This extension, at no additional cost to the Government, would bring about completion of this task order, and at the same time would spell out in some detail several changes in scope and content of the task order to be pursued during the period of extension requested. Paperwork is now being prepared on this item and should be in my hands shortly for transmission to and other interested parties. This request for an extension of time in no way reflects that the contractor has failed to perform the task which he was assigned under the terms of the original technical proposal. It merely reflects that we were unable to anticipate the many avenues of investigation which presented themselves, mainly because of the nature of the investigations and our inability to predict the probable outcome with any confidence.
