Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c) (2006 & Supp. IV (2010)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) National Security/Intelligence Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of national security and foreign intelligence records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and PA exemption (j)(2) as applicable to requests for records about individuals [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2); 50 U.S.C § 3024(i)(1)]. - (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.

Reference is made to my letter dated September 2, 1944 concerning the above-captioned matter. The following is submitted to bring the Bureau up to date in connection with CLARK's b7E the Of-

fice of the Treasury Representative in the American Embassy at Habana.

In connection with an official investigation concerning JOSEFINA WASTRONARDI and CLARIVER RINGUIS NORTHING DE SALA, two Argentine subjects, and while in contact with the latter, I learned that had represented himself to them as a Secret Agent of the American Embassy, and had on the night of September 9th endeavored to extract information from these women in connection with their application for a visa to enter the United States.

On September 12th, these women voluntarily and without prior notice, appeared at my office for the purpose of registering a complaint against for his actions. They furnished a b7E signed statement, a translation of which is attached, which was on September 20th brought to the attention of the Ambassador. Our investigation of DE SALA and MASTRONARDI was initiated because of certain rumors current that they were engaged in suspicious activities in Habana. The investigation resulted negatively, and in view of the non-specificity of the original information against them, the case was closed. No evidence whatever was developed that these women are acting in a manner inimical to the security of Cuba or the war effort.

On the night of September 18th, CLARIVER DE SALA telephonically advised me that she had called at a number he had given her, which was

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Director, FBI 9-28-44 b7E When it was brought to the attention of Chargé d'Affaires NUFER and First Secretary of Embassy ACKERSON on September 19th that_ in spite of the abortive hoar which endeavored to perpetrate on the Embassy in connection with his visa request described in my letter of reference, MR. NUFER acted immediately. MR. NUFER telephoned CLARK and demanded to know if it was true that b7E was no business of the Charge d'Affaires. MR. NUFER disagreed, and stated that he was responsible for the Embassy and all the officials attached to it: that he could not sit by without making protest when inpatently dangerous to the Embassy,[dividuals such as lattached to the Embassy. MR. NUFER told CLARK that he could not understand how lin view of the latter's CLARK could continue to character, reputation and background. CLARK then told MR. NUFER that JOSEFINA MASTRONARDI and CLARIVER DE SALA were "secret agents" of MR. GARY ACKERSON of the Embassy, who was "out to get" CLARK. NUFER abruptly terminated this conversation with the statement allegations by a to CLARK that he would not dignify reply of any kind, since they were too ridiculous on their face. When MR. NUFER advised MR. ACKERSON concerning CLARK's accusations against him, MR. ACKERSON was completely dismayed by CLARK's utter lack of coherence or logical thinking. He expressed himself as firmly of the opinion that CLARK is a mental case.

An interesting sidelight in connection with the above conversation between CLARK and NUFER is that these self same "secret agents" of MR. ACKERSON, JOSEFINA MASTRONARDI and CLARIVER DE SALA, according to CLARK, succeeded in placing under the influence of liquor, MR. R. M. McDAVID, Chief of the Miami Office of the Treasury Department while he was in Habana in August, 1944.

It is particularly illuminating that in spite of McDAVID's admittedly intimate association with the subjects from August 7th to August 23rd (the period of his stay in Habana), and in spite of the fact that he lived at the same hotel with them, he failed to ascertain their last names.

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left my office at approximately 6:45 P.M. yesterday, and approximately 30 minutes later, at 7:15, the entire CLARK affair was brought up personally with the Am-I brought the Ambassador up to date with last minute bassador. developments in connection with and suggested to the Ambassador that possibly he might desire to take some action in connection with this matter, in view of the fact that I refuse to tolerate any criticism of my Bureau by any Government official. and especially by a cheap crooked I further stated that in Habana. it does not appear that CLARK is following the Ambassador's instructions, which are explicit on the point that the office of the Legal Attaché.

MR. NUFER, Counselor of Embassy, was present during this discussion, and was fully in accord that the time was ripe to demand an explanation from CLARK.

True to form, the Ambassador took his usual vigorous action, which included the calling of CLARK to the Embassy immediately, in spite of the late hour. CLARK reached the Embassy at about 8:00 P.M., and the Ambassador told him that he was extremely concerned that CLARK had seen fit to hurl empty and ridiculous accusations at First Secretary ACKERSON and the Legal Attaché.

The Ambassador stated that he would accept the word of MR. ACKERSON and this Legal Attaché without question and against the word of any other person. The Ambassador reminded CLARK that at the time CLARK entered this Embassy, he was advised that the Embassy operated on a basis of 100% cooperation among the various Government officials attached to it, and that the Ambassador had expected that CLARK would keep him advised, would work in harmony with the rest of the Embassy, and would enter into the spirit of team play which prevails in the Embassy at This Ambassadorial reprimend devastated CLARK's composure. He became highly nervous, and with a painfully twisted face and whiney tone, plaintively accused the office of the Legal Attaché of having "tailed MR. McBRIDE" when the latter was in Habana during August, 1944. (CLARK referred to McDAVID as McBRIDE until I inquired as to whether he did not have McDAVID in mind). The Ambassador demanded details, and CLARK said that MR. McDAVID, had told him that the Legal Attaché and his Assistant, MR. WILLIAM CALDWELL were "planted" in his hotel lobby the very day he arrived in Habana (apparently this was on August 7, 1944). MR. CLARK in a miserable attempt to be triumphant, averred that McDAVID had caught us in the act of surveilling his person, and had approached us directly and greeted us, thereby putting us on notice that he, McDAVID, had discovered us in the act of tailing him.

When CLARK was quite finished, I informed the Ambassador in a firm but calm voice that I have never laid eyes on McDAVID; that we have never met, and that McDAVID to my knowledge has never seen me. In order to clarify this point, I later determined in conversation with MR. CALDWELL that on the night described by CLARK, he was in the lobby of the Seville Biltmore Hotel, talking with JUAN BOSCH, the Dominican Revolutionary. At this time, McDAVID approached them and said, "hello". McDAVID apparently assumed that JUAN BOSCH was identical with the Legal Attaché.

know that MR. CALDWELL has never laid eyes on these women. The Ambassador demanded CLARK's source of information in connection with this allegation. CLARK replied that had furnished him with these data. Legal Attaché dated December 30, 1943, which described the high-
ly unsavory character and reputation of CLARK demurred,
endeavoring to explain to the Ambassador that the statements
contained in his memorandum dated December 30, 1943 represented
the views of his secretary, MISS ZALDOUNDO (now MRS. LEO FOX),
and that he, CLARK, was of the opinion that she had been mistaken
about The Ambassador strongly pointed out to CLARK that
in that case he was forced to agree with MISS ZALDOUNDO, since
it was inconceivable how anybody with the slightest sense of ob-
servation could fail to conclude that is a double-crossing,
highly disreputable and unreliable individual. The Ambassador in
the clearest of language, told CLARK that was being barred
from the Embassy, effective immediately; that CLARK was specifi-
cally instructed to discontinue and that
in Habana are to be handled exclusively by the Legal
Attaché. The Ambassador warned CLARK that he must cooperate
with the officials of the Embassy or suffer the consequences.

The Ambassador went on to explain that if the Commercial Attaché has a disagreement with the Counselor of Embassy, or there are differences of opinion between the Military and Naval Attachés or any misunderstandings between members of his staff, the men get together directly in order to talk over the situation. He instructed CLARK to follow this procedure in the future, and not to register unfounded grievances which are the figments of his imagination.

In connection with the statement in my letter of reference that CLARK has manifested symptoms of paranoia, it was interesting to note that CLARK, when asked by the Ambassador why he had seen fit to conduct himself in such a thoroughly unsatisfactory manner, stated, "Well, Mr. Ambassador, one does strange things when he is being pricked night and day by so many pins".

The Ambassador specifically informed CLARK that he was entirely mistaken in concluding that the Legal Attaché or MR. ACKERSON or anybody else in the Embassy was interested in his activities or had investigated McDAVID, or any other

The Ambassador most emphatically instructed CLARK to cooperate with the Embassy and the other Attachés, and recommended that he endeavor to function in the manner of this Legal Attaché. The Ambassador proceeded to speak in very lauditory terms of the attitude, efficiency, accomplishments, discretion and complete fair play which have characterized the work of the Legal Attaché's Office in his Embassy.

After the interview. I made it a point to compliment the Ambassador on the manner in which he handled this situation, and to advise him that I was profoundly appreciative of his kind remarks concerning my office and myself personally. I added with a smile that I realized they were, of course, too good to be true. He quickly assured me that he was completely sincere in his statements concerning the fine quality of the personnel and work of the FBI in his Embassy, and would not hesitate to endorse us in a similar fashion whenever the occasion presents itself.

The interview was concluded, and as CLARK prepared to leave with the Ambassador's caveat that he mend his ways still ringing in his ears, I offered my hand in a gesture which under the circumstances can only be considered one of pure magnanimity. As we were shaking hands, CLARK said, "All right now, no more tail jobs". The Ambassador's utter exasperation was ill concealed. My reply was appropriate.

The Ambassador has confidentially advised me that CLARK is on probation, and will be removed if he causes any more trouble for the Embassy.

In the absence of further positive developments, this incident will be considered closed.

Statement: We. CLARIVER RINGUIS NORTHING DE SALA and JOSEPHINE MASTRONARDI, have come to make in the American Embassy to report to the Legal Attache's Office, the following:

This information, which we are writing, is from our own free will, and we do it without threats or promises of any kind.

On September 7, 1944, I, CLARIVER RINGUIS MORTHING DE SALA. arrived in a car at the American Embassy, and I met who asked me if I was coming to get the visa for my passport to enter the United States, and I answered, "Yes"; that was all the conversation we had.
On Sept. 9, 1944, JOS EPHINE MASTRONARDI was sitting at the bar of the Seville Biltmore Hotel, when approached, and asked her where I was. She answered him I was in my apartment.

Upon leaving, he told us that if we found ourselves involved in difficulties with the American Embassy, that he could help us, solving all the inconveniences that we might have.

I was disgusted, and ordered him to go away, and I immediately informed MR. JACK WEST of the American Embassy of what had 5/21/02 (U) 00/08/05/05/05 just happened to us.

On September 20, 1944, Supervisor William Beaulieu of the Bureau advised Jerome Doyle of the New York SIS office that the Legal Attache's office in Havana, Cuba had in its possession expolice badge marked "Sergeant, Police Department, City of New York, Police Reserve 69." It was stated that the New York Field Division might be interested in returning this badge to the Police Department, City of New York.

On September 22, 1944, I furnished the information about the badge to the office of the Chief Inspector of the New York City Police Department and was advised that it was a World War I badge and that subsequently the Police Department would notify me as to what disposition should be made of it.

Thereafter, Detective Schuler of the office of Chief Inspector John J. O'Connell, New York City Police Department, advised the records of this department reflect this badge was issued on August 16, 1924 to one MANUEL QUEVEDO, who gave an address of 104 West 70th Street. New York City, and there is no record of the badge's being returned.

Detective Schuler stated QUEVEDO applied for membership in the Aviation Division of the Police Reserve on April 16, 1924; was appointed on August 16, 1924; and was separated from service on October 8, 1925. The application reflected the following descriptions

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated September 9, 1944 concerning the above-captioned matter. With regard to the Bureau's suggestion that Ambassador BRADEN be advised of my intention to contact De SOSA to develop information concerning the proposed convention, the Bureau is advised that this has been done. As a matter of fact, out of abundant caution, since the events leading to De SOSA's becoming persona non grata with the Embassy, I have contacted him only after appropriately advising the responsible Embassy official, and receiving his consent to do so.

On September 22nd, De SOSA called my office, and requested that I visit him that day, since he had something of interest to discuss. I thereafter, in the absence of the Ambassador, informed Mr. G. G. ACKERSON, First Secretary of Embassy and Coordinator of Intelligence Matters, of De SOSA's request, and inquired as to whether the Embassy had any objection to my seeing De SOSA. He stated that there was no objection. I specifically inquired as to whether the matter should be cleared with the Ambassador. He stated that that was not necessary.

The contact with De SOSA was made on September 22nd, and on the 23rd a comprehensive memorandum, a copy of which is attached, setting out the results of my interview with De SOSA was furnished to the Ambassador.

On the morning of September 25th, MR. ALBERT CHIPMENTONION Counselor of Embassy, called me into this office the constant of th staff meeting, and advised me confidentially of the first Ambassador would probably instruct me to discontinue contacts. MR. MONTAMAT, who mentioned this matter to me shortly after NUFER's conversation with me, expressed the opinion that the Ambassador would be guilty of sheer folly if, to gratify his personal desires to spite De SOSA, he instructed the Legal Attaché to discontinue his contacts with De SOSA.

At approximately 4:30 P.M. on September 25th, in connection with other matters, the Ambassador brought up the above subject, and stated that he had read my memorandum of September 23rd; that he at first was quite disturbed that MR. ACLERSON had permitted my contact to continue with De SOSA after the latter's controversy in the press with the Ambassador; that Messrs. ACKERSON, NUFER and MONTAMAT had all expressed themselves as being solidly opposed to any severance of relations between the Legal Attaché and De SOSA, and that after thinking the matter over, he, the Ambassador, was inclined to agree with his aides, and permit these contacts to continue. The Ambassador stated that De SOSA should realize that my contacts with him are being continued upon the specific authorization of the Ambassador. The Ambassador further indicated that he recognized the desirability of maintaining contact with De SOSA, since any information from that source is better than none, and since he desires to keep fully informed as to the activities and intentions of the enemy (meaning De SOSA, a personal enemy of the Ambassador). The Ambassador without foundation disparaged the value of data concerning Communist matters which De SOSA is in a position to furnish to this office.

I reminded the Ambassador at the outset of this discussion that relations between the Diario de la Marine and the office of the Legal Attaché were first inaugurated over two years ago by my predecessor, MR. RAYMOND G. LEDDY; that upon my arrival at this post, I carried on contacts with De SOSA in view of his value to the work of our office; that immediately upon De SOSA's becoming persona non grata with the Embassy, I refrained from calling or visiting De SOSA, but that the latter had called me, requesting that I visit his office. I explained to the Ambassador that on the occasion of each of these requests on the part of De SOSA, I immediately advised First Secretary, MR. ACKERSON, and Chargé d'Affaires NUFER (acting while the Ambassador was in the United States) of De SOSA's desires that I call on him, and solicited their opinion in the premises. On each occasion,

permission was forthcoming from these officials, the contact made, and a full report as to what transpired at my meeting with De SOSA furnished to the Embassy. I further advised the Ambassador that the matter of continuing or discontinuing consecutive with De SOSA was utterly immaterial to me in view of the fact that at least 90% of the information furnished by De SOSA is political in character, and consequently of primary interest to the Embassy and of virtually no interest to my office. I indicated that the loss of De SOSA as a source of information on subversive activities could be absorbed painlessly by my local organization.

Finally, I emphasized that my sole desire in the matter was to scrupulously abide by the Ambassador's instructions and wishes, and that I would sever connections with De SOSA and be freed from the necessity of reporting his utterances to the Embassy, or continue contact with him and keep the Ambassador informed as to his plans and opinions.

The Ambassador stated that my actuation in this entire matter was above reproach; that he approved wholeheartedly of the menner in which I had handled it, but that his initial reaction was that Mr. ACKERSON had utilized poor judgment in not causing me to break off relations with De SOSA. As indicated, the Ambassador stated that upon reflection, he had concluded that MR. ACKERSON was right in keeping the channel open to De SOSA, and that he, therefore, not only approves of my continuing contact with De SOSA, but it is highly desirable that this be done, in view of the value to the Embassy of the information secured from De SOSA.

I shall continue to keep the Bureau advised of any interesting developments in connection with our contact with De SOSA.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE AMBASSADOR

BACKGROUND:

For over two years, contact has been maintained by this office with EUGENIO DE SOSA, Director of the Diario de la Marina. This contact was first inaugurated by MR. LEDDY, and was continued upon my arrival at this post, because DE SOSA is a highly fruitful source of Communist information.

Since the incidents leading to DE SOSA's becoming persona non grata with the Embassy, I have contected him only after receiving prior authorization of a responsible Embassy official. On no occasion was the contact with De SOSA made on my own initiative, but rather at his specific request. Yesterday after clearing with MR. ACKERSON, I saw De SOSA, after he had requested that I drop around to his office.

DETAILS:

I. DE SOSA is leaving for Washington tomorrow, Sunday, September 24th. While he did not yesterday describe his plans in Washington, he did on a prior contact state that he intends, of course, to call on various Governmental officials, and in addition will offer a dinner for Washington correspondents. He advised that he probably will see MANUEL BENITEZ while he is in New York. He stated that he will endeavor to go to Canada in order to secure additional news prints, since he fears that a general strike of dock workers will be in the offing within a comparatively short period after GRAU assumes the Presidency.

II. According to him, DR. BELT will probably be appointed Ambassador to Washington, and will leave to assume his duties there before his appointment is confirmed by the Senate. BELT has only a very slender chance of ever being confirmed by the Senate. In this connection, I saw DE SOSA yesterday lunching with DR. EDUARDO SUAREZIRIBAS, who as you know will probably be the new President of the Senate. While at lunch with DR. BELT on September 21st, he expressed some concern about the possibility that he would get too many "bolas negras" when the

time comes for action on his appointment by the Senate. He (DE SOSA) stated that he has kept BELT's name out of the Diario de la Marina; that he will continue to do so until BELT's chances of becoming Cuban Ambassador to Washington are definitely scotched. He advised that within the past few weeks, BELT has sent intermediaries to him for the purpose of having the Diario's policy against recognition of BELT in print altered. DE SOSA indicated that these emissaries did not, of course, admit that BELT sent them, but that it was obvious because they were not persons susceptible of being moved by such altruistic motives.

With reference to BELT's appointment, DE SOSA opined that DR. GRAU's procedure would be something like the following: Appoint BELT; dispatch him to Washington; and then call in the Senators individually in order to convince them the desirability of confirming the appointment, in view of the severe embarrassment to the Cuban Government if he were forced to return without Senate confirmation. DE SOSA does not believe that this will prove effective.

III. Concerning the recent killings of five policemen and the serious wounding of two others by the armed terrorists, DE SOSA advised that shortly before I came into his office, he had received two Guitaristas, who has requested assistance from him in the matter of securing news print, and the publication of certain articles in their behalf. He told these men that he would do what he could for them, since they represent a segment of DR. GRAU's following, but that in no event would he publish any material which was inflammatory in nature, or which condoned violence and lawlessness. He characterized these men as killers, who endeavored to create the impression that they came to him because they are against Communism, and are, of course, aware that he, too, is anti-Communist. DE SOSA did not reveal to me the names of these Guiteristas.

DE SOSA stated that Chief of Police ANTONIO BRITO had informed him to the effect that CARLOS RIO SOCARRAS had gone to BRITO and specifically requested that he do nothing to get El Colorado, the author of the recent (and many other) policemen killings. DE SOSA swears that El Colorado and his two accomplices are being harbored in the house of EDDY CHIBAS, Autentico Senator.

According to DE SOSA, yesterday morning two Cuitoristas with paint and paint brushes, started to letter the words 'Viva DI Colorado" on the sidewalk in front of the Diario de la Marina. DE SOSA stated that there were two police officers in view, and

both were discreetly looking the other way when these hoodlums began their process of defacing Diario property. DE SOSA stated that they were able to talk the Guiteristas into leaving without going through with their plan, but that this merely pointed out the fact that law enforcement as Cubans have known it for the past six or seven years left Cuba with MARIANO FAGET and his trigger-men. He advised that the police now are leery of making arrests for even the smallest infractions because they fear that the perpetrators might be Guiteristas. It will be recalled that two policemen have been killed and two permanently incapacitated because three Guiteristas (El Colorado and his two accomplices) refused to pay their bus fare when they got on a bus.

You no doubt are aware that recently all newspapers carried a story of an interview with GRAU, in which he stated that the Chiefs of the Army, Navy and Police would be ratified in their positions. The Diario in reporting this interview studiously avoided the use of the word "ratify". DE SOSA says that it so happened that when the Guiteristas read the GRAU interview, they sent a delegation to call on GRAU to request an explanation of his statements. Upon being confronted by this group, GRAU invited their attention to the report of the interview which had appeared in Diario, and explained to the Guiteristas that the Diario had actually accurately reported the interview, whereas the other papers were guilty of printing mis-information. DE SOSA claims that GRAU personally thanked the reporter of the Diario for the restrained manner in which GRAU's statements concerning the ratification of the Chiefs of the Army, Navy and Police in their positions were presented.

IV. Day before yesterday, I saw DE SOSA lunching with General TABERNILLA at the Hotel Nacional. Yesterday, DE SOSA informed me that in the event of trouble in Cuba, there is only one General who has sufficient influence over the men of the Army to take command of the situation. That General is TABERNILLA. He stated that TABERNILLA is a purely professional man; that he has no political ambitions, and that he enjoys the complete loyalty and confidence of the armed forces. It is DE SOSA's hope that the GRAU administration will succeed. It is his fear that it will not, and it is his expectation that if it does fall, DE CARDENAS will take over and will do a creditable job, with TABERNILLA's strength behind him.

CONCLUSION:

DE SOSA, upon his return from Mexico, furnished me very interesting information relative to Communist operations in that country, which is being reported in a separate communication.

All of the above information was furnished to me by DE SOSA in confidence, and it is respectfully requested that the Embassy honor this confidence.



SUBJECT: DISTRIBUTION OF POLITICAL IMPORTATION IN CUBA

BACKGROULD

In the past, political information which came to the attention of the Office of the Legal Attache in Lavana, Cuba, in a gratuitous and unsolicited manner was Turnished to Ambassador Spruille Braden.

By Eureau radiogram dated September 22, 1944, all Legal Attaches were instructed to furnish no reports concerning political matters to the Embassy, Eilitary, or Haval Attache in their respective posts of assignment. However, permission was granted to investigate and report on specific individuals or situations where a specific request was received from the Ambassador.

DETAILS

Legal ittache Jack West by letter dated Movember 7, 1944, expressed the opinion that, as in the past, unsolicited information of a political nature which comes to the attention of the Office of the Legal Attache in Havana should be furnished Ambassador Braden. Pegal Attache West believes this should be done because of the Ambassador's desire to be kept fully informed concerning conditions in Cuba and to forestall possible criticish of the Office of the Legal Attache, in the event Ambassador Braden did ascertain that political information received by that office was not being forwarded to him. Ir. West believes the latter situation might definitely embarrass the Bureau in Cuba.

RECOLUMNATION

It is recommended that the instructions set out in the Bureau radiogram dated September 22, 1944, be strictly followed. It is not believed the Bureau's policy in handling political coverage should be modified under present circumstances for our Mayana Office.

There is attached hereto a recommended letter to be sent/to Legal Attache Speakes informing him what action should be followed concerning the above situation.

At present the undercover men in Cuba are engaged in work of considerable value to the Bureau, and they are in charge of several squads of informants which do not have: direct contact with this office. The Agents of this office have been meeting these undercover men at the apartment of the Legal Attaché in Miramar on the outskirts of Habana, but this arrangement is very unsatisfactory because of the remoteness of the location and its lack of availability for quick appointments and hurried meetings.

For obvious reasons the undercover men cannot meet personnel of this office in their own places of Gresidence.

Attempts have been made to rent office space in showntown Habana, but even small one-room offices rent for as high as \$80.00 to \$90.00 a month, and at present there are almost none available.

Special Agent HARRY E. WILSON of this office has suggested that he would be willing to rent a furnished Lapartment in the downtown area of Habana which would serve him as living quarters and which would be so selected as to offer the greatest advantages for a discreet and handy meeting place. Not only would undercover men be contacted at this apartment, but also certain other informants such as representatives of the Basque organization which now come to the office but which could be much more advantageously contacted elsewhere. Rental, however, for a furnished apartment in such a location would come to probably \$115.00 or \$120.00 a month, which is a sum Special Agent WILSON would Unot reasonably desire to pay for his living quarters. states, however, that if the Bureau would pay \$50.00 per month on this rental during the period in which the apartment is so used for the Bureau's business, he would be glad to assume the additional expense incurred beyond that of his present living accommodations.

The writer believes that there is a definite need for such a point of contact, and that the monthly expense incurred by the Bureau would be more than off-set by the utility of the apartment. Actually it is felt that no other satisfactory solution has thus far presented itself. Accordingly, Bureau authority is requested for a rental of such an apartment, and it is respectfully requested that this office be advised by radio in the event that authorization is granted.

BACKGROUND:

At the present time, the undercover Agents assigned to Cuba make contact with representatives of the office of the legal Attache at the Mr. Jones Mr. Quim Legal Attache's apartment located in a suburb of Havana.

DETAILS:

The <u>legal Attache</u> has advised that this arrangement is very unsatisfactory because of the remoteness of the location and the frequent need for quick appointments and hurried meetings. The Legal Attache has pointed out that for obvious reasons the undercover men cannot meet the open Agents in the residences of the undercover Agents. Attempts have been made to rent an office in downtown Havana but even small, one-room offices rent from \$80.00 to \$90.00 per month and almost none are available.

Special Agent Harry E. Wilson of the Havana office has offered to rent a furnished apartment in downtown Havana which he would use as living quarters and which would serve as a meeting place for the undercover Agents as well as certain informants of the Havana office. The rental for such an apartment would be about \$115.00 to \$120.00 per month, and Agent Wilson has stated that if the Bureau could pay \$50.00 per month on this rental, he would assume the balance although it would amount to more than his present living quarters. The legal Attache has requested authority to proceed with this plan.

Although such a method of operation would undoubtedly be less expensive than the rental of an office for such purposes, it is believed that an office would be much more desirable and that we should avoid the use of Agents' living quarters for such purposes whenever possible.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is accordingly recommended that the Legal Attache in Havana be instructed to rent an office for this purpose if at all possible, even though it will cost a slightly higher sum. A suggested radiogram is attached.

On this date the writer accompanied by the other Special Agents assigned to this office attended a luncheon given at the American Club in honor of Special Agent ROBERT M. DURKIN, who is leaving the Habana Office on transfer. This luncheon was attended by approximately 40 of the leading American businessmen in Habana.

The writer, as a newcomer to Cuba, could not help but note the extremely high regard with which the Habana Office and its personnel are held by these American businessmen residing in Cuba.

In conversation with the writer prior to the luncheon, Mr. WILLIAM E. HEAGNEY, who is Assistant Manager in Charge of Credits for the Habana Office of the First National Bank of Boston, stated that he as well as many of his fellow American business executives could not help but marvel at the extremely fine type of young men with which the Bureau has consistently staffed its Habana Office. Mr. HEAGNEY stated that he would not have believed that a government institution could staff its various divisions with such uniformly able and respected young men, and he said that his views were held by the majority of the American colony in Cuba. To this the writer replied that he felt highly honored to be added to the group of personnel representing the Bureau in Cuba, and certainly everything possible would be done so that the Office of the Legal Attaché would merit the continued esteem of the portions of the public with which it comes in contact.

During the course of the luncheon several speakers made extremely complimentary remarks concerning the work of the Bureau in Cuba, and one U. S. Naval Officer present stated that in the post war, when the true facts of the Bureau's confidential work might be released to the public, the public as a whole would find out what an extremely valuable contribution to the war effort the Bureau had made.

BACKGROUND:

On December 6, 1944, the Legal Attache at Havana, Cuba, advised Mr. Jones Mr. Quinn Tamm of the need for an undercover office in that city to be used for contacting informants and by the undercover Agents assigned to Cuba. The Legal Attache Mr. Nease_ suggested renting an apartment in the downtown area to be occupied by an Agent of his office, the rent being paid half by the Bureau and half by the Agent occupying the apartment. At that time, we instructed the Legal Attache to endeavor to locate a suitable office for this purpose.

DETAILS:

The Legal Attache has now advised that no offices are available. However, an apartment can be obtained which would be ideal for this purpose. states that Special Agent Harry E. Wilson has offered to rent this apartment, provided the Bureau could reimburse him for half of the rent.

While it is undoubtedly necessary to have such an undercover office and this apartment presents the best available solution to the problem, the idea of paying half the rent on an Agent's personal living quarters does not appear desirable. The regulations governing the Living and Quarters Allowances paid Bureau Agents offer a solution to this problem, however. Such regulations provide that if an employee is furnished living quarters by the Government, he shall receive only 60 per cent of his normal Living and Quarters Allowance. Thus, the Bureau could pay the rent and cost of utilities in connection with this apartment and pay Agent Wilson 60 per cent of his Living and Quarters Allowance. The actual cost to the Bureau and to Agent Wilson would be approximately the same as if the Bureau were to pay half the rent of the apartment, but it would seem that handling the matter in accordance with the established regulations would be best.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the legal Attache at Havana be advised that the Bureau will authorize the rental of this apartment, the Bureau to pay the rent and the utilities in connection therewith. Agent Wilson will be authorized to use the apartment as living quarters and will receive only 60 per cent of his Living and Quarters subsequent to the date ne occupies this apartment. A suggested radiogram is attached.

It is to be noted that the Legal Attache has requested an expeditious reply, stating the apartment will be available only until January 8, 1945.

The writer has noted that since the institution of this office, it has been a practice that each morning prior to the opening of the office for business, two Embassy employees, who are Cubans and who are employed as cleaning men on this floor of the Embassy office building, come into the Legal Attaché's Office to dust the furniture. They are engaged in this cleaning activity when no member of the Legal Attaché's Office is present, and have keys to the set of offices, with the exception of the radio room and the Legal Attaché's Private Office.

It is my impression that this practice is at variance with instructions in the Bureau's SIS Manual, and that the situation is not entirely desirable from a security angle. Of course, all files and cabinets are locked, and the files are sealed by both the cabinet lock itself and the iron bar and padlock. I am advised that this practice has never been objected to by any Bureau inspector, and that in fact the building management might insist that it have keys to this office because of fire hazard.

Should the Bureau desire that a change be made in the above-described practice, I shall endeavor to employ a Cuban for cleaning purposes who would not have keys to the office, and who would do his cleaning during regular office hours, probably the last thing at night. Of course, prior to the hiring of such an individual, applicants would have to be interviewed and a background investigation made. The advice of the Bureau is requested in this matter.

BACKGROUND:

Section 6-J, Paragraph 12, of the SIS Manual provides that the char force shall not have access to an SIS office unless a regularly appointed Bureau employee is on duty. Legal Attache John N. Speakes at Havana, Cuba, has pointed out that it has been the practice in that office for two Cubans employed by the Embassy to dust the furniture in our office there prior to the arrival of Bureau employees in the morning. Speakes states that he desires to employ a Cuban for cleaning purposes who would not have keys to the office and who would do his cleaning while Bureau employees are present.

It would appear from this that our office in Havana certainly has not been following this security provision properly, and a possibility exists that the same situation may exist in other offices. It is believed that we should authorize the Legal Attache in Havana to employ an individual for cleaning purposes, first, of course, conducting a proper background investigation regarding any prospective employee, and that we should point out to him the necessity for a Bureau employee's being present with the char force during cleaning of the office outside office hours until such time as this new individual is hired to clean the office during regular working hours. It is also thought that we should call to the attention of all legal Attaches at this time the necessity for a Bureau employee's being present when any cleaning force is in the office.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Legal Attache in Havana be authorized to hire an individual to clean his office during regular working hours. It is also recommended that we point out to the Legal Attache at Havana the necessity for an employee of the Bureau to be present whenever the office is cleaned. A suggested radiogram to Havana is attached.

It is also recommended that we point out at this time to all Legal Attaches the necessity for a Bureau employee's being on duty whenever the char force has access to the office. A suggested radiogram to all FBI Legal Attaches with the exception of Havana is attached.

Subject: Security Check of Telephone Service, American Embassy, Havana, Cuba

The following is a summary of the recent security check of the telephone service at the American Embassy and the Ambassador's residence at Havana, Cuba:

The security survey was conducted of the telephone installation at the American Sabassy, Havana, Cuba, from January 19, 1945, to January 30, 1945, and it was ascertaine' that all telephone and special service lines are free from taps; also, there was no evidence to indicate that any agency, or agents, had attempted to use taps on any of these lines previous to this inspection.

All offices excepting those of the Military Attache, Maval Attache, and War Shipping Administration were inspected for concealed microphones and illicit telephone cross-connections, and it was ascertained that such devices are not being employed on the premises. The Military and Maval Attaches advised they preferred that only their private telephones at the Embassy and at their residences be checked for surreptitious connections. Due to this request, their offices were not searched for microphones or other connections to the telephones. However, every pair of wires leaving the building was verified as to its correct usage, so the possibility of such devices used in these offices is therefore precluded by elimination.

The private telephone lines of the Military and Naval Attaches were inspected at the Embassy for tampering, but there was no evidence which indicated that such had ever been attempted. The residence telephones of these two officials were also inspected and again there was no evidence of any tampering.

The possibility of unauthorized persons monitoring official Embassy calls Mr. Tolson, Mr. E. A. immlimited to the personnel operating the Embassy switchboard and to any possible Mr. Colege Mr. Colege which the Cuban Covernment may have installed in the Cuban Telophone Mr. Glavinghany. or manually through the board. Consequently, it is possible, if an operator so desires, to menitor any call in the imbassy. This, of course, does not hold true for calls placed over the private lines serving the various offices, because these lines have no appearances and are not connected through the imbassy switchboard. This condition is normal practice on such installations, and whether or not the operators monitor such calls is largely a matter of personnel.

Access to these lines can be had in the Cuban Telephone Company and whether the Guban Government has any arrangements for monitoring telephone service is largely a matter of conjecture. Further, the use of any telephones for discussions of highly confidential matters must be considered with great discretion, even though all indications are that the telephone service at the American Embassy in Havana is free from illicit tampering.

The above data has been made available to the American Ambassy at Havana, Cuba.

The following memoranda has been submitted to me by Special Agent DANIEL C. LIESS, following the completion of a security survey of the telephone installation at the American Embassy here:

The security survey was conducted of the telephone installation at the American Embassy, Habana, Cuba from January 19, 1945 to January 30, 1945, and it was ascertained that all telephone and special service lines are free from taps; also, there was no evidence to indicate that any agency, or agents, had attempted to use taps on any of these lines previous to this inspection.

All offices excepting those of the Military Attaché, Naval Attaché, and War Shipping Administration were inspected for concealed microphones and illicit telephone cross-connections, and it was ascertained that such devices are not being employed on the premises. The program was explained to the Military and Naval Attaches, and they advised that they preferred that only their V private telephones at the Embassy and at their residences be checked for surreptitious connections. Due to this request, their offices were not searched for microphones or other connections to the telephones. However, every pair of wires leaving the building was verified as to its correct usage, so the possibility of such devious devices being used in these offices procluded 64-4461-401 by elimination.

The installation at the Embassy consists of a small PABX of the "stepper" type, manufactured by the Automatic Electric Company of Chicago. This automatic equipment is further complemented by a two-position switchboard, on which appears every extension in the Embassy, and also the il combination two-way trunks which serve the Embassy for incoming and outgoing service. Also appearing on this board is one direct line to International Long Distance, and one direct line to the Batista Airport. This board can handle incoming, outgoing, and intra-office calls. Inter-extension calls can be made either automatically or through the board. possible by the use of the proper answering cord of the operator to go in on a busy extension, if such a call is placed automatically or manually through the board. Consequently, it is possible if an operator so desires, to monitor any call in the Embassy. This, of course, doesn't hold true for calls placed over the private lines serving the various offices, because these lines have no appearances, and are not connected through any position of the switchboard. This condition, however, is normal practice on such installations, and whether or not the operators may monitor such calls is largely a matter of personnel. Also, inasmuch as access to these lines can be had in the Cuban Telephone Company, whether the Cuban Government has any arrangements for monitoring these lines is largely a matter of conjecture. The use of any telephones for highly confidential material must, therefore, be considered with the proper discretion.

The installation at the residence of the Ambassador consists of a small rotary selector, relay-operated PAX. The service at the Ambassador's residence consists of two trunks, which are capable of handling incoming and outgoing calls. These trunks serve six extension telephone instruments located throughout the Embassy residence. The equipment has a local source of power for both talking battery and signalling purposes.

Ambassador's residence is taken off in a direct splice, and as one terminal box between the splice and the residence is located in a concrete vault between the sidewalk and the street, covered over by six inches of stone and sodded, entrance to this terminal can only be obtained by using a crew of pick and shovel laborers. Examinations of the splice and the earth covering this concrete vault failed to reveal any indication of tampering. The installation within the residence was examined, and again there was no indication of any tampering. This installation is a very clean job, and well designated. Duct wires feeding various extensions throughout the residence are all tagged in every appearance.

Close examination of the exterior of the building revealed that there were no other conductors leaving the building, except electrical power lines, nor were there any connections to any of the telephone lines. There was no indication whatsoever that any tampering had been attempted at any time.

Of the two trunks serving this residence, one trunk is connected directly to the Ambassador's phone, and is not available for calls from any extension other than his own instrument. The second trunk is a general purpose trunk, and can be used for incoming and outgoing calls from all of the instruments. The installation is in very good condition, and indicates that consideration was taken to insure the best possible service to the Embassy.

The private telephone lines of the Military and Naval Attachés were inspected at the Embassy for tampering, but there was no evidence which indicated that such had ever been attempted. The residence telephones of these two officials were also inspected, and again there was no evidence of any tampering. Information

relative to the cabling serving these instruments was again supplied by the contact of the Legal Attache's Office of the Cuban Telephone Company. The private telephone of the Secretary to the Military Attaché was also inspected, and again no evidence of tampering was discovered.

The following facts are stated for information purposes, so that a record will be available in Washington of approximately what the setup is on the telephone equipment in the Embassy in Habana. The service consists of:

The only private line or trunk which is in a multiple section of the cabling serving the Embassy is the private line used by the Visa Section. The telephone number is A-3553, and a recommendation has been made that this line be cut to the unmultipled section of the cable serving the Embassy, inasmuch as sufficient spare pairs are available for such a change.

An inspection of the exterior portion of the Embassy Building revealed that there were 11 drop wires leaving the exterior walls of this building, being connected to terminal boxes on other buildings across the street from the Embassy. There are six drop wires leaving the Embassy on the west wall, and five drop wires

leaving the Embassy on the rear wall. Examinations of these drop wires revealed that all except one were actually in a working condition, and were being used by RCA, Western Union, and Postal Telegraph as telegraph call boxes. The one drop wire not in use is terminated in the Communications Section of the Naval Attaché's Office, and is dead-ended at that point. Nothing is connected to this drop, and it is being held for future telegraph call box service. Other than these drop wires which have been verified as in actual service, no other illicit wiring is leaving the Embassy Building.

Consequently, since what arrangements the Cuban Government has with the Cuban Telephone Company for monitoring telephone service is largely a matter of conjecture, any matters of a confidential nature should be considered with great discretion, before they are discussed over any telephone service in a foreign country, even though all indications are that such service serving the Embassy at Habana is free from illicit tampering.

With reference to the contact of this office with Mr. ROBERT LYNCH, Private Secretary to Secretary of State STETTINIUS, the writer introduced himself to Mr. LYNCH at the Embassy reception. Mr. LYNCH was most gracious and drew the writer aside for conversation, the gist of which was that he had been extremely favorably impressed with the Bureau's personnel in Mexico City and he was giving serious thought to the possibility of the Department of State's adopting a new personnel program whereunder it would emulate the Bureau in selecting candidates for the Foreign Service. may be noted that during the evening the writer also was advised by several other members of the visiting group of the very favorable impression which had been left with them by the Bureau's personnel in Mexico. Mr. LYNCH made it a point to personally take the writer over to where Secretary STETTINIUS was standing and there introduce him on a somewhat special basis. However, the Secretary of State was so occupied with persons in conversation with him that the writer did not have an opportunity for extensive remarks.

During the course of the evening Mr. LYNCH was also busy at the hotel handling administrative matters concerning the baggage and travel of the party. Special Agents McAteer and Lucas were introduced to him and he was advised that they would be available throughout the night for any aid they might be able to furnish. Thereafter these Agents were of no little service and I believe Mr. LYNCH was quite favorably impressed both with their knowledge of the handling of details of the visit and also with their desire to be of the utmost assistance.

Reference is made to Bureau letter of April 2, 1945 addressed to the Legal Attaché at Bogota, Colombia, a copy of which was sent to this office. Referenced letter requested that the Bureau be advised with respect to the attitude and desires of the local United States Ambassador as to the investigation and distribution of political information by the Legal Attaché.

It is believed the practice in this Embassy meets with the Bureau's desires in so far as the relations of this office with the Ambassador are concerned. This office keeps apprised of routine political developments as obtained by the Embassy both through-frequent-conferences which the Ambassador has with his officers and through the routing of copies of the Embassy's political dispatches which go to Washington. office has followed the practice of advising the Bureau of this material received from the Embassy whenever it is deemed to have sufficient importance. Depending upon its interest, this material is submitted either by cover letter or by radio.

With regard to political developments which are obtained through the application of investigative procedures, this office from time to time furnishes the Bureau and the Ambassador with information which is received from informants and which is deemed of sufficient interest. Because this office, in so far as the Embassy is concerned, is primarily responsible for reporting all matters having to do with lare deeply involved in the contemporary political scene, there is frequent occasion for furnishing information of a semi-political nature and Trov as obtained by the Bureau's The Ambassador seems to Value this various_ material quite highly, and we endeavor to keep him currently. informed. This office also from time to time furnishes the Ambassador with information of a political nature which involves Communist operations in Cuba, this information being obtained almost exclusively from Confidential Informants. Here too it may be said that the Ambassador seems to value these contributions highly.

From the foregoing, it is believed that a very sound working basis has been established here in the Embassy with a free exchange of pertinent information. This office has, of course, at all times kept in mind the Bureau's desires so that no distribution would be made of information which would lead to criticism of the Bureau's work in this field. It is believed that political information furnished to the Bureau in the past has usually reflected the local distribution which had been made; in the future particular attention will be devoted so that the Bureau is at all times advised as to this local distribution.



I talked with Ambassador Yorweb today, and, of course, assured him that the FBI office in Havana Will cooperate fully with him in connection with our work.

For your information, Ambassador Morweb is well known to me and to the Bureau. He was United States Ambassador in Lima, Peru, at the time of the inception of the SIS program and frankly there was some difficulty and suspicion at first caused in large part by an ill advised letter dispatched by open mail to the Bureau by a former Special Employee setting forth derogatory information and charges concerning the Ambassador, personal in nature. Following the above unfortunate occurrence we were able to establish an office in the United States Embassy in Lima during May of 1942 and such office continues to date. Former Special Agent Herold Judgil was the Legal Attache from May, 1942, until Wovember, 1943, he being succeeded by Special Agent Charles Echabb, who, as you know, continues in Lima at the present time. Following the establishment of a Legal Attache in the Embassy, Ambassador Morweb has been increasingly cooperative and helpful. He has in the past manifested an aparently sincere admiration of Bureau work and Bureau personnel. He seems to have a very sympathetic understanding with regard to our problems. etc. Ambassador Norwab was transferred from Lima, Feru, to Lisbon, Portugal, as United States Ambassador in May, 1944. Since that time he has worked in very cooperative fashion with Legal Attache Do. nis A. Flynn and Addistant Legal Attache Eugene L. Padberg, both of whom are stationed in the American Embassy at Lisbon as FBI Liaison officials. The Ambassador seems to be keenly interested in the work performed by our legal ttaches abroad and he does like to be kept confidentially well informed concerning all matters of interest to the Chief of the Mission by Tame Logal Attacha.

The above individual has been in charge of an extensive survey in which he has been aided by Representatives #910 and 445. He and the other representatives have until now been using the apartment of Special Agent HARRY E. WILSON and this apartment, it will be recalled, was rented on a basis whereby the Bureau has been paying a share of the rental in view of the official business to which the premises have been dedicated. During the last ten days it came to the writer's attention that possibly this apartment had been utilized long enough in so far as security was concerned, and that it would be well to seek another address. There was also some possibility and some feeling on the part of the representatives that unidentified strangers were exhibiting an interest in the apartment and its occupants.

Accordingly, I instructed Representative #809 to secure a new apartment which would at least temporarily be used in the same manner; that is, as a meeting place for combined work with the other two representatives, and as a place at which to contact various confidential informants. The use of the premises is substantial and the representatives work together daily.

Representative #809 has now leased an apartment at 259 M Street, between 19th and 21st in Habana, on a three-months lease for \$105.00 a month, furnished. In view of the emergency which was necessitating an immediate withdrawal from the other apartment and in view of the absolute need for a working place for these three representatives, I advised Representative #809 to go ahead and rent the apartment in question and the Bureau would make an equitable settlement on the rental. living accommodations for #809. Subject: Relations with Colonel Meon R. Tausch and Captain Edward J. Ruff: Administrative

Reference is made to Havana letter to the Eureau dated July 19, 1945, captioned as above, a copy of which was designated for your office.

I wish to clarify the fact that relations between the Bureau and Captain Edward J. Ruff have proved Enff to be unreliable and unprincipled in carrying out his duties. Recently it was determined that Captain Ruff was responsible for a report sent to MIS in Washington, D. C., to the effect that information had been received from "sources of varying reliability" that a Burcau agent. formerly assigned to the Havanz office, had accepted a substantial amount of money to prevent the internment of a wealthy European refugee in Guba. Captain Ruff reported this rumor was known to all the higher officials of the Cuban police and was believed by some of them to the detriment of the Bureau. He also commented that while many cliens less cuspicious than the refugee involved had been interned in Cuba, this refugee was let alone.

A thorough and complete investigation of these allegations proved them toube false. The allegation regarding the payment of money to a Bureau representative originated from a completely unreliable Cuban source who is mentall Singound and who had a vicious hatred toward the Cuban national police and the Burgu agent involved. The rumor was not known among the higher officials of the Cuban police and was not believed by anyone, and Bureau relations with the Cuban authorities were not affected. Meither was there any indication that the refugee involved was ever considered for interment. nor ever believed dangerous. The statements emanating from Ruff can therefore be classified as entirely untrue and as having been reported with a complete lack of principle. As a further indication of his character, Buff attempted to influence the Bureau representative to "get the whole matter on record" as a complaint from a personal enemy of the refugee. after investi-Mr. Tolson and interrogation, had shown that Ruff's information was false.

> It is desired that you be extremely cautious in dealing with both Ruff and Colonel Egon R. Tausch and any indication that these individuals are attempting to violate the Delimitation bigreement or otherwise act in an unfriendly manner toward the office should be brought to my attention

immediately. You are instructed to be particularly slert to the proved unreliability and erratic nature of Suff as well as the recorded unreliability of Colonel Tausch.

Both you and the Havana office are instructed to destroy this letter and reference correspondence after the contents thereof have been appropriately considered.

Colonel EGON R. TAUSCH was formerly Military Attaché in the American Embassy in Habana, Cuba. He is presently, and has been for some months, American Military Attaché in Montevideo, Uruguay. Captain EDWARD J. RUFF is presently serving as Assistant Military Attaché in the American Embassy in Habana, Cuba, but Captain RUFF is shortly departing for Montevideo, Uruguay, to serve in the Office of the Military Attaché under Colonel TAUSCH, this transfer appearing to be at the direct request of TAUSCH. By copy of the instant communication, the Montevideo Office is being confidentially advised of the experience of the Bureau's representatives in Habana, Cuba with the two above-captioned individuals.

Under date of January 7, 1944, the Legal Attaché at Ciudad Trujillo, Dominican Republic, advised the Legal Attaché in Habana, Cuba that shortly Colonel TAUSCH would arrive in Cuba as newly appointed U. S. Military Attaché. In this communication, it was stated that the Bureau's representatives in the Dominican Republic had found Colonel TAUSCH to be boastful of his contacts in high government offices of the Dominican Republic, of the "scoops" which he obtained while serving in Mexico City, and of his other achievements. It was also reflected that though professing great respect for the Delimitation Agreement, he actually did not comply with it. He was said to be very prone to write sensational reports and to build them up. It was felt that the Colonel had little regard for the truth, but nevertheless superficially cordial relations were maintained with him.

While Colonel TAUSCH served in Habana, Cuba, he clashed on several occasions with former Legal Attaché, JACK WEST, with regard to investigative jurisdictional matters. The undersigned had no difficulties with him, possibly due to the fact that TAUSCH left Habana very shortly after the writer's arrival. The writer did have an opportunity to note, however, that TAUSCH seemed to be extremely unpopular among Embassy personnel. No examples of

his violating the Delimitation Agreement are recalled by the writer, and on one occasion TAUSCH did bring to this office a complaint for investigation of an espionage nature.

Captain EDWARD J. RUFF is presently on transfer to Montevideo, Uruguay, but he has not as yet left Habana. Under date of August 15, 1944, the Legal Attaché in Ciudad Trujillo, Dominican Republic, advised the Legal Attaché in Habana that RUFF had recently been transferred from Ciudad Trujillo to Habana. It was stated that RUFF had received training under TAUSCH, and followed TAUSCH's policies very closely. It was further stated that RUFF deliberately violated the Delimitation Agreement, and was extremely active, but very incompetent. It was stated that RUFF is extremely ambitious and would take vigorous measures to advance himself.

There appears no record of any particular importance in the files of this office concerning the experience of the Bureau's representatives with Captain RUFF. However, the writer has had considerable contact with RUFF, as have other representatives in this office. For the most part, RUFF is disregarded, and the Charge d'Affaires has most confidentially stated to the writer that he will be relieved when RUFF leaves Habana, since RUFF is inclined to write too many sensational reports which have no foundation, but which require the Chargé to then write an explanatory report to the Department of State in Washington. The writer's experience has been that RUFF receives an abnormally large amount of complaints of a political and highly sensational nature. He very often discusses these immediately with representatives of the Legal Attaché's Office, but when his views are not immediately received as correct, he is inclined to feel that everyone else lacks true understanding of the situation. is not regarded as a flagrant violator of the Delimitation Agreement, but it is felt that he would easily become one if he did not think the consequences might be embarrassing. Reference is made to your letter of July 30, 1945 concerning relations with certain officers of the Office of the Military Attaché in the American Embassy in Habana.

It is desired to state that the writer in his letter of July 19, 1945 specifically did not mention the incident involving the Military Attaché's report concerning alleged bribe-taking by a Bureau agent, because the writer felt that evaluation and comments on that incident would properly come from the Bureau, which might wish to give specific instructions.

Following the investigation of conditions surrounding the Military Attaché's report, relations between the Office of the Military Attaché and the Legal Attaché have been outwardly very cordial. The writer has not made reference to the Military Attaché's report, and has been careful not to demonstrate any attitude which might be considered one of unpleasantness or indignation. Nevertheless, in spite of the outward friendliness and in spite of the almost daily contact had with the Office of the Military Attaché with its routine spirit of cooperativeness, the writer has noticed that Lieutenant Colonel WILLIAM E BOONE, who is the Acting Military Attaché, seldom loses an opportunity to insert into the conversation some remark with a double meaning of an annoying if not definitely offensive nature. remarks are usually such that a stranger would scarcely note their presence, and seem to be based upon jealousy. I feel that Colonel BOONE is still somewhat worried concerning the matter of Captain RUFF's report, and that BOONE beneath his extremely polite exterior is definitely not a friend of the Bureau.

At this time, the file copy of the instant communication, the referenced Bureau letter of July 30th, and the writer's letter of July 19, 1945 are all being destroyed. RECORDED

Reference is made to Habana letter of August 1, 1945, captioned "RELATIONS WITH EMBASSY", and advising of the relation ship of this office with Ambassador NORWEB during the first few weeks of his taking charge in Habana. It is felt that excellent relations with the Ambassador are continuing. It is further felt that the writer's initial impression that Ambassador NORWEB would leave the detail work of Embassy administration to his Counselor has been largely confirmed.

On August 16, 1945, Ambassador NORWEB held his Second Embassy Staff Conference, which was attended by approximately 20 officers of the Embassy. The Ambassador mentioned the historic international developments of the week, and after that introduction spoke of the possibility that some of the war agencies should review their work program with the thought that staff reduction could now probably be made. The Ambassador mentioned that he was very well pleased with the functioning of the various departments in the Embassy, and he then devoted his remarks to other matters.

Toward the close of his remarks, Ambassador NORWEB stated that thanks to the courtesy and thoughtfulness of the Office of the Legal Attaché, he now had an excellent directional two-band receiving antenna on the roof of the Embassy, which was for the large radio receiver which the Ambassador keeps beside his desk. For the information of the Bureau, after it had been determined that the Ambassador was desirous of having an antenna, the writer arranged with Radio Operator WILLIAM JOULE, whereby an antenna of best possible appearance and quality could be set up. A carpenter was called in who made two varnished masts, which were set in concrete, and Radio Operator, WILLIAM JOULE, then put up a two-strand antenna, with a double lead-in to the Ambassador's window where there is a two-way switch, thus permitting the Ambassador to operate his set on either one of two receiving wavelengths. The Ambassador has since the erection of this antenna spent a great deal of time using his radio, and he seems to be very happy over the results obtained 64-4461-430

On August 22nd, Ambassador NORWEB called the Legal Attaché on the telephone, stating that he was testing several of his radio receivers in his office, and he thought he had encountered two defective tubes. He wondered if any means were possible to have them checked. The writer advised that they could be checked immediately, and a few minutes later, the writer returned the two tubes to the Ambassador personally taking down to him a new replacement tube for one which had been found defective. The Ambassador expressed great appreciation for this, and once again repeated his appreciation for the antenna. He then adopted a somewhat more confidential tone, and asked the writer to sit down with him for a moment's chat.

He then stated that when he had spoken concerning personnel reductions at his staff meeting a few days previously, he had meant to follow this up by taking the writer aside and saying specifically that he did not mean that the Office of the Legal Attaché should be reduced. He added that he has now been in Habana somewhat over a month, and he has had a chance to see what the various departments within the Embassy are accomplishing. He spoke of his fine impression of the work of the Bureau under Director HOOVER, and intimated that he thought the Office of the Legal Attaché in Habana was capably handling its important work.

The Ambassador then spoke of post-war problems, and stated that he felt the Bureau had earned the right to permanent establishment in United States Embassies throughout the world in the post-war era. He explained that he is aware of the various jurisdictional difficulties which have existed between the Bureau and the Office of Strategic Services, and he said that he felt strongly that the Office of Strategic Services should be discontinued with the close of hostilities in the war. He added that it would of course be difficult to prevent the Office of Strategic Services from continuing to maintain a handful of undercover men, but these at worst would never be more than a nuisance to the various Ambassadors.

The Ambassador closed by saying that thus he felt that the Bureau had set up a war record second to none, and had in

the international field "won its spurs in battle". He wished to leave two points with me: (1) that he feels the Bureau is the logical agency to be installed on a permanent basis in the U.S. Embassies throughout the world to handle intelligence work, and (2) that he has no intention of requesting that the staff of the Office of the Legal Attaché in Habana be reduced from its present strength, and that in fact, if the Bureau, due to outside pressure in Washington, finds itself contemplating reduction in the Habana staff, the Ambassador would be most happy to go on record against such a reduction.

The writer expressed proper appreciation to the Ambassador for his complimentary remarks. Of course, the writer refrained from any controversial statements concerning the Office of Strategic Services, and it was pointed out to the Ambassador that the writer had no information as to what, if any, changes might be brought about in personnel strength due to the close of the war. The writer did suggest for the Ambassador's attention the traditional interest this Embassy has had in Communism in Cuba, and also the necessity for an adequate staff to handle the investigative phases of this problem. The Ambassador was, of course, in full accord with this.

Reference is made to Bureau Radiogram of August 30, 1945 in the above matter, which requested that the Bureau be advised as to practices which would be followed by this office in the future.

This is to advise you that the matter has not been definitively settled in the Embassy as yet as to State Department employees, as apparently no instructions of policy have issued from the Department of State. However, various Attachés' Offices have received appropriate instructions as to the fortyhour week. The writer believes it will be sufficient for a skeleton staff consisting of one agent to work from 9:00 A.M. until 6:00 P.M. on Saturday, the said agent taking a day off as provided for in the Bureau instructions. It is not believed necessary to have a clerical employee present in the office on Saturday, in view of the lack of activity, and it is felt that the same clerical employee will be of greater walue working the regular days of Monday through Friday of each week when the complete staff is present, and the volume of work is greater.

In this connection, the writer desires to respectfully point out that according to a possible interpretation of a paragraph in a State Department General Bulletin of Information on the forty-hour week, there seems to be a suggestion that employees should not be permitted to work six consecutive days in any one work week. I do not know that the law is thus in effect a five-day work week law, but should that be the case, this office would then have the agent who is scheduled to work on the Saturday of any week anticipate that day's work by being off on the Monday preceding the Saturday, instead of the first work day of the following week.

On December 10, 1945, a staff meeting was held in the office of Ambassador NORWEB, and the following subjects were discussed:

CHRISTMAS HOLIDAYS:

It was decided that in compliance with the President's recommendation, both Saturdays, December 29th and January 5th will be full work days in place of the two Mondays, December 24th and December 31st. He advised that it was his desire that all members of the staff arrange to have their employees off at the same time.

COORDINATOR'S OFFICE:

The Ambassador advised that he received word from Washington to the effect that the Coordinator's Office, which was to be disbanded, would be taken over for a temporary period of time by the State Department, and would be under the direction of the Cultural Attaché, DR. JOHN T. REID. The Ambassador is of the opinion that this is a very fortunate move because it will afford the Embassy an opportunity to continue the propaganda work which had been carried on for the past several years by the Office of the Coordinator. It was further learned that the Ambassador did not contemplate changing the headquarters of the Coordinator's Office here in Habana, but it would be under closer supervision than previously by the Embassy. The Ambassador advised in absolute confidence that the radio program and commentaries of DR. PORTELL VILA will be discontinued at the termination of 1945. However, he stated that he did not wish this to be made public at the present time. This motion was seconded by DR. REID, who was present at the staff meeting.

The Ambassador at this time took the opportunity to advise that he had during the first part of September received quite a shock when he was informed of the contemplated closing of the Legal Attaché's Office in Habana, Cuba, and the discontinuance of the SIS program. The Ambassador in continuing advised that he was of the opinion that the Office of the Legal Attaché should continue, as it has functioned very well with other branches of the Embassy, and he stated that he had informed the State Department of his opinion in writing. In continuing, the Ambassador stated that even though all the other Legal Attaché offices in the Western Hemisphere were closed, the offices at Mexico City and Habana should be kept open at all costs. The Ambassador stated that on December 5th, he had been informed by writer that the President had made an appropriation for the continuance of the SIS program. The Ambassador stated he was more than glad to be able to inform the Embassy staff of this news, and stated that the office at the present time-was under the supervision-of-writer. The Ambassador spent quite a few minutes eulogizing the Office of the Legal Attaché in their efforts to combat subversive movements, and acting as an informative agency for the various Embassies.

In continuing, the Ambassador stated that he had received word that the former Legal Attaché, JOHN SPEAKES, who had been very cooperative with the Embassy officials, had been transferred, and would not return to Habana, Cuba.

At the termination of this speech praising the work performed by the Legal Attaché, the Ambassador for the first time since writer has come in contact with him openly stated that one fear that exists in the hearts of most Americans is Communism, the investigation of which is being well handled by the Bureau and the offices of the Legal Attachés in South America. MR. AMBASSADOR stated that if at any time any of the agencies of the Embassy desired information relative to an individual's political tendencies, particularly his leftist tendencies, that he could contact the Legal Attaché's Office, and they would be able to inform him on said matter.

Re: RELATIONS WITH U. S. AMBASSADOR HENRY NORWEB: ADMINISTRATIVE.

GENERAL HURLEY'S ATTACK OF STATE DEPARTMENT OFFICIALS:

The Ambassador spoke a short time relative to the recent attack by General HURLEY against various individuals attached to the State Department. The Ambassador stated that he admired General HURLEY for his fine work and as an individual. However, he believed that some of the remarks made by HURLEY were unjustified and that they could not be proven if taken to court. MR. NORWEB advised that he had been keeping close watch on this matter, and had corresponded several times with the State Department in Washington, and was of the opinion that this matter would be dropped in the very near future. The Ambassador stated that he is of the opinion that there are many individuals assigned to the Foreign Service and within the State Department's headquarters in Washington, D. C., who are quite capable of performing the task assigned to them, and definitely have their feet on the ground.

CUBAN-U.S. RELATIONS:

Relative to this subject, the Ambassador stated that he has of recent date been in contact with the Cuban Foreign Minister, INOCENTE ALVAREZ relative to the collecting of lend-lease funds. MR. AMBASSADOR stated that ALVAREZ either played ignorant, or is ill-informed relative to lend-lease material. It was ascertained that the Foreign Office in Habana, Cuba informed the Ambassador that they have endeavored to obtain a complete list of the purchases made by the Cuban Government through lend-lease, but their offices in Washington, D. C. have been unable to inform them properly because of the fact that they failed to keep accurate figures.



You are advised that as No. 7172 is occupying living quarters, the rent of which is paid by the Bureau, it will be necessary to deduct forty per cent of his Living and Quarters Allowance. This procedure is prescribed by the regulations governing the payment of such Living and Quarters Allowances which have the effect of law and must be followed by the Bureau.

The Bureau realizes that No. 7172 is not residing in this apartment by choice. However, it is felt that even with a deduction of forty per cent of his Living and Quarters Allowance, he will be obtaining living quarters at a most reasonable cost. The Bureau will not insist that No. 7172 continue to occupy these quarters. This is to advise that Mr. MORRIS HUGHES, Administrative Officer to this Embassy, recently advised me that in response to a circular request from the Department of State the Embassy was preparing a summary of available communications which might be utilized by the Embassy in time of emergency. In this Embassy this would include cable facilities through the naval base at Guantanamo Bay and special telegraph facilities of the Military Attache.

For the additional information of the Bureau the United States Navy has been operating a short-wave transmitter in the Embassy building proper under the direction of the Gulf Sea Frontier. The purpose of this transmitter is limited entirely to ship arrivals and departures in Habana, and it is not contemplated that these radio facilities will continue in operation for more than two months in the future

Mr. HUGHES incorred as to whether the existence of our facilities might be brought to the attention of the State Department in connection with this survey. I advised Mr. HUGHES that our facilities have of course been offered to the Embassy through the Ambassador and are always available in time of emergency for the transmission of Embassy traffic. In connection with making this information available to the Department in the above connection, however, I suggested to Mr. HUGHES that he adopt the following phraseology in the preparation of his answer to the Department's query:

"The special communications facilities of the Legal Attache are available to this Embassy in time of emergency for the transmission of Embassy traffic." $\mathcal C$

As a matter of information to the Bureau, this is to advise of the recent assignment and arrival in Habana, Cubá, of Colonel EDGAR E. GLENN as Military Attaché to this Embassy. Colonel GLENN succeeds Colonel WILLIAM E. BOONE, who has returned to the United States. At the time of Colonel BOONE'S departure from Habana his future plans were unsettled. However, he advised me personally that he desired to remain in the Regular Army and had submitted his name for consideration in this respect.

Colonel GLENN has advised me that he has been in the Regular Army since the last war and served considerable time in World War II in the Far East as an intelligence officer on the staff of General Claire L. Chennault. Preliminary contacts with Colonel GLENN have been very pleasant and he gives every indication of being extremely cooperative. He does not speak the Spanish language and has little or no knowledge of Latin American affairs. To date he has been very frank in stating that he hopes he can rely on this office to a very great extent inasmuch as his own staff has recently been depleted and his personal knowledge of Cuba is extremely limited.

Questions of distribution have been discreetly discussed with Colonel GLENN and it is my belief that this office will receive greater cooperation in the future with regard to reports prepared by the Military Attaché in Habana, which are of interest to this Office and the Bureau.





In order that the proper adjustment may be made in my living and quarters allowance, you are advised that the writer moved into this apartment on July 27, 1946.



This is to advise that on October 10, 1947 the Offices of the Legal Attaché, American Embassy, Havana, Cuba were moved from Room #414 in the Embassy Building at 61 Obispo to Room #215 in the same building.

This change has given us two rooms and considerably more space and is generally a much more desirable location than the Room #414 which was a single office, small, and of irregular shape.

The move was made in connection with a general rearranging of the office space in the Embassy building. A Mr. JOE MUSICK of the Foreign Buildings Office (and apparently a Security Officer) has been in Havana for the past few weeks and in the course of his work there has been several office changes. Our office is now located in a part of the building which he has referred to as a grouping of "the permanent outside agencies" in the Embassy. By this statement he refers to our office, the U. S. Treasury Department, and the U. S. Department of Justice Immigration and Naturalization office.

At the time this letter was prepared our new telephone lines had not been installed. When our new numbers are known the Bureau will be advised by letter.

floor plan of the Embassy building and is submitted, not as a complete scale drawing, but only a sketch to show the location of our new offices.



The mail room of the Embassy here has furnished the following concerning the mail schedules out of Havana:

There is an incoming pouch from Washington every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday. The Saturday pouch is not opened until Monday. There is only one confidential pouch to Washington which goes on Mondays, and each day there is an unaccompanied air sack which contains unclassified mail.

Reference is Havana letter of October 11 to the Bureau advising that our offices have been moved in the Embassy building from single room #414 to double room #215.

In connection with this move it was necessary to cut the wall which divided the room #215 into two offices, and install a connecting door. Formerly the large sized room #215 had been divided with a wall without a door inasmuch as there were individual doors to each section after the division. These individual outlets to each half of our office lead to the Treasury Department offices on one side, and to the Immigration and Naturalization offices on the other and both are now securely locked from the inside.

Consul General MORRIS N. HUGHES has now asked if it would be possible for us to pay the cost of constructing the door in our new offices. The total cost for cutting the wall, installing the door, and painting and varnishing is \$52.50. His reason for asking us to assume this obligation is that the Embassy's own funds for alteration work is hardly sufficient to handle this and all the other alterations being made in the Embassy, and HUGHES thought was that inasmuch as this work was for our benefit that we might be able to take care of this expense.

Reurlet dated January 29, 1948, in which you informed the Euroau that Fress Wireless and Western Union advised you that charges for coded messages between Havana and Washington, D. C. are the same for groups of five whether in numbers or letters. Accordingly, the Bureau made inquiry of the Federal Communications Commission in Washington relative to this matter and the following information was received.

Press Wireless is the only commercial cable company which does not charge an additional forty per cent for coded messages in groups of five in numbers. However, all other commercial cable companies in Cuba do charge an additional forty per cent for coded number messages and, in addition, all commercial cable companies, including Press Wireless, charge the additional forty per cent at all other foreign cities where the Bureau's liaison offices are located.

The Commission pointed out that the reduced rates for Press Wireless apply only to North bound traffic and. further, that the Cuban government is presently considering a rate increase to equal the present rates charged for South bound cable traffic. In the event this proposal is approved, the present reduced Press Wireless rate may possibly be disallowed.

For your further information, It 19 the Bureau's understanding that Press Wireless is primarily a press carrior and, therefore, its main function is to handle press carcommunications [10Nffoseff0], during the war Press Vireless was allowed to handle reversent communications due to the emercency which authority is still in existence. Reference is made to your letter of March 22, 1948, entitled lations with Embassy (Havana, Cuba) - Administrative."

For your information, the Attorney General and the President of the United States have ruled that the Bureau has the responsibility for conducting loyalty investigations of civilian employees in the executive branch of the Federal Government. The question has arisen as to how this responsibility can be discharged in foreign countries, and this problem is now being discussed by the Attorney General with representatives of the Office of Defense and the State Department. It is contemplated that the theatre commander will be responsible for conducting these investigations in occupied countries. In unoccupied countries, each branch of the service will be responsible for its own civilian employees. vestigations of all other civilian employees will be referred to the State Department for handling by whatever agency is available for this purpose.

HUTCHINSON said he is the officer responsible for determining the loyalty of the employees of this Embassy, and added that he has no means of investigating the loyalty of the persons assigned here.

HUTCHINSON asked if it would be possible for this office to assist him in investigations to determine the loyalty of American and Cuban employees assigned to this Embassy. He was advised of the Eureau's position in this matter, and he expressed his understanding of the reasons why it would not be possible for this office to conduct such investigations. He thereupon stated it is his intention to write the U. S. State Department to ask them to make an appropriate request of the Eureau as well as of in order to have one or the other agency assist in making such investigations.

In view of our position here as Legal Attacho of the Embassy it is believed that any investigative activity on our part to determine the activities of any persons assigned to the Embassy would seriously jeopardize our position within the Embassy. The foregoing data are being furnished the Eureau for informative purposes only.

Plans for Emergency Action

Reference: Department's Secret Circular Airgram of April 6, 8:40 am.

Forsons to whom this memorandum is addressed have now all read the Department's sceret airgram of April 6, 1949 on the above subject. Mr. Hallory has suggested that we form a committee as soon as possible to formulate detailed plans to be submitted to the Department together with an estimate of the expenditure which will be involved. In order that we may have something to work on, the following is submitted as a tentative plan in line with suggestions rade by various people who have read the instruction.

INTERNAL ETHICK

This subject deals with the care and protection of the imerican commity in general in event of an emergency. There are three types of emergency: (a) these resulting from natural causes; (b) civil riot, and war; and (c) war between sovereign states.

The only type emergency with which we would have to deal, arising from natural causes, would be hurricane. Most of the 1800 American residents of Habraa have sufficient knowledge of hurricanes and would have sufficient warning so that they coult take gare of themselves. However, in the event of a severe hurricane which would disrupt water, food and medical supplies and public utilities, the plan which is suggested for civil strife could be used.

Heat people, herever, do maintain a stack of same i code; therefore, in the case of exacuation to a concentrated point, the earliest eitistas should be requested to bring such items with them as extra clothing, hitchen at real and foodstuffs.
- 4. Evacuation point. In the event of an appropriate projection, the control areas of I done would prohibly to too dangerous to

permit the use of the Chancery. Likewise, most Americans reside in Vedado, Miramar or Country Club. This being the case, it would seen advisable to choose an evacuation point in Country Club as being as far away from the city as possible. Likewise, Country Club

Space and water would also have to be taken into consideration. This being the case, I would recommend the evacuation point to be the Embassy Residence from where imericans could be directed to nearby homes such as those, for example, of Colonel Glenn, Allen Stewart, Colonel Batterton, Mr. Hughes, In the event of an emergency, certain officers should be designated to proceed immediately to the Embassy Residence to prepare the groundwork there and to notify other officers to begin to work with the evacuation. To assist in this purpose, I would suggest that two dozen up-to-date street maps of Habana and suburbs be purchased, of which at least half should be kept in an accessible place at the Residence, the balance being held in the Chancery.

The above would also apply in the event of emergency in case of war but in the event of war evacuation to the United States would depend upon the state of shipping and the number of aircraft available at that time.

INTERNAL EMERGENCY

The internal security covers two points: (1) the personal security of Embassy personnel, and (2) physical security of confidential and valuable documents.

With respect to personnel security, that could be covered in the plan outlined above for the general American community. Evacuation of Embassy personnel to the United States in the event that normal transportation facilities have broken down should. I think, be designated the duty of the Hilitary Attaché for Air and the Naval Attaché for Air.

Internal security covers (1) confidential code, (2) confidential documents, and (3) such items as seals, fee stamps, cash, negotiable instruments and bank drafts. In respect to this subject, I would like to make the following suggestions:

- 1. That at least four officers in the Embassy become familiar with the Department's instruction with respect to the destruction of codes and clohers and that they at all times know the method of getting into the code room. I would suggest that the officers to be entrusted with this should be the Deputy Chief of Mission, the Consul Ceneral, the Security Officer and, for the present at least, Mr. Marvin because he lives so close to the Chancery.
- 2. The same officers would likewise be entrusted with the duty of destroying as far as possible confidential archives. To assist in such destruction, we should secure and have handy a large drum of kerosene handy to the incinerator.

The guard on duty should be given strict instructions in event of riot to close the front doors, to see that the stairway grill is closed and locked and to bring the elevators to an upper floor.

Each Embassy section chief will be responsible for the safekceping of seals and fee stamps entrusted to him and for their destruction in case of necessity. If section chiefs and their deputies cannot get to the Chancery, the officers entrusted with destruction of the code will know where to get the combinations to other safes so that they can accomplish this destruction.

With regard to the destruction of negotiable instruments and, if necessary, cash, the above-mentioned officers should be familiar with the places where such cash and instruments are kept.

It is suggested that the officers of related agencies and of the Attaches follow the above procedure.



BACKGROUND:

As you are aware, the office of the Legal Attache in Havana, Cuba is located in the American Embassy building. The rooms presently occupied were taken over in 1947 at the termination of the SIS program when it was possible for the Bureau's representative to occupy reduced space.

FACTS:

The Embassy Administrative officer has advised the Legal Attache that reallocations of space in the Embassy are being made and the Bureau's representatives will occupy Rooms 422 and 423 which are more desirable than the present location.

Rooms 422 and 423 were formerly part of the space occupied by the Bureau's agents during SIS and at that time certain mechanical installations were made in those rooms. Because of the natural damage caused by those installations, the Legal Attache has advised that it will be necessary to repair and renovate the two rooms before they are suitable for occupancy. The Administrative officer of the Embassy has requested that the Bureau's representative arrange for the funds for such repairs, as well as for the moving costs. Mrs. DOROTHY WATSON, in charge of the Embassy Mail Room here, advised that only one test has been made in recent months to determine the time needed to transmit air mail from Washington to Havana. Embassy file concerning this matter reflects that this test consisted of sending an encrypted airgram from the State Department in Washington to the Embassy in Havana by straight air mail. It appears / that the communication was posted in Washington at 3:00 p.m., March 14, 1949, and was received in the Embassy here at 2:30 p.m., March 15. DEECH PRODUCTION OF THE

Mrs. WATSON stated that the State Department has been following a policy of forwarding unclassified communications to the Embassy here by direct air mail when the mailing of such communications occurs on weekends. said that she had maintained no records as to the exact time elapsing for these communications to arrive in Havana from Washington, but from general observation she was of the opinion that it takes an average of two days for such communications to arrive after mailing in Washington.

Subject: USE OF ENCRYPTED AIRGRAMS Administrative

Reference is made to the Bureau's cablegram dated August 30, 1949, and the reply for your Office relative to the above-captioned matter.

Airgrams have been in use in correspondence with the Legal Attache's Office in Mexico City for the past four months, and have been found to work out satisfactorily. It has, therefore, been decided to extend the use of airgrams to correspondence between the Bureau and your Office. These airgrams are, in essence, cablegrams which are sent by air mail, thus effecting a definite saving over the effenced of transmitting such messages by cablegram, and, at the same time furnishing a method of communication in instances where the matter is too urgent to be handled by diplomatic pouch, and not so urgent that in the message must be sent by cablegram. It is desired that you use this airgram system whenever possible, limiting cablegrams to urgent matters which must be handled more expeditiously than would be possible through the use of air mail channels.

In the preparation and receipt of airgrams, the following rules should be followed:

> 1. A series of cipher pads presently in use between your Office and the Bureau should be designated for airgram use to separate them from the pads utilized for cable traffic. This will avoid the confusion which might arise if the same pads were used for both cablegrams and airgrams, and if the cable were dispatched subsequent to the transmittal of an airgram and received prior to the delivery of the airgram by mail.

2. The cipher pads goudesignated should be conspicuously stamped "AIRGRAM" to avoid confusion.

Reference is Bureau Service Message of November 8, 1949, calling our attention to the fact that our Service Message dated November 5, utilizing Cipher Sheet 4375, and our cablegram of November 7 utilizing Cipher Sheet 4376, did not contain serial numbers.

As noted by the Bureau these two cables were sent via commercial wire(Press Wireless) direct to the Bureau rather than through the State Department.

Our Service Message 11-5-49 using Cipher Sheet 4375 was sent direct because at the hour it was prepared, late Saturday afternoon, there was no one in the Embassy code room to furnish us with the Department serial number. Our message as sent direct to the Bureau code address "USINVEST" did carry our own serial number and the message as sent to the local Press Wireless started "85th 00024 04375..."

Our cablegram of 11-7-49 was also sent direct to the Bureau for the reason it was an urgent matter. The message was prepared at 10:30 P. M., 11-7-49, and there was no one in the Embassy code room to furnish us with their Department serial number. For that reason this cable was sent direct to the Bureau's code address. That message also carried a serial number with message starting "86th 00041 04376..."

I called on the Havana office of Press Wireless and there examined their message files. The manager informed me that our messages of November 5 and 7 were transmitted as submitted to his office. The local manager said that if any portion of our messages were not furnished to the



You will note that the average time for the Air Courier mail Havana to the Bureau runs around five days, while the Air Courier mail from the Bureau to Havana averages around five and one half days. The average time on communications sent via the "Air Sack" from Havana to the Bureau averages around six days. It has been noted that in frequent instances reports and letters emanating from your office for the Bureau carry additional copies which are flagged for the Eureau mail room with the request that those copies be transmitted to various domestic field offices. In some instances the copies of those reports or letters are indicated for the information of the field office concerned and in other instances they contain leads or requests for action by those offices. examples of this procedure are the reports submitted by your office in the case of dated at Havana.

In the latter case, the two copies were forwarded to the Bureau for transmittal to the San Juan, Puerto Lico, for its information, and in the former case two copies were indicated for the Miami Office for action. Other instances have been noted in the past when copies of your communications were indicated for the New York Office with the request that action be taken and the results thereof furnished to you.

It is believed that the above procedure of setting out leads for domestic field offices and forestding copies to those offices for action is highly undesirabled The Miami, Florida Office is the only Field Division which has arrangements through which information can be furnished directly teoposhence then only in extreme emergencies or in matters of a sufficiently non-confidential nature to permit the use of the open mails. Shaddick as all other domestic field offices can transmit information to your office only by way of the Bureau and the established diplomatic mail channels, you can readily understand why the procedure utilized by you may well result in confusion and unnecessary delay in obtaining the material you need.

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In the future, therefore, you should address any requests which you may have for information from the domestic field to the Bureau where those requests may be properly channeled and the replies forwarded to you through the appropriate means. Thenever it may be desirable to furnish copies of reports or communications to any of the Bureau's domestic offices, you should enclose sufficient copies of the report or letter to the Bureau so that those copies can be forwarded by cover letter containing appropriate instructions if necessary. In instances wherein you may desire to have leads followed in the domestic field relative to cases pending in your office you should set forth those leads in a cover memorandum attached to the report so that appropriate action can be taken at the Seat of Covernment.

The above instructions which must be followed by your office in order to expedite the handling of pending matters and to insure adequate supervision at the Seat of Government should not, however, be interpreted as changing your special arrangements with the Miami Office for the transmittal of information in emergency cases or in instances where the material involved can safely be trusted to your means of communicating with that office.

Clair Spears, the Bureau's Legal Attache at Havana, Cuba, called this afternoon and referred to his letter to the Bureau dated December 18, 1950, in which he set forth certain reasons to support his recommendation that he be authorized to proceed to Headquarters for the purpose of talking over certain problems which have arisen in connection with his office.

Mr. Spears stated that if possible he would like to be advised whether the Bureau would authorize his coming to Washington in the immediate future inasmuch as he felt now is an appropriate time, rather than later, since the work in Havana will pick up appreciably in the future.

I told Mr. Spears that his letter had been received yesterday afternoon, that it was receiving appropriate consideration, and that he would be advised of the Bureau's decision by cablegram as soon as possible.

BACKGROUND:

Mohr Special Agent W. Clair Spears, the Tele. Room Bureau's Legal Attache in Havana, Cuba, was last Nease at the Seat of Government in September, 1949, when he attended In-Service classes. Mr. Spears has now requested authority to return to the Seat of Government for two or three days' conferences in connection, with the work of his office. He has indicated that if authorization for such conferences is given he would prefer to make the trip to the Bureau as soon as convenient or immediately after January 1, 1951; in order to return to his post of assignment shortly after the first of the year, inasmuch as the peak work load of his office is customarily reached shortly after that time.

FACTS:

In view of the general situation today and because of certain problems peculiar to his office, Mr. Spears believes that it would facilitate the present and future operations of the Bureau in Cuba if he could return to the Seat of Government for brief conferences in the near future.

Among the problems which Mr. Spears feels it necessary to discuss at the Bureau are the following:

- 1. The relatively large expenditures which will be incurred by his office in connection with the transfer to the new Embassy building in Havana in November, 1951, and which should be taken into consideration prior to the preparation of the next budget.
- 2. Bureau war plans as they relate to the Havana Office.

3. Investigative aids and discussion with the Bureau officials relative to utilizing a limited amount of technical equipment in connection with certain types of investigations conducted by the Legal Attache's office in Havana.

Mr. Spears has also indicated that he has several other minor matters which he would like to discuss with interested Bureau officials in connection with his work in Havana.

It is felt that two or three days' conferences with Mr. Spears at the Seat of Government would be of decided benefit to the Bureau's coverage in Cuba. change which has occurred in the international situation since Mr. Spears was last at the Seat of Government and the present emergency require that the Bureau's Legal Attachesbe well briefed in current Bureau policies and major problems. It is further believed that brief conferences such as those afforded SAC's at the Seat of Government would be very beneficial to the Bureau's Legal Attaches in handling the problems which arise at their offices and in keeping them well abreast of Bureau policies and objectives. Mr. Spears presence at the Seat of Government for two or three days would present an opportunity to brief him on such Bureau policies as well as give him the opportunity to discuss the problems of his office with Bureau officials.

RECOMMENDATION:

In view of the changed international situation since Mr. Spears last conference at the Bureau together with the resultant problems which have arisen and which will continue to arise, it is believed that Mr. Spears should be authorized to return to the Seat of Government as soon as possible after January 1, 1961, for two or three days' conferences.

There is attached a proposed cablegram to Mr. Spears incorporating the above authorization.

In view of the general situation today and because of certain problems peculiar to this office I believe it would be very beneficial to our present and future operations here if I could call at the Bureau in the near future to discuss certain of our problems and gain the benefit of the counsel of Bureau officials.

Among the things I would like to discuss personally with Bureau officials are the following:

- 1. We have an administrative problem in which it will be necessary to anticipate our needs well in advance in view of the fact this matter will require an expenditure of such size that it should be taken into consideration prior to the preparation of the next budget. This matter has to do with the moving of our office (November 1951) into the new Embassy building now under construction.
- 2. Re Bureau War Plans as they relate to the Havana office. In connection with this matter I would appreciate the opportunity to discuss one important phase relative to special arrangements for ordinary and emergency communications with the Bureau.
- 3. Investigative aids: In certain of our investigative problems here we believe our work would be considerably improved if we could arrange for use of a limited amount of sound equipment and I would like to determine what equipment of this type could be made available to us and also determine the Bureau's policy with respect to our utilizing such investigative aids in Cuba.
- 4. Informant coverage. This matter is of utmost importance and we realize the great necessity for a considerable expansion as rapidly as possible. However, in this activity we have certain "jurisdictional restrictions." I would like to discuss this matter in order to be better equipped to handle this particular problem, especially in the event world conditions further deteriorate.

In addition to these main topics I have other matters of minor importance which I would like to discuss with interested Bureau officials.

In the event the Bureau deems it desirable for the writer to come to Washington, I would prefer to make the trip as soon as convenient or immediately after January 1, 1951 inasmuch-as shortly thereafter we usually RECURDED - 29 have our peak work load. 1665

In our present office, all furniture except the file cabinets, which are new and were recently sent from the Bureau, and one desk, has been loaned to us and this furniture, with the exception of the new file cabinets, is very old and dilapidated. In the new building, we should re-equip our office with new furniture in keeping with the mest of the Embassy as they are procuring all new equipment. The Legal Attache was instructed to furnish to the Bureau a list of his needs in this respect.

The space we now have consisting of old quarters was in a neat and clean condition. The paint in the offices was peeling due to the "big blow" which occurred about the end of January. I suggested to the Legal Attache that he have the offices re-painted as it will be at least six months, if not longer, before we can move into our new offices. The owner of the building has refused to do the painting and it will cost the Legal Attache \$28 to have the two rooms presently assigned to his re-painted. assigned towns re-painted.

There is no problem of security. The Legal Attache has a safe and two safe-type cabinets with combination locks furnished to him by the Bureau. The Legal Attache regularly changes the combinations.

ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

The total number of pending cases in the office is 64. There are 45 security-type cases and 19 other types. A representative number of cases were examined insofar as time would permit. There was noted a tendency to submit information by letter rather than by report. The Legal Attache was instructed to submit reports in every case where possible. It was also noted that a number of cases are delinquent, but it was determined this was in general due to the fact linformation. that it was necessary to wait for ____ b7D In the file on the Communist Party of Cuba, it was noted the last report had been submitted on March 7, 1951. A monthly summary is submitted in report form in this case. Individual cases are maintained on the top leaders of the party, but many other individual cases on active important Communists could be opened. The Legal Attache



To advise you of the proposed office space to be assigned to the Legal Attache in Havana, Cuba, in the new Embassy building, and to recommend that consideration be given to purchasing needed office equipment.

BACKGROUND

As you are aware, the United States Government is presently constructing a new Embassy in Havana, Cuba. During the time Legal Attache W. C. Spears was at the Seat of Government in January, 1951, he discussed the needs of his office for furniture so that the Legal Attache's Office, in appearance, might conform with the standards of the Embassy as a whole.

FACTS

Mr. Spears submitted a newspaper clipping of the architect's drawing for the new Embassy building, together with a diagram of the second floor (third level, inasmuch as the ground floor is not counted in Cuba), where his offices will be located. He has also furnished a copy of the Embassy memorandum advising of the allocation of space to the Legal Attache's Office, and a scale drawing to show the tentative plans for furniture arrangement.

It appears that the Legal Attache's Office is being assigned desirable space and will be given three rooms, each V10 X 142 feet in size.

It is expected that the Legal Attache will move into the new building on or about November 1, 1951. The Embassy is presently obtaining shipments of new furniture for their offices, and the Administrative Officer has indicated the Embassy desires to have uniformity of furnishings throughout the building, if such can be arranged conveniently by the other agencies having representatives in the Embassy. Most of the furniture presently being used by the Legal Attache's Office was purchased locally

The offices of the Legal Attache, Havana, are presently located in the building housing the American Embassy Chancery at Obispo 61, Havana.

The U. S. Government is presently constructing a new Chancery Building in Havana. We have been informed by the Embassy Administrative Officer that we should be prepared to move into the new building on or about November 1, 1951.

We have been allocated three adjoining offices (142' x 10' each) in a desirable location on the second floor of the new building. The second floor is actually the third floor inasmuch as the ground level floor is not counted in the floor numbering.

We will be required to assume the expenses in connection with the physical move of our office equipment and furniture and for the expense of the transfer of our telephones. We will advise as to the estimates of such costs as soon as the Embassy Administrative Officer furnishes us with the figures.

As you will see in the enclosures, the new Chancery building is a modernistic structure. The Embassy is presently obtaining shipments of new furniture for their offices in the new building and it has been suggested by the Administrative Officer that it is their desire to have a uniformity of furnishings throughout the building if such can be conveniently arranged by other agencies connected with this mission.



In exchanging reports between your office and the offices of the other Legal Attaches, the Dureau has no objections to your forwarding those reports directly to the interested Legal Attache in the event it can be done safely through diplomatic pouch channels.

In the event it is not possible to transmit such reports or letters directly to the Legal Attache, you should forward to the Eureau sufficient copies of the reports or letters so that copies can be transmitted to the Legal Attache by the Bureau. You should not, however, designate any of those copies for the Legal Attache with the notation that they are being forwarded to the Bureau as was done in the report prepared by Engelal Agent Clark D. Anderson at Mavana, Cuba, captioned "Lazaro Pena Gonzalez IS-R and Cuba" under date of June 11, 1951. This method of designating copies for other Legal Attaches is undesirable inasmuch as when your report is received at the Leat of Government, it is not always possible to tell whether or not the report has actually been forwarded to the other Legal Attaches.

You should, instead, include sufficient copies for distribution to the other interested foreign offices with a statement on the Administrative Page that such copies are being furnished for possible distribution to the Legal Attaches who you believe are interested in the matter.

As you probably know, there is a Legal Attache attached to the American Embassy in Havana, and my representatives in that city are Legal Attache &. Clair Spears and Assistant Legal Attache Clark D. Anderson. That office serves entirely in a liaison capacity in connection with matters under investigation by this Bureau. If at any time, however, the Legal Attache's Office can be of any assistance to you, I trust that you will feel free to call upon them.

BACKGROUND:

As you are aware, it has been publicly announced that <u>Wr. Willard L. Beaulac</u> has been confirmed as United States Ambassador to Cuba. Mr. Beaulac succeeds Mr. Robert Butler, who resigned from that post on February 10, 1951.

FACTS:

Ambassador Beaulac has been known to the Bureau since 1944, when he became Ambassador to Paraguay. He originally entered the Foreign Service in 1921 as Vice Consul in Tampico, Mexico. He also served at Chile, Haiti, Nicaragua and Salvador. In 1937 he was appointed Counselor of the American Embassy in Havana, Cuba, and in 1941 he was transferred to Madrid, Spain, as Counselor of the Embassy.

While in Paraguay, Mr. Beaulac was extremely friendly with by the Bureau and was also very much in favor of the Bureau's SIS Program. He was definitely opposed to taking over Latin American operations in 1947. He subsequently served as Ambassador at Bogota, Colombia.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the attached letter be forwarded to Mr. Beaulac at the State Department, congratulating him upon his new appointment, and offering him the services of the Bureau's representatives in Havana.
