regarding the threat to the United States from Iraqi unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) we are concerned about the potential for WMD armed UAVs to be used against the US mainland. In addition, various sources 1.4(c) suggest that Saddam might use chemical or more likely biological (CBW) agent armed UAVs against coalition forces and our allies in the Persian Gulf theater.

2. We have no definite indications that Baghdad is planning to use WMD armed UAVs against the US mainland. However, in June an Iraqi UAV procurement agent ordered six UAV autopilots with six copies of commercially available route planning software and an embedded topographic database that provides coverage of the United States. This database and software-designed for use by motorists and aviators-could support programming of a UAV autopilot for operation in the United States. Although, the procurement agent was unsuccessful in this effort to acquire the software, the product can be easily purchased online from other vendors or from stores.

Although we cannot exclude the possibility that this purchase was directed by Baghdad, information acquired in October suggests that it may have been inadvertent on the part of the procurement agent. We are attempting to collect additional information regarding Iraq's intentions with this software.

3. Although we have no evidence that Iraq has forward deployed small UAVs to the vicinity of the US mainland, it is technically feasible that they could do so.

It is also technically possible that Iraq could launch small UAVs from ships against the US mainland, however we have no evidence that such a capability has been tested.
