SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SG1A

The [REDACTED] the target airfield, consists of about six main strips; three appear active and officially used while the other three are considered inactive, not normally used. They are numbered 1 through 6 inclusively. The active, legal airstrips appear to have at least, and mainly not more than two hangars. The inactive, unofficial strips are marked by the lack of buildings in the area and the presence of a perceptible growth of hay/reeds, swamp grass. A sketch of the six perceived strips at the airfield is at ENCLOSURE 1.

Aircraft involved in the airdrop activities of contraband involving illegal drugs, take off from both active and inactive airstrips; on occasion both strips are used simultaneously.

On 6 July 1990, at about 1600 hours, a target single-engine white aircraft with blue stripes and bearing the black alpha- numerics of " BN --16Z" will provide an air-drop at a location identified as 50 miles south southeast of Ponce, Puerto Rico. A fishing tug predominantly (dirty) white in color with a black bottom will take the contraband on board. Call sign use in this operation is (phonetically) "cat's eye." Other phonetics surfaced are La Brosa, and Carta San Gaoda. Krana/Nevada also surfaced phonetically but the meanings were not further

described.

A Second low-wing aircraft will effect an air-drop at an area location about 200 miles south of the border of Haiti and the Dominican Republic. The aircraft will start at a heading for Puerto Rico and follow a half moon path to get to its destination. The aircraft is also a white single-engine craft. Tail markings bear the alpha-numeric of "Z-20--." A 40 to 50-foot fishing trawler with a Port Au Prince registry will on-load the contraband. It has a wooden hull and is dull in appearance; its name is the French equivalent heart (coeur) and spring (printemps). One flotation device was observed; it was wrapped with silver and red tape. Both cargoes dealt with or the equivalent of cocaine/crack.

Emitters in the form of beepers are being used in the retrieval system.
