You were previously advised we were consulting with another agency concerning information located as a result of your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request.

#### **EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS**

#### SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual;
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

#### STEPHEN IRWIN ABRAMS

On October 17, 1962 T-1 a confidential source abroad, advised that STEPHEN IRWIN ARRAMS landed at Dover. England from Ostend, Belgium on October 7, 1962 at which time he advised the British immigration officer he had been a lecturer in Moscow in January 1962, also that he had been studying at St. Catherine's College, Oxford, England for the past several years.

According to T-1 ARRANS possessed U. S. Passport 1813129 issued in Washington, D. C. on October 29, 1959. ABRAMS was born July 15, 1938 in Chicago, Illinois and his address was given as 7 Keble Road, Oxford, England.


On January 27, 1965 T-2 furnished


information as follows:

On January 4, 1965 ABRAMS contacted the U. S. Embassy, London, to report his tentative acceptance of a Soviet Government research grant covering two years work at the University of Leningrad and at this time he inquired as to what effect this acceptance would have on his American citizenship. It was indicated to ARKAMS that so long as he did not take an oath of allegiance, or do work on sensitive Soviet governmental contracts his American citizenship would not be affected by acceptance of such a grant.

ARRAMS on this occasion revealed that he had been on close terms with a Czech scientist residing in Czechoslovakia and described as a "staunch anti-Communist". ARRAMS advised he met this scientist through a Soviet scientist, Professor (FNU) VASILIEV. ABRAMS also claimed to have made one or more trips to the Soviet Bloc during which he had discussed with Professor VASILIEV the research grant he claimed to have, beginning the summer of 1965.

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ARRAMS was at Oxford University until at least October 1964. In July 1964 he stated he expected to complete his Doctorate in Philosophy thesis before the end of the year and commented that he had been offered a position, the Perrott-Warrick Studentship of Trinity College, Cambridge University for a period of two years. Reportedly he was also offered a second position as director of a projected Biological Telecommunications Unit at Enfield College of Technology. Reportedly he also expected to receive funds from a research grant and to have filed an application in July of 1964 with the American National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

In his early years at Oxford ARRAMS was supported by grants from foreign foundations, namely the Bollingen Foundation and the Human Ecology Fundament

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Re London letter 10/17/62 advising that ABRAMS was born 7/15/38 in Chicago and that he had landed at Dover, England on 10/7/62. Rebulet 11/5/62 which set forth information from Bureau files re an individual known as IRWIN ABRAMS employed as a professor of history at Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio from 1947 until about 1952. Since the subject of this case was born 7/15/38 it is not likely he is identical with the IRWIN ABRAMS since he would only have been 9 years old in 1947.

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Recheck Bureau files and Identification files regarding subject. Obtain information regarding his application for employment in July 1964 with the American National Aeronautics and Space Administration, obtaining all background information available.

Check passport files, U. S. State Department.

Any additional investigation desired by the Bureau based on the foregoing is left to the discretion of the Bureau.
