## COMMENTARY

### SECTION II

#### PART A

##### 1. Operations and Training:

- a. There were no changes in the assigned mission of the 78th Fighter Wing during the period 1 July - 30 September 1964. Col William S. Harrell, 5240A, former Wing Commander, was transferred to the Chicago Air Defense Sector. Col William C. Miller, 7861A, assumed interim command of the Wing on 15 July. Effective 30 July 1964, Col Charles D. Chitty, Jr., 4340A, became commander of the 78th Ftr Wg. (Assumption of command orders are attached under Tab A.) Lt Col Frank E. Kirby, 10330A, continued as Wing Executive.
- b. On 14 July, the 78th Ftr Wg was given a TAC EVAL (Tactical Evaluation) by the 28th Air Division. The evaluation involved 50 flying sorties, mass loading, F-101 turnaround and uploading, expanded security, and other exercise conditions. The Wing received a satisfactory rating.
- c. Due to the unsatisfactory rating the 78th Ftr Wg received during the ADC Operational Readiness Inspection in the previous quarter, the Wing was reevaluated by ADC during the period 24-28 July. The second ORI involved 59 sorties, mass loading, F-101/F-106

turnaround and unloading, expanded security, and other exercise conditions; the Wing received a satisfactory rating.

d. Hamilton AFB supported C-130 units of the Tactical Air Command being deployed to the Pacific Area throughout the latter part of the quarter. The troops and equipment moving through Hamilton were part of a buildup of forces in Southeast Asia which followed the Tonkin Gulf incident of 4 August 1964. There was a great deal of speculation by local news media about Hamilton's role in the buildup of forces. Although several speculative articles were published in local papers, the general public was largely unaware of any troop movement. Most local news media representatives mistakenly thought that Hamilton was a staging base for fighter aircraft. One article which appeared in a local newspaper is attached under Tab B.

e. The 78th Air Police Squadron revised its standard operating procedure, 205-51, to conform with a change in ADC directives on "Broken Arrow" procedures. A copy of the revised SOP is attached under Tab C.

f. The 78th Ftr Wg participated in nine live exercises called by either the 25th Air Division or the Portland Air Defense Sector during the quarter for a total of 175 UE sorties. Aircraft movement



records showed the following arrivals and departures cleared through Base Operations:

(NOTE: The difference in outbound and inbound totals was accounted for by passenger stops, diversions, and tactical flights which came in on DD 175 clearances and went out on tactical clearances.)

g. There were no aircraft, missile/nuclear, or fatal ground accidents during the quarter. (NOTE: F-101 56-0284 crashed on 7 August while at Hill AFB, Utah for repairs to the pitch control system. Preliminary investigation indicated the right main gear sway brace was cracked. The aircraft was a complete loss.)

h. Turnaround directors and all loading personnel received continued training in armament loading of the UE aircraft. This increased training was instituted because of the unsatisfactory rating the Wing received in the ADC ORI of the previous quarter.

i. Approximately 250 AFROTC cadets arrived at Hamilton AFB on 26 July to begin their four-week summer encampment. Over 50 colleges and universities from throughout the country

were represented. Lt Col Edward O. Willeford, 78th Ftr Wg Chief of Operations and Training, was the summer training unit commander. A copy of the cadet publication "The Gigline STU 1964" is attached under Tab D, along with 78th Ftr Wg Operations Plan 4-64 (AFROTC STU.)

j. The following reserve units held summer training encampments at Hamilton AFB during the quarter on the dates indicated:

2. Equipment:

a. F-101 58-0263 was assigned to the 84th Ftr Intcp Sq and arrived on 31 July. F-101 56-0284 crashed at Hill AFB, Utah on 7 August as noted in Operations and Training.

b. As prescribed by TCTO (Time Compliance Technical Order) 1F-101-1053, all turbine cases of F-101 engines were inspected for cracks. Forty-six cases were inspected; 29 were cracked. Only one was reparable at base level. Cases not

repairable at base level were shipped to Depot. After the necessary repairs had been made, a procedure was initiated to inspect cases on installed engines at each fifty hour postflight inspection.

c. All flyable F-101s were converted from the pneumatic to combustion engine starting system, except when drop tanks were installed.

d. Thirteen failures of a 22 OHM resistor in the pitch control system of the F-101 were discovered between 6 April and 31 July; this resistor had been installed by TCTO 1F-101-1039. It was determined that the failures were due to vibrations which caused the resistor leads to break leaving an open circuit or intermittent signals for horn or pusher actuation of the pitch control system. AFLC recommended adoption of a Hamilton suggestion, 42-65M, made to Prime Depot. This suggestion recommended encasement of the resistor and part of the terminal ends in potting compound; thus, the load stress was placed on the terminal end of the resistor and the effect of the vibrations was reduced to a safe level.

e. Because the analysis of malfunctions and the repair of MG-13 radar sets in F-101s were contributing factors in a low turnaround rate, and consequently contributing factors in the unsatisfactory

ORI rating in the previous quarter, emphasis was placed on accelerated trouble analysis and repair. As a result, the break rate decreased.

f. T-29 52-5822 was assigned to Hamilton AFB and arrived on 9 August. It was assigned to Hamilton to support the Headquarters Western Communications Region flying requirements.

g. As prescribed by TCTO 1C-123-579, all C-123 rib flaps were inspected and repaired as necessary.

h. At the close of the quarter, T-39 tires were in short supply; there were no spares on base. The supply of T-33 tires was also growing short.

3. Facilities:

b. Real Property Facilities.

(1) The Laytonville Relay Tower, between Mill Valley and Point Arena, was declared excess and disposed of; total value, \$88,494.

(2) The Athletic Field Stand at Hamilton was disposed of; total value, \$4,545.

(3) 21,912 sq yds of land were added to real property records. The 750 ft runway overrun extension constructed in the previous quarter was constructed on this property; total value, \$91,634.

c. On Sunday, 20 September, there was a complete, base-wide shutdown of commercial power. The purpose of the nine hour shutdown was to permit Base Civil Engineer and PG&E (Pacific Gas and Electric) personnel to perform required maintenance prior to the

rainy season. Repairs were made on PG&E lines coming into the base, the main transformer and bussing station, and underground ductwork. The power shutdown did not seriously interfere with mission performance.

d. Rehabilitation of the RAPCON (Radar Approach Control) center which was begun in May, was delayed due to microwave alignment problems. On 5 July construction began on the installation of a VASI (Visual Approach Slope Indicator) system. Completion of the VASI system was scheduled for early November 1964.

e. Extensive repairs to Building 727, the Redistribution and Marketing Office, were approved and scheduled to be started during the second quarter of FY 65 at a cost of \$5,000. Approved repairs included the installation of false ceilings, lighting fixtures, sound-proofing, and rest room facilities.

f. A 2,000 square foot, \$23,000. addition to Building 840 was completed on 12 August to implement the new Base Civil Engineer Control Center concept described in the 78th Ftr Wg history of the previous quarter (see Part A, para 3g). Control Center personnel began initiating the management concepts established in AFM 85-1.

4. Assets and Finance:

a. As of 30 September, the total assets of Hamilton AFB were \$45,474,041.65, an increase of \$80,358. over the previous quarter. The total assets of supported sites were \$37,586,848.72, a gain of \$3,973,162.80 over the previous quarter.

b. Hamilton AFB Exchange sales were \$347,991. higher than the previous year's sales as of 30 September.

c. In an accelerated first quarter Operations and Maintenance Program, Hamilton AFB obligated \$312,000, exceeding the \$302,000 budgeted.

d. As of 30 September, Hamilton AFB encompassed 2,183.79 acres of land; 1,271 improved acres, 912.79 unimproved.

5. Personnel:

a. Key personnel changes initiated in the previous quarter continued into the July-September quarter. Col Charles D. Chitty, Jr. who assumed command of the 78th Ftr Wg on 30 July, departed on 23 September for TDY at Tyndall AFB, Florida where he received instruction in the F-101 aircraft. During Col Chitty's absence, the Wing was commanded by Col John W. Jacobs, Jr., 5209A, D/C Materiel; a copy of the assumption of Command order is attached under Tab E.

b. Col Ralph M. Wanderer, Jr, 4440A, assumed command of the 78th Combat Support Group and Hamilton AFB on 1 July replacing Lt Col Edward O. Willeford, 3391A, interim Base Commander. Assumption of commander order is attached under Tab E.

c. Major George R. Metty, 42791A, assumed duty as 78th Combat Support Group Executive effective 1 July, replacing Lt Col Clifford F. Baxter, 6337A.

d. Major Harold J. Moody, AO578641, became the Chief, Administrative Services Division on 20 July replacing Major Paul H. Millikin, 16186A.

e. Lt Col James H. Moulder, 37979A, became the Chief of Supply on 19 August replacing Lt Col John H. White, AO429530.

f. On 6 July, Lt Col Wilbur A. Tapscott, 10076A, became commander of the 84th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, replacing Col Marvin H. Good, 13162A, who was reassigned to the 317th Ftr Intcp Sq, Elmendorf AFB, Alaska. Col Tapscott quickly established himself among local community leaders due in part to his past associations with Marin County (see Tab F).

g. Lt Col Arthur B. Harris, 19630A, became Chief of Dental Services, 78th USAF Hospital, on 1 July. He replaced Col Walter J. Reuter.



h. A roster of officers assigned to Hamilton AFB as of 31 August and a Morning Report are attached under Tab G.

6. Organization:

a. During the month of August, the Maintenance Support Division of the Base Supply Section instituted several procedural changes; pre-issue was abolished and the Repair Cycle concept established in its entirety. Initially, four supply points were established, and two more were planned. A general procedural change was also placed into effect within the Bench Stock area. This consisted of changes in procedures of document processing, review listings, and the marking of bin locations. In July and August, 13 additional Bench Stock locations were established within the shops of the Base Civil Engineer; this brought the total on-base Bench Stock locations to 70. The Bench Stock fill rate for the quarter was 85%. Shortage of space on the flight line precluded the transfer of some Repair Cycle items from Base Supply warehouses to badly needed additional Supply Points.

b. During the quarter, the Consolidated Base Personnel Office assumed personnel responsibilities for the 4677th Defense Systems Evaluation Squadron and the 4754th Radar Evaluation Squadron, both at Hill AFB, Utah. This involved an addition of

over 500 personnel records. The CBPO also assumed personnel responsibilities for Detachment 2, 4650th Combat Support Group at Hamilton; this involved 33 officers and four airmen records.

c. Flight records of the 84th Ftr Intcp Sq were consolidated with those of the Support Operations Division. On 30 September, the Support Operations Division received a flight records machine purchased from the Burroughs Corporation.

d. The Base Procurement office was reorganized in accordance with ADCM 70-4. Reorganization was completed in August.

e. In accordance with Hq ADC message ADODC 28716 and previous directives, the Hamilton AFB Survival School was deactivated on 2 July (See 78th Ftr Wg History for the period ending 30 June 1964, Part A, para 5c).

7. Other Activities:

a. On several occasions, Mr. Frank McGill, Director of Civilian Personnel, met with the manager of the San Rafael office of the California State Employment Security Department. Topics discussed at these meetings included:

- (1) Assistance available to airmen who needed part-time jobs.
- (2) Counseling of military retirees about services and benefits available to them.

(3) Inter-office cooperation and assistance in the event of a national emergency. And,

(4) Federal retraining programs administered by the State office that were available to Air Force employees affected by a reduction - in-force. The meetings were considered extremely valuable by both groups, and a framework for continuing mutual assistance was established.

b. On 31 July, a formal parade and assumption of command ceremony was held on the base flight line. During the ceremony, Col Charles D. Chitty, Jr., assumed command of the 78th Ftr Wg. A formal reception for Col and Mrs Chitty was held at the Officers' Mess following the parade and ceremony; both of the events were attended by local government and civic leaders. (See 7 August issue of the Hamilton AFB Intercept, attached under Tab P.)

PART B

1. Community Relations:

a. Northwest Approach Problem -

(1) "All is not well between Hamilton Air Force Base and the City of Novato and Marin County." This was the lead sentence of an article written by Mr. Theron A. Newell, a reporter, and published in the San Rafael Independent-Journal on 3 September (TabH); in some respects, it was an accurate summation of the touchy relations that existed between Hamilton AFB and local communities during the first quarter of FY-65.

(2) The most significant community relations problem during the quarter centered around the use of a "new" northwest approach to runway 12 by tactical aircraft. Essentially, the problem was this: in September of 1963, a new, safer approach to runway 12 was tested which brought landing tactical aircraft over the heart of the city of Novato. Shortly after testing began, complaints started coming in from people who lived under the new approach pattern. The complaints subsided at the conclusion of the test period, but resumed again one year later when the new approach was put into use. Because of the possible future significance of this problem and because of the potential value of a record of how it was handled,



all of the documents pertaining thereto which were available to the historian and which were reproducible are included as attachments ~~to this history.~~

(3) When testing of the new approach began during the first quarter of FY-64 (see 78th Ftr Wg History for the period ending 30 September 1963 and attachment one thereto), early complaints about it were that it had been established for the safety and convenience of the residents of Bel Marin Keys, the housing development under construction off the north end of Hamilton's runway. This misconception was first voiced as a formal complaint by Mr. James Harrington, Jr., of Novato, and, although not prevalent, was shared by other complainers and reappeared from time to time throughout 1963 and 1964 (see Tab H 2). (NOTE: It is possible that the Information Office was at least partially responsible for this misconception because, initially, there was some misunderstanding in the Public Information section about the new approach, and the first release made to local news media did state that the new approach was "needed to insure the safety of Bel Marin Keys and adjacent areas." (See Tab H 3) Newsmen who received the release were telephoned and requested to strike out that phrase, but some damage had undoubtedly already been done). In reality, the establishment of the new traffic pattern had absolutely nothing

to do with Bel Marin Keys, and VFR and conventional traffic continued to pass over that area.

(4) The new northwest approach was approved by the FAA in June 1964, and in the late summer and early fall of 1964, tactical aircraft began utilizing it on a regular basis whenever wind conditions warranted. There was a rebirth of public interest in the new pattern, and the protests against it became more vigorous and persistent. One of the more active complainers was a Novato housewife "interested in political affairs," Mrs. John Machado, who had first complained of the new pattern in 1963 (see Tab H 4). Mrs. Machado was the apparent leader of a relatively small group of irate citizens who made their objections known to Hamilton AFB, local news media, and local and Federal government officials. A close ally of Mrs. Machado was Mrs. Joseph D. Mook, another housewife of Novato. Mrs. Mook first contacted the Information Office on 1 September 1964 (see Tab H 5). Most of Mrs. Machado and Mrs. Mook's sympathizers lived in the Dawes Court area, a small section of Novato of no particular significance, which lay under the new approach pattern.

(5) The complaints expressed by Mrs. Machado and others included objections to noise, potential danger, interference to television reception, and alleged loss of property value. The full

range of complaints is well covered in the memo for record attached as Tab H 6. Mrs. Machado attempted to have the new northwest approach pattern rescinded by petitioning the Base, stirring up adverse public opinion, and pressuring local government leaders. Mrs. Machado's ally, Mrs. Moock, wrote a letter to her Congressman, the Honorable Donald H. Clausen. The letter was circulated in the Dawes Court area and signed by 38 people; copies were sent to the Base Commander and to a local newspaper, the Novato Advance (Tab H 14).

(6) Col Chitty, Wing Commander, and Lt Col Traverso, Director of the Joint Office of Information, considered several ways of explaining the new approach pattern to the people of Novato in an effort to overcome the negative publicity the base had received, and it was decided that a briefing should be held for local government and civic leaders. (See Tab H 7) The idea behind the briefing was that the necessity of the new pattern could be explained to local opinion leaders and that they, in turn, could explain it to the other citizens of Novato. Arrangements were quickly made, and invitational letters were mailed out to members of the Novato City Council, members of the Military Affairs Committee of the Novato Chamber of Commerce, and to several news media representatives. (See Tab H 8). The briefing was scheduled for 15 September. (Tab H 1, H 16 and H 17).

(7) Mrs. Machado and Mrs. Mook did not approve of the plan to brief civic officials. They strongly requested that the briefing be open to all interested parties so that complaints could be aired and discussed in a "round table" manner. Both ladies wrote letters to the Base Commander and made several telephone calls to the Information Office (see Tabs H 9, H 10, H 11, H 12, and H 13). Unfortunately, before the plan to invite only civic leaders had been decided upon, Mrs. Mook had been told by Major Paul K. Jones, Deputy Director of Information, that she would be invited to the forthcoming briefing on the new approach pattern. The fact that Mrs. Mook was first told she could attend the briefing and later told that she could not attend may have motivated her to write the letter attached under Tab H 14 to Congressman Clausen.

(8) The briefing for civic leaders was held on 15 September as scheduled and considered to be a moderate success. However, some observers felt that most of the civic leaders did not fully understand the briefing because of the heavy use of military terminology. A memo for record concerning the meeting, along with clippings from local newspapers, is attached under Tab H 15.

(9) The September 15th meeting did not end the northwest approach hassel. Mrs. Machado, Mrs. Mook, and their followers still felt they had been done a misjustice. Another unfavorable "Letter to the Editor" against the northwest approach appeared in a



local paper, the San Rafael Independent-Journal, Tab H 16, on 21 September; however, in the 28 September issue of the Novato Advance, two citizens came to the defense of Hamilton AFB. (Tab H 18).

(10) On 22 September, the Novato City Council met, and Mrs. Moock presented the council a petition with 17 signatures protesting the new approach pattern. Mrs. Machado also expressed her displeasure with the approach and told the council she had complained to her Congressman, the Honorable Donald H. Clausen, and to the FAA. As a result of the meeting, the Novato City Council formally asked Hamilton AFB to give a public briefing to all interested parties. (See Tab H 19). Col Chitty, Wing Commander, approved the proposal, and, at the end of the quarter, plans were being made for a public briefing which was scheduled for 22 October. (Tab H 20).

b. Raphael Village Problem -

(1) In the previous quarter, San Jose Blvd in Raphael Village was opened up as a thoroughfare from U. S. highway 101 to Loma Verde (not to south Novato as reported in the previous history). This increased the volume of traffic in Raphael Village and was a significant contributing factor to another community relations problem Hamilton faced during the first quarter of FY 65.

(2) Residents of Raphael Village, concerned primarily for the safety of their children, felt that stricter law enforcement,

either by civilian or military law enforcement officials, was needed in the village. A petition requesting such things as lower speed limits on some streets, better street maintenance, and more cross walks, was circulated in Raphael Village and presented to the Base Commander, Col Wanderer.

(3) Col Wanderer set up a meeting of city, county, and base officials at which the complaints were discussed (Tabs H 1 and H 17). Some of the Raphael Village residents' requests were granted, some were turned down, and action was postponed on others. Results of the meeting are reported in the newspaper clipping attached under Tab I.

(4) Following the meeting between city, county, and base officials, a Raphael Village Council was established at the direction of the Base Commander to provide an orderly, systematic method of handling any future mutual problems. The first meeting of the Council, whose members were residents of Raphael Village, was scheduled for the following quarter.

c. Sonic booms and other jet noises caused their normal amount of disturbances during the quarter (Tab J). There was an increase in complaints of noise caused by jet engine runups at night paralleling the increase in runups made necessary by the installation of F-101 engines returning from Depot (see Part A, par 2b). A brief report

on jet engine runup noise at Hamilton AFB, prepared by the 78th Ftr Wg in answer to a 28th Air Division questionnaire, is attached as Tab K.

d. There was a noticeable increase in the number of UFO (Unidentified Flying Object) sightings reported during the quarter, particularly in the month of August. Sightings were reported from throughout the San Francisco Bay Area and followed no discernable pattern. The reports were screened and forwarded to Wright-Patterson AFB in accordance with applicable directives. On one occasion, Hamilton received some unfavorable publicity from a misleading article published in the San Rafael Independent-Journal about a UFO incident (see Tab L).

e. In spite of the new northwest approach to runway 12, sonic booms, jet noises, and related problems, Hamilton AFB still managed to make a few entries on the plus side of the community relations ledger. During the latter part of August and September, forest fires raged throughout rain-starved Northern California, and on several occasions, local fire fighters called on Hamilton AFB volunteers for assistance. Each time the call was answered loud and clear. On 19 and 20 August, 130 volunteers from Hamilton helped fight a fire in Black Canyon, near San Rafael. Their efforts were credited with helping save an Army Nike Missile Site near

the canyon and many lives. On 21 September, 68 Hamilton volunteers were sent to Santa Rosa. The Santa Rosa fire was part of a larger fire which covered a large portion of Napa and Sonoma Counties. On 22 September, 51 volunteers, nine firemen, and a pumper truck were dispatched to Petaluma, north of Calistoga, and seven firemen and one pumper truck were sent to Boyes Hot Springs, near Sonoma. Hamilton AFB received many letters of praise from local fire-fighting and governmental officials.

f. Hamilton AFB volunteers also received praises for their assistance in finding missing persons on two occasions. In the first part of July, 22 Hamilton airmen joined civilian search parties in looking for two Larkspur youths near Mt. Tamalpais. Later in the month, Hamilton volunteers helped find a 10-year-old Los Angeles boy in Yosemite National Park.

g. Several officers, airmen, and dependents of Hamilton AFB took part in a community service project sponsored by the Marin Rod and Gun Club in August to clean out Papermill Creek, the most important stream drainage in Marin County. The project involved picking up debris which had accumulated in the stream between Woodacre and Tocaloma. The complete story of the Papermill Creek project is told in the newspaper clipping attached as Tab M.



h. The annual United Bay Area Crusade fund drive began at Hamilton on 1 September. Major L. S. Johnson, Commander, Hq Section, 78th Combat Spt Gp, was appointed Base Project Officer, and a goal of \$29,000.00 was set. As of 30 September, 70% of the goal had been reached.

2. Awards and Decorations:

a. The 78th Ftr Wg received word from the Air Force Academy that the Wing had been rated outstanding for its support of the Falcon '64 Field Study of the Armed Forces. In the previous quarter, Hamilton AFB had hosted approximately 700 cadets in connection with the annual training program. (78 Ftr Wg History for the period ending 30 June 1964, Part A, par 1h(2)).

b. Final figures indicated that the 78th Ftr Wg had a 27.3 per cent participation rate in the Military Suggestion program, one of the highest rates in ADC for FY-64. Of the 923 suggestions submitted during FY-64, 169 were adopted saving the Air Force \$50,148.

3. Distinguished Visitors: Distinguished visitors who visited Hamilton AFB during the quarter included:

a. General Curtis E. LeMay, Chief of Staff, USAF. (Tab N1).

b. Air Marshal Sir Douglas Morris, Commander-in-Chief, Royal Air Force Fighter Command.

- c. Maj Hsu Hui-Hung, Dentist, Nationalist Chinese Air Force.

- d. TSgt Otto Sigmund and TSgt Hannes Hoßel of the Austrian  
Air Force. (Tab N 2).

- g. Three hundred senior citizens of Marin County.

4. Athletic Activities:

- a. During the late spring of 1964, Hamilton AFB acquired a  
40-foot salvaged cruiser from nearby Mare Island Naval Shipyard.  
The boat was little more than a serviceable hull, but base volunteers  
quickly put it into a seaworthy condition. A base-wide contest was  
held to choose a name for the pleasure craft, and on 1 August, it  
was launched as the "Lady Hamilton." The boat was then made  
available to Hamilton personnel by Personnel Services on a rental  
basis and proved to be a popular recreational facility.
- b. On 12 September, Hamilton AFB held its Third Annual  
Field Day, considered one of the best Field Days in all of ADC.  
Military personnel and their dependents and friends enjoyed a day  
full of sporting activities which included something for both spectators

and participators. Proceeds from concession stands were contributed to the United Bay Area Crusade.

c. One of the Hamilton's best known athletes, SSgt Jacob "Jake" Highland, made sports history for Hamilton, ADC, and the Air Force by becoming the first Air Force volleyball player to compete in the Olympics. Because of his all-round fine play as a "setter," Highland was chosen to participate in the 1964 Summer Olympics in Tokyo, Japan. (Tab O).

d. Two Hamilton AFB boxers, both members of the ADC Boxing Team, were chosen as alternate members of the U.S. Olympic Boxing Team during the previous quarter. "Bob" Christopherson and Art Jones failed to win regular places on the team, initially, but due to the fact that one of the regular members of the Olympic team was injured during training, Christopherson was later chosen as a contender. During the latter part of September, the entire U.S. Olympic Boxing Team trained at Hamilton AFB prior to its departure for Tokyo at the end of the month.

5. Other Activities:

a. The annual Air Force Aid Society Fund Drive was conducted at Hamilton during the first two weeks of August. Hamilton personnel contributed a total of \$3,467.05.

b. Two copies of the unofficial base newspaper, the Intercept, published during the quarter are attached under Tab P.

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## BIOGRAPHY

### COLONEL CHARLES D. CHITTY JR.

Charles D. Chitty Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles D. Chitty of Albany, Ga., was born Nov. 1, 1916, at Fort Gaines, Ga. He attended high school in his hometown, graduating in 1933.

Colonel Chitty began his military service in May, 1937, when he enlisted as a private at Fort Lee, Va. He spent one and a half years with the Third Engineers in Hawaii before transferring to flying school at Randolph Field, Tex.

Colonel Chitty was commissioned a second lieutenant upon graduation from the Army Air Corps Advanced Flying School in 1939, and was assigned as an instructor, a squadron commander, and later as Director of Operations at Kelly Field, Tex.

A command pilot, the 47-year-old officer became director of Training for the next two years at Altus and Frederick, Okla., and at Ellington Field, Tex.

Colonel Chitty earned his first combat ribbons as a P-38 pilot in the European Theater during WWII. Stationed at Triola, Italy, as Director of Operations, he chalked up some 205 combat hours in 39 missions, winning the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with three oak-leaf clusters.

Returning to Texas in 1946, the veteran Air Force officer became Headquarters Commandant of the XIX Tactical Air Command at Biggs Field. He transferred to Eglin AFB, Fla., a year later as a squadron commander and subsequently assumed the position of Deputy Director of Operations for the Proving Ground Command.

Colonel Chitty, who has an M.A. degree in international affairs from the George Washington University, and a B.S. degree in military science from the University of Maryland, commanded the Eighth Fighter Group at Itazuke AB, Japan, from 1949-1950.

In 1951, he transferred to Washington as Chief, Operations and Commitments Branch, Director of Operations, Hq USAF.

Prior to, and during this assignment Colonel Chitty became active in service baseball. A former semipro player, he also extended his athletic interests by becoming a member of the Hq USAF's squash and tennis teams.

In 1960, following an assignment as Commandant of the Squadron Officer School (1955-1958), Maxwell AFB, Ala., he won the Alaska State Singles championship in tennis while serving as Deputy Commander of the Tenth Air Division and later as Commander of the 5070th Air Defense Wing at Elmendorf AFB.

Colonel Chitty, who has accrued some 5,600 flying hours in his career returned to the nation's capital in 1961 to begin his tour as a member of the Weapons Systems Evaluation Group, OSD.

On July 31, 1964, he transferred to Hamilton AFB, Calif., to assume command of the 78th Fighter Wing, ADC.

Colonel Chitty is married to the former Marianne Turnipseed of Fort Gaines. They have three children, Dean, 23, married and residing in West Point, Ga.; Charles, 21, a second-year student at the United States Military Academy, West Point, N.Y.; and Daniel, 17, a senior in high school.

The Chittys also have two grandchildren, Billy and Dean Mitchell, 7 and 5 years old, respectively.

Colonel and Mrs. Chitty are presently living at 222 Sunset Drive, Hamilton AFB, Calif.

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## LARGE PLANES FLYING FROM MARIN AIR BASE

*I J 7 any*  
Large planes, bigger than the F-101 Voodoo jets stationed there, have been taking off from Hamilton Air Force Base since the crisis in Vietnam.

Officials at Hamilton, however, will give no explanation, saying the information of movement of aircraft has been placed on a top secret, "war time" basis.

Hamilton is believed to have been one of several staging areas for more than 50 jet fighters and high-speed reconnaissance planes that have flown from California points to Hawaii.

The planes were ordered overseas by the joint Air Force-Army Strike Command, a force designed to respond instantly to war threats anywhere in the world.

Hamilton officials said operation of its own planes is "strictly normal."

BROKEN ARROW

1. PURPOSE: To establish procedures to be followed by Air Police Personnel in any situation involving nuclear weapons subjected to accidents such as, jettisoning from altitude, crash landing, fire or rupture by careless handling.
2. SCOPE: This procedure applies to all personnel assigned to the 78th Air Police Squadron.
3. REFERENCES: Hamilton Air Force Base Disaster Control Plan 100-64.
4. RESPONSIBILITIES: The Air Police Operations Officer is responsible for the overall compliance of this directive.
5. GENERAL: In any case involving accidents to nuclear weapons a limited hazard exists. Full nuclear yield will not occur, however, normal explosions of TNT may be expected with the possibility of low intensity alpha radiation being emitted. Alpha radiation is only dangerous when swallowed, inhaled or allowed to enter an open cut in the skin. Normal clothing is sufficient for sentries use, plus a gas mask when working downwind. It is expected that the danger area will be confined within 1500 feet of the accident scene, however, alpha radiation could extend downwind approximately 500 feet per 10 mile per hour wind to a maximum of 5000 feet. All personnel who are exposed within 1500 feet of a nuclear accident will be presumed to have been exposed to alpha radiation and must be decontaminated for their own health as well as preventing the spreading of the alpha contamination by carrying on clothes and shoes to other areas.
6. PROCEDURES: ON BASE:
  - a. Central Security Control (CSC) will receive notification of a peacetime nuclear incident (Broken Arrow) from the following sources: Secondary crash circuit from Base Operations, or observation of witnesses. If notification is received from Base Operations they will give grid coordinates and the wind direction either in degrees or general direction such as North North East, South West South etc, if reported by a witness the CSC Plotter should obtain enough information to enable him to give the approximate grid coordinates to the Primary SAT and the Broken Arrow Security Team when dispatching them to the scene.
  - b. NOTIFICATIONS: CSC PLOTTER:

Immediately upon receipt of notification the CSC Plotter will:

    - (1) Notify Base Operations if notification has been received from other sources.
    - (2) Dispatch the Primary SAT who will equip themselves with gas masks and a portable loudspeaker.

- (3) Notify the Law Enforcement Desk Sergeant.

c. LAW ENFORCEMENT DESK SERGEANT:

Upon receipt of notification from the CSC Plotter, or other sources, the Law Enforcement Desk Sergeant will:

- (1) Initiate the barracks recall.
- (2) Call the motor pool dispatcher and request a 1½ ton cargo truck be dispatched to the rear of building #442 (Air Police Barracks)
- (3) Notify the NCOIC of the Broken Arrow Team. If incident occurs during other than normal duty hours, the NCOIC of the on duty security flight will designate an individual to assume charge of the Broken Arrow team until the arrival of the NCOIC or his assistant.
- (4) Notify the Director of Security and Law Enforcement, Operations Officer, Security Officer, Operations Sergeant, Security Sergeant, NCOIC Broken Arrow Team if other than normal duty hours.
- (5) Dispatch a vehicle to the Command Post Bldg #442 for transportation for the Disaster Control Officer and his equipment to the scene.
- (6) Close all exit gates until further notice.

d. PRIMARY SAT:

Upon dispatch to the scene, the Primary SAT will:

- (1) The Primary SAT, upon arrival at the site of the Broken Arrow, will go downwind from the site and begin evacuating all personnel with 1500 feet, using the portable loudspeaker. NOTE: The only non-essential personnel excluded from withdrawal, are those occupying buildings which are designed to withstand a minimum of 2 pounds per square inch over pressure, and are located 800 feet or more from the accident/incident scene.

e. BROKEN ARROW TEAM NCOIC:

Barracks recall. Personnel responding to a Broken Arrow will be armed and equipped with normal security uniforms, consistent with the weather, radios, whistles, flashlights, restricted area badges, dosimeters, pencil & paper, radiation exposure cards (ADC Form 18) and gas masks.

1. Upon arrival at the scene, the NCOIC of the Security Team will establish an accident scene Air Police Control Point 1500 feet upwind on a convenient access road. An Air Police vehicle with red light on will be parked at the control point.
2. Guards will then be posted in a circular perimeter approximately 100 feet around the accident site, with the exception of the downwind side. Guards on the downwind will be extended according to the wind travel. Each access road, fence, gate, etc., will be blocked against entrance by any

SGP 205-51

person or vehicle, except fire trucks, ambulances, EOD team, and the Disaster Control Officer or on the scene commander. Radios will be placed at strategic locations for communication with the Air Police entry point and the on the scene commander. No one else will be allowed access unless the Disaster Control Officer or on scene Commander requests their presence inside the Security perimeter. The only exceptions will be the Wing and Base Commanders who will be allowed access when and where they request it.

f. PERIMETER GUARDS:

After being posted, the perimeter guards will:

(1) Perimeter guards will record the names, rank and organization of any person found within the 1500 feet security perimeter and direct them to the Air Police Control point for decontamination. NOTE: Persons will be allowed to leave thru the security perimeter, but will be directed to the Control point by the most expeditious route.

g. Air Police at the accident scene will obey all orders from the Fire Chief until the arrival of the on scene commander or disaster control Officer who will then assume charge.

h. Guards will take cover when notified to do so by an Air Police Officer or NCOIC of the area, or upon hearing short blasts of the fire engines horn, or upon noting vehicles hastily exiting the immediate area.

i. If an explosion of the nuclear weapon does occur, Air Police will expect EOD personnel to enter the area. There may be pieces of explosives lying around which must not be touched or stepped on. These particles resemble dirt lumps. EOD personnel will be directed to these objects. This paragraph also applies to parts of aircraft.

j. After the EOD inspection, a decontamination crew will enter the area.

k. When the area has been decontaminated, Air Police will enter the area and search for classified material which will be collected or covered against unauthorized disclosure. NOTE: This will be done if and when the Disaster Control Officer so directs.

l. No one will be permitted to photograph the scene except the USAF Alert Photographer, no statement will be made to the press or public, all inquiries will be directed to the Base Information Officer. Reference AFR 190-10.

m. Air Police may leave the scene at the orders of the Disaster Control Officer unless the investigations, Safety or Salvage Officer request a security detail to preserve the remains of the weapons for investigation.

7. PROCEDURES: OFF BASE:

a. When notified of a Broken Arrow off base, the Air Police (Law Enforcement) Desk Sergeant will:

1. Notify the Air Police Squadron Commander, Operations Officer, Security Officer, Operations Sergeant, WCOIC Security and WCOIC of the Broken Arrow Team.

2. Alert the Alert Photographer and instruct him to report to the Command Post.

3. Call the dispatcher at the base motor pool and request that a 1½ ton cargo truck be dispatched to the rear of building #442, Air Police barracks.

4. Dispatch a vehicle to the Command Post for the Disaster Control Officer.

5. Summons twenty (20) airmen from the Air Police barracks and order them to report to the Air Police armory.

(a) These airmen will be dressed in security uniform, (outer garments to conform with weather conditions), armed, equipped the same as for on base accidents.

(b) The Team WCOIC will assemble the airmen outside the command post with orders to board the 1½ ton vehicle. The team WCOIC will then report to the Disaster Control for further instructions.

b. When the Disaster Control Officer orders the convoy to go to the accident site, an Air Police vehicle carrying the alert photographer and the Disaster Control Officer will lead the convoy. NOTE: The convoy will be formed at Base Operations.

c. Upon arrival at the accident scene, the WCOIC of the Air Police Team will contact the local law enforcement agency at the scene. Advise the local police that EXPLOSIVES were on the downed aircraft which endanger the public within a distance of 1500 feet in any direction. If possible, offer to assist the police in evacuating the civilian population from the area.

d. Every effort will be made to recover classified material or cover it to keep it out of reach and sight of the public and photographers.

e. On an off base accident, the Air Police have no authority to prohibit civilian press representatives or photographers from covering the scene, however, each will be cautioned that Title 18, US Code, prohibits the photographing of classified information and could result in criminal prosecution. All representatives of the press will be directed to the Air Police Control point where the Base Information Officer will make the authorized press releases.

f. If a photographer insists on taking pictures, the only action the Air Police will take is to report the matter to the civilian police, and if possible to identify the offender. No force of arms will be used. Reference AFR 190-10.


g. The 1500 feet perimeter, Air Police Control point, demarcation, and decontamination procedures will be established.

h. The Air Police Team will rope off the area, if it is necessary to control the crowd of spectators expected at any accident.

i. The Disaster Control Officer will order the release of the Air Police Team when the area has been cleared.

j. It is expected the Investigation, Safety or Salvage Officer will request a two (2) man detail to secure the wreckage of the accident.

1. SITUATION.

a. Hamilton AFB will conduct an Air Force ROTC Summer Training Unit for 260 Air Force ROTC cadets during the period 26 July 1964 through 22 August 1964. These cadets will come from 22 colleges and universities located in the western half of the United States, and Hawaii.

b. Cadets assigned to the Summer Training Unit will have completed at least the Junior Year at their respective college or university. Certain of the cadets will have completed all of the Air Force ROTC program except STU and will be commissioned 2d Lieutenants, United States Air Force Reserve, upon completion of STU.

c. The importance of the Air Force ROTC Summer Training Unit cannot be overemphasized. The Air Force ROTC program provides the United States Air Force with more career officers than any other source. Every effort and facility of Hamilton AFB must be directed toward providing an outstanding educational and orientation program as this STU will be the first prolonged contact these future officers will have with the Air Force in operation.

2. MISSION. The objective of Air Force ROTC summer training is to supplement the institutional phase of cadet training by:

a. Promoting in all cadets an increased enthusiasm and desire to consider the Air Force as a career.

b. Developing in all cadets a better understanding of the USAF mission as exemplified in the operation of an Air Force base.

c. Increasing cadet proficiency in essential areas of junior officer training and leadership development.

d. Providing a thorough recorded evaluation of each cadet to assist in determining his potential as an Air Force officer.

3. EXECUTION.

a. Concept of Operations. The mission of the Air Force ROTC Summer Training Unit will be accomplished by providing the cadets involved with the instructional material required by Section B of Air Force Manual 45-3. Instruction will be conducted by the classroom method, by field trips to nearby military installations, by supervised field training in survival techniques and junior officer training, and by orientation aircraft flights. All cadets will also participate in individual and group athletics.

b. Tasks of Subordinate Units.

(1) 78th Combat Support Group

(a) Will furnish base support and house keeping functions as required in support of this plan. (Annex B, to be published.)

(b) Provide instruction within the scope of the organization as required by the Master Training Schedule. (Annex A, to be published.)

(2) Deputy Commander for Materiel, 78th Fighter Wing

(a) Provide required maintenance and supply functions in support of this plan. (Annex C, to be published.)

(b) Provide instruction within the scope of the organization as required by the Master Training Schedule. (Annex A, to be published.)

(3) Deputy Commander for Operations, 78th Fighter Wing

(a) Provide facilities and aircraft and aircrews as required to support the flying phases of the Master Training Schedule. (Annex A, to be published.)

(b) Provide instruction within the scope of the organization as required by the Master Training Schedule. (Annex A, to be published.)

(4) Director, Medical Services. Provide medical services, and cadet physical examinations as required by AFM 45-3.

c. Air Force ROTC cadets do not possess security clearances. All instruction material should be screened accordingly.

d. Coordinating Instructions. This plan will be implemented during the period 26 July 1964 through 22 August 1964.

4. REPORTS: Reports will be submitted as required by AFM 45-3.

5. ADMINISTRATION AND LOGISTICS. Normal.

6. COMMAND AND SIGNAL.

a. The Hamilton AFB STU Commander is Lt Col Edward O. Willeford, located in building 433, ext 3270, Hamilton AFB, California.

b. The Hamilton AFB STU Supply Officer is 2d Lt James A. Harper, located in building 410, ext 27276, Hamilton AFB, California.

c. The Hamilton AFB STU Assistant Training Officer is 2d Lt Kenneth R. Stump, located in building 433, ext 27107, Hamilton AFB, California.

d. On 12 July 1964, Hq Hamilton AFB AFROTC STU will be established in building 915.

e. The Base STU officers are authorized direct communications with all participating units and/or headquarters.

f. This plan is effective upon receipt and until 31 August 1964.

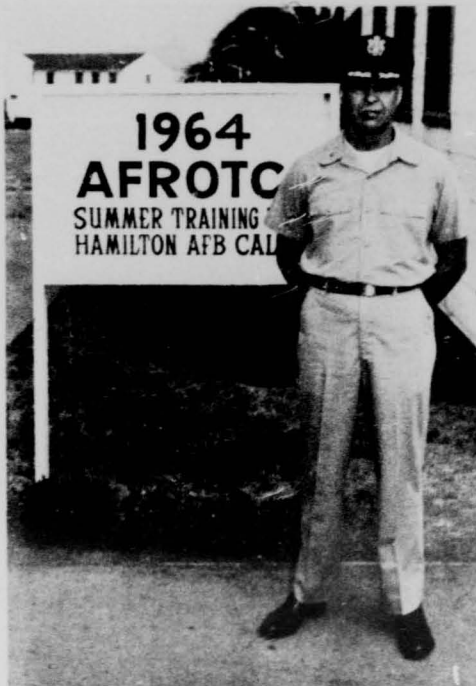
COMMANDER'S LETTER

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Biography

COLONEL RALPH MATTHEW WANDERER

Ralph Matthew Wanderer Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph M. Wanderer Sr., was born Aug. 19, 1917, in Clancy, Mont. He attended the University of Montana from 1935 until 1939, when he entered the U.S. Army Air Corps as an aviation cadet.

A year later he was commissioned a second lieutenant, and in May, 1940, joined the 18th Pursuit Group at Wheeler Field, Hawaii.

In October of that year he transferred to the 23d Bomb Squadron at Hickam AFB, Hawaii. It was during this assignment that he was promoted to first lieutenant and awarded the Purple Heart for action on Dec. 7, 1941, at Pearl Harbor.

In January, 1942, Lieutenant Wanderer joined a task force of B-17s in the South Pacific, led by General (then Major) Walter C. Sweeney. Two months later he received his promotion to captain.

During his Pacific tour, Captain Wanderer flew 66 combat missions in the B-17 aircraft, many of them accomplished while serving as commander of the 23d Bomb Squadron---a position he attained in October, 1942.

Promoted to major in December, 1942, he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with one oak-leaf cluster, the Bronze Star, the Air Medal and the Commendation Medal.

Major Wanderer returned to the U.S. in June, 1943, and was assigned to the Test Flight Group, Mobile Air Depot, Brookley AFB, Ala.

In November, 1943, he attended the Command and General Staff School at Fort Leavenworth, Kan.

He was assigned to the Combat Crew Training School at Sioux City, Iowa, in January, 1944, and four months later was promoted to lieutenant colonel.

From July, 1944, until September, 1945, Colonel Wanderer served as Director of Operations, B-29 Operational Training Unit at Fairmont, Neb.; Commander of Fairmont AFB, Neb.; and Director of Operations at Cook AFB, Neb.

The month following V-J Day saw Colonel Wanderer assigned to the Pacific Air Command, U.S. Army at Fort McKinley, Manila, Philippine Islands. The following month---in November, 1945, he joined the Advanced Echelon, Pacific Air Command, U.S. Army, with headquarters in Tokyo, Japan.

After a short tour in Japan, Colonel Wanderer transferred to Headquarters, 20th Air Force as Director of Operations and Training on Guam in January, 1946.

He returned to the U.S. in November, 1947, as Director of Operations for the 92d Bomb Wing, Fairchild AFB, Wash., where he remained for 18 months before attending Air Command and Staff School at Maxwell AFB, Ala.

Colonel Wanderer returned to the State of Washington in June, 1949, to assume command of the 325th Bomb Squadron, 92d Bomb Group at Spokane AFB, Wash.

Immediately following the outbreak of the Korean conflict (July, 1950), he made his second trip to the Far East---on a deployment to Yokota AB, Japan. Here, he flew 16 combat missions in B-29s. He returned to Fairchild, AFB, Wash., in November of that year.

Lieutenant Colonel Wanderer was promoted to colonel in January, 1951, and assumed command of the 90th Bomb Group at Fairchild AFB, Wash.

From April, 1951, until July, 1959, he served in the U.S. as Director of Operations for the 90th Bomb Wing; Deputy Commander, 90th Bomb Wing; Chief of Manpower and Organization Divisions, Strategic Air Command Headquarters, Offutt AFB, Neb.; Deputy for Plans and Programs, Personnel Procurement and Training, Headquarters, U.S. Air Force; Assistant Secretary, Air Force Council Vice Chief of Staff Office, Headquarters, USAF; and Secretary, Air Force Council, Vice Chief of Staff Office, Hq., USAF.

He also attended the Manpower Management Course at George Washington University in 1952, an advance management course at Harvard University in 1954, and during the same year received a BS degree in Education from the University of Omaha.

Colonel Wanderer, who had now accrued some 850 combat hours in both the B-29 and the B-17 aircraft, received his next overseas assignment in July, 1959, when he was assigned as Deputy Commander, 10th Air Division, at Elmendorf AFB, Alaska.

A year later he became Commander of the 5040th Air Base Wing and Commander of Elmendorf AFB.

He arrived at Hamilton in June, 1962, where he was assigned as Deputy for Personnel, Headquarters, 28th Air Division. He assumed command of Hamilton AFB in July, 1964.

Colonel Wanderer is married to the former Margaret Burns of Helena, Mont. They have four children, Kenneth B., 19; Ralph M., 18; Barbara Jean, 15; and Christina, 6. The family now resides at 297 Casa Grande Real, Hamilton AFB, Calif.

From Marin County to Marin County, one sometimes goes by way of North Africa or Korea, according to the record of the new commander of the 84th Fighter Interceptor Squadron at Hamilton Air Force Base.

Lt. Col. Wilbur A. Tapscott, who has just assumed the command of the award winning squadron, is a native of Marin. He was born in Kentfield, Sept. 25, 1921. His father, Robert M. Tapscott, was in the claims department of Fidelity and Casualty Insurance Co. in San Francisco. The family lived on Cypress Avenue in Kentfield. Young Tapscott attended Kentfield Elementary School, Tamalpais High School, and Marin Junior College, and worked for Castro's Garage in San Rafael. dal with six oak leaf clusters, the Distinguished Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster, and the Croix de Guerre with one silver star.

After the war, he was assigned to the 171st Fighter Squadron with the Michigan National Guard. Then followed assignments with the 14th Air Force at Orlando, Fla., where he was chief of the fighter branch, and at Robins Air Force Base, Ga. In 1952, when he was sent to Korea, he returned his wife, the former Jacqueline Kievenaar of Marin County, to Novato, buying a house at 33 Las Alondros.

In 1955, he was assigned to the 28th Air Division at Hamilton. Assignments in Colorado Springs and Japan followed. In 1962, he returned to the 28th Air Division, serving as chief of plans and programing until his appointment as commander of the 84th.

Colonel and Mrs. Tapscott have three children, Terri, 15, Piet, 14 and Libbie, 6. They now live at 225 Mount Shasta Drive in Lucas Valley.

The fight against the change

headed by Max John Machado

of 1424 Dawes Street, Novato.

"The low flying planes are en-

declared.

I would like to register a formal protest against the proposed change in the flight pattern which brings low flying jet aircraft over the whole portion of the City of Novato. It seems totally unreasonable for me, a private citizen, to be subjected to noise, increased noise threats to safety because of a new housing development, namely, Bel Marin Keys. The developers of this project knew full well in advance what they were doing. I see no reason whatsoever for subjecting other citizens to inconvenience, frustrations and anxiety for the convenience of the residents of Bel Marin Keys.

In conversation with Major Smith on Monday evening, September 9th, he informed me that the major reason for revamping the flight pattern was the safety of the Bel Marin residents. This adds substance and reason to the above objections.

We value highly the contribution of Hamilton Air Base, its officers and personnel to the City of Novato. However, we feel that this change in flight pattern would have a decidedly detrimental effect upon this outlook by the residents of Novato.

We sincerely hope that the proposed change will not be put into force.

Our new test pattern has been proposed to solve difficulties faced by our pilots when weather conditions make an instrument approach to the southeast runway desirable. Because we have not had such an approach in the past it has sometimes been necessary for us to divert our interceptors to Travis Air Force Base.

As you probably know, Novato lies in a direct line with our North-west-Southeast runway. If this line were extended further it would run through Burdell Mountain which has an elevation of 1580 feet. The mountain which is seven miles from the end of the runway is the key problem in a southeast approach.

Because required terrain clearance cannot be maintained over this mountain during an instrument landing, it is necessary to pass either to the east or the west of the hill. Passing to the east is not feasible as such an approach interferes with the operations of the Marin County Airport and with our Air Defense climb corridor. In addition to these problems, our TACAN navigational facility which is used in these approaches, is not located in such a position as to make the approach from the east of the mountain possible.

An approach which passes one mile to the west of the mountain satisfies terrain clearance requirements without raising the other problems. We have proposed, therefore, that this approach is most desirable even though it does pass over the City of Novato.

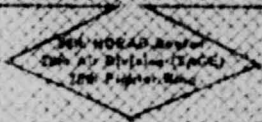

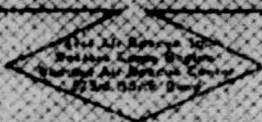

HAMILTON AFB, CALIFORNIA, September 9, 1963 . . . Marginal weather conditions during the winter months have made it necessary for F-101 interceptors of the 54th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, here, to test a new approach to the runway on the base, it was disclosed today.

Normally, all take-offs and landings are made from south to north and Novato is avoided entirely. During the winter months, however, the wind frequently comes from the south and a downwind landing from this direction would be extremely hazardous in the event of rain or heavy fog. The only answer, to avoid the possibility of serious accident and tragedy is an approach to the base from the north.

Normal approaches from this direction, in clear weather, present no problem. Marginal winter weather, however, is a different story, for not too far north of Novato is a 1,500-foot peak which presents a definite hazard to an F-101 flying the normal landing pattern under instrument conditions. During an approach at speeds up to 300 mph, with the peak obscured by low clouds, veering just slightly from the prescribed pattern could result in disaster.

The danger presented by the 1,500-foot mountains can be averted by flying farther to the north and then turning south for a straight-in approach. This pattern brings the planes directly over Novato at altitudes of 2,000 feet and is the one currently being tested for feasibility. The experiment is being made under conditions prescribed by the FAA.

Aircraft participating in the test will approach Novato from the northwest, as they pass over Little Mountain at 6,000 feet. At this point they will let down to 2,000 feet by the time that they fly over Sinto Avenue.

An altitude of two thousand feet will be maintained until a point just northeast of the intersection of South Novato and Howard Boulevards. Here, the F-101's, flying a heading of 90 degrees will commence their let-down to field elevation. The planes will be flying over Novato at 250 knots, or 278 mph. Weather conditions which would make such an approach necessary normally would be accompanied by low-lying clouds which would serve to muffle any increase in noise from the jets as they pass over Novato.

Residents of Novato are asked to notice some approaches that will be lower than the prescribed normal 2,000 feet. These will be intentional low-level experimental approaches necessary to test radar capabilities of the National Air Route Base ground control approach (GCA) system. Such low-level approaches are temporary and will be discontinued as soon as possible.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

A Mrs. [redacted] 517-2807, who lives at 424 Daves St. George  
tells me she has flight tickets over city of Mexico. She identifies  
herself as a woman who is interested in political affairs and  
that she was well aware of the Bel Maria Keys project and was in  
the public records on this project some 2-1-1948 years ago. Her  
objection was to the interests that her current flight plan was there  
to discontinue safety measures to the Bel Maria Keys project. I dispel  
this misconception immediately and told her that Bel Maria Keys  
had no influence in the long range planning to obtain a safe approach  
to the island. I pointed out that we had been seeking a way to protect  
this area a period of years and improved navigational safety and charts  
had helped us in this. We were experimenting and had testing the waters  
and that it utilized in the future it would contribute to our common  
purpose. I pointed out that this improved posture provides her and  
her neighbors with a high degree of security and knowledge that  
we are ready to meet any threats.

The subject of this memo stated to me she received this instruction but  
impressed me as an individual who will continue to pursue a similar  
course of conduct on this subject. She was not belligerent nor  
contumacious in asking for information on this particular subject.  
We did not discuss the information she brought in the matter of the  
location of a civilian airport to be located here and I made  
certainly no promises as to what she could do today inasmuch as it would  
be a matter of several months. Given by persons less trained than  
I am, she should be for the compliance of such an operation

Aircraft Approach Briefing

1. Since the new marginal weather approach to runway 12 has been in use, we have received an increasing number of complaints from the citizens of Novato. In their complaints, the homeowners cite the disturbing noise level, the relatively low approach altitude which they feel endangers houses and the Novato High School, and even more concerning from the aircraft onto clothes-lines and houses.

2. With the approach of the winter season, this pattern will be given greater use and the number of complaints can be expected to rise sharply. This may result in a serious problem in our relations with the city of Novato, particularly if the homeowners organize an official protest to their Congressional representatives. On 2 September 68, Mrs. Joseph D. Mank of 5 Dawes Court, Novato, indicated she plans to initiate a petition among her neighbors protesting this new approach.

3. To forestall such a reaction, it is recommended that a public briefing be held on base at the earliest opportunity. An open invitation would be extended through the local news media to all interested residents of the Novato area and to the local press.

4. At this briefing, the reasons for using the new approach pattern would be explained by a team composed of the 24th Squadron commander, Colonel Yuscott; an FAA representative, and other appropriate officials. Particular emphasis would be placed on the fact that the FAA has investigated and approved the pattern and that there is an adequate safety margin.

5. The effectiveness of this briefing would be enhanced if Mr. Richard Nava, president of the Novato Chamber of Commerce, were to be given an actual demonstration of the new pattern. He could then express his views on the approach to his fellow citizens.



1. Col Traverso returned a call from Mrs Murchado at 1700 on 14 September and the following exchange took place: *(not always verbatim)*

Murchado: I have Col Wanderer's letter and I am unhappy. The women are furious. Mrs Mook is fit to be tied. We were told we could attend the briefing. A round table discussion is the best way to do this thing. My questions to Col Wanderer were not too hard to answer. The "practice session" of last Thursday is what got us upset. Once, at three o'clock in the morning somebody made a wrong turn and a whole squadron went over.

Traverso: Mrs. Murchado don't you agree with me that this isn't that big a squeal? We are doing this for the safety of the aircraft.

Murchado: This is a comedy of errors caused by the school pattern. We never had it before. Now you thrust it upon us. Bel Marin Keys is behind this. I sat on a planning commission discussion a few years ago and heard your Major (Jerman) plead not to build in that area.

Traverso: This is a misconception, Mrs. Murchado -- Can I call you Betty?

Murchado: Oh yes. I'd be most flattered.

Traverso: Bel Marin Keys gets every type of aircraft noise.

Murchado: Except during bad weather.

Traverso: When the wind is out of the north all traffic goes over the Bel Marin -- Kenney Homes area.

Murchado: Ah! Kenney! And the shopping area! I have my ear to the ground.

Traverso: The only traffic over Novato will be interceptors when the wind comes from the south.

Machado: Except for your practice sessions. One woman was up all night.

Machado: The officials are not the ones who are complaining. You people never explain. Just get it done and then let them holler. You are passing the buck to John Baget. It's not fair. You are going to tell us -- not ask us.

Traverso: Betty-- the pattern has not been changed. Traffic still flows as it always did.

Machado: What were you doing Tuesday?

Traverso: We have added to our traffic patterns -- not changed them.

Machado: Yes -- over my house. And you have messed up Public Relations. You and Wanderer. Major Jones invited us to the meeting.

Traverso: Our original plan was as it now is. The wives were never in on it. Betty -- let me offer you a compromise. Can we talk to you at a later date?

Machado: No. I want to know what happened at this meeting. Those people are not representing me. I have to know what they are doing. Public Relations must be founded on citizens. You can't pull 'military' on civilians. You are cramming it down my throat. I want a round table. What would happen if I showed up?

Traverso: I'd like to invite you and Mrs. Mook to lunch some other day.

Machado: No. Tomorrow at two.

Traverso: No. . . . We have nothing to hide Betty . . .

Machado: Well -- Wayne Womack will think twice when he starts to lose our business -- just as Irv Lynes did . . .

(Mrs. Machado -- fixing spaghetti for her husband who was going deer hunting up north -- had to get back to her cooking.)

## Seeks Help On New Bore Flight Pattern

To The Editor:

Since the change of approach flight pattern of four Run Field.

This letter is in regard to the above subject and a telephone conversation on the above date to a Major Jones, command officer, Hamilton Field Extension 2411 asking why a flight in these areas of Novato has suddenly become a new flight pattern of U. S. Air Force jets.

I am asking for the cooperation of the Novato officials in having this flight pattern reversed to the original approach. I do believe it has always been of the direction of the east side of Highway 101 north of the Bay and Black Point and surrounding areas. Now, as per my conversation with Major Jones, this has been changed to the new pattern, mostly the bad weather, wind blowing the runways in a certain and technical position etc. etc.

As a resident and parent to a child today, one plane in particular passed directly over my home with landing gear down and very very low. Major Jones assured me the pilot was at least 1000 feet high. I say 300 feet to be more exact. Neighbors reacted with me 9 hours later after with an approximately 1000 feet altitude during the past hour. Aside from the previous experience I say this is a direct hazard to many families.

I have wanted to some of the Novato officials during my telephone conversations to get that the new pattern was a change in a very low altitude in the extension of the flight pattern of the Olive Street School. The area around the school is a very busy residential area and I am sure the flight pattern is a direct hazard to many families.

This is why Mr. Max Baughman, state superintendent of schools, has been notified of this trouble being an unsafe condition for the children and the state of California. He has been the leading head of the industry. Not to mention the constant noise and distraction of the studying people.

This also affects the shopping centers and even a field one (which Waddellville, a woman was so upset over the removal of trees from a shopping area she would not purchase the area until they were replaced immediately). This also has another aspect of a dirt problem from the jet fuel residues which dirties homes and a laundry problem—small and insignificant to all but the housewife constantly rewashing white clothes.

Certainly sir, I do not have to state the times a plane has missed runways, exploded or crashing in residential areas. We all read newspapers and know of the dangers. I am certain my undersigned neighbors can and do have other statements of fact regarding this new dangerous situation.

I am asking for your cooperation and support of having this flight pattern put back to the original area. Major Jones has told me of a forthcoming meeting soon in approximately three weeks explaining to all interested parties, the why's and reasons of this change, assuring me the Chamber of Commerce and any interested parties are welcome. He also said he would notify me in regard to this and I have asked for a open discussion from the user, which he stated he would welcome.

Now I would like to mention flightie since Bel Martin Keys has been built and warned against building in this location because of Hamilton Field, they are no longer in the flight pattern.

Major Jones says they have anything to do with this. I am sorry to hear this.

Can you see why the Novato tax dollar could not be spent to protect Novato residents and not for the ignominy benefit of Bel Martin Keys who warned against this building program because of danger, noise, vibration, etc. that it seems sitting during my seven years as a resident the weather has changed quite suddenly. Are these weather changes called Martin Keys?

Sir, I am asking for your cooperation and support at this forthcoming meeting in Hamilton Field, for the protection of the Novato resident.

Dear Mrs. Mouch:

Your letter to Colonel Wanderer arrived after all plans were made for the briefing of Novato officials which was presented yesterday. Colonel Wanderer asked this office to answer the letter because of our involvement in the briefing.

Despite my invitation to you, you now know that it was decided to brief the City officials and the press as a more expeditious way of disseminating information to the public at large. Accordingly, we did not invite individual citizens and I was unable to keep my promise to you.

In answer to some of your specific questions -- and I hope that the local press will have made our reasons clear when you receive this -- it would be inadvisable, for reasons of safety, for us to abandon our new approach to the southeast runway. I also want to reassure you that Bel Marin Keys had no influence on this new flight pattern. The Bel Marin Keys residents are still directly under our major traffic patterns which are utilized perhaps 99% of the time.

The inconvenience caused you and your neighbors by our new approach is, of course, of concern to us. I want to repeat the Wing Commander's statement at yesterday's briefing that the use of this approach will be held to a minimum -- consistent with the safety of the Novato residents and our own aircrews.

The Chamber of Commerce, as well as City and School officials and the local press were given the briefing yesterday. They indicated they would help us pass the information along to all interested parties.

Secretary of the Air Force (SAFOM/L&L) Wash DC

1. The following information is forwarded as background material in the event of Congressional inquiry about a new flight pattern at Hamilton Air Force Base.
2. The new pattern, called the Novato Approach, is from the AFIO let down book. A copy of this chart is attached. A plain view of the approach and its relationship to the City of Novato, population 24,000, is indicated on the San Francisco local aeronautical chart which is also attached.
3. This approach is required to increase the operational effectiveness of the 84th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, 78th Fighter Wing, at Hamilton. It replaces a circling approach to runway 12, which was inherently more dangerous to the City of Novato, and it enables interceptors of the 84th Fighter Interceptor Squadron to land safely under lower minimums than was possible with the circling approach. This greatly improves the operational effectiveness of the squadron.
4. This approach was approved by FAA on 15 June 1966. Weather conditions are such as to require its use less than 10 percent of the time. The approach, which is for interceptors only, brings F-101s over the city on final let down. It provides a new experience for many residents of Novato who live under the line of flight, and it has caused some trepidation. Because the old circling approach was not directly over their heads, Novatans were less aware of landings to runway 12 in the past.
5. The locations of Purcell Mountain, Big Rock, and the interceptor climb corridor, which are indicated on the chart, make the present flight path for a straight-in approach to runway 12 the only one which also meets FAA approach criteria.
6. Explanations of the reasons for this approach to the citizens of Novato are being made. An educational program which has included

press releases, briefings of Nevada businessmen, city officials, and civic leaders, has been accomplished. Further briefings are being planned.

1. The meeting began at 1405. Thirty-one civilians were present as were Col Chitty, Col Wanderer, Col Miller, Lt Col Tapscott, Lt Col Traverso, Major Jones and Capt Cumming.
2. Colonel Chitty opened the briefing with an overall picture of 84th FIS operations, which are largely to the Northwest of Hamilton. He explained the Novato approach as an operational requirement relatively new, approved by FAA on 15 June 64, which would be used when weather conditions made it necessary. He turned the meeting over to Colonel Tapscott.
3. Colonel Tapscott explained there had been a similar approach in 1953-54 which came in from the Farallones, then turned to pass over Novato on a comparable flight pattern. Because the F-101 has greater speed and a greater turn radius this approach has now been modified. Bel Marin Keys had nothing to do with it --, Burdell Mountain is the limiting factor. He explained that the new approach uses a TACAN facility which provides the pilot with direction and distance from a ground station.
  - a. He then presented a slide showing a plan view of the approach and then overlaid a chart of the City of Novato.
  - b. He presented a vertical cross section of the approach and explained that only Hamilton 101's would use it - - that the 101 was twin engined and as safe as the art could devise.
  - c. A final slide showing the climb corridor and the position of Mt. Burdell and Big Rock was projected.
4. A question and answer period produced the following information.
  - Q. The approach is controlled by prevailing weather?
    - A. It is dictated by it.
  - Q. What has happened to the weather in the last six months which makes this approach necessary at this time?
    - A. We have always used runway 12 but out of a circling approach from the southeast. Such an approach requires visual sight of the runway throughout the turn -- and it is inherently more dangerous.

Q. The new approach does not come out of the North. Why?

A. Bardell Mountain.

Q. This approach interferes with egg production on my chicken farm.

A. I have no good answer. However, we do make our landings with reduced power and we use this approach only when necessary.

Q. You say the approach is based on weather. But you use it at other times when weather does not seem to be a factor.

A. We must practice during good weather. However, weather conditions will put the runway in use about 1 (one)% of the time.

5. Rich Nave, President of the Novato Chamber of Commerce was given a 101 flight utilizing the Novato Approach during the briefing. The flight was followed by radio in the briefing room and position of the aircraft was traced on a projected chart. Mr. Nave arrived in the briefing room at 1300 in flight gear and indicated that the new approach looked good to him.

6. Col Chitty promised to keep approaches to runway 12 at a minimum consistent with safety and indicated that if a safer approach could be devised, it would be. In response to one last question as to whether or not a briefing would be given housewives, if there were great enough demand, he indicated that such a briefing would be provided.

7. Handouts included a San Francisco local aeronautical chart, base guide and copy of the base newspaper. Some questions were clarified after the meeting broke up.

# New Approach To Base Explained

When a jet plane was seen in the sky above Hamilton in the south, the planes of three things — downward it would wave or it would fly in it the line straight by its being there. Some may shake a flat at it.

Recently some have been the usually, making their hats officials of Hamilton Air Force Base yesterday held a briefing for city officials and civic leaders to explain the reason for a new landing approach to Hamilton.

Gathered in the briefing room of the 78th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron near the Hamilton flight line they were essentially told these facts:

- A new north approach was approved by the FAA this June.
- It is to be used exclusively by jet fighters operating out of Hamilton.
- It is to be used only when weather and wind conditions warrant it.
- The new approach replaces a previous pattern used by jet pilots of circling the base to approach it from the north when bad weather and wind required it.
- If there was a safer method, the Air Force would use it.

Hamilton air pilots landing below that Northwest in the south, the planes would loop away and circle the base to approach it from the north. Air rules require that pilots under these conditions keep the landing strip in sight. However, because of the wide turning radius of the 10-1000, labeled as high speed, pilots have not always been able to observe this rule.

Thus the search for a legal and direct landing approach.

Lt. Col. Wilbur A. Tapscott, commander of the 84th, said the weather and wind in the area would require landings for fighter jets from the north only 1 per cent of the time. However, F-101 pilots must practice each landing pattern at least once every three months. He estimated that no more than 5 per cent of the landings at Hamilton would be over Novato in the new north-south approach.

Col. Charles Chitty, commander of the 78th Wing at Hamilton, promised the group that the use of the new approach would be held to a minimum. He lauded his promise when Casey Tom Gwynne informed the group that the low level jets were exciting his

under the jet and the jet would approach it from the north.

The jet approach starts with it being at an altitude of 1000 feet west of South Road. The plane is 1000 feet west of Petaluma. From it starts swinging east over Novato towards the Hamilton runway.

At 1000 feet the jets are over 5150 Avenue and Novato Boulevard over Nave Shopping Center and the Novato Pier Shopping Center, they are at 1000 feet. From that point they are headed straight for the Black Point cutoff which they hit at an altitude of 700 feet.

In the event weather is so bad that the pilots can't see the runway at 700 feet they must make a CCA (ground control approach) landing. In this event, a ground radar controller directs the pilot in by bringing him over Richmond and then into Hamilton.

While Col. Chitty and Tapscott explained the need for the approach, a jet was winging its way over the route into Hamilton carrying Richard Nave, president of the Novato Chamber of Commerce.

Over a main live-in broadcast over the public address system in the room the group heard the pilot's altitude and distance at the various check points as the jet drifted in.

After landing and appearing before the group Nave expressed himself "100 per cent" in favor of anything that contributed towards safer landings.

Nave's chauffeur on his jet trip was Capt. Robert Russ.

A letter to the council, expressing concern of the new approach, is to be considered at the next council meeting Tuesday. In answer to City Manager John Ruge, Col. Chitty said if the council was unable to explain to citizens the need for the approach that base officials would cooperate in conducting further briefings.

# 'Bad Weather' Flight Defended At Air Base

A "bad weather" flight pattern for Hamilton Air Force Base, which has brought complaints from Navajo housewives, was defended as "the safest flight plan for pilots and citizens" at a meeting at the base Monday from which the complaints were resuspended by their absence.

Col. Charles D. Chitty, commander of the 78th Fighter Wing, so described the new pattern at the meeting, in which city officials and chamber of commerce representatives had been invited. He was backed up by Lt. Col. Wilbur A. Tapscott, commander of the 84th Fighter Squadron, who called it "the safest approach in bad weather."

One Navajo present was not satisfied, however. Casey Van Orman, 1623 Center Road, a poultry farmer, disclosed that women aren't the only ones disturbed by low-flying planes approaching on the new pattern. They scare out his egg production, he said.

Mr. Gutzgen said he wasn't complaining for himself, but his wife's health has gotten nervous when the planes fly over.

Colonel Chitty said the new flight pattern, which brings the planes into the base directly over Mount Sordell residential areas, was adopted as it had been successful for some time. He said that the pattern was approved by the Federal Aviation Authority. He raised flight level to 1,000 feet and the

complaints came soon afterward.

Chitty said planes level off at 2,000 feet over Suro Avenue and Navajo Boulevard when following the new pattern. They drop down to about 1,500 feet above Yakon and Deana Ways and are down to 700 feet by the time they cross the Highway 27-highway 101 intersection.

City officials seemed satisfied with the explanation for need for the new approach to bring planes to the base well away from Mount Sordell during fog and rain. But City Administrator J. Julian Bagel suggested the women might not be satisfied. Colonel Chitty would another briefing for them if they request it. The colonel said he would.

Richard Nave, president of the Navajo Chamber of Commerce, was given a flight over the approach pattern and landed nearby for briefing.

"If anything makes the job easier for the pilots, it's to have the commandery in with the Air Force," declared Nave.

DURING A BRIEFING on the new flight pattern at Hamilton Air Force Base and Tuesday, Rich Naess, president of the Greater Novato Chamber of Commerce, was given a ride in an F-101 Voodoo over the new Novato shopping center. Rich is seldom without his good sense of humor, and he did not leave it on the ground that day.

As his plane came down the approach pattern, the voices of his pilot, Capt. Robert Roden, and Rich were heard in the briefing room over loudspeakers.

As they were between 17,000 feet over Santa Rosa and 5,000 feet over Petaluma, Rich called out:

"PICK UP MY PANTS up off the runway—I lost them on the way by."

A short while later as they were going over Novato, Rich said:

"We are not going over beyond Novato shopping center."

The pilot had to circle the field and land from the south. An obvious offense resulted over the runway. Neither the pilot, who was busy landing the plane, nor Rich said anything. A few minutes later the crowd learned the truth. As with most airshows, men when they are fast put through the strains of several G's to a turn in a P-101, their stomachs rebel and give up its first meal. So it was with Rich, only he could not get his eyes open wide off in time to see the "very long" line of the pilot's dunking after the flight but was all smiles when he came dripping wet into the briefing room.

A meeting to explain the new flight pattern at Hamilton Air Force Base has been called for 2 p.m. Thursday in the briefing room of the 40th Fighter Interceptor Squadron at the base.

Novato city councilmen, the military affairs committee of the chamber of commerce, and other interested persons have been invited to the meeting, according to base officials.

The meeting results from several complaints recently from Novato residents concerning low-flying planes from Hamilton. The new flight pattern brings planes in an approach from the west, through State Route 101 and onto the runway. This was approved for a bad weather approach and planes have been practicing using it the past few weeks.

This will be the second meet-

ing in two weeks to iron out friction between the base and civilians. Last week complaints of residents of Raphael Village, Air Force housing west of Highway 101, about traffic control and street maintenance, were discussed at a meeting of city, state, and base law enforcement officers.

## Housewife Irate At New Flight Pattern

Let's be fair, T.J. You've given most coverage to just one side of the "Bad Weather" flight pattern problem in Novato, the Air Force side, and the articles are so phrased that we who have filed complaints appear to be arbitrary, unreasonable, cranky "housewives." In your article of Sept. 16 you state: "The complaints were conspicuous by their absence." The Air Force very generously decided upon a hearing with very little advance notice, at an hour when no busy housewife or working mother like myself could attend.

The Air Force continues to plead that the new landing route which permits low, curving, climb-rattling flights over the most heavily populated area of Novato... is the "safest." This is so their pilots will not be endangered by having to pass over Mt. Bardell, elevation approximately 1,000 feet, or some equivalent to the small mountains of Bel Marin Keys.

Why is it that since the opening of Hamilton Air Force Base over 20 years ago, fair weather had had, and during wartime when hundreds of aircraft landed per day it was there without a hangar or out on the tarmac—aircraft with much less speed, frequently armed, and much less maneuverable, had no trouble with the old landing pattern over the least populated area of north Novato. Should be discussed?

This foul weather approach, used on the evening of Sept. 16, was a great disturbance to children trying to get back to their studying patterns. An inquiry to the Major at Base Operations, as to why, on a

busy, clear evening, a foul weather approach was being used, was answered: "The wind is from the south, Ma'am." (I had already checked this and the usual mild prevailing westerly was coming in from the ocean fog bank.) I appreciate military protection, support it with my taxes, have served my country in uniform and out, but I don't feel protected by jets ripping my roof-top and shattering the peace of the "country" life when it has not been proved essential for safety to ALL concerned, not just the pilots whose predecessors seem to have lived to retirement age without mishap under prior flight patterns.

I'm glad the Novato Chamber of Commerce representative had a nice, free ride over the flight pattern and that he decided for all of us that it was "safer for pilots." What about the safety and serenity of those of us who have invested in homes in the "Valley of No Regrets"?

"Housewives" indeed! What is the matter with you husbands? Oh, well—pick up the phone, gals—we may not win, but the O. D.'s will get mighty weary of repeating "The wind is from the south, Ma'am."

## Two Meetings Scheduled To Air Hamilton Disputes

Two meetings were scheduled today at Hamilton Air Force Base to air complaints of Air Force personnel about civilian authorities and of Novatoans about the Air Force.

The first meeting will be held Thursday noon at the Officers Club on the air base, sponsored by Col. Ralph M. Wanderer Jr., base commander. He said Mo-

reno, Marin County and state law enforcement officials will be invited to hear complaints of Raphael Village residents about traffic through their area.

The second meeting will be held one week later, the time and place not yet determined. Novato civic leaders and residents will be invited, and the colonel will be to hear Novatoans' complaints about annoyance from planes because of a new flight pattern adopted by the base last year.

Raphael Village is a Wherry Housing Act development which belongs to the Air Force but is part of Novato. Unlike the base itself, it is under civilian authority—specifically, that of the city.

On Aug. 23, a group of Raphael Village residents drew up a list of complaints about traffic problems—particularly speeding—and began circulating petitions to be presented to the air base commander.

The complaints result in large part from alleged increase in speeding since completion by the State Division of Highways of the Ignacio Boulevard-Highway 101 overpass. The new route sends cars into Raphael Village at higher speeds—its residents were warned it would by a story in the Scramble, the airbase newspaper.

Residents ask: (1) reduction in the speed limit from 35 to 15 miles per hour; (2) marking of pedestrian crosswalks; and (3) closer police patrol.

Their complaints will be presented to county and state authorities since part of the road generating the traffic trouble is outside the city and is patrolled by the California Highway Patrol.

The Novatoans' complaint to be aired at the second meeting is that the change in the "bad weather approach" to the air base adopted last year sends planes at low elevation over Novato homes.

The approach to which the Novatoans object is that which brings planes over Little Mountain, a 600-foot hill west of Novato, and over a residential area.

their approach" from the northwest was used. The Air Force made the change, according to Hamilton spokesmen, because the old approach took aircraft dangerously close to Mount Burdell, which rises 1,600 feet.

Mrs. John Machado of 1424 Duwee Street, Novato, who is spearheading a fight to have the former flight pattern restored, contends that no one objected to it until after building started in Bel Marin Keys—directly under the northwest approach.

Most of the time, Hamilton planes used a southerly approach, but in recent weeks they have been using the "bad weather" pattern.

It was also stated in the letter that one plane was only 600 feet from the ground while Major Jones stated 1000 feet. But the lady insisted 800 was more exact. They must have an unusually long "measuring stick" on Duwamish Court.

The world situation being what it is, rather than complain about the noise, etc., their "our defender" makes, would it not be better to be grateful that he is here? He has a seri-

ously, suddenly, thankless job to do, and I for one say "By your grace, day or night, and I shall thank God that you are a friend instead of a foe."

## Flight Pattern Hearing Asked

A public hearing on the change in the Hamilton Air Force Base flight pattern was requested of the Air Force last night by the Nevada City Council.

The formal request was voted after four members of the audience asked that such a hearing be held.

Mrs. Jean Morrison of 2024 Dewey Street said she had tried to attend a briefing last Thursday at the air base, but was denied admittance by the authorities there.

She also reported she had brought complaints about the change in the flight pattern to the attention of Rep. Donald H. Cisneros and the Federal Aviation Agency.

"I disagree with the policy and procedures of the Air Force," said C. P. Hansen of 1410 Cambridge Street.

Mrs. Joseph D. Mouch of 5 Davis Court presented the council a petition with 17 signatures protesting the change in the approach pattern, which brings planes down to 5,000 feet over

the residential area of Novato. The Air Force had proposed a change from the south approach to one over Novato for their bad weather approach when winds blow from the south. This was approved June 16 by the FAA, and practice flights have been made ever since that time. As a result of residents' protests, the briefing for city officials and a few others was held last Tuesday.

J. Wayne Wenzel assured the group that Col. Charles D. Chitty, commander of the 78th Fighter Wing, had promised another briefing if the residents of the area wanted it.

The council then formally asked for such a meeting to be held at a time and place in which the public could attend, with advance notices given in the press.

## OFFICIALS REPLY ON TRAFFIC WOES

Raphael Villagers Win Some, Lose Some  
In Huddle With City, County, Base Aides

Some of the demands made by residents of Raphael Village for traffic control will be met and some will not.

This was the conclusion yesterday at a meeting at Hamilton Air Force Base of traffic control officers from Novato, the air base and the California Highway Patrol.

Residents of Raphael Village, which is Air Force housing west of Highway 101, drew up a list of complaints on Aug. 22 which they presented to Col. Ralph M. Wanderer Jr., base commander. Wanderer said the list will be submitted to the Novato city council.

The residents asked that the speed limit on Raphael Village streets be cut from 25 miles to 15 miles per hour. Novato Police Chief Robert Di Grazia said 25 miles per hour was the lowest speed limit allowed by state law.

To a request for marking speed limit signs and crosswalks, Di Grazia and Wanderer reported the signs are there both on the pavement and signs beside the street. Crosswalk markings are faint, however, but Di Grazia said a street painting crew should have them repainted within a month.

The residents were turned down on their requests to make Ignacio Boulevard a one-way street past the Marin Golf and Country Club Estates, and for a traffic light at the intersection of San Jose Boulevard and Entrada Drive and a blinking light at Ignacio and San Jose boulevards.

Requests for street improvement and more adequate street lighting were referred to Lawrence A. Coleman, Novato director of public works. Coleman sent word to the meeting that the city council had budgeted \$30,000 for reconstruction of Ignacio Boulevard, but "I do not know how much if any of the work will be done to the street this year."

The residents had also requested closer police patrol. Di Grazia said his radar patrol unit had spent three weeks in Raphael Village and issued only 20 citations.

"This is fewer than we would issue in one eight-hour shift if we had the unit on South Novato Boulevard or some other hazardous traffic spot," he said.

Signers of the petitions had also complained that school buses speeded. Supt. Ralph Giannelli of San Jose School District said he was not aware of any speeding by bus drivers but would warn the district's drivers.

Colonel Wanderer said that traffic of San Jose Boulevard will increase when the Sunset Parkway connection is completed later this fall.

He praised cooperation received from Novato police, Marin County sheriff's deputies and California Highway Patrol.

## Boom Breaks Windows In South Marin

A discriminating sonic boom, which broke windows in Corte Madera and Mill Valley but wasn't even heard north of Larkspur, shook Southern Marin County at 9:36 a.m. today.

Police departments from Larkspur south were flooded with telephone calls from residents who described the boom as a "sharp explosion" or "a long rumbling noise."

Hamilton Air Force Base officials said the boom was caused by two F-101 Voodoo jet interceptors that were flying out to the Pacific Ocean on a routine training flight.

Because of the reported intensity of the boom, base officials said the two jets must have "gone supersonic" at the same time.

Virginia M. Matheny of 100 Grove Avenue, Corte Madera, reported to police that the front window in her home was cracked by the boom. She said she would file a claim for damages with the Air Force.

In Mill Valley, Frances Haslam of 352 West Blithdale Avenue told police that a glass window pane in her door was blown

out at the time of the boom

Another Mill Valley resident, Mrs. P. W. Kearney of 655 Summit Avenue, complained that the sonic booms should be stopped.

"I think the appropriate public official should, in the name of the citizens of the county, take suitable action to eliminate this from our community. The more people that raise the question, the better," she said.

In San Francisco, the boom was first thought to be an explosion in the vicinity of Green and Buchanan streets.

The boom was also felt in Richmond.

Hamilton Air Force Base officials, in the face of possible filing of claims, said such claims are referred to its legal division which makes a careful investigation of each one.

## F101's Whip Up Sonic S. F. Boom

Two Air Force F-101 Voodoo Fighter jets "scrambled" in a practice exercise at Hamilton Field about 9:20 a.m. yesterday and 10 minutes later a sonic boom rocked San Francisco, the Peninsula, much of Marin County and some of the East Bay.

The airplanes, Hamilton Field said, were answering a practice alert.

In San Francisco residents who flooded communication switchboards with inquiries for some reason thought the boom was an explosion in the vicinity of Green and Buchanan Sts.

Only a few windows were broken, but none in that area. Mill Valley, Sausalito, Belvedere, San Quentin and Richmond were shaken. At the prison, officials said they thought a quarry blast had been set off.

## 'Flying Sub' Eludes Radar At Hamilton

Three men who saw it said it looked like a flying submarine. Others reported it was a glowing, cigar-shaped object. One man said it was a sphere.

But whatever it was, radar at Hamilton Air Force Base failed to detect it.

Base officials today reported call inquiring about a large glowing object seen flying through the sky about dawn. But though it was reported all the way from Redwood City to Eureka, Hamilton's huge radar installation — which scans the skies for enemy aircraft or missiles — didn't detect it at all.

United Press International reported three patrolmen on their way to work in Alameda saw the object and reported it looked "like a flying submarine."

There were other reports from throughout the Bay Area and as far north as Eureka, UPI said.

San Rafael police saw it. They thought it might have been a jet plane, its appearance altered by the glow and smoke from Sonoma County forest and brush fires that filled the air.

Hamilton officials said they received only two calls about it, one from a San Francisco radio station and one from E. Handschum of Cloverdale, Sonoma County — although a Sausalito woman told the Independent-Journal she called Hamilton shortly after seeing the object at 6:15 a.m.

Everyone but Handschum described it as elongated or cigar-shaped, but Handschum was quoted as relating it was "a sphere in the sky that looked like the sun," with smoke billowing around the sphere.

Whatever it was, it traveled rapidly through the sky, observers agreed. "I said it eluded the Hamilton radar."

## Clean-Up Set At Papermill Creek

Papermill Creek, the most important stream drainage in Marin County, is due for a face lifting Saturday.

Led by the Marin Rod and Gun Club, a massive clean-up effort will be waged along the creek from Woodacre to Tomaloma. Among those persons to help stamp out litter are the Hamilton Air Force Conservation Committee, California Department of Fish and Game personnel, rangers from Taylor State Park, Woodacre Improvement Assn., San Geronimo Valley Assn., and the Marin County Fire Department.

The Marin Rod and Gun Club has adopted as its 1964 conservation project the "improvement and protection of the fisheries and aesthetic and recreational potential of Papermill Creek."

Barney DeBisschop, chairman of the rod and gun club project committee, declared, "This stream is one of the most beautiful portions of Marin County. From its sources in the White's Hill area to tidewater section of Tomales Bay, this stream could be developed into an outstanding fishing resource."

"Since Indian times the White House Pool area of Papermill Creek, which extends from Highway 1 just south of Point Reyes Station, downstream through the tidewater section to the head of Tomales Bay, has been and is the most important single steel head and salmon fishing area in the entire county of Marin.

Members of the Marin Rod and Gun Club, volunteers from the Hamilton Conservation Committee and the Base Explorer Scout unit, residents along the streamside will join together to remove debris and rubble from the creekbed. They will have the use of four dump trucks loaned by the Air Force at Hamilton Air Force Base.

The volunteers from HAFB, led by Capt. Lloyd Vidal of the conservation committee and Col. Ralph Wanderer, base commander, members of the ranger staff at Taylor State Park, directed by Neil Power, Al Giddings, fish and game warden for Marin, and Marin Rod and Gun Club Conservation Committee members, led by Al Ferrari, will meet at the Marin County fire station in Woodacre Saturday at 9 a.m.

The group will divide into several work units and work its way from Woodacre to Tomaloma. A two-way radio communications center will be established at the Woodacre headquarters of the Marin County firemen and all work parties will carry walkie-talkies.

"With the clean-up of the creek, the proposed installation of a splashboard on Peters Dam to insure the impoundment of sufficient additional waters to permit continuous release throughout the summer, and consideration by the California Department of Fish and Game for planting of fish resources, Papermill Creek could become an outstanding recreational area in Marin County," said DeBisschop.

## Marvelous Marin



(First in a series of eight articles written to introduce Hamilton personnel to "Marvelous Marin.")

Hamilton AFB has a reputation throughout the Air Force as one of its most beautiful bases. To the newcomer, one of the most prominent features of the base is the Spanish Colonial architecture of the older, permanent buildings. The Spanish Colonial architecture and the Spanish names of many of its streets link Hamilton closely to one of the most colorful periods in the history of Marin County, the years during which California was under the flags of Spain and later Mexico.

### INDIAN LAND

Marin County has the longest recorded history in the western part of the United States. This land belonged exclusively to the redskins until Francis Drake landed his ship, the "Golden Hinde," on the sandy beach of the bay of northwestern Marin County on June 17, 1579. Drake was searching for the "Northwest Passage," but because of the extreme cold, had to turn south again. Along the Marin shore, he sailed into the harbor that now bears his name. Here he landed and placed a brass plate, claiming the land for Queen Elizabeth I. The Spanish began their exploration of California soon afterward, and it became a part of Spain's domain.

On Dec. 14, 1817, Mission

Gold was found in California in 1848, and the famous Gold Rush of the 1850's brought hundreds of Americans to the far west, much to the resentment of the Indians and Mexican dons. The vast growth of California's population resulted in her being admitted as a state in 1850. Marin was one of the original counties.

As the Americans moved in, the carefree life of the Mexican land holders came to an end. Gradually, the great ranchos were sold in small parcels, and settlements sprung up first along water routes and later along railroad lines. At the turn of the century, as rail and ferry service improved, commuters discovered Marin County. Many San Franciscans who lost their homes in the 1906 earthquake and fire rebuilt in Marin. Every weekend, thousands of picnickers flocked to Marin to enjoy its scenic beaches and forests. Construction of the Golden Gate Bridge in the 1930's opened Marin County to additional thousands of commuters, and the county continued to grow by leaps and bounds.

Marin County of today combines urban and suburban developments with extensive rural and recreational areas. It is one of the least populated but one of the most beautiful

## Military Aviation 1907 - 64

If you were traveling to Los Angeles in the winter of 1932, you might have been advised to stay away from March Field, near Riverside. Rubberneckers had a good chance of being hit on the head with a crate of eggs or a bag of flour; and all because of the Indians.

The winter of 1932 was a hard one in the western United States. The cold weather brought snow and more snow. Great blizzards moved across New Mexico, Northern Arizona, Southern Utah and Southwestern Colorado. Roads were covered and blocked. Nothing could move on the ground. All of that region was a desolate sheet of white.

The area where the blizzards had dumped tons of snow contained many Indians, either settled there by treaty or on their natural tribal reservations. These Indians were slowly starving to death. The severity of the weather and the impassable condition of the roads had them trapped without sufficient food to last out the long days until the spring thaw. An appeal was made to the Army Air Corps. The problem of helping the Indians was given to Gen. Henry "Hap" Arnold. The 11th Bombardment Sq. was picked to do the job.

The following days brought an unusual sight to March Field. Two-wing Condor bombers slowly wheeled over the air field dropping, not bombs but parachutes of food. As each load settled to the ground, airmen uncrated the food and studied the packing arrangements, seeing what had

Mission San Rafael Arcangel was the 20th of the 21 missions established in California by the Order of Franciscans of the Roman Catholic Church. The site was chosen because of the mildness of the climate and fertility of the soil.

California, and Marin County, fell under the rule of Mexico when Mexico received her independence from Spain in 1835. The dons lived in stately adobe haciendas and raised fine horses and large herds of cattle. Mexico took land away from the California missions causing the friars to flee for their lives and the Indians to be banished. Mexico ruled California, for some 11 years, until United States occupation began in 1846.

and spilled and what had stayed together. The aviators were not unduly concerned about flying over the vast reaches of white. They were prepared for that. Many hours of flying missions had equipped them to fly over most any type terrain. What they were not prepared for was the strange bombs they were to carry. The food had to be packed so as not to break up on hitting the ground. Eggs, raw meat, sugar, salt potatoes and flour is not appetizing when well mixed with splinters of wood. The standard parachutes were discarded. They did not slow the packages sufficiently to prevent breakage. Packing methods were experimented with, changed and changed again. Finally the right combination was found. A dozen eggs could be dropped without breaking one.

The fun was over. The mission began in earnest. The crew members suited up in heavy flying suits, sweating in the hot California sun. The Condors were loaded with their odd "bombs" and the motors brought to life. The 11th Bombardment Sq. took off into the sun.

Several airports were used as temporary bases for their life saving mission. Using the Transcontinental and Western Air routes as a guide, the planes were scattered from Kingman, Ariz. at the edge of the Mojave desert to Amarillo in the Texas Panhandle. Local Indian agents who knew the country well directed the bombers to isolated Indian villages. The bombing run went on for several weeks.

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## A Look At Communism

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

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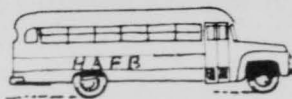

## Student Arrives From France

What's in a dream? An ocean voyage? A trip to a strange land?

Or maybe you'd just like to do something completely different, say for one whole year!

Doesn't happen, you say? Well it did! And there's living proof of such an experience in the person of 18-year-old Brigitte Hedel, 106-pound lass from the colorful city of Orleans, France.

The young, blue-eyed French miss is the fourth American Field Service student to attend the Terra Linda High School in Marin County, Calif., under the International Student Exchange Program.

She is in the U.S. as the "adopted" daughter of Col. and Mrs. Ralph M. Wanderer Jr.

Although her residency on an American air base is of particular note, Brigitte is believed to be the first foreign student under the Exchange Program to live in the home of a base commander.

How did it all come about? Well, Brigitte's story began like most "fairy tale" adventures. She and a twin sister, Anne—now studying in Paris, were born in the little town of Lille, in northern France. At age 14, her father, an inspector in the local post office, was transferred to Orleans, about 60 miles from Paris.

"My mother teaches school in Orleans," she said. "She also serves as a bi-lingual exchange teacher with the American school at nearby Chateauroux AB."

Brigitte's study of the lang-

uage, and a later meeting with Americans who visited her city's public swimming pools, helped foster her dreams of coming to the United States.

"I used to stroll along the Loire (river), she smiled, "imagining myself on a big ocean liner going to the states."

But little did Brigitte know that her dreams were soon to become a reality.

In October of last year the young French student travelled to Paris to make application with the American Field Service Committee on the off-chance that she might be selected to journey to America as an Exchange Student.

"So many students apply, I just knew I would never be chosen," said the obviously happy Brigitte.

But thousands of miles away — as if the good fairy had waved a magic wand — 15-year-old Barbara Wanderer, daughter of Hamilton's base commander, happened upon a folder of the student exchange program while attending school at Terra Linda.

After getting the consent of her parents, she filled out applications expressing her desire to have a foreign student become her American "sister" for the 1964-65 school year.

Following interviews, here and abroad, both families were notified of the acceptance of their applications.

"I'll never forget that moment as long as I live," said Brigitte when notified by mail of her selection. "I was so excited, I said over and over; 'I'm going to America! I'm going to America!'"

She also got her visit to a strange land — having arrived in the U.S. Aug. 15 aboard the American-Holland "Seven Seas" liner.

And a year of doing things completely different?

Well, since arriving in Oakland Aug. 19, the French student has eaten her first hamburger, drunk her first milk shake and visited her first American school.

"Everything is different, and so beautiful," she mused excitedly. "Just like I've always imagined it."

The Wanderers are just as excited about having a foreign visitor in their home as Brigitte is about the U.S.

"She is a very intelligent girl," said Mrs. Wanderer. "I'm sure that we'll gain as much from her experience as she does."

Aside from Barbara, the Wanderers have three other

children, Kenneth, 19; Ralph, 18; and Christina, 6.

Their newly acquired "daughter" sums up her feeling for the Hamilton family with the same expressions she noted on the application to the AFS committee last October:

"To live for a year in an American town, as an American girl, an American pupil, in an American family — how wonderful!"

To Brigitte Hedel her dream came true.

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## Minnesota Air Guardsmen Take Ricks Trophy Meet

TYNDALL AFB, Fla. — (NNS) — The 1964 Air National Guard's Ricks Trophy weapons meet went down to the wire before the sharp shooting of Maj. Albert J. Amatuzio on the final mission pushed his Minnesota Air Guard team into first place and the championship.

The 119th Fighter Group team from Fargo, N.D., led going into the final hour of the meet Aug. 27, but saw the lead tumble when Minnesota's 148th Fighter Group from Duluth fired.

The meet-winning shot also won the Ricks Trophy for Major Amatuzio and his radar observer, Capt. John Aretta. While the championship of the competition is decided by the overall team effort, the trophy annually goes to the team member or aircraft crew which amasses the highest number of points.

Major Amatuzio and Captain Aretta had a total score of 3,050. In second place for aircrew scoring were Captains Richard Hermanson and Bruce Kasson of the North Dakota team with 2,900 points.

Flying the second aircraft for the 148th were Captains John Skomars and Johan Petterson, who posted 2,700 points. The remaining points came from ground support people who tallied 1,610 in the weapons-loading phase of the meet.

Other aircrew members of the winning team were Captains Charles Quellette and Kenneth Leland. On the ground crew were Maj. Jesse Wheaton, Capt. George Wise, MSgt. William Emery, MSgt. Richard Robinson, MSgt. John Thro, CMSgt. George Anderson, TSgt. Donald Magdzas, TSgt. Irvin Tverberg, SMSgt. Ronald Orme, MSgt. James Maunu, MSgt. Billy Winselman, TSgt. John Stephan, and SSgt. Bernard Wilson.

Nine Air Guard fighter groups entered F-89J fighter interceptor teams in the meet, held under auspices of USAF Air Defense Command and designed to test combat proficiency. They are part of ADC's contribution to the fighter forces of the North American Air Defense Command.

21 Air Guard units in 18 states stand runway air defense alert along with other fighter squadrons of ADC.

Final scores for the fighter groups in the competition, which included firing air-to-air rockets at jet drones, were:

148th, 7,360 points; 119th, 7,000; 101st from Bangor, Me., 5,960 points; 158th, Burlington, Vt., 5,900; 115th, Madison, Wis., 5,870; 132nd, Des Moines, Iowa, 5,820; 120th, Great Falls, Mont., 5,170; 142nd, Portland, Ore., 5,120; and 141st, Spokane, Wash., 4,780.

The trophy, named for Maj. Earl T. Ricks, former chief of the National Guard Bureau's Air Force Division, is contributed by the Air Force Association and will be presented at its annual convention, Sept. 9-12.

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**Tour Change**

## Difficult Later

Hamilton personnel overseas-bound who choose to serve an unaccompanied tour have little chance of later getting their dependents authorized to join them.

A recent all major air command message tells personnel officers to stress this fact in counseling to minimize dissatisfaction and complaints resulting from family separations.

It points out that a change in dependent status will be allowed only on the determination by Hq. USAF that it would be in the best interest of the Service. Each request for change must be fully documented and none but exceptional cases will be ruled to be in the best interest of the Service, the message says.

Men entitled to transportation of dependents and household goods at government expense must elect prior to shipment to serve either "with command-sponsored dependents" or "all others" tours. This applies to both reassignments from the continental United States to overseas and between overseas bases.

Requests to change a tour election will be judged on two main points — factors affecting mission performance and individual hardship.

Critical manning requirements, necessity for maintaining position continuity, special training requirements, shortage of supervisors and projected manning requirements are mission factors which will be considered.

Requests based on hardship must meet the general criteria for humanitarian reassignment described in AFM 35-11 and AFM 39-11.

The Air Force Aid Society is not an insurance organization, but it does help in times of need when someone dies.

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## Army Career Of Gen. Lolli Draws Honor

Army Maj. Gen. Andrew R. Lolli, commander of the 28th North American Air Defense Command Region, has been picked as the American of Italian origin who has contributed the most to the military life of the nation.

The honor was bestowed at a national convention of the Order of Italian Sons and Daughters of America in Pittsburgh, Pa.

General Lolli began his military career as an enlisted man in the New Jersey National Guard in 1935 and received his commission that same year.

Before assuming command of the 28th NORAD Region, he commanded the XV U.S. Army Corps at the Presidio of San Francisco and the XX Corps at Ft. Hayes, Ohio.

Earlier, as deputy chief of staff for Plans and Operations at ARADCOM headquarters in Colorado Springs, he conceived and developed the short notice annual practice system. This is the most practical means, short of actual combat, to test the state of readiness of Army air defense missile units, and for originating the system, the general received the Legion of Merit.

In his present capacity as commander of the 28th NORAD Region, General Lolli directs the joint-service air defense operations of the Army, Navy and Air Force in 10 western states. He is responsible for the air defense of approximately 700,000 square miles and 20 million people.

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## You Belt Your Life

Lt. Col. William L. Ward, new 28th Air Division Chief of Safety, included the following information about vehicle seat belts in a recent accident prevention report.

"Seat Belts — Fancy versus Fact"

Fancy: I use a belt on high-speed roads. But it's a nuisance just driving around town.

Fact: Half of all injury-producing accidents occur at impact speeds of 40 mph or less.

Fancy: The pesky things always need adjustment for different people and clothing.

Fact: Official design standards include ease of adjustment. There are many inadequate belts on the market. Check the belts you buy for convenience.

Fancy: Some people are thrown clear in a crash and walk away with hardly a

scratch. ("I'll never die.")  
Fact: The chances of survival in a crash are five times as great if you stay inside the car.

Fancy: I don't like the idea of being trapped by a belt if the car catches on fire or goes into water.

Fact: Fire occurs in only 0.2 per cent and submersion in only 0.3 per cent of all injury-producing accidents. Even then, the chance of escape is better if a belt keeps you from being knocked unconscious.

Fancy: I don't need to wear a seat belt just to drive to the store or office.

Fact: Half of all traffic deaths occur within 25 miles of home.

Fancy: I'm a careful driver — never had an accident. Good drivers don't need seat belts.

Fact: Four out of five drivers in accidents never had an accident before.

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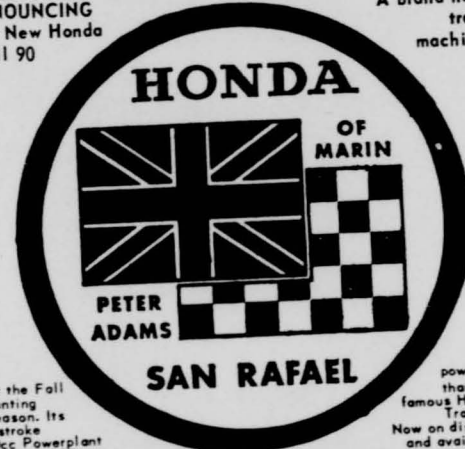
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## Civilian Wins 30 Year Award

## Military Aviation 1907 - 64

(Ninth in a series on Military Aviation by TSgt. Charles Wilkerson, 28th Air Division.)

The Wright brothers made the first powered flight in 1903 and the Army Air Service was activated as a division of the Signal Corps in 1907. Yet 41 years before the historic flight at Kitty Hawk and 45 years before the start of the Aeronautical Division, the United States Army had an air force.

Admittedly, it was a strange air force, consisting of two balloons, a chief aeronaut, and 51 men engaged in maintenance. The largest of the balloons was called the Intrepid and the chief aeronaut made his observations and reports from it. This forerunner of the RF-101 and U-2 of today was used by the Union Army. The chief aeronaut held no military rank. The pictures available show this first military aviator, Professor Lewis, dressed in a white smock. He and his men were used by General McClellan in the crossing of Chickahominy River and the advance toward Richmond, Va.

The Balloon Corps was a thing of wonder to both the Blue and the Gray. The balloons were inflated with hydrogen gas made by mixing sulphuric acid with scrap iron. In the tiny basket, Professor Lewis made his observations and reported the positions of the Confederate Army to General McClellan. Many times each day observations were made. From the balloons, Richmond, the long awaited prize, could be seen. Many



## Editorial Column

IS freedom in the Armed Forces any different from freedom in civilian life?

Many men in service are sure that it is. Some will go so far as to say there is little or no freedom in the Armed Forces; that a civilian gives up his freedoms when he puts on a uniform. But a few moments' reflection may convince us that this is not true.

Some of our basic freedoms remain entirely unaffected when we enter the Armed Forces: we retain the right to vote, to worship as we please, to own property and to read any newspaper we wish.

The freedoms that are affected by military service are those involving public expression of personal opinion, and these are not abolished but only restricted somewhat more than they are in civilian life.

Military life requires a more stringent limitation of these free-

questions were asked that only spies, at the risk of their lives and the loss of time necessary to slip in and out of Richmond, could answer. Now the balloon and Professor Lewis could supply military intelligence that was of equal value and do it much quicker.

As McClellan became used to this new means of information, more and more questions flowed. How many men were engaged in fortifying Richmond? Where were the troops moving and where were they? What fortifications had Richmond? The answers came and strategy was made. On one occasion a near disaster was averted. The Union Army was prepared to cross the Chickahominy when a last balloon ascent was made. Professor Lewis noted that Richmond seemed deserted, the camps of the Confederacy had been struck and the troops were moving out of Richmond, not away, but toward the river. This information was relayed to McClellan. An appraisal was made of the new situation, judgments were made, the lives of many men were saved. All of this because of a man in a white smock, with the imposing title of chief aeronaut and two small balloons. This is part of our heritage.

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doms than most civilian jobs, but that is only because the man in service carries a greater responsibility than most civilians. He is a member of the executive branch of the Government, under the President of the United States, and is directly responsible for the security of the Nation. His freedoms have to be restricted where the free exercise of them would interfere with that job.

Hence his freedoms are restricted to that extent. But they are not denied and they are not restricted any further than is necessary.

There is nothing to stop a serviceman from voting for or against the President in an election, or from arguing—in private conversation and apart from his military duties—about the rights and wrongs of his policies. These are his rights as a citizen and a voter, and since the exercise of them does not violate military discipline in any way, the Armed Forces have no desire to interfere with it.

The serviceman of today is carrying on a time-tested tradition. To the defense of American liberty he has, for the time he is in the service, pledged certain of the individual freedoms he enjoyed as a civilian. He can do so with full confidence that the pledge will be redeemed. (AFPS)

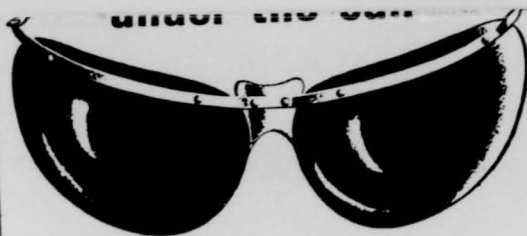

"Pogo" — the name her friends use — was one of the few Americans to see — and photograph — President John F. Kennedy on his now-famous trip to West Berlin. "It's hard to describe the thrill I felt — just being there with that terrific crowd cheering our President."

And the blue-eyed young lady also took shots behind "The Wall of Shame" in East Berlin.

She began her Air Force career by enlisting at Chicago, near her home in Evanston, in November 1952.

Quite in the nature of a young lady, she volunteered for flight attendant training with MATS "to see the world" — and after schooling, was booked on one trip to Germany. "That was enough — I decided my place was in a photo lab," she laughed in recalling the lone 1956 trip. Then came the return to Germany — and a small role in history — and her assignment to the photo lab at Headquarters, USAFE.

Because of the lab's importance, "Pogo" soon had her hands full with processing, mixing chemicals and duplicating slides by the thousands.

There were advantages, too. The long hours spent in the lab were somewhat alleviated by leaves spent in Madrid, Rome, Capri and other famed spots on the Continent. "I even got on TDY," said Viola — to Darmstadt — and watched the "STARS AND STRIPES" being put together for a few days."

On her trip to West Berlin, she rode a U. S. Army bus to the East sector and saw Communism in operation. "After the crowded streets of the free city, it was a weird feeling to see so few people on the streets beyond the Wall," Viola recalls.

She doesn't think she'll ever forget the sound of tourist's cameras clicking — "like a

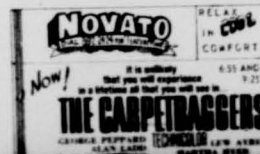

That was the ball game — except for prolonged cheers and applause for Schumann.

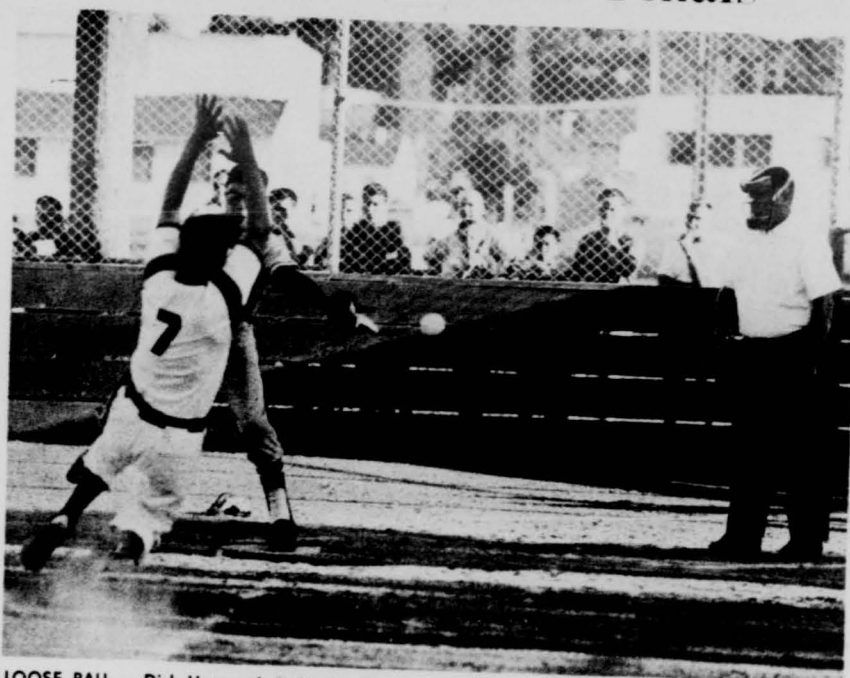

### Volleyballers Still Winning At World-Wide

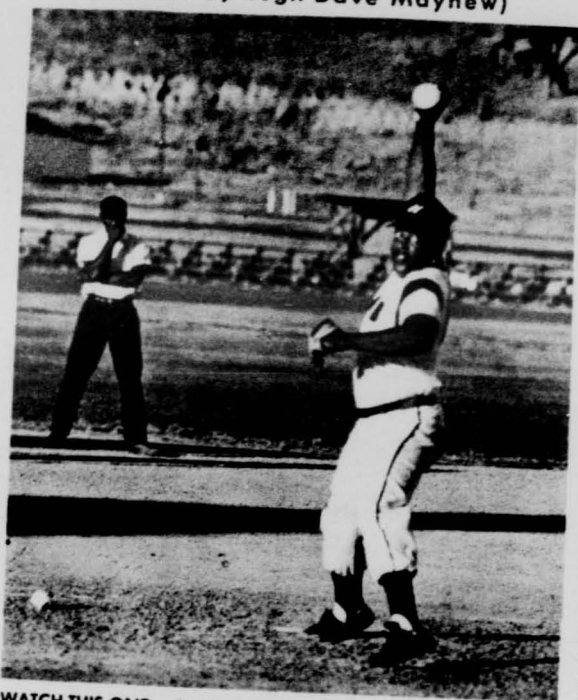

AFB, Mich. Later assignments saw Colonel Cellini attending the Armed Forces Staff College, Norfolk, Va.; Operations Officer for the 10th Air Force at Omaha, Neb., and overseeing the reactivation of the 52d All-Weather Fighter Gp.

In 1950, he transferred to Okinawa where he took command of the 51st Fighter Gp. and was transferred later with his unit to Korea. In Korea he accumulated more combat time, flying 87 missions and raised his total combat hours to 400.

Colonel Cellini returned to the states in November 1951 and was named Director of Manpower and Organization, Hq. ADC. He moved to Otis AFB, Mass., in 1953 to command the 4707th Air Defense Wg. While there, he activated the 551st Aircraft Early Warning Wg.

Peacetime operations took the colonel back to Europe as Director of Air Defense, Allied Air Force, in Southern Europe.

In 1959, the veteran Air Force officer became the Inspector General for the Air Defense Command. Three years later — until his recent assignment to Hamilton — he served as ADC's Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff for Materiel.

Married to the former Bernice M. Langlois of Chicago, Colonel Cellini and his wife have three children, Donna 23; Linda, 17, and Beverly, 9.

The test writers are senior airmen picked by their commands as specialists in their fields. They are working under test and review psychologists of the Air Force Personnel Laboratory at Lackland.

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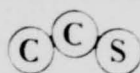

## COMMENTARY

### SECTION II

#### PART A

##### 1. Operations and Training:

a. There were no changes in the assigned mission of the 78th Fighter Wing during the period 1 October - 31 December 1964. Col Charles D. Chitty, Jr., 4340A, remained in command. Lt Col Frank E. Kirby, 10330A, former Wing Executive, was assigned to the ADC NCO Academy, Hamilton AFB, Calif. Effective 14 December, Lt Col Levon H. Philibosian, AO564032, became the new Wing Executive; assignment order PA-236 is attached under Tab 1.

b. Much of the Pacific Northwest was hit by severe storms and cold weather during December, and the 78th Ftr Wg and Hamilton AFB were called upon to support two major relief operations.

(1) Persistent, violent blizzards and sub-freezing temperatures in the far north left many domestic and wild animals stranded without food and shelter forcing ranchers and farmers in that area to ask the U. S. Government for help. Air Force reserve troop carrier units provided the bulk of this help by dropping tons of hay to thousands of snowbound cattle and sheep in southeast Montana; one of the participating units was the 349th Troop Carrier Wing (Reserve) of Hamilton AFB. 78th Ftr Wg support of "Operation Haylift" consisted of providing a photographer from the base photo

lab to accompany the 349th and the processing of 200-plus official photographs that were taken.

(2) Although Hamilton AFB received an abnormal amount of rain during the quarter, it was spared a deluge of the magnitude which turned a large portion of Northern California and nearly all of Oregon into a disaster area in the latter part of December. Heavy rains fell day after day washing away roads, destroying farms and businesses, and flooding hundreds of homes. The Air Force assisted other government and military agencies as well as civilian authorities in relief and rescue operations, and Hamilton AFB was the scene of several relief activities.

(3) On 24 December, the Wing Commander, Col Charles D. Chitty, Jr., assumed responsibility for handling requests for assistance received from the Joint Emergency Operations Center (JEOC), Sixth Army, Presidio of San Francisco, coordinating agency for rescue operations in the Northern California disaster area. The 78th Ftr Wg provided support as follows:

(a) On Christmas Eve, JEOC requested Hamilton to air-lift two generators, 300 pairs of hip boots, and 300 rubber ponchos to Arcata, California. The requested items were delivered via C-123 on 26 December.



(b) On Christmas Day, JEOC requested that a tanker with JP-4 fuel be positioned at Ukiah Municipal Airport (approximately 80 miles north of Hamilton AFB). Accordingly, two airmen and a JP-4 refueling unit from the POL section were dispatched to Ukiah to aid Army personnel in servicing rescue aircraft. Personnel were replaced weekly for as long as they were needed. During the rescue operation period, Hamilton provided 7,794 gallons of jet fuel, 4,913 gallons of Grade 115/145 Avgas, and 10 gallons of 7808 jet engine oil.

(c) On 26 December, the Wing Commander received a request from Fort Ord, Calif. (Army) for 500 Class "A" rations. Fort Ord sent a refrigerated truck to Hamilton, rations were on-loaded, and the truck was dispatched to Ukiah within five hours from the time of the request.

(d) On 27 December, the base was notified that the 84th Engineer Battalion would be moving from Fort Ord to Ukiah and that Hamilton was to support the unit (approximately 1200 personnel) with Category 1 (Rations) and Category 111 (POL) items. Elements passed through Hamilton during the day and were refueled. In addition, 20 drums of Avgas were loaded on to 84th vehicles, and hot meals were provided for 40 men.

(4) Reserve, Rescue, and Communications tenant units at Hamilton AFB were also involved in Northern California rescue operations. (See Atch 2)

c. As a result of the extended periods of inclement weather, the Wing had difficulty using flying time allocated to support aircraft during the quarter, and the number of UE sorties flown was down compared to previous quarters. T-33 aircraft were allocated 2,375 hours and flew 2,232; C-47 aircraft were allocated 788 hours and flew 595; U-3A aircraft were allocated 260 hours and flew 161. Hamilton AFB received a total of 15.08 inches of rain in October, November, and December as opposed to 9.0 inches normally received during this period.

d. Due to the threat of a rail strike, the 78th Ftr Wg was alerted on 19 November to implement Phase I of 78th Ftr Wg Operations Plan 13-64, "Sky Train." Necessary actions were taken, but the rail strike did not materialize due to the intervention of the President. On 29 December, the Wing Operations Plans Division incorporated Changes 1 and 2 published by ADC and the 28th Air Division into Change No. 1 to 78th Ftr Wg OPSPLAN 13-64. A copy of this change is attached under Tab 3. (A copy of 78th Ftr Wg OPSPLAN 13-64 is attached under Tab A to 78th Ftr Wg History for the period ending 30 June 1964.)

e. The 78th Ftr Wg and Hamilton AFB continued to provide support to TAC C-130s being deployed to the Pacific area and redeployed to the ZI.

f. The 78th Ftr Wg participated in seven flying exercises called by either the 25th Air Division or the Portland Air Defense Sector during the quarter for a total of 140 UE sorties. Aircraft movement records showed the following arrivals and departures cleared through Base Operations:

(NOTE: The difference in outbound and inbound totals was accounted for by passenger stops, diversions, and tactical flights which came in on DD 175 clearances and went out on tactical clearances.)

g. There were no aircraft or missile/nuclear accidents during the quarter. There was one fatal ground accident; on 28 November, a Hamilton AFB sergeant was killed when the automobile he was driving crashed into a light pole on the Bolling Drive off-ramp from Highway 101 near the entrance to the base.

h. During the period 23-24 November, the 78th Ftr Wg participated in Exercise Desk Top VII, called by Hq NORAD. The exercise began at 1350L, 23 Nov, and terminated at 1415L on 24 Nov. The first 1AF-V21 STATREP (Statistical Report) was submitted 40 minutes after Round House (Recall) was announced. Five 1AF-V21

STATREPS, one 2-AF-V21 OPSACT (Operational Activities Report), and one 5-AF-V21 HOT NEWS were forwarded. A problem of reporting the status of support aircraft to 28th Air Division was experienced late in the evening and night of the 23rd due to minimum manning of the 28th Air Division COC. Some delays were noted in having reports typed and properly classified due to the placement of unexperienced personnel in the Command Post Administrative Branch. It also became evident that the responsibility for making the various V-21 reports had not been established until the need for a report became apparent. On the whole, it was felt that Desk Top VII, the major exercise of the quarter, provided valuable training for newly assigned personnel and oldtimers alike.

i. The base Disaster Control Office participated in eighteen exercises called by the 25th Air Division, 28th Air Division, or Portland Air Defense Sector during the quarter. Exercises were both simulated and live. Two simulated Broken Arrow exercises were held during the reporting period.

j. Representatives from the majority of F-101-equipped squadrons in the western United States received training at Hamilton AFB on 12 and 13 October to comply with TCTO (Time Compliance Technical Order) 1F-101-1049 and TCTO 1F-101-1052. These technical orders required the installation of oxygen and survival package in the aircraft seat plus related, general airframe modifications.



k. Three representatives from the Operations Plans Division attended a meeting at the Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colorado, from 11 to 14 November; the meeting was a critique of Falcon '64 (Field Study of the Armed Forces) and a preplanning conference for Falcon '65.

1. The 329th Fighter Interceptor Sq, a 28th Air Division unit from George AFB, Calif., was presented the Hughes Trophy at a special ceremony held on the Hamilton AFB flight line on 9 October. Following a formal parade and review on the flight line, officers of the 329th were hosted at a dinner party at the Officers' Mess by Hamilton based officers. At the same time, another dinner party for NCOs was held at the NCO Open Mess.

2. Equipment:

a. F-101B, 580-289, was assigned to the 84th Fighter Interceptor Squadron in December. This brought the total number of UE aircraft assigned to 24 (including the two "F" models).

b. The problem of cracked and broken struts on F-101 aircraft, an Air Force-wide problem throughout 1964, was encountered by the 78th Ftr Wg during the last quarter of the calendar year. On 21 November the left strut broke off of an unloaded F-101 (#8265) while the aircraft was being towed from the Alert Hangar. Four days later, the left strut on F-101F, #6260, was found cracked during a routine

magnaglow test. Emergency URs (Unsatisfactory Reports) were submitted following each incident.

c. The problem of cracked J-57 engine cases in the F-101 experienced in the previous quarter continued to resolve itself slowly. At the end of the quarter, there were no UE aircraft not operationally ready, but neither was there a serviceable spare engine available on base.

d. Antenna harnesses installed during the Interceptor Improvement Program began failing in large numbers. Experience indicated that the harness should have been a 300-hour change item. A UR was submitted on the problem.

e. On 20 October, F-101 #6283 lost a drop tank on a routine night training sortie. It appeared that the right drop tank fell off the aircraft, causing damage to the right-hand engine oil lines and resulting in zero oil pressure, engine shutdown, and eventual engine seizure. Both right engine bay doors were damaged, and the aircraft's skin was nicked and scratched.

f. A one time inspection of the C-123 nose gear revealed five aircraft in the fleet with cracked rod ends. A like serviceable item was installed and the aircraft returned to service.

g. Parts for U-3A aircraft assigned to Hamilton AFB were extremely hard to obtain during the quarter resulting in a high NORS (Not Operationally Ready Supply) rate and contributing to the low U-3A flying time.

h. As a result of an ADC Equipment Review and Utilization Survey conducted in November, the number of sedans authorized the base motor pool was reduced from 24 to 20, and the number of station wagons authorized was increased from seven to ten.

3. Facilities:

a. Construction of the VASI (Visual Approach Slope Indicator) system, initiated in the previous quarter, was completed in December. However, it was not yet operational at the end of the quarter pending an FAA flight check.

b. Routine resealing of the aircraft parking ramp facilities was begun and was approximately 15% completed by the end of the quarter. Progress was hindered by adverse weather.

c. Installation of a REIL (Runway End Identifier Lights) system on the approach end of runway 12 was initiated.

d. Construction of a new POL Refueling Shop was started in October. Completion was scheduled for June 1965.

e. Design of a nine-hole golf course for Hamilton AFB was initiated. Design completion was scheduled for January 1965.

f. All construction work on the Ignacio Wye project on U. S. Highway 101, that portion of U.S. 101 which affords access to and egress from Hamilton AFB, was completed during the third week of December.

4. Assets and Finance:

a. As of 31 December, the total assets of Hamilton AFB were \$45,583,687, an increase of \$109,646 during the quarter.

b. Hamilton AFB Exchange sales were \$1,138,626.00, an increase of 13.22% over the same period of 1963.

c. Commissary sales for the quarter were \$1,295,300.00 as compared to \$1,341,079.00 for the same period of 1963. The decrease was accounted for by the transfer of the Two Rock Ranch commissary to the Army and the opening of a Quick Stop Shop at Hamilton by the Base Exchange.

d. The base Redistribution and Marketing Office received \$4,948.00 on sales of \$47,657.00 worth of surplus property. This represented a net return of 10.3% as compared to an average net return of 4.67% realized by 18 installations serviced by the Defense Surplus Sales Office, Oakland, Calif.

5. Personnel:

a. Col Charles D. Chitty, Jr., 78th Ftr Wg Commander, returned from Tyndall AFB, Florida after a two month F-101 aircraft transition course. He reassumed command of the Wing on 9 November. (Atch 4)

b. Lt Col Wilbur A. Tapscott, Commander of the 84th Ftr Intcp Sq, and Lt Col William R. V. Marriott, Commander, 78th USAF Hospital, were promoted to full colonel effective 15 November.



c. Major Teddy A. Dudek, AO1174562, replaced Lt Col Henry J. Remeis as Commander, 78th Field Maintenance Sq effective 31 October.

d. A roster of officers assigned to Hamilton AFB as of 31 December and a Morning Report are attached under Tab 5.

6. Organization: On 1 October, the 78th Armament and Electronics Maintenance Squadron assumed responsibility for the Conventional Ammunition Area and the Explosive Ordinance Disposal Element.

PART B

1. Community Relations:

a. Hamilton AFB enjoyed relatively good relations with its neighboring communities throughout the final quarter of calendar year 1964, and its biggest community relations problem, the northwest approach problem, had subsided by the end of the year.

b. Northwest Approach Problem - (Continued from 78th Ftr Wg History for the period ending 30 September 1964)

(1) At the close of the previous quarter, plans were being made by Hamilton AFB officials for a public briefing to explain the need for the new northwest approach to runway 12, which brought landing tactical aircraft over the heart of the city of Novato. As pointed out in the previous quarter's history, the new traffic pattern had stirred up a fair amount of public opposition.

(2) Early in October, Col Chitty, Wing Commander, received a formal request from Novato's City Administrator, J. Julian Baget, for the public briefing (Atch 6<sup>1</sup>). Col John W. Jacobs, acting Wing Commander, replied that the Wing would provide a briefing for all interested parties (Atch 6<sup>2</sup>), and details were worked out between Wing operations personnel, the 84th Ftr Intcp Sq commander, and the Director of Information. A briefing similar to that which had been given to civic officials in the previous quarter

was planned with modifications suggested by the Information Office (Atch 6<sup>3</sup>). Invitational letters were sent to local service clubs (Atch 6<sup>4</sup>), and a release was made to local papers announcing the time and place of the public briefing (Atch 6<sup>7</sup>). (The public briefing was originally scheduled for 15 October, but was rescheduled for 22 October at the request of Mr. Baget, City Administrator.)

(3) The briefing went well, and those who attended considered it to be a success as indicated by Atch 6<sup>5</sup>, Memo for Record, 23 Oct 64. Even Mrs. Machado appeared to have been placated as evidenced by Atch 6<sup>6</sup>, Memo for Record, 23 Oct 64. Atchs 6<sup>7</sup> and 6<sup>8</sup> are clippings from local newspapers concerning the briefing.

(4) With the exception of Mrs. Machado's call on 27 October (Atch 6<sup>6</sup>), Hamilton AFB heard no more from opponents of the new northwest approach for the remainder of the quarter. In mid-December, Mrs. Mook, Mrs. Machado, and several other Novatans drafted a somewhat incoherent summary, or evaluation as they called it, of all that had taken place in the northwest approach controversy and sent it to Congressman Donald H. Clausen. A copy of the letter was sent to the Novato Advance and printed in that paper's "Letters to the Editor" section (Atch 6<sup>9</sup>). Even if only for the time being, the northwest approach problem appeared to have been quieted.

(5) As mentioned in the previous quarter's history, several of those who opposed adoption of the new northwest approach pattern signed a petition, or letter, which was circulated in the Dawes Court area of Novato by Mrs. Joseph D. Mook.<sup>1</sup> Copies of the petition, which contained 17 signatures, were mailed to the Novato Advance, Hamilton AFB, and to the Honorable Donald H. Clausen, U.S. Representative from California's First Congressional District; a copy of the petition was also presented to the Novato City Council, in person, by Mrs. Mook on 22 September.<sup>2</sup> As a result of the petition and other complaints from his constituents, Congressman Clausen became interested in the northwest approach problem, and, while visiting Hamilton AFB for the Hughes Trophy Presentation Ceremonies in October (para 1, 1, p 7), he expressed a desire to be given an F-101 orientation flight utilizing the new approach pattern and indicated his intention to attend the public briefing that had been planned for 22 October.

NOTE: The petitions referred to on pages 17, 18, and 19 of the previous quarter's history were apparently all the same petition. The difference in the number of signatures mentioned in para 1a(5) and para 1a(10) is accounted for by the fact that in one place signatures of couples (husband and wife) were counted as two signatures and in another place counted as only one signature. The figure "38" (para 1a(5)) is completely in error due to the fact that several signatures were counted as couples that should have been counted as singles.



(6) Congressman Clausen was unable to attend the public briefing but was represented by Mr. Ray Paschke, his Santa Rosa Field Representative. At the conclusion of the briefing, Mr. Paschke indicated Congressman Clausen would fully back up the Air Force position.

(7) On 28 October, Congressman Clausen received a briefing on the northwest approach and an F-101 orientation flight. The flight included a practice intercept and two landings utilizing the northwest approach. Following his orientation flight, he lunched with members of Hamilton's chapter of the Air Force Sergeants Association per his request. He appeared well satisfied with his visit, made no statements for the press, nor any official pronouncements on the northwest approach but appeared to be convinced the approach pattern was necessary for effective and safe operations of the 84th Ftr Intcp Sq.

c. A portion of land adjacent to and south of Hamilton AFB, between the Capehart housing area and highway 101, was rezoned by the Novato City Council at a meeting on 27 October. The property was rezoned as R-4, Single Family Residential/Mobile Home District, to become effective 26 November. The request for rezoning was initiated by Mr. John Lyddon who, reportedly, planned to construct a 380-space trailer park for larger, expandable mobile

homes. Mr. Lyddon submitted a written request for a use permit to the Novato Planning Commission on 20 November. At the end of the quarter, no action had been taken by the Planning Commission on Mr. Lyddon's request.

d. Near the end of November, Hamilton AFB received a copy of a letter addressed to the Honorable Robert S. McNamara, Secretary of Defense, urging that Hamilton be included in a list of bases the Defense Department had announced it planned to close. (Atch 7<sup>1</sup>). A copy of the letter was also sent to the Novato Advance and published in that paper's "Letters to the Editor" section on 2 December (Atch 7<sup>2</sup>). The copies of the letter that were sent to Hamilton and to the Novato Advance were identical except for the signatures: the letter sent to Hamilton was signed "Harold Rogers"; the letter sent to the Novato Advance was signed "Don Anderson". One week after the first letter from "Don Anderson" appeared in the Novato Advance, another letter was published under that name extolling further benefits of closing Hamilton (Atch 7<sup>3</sup>). Having seen these two letters in the Novato Advance, Hamilton's Director of Information called the paper's publisher, Mr. George Barnwell, and together they concluded that either "Don Anderson" or "Harold Rogers" or both were fictitious names; a statement to that effect was published in the 16 December issue of the Novato Advance (Atch 6<sup>9</sup>).

At the end of the quarter, neither Hamilton AFB nor the Novato Advance had heard any more from either "Don Anderson" or "Harold Rogers," and any indication that the closing of Hamilton was eminent was dispelled by a statement made by Congressman Clausen and printed in the Novato Advance on 22 December (Atch 7<sup>4</sup>).

e. Hamilton AFB held its fourth annual Base/Community Christmas Concert on 13 December. Over 200 choir members from seven civilian and military choirs combined their talents with the 28th Air Division Band during the concert which was given in the North Recreation Hall. More than 600 people attended the concert.

f. For the sixth consecutive year, Hamilton-based units adopted Sonoma State Hospital, a nearby hospital for the mentally retarded, during the Christmas season. Parties were given in 11 of the hospital's wards for over 1,000 patients. In connection with the ward parties, one of Hamilton's units, the 501st Field Training Detachment, collected more than 2,000 used, repairable toys and distributed them to younger patients at the hospital.

g. On 5 November, fifty Hamilton NCOs hosted forty members of the Novato Chamber of Commerce at a dinner given in honor of the Chamber. Guest speaker for the evening was Mr. Thomas Cahill, San Francisco Chief of Police.

h. The 1964 United Bay Area Crusade fund drive ended in October. Hamilton AFB personnel contributed a total of \$29,891.35.

2. Awards and Decorations:

a. Hamilton AFB took first place in the annual ADC Field Day competition. In recognition of its outstanding Field Day program, held in September of the previous quarter, the base was awarded a check for \$250.00 by ADC.

b. For the second consecutive year, Hamilton AFB won the Department of the Air Force's Achievement Award for 100% participation in the Civilian Suggestion Program. The 100% participation rate was the highest in the Air Force; next highest participation rate in the competition was 75%.

c. The 78th Ftr Wg received the 28th Air Division Military Suggestion Award for the last quarter of CY64. (The Wing also won the award in the three previous quarters of CY64.)

d. The 78th Ftr Wg was notified in November that it had won second place in the annual ADC Base Fuels Award competition.

e. Hamilton AFB Food Service was selected to represent the 28th Air Division in the 1964 Hennessey Trophy, Class II, competition. It was selected first runner-up in ADC.

f. The 78th Transportation Sq received its fourteenth consecutive quarterly 78th Ftr Wg Outstanding Achievement Award for 100% effectiveness in On-the-Job-Training.

1. SITUATION:

a. Transportation is essential for the movement of materials within the Continental United States. In the event there is a partial or total suspension of rail, truck, or airline service, other means of transportation available to the military departments must be ready to meet the domestic transportation crisis. Upon request of the Department of Defense, the Joint Chiefs of Staff have assigned the responsibility for planning for the utilization of military air transport to the Department of the Air Force. To discharge this responsibility, the Chief of Staff, USAF, has designated Commander, MATS as Task Force Commander. This plan supports the 28th Air Division and MATS plans for the peacetime mobilization and employment of all forces made available for this task. Traffic guidance contained herein applies to all military claimants for airlift during a domestic transportation crisis.

b. Upon implementation of this plan, the 20th Provisional Squadron will be established at Hamilton AFB by the 4650th Combat Support Group, Det 2. This squadron will consist of 11 C-123's furnished by the 4650th Combat Support Group Det 2; three C-47's to be allocated from the 78th Fighter Wing resources, and two C-47's from the Los Angeles Defense Sector through Commander, 414th Fighter Group, all with the appropriate number of pilots, crew chiefs, crew and maintenance personnel from each supporting unit. The 20th Provisional Squadron at Hamilton AFB, California will be under operational control of 4650th Combat Support Squadron, Richards-Gebaur AFB, Mo.



c. Unfriendly Forces: All forces which have a capability of causing partial or total stoppage of domestic rail, truck, or airline transportation systems by overt or covert means.

d. Friendly Forces: Major Commands of the USAF and forces of the US Army and US Navy will support MATS in the implementation of this airlift as necessary.

e. Assumptions:

(1) A partial or total suspension of rail, truck, or airline service may exist in the United States, necessitating the utilization of available military airlift to meet the emergency.

(2) The President, by Executive Order, will designate the governmental agency which will have over-all directional authority and responsibility over the various transportation media available to meet the emergency.

(3) This airlift will have precedence over normal peace-time operations and all non-essential flying will be stopped.

2. MISSION: To support the Commander MATS, in the mobilization and utilization of military aircraft to provide airlift in a domestic transportation crisis.

3. TASKS:

a. Deputy Commander/Operations is responsible for allocating three C-47 aircraft with two aircrews each, to perform duty with the 20th Provisional Transport Squadron.

b. Chief, Operation Plans is responsible for, as required by changing conditions or amendments from higher headquarters, advising those responsible for movement planning, of changes in concept.

c. Chief of Safety is responsible for insuring basic policy of air safety in all operations will be strictly adhered to.

d. Chief of Maintenance is responsible for:

(1) Providing normal maintenance and servicing equipment. If such equipment is not available at Hamilton, the base from which aircraft were transferred will furnish a proportionate share of required equipment.

(a) Funding for expenses for TDY of aircrews, POL, and local purchases of supplies and equipment will be the responsibility of the activity to which the personnel and aircraft belong. Funding for other logistic support will be the responsibility of the installation and activity where the aircraft are located for this operation. POL and logistic support required from other services will be accomplished on a cross-servicing basis.

(b) Appropriated funds already available may be used without regard to legal requirements where preservation of life or property are immediately involved.

(c) In cases where adequate appropriated funds are not locally available and where life and property would be jeopardized or where the emergency demands immediate execution of a plan, it may be assumed that commitments may be made for the use of appropriated monies even though no immediate formal action can be taken to obtain such appropriated funds.

(d) Where actions are taken under paragraphs (b) and (c) above, persons authorizing such actions will be prepared to submit to higher headquarters, as soon as circumstances permit, adequate justification data for the actions taken during the emergency.

j. Commander, Hq Sq Section, 78th Combat Support Group is responsible for providing necessary details for loading and unloading aircraft as required. Command assistance should be requested if details become excessive.

k. Implementation Instructions: Upon receipt of instructions from Headquarters, 28th Air Division (SAGE), 78 Fighter Wing Deputy Commander/Operations will notify task organizations to implement this plan. Normal implementation will be phased into conditions defined below to meet airlift requirements.

(1) CONDITION I: A warning order is issued by Headquarters 28th Air Division alerting 78th Fighter Wing of possible implementation of this plan. Applicable task organizations will:

- (a) Report resources which can be made available within 24 hours.
- (b) Report additional resources which can be made available within 5 days.
- (c) Expedite maintenance on all reported aircraft.
- (d) Terminate all non-essential flying of reported aircraft.
- (e) Maintain a capability to deploy 50% of reported resources within 24 hours after receipt of execution of message.

(2) CONDITION II: Limited implementation of the plan is directed by Hq ADC as requirements dictate.

(a) Commander ADC directs activation of specified provisional squadrons.

(b) Provisional Squadrons and assigned resources will be established as directed.

(c) Commander ADC may direct that manning of provisional transport squadrons be increased from a 1:1 to a 2:1 aircrew ratio in conformance with airlift requirements.

(3) CONDITION III: The plan will be fully implemented with the exception of Reserve and ANG forces procedure.

(a) Commander ADC directs activation of all provisional squadrons.

(4) CONDITION IV: The plan will be fully implemented to include Reserve and ANG forces. The specified Reserve and ANG Provisional Squadrons will be activated.

1. GENERAL:

(1) All task organizations will be prepared to execute this plan on a reduced scale or in specific areas.

(2) All task organizations will prepare a supporting plan or modify as required existing plans covering participation in this airlift.

(3) If at any time participating commanders determine that they are unable to meet their commitments, the Commander, 28th Air Division (SAGE), through channels, will be notified immediately.

(4) Direct communication between Commander, 78th Fighter Wing and EASTAF, WESTAF, and Hq MATS, is authorized as necessary to support this plan.

(5) Parachutes will be provided by units to which aircraft are assigned IAW AFM 60-1.

(6) All Office of Information releases will be made through the Commander, 78th Fighter Wing in accordance with policies of higher authorities. In certain instances, authority for lower echelons to make releases may be granted by the Commander, 78th Fighter Wing.

4. COMMAND AND COMMUNICATIONS:

a. Command:

(1) The Commander, MATS, has been designated as Task Force Commander.



SUBJECT: Novato Approach

1. A citizens briefing was held in the 84th FIS briefing room at Hamilton at 2000 hours on 22 October. Twenty eight people from Novato and San Rafael attended in response to a general invitation carried by the Novato Advance and San Rafael Independent Journal.
2. Colonel Jacobs, Wing Commander, introduced Lt Col Tapscott, Commander of the 84th FIS, who presented the slide briefing. Also present were Col Miller, Wing Deputy for Ops and Lt Col Traverso, Director of Information.
3. Col Tapscott reminded the visitors of the vast changes which have taken place in the world and in Marin County. He compared these changes to comparable changes in the Air Force as applied to aircraft cost, performance, and airspace. The Novato approach is the direct result of such changes and is an indication of progress, he said. He explained the safety of the new approach, weather conditions, and landing rolls. He presented plan views of the various traffic patterns including the Novato approach, explained the professionalism and competence of Air Force personnel as "the most competent, mature force in history" and then opened the meeting to discussion.
4. Questions as to safety, noise, weather utilization, minimum altitudes, alternate possibilities, speeds, future aircraft, the missile-bomber threat, Bel Marin Keys, aircraft accidents and the relationship between speed and maneuverability were answered by Cols Jacobs, Miller and Tapscott. This last item -- with an explanation of wing ~~wing~~ loading by Col Miller provided the most telling argument. The visitors began to understand the need for the straight-in Novato approach.
5. More general discussion on misleading news coverage, possibilities of commercial airport, atomic destruction, and the need of the community for Hamilton's 12,000 people and 25 million dollar payroll ended the evening.
6. In attendance were, Mr. Ray Paschke, representing Congressman Clausen, John Baget, Novato City Administrator, Rich Nave and Ron Lipe, Novato Chamber of Commerce, Gene Fremboley, of the Marin County Airport Commission. Also present were Mrs. Mar...

# VOODOO FLYOVER CALLED A MUST

## Air Force Spokesman Says There's No Safer Way For F-101s in Bad Weather

Hamilton Air Force Base officials politely but firmly told Novato citizens last night that the base's powerful F-101 Voodoo jets sometimes must fly over the city — or they cannot be flown in bad weather.

"There is no safer way," stressed Col. John W. Jacobs, acting wing commander, to land the 23-ton interceptor during stormy weather, than to bring it in a long, straight glide south of Mount Burdell, roughly along South Novato Boulevard.

The Federal Aviation Agency has tested and approved the new pattern for safety, reported Lt. Col. W. A. Tapscott, commander of the 84th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron that flies the twin-jet aircraft.

Using Hamilton's runway from the opposite direction, approaching over the bay in bad weather, might mean planes missing the runway and falling in the populated area, the Hamilton officials warned.

Only the speedy Voodoos must use the over-the-city approach; other types of Hamilton-based aircraft can use the old patterns, they said.

Questioned why the pattern has been used only recently and why it is being flown in good weather, Colonel Tapscott explained that formerly, the Voodoos simply did not fly in bad weather. New navigation and landing control equipment now enables the planes to keep the defense system operational in all weather, he said.

Crews that man the F-101s at

Hamilton must get in some practice during good weather to allow safe use of the pattern when storms occur, he added. Hence, the landings which have brought complaints from Novato residents.

Only about 25 Novato area citizens attended last night's briefing in 84th Squadron headquarters.

Most questions were asked by

Mrs. John Machony of 5424 Davies Street. The former city planning commission member recalled that the Air Force had pleaded against the city granting permission for Bel-Marie Keys subdivision right outside the base, and declared, "I don't ever want to be accused of not being on the record" as investigating the problem with the F-101's new pattern.

Novato Chamber of Commerce President Richard Nave appeared to sum up the outcome of the meeting when he agreed that the city may "have to live with" the new pattern, and noted that if the Air Force should abandon the base, there would be great pressure to make it a heavily-used commercial airport—probably with noise problems.

## Need For New Jet Approach Told

The physical and flying characteristics of the F-101 intercept jet and advances in navigational equipment are among some of the reasons for the new Novato approach to Hamilton Air Force Base.

This was the gist of information supplied to residents at a briefing held last Thursday in the 84th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron briefing room at Hamilton. Some 28 residents, businessmen, and city officials were present.

The briefing was held at the request of the Novato city council which last month received a petition from a group of residents protesting against the low-flying planes over Novato. The planes were flying at a lower altitude over Novato than done normally because of a new FAA-approved bad weather jet approach to Hamilton.

### Col. Tapscott

In charge of the briefing last Thursday was Lt. Col. William A. Tapscott, commander of the 84th. He was assisted by C. William C. Miller and Col. John W. Jacobs Jr.

Col. Tapscott noted the weight of the F-101 — 25 tons — and the fact that because of its speed and weight it needs a larger turning radius. Thus past bad weather approaches to Hamilton have become unmaneuverable and dangerous for the new jet.

He compared the jet and previous base landing patterns with high-powered, radial, high-speed taxi. Base security is also

of Mt. Suddell instead of the way, so that it won't conflict with a FAA-approved climb corridor.

In answer to a question, the reason for Hamilton Air Force Base was explained as destroying armed enemy bombers from coming in.

The new bad weather approach — to be used when the wind is from the east — has allowed the F-101 jets to operate in all types of weather instead of being grounded and has allowed them to land at Hamilton instead of being waved away to other fields when proper conditions did not exist.

### Pilot Experience

The pilots of these jets average 31 years in age and have 22 years of flying and 100 hours of actual flying time, an audience was told.

In regard to inhibition of Novato, the new approach is the safest possible when the wind is from the east and the runway is west.

The approach will be used 10 per cent of the time. There will be some bad weather approach in good weather that pilots may be required to use with it.

The approach is used by interceptors. Other aircraft are not allowed to fly in the

We, the undersigned, request to go into the record with our letter of evaluation concerning the October 28, 1964 meeting held at Hamilton Field for the citizens of Novato on the subject of the bad weather flight approach recently adopted by the Air Force. We also request the following statements be taken under consideration since we feel this flight change should not be the only "safe" approach to the field.

1. We allow the flight pattern change only in view of National Defense. Should the military use of the field ever be curtailed, we request this flight pattern be abandoned.

2. An alternate plan be studied by the Air Force Engineering Corp. to keep the aircraft over the marshland as was the original design of the field. Safety is of prime concern for the pilot, as the Colonel stated the night of the meeting, but we are also concerned over the safety of the public.

3. Every safety factor be employed in connection with the public schools since the majority of the facilities are within the new flight pattern.

4. If the home owners should incur land depreciation due to the adoption of the new flight pattern, a review of the situation be granted at any time, perhaps the legislation to be changed to allow the grievance to be processed through the FAA and this agency be granted the right to negotiate on behalf of the citizens with the Air Force should their funds be depleted.

5. Keep the flight pattern...

be used only as so designed; bad weather approach and limited practice usage. At no time to be used as a "take off" pattern by flight control.

We feel the unforeseen new design of the jet aircraft has placed the planes over Novato and we are now in danger each day; however, good public relations between the citizens and Hamilton Field will be the key to insure harmony in the future.
