Case 108

Reports of distant strange lights in the sky were recieved by police agencies throughout southern Ohio, Tuesday night, January, 25, 1971.

A young couple in Jackson, reported a close-up encounter with a brightly lighted object moving at the southwest edge of the city around 7 p.m. Jay Chase, 19, and Ruth Spry, 17,

both of Jackson were driving on a county road near the old Jackson Iron and Steel plant when they saw what looked like the moon rising ahead of them.

The couple said the light came quickly up in front of their car hovering above the ground until they backed up their car.

They said it changed color from orange to purple and followed than. They stopped at a house to get the residents to look at it but got no answer.

" While they were at the house, the object hovered just beyond beyond the object the garage less than 100 feet away. The couple returned to the car, and while driving back to town, saw the object rising into the sky.

"It got bigger and bigger," they said, before it faded into the The object changed from distance. orange to blue and purple and back

On a relatives farm just before dark on April 11,1971, Ir. and Irs Grace Shroeder and family were leaving on Courtney Rd., headed west off North Johnson. They saw a low object changing colors from red to lighter red and back to darker red again. The object hovered over the trees on the property of Art Spokes.

They stopped to watch it. It then went out of their sight be-yond the trees. They moved their car up to the next open space, but they didn't see it right away. After a short time, they spotted it, but this time it was much smaller. It hovered for a few seconds then zoomed off straight They heard no sound.

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Richard Milliams, 18, of Millard, Ohio, said that he saw a diamond shaped UFO on January 22, 1971, in the evening which was equipped with white lights and two exhausts jets. The Huron County Sheriff's office said that it recieved calls from 18 other persons who claimed to have seen the UFO.

Williams said he was driving along Old River Road near Willard with his wife and son when he spotted a low flying object coming towards his car. His wife also saw the object.

"The object looked like a bat," said. "The wings were wider he said. than the plane or what everit was. On the middle of each wing there seemed to be an exhaust rocket engine or jet engine. It had red and white lights on each of the wings

and on the tails." "I thought it was a big plane going to orash," he added. "It hevered down close to me about 100 feet and then took off again and went east and circled around towards

Williams said he thought the object was about 25-30 feetin diameter.

He said he stopped at a friends' home in the area in an effort to find other witnesses. The Huron Sheriff's office cited 18 reports were called in that night by persons who claimed to have seen the object.

Villiams siad he thought some kind of creature was inside the UFO because there appeared to be some kind of motion.

"In the back of the cockpit there was something flashing the light on and off-like you were blocking the light," he said. The sheriff's office said it

was investigating the reports, but because of their unfamiliarity in such studies, officials weren't sure of just what steps were being taken.

"When you get a call like that you think it was a drunk or crackpot," said one deputy. "But when you get so many calls then you begin to wonder."

Officials said Williams appeared to be upset after sighting the ob-ject, but Williams claimed he was morely curious.

"Well, I was really wanting to see what it was," he explained. "But afterwards I was thinking it might have been really dangerous." (Times Recorder, January 24, 1971)

A housewife in Alliance, Ohio, Lrs. Spencer Triner of 13825 Vine Ohio, Street, recalls an account of a UFO she saw in 1962, chout the 20th of December. At approximately 9:00 pm, on a partly cloudy night, irs. Kriner was out in her driveway and noticed some light in the sky in the north. What she saw was a cigar-shaped UFO hanging silent stationary in the night sky.

Decording to Mrs, Kriner, the UFO was about 20 to 25 feet long, at a height of about 100 feet. The object had amber lights at intervals all along the side of the cigar shaped object, the lights were what caught her attention.

She watched it for about two minutes then ran inside to get her husband, and when they returned back outside, it was gone. (Paul Lozich)

Case 113

irs. Eileen Hagnet sighted UFO in late August of 1967 in Belle Vernon, 20 miles south of Fitts-burgh, Pennsylvania. While looking at the stars

through her bedroom window, she . saw four, large white lights moving slowly from south to north. Two of the objects, or lights, were grouped close together, while the other two were situated on the flanks, one on each side, but futher out.

After watching them for awhile one of the objects emitted a beam of light towards the earth for a few seconds. ...fter another minute or so, sh e noticed an airplane ap proaching the house. This she was able to identify by the running lights and the sound of the engine. Suddenly, all four lights extinguished and ...were not seen again. The time was approximately 10:00 p.m.

Case 114

On September 25, 1968, Mr. ...dam Lewandowski; while sitting on the house porch, spotted a yellow saucer shaped object airborne just south of his home. The time was 8:45 p.m., and the weather was cloudy with no stars visible.

The significant factor in this sighting was that there were re-ference points on the landscape with which the witness could make distance estimates. The object was seen over some hills toothe south. These hills are at a distance of two miles. However, even at this distance, no sound was heard. The UFO hovered over the hills for a while then accelerated upwards into the clouds. Case 115

On the night of November, 14, 1968, at Claysburn, Pa,a woman re-ported sighting aUFO along a mountain road between Bakers Summit and Sproul on Dunnings Mt., the woman (name withheld be request) said the object, saucor-like in shape, was easily visible as it darted and then altimately hovered above an open field. Red and blue lights seemed to ring it, but as light light seemed to shine from directly beneath it.

Case 116

Police in Brownsville, Pa., reported that several persons came into the local police station at 1:45 a.m., on August 5, 1969 and said they saw a bright shining ob-ject shooting through the sky. The object then spread, changed into a large ball of fire and then disappeared.

Case 117

Several persons reported seeing a bright object flying low over Headville, Pa., September 6, 1969, its idenity and origin remain yet unsolved.

Three observers on North St., described the UFO as a yellowish-white fireball, giving off smoke and burning with a steady glow. Case 118

Mr. and Mrs. Earl Hazel and their two sons, of Youngstown, Ohio, spotted a round red UFO traveling from the west to northeast.

Mr. Hazel provided this account of the sighting for us:

"I and my wife and two boys had just returned from picking up one of the boys at the U.S. Navel Reserve.I put my car in the garage the others had already gone into the house. Thile walking from the garage to the house, I looked up in the sky toward north, northeast.

It would remain in one spot for sometime and then move on slowly again. I then called the others from the house to some out and see this.

At no time did the red light go out, but it would go from bright to dim and back to bright again. I would sight the object with a pole in front of our home and could judge if it was moving or not. Often it stayed in one spot. Т judge it was about 2000 feet up and about three miles away.

It then went out from our location to the north, northeast. After staying in one spot for some time, it then changed directions toward the southeast at a very fasttrate of speed.

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
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
