E. SESSION SUMMARY:

The current location of the vehicle and the target individual is northwest of the incident. The individual is not with the vehicle. This area/vicinity is famous for its rocky features. The individual is currently 5 miles west of the vehicle. The words WINSTON/WALTER and BRIDGETON/BRIGHTON/BUXTON are associated with these specific details. The individual is currently fishing.


The abandoned vehicle is parked next to a disused wooden structure (see diagram page i). The structure is partially hidden by dark green bushes, etc. The roof from the structure extends out from the building and partially overhangs the vehicle. A dirt two rut trail runs along side of the building. This trail winds through a heavily wooded area. The structure/vehicle sit .56 or .65 miles from a hardened road (see sketch map pages ii & iii). The phonetics RAN, RUN & RANDEL are associated with this hardened road.


The trail goes around the top of a small hill and crosses through an area of water or mud. The odd thing about this trail is the dark green vegetation growing on the hump between the ruts. There are at least two intersections on this trail within the vicinity of the structure.


The hardened road runs across the top of a large hill or knoll. A church sits near the top of this hill. An area of cement or stone wall lies parallel to the road and cuts into the terrain of the hill in front of the church. The structural portion and the tower section of the church are made of different materials i.e. wood vs. brick, brick vs. wood, stone vs. brick, etc.

This hardened road continues past the church and downslope where it crosses over a stream or moving water. A red, cylindrically shaped object sits near the road and is associated with the water. (Viewer's AOL: why have a water tank near a stream?) The words ASTON, ASHTON and ASHLEY are associated with the church, the hill and the moving water. This hardened road "feels" like it dead-ends a short distance past the dirt road turn off. There is also an area of exposed wooden support beams along this road. They feel like a railroad bridge or shoring-up timbers for a mine or earth. They occur along side of the road.

A large river is located a distance behind the church. There is a strong impression of water moving over a series of rocky shelves or levels here.

E. SESSION SUMMARY:

Two objects were perceived during this session (see diagrams). The first is a black metallic object. It is within a satchel-type bag which is filled with some sort of gray-brown granular substance. The object has screw-type ends which attach to another object. The terms EAGLE NEST, EAGLE CLAW and CLOSED CLAW are associated with this scene.

There is a list of five targets; the names are typewritten. These were perceived to be:

with plotting, plotting, plotting. He is frustrated; his frustration level is through the "roof". This is somehow associated with the Persian Gulf. I perceived a sense that he considers his actions "divinely directed", whatever that implies. He has a grudge and a personal score to settle.

As far as additional involved personnel, I perceived only the impression of "shadow" figures with an AOL of high-level government related individual(s).

He has several types of weapons; one of which has a long barrel with a large tube on top (reminiscent of a sniper rifle with scope). He has a bound group of cube-shaped objects (see diagram).





Jan. 28: Kansi's roommate, Zahed Mir, reports Kansi missing to Fairfax police. Mir tells police he last saw Kansi on the day of the shootings

Jan. 30: Kansi calls Mir to say that he will not be returning to their Reston apartment and that someone will come for his belongings.

Feb. 6: Mir again calls police and tells them he believes Kansi may have been involved in the shootings. Mir's was among about 2,500 tips police received during the investigation.

Feb. 8: Police search the Reston apartment. They find an AK-47-type rifle and several other weapons. A jacket and pants fitting witnesses' descriptions of what the gunman wore also are found. Shards of glass are on some of the clothes; car windows were shot out at the CIA.

Feb. 9: Authorities announce that ballistics tests show Kansi's AK-47 rifle is the weapon used in the shootings and that Kansi has been charged with capital murder.

Feb. 10: Manhunt spreads worldwide for Kansi.

Sources said yesterday that the fingerprints will be most useful if they are of sufficient quality to use in a computer screening process, if they are indeed those of the gunman and if the gunman has been arrested for a felony. The FBI has on its computer only the prints of people arrested for felonies. Millions of others exist in paper files, which must be searched by hand.

The CIA has planned a memorial service at its headquarters today for Lansing H. Bennett, 66, of Reston, a physician and intelligence analyst, and Frank Darling, 28, of Reston, who worked in covert operations. Security was especially tight again yesterday at all entrances to the complex, officials

Bennett and Darling were in their cars at a stoplight on Dolley Madison Boulevard (Route 123), preparing to turn into the CIA entrance, when the gunman suddenly emerged from a car and opened fire shortly before 8 a.m. Monday, Two other CIA employees, Nicholas Starr, 60, and Calvin Morgan, 61, were wounded. They continued to show improvement at Fairfax Hospital, where their conditions were upgraded yesterday to fair.

The third injured man, Stephen E. Williams, who was treated for superficial wounds and released Monday, works for a CIA contracor. All were stopped at the light.

Franklin said police now believe he gunman stopped his car—described as a dark, medium-sized automobile—directly behind Bennett's Saab in one of the turn lanes. After the shooting, witnesses said. he maneuvered the car past Benett's and continued east on Route 23. Then he vanished, leaving behind the victims and dozens of witlesses, many too shocked to recall letails.

Police found at least seven shell asings near the cars, including at east one that yielded a fingerprint, sources said. Authorities said the shell would have been touched as it vas being loaded into the gun's clip. t was not clear last night veet for which car the other fingerprint was

etrieved.

Fingerprints believed to be those of the gunman who killed two men and wounded three others outside the CIA's Langley headquarters Monday have been discovered on one of the victim's cars and on a shell casing, sources close to the investigation said yesterday.

Based on the size of shell casings left at the scene of the bloody rushhour incident, investigators also have determined that the gun used Monday was one of a few basic models of the AK-47-type assault rifle. Each carries 10 to 30 rounds of ammunition and is available at local gun stores.

Investigators have been canvassing gun stores throughout the Washington area in hopes that Monday's gunman had bought his weapon recently, police said.

Although many hurdles remain, law enforcement sources said the fingerprints, if they match those in FBI computer files, could provide a major break leading them to a suspect, or could at least help them target or eliminate people who are brought in for questioning.

Fairfax County police Capt. David Franklin, head of the department's Major Crime Division, declined to discuss any findings yesterday. He said there has been no "final analysis" of the evidence.

"We've received a lot of good leads," Franklin said at a news briefing. "All of these leads are being investigated. I personally feel that we're making progress, but it's a slow and tedious process."

Franklin said that since the incident, police have received more than 400 calls with information on the incident via a special 24-houra-day phone line staffed by investigators.

"There are a lot of people we've been given information about," he said. "I wouldn't characterize any of

Depending on their quality, the prints can be entered into the FBI's computerized fingerprint laboratory, which has prints from more than 25 million people arrested by federal, state and local police departments.

Leslie J. Wallace, a spokeswoman for the FBI, said the bureau also maintains fingerprints of more than 42 million other people, including all military personnel and other federal employees, some police, and workers in places such as banks that must register prints under federal law.

The length of time it takes to identify a fingerprint depends greatly on its clarity. Wallace said, adding, "Under ideal conditions, it can take two to three hours, but it could take up to two to three days or even longer."

FBI specialists in computerized fingerprinting were not available to explain how the computer checks ingerprints. But other specialists said the computer reads lines, loops and other fingerprint features and selects potential matches that then must be reviewed visually by laboratory analysts. The computer can review millions of fingerprints and select 25 candidates in seconds. One private consultant said that even partial prints or smudges, although less desirable, can be enhanced and run through computers in a search for a match.

Law enforcement sources said the dimensions of the shell casings led them to believe that the gunman probably used one of several basic kinds of semiautomatic militarystyle firearms: an SKS, a gas-operated rifle with 10 rounds, or a variation of the AK-47, the most widely used assault rifle in the world, such as the AKM. Both the AK-47 and the AKM carry 30-round magazines. Such weapons have been used in other recent multiple shootings across the nation.

Authorities said they plan to show pictures of the guns to witnesses in the CIA shooting in hopes of pinpointing the kind of weapon used.

Those who track cases of ma violence said the choice of firearr suggested that Monday's assault w well planned and that the gunman h a strong mission—possibly, one sai a war with the CIA. In addition, the fact that bullets were fired metho ically into car windows, rather the sprayed indiscriminately, indicate that he knew how to use an assau weapon, they said.

"Mass murderers are looking accomplish a goal," said James Ala Fox, a criminologist from Northeac

Morgan suffered at least one gunshot wound to his left arm.

Medical authorities said the bullet traveled up his arm and lodged behind his ear.

The two men were wounded by a gunman who fired at close range as they sat in their cars waiting for a light to change on Dolley Madison Boulevard (Route 123). Two men died at the scene, while a third motorist was treated at Arlington Hospital and released.

Starr underwent nearly 12 hours of surgery at Fairfax Hospital on Monday. Morgan was in the operating room a few hours. Starr, who consented to allowing his doctor to discuss his case, underwent additional surgery yesterday afternoon to redress his wound, Trask said.

When he recovers, Starr will have some impairment in his left arm because one of its three major nerves was severed and another nerve is not working, according to the doctor.

Because of the blood loss Starr

suffered, hospital workers put out an urgent call Monday morning for donors, especially those with his rare O-negative blood type. More than 250 people—four times the usual donor pool—showed up, creating a two-hour backup at the Blood Donor Services office. Another 200 people gave blood Tuesday.

David Gens, an assistant professor of surgery at the University of Maryland's Shock Trauma Center, said the key to saving severely injured people is to get them to a good trauma facility quickly.

"Minutes are important," espe-

cially with substantial blood loss, Gens said. "If it's true [Starr] lost his entire blood volume, then 45 minutes, for example, might have meant death."

While praising the efforts of his trauma staff, Trask said there was nothing particularly unusual or heroic in their efforts to save Starr's life.

"This happens in trauma centers almost every day," he said. "It's just that they're usually not working at the CIA. And they're usually not shot with an AK-47."



CIA Shooting Investigators Looking for a Marksman

'Weren't Too Many Shots Wasted,' Source Says

Fairfax County's chief prosecutor and others investigating last week's hooting outside the CIA's head-uarters said yesterday that they believe the gunman is a skilled narksman.

"From all the evidence available, his was a very efficient gunman," aid Commonwealth's Attorney Robert F. Horan Jr. "He certainly vas well armed."

"It's obvious to those of us in the usiness, there weren't too many hots wasted," said a source close o the investigation.

Horan declined to discuss any evdence in the incident, but sources said the gunman fired at least 10 rounds, hitting the five victims eight times. A source said the gunman, who parked a brown compact station wagon behind one the victim's cars, fired shots as he moved toward the front of the line of traffic waiting to enter the complex, then continued shooting on his way back to his car.

Two men were killed and three others were wounded by what police have described as an AK-47 type of semiautomatic assault rifle shortly before 8 a.m. as they sat waiting to turn left from Dolley Madison Boulevard (Route 123) into CIA head-quarters, in Langley. Four of the vic-

While investigators suspect the gunman may have a grudge against the CIA, they still have no motive for the shootings. "Some people want to say this is a real crazed wacko as opposed to some cold, calculating hit man or someone with a mission against the CIA," Horan said. "Any conclusion is pure speculation."

Police sources and others familiar with firearms said proficiency with an AK-47 type of weapon, a military assault rifle capable of firing 10 or more rounds, could come through practice or military training.

Edward Ezell, the firearms curator at the National Museum of American History, said it "was pretty amazing" that the gunman was able to hit so many people in such a short time.

The gunman's apparent choice of only male targets, bypassing at least two women, showed that he had some skill with the weapon, Ezell said. He added that the events demonstrated some preparation by the gunman, rather than a spur-of-the-moment shooting.

However, some gun experts said it doesn't take a lot of expertise to shoot someone with a rifle from as

lose as three feet.

"That's point-blank range," said Hayward Long, owner of the Blue Ridge Arsenal, an indoor firing ange and gun shop in Chantilly. Anyone can do that. It doesn't take skill. That weapon is not all that complicated to use."

Long and two other area gun shop officials said skill usually is required when shooting an AK-47 type of weapon at a distance.

But others noted that the gunman vas firing under stressful conditions, in a hurry and moving. They suggested he might have prepared for the shooting at a firing range.

Law enforcement authorities called the owner of Clark Brothers iring range in Warrenton, Va., last week to ask if anyone matching the gunman's description had practiced with an assault weapon recently. The range, about a 90-minute drive rom CIA headquarters, is open to the public.

"It does make you perk up and take notice," said Steve Clark, the owner. "The composite picture is bretty much anybody, unfortunate-y. I'd like nothing better than to turn in somebody like this."

Meanwhile, Nicholas Starr, one of the three men wounded in the shooting, was released from Fairfax Hospital yesterday, 11 days after he

raffiti Suspect Probed for Possible Links to CIA Slayings

A 2 year-old Fairfax County man has een charged with spray painting words, icluding "CIA," "Crime" and "Police," in arge of ters on roadways surrounding Vinna and with possessing a concealed oaded semiautomatic pistol.

Police said they are investigating whether Michael T. Murray had "any possible involvement" in the lan. 25 shootings outside the CAA's Langley headquarters in which two Ten were killed and three others in-

jured. According to sources, there is no evidence that Murray is the gunman.

Murray, who has green eyes and sandy blond hair, does not match the description of the suspect. Witnesses described the suspect as a white male with a dark complexion and dark brown or black medium-length hair.

So far, police have received nearly 1,500 tips about the case.

Murray was stopped Tuesday night for a traffic violation and was later charged with 15 counts of destruction of public property in December and January, possession of a Glock 9mm pistol with a high-tech sighting

device and driving with a suspended driver's license, police said yesterday.

Murray, who was released from the county jail on \$8,250 bond yesterday, said in an interview that he had nothing to do with the 7:50 a.m. shootings. He said he was at the Dirksen Building on Capitol Hill about 7 a,m. that morning, then left about 8:20 a.m. for the Library of Congress to do some research.

"That's a very terrible situation, and I wouldn't do anything like that," Murray said in an interview at his home. "As a matter of fact, I don't even know where the CIA complex is."

Murray, who said he is unemployed because of a broken wrist, declined to comment on the allegations that he painted the streets and a building in the Merrifield area with white or fluorescent red paint.

He also said that police have the wrong description of his height and weight and the color of his eyes and hair on the arrest warrants. The arrest warrant describes Murray as 5-9, 170 pounds, hazel eyes and brown hair. Murray said he is 5-10, 195 pounds, with green eyes and sandy blond hair. Police said the shooting suspect is 5-8 to 5-10 and


Police Release Drawing of Car Possibly Used in CIA Shootings

Pairfax County police released a drawing yesterday of the car they believe was driven by the gunman who opened fire last week on motorists at a red light outside the CIA's headquarters, killing two men and injuring three others.

The car, a dull medium brown compact station wagon believed to closely resemble a 1970s or early 1980s Toyota Corolla or Ford Escort, was seen being operated erratically just before and after the Jan. 25 shootings in the two turn lanes on Dolley Madison Boulevard (Route 123) leading to the CIA's main entrance, according to police.

The computer-produced drawing was made using descriptions of the car from witnesses, police said. They said that anyone who saw the car on roads leading to or from the Langley area around the time of the 7:50 a.m. shootings should call a special tip line: 703-591-9991.

The suspect, a white male, 20 to 30 years old, with dark brown or black hair, was wearing a tan jacket and dark pants, possibly jeans, police said. He was described as being 5-foot-8 to 5-foot-10 and weighing 145 to 165 pounds, they said.
