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

ORGANIZATION - GENERAL

Organization of Intermediate Command Headquarters of Strategic Air Command

(Supersedes SAC Reg 20-1, 13 Aug 52)

- PURPOSE. This regulation outlines a standard organizational structure for Strategic Air Command intermediate command headquarters. It also prescribes placement of functions in a manner which will standardize, insofar as possible, the major functions of such units.
- 2. SCOPE. The provisions of this regulation are applicable to the Second, Eighth, and Fifteenth Air Forces, the 3D, 5TH, and 7TH Air Divisions, and such other units as may be specifically designated by this headquarters.
- 3. GENERAL. Strategic Air Command mobility plans require the integration of parts of two or more subordinate headquarters into an operating task force capable of immediate command effectiveness in a forward area. Prior to this integration it is essential that the normal routines of the units concerned be established on a common basis in order to permit a smooth meshing of the various components into a structure capable of effecting the basic purposes of the command. The transition must not be delayed by the necessity of fitting individuals into unfamiliar organizational patterns. This requires the pre-arrangement and standardization of organizational patterns for the units involved to the maximum degree possible and the continued adherence to these patterns. The organizational structure specified herein conforms as closely as possible to that in effect at this headquarters. It is directed that this pattern be followed unless deviations are authorized by this headquarters.
 - 4. RESPONSIBILITIES. An intermediate command headquarters is responsible for:
- a. Directing and supervising the activities of all assigned and attached units, bases, and personnel and maintaining them in a state of readiness to effect immediate operations.
- b. Manning, training, and equipping assigned and attached units to accomplish the primary mission.
 - c. Preparation for and participation in disaster relief and other domestic emergencies.
- d. Performing such other special missions as the Commander, Strategic Air Command, may direct.
- ORGANIZATIONAL TITLES. a. The standard breakdown of organizational titles which will be utilized are listed below in descending sequence.
 - (1) Directorate.
 - (2) Division.
 - (3) Branch.
 - (4) Section.

b. The staff agencies of Judge Advocate, Chaplain, Surgeon, Inspector General, and Special Assistant will be referred to as "Offices" and the subordinate elements will be titled in the same manner as the directorates, i.e., divisions, branches, and sections.

6. ORGANIZATIONAL DETAILS, a. Command.

- Commander. Exercises command and direction of all assigned units, bases, personnel, and certain attached units.
- (2) Deputy Commander. Acts as principal assistant and advisor to the commander. Fulfills the duties of the commander in his absence.
- (3) Chief of Staff. Acts as advisor and assistant to the commander and deputy commander. Directly supervises the administrative activities of the headquarters.
- b. Office of the Judge Advocate. Acts as legal advisor to the commander and staff. Supervises legal assistance and military justice programs throughout the command. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Military Justice.
 - (2) Military Affairs.
 - (3) Legal Assistance.
- c. Office of the Chaplain. Acts as advisor to commander and staff on all matters pertaining to religious life, morals, morale, character guidance, and related matters. Directs, supervises, and evaluates chaplain activities throughout the command. Maintains liaison with civilian religious and social service activities. Internal organization will consist of personnel and administration and professional services.
- d. Office of the Surgeon. Advises commander on medical matters. Directs and supervises all medical activities of the command. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Professional Services.
 - (2) Administrative Services.
- e. Office of the Inspector General. Informs the commander of the state of the command through inspections and investigations. Formulates plans and policies for maintenance of discipline and security in the command. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Inspection.
 - (2) Provost Marshal.
- f. Office of Special Assistant. Plans and directs the public and internal information programs of the command. Undertakes special projects as directed by the commander. Advises the commander on all public information matters and public relations aspects of command decisions and actions. Implements internal and public information policies and historical activities and policies of the command. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Information (Internal).

- (2) Public Information.
- (3) Historical.
- g. Office of the Adjutant. Formulates and monitors administrative procedures for the headquarters. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Administrative.
 - (2) Publications and Forms Management.
 - (3) Mail and Records Management.
- h. Comptroller Directorate. Supervises and coordinates matters pertaining to dollar resources. Collects, analyzes, and presents information necessary for the accomplishment of approved programs. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Budget and Accounting.
 - (2) Finance.
 - (3) Statistical Services.
 - (4) Management Analysis.
- i. Directorate of Personnel. Plans, directs, and supervises all military personnel activities of the command including status of personnel, manning of units, technical training, and services. (In oversea theaters, a civilian personnel liaison function will be established.) Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Programming.
 - (2) Assignment. Status Branch.
 - (3) Personnel Services.
 - (4) Ground Safety (directly responsible to the Director of Personnel).
- j. Directorate of Intelligence. Formulates and directs intelligence plans, policies, and procedures. Collects, evaluates, produces, and disseminates intelligence information and materials required to support the mission of the command. Advises the commander in the planning and conduct of air operations. Exercises operational control over assigned command reconnaissance technical units. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Target Intelligence.
 - (2) Combat Intelligence.
- k. Directorate of Operations. Responsible for operational planning, development of tactical doctrine and procedures, current operations, flying safety, communications-electronics, and promulgation of a training program in the command. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Operations and Training.
 - (2) Training.

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- (3) Flying Safety.
- (4) Communications-Electronics.
- (5) Standardization Board.
- Directorate of Materiel. Plans and supervises the materiel activities of the command including logistics planning, supply, maintenance, armament-electronics, transportation, and installations. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Logistics.
 - (2) Supply.
 - (3) Maintenance Engineering.
 - (4) Armament-Electronics.
 - (5) Installations.
 - (6) Transportation.
- m. Directorate of Plans. Directs and monitors the formulation of plans, programs, policies, organization, efficiency, and economy in the utilization of command resources. Comprises the following divisions:
 - (1) Plans and Programs.
 - (2) Manpower and Organization.
- n. Headquarters Squadron Section. Provides services, supplies, and facilities for operation of the headquarters. Administers all personnel assigned to the headquarters. May include messing facilities and a headquarters flight section when specifically approved by this head-
- 7. CHANGES AND DEVIATIONS. Changes or deviations desired by individual commanders to the organizational pattern specified herein will be submitted in writing to this headquarters, ATTENTION: Directorate of Plans, Manpower and Organization Division. Requested changes must be accompanied by appropriate justification and sufficient information to support the facts that the desired change will not impede integration or require reorganization or provisionalization at the time of merging. Such changes normally will not be approved unless the concurrence of all affected headquarters is obtained.

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
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ORGANIZATION CHART

PART I - GENERAL

- PURPOSE. This regulation prescribes a standard organizational pattern for Strategic Air Command combat wings. It further directs uniform placement of all functions normally required for garrison and field operations.
- SCOPE. The provisions of this regulation are applicable to all Strategic Air Command combat wings including those in oversea areas.
- 3. OPERATIONAL CONCEPT. a. The combat wing is an organization designed for immediate deployment for sustained operations, combining into a single unit the combat and supporting elements necessary to carry out this mission. It provides for clean-cut command channels and assignment of personnel to the unit charged with their utilization and welfare. An individual is clothed, housed, paid, promoted, and administered by the commander who is charged with working that
- b. The wing is the basic operational unit. The groups and squadrons are mutually dependent upon and operate under the direction of a single commander, the wing commander. By molding all interdependent elements into a whole, a self-sufficient organization, capable of sustained effective action, is formed.
- 4. WORKLOADS, a. The operation of a wing involves two separate workloads. The first is that incident to the readiness mission of the wing. The second type of workload is that incident to the operation of the installation under peacetime conditions, i.e., a 44-hour workweek, normal pass and leave schedule, additional functions such as budget and accounting, base housing, and others for which there are no T/O counterpart. This second workload will vary from time to time because of geographic location, changes in total population, number and type of tenant units, available facilities, etc.
- b. In some instances, there are missions to be performed on a base which are not coincident with those being performed by a T/O unit. In these cases a separate non-T/O unit, defined as a Table of Distribution (T/D), may be organized.
- GENERAL PLACEMENT OF FUNCTIONS. The wing organization consists of the wing headquarters, the combat and maintenance squadrons, and a tactical hospital (which are assigned directly to the wing), an air base group with the support squadrons, and a fixed medical treat-

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- a. The wing headquarters is the directing head for the wing organization and functions as both a planning and an operating agency. The wing commander will be the combat commander.
- b. The air base group is charged with those functions associated with the operation of a base. Normal composition is an air base group headquarters and specifically named squadrons that perform the functions of security (including the maintenance of law and order and other police functions), installations, food service, operations and training (including communications), motor vehicle, supply, and the fixed medical treatment facility. The commander of the air base group will be designated as the air base commander.
- c. The medical service is comprised of two autonomous type units which are integrated to provide total tactical medical support of the combat wing, and the operation of a fixed medical treatment facility to provide base level, area, or specialized medical service. This dual responsibility is performed by one staff through the utilization of personnel assigned to the tactical and fixed hospital units. The tactical hospital (T/O) is mobile and highly flexible, capable of being subdivided into elements adaptable to rapid movement with the combat units. The USAF hospital (non-T/O) will constitute the permanent party for command and operation of the fixed medical treatment facility. The senior medical officer assigned will be the tactical hospital commander and will be directly responsible to the wing commander for all medical support to the tactical wing. Normally, he will be attached to the USAF hospital for duty as hospital commander and will be responsible to the air base commander for the operation of the fixed medical treatment facility. On a multiple wing base, the senior medical officer assigned will be designated, also, as division surgeon and will act as advisor to the division commander on all matters pertaining to the medical service. The greater portion of the staff of the fixed medical treatment facility will be personnel attached for duty from the tactical medical unit(s).
- 6. ORGANIZATION. a. Organizational structure of all units will follow the pattern of functions authorized in the applicable manning document(s).
- b. Function titles and corresponding code numbers, authorized for use on manning documents and organization charts, are contained in AFM 171-5, as amended, and SAC Reg 26-1, 30 Mar 54.
- c. Primary functions, in some instances, may have sub-element functions depicted on the manning document(s), with personnel authorizations allocated specifically for that particular sub-agency. Organization chart will indicate these sub-agencies under the jurisdiction of the applicable primary function.
- d. Subdivisions of primary or sub-element functions, not shown as a separate sub-agency in the manning document, will reflect the sub-division breakdown on local organization charts only.
- 7. OPERATING PRINCIPLES. a. The principles of correct command and staff procedures must be fully recognized and followed. Control is exercised by the wing commander through the group and squadron commanders, as appropriate. The staffs of the air division, wing, air base group, and squadrons possess no command function. As staff personnel, their authority is limited to that of assisting the commander through planning, inspecting, investigating, and recommending. All directives are issued in the name of the appropriate commander. The commander may delegate duties to an appropriate staff officer or unit commander. An officer, so designated, may issue directives or sign correspondence, relative to such delegated functions, "For the Commander" or "By Order of the Commander." However, delegation of duties does not relieve the commander of the responsibility imposed upon him nor of the requirement for appropriate command supervision. The air base commander may not delegate those duties which are imposed upon the air base commander by the Uniform Code of Military Justice, appropriation acts, or other statutory provisions.

- c. When the wing is transferred PCS from a single wing base, this headquarters may direct a numbered station unit to be organized as a T/D unit to maintain the base if the circumstances warrant.
- d. All units will be responsible for performing operator maintenance on utilized motor vehicles and organizational maintenance on all motorized equipment used in support of aircraft maintenance.
- e. Records management will be accomplished in accordance with AFM 181-4 and AFM 181-5, as amended.

SECTION II - WING ORGANIZATIONAL DETAILS

- 8. WING HEADQUARTERS. a. General. The function of the wing headquarters is to provide command and staff supervision over assigned units and to exercise such control over attached units as may be prescribed. The wing headquarters is organically capable of performing this function, and directing the operation of the base occupied, in such a manner as to insure adequate training essential to the accomplishment of the assigned mission. The wing headquarters will be the single addressee for a one-wing base.
 - b. Organization.
 - (1) Command.
 - (2) Staff agencies.
 - (a) Inspection.
 - (b) Adjutant.
 - (c) Squadron headquarters.
 - (d) Comptroller.
 - (e) Personnel.
 - (f) Operations.
 - Operations and Training (includes flying safety officer who reports to and is directly responsible to the wing commander).
 - 2. Intelligence.
 - 3. Communications.
 - (g) Materiel (combinations of elements listed below will be in accordance with applicable T/O).
 - 1. Logistics.

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- 2. Maintenance.
 - a. Maintenance Control Unit (T/O: Maintenance Control).
 - (1) Supply Unit (T/O: Supply Control).
 - (2) Aircraft Records Unit (T/O: Aircraft Records and TOC).
 - b. Quality Control Unit (T/O: Quality Control).
 - c. Aircraft Maintenance Standardization Team (T/O: Maintenance Standardization).
- 3. Supply.
- COMBAT SQUADRONS, a. Normal assignment is three primary mission squadrons per wing plus one air refueling squadron. The function of each squadron is to maintain a state of readiness for and the execution of assigned tactical missions.
 - b. Organization.
 - (1) Command.
 - (2) Operating sections.
 - (a) Personnel and Administration.
 - (b) Operations and Training (includes Survival Training and Personal Equipment).
 - 1. Intelligence.
 - 2. Combat Crews.
 - (c) Maintenance (in accordance with SAC Manuals of the 66 series) (combinations of elements listed below will be in accordance with applicable T/O).
 - 1. Aircraft Ground Crews.
 - 2. Post Flight Crews.
 - 3. Motorized and Ground Servicing Equipment (T/O: Auxiliary Equipment).
 - 4. Tool Crib and Aircraft 263 (T/O: Tool Room).
 - (d) Supply.
- 10. STRATEGIC SUPPORT SQUADRON, a. General. Strategic support squadrons are operationally controlled by the numbered air force to which assigned and are administratively and logistically supported by the wing to which attached. These squadrons are responsible for and capable of providing immediate and sustained global airlift support of Strategic Air Command units as required.
 - b. Organization.
 - (i) Command.

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(2) Operating sections.

(a) Personnel.

- (b) Operations and Training (includes intelligence, survival training, and personal equipment).
 - 1. Combat Crews.
 - 2. Communications-Electronics.

11. RECONNAISSANCE TECHNICAL SQUADRON. a. General. Assignment is one squadron per base when a strategic reconnaissance wing, or wings, is assigned to the base. When one strategic reconnaissance wing is assigned to a base, the reconnaissance technical squadron will be assigned to the wing. When two strategic reconnaissance wings are assigned to a base, the reconnaissance technical squadron will be assigned to the air base group and will function under the general operational surveillance of the air division operations officer. The commander of the reconnaissance technical squadron in this case will collaborate and coordinate directly with the staff director of operations of each reconnaissance wing in the execution of the primary mission. The reconnaissance technical squadron is responsible for and organically capable of processing aerial and radar-scope film, immediate photo interpretation, and submission of all resulting material to higher headquarters.

The base accountable officer (air base group) will exercise technical and administrative supervision over the functions comprising the base supply and will keep the air base group director of materiel advised of the status of these functions. The supply squadron will be responsible for the requisitioning, receipt, storage, handling, issue, and ration breakdown of subsistence supplies and the operation of a commissary when authorized. The supply squadron commander will report directly to the air base commander on purely administrative details and to the air base group director of materiel on technical matters pertaining to the subsistence, laundry, clothing sales store, memorial services, and salvage and disposal operations.

When not deployed or engaged in unit tactical training, personnel will be attached for duty to the fixed medical treatment facility for accomplishment of base medical service responsibilities.
- b. USAF Hospital, Infirmary, or Dispensary (non-T/O). Normally, each base will have one fixed medical treatment facility. The type and size of this facility will be in accordance with the approved bed authorization established. The USAF hospital, when authorized, will be responsible for and capable of furnishing definitive treatment for all persons authorized medical care. The USAF infirmary, when authorized, will be responsible for furnishing definitive treatment, within its capabilities, for all persons authorized medical care. The USAF dispensary, when authorized, will be responsible for and capable of furnishing out-patient service for all persons authorized medical care.
 - c. Assignment.
 - (1) The tactical hospital (T/O) will be assigned to the wing.
 - (2) The USAF hospital, infirmary, or dispensary (non-T/O) will be assigned to the highest echelon exercising command of the installation, i.e., the wing on a single wing base; the air division on a multiple wing base. The USAF hospital, infirmary, or dispensary unit is attached to the air base group for all purposes.
- d. Organization. Tactical hospitals and fixed medical treatment facilities will be organized in accordance with AFRs 160-105 and 23-18, as amended. USAF hospital and infirmary units are considered the equivalent of air force groups; dispensary units are considered the equivalent of squadrons.

SECTION III - DIVISION STATION ORGANIZATIONAL DETAILS

23. GENERAL. a. In order to conserve manpower, economize on real estate resources, and to satisfy a tactical requirement, more than one combat wing may be assigned to a base. When more

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than one combat wing is assigned to a base, an air division will be activated to supervise, direct, correlate, and coordinate the operations of the assigned units.

- b. The primary mission of an air division is combat training of the assigned wings. The combat capabilities of the assigned wings are the basic factors in the performance of this primary mission, therefore, the air division will concentrate more on operations, flying training, and air-craft maintenance in the subordinate units than administrative and other support activities. The primary responsibility of the air division will be the formulation of policies. In order to avoid the necessity for direct participation in routine matters, the air division commander will utilize the command and staff elements of the subordinate units to the maximum extent possible consistent with the assigned functions. The air division headquarters will act as arbitrator to resolve controversial issues between the assigned units.
- c. The staff authorization of an air division is designed to aid the air division commander in accomplishing the arbitrative, supervisory, and inspectional responsibilities. This staff will inform and advise the air division commander regarding actual and anticipated problem areas.
- d. The air division headquarters will be designated as the addressee at an air division base.
 - e. The commander of the air division will be the senior officer assigned to the base.
 - f. The combat wings will be assigned to the air division.
- g. The air base group on an air division base is assigned to the air division and is responsible for supplying base support to the combat wings. Conflicts regarding the utilization of facilities will be referred to the air division commander for a decision. The air base commander will be responsible for all matters pertaining to base services. The adjutant of the air base group headquarters will be designated as the officer of authentication for the air division. The message center of the air base group headquarters will process all incoming and outgoing correspondence.
- h. The USAF hospital, infirmary, or dispensary will be assigned to the air division and attached to the air base group for all purposes.
 - 24. RESPONSIBILITIES. The air division will:
- a. Provide command supervision and direction of the combat operations of assigned wings.
- b. Provide command supervision and direction of the combat training of assigned wings, insuring that the highest standards of quality are attained.
 - c. Promote standardization of operating techniques of assigned combat wings.
- d. Insure that proper emphasis within combat wings is being placed upon the essential preparations for execution of assigned combat missions.
- e. Monitor closely and participate in, by means of observer personnel, the execution of all simulated combat missions conducted by the assigned combat wings.
- f. Provide command supervision, direction, and correlation of the functions of the air base group.
 - g. Correlate the activities of all assigned units.

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h. Advise the numbered air force headquarters concerned as to any action required to improve operational capability of assigned units.

25. ORGANIZATION.

- 26. TDY MOVEMENT OF A WING. If, on an air division base, one wing is placed on a TDY status, the following actions will occur:

- b. Air base support personnel required at the TDY base will move as individuals and will be utilized to augment the existing units at the TDY base.
- c. If a strategic reconnaissance wing is placed on TDY, the reconnaissance technical squadron will provide a detachment to move with and support the TDY wing.
 - d. The air division headquarters will remain at the home station.

SECTION IV - COMPOSITE WING ORGANIZATIONAL DETAILS

- 27. To provide for the necessary organizational flexibility or task force requirement, a composite wing may be authorized.
- 28. A composite wing is an organization whose combat squadrons have assigned nonidentical type missions or aircraft.
- 29. Support squadrons within a composite wing will be organized to provide the necessary personnel and equipment.


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

- 1. Inactivation of aviation squadrons will be effective 1 Jul 54 per Headquarters SAC General Order 48, 10 Jun 54.
- 2. Manning, Each A&E Maintenance Squadron will be augmented on the July 1954 T/D-A:s by one officer and eleven airmen. All officer positions have been filled except for the 12th A&E Squadron, and the selection of this last officer is expected within a few days. Airmen resources from aviation squadrons have been utilized at Bergstrom, Biggs, Carswell, and Walker AFB's to fill priority No. 1 teams to the extent they are available. Airmen resources not required for priority No. 1 teams have been applied to priority No. 2 teams to the extent they are available. Airmen in excess to the requirements of Nos. 1 and 2 priority teams at the foregoing stations in the 331-O career field have been designated for reassignment to Limestone AFB. Manning responsibility of Weapons Maintenance Teams at Dow and Ellsworth AFB's has been assumed by SAC. After implementation of the above actions, the following vacancies in AFSC 46170/50 will exist within squadrons indicated which cannot be filled from 8AF resources.

- 5. Surplus technically trained personnel for whom reassignment instructions have not been received will be requested by SAC on approximately 1 Aug 54.

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- 6. The capability and proper organization for an atomic weapons support unit is under study at this headquarters.
- 7. Equipment. SAC will mail 20-33 ECL's to all organizations concerned by approximately 1 Jul 54.
- 8. Publications. Instructions have been sent to all wings on the distribution and procurement of special weapons technical publications and tech orders.
- 9. Facilities of all stations have been surveyed for adequacy and availability. Three stations (Altus, Bergstrom and Dow AFB's) do not have adequate facilities. Facilities are programmed in the FY 55 M&O Program for Altus AFB and in the Public Works Program FY 54 for Dow AFB and Bergstrom AFB. Probable beneficial occupancy dates of special weapons training buildings are January 1955 at Altus AFB, October 1954 at Bergstrom AFB, and December 1954 at Dow AFB.
 - 10. Unit training standards are being prepared by SAC.

- 1. Manning. a. All officer positions have been filled on the AME Squadron twelve-man teams. Nineteen airman vacancies exist in the 461 career field, munitions maintenance.
- b. The reassignment of eight technically trained officers to AMC sites at Rushmore, South Dakota, and Caribou, Maine, has been directed by SAC. Six officers have been released from the special weapons program, and disposition is pending on the nine remaining assembly trained officers within the command.
- 2. SAC Reg 82-2, which governs unit training standards, is now being published. The majority of other regulations, directives, SOP's, etc., affected by the atomic weapons support augmentation for ANE Maintenance Squadrons will be published approximately 15 ANG 5h.

b. SAAMA is shipping 39D equipment authorized on Interim ECL 20-33 to the 28th SRW. SAMMA airlifted 8000 pounds of 39D equipment to Ellsworth AFB on 22 JUL 54. Three training weapons will be delivered on 26 JUL 54.

PART I - PROGRESS EVALUATION

l. All staff actions necessary for the successful implementation of this plan have been completed. This does not mean that all special weapons teams have 100 percent EWP capability but means that further action required can be completed as normal staff action. The implementing staff actions of each directorate follows below.

2. Director of Personnel:

- a. Manning. All "priority 1" teams are completely manned or have a known input of personnel. A shortage of personnel in the 461XO career field has hampered manning of "priority 2" teams. An emergency requisition for 25 munition maintenance men has been submitted, and Headquarters USAF indicates the requisition will be filled in DEC 54.
- b. Logistic and administrative personnel who are not trained in special weapons have been reassigned in accordance with instructions issued by this headquarters.
- c. Technically trained personnel in 8AF have been assigned to A&E teams to the fullest extent possible.
- d. Excess personnel resulting from this plan have been reported to Headquarters SAC for reassignment.

3. Director of Operations:

- a. Training standards have been published by Headquarters SAC in the 82 series manuals.
- b. Coordination with appropriate staff agencies pertaining to organization, personnel authorization, capability of units, and adequacy of facilities has been completed, and staff policies have been established.

4. Director of Materiel:

a. Equipment changes required to implement this plan have been coordinated with Headquarters SAC. Interim ECL 20-33 has been published and distributed.

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SUBJECT: Progress Report #4 (Final), Atomic Weapons Support Augmentation for A&E Maintenance Squadrons (8AF Programming Plan 19-54) Status as of 1 NOV 54

b. All additional equipment required by ECL 20-33 is on requisition, and is being shipped and/or procured by SAAMA.

- c. Excess materiel resources are being reallocated or being disposed of otherwise. Shipping instructions have been issued on all excess materiel.
- d. Facilities for the 7th BW, 11th BW, 27th SFW, 28th SRW, 95th BW, 97th BW, 509th BW, and 6th BW are considered adequate. The 506th SFW has initiated work orders to make their facilities adequate. New facilities for the 27th SFW are being constructed, and the 12th SFW will take over the present facilities of the 27th SFW. The Special Weapons Building for the 42d BW is programmed to be completed in AUG 55 under FY55 PWP.

5. Director of Plans:

- a. Inactivation of aviation squadrons was accomplished by SAC GO #48 dated 10 JUN 54.
- b. AME special weapons teams were authorized 1 officer and 11 airmen by SAC PAV's dated 19 JUN 54.
 - c. All organization actions have been completed.

6. Inspector General:

- a. Security measures required by the implementation of this plan have been reviewed, and those measures which were in effect in the aviation squadrons are considered adequate for this plan.
- b. Required capability of special weapons teams is determined by special and regular inspections of the teams. At the present time the 27th SFW, 95th BW, 7th BW, 506th SFW, 28th SFW, and 6th BW are considered capable of carrying out their missions, considering primary weapon utilized. The 97th BW and the 11th BW have limited capabilities. The 12th SFW, 42d BW, and 509th BW are considered incapable of carrying out their assigned missions.

COLONEL CARL E. JACKSON, 3852A, distinguished himself by heroism involving voluntary risk of life at Lowry Air Force Base, Denver, Colorado, on 3 July 1954. While on a take-off in a T-33 aircraft, COLONEL JACKSON, discovering that the ship was not responding normally, decided to abort the attemped flight two-thirds of the way down the runway. Leaving the end of the runway, he retracted the gear and came to a halt. Hearing the airman aboard his aircraft cry for help, COLONEL JACKSON pulled the canopy jettison handle. The instant the canopy fired, the entire aircraft was engulfed in flames. COLONEL JACKSON dived over the left side of the burning cockpit, landed on his head and rolled over on his back. Though stunned, COLONEL JACKSON, hearing a cry of agony from the airman still in the blazing plane, rose to his feet, jumped to the left wing and reached for the passenger's safety belt with his right hand. Though the intensity of the flames made it impossible for COLONEL JACKSON to see, he succeeded in locating the passenger's shoulder harness and safety belt and heroically attempted to release him until the intense flames and agonizing burns forced COLONEL JACKSON to abandon his courageous efforts. COLONEL JACKSON's valiant actions and supreme self-sacrifice on behalf of a fellow airman demonstrated heroism at its highest and were in the finest tradition of the Armed Services.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 2 July 1926, and Transfer Order 30, 1948, the Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to the following-named airmen:

TECHNICAL SERGEANT PRUDENCIO URANGA, AF18199466, distinguished himself by an act of heroism involving voluntary risk of life at Hayward Air National Guard Base, Hayward, California, on 7 December 1953, while serving as a Civilian Air Technician with the California Air National Guard. An explosion in the pumping compartment of an F-2 refueling unit set the unit afire and threw burning aircraft fuel upon SERGEANT URANGA. After extinguishing the flames on his clothing, SERGEANT URANGA displayed outstanding courage and selfless disregard for his own safety by entering the tractor of the furiously burning fuel trailer and driving it from the aircraft parking area. SERGEANT URANGA, without benefit of protective clothing, and although he had sustained first and second degree burns of his hands, arms, and face, then assisted in subduing the fire in the fuel trailer. The courage and devotion to duty displayed by SERGEANT URANGA in this emergency reflect great credit upon himself, the Air National Guard and the United States Air Force.

AIRMAN FIRST CLASS DARL N. ASHBAUGH, AF17309496, distinguished himself by heroism involving voluntary risk of life near Nakasato, Japan, on 5 February 1954. While serving as an aero medic aboard an Air Force helicopter, AIRMAN ASHBAUGH demonstrated outstanding determination and courage in the rescue of a Naval airman who has crashed in deep snow in the mountains. Due to the deep snow the helicopter could not land. After effecting a successful hoist pick-up of one survivor, AIRMAN ASHBAUGH voluntarily descended to the crash area via the hoist in search of other survivors and found one dead crew member and an airman trapped in the badly mangled wreckage. Although he was greatly hampered in his efforts by the grasps of the delirious victim, AIRMAN ASHBAUGH worked laboriously for over three hours with a sheath knife as his only tool until the trapped airman was freed. Once during this ordeal AIRMAN ASHBAUGH was swept away by a snow slide but emerged from the waist-deep snow to resume his efforts. Until the rescue and evacuation of the victim could be accomplished, AIRMAN ASHBAUGH sheltered and treated him. AIRMAN ASHBAUGH again volunteered to remain at the crash scene to guard the body of the deceased airman and the wreckage. After spending the night in sub-zero weather wrapped only in a the wreckage. After spending the fight in sub-zero weather wrapped only in a nylon tent and parachute for warmth, AIRMAN ASHBAUGH walked through the snow to a village eight miles away where he was treated for exposure and exhaustion. AIRMAN ASHBAUGH'S heroic actions on behalf of his fellow man are in the finest tradition of the military service and reflect the highest degree of credit upon himself and the United States Air Force.

AIRMAN SECOND CLASS AUGUSTAS FULTON, AF18353201, distinguished Althority Second Class involving voluntary risk of life at Hickam Air Force Base, Territory of Hawaii, on 21 February 1954. While serving as an Apprentice Air Policeman on a motor patrol, AIRMAN FULTON noticed flames enveloping the curbing near the rear of a refueling trailer loaded with gasoline. The trailer, parked in an aqua system containing thousands of gallons of high The trailer, parked in an aqua system containing thousands of gallons of high test aviation gasoline, was in danger of being ignited and exploding. Displaying high courage and judgment, AIRMAN FULTON parked his Air Police Vehicle so as to block oncoming traffic and reported the fire by radio. With complete disregard for his own safety, AIRMAN FULTON then obtained a number of CO2 fire extinguishers, ran to the trailer and, with the aid of another airman, extinguished the threatening flames. AIRMAN FULTON'S presence of mind and heroism in this crisis minimized the property damage and averted a disaster with possible loss of lives. AIRMAN FULTON'S decisive actions, courage, and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest standards of Air Force conduct devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest standards of Air Force conduct and bring great credit to himself and the United States Air Force.

AIRMAN THIRD CLASS PAUL N. J. ABAIRE, AF21635392, distinguished himself by an act of heroism involving voluntary risk of life at Hickam Air Force Base, Territory of Hawaii, on 21 February 1954. While serving as an Apprentice Air Policeman on a motor patrol, AIRMAN ABAIRE noticed flames enveloping the curbing near the rear of a refueling trailer parked in the Aqua System.

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EIGHTH AIR FORCE PROGRAMMING PLAN 102-54

SUBJECT: Movement of Headquarters Eighth Air Force and Certain Units to Westover AFB

OBJECTIVE:

1. To provide this headquarters with a plan which, when implemented, will result in the efficient move of Eighth Air Force Headquarters and certain units from Carswell AFB to Westover AFB.

STAFF CONSIDERATIONS:

- 2. The transfer of command jurisdiction of Westover from MATS to this headquarters will take place on 1 February 1955. This will result in an immediate requirement for an Air Base Group for support and the development of sufficient facilities, including communications, to support an Eighth Air Force ADVON which will be moved into place as soon as facilities permit.
- 3. To insure this capability, the Air Base Group will be activated on or about 8 January 1955. This will permit sufficient time for planning, programming input, manning, and integration of personnel presently assigned to MATS who will be transferred to Eighth Air Force.
- 4. The move will be phased with the availability of facilities but planned so that the headquarters is operational at Westover no later than 1 April 1955. The move will be completed on or before 30 June 1955.
- 5. Accordingly, it is planned to form an ADVON which will be in place at Westover on or about 1 February 1955. It is further contemplated that the main body will make the move in June 1955, in two phases. The second phase will complete the move no later than 25 June 1955.
- 6. Representatives of interested staff agencies of this headquarters conferred on 13 October 1954 for the purpose of analyzing the problem, developing a suitable plan and determining the necessary implementing action. (List of conferees attached as Inclosure 1)

FACTS BEARING ON THE PROBLEM:

7. A transfer agreement for Westover AFB will be effected between MATS and SAC prior to the movement of this headquarters.

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- 8. Command jurisdiction of Westover AFB will be transferred from MATS to SAC on 1 February 1955.
- 9. The 65th Strategic Fighter Wing with the 65th Air Base Group will be activated on or about 8 January 1955.
- 10. Those officers and airmen of the 8th Reconnaissance Technical Squadron at Carswell AFB will be transferred to Westover AFB with Headquarters Eighth Air Force. That portion of the 8th Reconnaissance Technical Squadron located at Ellsworth AFB will move to Westover AFB when facilities for this activity are available (estimated BOD May 1955).
- 11. The 2d Weather Squadron Headquarters will move to Westover with Headquarters Eighth Air Force.
- 12. Movement will be made in accordance with applicable provisions of Air Force Regulations 75-2, 75-20, 75-38 and SAC Regulation 76-1.

AGREED COURSES OF ACTION:

- 13. A Space Allocation Committee will be established. Interested agencies will furnish this committee with space requirements which will be reviewed against availability. Space will be allocated to agencies together with building layout drawings for planning purposes.
- 14. A Facilities Requirements Board will be established. Interested agencies will furnish this board with requirements. Upon allocation of facilities each agency will plan location and utilization, incorporating these in the space allocated.
- 15. Each agency will furnish an ADVON, as required, to insure that necessary operating facilities are in place prior to the move of the main body.
- 16. A Movement Plan will be formulated based on an ADVON and the main body. It is contemplated that air transport of equipment will be used insofar as possible to insure the least loss of time in the transfer of this headquarters.
- 17. For planning purposes, the date of assumption of command jurisdiction at Westover AFB will be referred to as X-Day.
 - 18. The tentative plan is for the movement to be in four phases:
 - a. Phase I: Present date to X 30.
 - (1) Preliminary planning.
 - (a) Space allocation.
 - (b) Determination and initiation of action on required facilities.

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- (c), Movement plan.
- (d) Programming Plan for the 65th Wing.
- (2) Preliminary supply action.
- b. Phase II: X 30 to X 10.
 - (1) Activation, manning, and equipping of the 65th Wing to include the 65th Air Base Group.
 - (2) Preparation for movement.
- c. Phase III: X 10 to X-Day.
 - (1) ADVON transferred to Westover.
 - (2) Administrative and logistical facilities activated.
- d. Phase IV: (X Day to X / 145)
 - (1) X-Day to X / 120 Such action as required.
 - (2) X / 120 to X / 145 Phased movement of main body.
- 19. Availability of dependent housing will be monitored prior to and throughout the move.
- 20. Action will be initiated for programming of adequate housing for senior officers.
- 21. The Headquarters Eighth Air Force Liaison Office at Westover will be augmented as necessary to accomplish advanced actions required by this move.
- 22. Applicable personnel will be authorized one time military air transportation from Westover AFB to Carswell AFB to provide for TPA movement.
- 23. Required administrative aircraft and crews assigned to the 824th Air Base Group will be assigned to the 65th Air Base Group.

IMPLEMENTATION REQUIRED:

- 24. The Director of Personnel will:
- a. Insure that the Eighth Air Force Headquarters, the 18th Communications Squadron, and the 8th Reconnaissance Technical Squadron are adequately manned prior to the move.

- b. Insure that personnel making this move have adequate retainability, and consider hardship and compassionate cases.
- c. Be responsible for the integration of required personnel presently assigned to MATS, who will be transferred to Headquarters Eighth Air Force.
- d. Divert, where possible, personnel scheduled for assignment to Eighth Air Force to preclude unnecessary movements.
- e. Publish a personnel services, welfare and housing information bulletin for distribution throughout this headquarters.
- f. Insure transfer of WAF personnel from Carswell AFB in accordance with current directives.
- g_{\bullet} Determine and monitor the disposition of the 585th Air Force Band.
- $\ensuremath{\text{h.}}$ Publish a personnel policy relative to delay enroute and leave.
- i. Insure continuation of personnel and special service activities at Westover.
- ${f j}_{f \cdot}$ Program for such additional welfare facilities as will be required at Westover.
- k. Furnish the Director of Operations with a list of personnel requiring airlift to Westover together with required phasing.
- 1. Insure that crew members of assigned command aircraft are assigned to the 65th ${\tt Air}$ Base ${\tt Group}_{\:\raisebox{1pt}{\text{\circle*{1.5}}}}$

25. The Director of Operations will:

- a. Be responsible for movement of personnel and equipment requiring airlift to Westover.
- b. Determine the availability and extent of utilization of Eighth Air Force aircraft, including Strategic Support Squadrons.
- c. Determine the communications requirements for Westover AFB, initiate necessary action, and maintain close coordination with all higher and lower echelons on the communications plan.
- d. Coordinate and monitor all matters pertaining to the movement of the 18th Communications Squadron.
- e. Monitor the plans for the movement of the 2d Weather Squadron Headquarters.

- f. Take necessary action, in coordination with Materiel Directorate, to provide adequate MIT aircraft for Eighth Air Force Headquarters.
- g. In coordination with MD and the Eighth Air Force Liaison Officer at Westover, take necessary advanced action to insure that an adequate control room facility is in being at Westover by 10 March 1955.

26. The Director of Materiel will:

- a. Determine what equipment will accompany this move and what equipment should be in place at Westover.
- b. Furnish the Director of Operations with a list of equipment and materiel to be moved to Westover, together with any accompanying personnel.
- c. Develop and publish a movement plan in coordination with other staff directorates of this headquarters.
 - d. Make available the necessary surface and air transportation.
- e. Be responsible for assignment of dependent on-base quarters prior to the move, coordinating with Plans Directorate on availability.
- f. Provide, in coordination with OD, adequate ${\bf MIT}$ aircraft for Eighth ${\bf Air}$ Force Headquarters.
- ${\tt g.}$ Be responsible for the necessary renovation of buildings at Westover prior to the move.
- h. Supervise the preparation, control, crating, shipping and receiving of all equipment moving to Westover.
- i. Advise applicable overseas transportation officers of the new location and in-place date of Eighth Air Force Headquarters.
- j. Maintain coordination with and assist the 65th Air Base Group on all problems concerning materiel and base services.
- k. Be responsible for the implementation of such further supply action as may be received from SAC as pertains to supply, equipment and transportation.
- Monitor work projects status at Westover and make comparisons to the established requirements.
- m. Assure that adequate household storage is available at Westover.

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- n. Insure that adequate advanced action is taken to provide reputable moving van companies as required for the movement of household goods.
 - o. Insure that adequate troop housing is available.

27. The Adjutant will:

- a. Publish necessary orders.
- b. Insure, in coordination with the Comptroller, that personnel who must perform TDY travel to Westover in connection with this move will not lose TPA privileges.
- c. Determine the opening and closing dates of headquarters locations and in coordination with the Comptroller, notify all agencies concerned.
- $\mbox{\tt d.}$ Take necessary action to insure an even flow of publications and other correspondence during the move.
- e. Monitor the establishment of an AG printing plant at Westover.

28. The Comptroller will:

- a. Insure that funds are available to support the move.
- b. Prepare and submit all reports required in accordance with SAC Manual 171-1 and other applicable directives.
- c. Insure that project officers are appointed in all directorates and that officers render semi-monthly progress reports not later than the 15th and 30th of each month. Peports will contain an analysis and evaluation of progress in terms of effectiveness, pointing out phases which require particular attention.

29. The Surgeon will:

- a. Insure that adequate medical facilities are available at Westover.
- b. Monitor the evacuation of such hospital buildings at Westover as will be required by Eighth Air Force Headquarters.

30. The Inspector General will:

- a. Establish and monitor a security program for Westover.
- b. Be responsible for the staff supervision of the security at Westover from the date that Eighth Air Force assumes jurisdiction.

31. The Chaplain will:

a. Provide Chaplain assistance as applicable and monitor Chaplain facilities. $\overset{\text{\tiny \pm}}{}$

32. The Director of Intelligence will:

- a. Monitor the move of that portion of the 8th Reconnaissance Technical Squadron assigned to Headquarters Eighth Air Force, Carswell AFB.
- b. Monitor the move of the remainder of the 8th Reconnaissance Technical Squadron from Ellsworth when facilities become available at Westover.
- c. Insure that adequate facilities are available at Westover, for target material storage.
- d_{\bullet} Coordinate and monitor matters pertaining to the move of the Special Security Office.

33. The Headquarters Commandant will:

- a. Process records as required.
- b. Take necessary action in coordination with the Director of Materiel in regard to supply matters.
- c. Monitor troop housing in coordination with the Director of Materiel.

34. Office of the Special Assistant will:

a. Make public information releases as applicable.

35. The Director of Plans will:

- a. Coordinate, publish and distribute this programming plan.
- b. Revise this plan as required.
- c. Monitor the availability of dependent on-base housing at Westover, taking all possible action to make this housing available.
- d. Publish a programming plan for the activation, manning and equipping of the 65th Strategic Fighter Wing.
- e. Monitor the transfer of civilian personnel in conjunction with the Civilian Personnel Officers at Westover and Carswell. This will include monitoring the move of all civilian personnel who desire to be transferred from Carswell to Westover.

- f. Initiate action for adequate housing for senior officers.
- ${\tt g.}$ Recommend inactivation of the 1st Air Division, when no longer required.
- $h_{\:\raisebox{1pt}{\text{\circle*{1.5}}}}$ Form a committee to formulate policy on assignment of dependent on-base housing.
- i. Monitor the overall preparation for, and movement of this headquarters.

36. All Staff Agencies will:

- a. Insure maximum coordination and cooperation in the planning and execution of this movement and programming plan.
- b. Appoint project officers to monitor this program and submit reports on progress in accordance with Eighth Air Force Staff Memorandum 56-1.
- c. In addition, each agency will furnish a member as required for the Space Allocation Committee, the Facilities Requirements Board, and a project officer for the Movement Plan.

These two areas have the greatest amount of policy and administrative details, and therefore more implementing actions were accomplished in these areas. Other areas, particularly Operations and Materiel, have more operational type actions, and many of these cannot be accomplished this early in the plan implementation.
 - 2. The following implementing actions have been completed:
- a. Diversion Date for personnel being assigned to 8th AF Headquarters has been established as 1 May 55.
- b. Personnel and Special Services at Westover have been insured by arranging for the MATS special services personnel presently assigned to be transferred to Headquarters 8th AF, and to remain in their present duties after the transfer.
- c. Adequate Household Goods Storage have been determined to be available commercially at Westover.
- d. A Class "A" Printing Plant was assured by obtaining Headquarters USAF approval to move the present Headquarters 8th AF printing plant to West-over concurrent with the move of the main body. (See para. 8a below for full details)
- e. Housing Committee to formulate policy on assignment of on-base housing has been formed.

PART II - PROBLEM AREAS

3. The transfer agreement meeting with Headquarters Atlantic Division, MATS, at Westover on 26-28 OCT 54 revealed a most serious problem. MATS indicated, due to construction delays at McGuire AFB, they could not meet the phasing schedule previously established. Instead, they proposed a final phase-out date of 30 June 55. Since this plan was not acceptable to SAC, the facts will be presented to the Chief of Staff, USAF, for a decision (see paras. 5a & b below for full details). This development seriously hinders the implementation of this programming plan, as many actions must be held in abeyance until a firm phase-out date is established. (Confidential)

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- d. It has not been definitely determined that the 71st SFWg (formerly the 65th SFW) will be activated at Westover. There exists a possibility that it may be activated elsewhere and that AREFS will replace it at Westover. (Confidential)
- e. A Space Allocations Committee has been formed from members of PL, OD, MD, PD, and ID in accordance with a DF from the Chief of Staff. The committee met on 9 November 1954 for a preliminary meeting to discuss the possible assignment of various buildings to directorates and staff agencies. These plans will be studied and final recommendations will be made at the next meeting.
- f. A Facilities Requirements Board has been selected and is composed of representatives from PL, MD, and OD. This board will meet at a later date.
- g. Plans of all available appropriated housing at Westover were secured. In addition, representatives of this office visited the Wherry manager, and it was agreed that phasing in of 8th AF personnel would be accomplished through the base housing officer. Policies concerning the present assignment of Wherry Housing at Westover were secured for study.
- h. This headquarters will provide the central Civilian Personnel Office, Westover, with civilian personnel requirements 90 days prior to effective date of installations transfer.
- i. A letter was sent to SAC on 22 OCT 54 requesting additional senior officer housing. HQ SAC approved the letter and has forwarded it to HQ USAF.

6. OPERATIONS DIRECTORATE

- a. Meetings of the Space Allocation Committee were held on 4 and 8 NOV 54. During the latter meeting, this Directorate's member filed a minority report on the arrangement of space allocated for Operations.
- b. A letter was forwarded to Headquarters SAC requesting that action be taken to designate Westover AFB as a SAC Foreign Clearance Station, effective 15 JUN 55. The requirement for that station to be a Regular Foreign Clearance Station will be deleted at that time.

7. MATERIEL DIRECTORATE

a. 27 April 1954, between MATS and SAC was no longer practical because of construction slippage at McGuire AFB. Inasmuch as the SAC mission could not be superimposed upon the MATS mission, the agreement was based on the capability of MATS phase-out, subject to approval of higher headquarters. The agreement called for two squadrons of MATS to be moved NLT 30 April. HQ ATLD 15 May, another squadron NLT 31 May, and the remaining four squadrons to be moved NLT 30 June. (Confidential)

- b. This agreement was not approved by SAC HQ. Meetings were held at HQ USAF on 3 and 5 November 1954. The SAC position was that they wished to have a capability of placing 205 personnel from this headquarters at Westover AFB o/a 1 April 55. They also wished to activate one AREFS at Westover by 15 March and another by 1 April. The MATS position was that they could not move sufficient units in time for this capability. No agreement was reached. Conferees were told that a summary of the positions taken and the reasons therefor would be presented to the Chief of Staff, USAF, for decision. (Confidential)
- c. HQ SAC was requested to aid this headquarters in establishing procedures to facilitate movement of personnel without loss of TPA. This will be accomplished as follows:
- (1) HQ SAC will authorize the organization of an ABSq assigned to HQ 8AF at Carswell AFB to act as a holding unit. This unit will be authorized to issue TDY and PCS orders on personnel.
- (2) The 1st AD is presently in being at Westover AFB and is assigned to this headquarters; therefore, 8th AF personnel can be assigned to that unit with duty station at Westover.
- (3) Based on the above factors this will provide an administrative facility to do the following:
 - (a) Reassign personnel who can be released for PCS move to Westover prior to the official move of 8th AF HQ. These personnel can be assigned to the 1st AD at Westover and later reassigned to HQ 8th AF after it is moved to Westover
 - (b) Reassign those personnel who are required at Westover to provide an operational capability and who cannot be allowed time for PCS travel. They may be placed on TDY to allow their return to Carswell AFB and may be reassigned to 8th AF HQ after it has been moved.
- (4) Upon completion of the movement of all personnel to Westover AFP, the ARSq at Carswell AFB and the 1st AD at Westover will be inactivated by SAC HQ.

a. Furnished Hq SAC with estimates of P458 costs of move to Westover AFB. SAC included these costs in their 2nd Quarter FY 55 Financial Plan to USAF.

PART I - PROGRESS EVALUATION

1. Progress continues to be made in the policy and administrative areas. Initial communications actions have been taken (PARA 3 below), facilities surveys are being accomplished (PARA 3 & 4 below), and civilian employee transfer rights and procedures have been established (PARA 2 below).

PART II - IMPLEMENTING ACTIONS

2. PLANS DIRECTORATE

- a. An initial screening of all civilian employees assigned to this headquarters who desire to transfer to Westover AFB has been completed. This screening resulted in lik civilians of the 107 authorized expressing a desire to transfer to Westover AFB.
- b. During the transfer meeting at Westover AFB, it was agreed that rules pertaining to a functional transfer would apply to movement of this headquarters. This means that an individual employed can elect to transfer with the organization and retain all civil service rights.
- c. The official screening of civilian personnel who desire to transfer will be accomplished by the Civilian Personnel Officer, Carswell AFB, 90 days prior to the actual move of this headquarters.
- d. HQ SAC has approved our letter of 22 OCT requesting the 585th AF Band be transferred to Westover and has forwarded it to HQ USAF.

3. OPERATIONS DIRECTORATE

- a. A Liaison Staff Officer for Communications has been approved for Westover AFB. Captain Walter F Brothers, 18th Communications Squadron, is scheduled to arrive at Westover, PCS, on or about 9 DEC 54.
 - b. A full period (SOCS) telephone circuit has been activated between Loring and Westover.
 - c. Standard (SOCS) circuitry and switchboard for OBOE Control and Headquarters 8AF has been requested by Headquarters SAC in correspondence to Headquarters USAF.

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d. Equipment is being assembled at Carswell AFB to provide an interim radioteletype circuit (SAC Plan 1000) from Westover to Offutt AFB. This will provide teletype service between Carswell and Westover by a relay at SAC.

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- e. Headquarters Middletown Air Materiel Area has dispatched engineering personnel to Westover AFB to engineer the outside telephone plant expansion currently in the mill. Eighth Air Force requirements were recently furnished to MAAMA by this directorate.
- f. MAAMA has also indicated that the control and audio cables to the SAC Plan 1000 receiver site will be provided by contract and contractor supplied material.
- g. Representatives of the Operations Directorate, meeting with the Space Allocation Committee on 29 November 1954, discussed the adequacy of the buildings presently assigned to this directorate at Westover AFB. The committee was informed that building T-179, previously allocated on a temporary basis, had been inspected and found inadequate for operations needs. The Space Allocation Committee considered all the factors involved, and the effect they have upon the allocation of space to the Directorate of Plans, the Office of the Adjutant, and the Directorate of Operations. No decision was reached at this meeting, and the committee agreed to take this matter under advisement to be resolved in the immediate future.
- h. Major Dick F Gibson and Captain William W Pickavance represented this directorate on a visit to Westover AFB with a view toward locating activities pertaining to operations. MATS Atlantic Division personnel contacted by Major Gibson and Captain Pickavance were:

- i. A condensed evaluation of the buildings inspected follows:
 - Building T-332. The following functions are planned for location in this building:

Control Room teletyre machines and tape storage
Eighth Air Force Control Room
Offices of the Director and Deputy Director of Operations
Administrative Section
Eighth Air Force Stand Board

Comment: With minor modification, this building will be satisfactory under current concepts.

(2) Building T-181. This building is programmed to house the Office of Flying Safety, Combat Operations Branch, and Eighth Air Force War Room.

Comment: This building, although considered minimum satisfactory due to a lack of floor space, can be used with minor modifications. Approximately 750 square feet at the rear of this building are presently used for cold storage space and will not be available upon the movement of Headquarters 8AF to Westover AFB. The deduction of that much area makes it imperative that the third building allocated to this directorate be large enough to house the remaining people assigned.

(3) Building T-330.

Comment: This building is considered totally inadequate to the needs of the Directorate of Operations due to the space limitation caused by existing partitions and the cost of rehabilitation. It is believed that a savings can be effected through the allocation of another building to the Directorate of Operations.

(4) Building T-180. This building is programmed to house the Communications and Electronics Division and the Training Division.

Comment: With minor modification, this building will meet the needs of the two divisions mentioned above. It will permit their functions to be carried on with the close coordination that is necessary.

(5) Building T-179.

Comment: This building would not be satisfactory for the needs of the Communications-Electronics and Training Divisions. It is believed that it would better suit the needs of the Directorate of Plans. Also, a minimum of remodeling would be required to provide space for a Headquarters Conference Room. Its central location also favors this use.

(6) The nature of operations to be conducted in buildings T-181 and T-332 will require installation of a chain link fence and blocking of all windows for security purposes. Because of the blocking of windows, air conditioning becomes an additional requirement.

4. OFFICE OF THE ADJUTANT

- a. Personnel of this office accompanied the Space Allocation Board to Westover AFB and inspected the buildings allotted to this office.
 - (1) Building T-541 was found unsatisfactory for operation of the office. An effort is being made to have another building allotted to this office but no definite decision has been made to date.
 - (2) Building T-431 was allotted this office to house the Class "A" Printing Plant. This building is presently being utilized as a Base Exchange Warehouse and will necessitate many changes prior to establishment of a Class "A" Printing Plant in the building. Plans are being prepared, by personnel of this office, to have the building renovated to adequately house this plant. It is estimated that the recommended changes to the building will be submitted by 20 DEC 54.

5. OFFICE OF THE SURGEON

a. The Surgeon, Atlantic Air Division, MATS, reiterated on 23 November 1954 that hospital buildings T-173 and T-174 could not be made available for use by Headquarters Eighth Air Force until aeromedical evacuation activities were transferred to McGuire Air Force Base.

b. This agency will initiate correspondence through SAC medical channels requesting authority for temporary use of these buildings by Headquarters Eighth Air Force immediately on transfer of the evacuation function for Westover. This will preclude any delay of occupancy by this headquarters. Request for permanent transfer of these buildings from medical control will be initiated when this command actually assumes control of the installation.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD:

SUBJECT: Civilian Personnel Problems Concerning Movement of this Headquarters to Westover

1. A conference was held in the Office of the Director of Personnel at 1400 hours, 15 December 1954 to discuss civilian personnel problems occasioned by the movement of this headquarters to Westover Air Force Base and to recommend ground rules to handle such problems. The following officers were present:

Colonel William G. Booth - Commander, Carswell AFB

Colonel Charles A. Dunn - Director of Personnel, H 8AF

Colonel Rockly Triantafellu - Director of Intelligence, Hq 8AF

Lt Colonel F. A. Whitfield - Directorate of Plans, Hq 8AF

Major Dick F. Gibson - Executive, Directorate of Operations, Hq &AF

Captain H. D. Rummel - Directorate of Materiel, Hq 8AF

Captain M. M. Reynolds - Adjutant's Office, Hq 8AF

Mr. D. K. Glenn - Civilian Personnel Officer

DISCUSSION:

- 2. A recent survey of the 107 civilian employees on the rolls of this headquarters indicates that 82 have indicated that they will not move to Westover, 14 are undecided, and 11 have indicated that they will accompany the headquarters.
- 3. Employees who do not desire to move to Westover are endeavoring to secure employment with other Federal agencies, primarily Carswell Air Force Base. Operating officials are reluctant to release such employees until the movement of the headquarters. On the other hand, the employee endeavors to line up a good job when such job is available, without regard to the wishes of his or her present employer.

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- 4. An employee in one directorate or separate staff agency who does not intend to go to Westover may find it possible to accept a higher grade vacancy in another directorate or separate staff agency until the move of the headquarters without regard to the resulting chain reaction of vacancies or to the wishes of his or her present operating official.
- 5. The question arose as to whether or not an operating official is required to take to Westover all civilian employees on the rolls of his directorate or separate staff agency at the time of the movement of the headquarters. It was determined that Civil Service Regulations make such action mandatory, when the position is moved with the functional transfer and the employee desires to accompany the move to Westover.
- 6. The question arose as to whether or not an operating official of this headquarters could be forced to accept a civilian employee offered to him by Westover Air Force Base. It was determined that he was not required to do so.
- 7. The problem of selecting and earmarking certain employees now at Westover for positions within this headquarters was discussed and in some cases this action must necessarily be taken at an early date to provide for the processing of top secret clearances.
- 8. The procedure for referring employees now at Westover to operating officials at this headquarters to fill vacancies within this headquarters was discussed. The need for a final completed survey to determine those employees who will agree in writing to accompany this headquarters to Westover was discussed and also the action that should be taken regarding those employees who decline.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The following policies and procedures which are in compliance with civil service rules and regulations are recommended:

- 9. This headquarters not release employees to other units until approximately 1 June 55 except by negotiation with the interested operating official in each instance.
- 10. Establishment of a stenographic pool of temporary employees within this headquarters to handle work load deficiencies caused by vacancies until final movement of the headquarters. Headquarters SAC approval will be necessary.
- 11. The Base Commander, Carswell Air Force Base, adopt a policy that no employee who resigns a job within this headquarters will be employed at Carswell Air Force Base until after final movement of this headquarters unless such action is acceptable with the operating officials concerned.

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- 12. No employee of this headquarters be permitted to transfer to a higher grade vacancy within this headquarters except within the same directorate and/or separate staff office or to meet security requirements.
- 13. A comprehensive survey be conducted on 1 April 1955 to determine those employees who will agree in writing to accompany the headquarters to Westover. A complete and detailed summary of the move (per diem authorized, movement of household goods, retention rights, etc) be furnished each employee who indicates that he will consider the move. Those declining will be given separation notices, with effective dates on or about 1 June 1955. After completion of this survey, requisitions for civilian personnel should be forwarded to the Civilian Personnel Officer, Westover Air Force Base for necessary action through Mr. Glenn, CPO, Carswell Air Force Base.
- 14. Operating officials who will require employees from resources at Westover who require top secret clearances, take necessary action to have personnel selected and earmarked for such positions at the earliest possible date, after incumbent has declined to transfer.
- 15. The Civilian Personnel Office, Carswell Air Force Base, prepare an appropriate questionaire and establish procedures for the referral of employees at Westover to the operating officials of this headquarters for placement action.
- 16. That civilian position changes after 1 March 1955 be restricted to changes in compliance with directed organizational or functional realignments or mission change.

PART I - PROGRESS EVALUATION

1. Results of the administrative and policy actions previously reported are now becoming evident. Personnel requirements are firming (PAPA 2), space at Westover has been allocated to staff agencies (PARA 3b), and construction has begun on communications facilities (PARA 4).

PART II - IMPLEMENTING ACTIONS

2. PERSONNEL DIRECTORATE

- a. A list has been compiled of officers and airmen who do not have adequate retainability to accompany the movement. The list will be revised and distributed when the date for implementation of Phase IV of the movement plan is firmly established. The major career areas affected will be 70 (administrative), 73 (personnel), and 83 (stat). Hardship and compassionate cases will be handled on the merit of the individual case. Preliminary survey reveals few, if any, cases will arise.
- b. There are 52 WAF's assigned to MATS units at Westover AFB who can be utilized in Eighth Air Force units. It is expected that those personnel will be among those transferred to Righth Air Force effective with the date of transfer.
- c. The 19th Air Division has been notified of command aircraft crew member requirements for Westover, and instructed to earmark required personnel for assignment to Westover AFB.

3. PLANS DIRECTORATE

a. A letter requesting additional senior officer quarters at Westover AFB was forwarded to SAG on 22 October 195h. Headquarters SAG approved
the letter and forwarded it to USAF on 8 November 195h and stated that these
19 additional units had been added to the previous request dated 26 August
195h. This total request will be used as a basis for compiling any future
senior officer units requirements submitted to the Office Secretary of Defense
and Congress. This letter was returned to this headquarters for our information and file and stated that we would be advised on further action on the

A third information message was received from SAC Headquarters to USAF requesting phase-out covering ATLD Headquarters Air Flight and Air Passenger Operations and Group Headquarters Phase-Out. (Secret)

4. OPERATIONS DIRECTORATE

a. Construction of the new communications building has begun. The Corps of Engineers has been presented with a requirement to change the design of the cable vault; although acceptance has not been received, it is anticipated.

b. Information has been received from the Base Communications Officer, * Westover AFB, that construction has begun on partial implementation of the outside cable expansion project. This partial implementation will provide cable relief in critical areas on the flight line. Also, this headquarters was advised that the Communications-Electronics Scheme for installation of the SAC Plan 1000 Receiver Site cable has been forwarded to Rome Air Force Depot for approval. This project will be awarded to a civilian contractor for implementation. Funds are presently available at Middletown Air Materiel Area.

5. OFFICE OF THE ADJUTANT

a. Except for local 8AF reproductions, it is anticipated that the Class A printing plant will be closed during the latter part of April preparing equipment for movement to Westover. The Class A field printing plant will resume operation at Westover at the earliest practicable date after 15 May 1955. All personnel will be advised of any slippage in contemplated dates.

b. To insure sufficient & AF forms at all echelons of command during the period of the move, a directive will be published on or about 15 JAN 55 requesting all & AF staff agencies and subordinate commands to requisition a six months supply of all & AF forms.

6. OFFICE OF THE HEADQUARTERS COMMANDANT

a. A survey of enlisted personnel assigned to this Headquarters, who are eligible for separation prior to 1 January 1956, has been conducted to determine how many of these airmen will reenlist to accompany this Headquarters to Westover. The results of this survey are as follows:

Total eligible for separation - 134 Total number that will reenlist - 45

b. A continuing effort is being made by the Headquarters Squadron Supply Officer to effect turn in of unserviceable property presently being utilized within directorates. In addition, positive action has been initiated to insure that all unit property on hand within the unit supply will be ready for shipment. This action consists of inspection of survival gear, consolidated listing of personal equipment, and a comprehensive review of supply records.

7. COMPTROLLER DIRECTORATE

a. HQ SAC is budgeting for FY 55 table erating costs at Westover AFB subsequent to transfer of the to HQ 8A . The fourth quarter revised financial plan for these costs will be submitted by this HQ.

PART I - PROGRESS EVALUATION

1. Refinements of actions already implemented are most prominent for the period reported on. Civilian personnel transfer criteria have been further firmed (PARA 3a), a housing policy has been established (PARA 3b), further information has been received on the phase-out of MATS at Westover (PARA 3e & 3f), and progress is reported on communications facilities (PARA 4). Information has been received indicating USAF will determine van lines to be used in moving household goods (PARA 5b), and that permanent barracks for Westover are in current plans (PARA 5c).

PART II - CHANGE TO THE PLAN

2. Change #1 to this plan was made by the Directorate of Plans on 23 December 1954. This revision assigned to the Personnel Directorate the responsibility for transferring the NCO Academy from Bergstrom AFB to Westover AFB as soon as possible after the transfer of command jurisdiction of Westover to SAC.

PART III - IMPLEMENTING ACTIONS

3. DIRECTORATE OF PLANS

a. The Civilian Personnel Officer of Carswell AFB is maintaining a daily accounting of civilian personnel who desire to transfer with this headquarters. Within 90 days prior to the move, an official statement will be signed by each employee indicating individual's final intention concerning transfer to Westover AFB. Headquarters SAC has been requested to authorize this headquarters to employ fifteen additional employees on a temporary basis to form a pool of stenographers. These stenographers will be used to fill positions being vacated by stenographers securing other employment before this headquarters moves. A team of officers from this headquarters will attend a conference at Westover on the 11th of January for the purpose of discussing the freezing of military and civilian personnel at Westover and establishing rosters of personnel to be transferred from the 1600th Air Base Wing to the incumbent SAC Air Base Group.

- e. Information in SAC message DPLMA 45373, 21 December 1954, states that no consideration is being given to transferring the 585th Air Force Band at this time.
- f. Lt Colonel Robert G. Bradley assumed command of the 1st Air Division (SAC) at Westover AFB effective 3 JAN 55.

4. DIRECTORATE OF OPERATIONS

- a. Sketches outlining modification of floor plans of buildings allocated to the Directorate of Operations at Westover AFB have been forwarded to the Directorate of Plans. Plans for an operations annex to be constructed between T-332 and T-181 have been requested through the Directorate of Materiel.
- b. Headquarters USAF has reversed the decision to move the WSA. RAPCON Console from Westover AFB. An installation and maintenance team is expected at Westover on 2 JAN 55 to begin installation of the ultimate RAPCON facility. Associated radar equipment is already in operation.
- c. Construction of the outside telephone cable requirement is progressing satisfactorily. This work is being accomplished by base team augmented by Army Signal Corps personnel.
- d. Construction of the new Communications Building is underway. Engineering plans for rerouting of cables to the new building are being drawn.
- e. The CRD-6 UHF/DF equipment is ready for inspection and final check flight.

5. DIRECTORATE OF MATERIEL

- 1. Purpose and Scope. This Regulation states the mission and responsibility of the Strategic Air Command.
- 2. Definition. As used in this Regulation, the term "conduct" means to direct all essential operations in connection with the strategic air offensive with a view to insuring that the required unity of effort will be obtained. Specifically, this term includes authority, within the scope of Joints Chiefs of Staff directives, to assign targets, weight of effort, and timing of air operations as well as the authority to coordinate the detailed air operations of the forces involved to the extent necessary to prevent interference between forces and to secure maximum tactical advantages from the operations involved.
- 3. General. The commander, Strategic Air Command, is responsible for exercising command jurisdiction over and operating the Strategic Air Command in accordance with policies established by the Chief of Staff, USAF.
- 4. Mission. The commander, Strategic Air Command, will:
- a. Organize, train, equip, administer, and prepare strategic air forces for combat, including strategic reconnaissance, strategic bombardment, strategic fighter units, and strategic support units in accordance with directives and policies issued by Headquarters USAF.
- b. Exercise command over all forces allocated to him by the Joint Chiefs of Staff or other appropriate authority.
- c. With assigned forces and with such other forces as may be made available by the Joint Chiefs of Staff, conduct strategic air operations as defined in the functions of the Armed Forces. (See AF Bul 1, 1948.)
- d. Conduct such other air operations as the Joint Chiefs of Staff direct.

- e. Support other commanders under the Joint Chiefs of Staff in their missions.
- f. Prepare plans to accomplish these missions in case of a general emergency.

5. Responsibilities:

- a. Primary. The primary responsibility of the Strategic Air Command is to:
 - Maintain assigned units in a state of readiness to permit immediate operations, either unilaterally or jointly with other forces against the enemies of the United States.
 - (2) Organize, train, and equip assigned combat, and supporting units.
 - (3) Develop, test, and improve the organization, equipment, training, doctrines, tactics and techniques of strategic bombardment, strategic reconnaissance, strategic fighter aviation, and specialized transport aviation in conjunction with other major air commands and activities.
 - (4) Train combat crews and units for the performance of strategic air operations.
 - (5) Prepare plans for strategic reconnaissance (electronic; weather; visual; aerial photographic; cartographic reproduction and related activities) to meet the global requirements of the Department of Defense for which the Department of the Air Force is responsible. The Strategic Air Command will provide the necessary crews, units, equipment, and personnel for the execution of these plans and will accomplish the field operations phase of those programs as directed by the Chief of Staff, USAF.
 - (6) Support the Air Force Prestocking Program; to include indoctrination of

personnel, and receipt, storage, rotation and maintenance of Materiel Reserve Equipment and Supplies provided in support of current war plans.

(7) Perform such special missions as the Chief of Staff, USAF, may direct.

- (8) Participate in disaster relief and other domestic emergencies in support of the major air commands designated for coordinating such activities.
- (9) Participate in the Reserve training program to the maximum possible extent commensurate with the execution of the primary mobilization mission by exercising responsibility for the training and administration of Reserve officers and airmen as may be directed by Headquarters USAF and by training and administering such Reserve units as may be assigned.

b. Secondary. The secondary responsibility of the Strategic Air Command is to develop and maintain the technique of employing strategic air forces in the following functions:

(1) Interdiction of enemy sea power through air operations.

(2) Antisubmarine warfare and protection of shipping.

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(3) Aerial mine-laying operations.

(4) Upon notification by the Air Defense Command or higher authority that an air attack upon the United States is imminent, providing to the operational control of the Air Defense Command, those Strategic Air Command forces which have an air defense capability, that are located in or immediately adjacent to the continental United States, and are not required for immediate participation in strategic air operations.

(5) Training all units that possess an air defense capability for employment in the air defense of the United States. When appropriate, such units will be provided with auxiliary air defense

equipment.

6. Direct Communication. Direct communication is authorized between the commander, Strategic Air Command, and the commanders of the other major air commands on matters pertaining to the mission of the Strategic Air Command.

ORGANIZATION - AIR COMMANDS AND AIR FORCES

Mission - Eighth Air Force

- 1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this regulation is to state the mission of the Eighth Air Force.
- 2. GENERAL. The Commanding General, Eighth Air Force, is responsible for exercising command jurisdiction over and administering such units and installations as may be assigned.
- 3. MISSION. As directed by this headquarters and in accordance with the posicies established by the United States Air Force, the Commanding General, Eighth Air Force will:
- a. Man, train, and equip assigned units for the primary purpose of conducting strategic air warfare on a global scale utilizing either atomic or conventional weapons.
- b. Be prepared to perform those tasks assigned in the current emergency plan and related operations order.
 - c. Train and administer assigned reserve personnel and units.
- d. Be prepared to participate in disaster relief and other domestic emergencies.
- e. Perform such special missions as the Commanding General, Strategic Air Command, may assign.



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AWOL RATE FISCAL YEAR 1954 RATE PER 1000 PERSONNEL ASGD




V. D. RATE BY RACE AS OF END OF MONTH 1954

AIRCRAFT ACCIDENT RATE RATE PER 100,000 HOURS FLOWN








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PRIMARY AIRCRAFT COMMISSION STATUS




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PRIMARY AIRCRAFT COMMISSION STATUS



AVERAGE ENGINE OPERATING TIME BEFORE REMOVAL






