

It is believed that Philadelphia coverage is sufficient in Arab matters; however, attempts are constantly being made to develop additional sources among individuals knowledgeable in Arab matters.

On 10/15/68, [redacted]
[redacted] Dallas, [redacted]

[redacted] (established source), advised that he has no knowledge of terrorist Arab organizations or of any of the Arabic-speaking people, some 25 to 30 families in the Dallas area, belonging to any activist movement. [redacted] stated that he is personally acquainted with [redacted]

[redacted] he is in contact with them on an occasional basis. He advised that [redacted] a Palestinian by birth, is in charge of the Arab Information Center, Hartford Building, Dallas, Texas. He stated [redacted] is married to an American citizen and they reside at [redacted] Dallas. He states that so far as known to him, [redacted] confines his activity to the duties and responsibilities of his office.

[redacted] stated that he will be particularly alert to the possibilities of terrorist groups or individuals among the Arabic-speaking people in the Dallas area and will notify the Dallas FBI Office should any information come to his attention.

On 10/7/68, the information furnished by the Bureau in referenced letter was discussed with [redacted] Intelligence Section, Dallas Police Department. [redacted] advised he did not know of any terrorist organizations or individuals among the Arabic-speaking people in Dallas and had no such record in the files of his office.

On 10/21/68, [redacted] Anti-Defamation League of B'Nai B'rith, 908 Petroleum Building, advised he had no knowledge or record of any Arabic-speaking people or groups involved in any terrorist activities in the Dallas area. He stated his records showed that [redacted] [redacted] Arab Information Center, Dallas, had made several speeches in which he indicated a definite anti-Semitic attitude but this was to be expected.

It is felt that the sources set forth are sufficient in view of the small number of people located in the Dallas area from the Arabic-speaking states, therefore, no additional inquiries will be made at this time UACB.

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



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

The above file review failed to disclose information received from Boston established sources, the news media, or sources of other field divisions, revealing the identity of any pro-Arab organization that is currently active within the Boston Division. This file review also failed to develop information concerning anti-U.S., anti-Semitic, and/or anti-Israeli statements, demonstrations, violent threats, or other such activities engaged in by Arab students and/or pro-Arab organizations within the territory covered by the Boston Division since the Middle East crisis during the summer of 1967.

Also, there is no information available to the Boston Office indicating the presence in this area of an organization that is related directly or indirectly to the Arab commando organization known as AL-FATAH or its rival commando group, the Popular Front for Liberation of Palestine.

The Boston Office is fully aware of the Bureau's responsibilities relative to adequate informant coverage in pro-Arab organizations whose goals are inimical to the best interests of the U.S. In this regard, the Boston Office, in carrying out its daily operations, will be particularly alert to the presence of such organizations or individuals possessing pro-Arab inclinations which represent a threat to the National security of the U.S.

In reviewing communications being submitted by other field offices relative to captioned matter, the Bureau is requested to forward to this office all pertinent information received indicating the current operations of pro-Arab organizations in this Division which warrant investigation and informant coverage.

All pertinent information received by the Boston Office relative to captioned matter will be expeditiously handled. No further action being taken at this time UACB.

included children and generally represented families seeking permanent residency in the U.S. He stated that there is no concentration of Arab population in any particular area, either in the City of Los Angeles or throughout the general area.

A review of files of the Los Angeles Office concerning previous pro-Arab organizational activity in this area reflects that the United American Arab Congress (Bufile 97-5137) which had been organized to raise funds for food, clothing and medical supplies for Arab refugees following their defeat by the Israeli in the summer of 1967, is largely inactive at the present time. There is no evidence of any major Arab student activity on any campus in this area and no information has been developed regarding anti-Semitic and/or anti-Israeli statements, demonstrations or activities engaged in by Arab students since the Middle East crisis of 1967.

In view of the foregoing, informant coverage through established sources [redacted] established sources on campuses throughout the area and through Security Informants of the Los Angeles Office familiar with student and protest group activity as well as with regular CP affairs, appears adequate at this time. In the event information is received from these sources of increased pro-Arab activity, informant coverage will be developed as needed.

Referenced letter requested recipient offices to advise of the current coverage in Arab Matters, whether such coverage was sufficient and steps planned to augment such coverage, if necessary.

Detroit has been aware of and to some extent following the activities of the Arab Student Association (ASA) on the campus of Wayne State University (WSU), Detroit. Coverage of the activities of the ASA has been effected through [redacted] is currently under investigation as a PSI. She is the original source of some information and in other instances she obtains information from Arab students on the WSU campus. [redacted]

A second source utilized to cover Arab Matters in this area is [redacted] (BUfile 170-65; DEfile 170-50). This source has furnished valuable information related to some Arab activities, but has not the original source on most occasions.

Detroit will continue efforts to enhance the coverage of Arab Matters through the above two sources. The above coverage is deemed insufficient and efforts will be made to develop a source of Arab extraction who it is hoped can gain the confidence of ASA members. It is believed that the members of the ASA are all of Arab nationality.

Detroit is also conducting a survey of major college campuses in Michigan to ascertain the existence of any pro-Arab organizations capable of directing violence against officers of the U.S., participating in activities of a subversive nature, in conjunction with subversive organizations, or are raising funds for terroristic activities directed against nations friendly to the U.S.

If it is determined that any such pro-Arab organizations are active on campuses outside of Detroit, the Bureau will be informed of steps that will be taken to cover these activities.

The Chicago Division has reviewed its coverage and
feels it is adequate. First, the Chicago Division has contacted
on several occasions, one [redacted] Chicago file [redacted]

[redacted] in the Chicago area. This organization is the most active
pro-Arab group in the Chicago area and contacts with [redacted] have
elicited information from him concerning the Arab community in
general in the Chicago area. While [redacted] is not considered
a source at this time, the Chicago Division feels he may very
well become a source in the future if he remains cooperative.
If [redacted] does not qualify as a source, the Chicago Division
feels sufficient information can be derived from him in the form
of names of other individuals prominent in the OAS and the Arab
community in general from which this Division can cull the most
promising for informant coverage.

Third, the Chicago Division has recognized the inter-relationships between problems which stem from the pro-Arab organizations and other areas such as the black militant field and the Soviet and Chinese espionage fields. In this connection, it should be noted that [REDACTED] has spoken before many groups in the Chicago area which are distinctly black nationalist in nature. [REDACTED] speeches have been prominently mentioned in issues of "Muhammad Speaks", which is a Black Muslim newspaper. In addition, [REDACTED] has spoken before groups of individuals who are connected with the Socialist Workers Party and the Young Socialist League in the Chicago area.

Because of these inter-relationships, the Chicago Division has alerted individuals covering the black nationalist area as well as the Soviet and Chinese espionage areas to be alert for any information which may tie the pro-Arab organizations in the Chicago area with these aforementioned groups. To date, no concrete relationship has been ascertained concerning the OAS and the above mentioned groups with the exception that [REDACTED] has spoken to groups of Black Muslims and other groups such as the Socialist Workers Party.

The Chicago Division feels that if it can [REDACTED] [REDACTED] it will be possible to be in an excellent position to determine the innermost policy decisions of the Arab community in the Chicago area. Chicago is also constantly attempting to develop more Arab individuals who may be helpful in providing coverage.

Finally, the Chicago Division feels that informant coverage from the black nationalists and other security-type informants who may be in contact with pro-Arab groups will adequately and completely encompass the Arab community in the Chicago area.

The Chicago Division will submit as they become available, the names of new individuals being developed under this program.

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There are no other known Arab organizations in the Chicago area other than the Organization of Arab Students (OAS) which is a small group that meets infrequently and at which meetings discuss only ways of informing the United States public as to policies of the United Arab Republic, and have been described as non-violent.

On 10/28/68, [redacted] Marquette University, Milwaukee, Wis., advised that there is no recognized organization of Arab students on the campus, but he is aware that on occasion students from the Middle East countries get together for social purposes. He said there has never been any sign of political activity or other activism on the part of Arab students on the Marquette campus. He said he would advise the Milwaukee FBI Office if info relating to political activities of Arab students should come to his attention.

On 10/29/68, [redacted] University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee (UWM), Milwaukee, Wis., advised there is no Arab student group active on the UWM campus. He said that if such a group came to his attention he would closely follow their activities and report same to the FBI.

On 11/2/68, [redacted] INS, Milwaukee, advised he is in a position to interview all immigrants, individuals with permanent visas and alien students in connection with his official duties. He said that, regarding aliens from Arab countries, there exists considerable feeling regarding the Arab-Israeli situation and the role that the US has taken in the dispute. During his interviews, he said he has found no indication of an active Arab group in Wis. He concluded that the files of his office were not set up in such a manner to provide a number of aliens of Arab descent presently living within the Milwaukee Division.

Investigation to date has failed to uncover activity by Arab groups in the Milwaukee Division of the type described in relets. Due to this inactivity, the coverage provided this ethnic group is presently considered sufficient. However, due to the increased activity in this area by outside influences, the possibility of future activity definitely exists within this division, and all those sources capable of detecting change in the status of Arab groups have been alerted to note and report such change. In addition, the contact at INS will be closely maintained with the intention of developing additional info regarding activities of this nationality group.

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam, and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anticommunist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of July 24, 1968, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.



Some of the demonstrators who were picketing demanded rights for Palestinian Arabs in Israel. These demonstrators consisted of members of the Palestinian National Liberation Movement, commonly known as Al Fatah. Eight of these persons wore Al Fatah buttons which were 1 1/4 inches in diameter, red background, with a white picture of Palestine. These demonstrators distributed literature which, according to [redacted] reflected that the literature came from 801 Second Avenue, Suite 801, New York, New York. b7C

The January 30, 1969, issue of the "Worcester Gazette," a daily publication in Worcester, Massachusetts, contained an article reflecting that Abu Ammar (the military alias of Yasir Arafat) is the founder and leader of Al Fatah.

According to Ammar, Al Fatah was founded as a secret society in 1958 and its military activities started in 1965.

Al Fatah's goal is the liberation of Palestine through armed struggle, which, according to Ammar, is the only means to achieve their goal.

b7C Among the demonstrators mentioned above was a small group of counter demonstrators, whose leader was [redacted] of Brandeis University, a member of the Jewish Activist League. This group was supported by the "Ad Hoc Committee for a Just Policy in the Middle East." This group of anti-demonstrators distributed leaflets alleging that Al Fatah fails to recognize the rights of the Jewish people.

All of the above groups dispersed about 2:00 p.m., and there were no incidents.

APPENDIX1.YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

The May, 1960, issue of the "Young Socialist" (YS), Page 1, Column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled "The Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA) was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This issue stated that this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter clubs of the publication YS.

The above issue, page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles, and that the supporters of the YS have come into basic political solidarity with the SWP on the principles of revolutionary socialism.

On March 10, 1967, a source advised that the YSA was formed during 1957, by youth of various left socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The source further advised that the YSA has recently become more open about admitting that it is the youth group of the SWP and that an SWP representative has publicly stated that the YSA is the SWP's youth group.

The National Headquarters of the YSA are located in Room 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City.

On October 31, 1967, a second source advised that at the 22nd National Convention of the SWP held in New York City from October 26, 1967, to October 29, 1967, it was stated that the YSA remained as the main recruiting ground for new SWP members.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

APPENDIX

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE OF BOSTON

A source advised on October 30, 1959, that at a closed Socialist Workers Party (SWP) meeting held on October 29, 1959, at SWP headquarters in New York, New York, it was stated that a youth organization named the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) of Boston had just been officially formed.

The publication "Young Socialist" of May, 1960, reported during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled YSA was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Boston was reported as one of the cities represented at this founding conference.

A second source advised on May 7, 1968, that the YSA of Boston continued to be active and that meetings of the YSA of Boston were regularly held at the headquarters of the SWP at Boston, Massachusetts. This second source further advised that the YSA of Boston is the Boston affiliate of the national YSA and follows the aims and purposes of that group.

The Socialist Workers Party has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

One primary concern is the threat by the fedayeen to extend their terrorist acts to the U.S. to include attacks on U.S. Jews and their property, Israelis stationed in or traveling to or from the U.S., and facilities utilized by these Israelis. To provide better insight into this problem and to explore ways of possibly improving Bureau coverage of Arab activities in the U.S. in such a way that we may be alerted to planned terrorist activities here, Bureau intends to analyze terrorist acts in Europe either attributed to or claimed by fedayeen groups since the June, 1967, war. The analysis will concern itself with a determination of any common threads or patterns in the backgrounds of the personalities involved in the terrorist acts, their method of travel (including passports and visas), and modus operandi.







QUAD-CITIZANS FOR PEACE

Chief of Police Charles L. Meyers, Rock Island Police Department, Rock Island, Illinois advised on February 9, 1970, that his department had received through the mail an unsolicited open letter from the Omega House of Hospitality, 2808 - 5 1/2 Avenue, Rock Island, Illinois, which letter stated that the Omega House was an attempt to practice Christianity, as well as preach it. The letter stated further that the founding of the Omega House of Hospitality was a response, an alternative, to the violence and hate present in our society. The letter continued that those individuals of the Omega House of Hospitality felt that peace and love could become realities in the lives of those who participate with them, and in those whose lives they touched.

The letter further set forth the specific work of the Omega House, which would include four major areas of involvement, and those areas were set forth as follows:

(1) We will provide food and/or shelter 24 hours a day to those who need it. FISH, Project NOW, Davenport Diocese Social Action Dept., Rock Island Community Mental Health Center, and the American Red Cross have verified the need for such a service and serve as examples of agencies which can refer people to us and with whom we can coordinate our efforts. We would also help, in whatever manner possible, anyone who comes to our doors seeking the help and understanding they have been denied.

(2) Serve as a draft counseling and educational center for the Quad-Cities area. Such a center is a response to the needs of men who face conscription and need sympathetic counseling and expert advice. There are two independent functions involved - one educational, the other counseling. The task of the counselor is to help the counselee identify his own values and motivation and take action which best fulfills these inner directions. He provides legal information concerning selective service law but does not inject his own opinions.

This document contains neither recommendations nor conclusions of the FBI. It is the property of the FBI and is loaned to your agency; it and its contents are not to be distributed outside your agency.

QUAD-CITIAN'S FOR PEACE

Counseling does not prevent a counselor outside of the counseling relationship from educating others on the inequities of the draft or from urging resistance to the draft. In addition he can alert young men of their rights by speaking engagements and leaflets.

In addition to fulfilling both of these functions at Omega House, we will train others to be counselors and serve as a draft resistance center - that is, provide an environment in which young men who choose to resist the draft (refuse to cooperate with) for reasons of conscience can find understanding and legal help to face the social and legal consequences which they face in our society. None of these activities are illegal.

(3) Teaching the philosophy of non-violence: By speaking engagements and writing we will attempt to point out the roots of violence in our society and explain the philosophy of non-violence. We will also publish a monthly paper which we plan to call "The Christian Radical." In addition we will publish leaflets and/or pamphlets on non-violence and related subjects.

(4) Work with teenagers and young adults: We will work with concerned young people of the area; provide a place for dialogue and work with them to affect constructive social change. Omega House will be a "half-way house" for young people who have been in some kind of trouble or who need foster homes for a time. Member of the Rock Island Community Mental Health Center will be available for counseling these young people when required.

[redacted] Security and Intelligence b7C Branch, Rock Island Arsenal, Rock Island, Illinois, advised a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on February 12, 1970, that a confidential source of information of their security office advised on that date that he had been in attendance of a meeting of the Quad-Citians for Peace in the Social Room of the Sacred Heart School, Rock Island, Illinois. [redacted] advised that the meeting was led by Mr. Charles J. Quilty, Chairman for the Quad-Citians For Peace, and that the primary purpose of the meeting, according to the confidential source, was to hold an election for a new chairman and vice-chairman of the Quad-Citians For Peace organization.

b7C [redacted] advised that their source furnished the following information pertaining to proceedings of the aforementioned meeting on February 11, 1970:

The meeting commenced at 7:30 PM on February 11, 1970, at the Social Room of the Sacred Heart School, Rock Island, Illinois

QUAD-CITIAN'S FOR PEACE

The meeting was attended by approximately 40 to 50 persons, to include one Negro youth. The source stated that a member of the Davenport, Iowa City Council was present at the meeting, name unknown to the source, but who urged members of the Quad-Citians for Peace organization from Davenport, Iowa to be sure and attend City Council meetings of Davenport for the purpose of making requests for recognition and money for their organization.

Charles J. Quilty discussed draft resistance, the evils of narcotics, the evils of drinking, and indicated that he has, and will be, making talks on these subjects at various schools and churches, in the Quad-Cities of Illinois and Iowa. Quilty stated that he had given two talks at St. Johns Methodist Church in Davenport, Iowa and on February 20, 1970, he is scheduled to speak at Alleman High School, Rock Island, Illinois.

Quilty advised further that the Catholic Inter-Racial Council of Davenport, Iowa is now paying for all draft counseling expenses at the Omega Hospitality House. Quilty indicated that this aspect of their organization, that of the Hospitality House and draft counseling, was a successful operation.

Quilty gave a follow up report on his previous discussion of income tax evasion, and according to source, spent considerable time discussing how to get by without paying income tax. Quilty suggested listing 15 to 20 persons as dependents to employers, pointing out that when an extensive list of dependents are claimed by an employee, the government representatives and even some of the employers will tear up the forms and pay no attention to them.

Quilty discussed organizing a fast for people demonstrating in front of the Federal Building in Davenport, Iowa on Ash Wednesday, February 11, 1970. He discussed the fast and demonstration that was taking place in front of the White House in Washington, D. C. from 9:00 AM to 6:00 PM, commencing on February 11, 1970 and continuing through April 27, 1970. Quilty mentioned that black church members in the Quad-Cities of Illinois and Iowa were going to have their own fast in their own churches, and would not participate with the whites. Quilty further suggested that those participating in the fast could take the money saved by not eating and send these funds to one of three places. One, down south, two, to Canada, and three to another location in the Northern United States, specific location of organizations not identified. Quilty indicated that these funds could be utilized by groups in those areas in making better living conditions for the people in the communities.

QUAD-CITIANS FOR PEACE

Quilty, according to the confidential source, stated that he did not feel he was accomplishing sufficient undertakings that are sensational enough to gain national recognition, nor had he sufficient things to create interest in his meetings. Quilty stated that for this reason he felt that new blood would be better for the organization and thereupon made a motion for the election of a new chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. A motion was made by one of those in attendance of the meeting, renominating Charles J. Quilty for the position of chairman, explaining that Quilty was doing, and has done, an excellent job as chairman of the Quad-Citians for Peace. It was pointed out by this individual that if pressure was being placed upon Quilty for him to terminate his position with the organization as chairman, and there was another qualified individual to assume the chairmanship of the organization, then Quilty should be allowed to relinquish the chairmanship of the organization. There was a general discussion among the members in attendance, but Quilty was unanimously re-elected as chairman of the Quad-Citians for Peace. He stated [redacted] who was not present for the meeting, was nominated for secretary, then when it became known that the vice-chairman was to take care of the news bulletin, [redacted] was suggested for the vice-chairmanship, but nothing definite was settled on that matter.

Source advised further that a discussion ensued as to the possibility of the Quad-Citians for Peace joining with other similar type groups in the Quad-Cities of Illinois and Iowa, specifically mentioning the Coalition Group which is believed by the source to be a newly formed group of professional and businessmen of the Quad-City area.

The source advised that Quilty, during his remarks to the members at the meeting on the evening of February 11, 1970, commented that he had left a good paying position to become a poor boy and work for humanity.

Chief of Police Charles L. Meyers, supra, advised on February 13, 1970 that he had learned recently Charles J. Quilty Chairman of the Quad-Citians for Peace, had made a \$10,000 deposit on the building now housing the Omega House of Hospitality. Chief Meyers stated that this building was formerly a convent, and jointly owned by the Sacred Heart, St. Joseph, and St. Pious Catholic Parishes in Rock Island, Illinois. He explained that he knew this building was placed on the market for sale, and was certain that the building would not have been sold for anything under \$30,000. He stated that efforts by their department to establish the source of revenue for Quilty's operation of the Omega House or the operation of the Quad-Citians for Peace, has been unproductive.





Killer of 3 Laughs At Death Sentence

CHAPPELL, Neb (AP) — Duane Pope, robbery killer of three, chuckled to himself as he was removed from the courtroom. He had just been sentenced to death in the electric chair.

Dist Court Judge John Kuns yesterday ordered that Pope be executed during the week of April 6 for one of the bloodiest bank holdups of modern times

Defense lawyers said they would appeal and that it may be years before it is known whether the sentence will ever be carried out

Thus, the lanky 26-year-old farm boy from Roxbury, Kan, faces a second long wait with the threat of death hanging over his head

More than four years ago a jury condemned him to death on federal bank robbery charges in connection with the June 4, 1965, hold up at the Farmers State Bank in Big Springs, Neb, which left three persons dead and a fourth crippled for life

The U S Supreme Court vacated that sentence because of a defect in the capital punishment provision in the bank robbery law and Pope was resentenced to life imprisonment

The state then prosecuted him on a murder charge His lawyers contend this subjected Pope to double jeopardy

Pope showed no emotion when Judge Kuns announced "The severe penalty of death must be imposed in this case" Pope was seen laughing to himself as marshals escorted him from the courtroom

Before Pope fled with \$1,498 from the bank, he ordered bank President Andreas Kjeldgaard, 77, his nephew Franklin Kjeldgaard, 25, cashier Glenn Hendrickson, 59, and bookkeeper Lois Ann Hothan, 35, to lie face down on the bank floor

He fired two shots into each victim Only Franklin Kjeldgaard survived He was left paralyzed from the waist down

3 Soledad Slayings 'Justified'

SALINAS — The fatal shooting of three prisoners at Soledad State Prison by a guard was ruled "justifiable homicide" yesterday by the Monterey County Grand Jury.

Guard O G Miller shot the inmates Jan 13. He said it was necessary to fire the shots in order to break up a fight in the maximum security area. All three prisoners killed were black.

A white guard was beaten to death apparently in retaliation for the shootings by Miller on Jan 16. Three black inmates were subsequently charged with the crime.

Meanwhile, the California State Employees Association yesterday said staff shortages at prisons are "at the breaking point."

Overdose of Pills Accident, Suicide?

By LLOYD BOLES Tribune Staff Writer

Jacob V Yannell, 21 was found dead in a sleeping bag on the living room floor of his parent's trailer home in Castro Valley on April 7, 1967.

The Alameda County Coroner's Office reported he died of an overdose of sleeping pills — but didn't say whether this was by accident or by design.

Did young Yannell commit suicide? Or was the overdose an accident?

There's a \$20,000 riding on the answer for which an Alameda County Superior Court jury will resume deliberations on Monday.

Some time before Yannell died his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Julius Yannell (he's a machanicist and she's a housewife), purchased a \$20,000 accident policy on his life from the Insurance Company of North America through the

State Automobile Association.

When the parents sought to collect on the policy the insurance companies balked. It claimed that Yannell committed suicide thus voiding the policy and refused to pay. The parents sued.

For four days the jury of nine men and three women in the courtroom of Superior Court Judge Folger Emerson heard a torrent of conflicting testimony. They began deliberations yesterday, but after three hours were still so far from a decision that Emerson sent them home for the weekend.

The suing parents claim through their attorney, J. Mike Brown, that their son was young, vigorous, healthy, happy and had a zest to live. Additionally he was clean cut and well-groomed.

Not so says the defense team headed by Atty John P. Herty. They claim — and produced witnesses to prove it — that young Yannell was a brooding pot-smoking disheveled, agnostic college dropout who often talked of death. Additionally he disliked and was unable to communicate with his father, the defense said.

All these traits, says the defense, made young Yannell a prime suicide suspect. The defense also produced a toxicologist who testified that in his opinion Yannell took at least twenty 100 milligram sleeping capsules hardlv, he said "the average dose."

The sleeping pills Yannell ingested were described as "strong." Both his mother and father testified they didn't know where their son got the pills. There were no bottles and no notes found near his body.

The picture introduced into evidence of Yannell shows a handsome smiling, well-dressed young man.

It's a puzzling case for the jury.

Youth Found Guilty of 2 Slayings

MARTINEZ — A Costa Superior Court jury yesterday found Christopher W. Williams guilty of two counts of first degree murder.

Judge Robert J. Cooney set Tuesday at 10 a.m. for the start of the trial's penalty phase for the 18-year-old Pittsburg youth.

The seven women and five men on the jury deliberated for four hours after a three-week trial. They found the youth guilty of the deaths of Rheinhold Plath, 59, Pittsburg, and Kenneth McCleary, 52, of Martinez.

Plath was stabbed July 31 and died four days later. McCleary was beaten to death with a tire iron Sept 1.

Dep. Dist. Atty. John D. Hattenhuhler argued that both murders were committed during the commission of robbery.

Bandits Raid Jewelry Shop

RICHMOND — Two men were slugged and beaten in a hotel jewelry shop yesterday by three bandits who stole diamond watches valued at \$580 and smashed some display cases.

Police said the suspects first eyed the display cases from outside of the shop in the Hotel Don at 10th Street and Nevin Avenue then entered the store and asked for a catalogue.

Owner Harold E. Green 52 said he was hit from behind and an employe Ralph Larock 58 was beaten to the floor apparently by only one of the men.

Both men suffered cuts and bruises but were not hospitalized.

Hottel said the spokesman told him Arab leaders are giving serious consideration to training Black Panthers on Al Fatah bases and have them actually take part in Arab operations in the Middle East.

Hottel said the Panther training would include combat operations, sabotage and other tactics. Hottel said the spokesman told him.

"When the time comes, the Panthers will carry out quick and deep strikes in the United States — assassinations of men responsible for the policy of discrimination from high to low and sabotage to factories and capitalist installations."

The Al Fatah spokesman said Black Panthers are already being trained in North Korea, Cuba and North Vietnam.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in February, 1970, advised that the November, 1969 issue of the "Twin Citian Magazine" reportedly had carried an article to the effect that there were rumors on the "campus" concerning recruitment of volunteers for Arab Terrorist Organizations.

A second source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in February and March, 1970, advised that the "Twin Citian Magazine" had been published by the Twin Citian Corporation, Northstar Center, Minneapolis, Minnesota, but had ceased publication with its November, 1969 issue. The magazine was generally devoted to schedules and articles relative to the arts, theatre, music, dining and sports events, which were to occur in the Minneapolis-St. Paul, Minnesota area for the forthcoming period. It would also generally carry some feature article. The source provided a copy of the November, 1969 issue of the "Twin Citian Magazine" and appearing on the following pages is a Xerox copy of an article which appeared on pages 9 through 13 entitled "The Come to Damascus Affair."

The Come To Daunces. A. (The)

COME BY ONF the six men of the killer team fled the chopper, into the long, thick grass. The last man was larger than the others, nearly six and one-half feet tall, gaunt at 165 pounds, laden like his colleagues-in-destruction with enough explosives to destroy a hamlet entirely on his own. At dusk it is clear and hot. The six men are dressed in the special indigenous tiger stripe fatigues of gray, black, and green. Their faces are covered in grease-paint, also a mixture of black and green. They wear round floppy hats with the phosphorescent panel inside which when turned inside out can be seen by the helicopter pilots who are trying to differentiate the good guys from the bad.

Officially, such a group of specialists is called a Long Range Recon Platoon (LRRP), they replaced the Ranger Battalions. The six men act as a single weapon, they assess bomb damage, locate the opposition, check out river passages, act as snipers, conduct diversions, general harassments, and the occasional assassination etc. In any case, LRRP men are special; they are generally ex-infantry, at least once wounded, frequently "crazy"—Ben Samuels can look back on those days now and say, yes, I was a kid and I was crazy, I just didn't give a damn.

On a five-day mission they might never actually speak. They have pills to keep them from coughing, pills to keep them awake, bennies, anything you want. The only way you can do it is to not "give a damn for nothing." Obviously, you volunteer for the job.

Ben Samuels, the tall man, was the last man on the team—the rear security man. As a group they choose their own weapons: twelve gauge shotguns, M-16's, 45 greaseguns with silencers, sniper rifles with scope and pads, each man has a waiting arsenal: grenades, automatics in shoulder holsters. Samuels carried a short machete hung flat against his back. Beneath their black berets sweat stung their eyes. On their rifles there were no buckled slings which can make detectable sound, instead, the rifles were hung with parachute cord—absolutely silent. All very precise, very businesslike. Nobody fooled around.

"And right away," Samuels recalls, "we ran for the treetline. The chopper pulled off and we hit the treetline out of breath, and for God's sake we were right in the middle of a VC battalion bivouacked in the treetline. We had no idea they were there and suddenly we could hear pots and pans, VC yelling, and we looked at each other, like we were saying, Oh, my God, it's going to

be one of those days.

"So, we just got on line and went through 'em, firing, not much else you can do, and I could hear the radio man calling 'flaming arrow, flaming arrow'—calling for our gunships to come in, and we used some smoke grenades."

As the last man, Samuels dropped a smoke grenade, ran down the ditch, jumped over a fallen log and felt the bullet get him in the back like a baseball bat hammering his right kidney. The team came back for him in the smoke and the mud and the chatter of gunfire, dragged him away into the all but impenetrable underbrush, sunk the morphine syringe into him. Half an hour from the time he was shot, Samuels lay in the thorny thicket, high on morphine, darkness suddenly on them.

"I could feel the pain but the effect of the morphine was such that you don't care, you have a fantastic sense of well-being. I couldn't get to sleep so they lay in a circle around me so I could touch them all, keep them from snoring. I stayed awake all night, the VC spent the night looking for us, and at first light of dawn a medivac chopper came in and took me out. Twelve hours from being shot I was in a field hospital, then later that day I was in Japan for the removal of a kidney, a piece of my stomach, fixed up a collapsed lung."

At the time, Ben Samuels hadn't the slightest idea that he had just completed a graduate course, with honors, qualifying him for a place among that curiously elite army of fortune—the world's mercenaries, professional soldiers who fight not from need, not from political or national loyalty, not from the effect of the draft, but simply because it is the thing they do best.

Potential first-rate mercenaries are sought by a wide variety of armies (including our own sort-of-army, the CIA) and the price is right. Consequently, the return of Ben Samuels to the United States did not go unnoticed. And one warm and pleasant day as he took a break from his undergraduate studies at the University of Minnesota, they came to Ben Samuels and they made him an offer. It was all part of the game and in Samuels' case it happened to be the fedayeen, specifically Al Fatah—the Arab terrorists.

Al's Diner in Dayton steamed in the early morning's hazy August glare. In the street outside shaggy students peered in, saw the stools occupied, moved

sluggishly onward Ben Samuels lingered over the coffee and the remaining bites of steak and eggs, the headline in the morning paper, buried on an inside page, had given him pause.

Al Fatah, it read *Claims Guerrilla Successes*; and the dispatch went on to detail an Arab raid into Israel, a demolition mission, and Samuels' mind flickered like a ferret's eyes in the dark tunnel of the past. Teeth flashed, memory gnawed and explosions clattered at the walls of time.

Several Israelis had been killed but, Arab reports to the contrary, he knew some of them had died as well. It was in the nature of the mission. But, then, it wasn't mere professionalism that accounted for his interest. It was memory and the peculiar man he had encountered the night before at Stub and Herb's bar. The man had known who he was and he, too, had brought up the subject of demolition. "Do you know anything about explosives? Plastique, for instance?" That was what the man with the dark skin and the white blotches, as if he had been too long in the desert, had said. Samuels had grinned at that one.

"So you think you know so goddam much about demolition, do you, Samuels? Well, get rid of that goddam tree." The lieutenant spoke with an overlay of sarcasm, a twang just hinting at contempt. "Just move the tree."

Samuels considered the tree which had to be moved for a helicopter landing zone. Beside it ran a muddy Vietnamese creek. The grin came slowly, following the formulation of a plan.

"Yes, sir, I know pretty goddam much about demolition, and I'll tell you what I'm going to do for you. You see the big fork in that very big tree? Well, I'll drop one fork across the creek to use for a bridge and I'll blow the other one all the hell out of the way for you."

He used composition B, a molded explosive not unlike the plastique used with such notoriety in Algeria. And while the lieutenant looked on, he dropped one fork perfectly across the river and blew the other one out of the way.

Samuels was a very good man with explosives.

* * *

The day before had been a soft Sunday of late, hesitant, dying summer, one of the good, hot, lazy Sundays. The sun had been out most of the day, the streets were breezy, pleasant to walk along. As the light faded, Samuels and his friend, Morris, had walked across to the East Bank along Washington Avenue in the direction of Stub and Herb's. As they walked they enjoyed the day, didn't speak.

Stub and Herb's is a 32 beer joint situated near the corner of Oak and Washington. Inside the door there are two pinball machines which ring incessantly, bells and buzzers going off all evening long over the sounds of the jukebox. It's no different than a dozen other places—not a particularly sinister place but more like something out of Hitchcock: an essentially innocent setting. Only what happens is sinister. At least in the movies.

It had gone seven and the place had already filled up but Samuels and his friend found a booth along the far wall across from the bar. Against the wall behind the bar there are silver and pewter beer mugs owned by

regulars. Hitchcock would have loved it, a concession toward classic pub-dom. Samuels ordered chili and beer, his friend a Pepsi. In the ease of the Sunday evening they sat quietly, smelling the beer and hearing the music rocking out and the pinball machines. College beer joint, University of Minnesota style, the American way of life.

"Morris, my old friend, how are you?" The man standing at the table was a stranger to Samuels, dark, smiling, sleeves of his white shirt rolled part way up on his forearms. He was holding a glass of beer and a trace of foam clung to his upper lip. He smiled steadily at Samuels.

"George! Sit down, sit down, for God's sake." Morris always got very excited when he met a friend in a bar—one of life's bonuses. "George, I want you to meet Ben Samuels. I've told you about him—he's back from Vietnam."

"Of course, Morris, I remember." His hand was firm, bony, hard. Morris has told me a good deal about you. I'm delighted to meet you.

"Morris never knows when to keep his mouth shut," Samuels laughed. "So don't take seriously what he says about Vietnam."

The chili came and George brought his pitcher of beer to the table and settled in, chatting with Morris while Samuels worked on the chili.

"You were in Vietnam a very long time, then?" It was George being casual, interested, friendly, wiping the mustache of foam.

Morris' eyes were very happy, he enjoyed talking about Vietnam, even though he would never go there himself. Like most men who had never seen war, he was fascinated by it.

"Yes, quite a long time."

"You were in the army, in the airborne—you were a paratrooper? Morris once said you were a jump instructor, as I recall?" He giggled politely at his own retentive memory.

"Yes." Samuels wanted to change the subject. It was a long way away, in time and in space, it was a foolish subject. "Where are you from?" Change the subject.

"I am an Egyptian."

"I've never been there. The closest I've come was Iran and Turkey."

"When were you there?"

"1964 with the 101st Airborne. It was ridiculous. We did nothing except walk around after we jumped in." It was getting very loud in the bar, another Sunday night.

"Very interesting."

"It looks as if you guys are getting your asses whipped by the Israelis." Within a moment, Samuels regretted the undiplomatic comment. Going over the Vietnam thing with a stranger had unsettled him.

George leaned over the table. "You are sympathetic to the Israelis?" It wasn't irritation, but curiosity.

"No, I am for no one. Absolutely no one."

"That is different, then. Most Americans are for the Israelis."

"Most Americans are fools," Samuels said, "they have little understanding of anything in such matters." Morris was having a very good time.

George thought this over. "I don't know. Perhaps

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you're right. What do you think of the Arabs, then?"
 "They are fools as well—equally bloody damned fools."

George filled Samuels' beer glass.
 "Why? Because they want their homeland?" He shook his head. "It is true that we are not doing very well at present but we are getting organized. We have Al Fatah, of course." George sipped at his beer, smiling shyly.

"They are killers, aren't they?" Morris was very excited.

"Ah, Morris—don't judge them too harshly. Killers? All right, killers, then. But they may be the only way, if the Arabs want to win the war. The point is, they can't seem to do it any other way." George was listening closely. "George, why aren't you back in Egypt fighting? Instead of being over here?"

George shrugged his shoulders, shook his head. "I have other things to do right now. Maybe some time."

"Are you going to go back and do something or are you going to stay here all your life?" Samuels probing, had hit a sore spot.

"I will go back at the proper time. When I have something to offer." He paused. "How do you feel about war then if you don't take sides?"

"War, my friend," Samuels said, "is war. There are only losers and the dead—no winners. I have no politics. In Vietnam I did a job—I did my job. Nothing more. I could do the job anywhere. It is a matter of complete indifference to me."

"Would you help the Arabs?"

"Yes, of course—for the proper amount of money. And for no other reason."

"This, then, is not the place to talk about that." George glanced around nervously. "I will give you my number. Call me at the beginning of the week." George wrote briefly on the back of a cash register slip. "We will meet again."

"Yes," Samuels said. "I'll call you."

During the walk back to our rooms, Morris asked Samuels if he would really work for the Arabs.

"Yes, of course," Samuels said, "there is absolutely no difference in killing, it is immaterial whom you're killing for. War is simply immoral—why should I be moral in such a world? Until Man grows up there will always be war. I have no control over it and neither do you and neither do all the peace people. When they stop one war, there's always another one. Sometimes I think the best that man can do is to make rules that will keep himself from destroying himself. And that, Morris, is just the way it is."

Each night, every night, from somewhere in the Arab nations, commandoes cross the Israeli borders to bring terror, death and destruction—it is the manner by which the Arabs continue their fight against the hated Israelis. It is, more often than not, Al Fatah striking in the night and those Arabs who die are martyrs by the laws of jihad—holy war—engaged in by 34 Moslem countries against Israel.

Al Fatah in the largest and most prominent of the Arab guerilla organizations, "freedom fighters" in Arab eyes, terrorists to the Israelis. In fact, taken as a whole, they are the fedayeen ("men of sacrifice"), a cluster

of secret groups frequently given to arguing among themselves as well as with their common enemy. If the Middle East, as most of the world agrees, is on the brink of war again it is due in large part to the activities of the fedayeen.

Even considering the fact that the Arab world is led by Egypt's Nasser, a man of immense power and magnetism (and considerable ability), and armed in large measure by the Russians, it is obvious to all concerned that the Arabs are still in no position to effectively wage war with Israel. But facts to the contrary, it is still apparent to Nasser and Jordan's King Hussein that the feelings of their masses—the deep, malignant hatred of Israel—must not be ignored.

And it is the fedayeen who provide the people with their emotional safety valve. Given the myriad tensions of the situation, the fedayeen operate outside the framework of any government or official agency—consequently, their freedom is extraordinary. They owe allegiance only to themselves, only to their own plans. And they view any negotiated, compromise settlement of the Middle East conflict as an outright disaster.

In practice, their effect is varied and predictable. In one sense, they can keep the fire perking by striking repeatedly at the Israelis, keeping them irritated, provoking reprisals. In another, they keep the Arab populace sufficiently excited so that Nasser and his colleagues will hesitate before accepting a settlement with the Israelis. And at the same time, the fedayeen's power grows—in Jordan, it is said, from which most of the raids take off, the fedayeen is so powerful that they could overthrow Hussein at any time.

Who are the fedayeen, then? In numbers, they represent 1,500,000 Palestinian refugees—the Palestinian diaspora, for twenty years homeless, wandering, unable to control their lives. Dispossessed when Israel was founded in 1948, they have endured as "outsiders" regardless of where they have gone. Their lives have been miserable as only refugees can know, lived at the naked edge of subsistence. Politically, the Arab rulers have used them as pawns. Fed them promises of a return to their Palestinian homeland, grown fat on the burgeoning hatred of the Israelis.

The fedayeen has taken as its cause the cause of the Palestinian Arabs. They are the only force continuing to attack Israel.

And, most importantly, out of all the defeat and humiliation, the fedayeen—and most particularly Al Fatah—are the only fighters in whom the Arabs can have any pride. With the Israeli victory two years ago, the fedayeen were given the Arab people as a gift. Only through the fedayeen could the Arabs strike back.

Mohammed "Yasser" Arafat is leader of Al Fatah, largest and most secret of the fedayeen. It is said to be financed and guided by a wealthy group in Damascus. Also, Yasser Arafat, not a great deal is known. "Please no personality cult. I am only a soldier. Our leader is Palestine. Our road is the road of death and sacrifice to win back our homeland. If we cannot do it, our children will, and if they cannot do it, their children will."

It is Arafat who has long contended that the Arabs will never defeat the Israelis by conventional means. He studied, throughout the 1950s, the techniques of the Algerian terrorist. Simultaneously, Nasser was or-

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ganizing the original fedayeen-type Palestinians in the Gaza Strip and they were raising sufficient hell to help bring on the 1956 war which ended so badly for the Arabs. It was only after Suez that Al Fatah was organized as a Palestinian force entirely outside Nasser's control.

Al Fatah's first raids came in 1964, only one a week, and were primarily conducted as experiments both in guerilla techniques and the effect on public opinion. By 1967 they were in a position to take advantage of the Arab defeat in the Six-Day War by picking up the thousands of abandoned weapons left in the desert by the retreating armies.

Israeli reaction to the attacks was severe, particularly in the atmosphere following the war, but the guerillas continued, with as many as two dozen attacks per day. Although Al Fatah strenuously denies it, their tack is clearly terrorist oriented—violence directed at the Israeli civilian population, bombs in theaters, grenades tossed into children's playgrounds, terror for its own sake. And the Israelis react predictably.

Wisely Al Fatah has chosen to stay out of the specifics of Arab politics and is therefore able to work in relative freedom. Hampering them more than anything else are internal disagreements among their own factions. But the aim is at least a shared aim and the people are with them.

Training has been a constant problem and much of it is left to the Egyptian army, there is no evidence of any direct training, and the few from other sources or Peking. They are badly in need of expert training.

Philosophically, Al Fatah realizes that Israel will simply not be driven from the land militarily. Consequently, in a curiously sophisticated and circuitous plan, Al Fatah hopes to provoke Israel into greater and greater expansion and more and more repressive measures internally—until, first, democracy in Israel is dead and, second, they can no longer absorb the vast hordes of Arabs. Thus weakened, Israel will collapse.

Arafat has said "The very process of Israeli expansion will extend the war of liberation into all the countries bordering on the occupied territories, and they will take up the struggle in defense of their own existence—"

It is, of course, impossible to determine just how much damage Al Fatah actually inflicts on the Israelis. The Israelis deny everything, Al Fatah claims every Israeli misfortune as a result of its own master plan.

Publicly, the Israelis do dismiss fedayeen efforts as inept, blundering, cowardly. One Israeli officer commented recently "We cannot dignify them with the name guerilla or commando. The Arabs who cross over show no daring. In that respect, they are nowhere near Viet Cong standards."

But the Israelis are worried.

And men like Ben Samuels, schooled in the seething agony of Vietnam, accustomed to the smell of their own blood and the sensation of the morphine and the varied postures of death—men like Ben Samuels don't make them breathe any easier.

Ben Samuels met George a few days later at Bridgemen's ice cream parlor at Oak and Washington. He took a booth as far from the window as possible, think-

ing that if he was being overly cautious there was nothing lost and the situation, in any case, was out of the ordinary. After all, he still didn't know who was really in on this—the CIA, for instance, who had once tried to recruit him, or a pro-Israeli organization who would do anything to stop just this sort of recruiting. So he ordered a cup of coffee and waited, listening to the kids chattering over their ice cream cones.

George arrived shortly, a tall good looking man, dark hair and eyes, small squint wrinkles at the corners of his eyes. Around his hands and mouth his complexion is flecked with white spots, giving him the look of coming out of the desert thirsty and dry and scarred by the experience.

Over a chocolate malt, Samuels watched him pick at his fish dinner. Samuels said "Shall we talk frankly now and see if we both are after the same thing?"

"Yes." He chewed on some fish. "Quite frankly, Mr. Samuels, I am merely a go between in this affair." He savoured tartar sauce, patted his lips. "However, the point is that we—Al Fatah—need people, experts to train our men. You have experience and knowledge of weaponry, parachute training, demolition. We lack only men such as yourself to train us. In short," he sucked on his malted milk, "in short, Mr. Samuels, we want you to come with us, we want you to train Al Fatah." He leaned back in the booth staring at Samuels, then leaned forward and began to wolf the food.

"If I should agree to do it," Samuels said, "you must be prepared to pay my way out of the states and make certain other financial arrangements."

"Of course. There is no question about that. But first they must accept you. I will have to prepare a more complete dossier, send it to them, and then we wait. They are, you understand, very suspicious of everyone—they will not be open with you or will they be friendly. They need you but they will not trust you. You must not do anything that will make them doubt your honesty. If they do it will go very badly for you. Do you understand what I mean?"

"I understand and there will be no problem. I even sympathize with their situation. It is a very difficult thing to be an insurgent. But it is a way of life, like any other."

"That is true, of course—and remember you will not be expected to fight. That must be done only by Arabs. They will not let you fight. The fighting must be done by Arabs if they are to have any self-respect."

"You are not a fighter, though, are you?"

"No. I would if I had to."

"George, you know that someday you will have to destroy Al Fatah—it will have grown too strong. Nasser himself will be threatened by their power. When they have served their purpose, they will have to be wiped away."

"We are only temporary," he said calmly, "a unique phenomenon, yes. At some future time, we will very possibly have to be destroyed—yes, you are right. Eventually, we will be holding back progress of society. It is inevitable that eventually we be removed. It is the fate of extremists, I suppose." He shook his head sadly. "But now we are needed—all Arabs owe us much. Now is the time of Al Fatah, you see."

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Later that same evening, Samuels met a friend who had served in Vietnam in the Special Forces, a man he could speak with candidly.

"A question Samuels said over a beer at The Mixer's in Seven Corners. Has anyone ever approached you about going to work for a foreign government or organization?"

"No, why?"

"I just got through talking to a guy from the Near East—wants me to train commandos."

"Are you going to do it? His hands showed the ravages of frost bite. He was a mountain climber.

Samuels' friend was well versed in the basic arts of war but he was no longer involved.

"I would be very careful," he said, "if I were you I don't know who was talking to you but you could get yourself into quite a bit of trouble. If you want to be a mercenary, Ben, there is a better way to go about it."

"What way?"

"Most of these things get the CIA involved in one way or the other. You see, if you wind up in the position of being an embarrassment to the US it's much easier for them to give you (fill) you then spend anytime doing something else. You just have to make certain what side you're on. It's much smarter to get hired *outside* the US by a country that the US approves of than to go to work for a country the government doesn't approve of. I just don't know, Ben—sometimes I think politics can kill you faster than war."

"I think maybe I'll do it," Samuels said.

"Well, it's your neck, Ben. But, listen—if you really want to go this mercenary route, go to Europe. Go to the Zambizi in London—it's a bar which acts as a clearing house in England for mercenaries. Just drop in every day at the same time, have a couple of drinks, sit and wait. You'll be contacted. The same thing is true of The Internationale in Brussels, follow the same process. And there's a bar in Lisbon too. That's the right way to do it."

"I'll keep it in mind."

"Do that. And remember, those places aren't out of some man's magazines. They're for real, Ben."

Sunday night Samuels met George at Stub and Herb's. One week had passed. George had a pitcher of beer and two mugs on his table.

"I have the information," Samuels said.

George smiled at the envelope.

"Are you sure that you want to go through with this?"

"Yes. You now have everything you need, George, and for God's sake be careful, be very security conscious. I hope that this will stay a very confidential matter—I don't want any leaks. George.

"Of course you don't, Mr. Samuels. It could be bad for you. The Israeli groups would make living very uncomfortable for you."

"Did you read about the power lines in Egypt being blown by Israeli commandos? It had been a big raid, most distressing for the Egyptians."

"Yes, but neither of us knows the full story. There is so much repression of truth."

As they spoke, Samuels noticed a big kid with a beard wearing a white T-shirt and jeans and sandals.

There was blood all over his T-shirt.

"How long will it be before I know one way or the other? I must make some plans."

"I don't know. It is hard to say. Communication is very slow. We must be very careful. The mail in the US is looked at closely."

"No doubt," Samuels said.

The fellow in the bloody shirt was standing at Samuels' elbow. Samuels looked up at him. He seemed drunk.

"You're a son-of-a-bitch," the man said. "Now let's go outside and I'm going to whip your ass." He braced himself, legs apart.

"What did you say?"

"You heard me."

Samuels couldn't believe what was happening. George looked carefully from one to the other.

"No, I will not go outside with you," Samuels started to turn away.

"Listen, buddy, do you want me to kick your ass right here? I will."

"No, you won't. You're not going to do much of anything." Samuels was embarrassed about the whole thing. "Look, I'll buy you a beer and we'll forget the whole thing."

He looked very foolish.

"Why me?" Samuels asked calmly. "I don't even know you, do I?"

"No, you don't know me but you're the biggest guy in here and I feel real mean."

George continued to watch closely.

Samuels couldn't believe it. In all the bars he'd ever been in all the backwaters, he'd never had any trouble.

"Listen, I've been shot once tonight and I don't give a goddam. Now are you going to fight or are you chicken?"

"I'm not going to fight you so forget it."

Eventually Samuels bought him a pitcher of beer and he left.

George asked "Don't you know him? Are you certain?"

"No, I didn't know him."

"Very strange behaviour."

"Yes it was. Almost as if I were being tested."

"You were very wise not to fight him. It was very stupid, the whole performance."

* * *

In the most classic political sense, the Middle East is a powder keg and a short fuse is sputtering erratically. Tension between Arabs and Israelis is extreme. It is a tension that has spread to unlikely corners of the world, to a bar and an ice cream parlor on the campus of the University of Minnesota.

And now Ben Samuels, trained to be a mercenary, awaits word from Al Fatah. They will take him if he still wants to go. The monthly paycheck will be deposited in the Swiss bank account.

There is absolutely no difference in killing. It is immaterial whom you're killing for. War is simply immoral—why should I be moral in such a world. Until Man grows up there will always be war. And that, Morris, is just the way it is.

And in the spring, while the campus comes to life and the girls go part in their pretty dresses, Ben Samuels has an appointment in Damascus.



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

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During the course of the current inquiry, a number of sources familiar with activities at and around the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, were contacted. None of these sources could furnish any information relative to any known Al Fatah or related Arab Terrorist organizations activities on the University of Minnesota campus or in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area. All of these sources were aware that there is at the University of Minnesota an organization known as the Arab-American Club, which has been approved by the University of Minnesota, which is comprised of foreign students from Arab countries. Activities in this group are limited and no information has been received that it openly or covertly supports the Al Fatah or that it is contributing financially or otherwise to Al Fatah or other organizational activities abroad. None of these sources were familiar with [redacted] who last was known to have been a student at the University of Minnesota during the spring, 1969.







The Guerrillas

Guerrillas skyjacked three jet airliners and held as hostages 430 crewmen and passengers (TIME cover, Sept. 21). Most were finally let go by the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, but 54—38 Americans, two with dual Israeli-U.S. citizenship, and 16 Britons, West Germans and Swiss—were still being held at undisclosed hideaways at week's end. The hostages were in danger of getting caught in the battle, and a guerrilla spokesman would say nothing about their condition. "All we know," he said, "is that all are alive." The whole episode, said Hussein, was "the shame of the Arab nation."

Jordanian Premier Abdel Moneim Rifai tried to paper over this latest controversy with an agreement stipulating that the guerrillas be allowed to operate openly in Amman and that the army stay outside the capital. When Hussein saw the agreement, he was aghast. The army was already close to mutiny as a result of the restrictions placed upon it in its dealings with the cocky, freewheeling fedayeen. At one inspection an armored commander flew a brassiere from the radio antenna of his tank. When Hussein asked why, the officer snapped: "We have all become women." At another inspection, army officers pulled off their kaffiyehs and threw the traditional Jordanian headdress to the ground at the King's feet. The skyjacking represented a final humiliation: army units had quickly ringed the three jets squatting in the desert outside Amman, but orders from the King pre-

half of them. Bedouins with little use for the fedayeen, were bitterly resentful. "They are on the razor's edge," he told the French daily *Le Figaro*. "They've had enough. They are not accustomed to being so vilified, denigrated, provoked endlessly without being able to react. The situation cannot go on. Every day Jordan sinks a little deeper. There must be peace—or war."

Scathing Rebuke

In the past, Hussein scrupulously avoided a confrontation. More and more, critics accused him of wavering. Finally, the King decided to make a tough decision stick. He had little choice. If he did nothing, there was a real chance of an army mutiny. Rifai volunteered to resign as Premier because he was "tired." Instead, Hussein scathingly rebuked him and then fired him—along with the rest of his 17-member Cabinet. The King appointed a new Cabinet made up of eleven army officers and headed by Brigadier General Mohammed Daoud, 50, as Premier. More important, he dusted off a measure that was hurriedly enacted during the 1967 war with Israel and declared martial law. Hussein appointed Field Marshal Habes Majali, a 57-year-old Bedouin officer, as commander in chief of the army as well as military governor of Jordan.

Hussein's orders were terse. The new government was "to act immediately to undo hostile planning and restore matters as they should be." "Hostile forces," the King added, had "undermined national unity, shaken the armed forces, dynamited their military spirit and discipline, and created a state of despair." At Majali's command, the Jordanian army was soon moving tanks and artillery into Amman.

The guerrillas accepted the challenge. Yasser Arafat, leader of Al-Fatah, the biggest guerrilla group, and of the overall PLO command, had already summoned ambassadors from other Arab states and told them: "Will you kindly inform your governments that King Hussein, with mature consideration, has

refutable proof that he intends to liquidate the Palestinian resistance." In Amman, Damascus and Baghdad, guerrilla radios suddenly began crackling with curiously coded messages. "The dinner is hot," said one. "Ghazi is marching to Haifa," said another. In plainer language, the fedayeen command advised its men to "keep your finger on the trigger until the fascist military rule has been removed." In Amman, shopkeepers, who have suffered through previous confrontations, shuttered their stores. Schools closed, offices emptied, and civilians huddled in the basements of limestone houses on Amman's seven hills. Telephone lines went dead. The airport waved off incoming flights and sent Royal Jordanian Airline's Caravelles out of the country.

The 54 skyjacking hostages were also moved for "safekeeping." Anxious to thwart any rescue attempts, the Popular Front split them up into groups of four or five and scattered them to different hiding places. Before the fighting broke out, most were believed to be in a sprawling Palestinian refugee center on the southern rim of the capital, called Amman New Camp. At the same camp the guerrillas are believed to be holding \$650,000 in U.S. bills that Swissair last week admitted had been aboard its skyjacked plane. When the guerrillas found out about the money, by reading the craft's loading sheet, they marched the plane's captain into the desert, held guns to his temples and forced him to tell them where it was.

Groping in the Dark

The outbreak of civil war in Jordan vastly complicated efforts to free the hostages from what the guerrillas assured the world was humane captivity. At the same time, the snooting increased the confusion surrounding the negotiations for their release. At one point the International Committee of the Red Cross broke off talks, demanding that the guerrillas provide "more precision as to who was speaking for whom." Once civil

all completely.

The five governments involved in the negotiating—the U.S., Britain, West Germany, Switzerland and Israel—added to the confusion. The West Germans once again contemplated trading unilaterally for the release of two citizens by freeing three Arabs imprisoned by Bonn. British Foreign Minister Alec Douglas-Home, anxious to speed up deliberations, interrupted Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban's private visit to England to press for a promise to release more Arab prisoners. The Israelis agreed, among other things, to give up

For its part, the U.S., which had dispatched Sixth Fleet ships with 1,500 battle-ready Marines to the Eastern Mediterranean when the planes were skyjacked, added more ships to the task force. Most notably, the helicopter carrier *Guam*, with combat Marines aboard, sailed from Norfolk naval base to join the fleet.

The Marines' assignment, if events warranted, was to helicopter ashore in Jordan to rescue the 40 members of the U.S. embassy in Amman and any of 350 U.S. citizens living in Jordan, or other foreigners who cared to leave.

more one of liberating some of the 200 airline hostages. Washington Special Action Group, a crisis committee of State Defense and intelligence chiefs headed by Henry Kissinger, met twice to draw up contingency plans.

The ostentatious movement of ships and Marines had another purpose. Even as Israeli Premier Golda Meir arrived in the U.S. for conferences with President Nixon (see following story), the Administration was carefully leaking muted warnings of U.S. intervention. The warnings were chiefly designed to dissuade any invasion by Israel, whose

Caravan of Martyrs

NEARLY two decades before the Middle East completely lost its romantic Lawrence of Arabia aura and became a brutal battlefield, two young cousins sat on neighboring thrones: Feisal II in Iraq, Hussein in Jordan. Handsome, carefree, gallant, the two young Kings were installed on the same day in 1953. Their dual reigns were a spectacular achievement for the ancient Hashemite dynasty.

In the summer of 1958, the spectacle ended. Feisal, then 23, was murdered in his Baghdad palace by a clique of revolutionary army officers whose political passions had been aroused by the anti-royalist call of Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser. Hussein, only 22, narrowly escaped a similar death; his life and throne were saved by the intervention of British paratroopers. In Amman, the boy King took the train of events heavily. "I have received confirmation of the murder of my cousin, King Feisal of Iraq, and all his royal family," he told reporters. "They are only the last in a caravan of martyrs."

That Hashemite caravan has been a long and winding one. The principal reason for the fanatic support that Hussein received from Bedouin warriors in Jordan is that the King can trace his ancestry back to the Prophet Mohammed. Thirty-seven generations of Hashemites were traditionally Grand Sherifs, or rulers of Mecca, Islam's holiest city, until they were forced out in the early 1920s by the Saud family. At the time of the Saudi takeover, the Grand Sherif of Mecca was Hussein, great-grandfather of the boy Kings. The Sherif thought he had found a way to refurbish the Hashemite image. He volunteered the family's services to the British in their World War I battles with the Ottoman empire, which was allied with Germany. In return, the Hashemites were to receive large swatches of territory, including Syria.

But the British reneged on part of the deal. The Sherif's son Feisal was made King of Iraq, but a second son, Abdullah, was left with nothing. To make amends, Winston Churchill, then a young British Colonial Secretary, called a conference in Cairo in 1921 which sketched the boundaries of a new kingdom on some unallotted lands near Palestine. The country was called Trans-Jordan.

Abdullah, as the first King of Trans-Jordan, ruled his country uneventfully for 30 years. The most exciting act of his reign came in 1948 when Israel was created and Abdullah annexed a tract of Palestine west of the Jordan. With land on both sides of the river, the King decided to call his country merely Jordan. Control of it remained firmly in the hands of the Trans-Jordanians, however, and Abdullah's Palestinian subjects on the West Bank never really warmed to their King. Many of them suspected that he might agree to a peaceful settlement with Israel: one of the Israeli emissaries who once slipped into Jordan in Arab disguise to plead with the King was Golda Meir. A Palestinian gunman killed Abdullah at Jerusalem's historic Al Aqsa mosque. The assassin

also fired at Grandson Hussein, who was standing beside Abdullah, but the bullet ricocheted off a medal on his uniform. Abdullah was succeeded by Hussein's father, Talal. But after one year, schizophrenia overcame Talal, and Hussein, 18, was proclaimed monarch.

Hussein had been a playboy prince who liked to drive fast cars, chase women, drink too much Scotch in the bar of Amman's old Philadelphia Hotel. In his first days as King, there was scant improvement. His idea of a fun evening was to disguise himself as a taxi driver, pick up customers in Amman and ask them what they thought of their new monarch. Hussein preferred blondes, but in 1955 he married a Hashemite cousin named Dina, several years his elder. She bore him only a daughter, and after two years Hussein quietly divorced her. He soon married a brunette British sec-

retary named Toni Gardiner, whose father was an army officer stationed in Jordan; a convert to Islam, she is known as the Princess Muna, Arabic for "heart's desire." They have two sons, Abdullah, 8, and Feisal, 7, and two-year-old twin daughters, Zein and Aisha. Last week Abdullah and Feisal were tucked off to a British boarding school with a fatherly message from Amman to "be good and work hard."

After 17 years on the throne—and nine assassination attempts—Hussein works hard at the job. He has become a good King—although his Palestinian subjects complain that he has too many corrupt relatives. His chronic fault is that he has always wavered in making decisions. Despite some vacillation last week, it seemed that Hussein finally had mustered the will to execute his purpose. As he said this summer, when he was beginning to lose patience with the guerrillas: "I am not the kind of person who will quit. This mission is part of me and I am part of it. I will see it through to the end."

paratroopers were already on the alert to jump into Jordan if Iraqi or Syrian troops came to the aid of the guerrillas. However, an Israeli invasion would undoubtedly be met by some sort of Egyptian response.

As the battle developed, Hussein appeared to be faring well without help from the outside—though a helicopter stood by at Al-Hummar Palace just in case, ready to lift him to exile (probably in Iran). At 4:05 on a quiet morning in Amman, barely 24 hours after martial law was imposed, an artillery round shattered the predawn quiet. It was the tocsin for a barrage of fire from both sides, mostly in the dark at shapeless targets.

The fighting grew fiercer as the sun rose, however. From whitewashed houses and the ramshackle huts of refugee camps, guerrillas fired on tanks and armored vehicles moving into Amman. Anything that moved in the capital was raked by vicious crossfire. Stranded in the Jordan Inter-Continental Hotel, guests watched as an armored vehicle raced down the street outside and laced a nearby building with 75-mm. shells. "Amman is on fire," reported a guerrilla radio communiqué. The city looked it; a column of thick black smoke from burning petroleum tanks hung in the generally clear and sunlit sky.

Offer to Brothers

The battle between army and guerrillas was not an even one. In addition to 25,000 regulars, the fedayeen could muster 25,000 ragtag militia. Against this sizable but largely undisciplined unit stood the King's 56,000-man force, the best-drilled and most efficient army in the Arab world. Originally trained by Britain's Sir John Bagot Glubb, the army's three armored and nine infantry brigades are equipped with 300 Patton and Centurion tanks, 270 armored and scout cars and 350 armored personnel carriers. Though trained to fight in desert or rural situations, the troops proved adept at street fighting. Gradually, their advantage began to show. By nightfall of the first day, much of Amman was reported in army hands and the battle swirled around the refugee camps where the guerrillas had the edge.

With the army enjoying the upper hand in Amman but still plagued by snipers, Field Marshal Majali called for a cease-fire so that "our brothers, the fedayeen, can join us." The offer had underlying purposes. For one, Amman's population is largely Palestinian; rather than root out the guerrillas, a process that would have cost countless civilian lives, the army preferred to wait them out. The cease-fire could give Majali a chance to shift more of his forces from Amman to the north, where guerrillas from Syria and Lebanon were slipping over the border to join the fight. The guerrillas rejected Majali's call. Arafat declared "revolutionary control" over the region and ordered his forces to fall back on a triangle marked by

the towns of Irbid, Mafraq and Zarka. In the countryside, the situation was cloudy. The guerrillas made some gains; at Ramtha, on the Syrian border, the army wanted to cut the Damascus-Amman highway to sever fedayeen supply routes. At week's end the fedayeen still held the road. But ammunition shortages bothered the beleaguered guerrillas. "Use your rockets only against tanks," was the repeated message from the fedayeen radio in Amman.

In an effort to stop the fighting, Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser dispatched his chief of staff, Lieut. General Mohammed Ahmed Sadek, to arrange a truce. Sadek was unsuccessful.

If Hussein were to defeat the guerrillas, what would his victory do to the power balance of the Middle East?

For the near term, the guerrillas would be in bad shape. Not until December, perhaps, would they be able to resume



a full schedule of raids against the Israelis, and by that time the winter rains would limit operations. They might hinder, perhaps by more skyjacks or other diversions, whatever peace arrangements United Nations Negotiator Gunnar Jarring may be able to work out with Egypt, Jordan and Israel before their temporary truce expires on Nov. 5.

Over the longer range, the outlook for the Palestine Liberation Organization is less gloomy. No Arab doubts that the guerrillas will remain a formidable political force. In the six years since they first began operations against Israel, they have grown to the point where they can only be temporarily subdued but not eliminated.

The seeds of the guerrilla movement were planted in 1948, when Israel was created out of ancient Palestine. Only 160,000 Arabs out of nearly 700,000 elected to remain in the new Jewish state; 500,000 stayed in the Gaza Strip, held by Egypt, and on the West Bank of the Jordan River, taken over by Jordan. Another 700,000 Palestinians were dispersed as refugees; most ended up in 54 refugee camps in Jordan, Syria and Lebanon, where they remained, forgotten by the world and deliberately

abandoned by Arab nations, who found them useful propaganda pawns in the vocal war against Israel.

From these camps, where the residents grew increasingly gray with despair, most of the first guerrillas were recruited. Studying the tactics of the Algerians against the French and even of the Jewish terrorists against the British in the pre-independence days of the mandate, Al-Fatah in 1964 launched its first raid—on a small Israeli pumping station. After that, Arafat's growing group carried out a raid a week to gain experience and with each raid slowly won more support. The Six-Day War in 1967, a debacle for Arab governments, was a boon for the guerrillas. It provided them with thousands of weapons discarded by fleeing Arab soldiers: a grim race went on to see how much of the ordnance the guerrillas could grab before Israeli salvage squads reached it. The war also displaced more Arabs in Gaza and the West Bank and bred frustration and resentment among Arabs toward their disgraced armies. At the same time, the war convinced the displaced Palestinians that other Arabs would nev-

AFRICA, COURT CASES, HARBOR. In March 1968, the guerrillas got another lift. When Israeli forces attacked the fedayeen stronghold at Karameh in Jordan, the guerrillas staged a creditable defense. They discovered that they could at least stand up against regular forces. Today the Palestinians have a new, bold self-image. "Cruel events since '67 have taught us one thing," says Nabeel Shaath, a Palestinian who lectures in economics at the American University in Beirut. "The only way to get the world to notice us is to speak and act as Palestinians."

Warring Ideologies

The guerrillas can thus survive, but to prosper they may have to change. Like many revolutionary movements, their central command is being devoured by warring ideologies.

Politically, the early fedayeen were relatively moderate and undivided. Inevitably, however, as the guerrillas grew more numerous and more prosperous, schisms began to appear. Syria barred the Palestinian guerrillas and organized its own fedayeen, known as Al-Saiqa (the thunderbolt), with "retired" army

officers at their head. Iraq did the same with a smaller organization known as the Arab Liberation Front.

The most disruptive influence on the guerrilla movement was the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, organized in Beirut by a Palestine-born Christian physician named George Habash. Habash's P.F.L.P. has recently become the fastest-growing guerrilla organization because of the group's well-

hurriedly toward the pilot's cabin, one of them carrying a plastic flight bag. Pointing a rusty revolver at a cable and switch that protruded ominously from his satchel, one of them shouted to the captain: "Change course or I'll press the switch and the plane will blow up!" With a small compass that he carried in his pocket, the hijacker made sure that the plane was really changing direction.

Another skyjacking carried out by Palestinian guerrillas? Not quite. A few minutes after that scene occurred over Czechoslovakia last week, the Prague-bound BAC One-Eleven jetliner flown by Rumania's TAROM airlines landed at Munich international airport. As the hijackers stepped onto West German soil, they knelt on the runway to say a prayer of thanksgiving. While the airliner was refueling to resume its interrupted flight, another of the passengers, a 31-year-old East Berlin engineer who had had nothing to do with the hijacking, decided on the spur of the moment to capitalize on his good fortune and defect from the Communist world.

The hijackings of recent years have victimized mostly Western passengers and companies. Many of the pirates have been professed Communists or sympathizers bound for places like Cuba and North Korea, or Arab irregulars headed anywhere from Algiers to Damascus. But Communist airlines have not escaped the skyjackers. In the past year alone, at least ten East European craft have been commandeered by pas-

sengers and diverted to Western or neutral airports. No plane has yet been hijacked from the Soviet Union, however, probably because Russian crews have shown a willingness to use firearms to stop them. Nearly all of the hijackers have sought political asylum outside the Iron Curtain. In the midst of the search for ways to prevent sky piracy, their arrival has posed a painful question for non-Communist governments: Is there ever any legitimate excuse for hijacking an airliner?

Many of the East European refugees are fleeing harsh repression at home and can find no other way of getting to another country. So far, none has damaged an aircraft or injured any of its passengers. In comparing the successful Hungarian heist with the nightmare hijackings carried out by Palestinian commandos, the *Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung* editorialized: "The Palestinian extremists want to terrorize by taking hostages, while the young Poles, Czechs, East Germans or Hungarians want to shake from their shoes the dust of hermetically closed territories. This difference in motivation and mentality will have to be kept in mind."

For all that, however, there is little difference in method. Anti-Communist hijackers, like the pro-Communist or Arab variety, are generally armed, and thus they subject passengers and crew to some danger. Moreover, if the U.S. and other major victims are to secure worldwide cooperation in preventing

executed and widely publicized raids on airlines, culminating in the quadruple skyjack two weeks ago. Among Arabs, Habash is equally notable for having made ideology a paramount concern among the fedayeen for the first time. Rooted in Marxist dogma strongly tinged with Maoism, the P.F.L.P. wants not only to attack Israel but also to topple what it considers backward, corrupt and conservative Arab governments. "We do not want peace," Habash told the West German magazine *Stern* recently. "Peace would be the end of all our hopes. We shall sabotage any peace negotiations in the future." Nor would Habash mind, he said, if the Middle East crisis triggered World War III. "If this should be the only possibility to destroy Israel, Zionism and Arab reactionism, then we wish for it. The entire world except us has something to lose."

Habash's intensely doctrinaire movement has spawned several offshoots. Two splinter groups, the Popular Democratic Front for the Liberation of Palestine and the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, General Command, are more rabidly Maoist than Habash is; both have seats on Arafat's central committee. They and similar splinters badly disrupt the coordination of the

group and sap the effectiveness of the guerrilla movement.

As the fedayeen fragmented, fought among themselves and began menacing the governments of Jordan and Lebanon in particular, Arab rulers began to squirm. Hussein once declared, "We are all fedayeen," but he finally mustered his army to chastise the movement. Egypt's Nasser in other days hailed the fedayeen as "the vanguard of the Arab revolution." Now, worried that the guerrillas' romantic image may be undercutting his own, Nasser ventures fewer and fewer encouraging words.

Monitoring the civil war in Jordan last week, Cairo radio was unusually severe: "Egypt will not allow a Palestine maverick group to jeopardize the peace-seeking efforts of the Arabs." Moscow, too, scolded the guerrillas and warned Syria and Iraq, both Peking-leaning regimes, to keep hands off. As far as Jordan is concerned, the Soviets presumably would prefer even a monarchy to guerrillas who might wind up in Peking's corner.

The withdrawal of Nasser's support will not wither the fedayeen. Despite differences and setbacks, the guerrillas will continue as a potent force in the Middle East—an intruding hand capable of re-

Hijackers

hijackings, they can hardly expect to set a double standard.

Washington has chosen a middle course. U.S. delegates at a meeting of the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) in Montreal last week proposed that countries that took no action against hijackers be subjected to an international air boycott. However, each country would have a choice of extraditing the hijacker or prosecuting him locally. President Nixon, who supervised the drafting of the plans, prefers extradition of U.S. hijackers, and for that reason has ordered the renegotiation of existing extradition treaties to include hijackers specifically. The U.S. is even willing to waive the death penalty, which hijackers risk under American law, if they are caught in a country that does not impose capital punishment.

But the right to political asylum makes extradition a practical impossibility in many places; West Germany, for example, would be as loath to ship a Bulgarian hijacker back to Sofia as, say, Egypt would be to send a disaffected Israeli back to Jerusalem. The U.S. plan seeks to assure victim nations that hijackers would face the force of law somewhere. Perhaps the most blatant example of a hijacker who escaped punishment altogether occurred last January in Lebanon, where a 26-year-old Frenchman who took over a TWA jetliner to draw sympathy for the Arab cause was treated to a free vacation, entertained at the homes of Lebanese Cabinet

ministers, and generally feted as a hero.

Last week West Germany held its first trial involving East European refugee skyjackers. The defendants were eight Czechoslovaks who forced a national airliner to fly from near Karlovy Vary to Nuremberg. In their defense, they claimed that they were in imminent danger of arrest for anti-Soviet activities after the 1968 Russian invasion of their country. They found considerable sympathy: five got suspended sentences, while the three who carried weapons and gave orders were each sentenced to 30 months for "deprivation of liberty and coercion." The court president, in his opinion, expressed doubt that the three had been in as much danger of arrest as they claimed, leaving the impression that had their plight been more desperate, their sentences, too, would have been suspended.

The Hungarians, who arrived in Munich during the Czechoslovaks' trial, expected to be prosecuted, but they also anticipated light sentences. "Here we will have to be in jail for a while," said one. "In Hungary we were permanently unfree." Whatever their punishment, it will doubtless be a good deal more lenient than what their own government would prescribe. Last March, a young married couple in East Germany had occasion to contemplate the future of hijackers behind the Iron Curtain and decided it would be intolerable. Having failed to blast open two locked cockpit doors on the plane they were attempting to commandeer, they put their pistols into their mouths and fired.

in any settlement. Ultimately, as even Hussein knows, the only way to defuse this threat is not by force of arms but by fulfilling the fundamental fedayeen demand for a Palestinian homeland.

Ideally the Palestinians, who are generally the best educated and most cultured of all Arabs, would like to turn the clock back to the days before the Balfour Declaration pledged the creation of a Jewish homeland. They would reconstitute the old Palestine, which includes the present Israel, the West Bank of the Jordan River and the Gaza Strip. They would bar "Zionists" but would allow native-born Jews to live with them in a nonreligious society. By "native-born Jews," however, some Palestinians mean those born in the area before Israel came into being in 1948; that would amount to a small fraction of Israel's 2,800,000 people.

Artificial Creation

After the P.F.L.P. two weeks ago engineered its multiple skyjacking, hostages aboard the planes were given literature and lectures by the guerrillas, setting forth the Palestinian positions. Many of the hostages came away more sympathetic than when they started. "They think the idea of one nation with one re-

ligion is prejudiced, and they were kicked out of their homes," said Catherine Holz, 15, of New York as she reached the safety of Cyprus. "They gave us some pamphlets. People said it was propaganda, but I believe that some of it was true."

Many Western students of the Middle East believe that the surest way to secure peace is to establish a Palestinian state. Most often the West Bank of the Jordan, captured by the Israelis during the 1967 war, is suggested as a possible site. In recent months, however, Middle East experts in both the U.S. and Israel have been thinking more and more seriously about a different alternative for a Palestinian state. Why not, they suggest, convert prewar Jordan into such a state?

The proposal is so far only fancy, but persuasive arguments for it can be mustered. The Palestinians who make up nearly two-thirds of Jordan's population are not particularly devoted to either the country as it now exists or to the Hashemite dynasty. Moreover, Jordan is an artificial creation to begin with.

Hussein could bring peace to the Middle East, so goes the argument, by abdicating in favor of a popular government. The fedayeen would then have the joy—and the sobering responsibility

—of a country of their own. It would not be exactly the country most of them want. Undoubtedly, hostility toward Israel would remain intense. But usually the Palestinians might recognize the finality of the Jewish state and conclude a general peace.

Unstable as Water

The argument has obvious flaws. With former fedayeen at its helm, Jordan might march against Israel before the advocates of peace have a chance to prevail. Further, there would almost certainly be a savage internal dogfight as the leaders of rival factions struggled for paramouncy—and the battle would be complicated by the presence of Jordan's Bedouins, who make up 35% of the population and despise the fedayeen. The greatest immediate flaw, of course, is that Jordan's young King—as long as his shaky throne lasts—will have no intention of handing his kingdom over to his adversaries.

More than any of the Arab peoples, the fedayeen fit the description set forth by T. E. Lawrence in his *Seven Pillars of Wisdom* more than 40 years ago: "They were as unstable as water, and like water would perhaps finally prevail." Will the guerrillas

also ultimately prevail? In one way they already have, for the world will never again be able to ignore them, as they smolder in their refugee camps, without attempting to find at least some rational solution for their plight. In another way, they cannot prevail without first achieving a measure of stability and substituting a sense of modern reality for their fanatical insistence on the destruction of Israel.

The Missile Impasse

WHILE Jordan's civil war set off a new and dangerous explosion in the Middle East last week, the print fuse was still burning away ominously. As the 90-day cease-fire worked out between Israel and Egypt in August passed its halfway mark, chances of any resulting settlement were becoming increasingly slim. Israeli Premier Golda Meir, after conferring in Washington with President Nixon, again ruled out negotiations with the other side until Egypt agreed to "roll back" the Soviet missiles that were installed in the standstill zone along the Suez in violation of truce terms. Egyptian Foreign Minister Mahmoud Riad angrily declared that

with Nixon, to be sure they could have a meeting of the minds."

On the question of aid, she found the prospects fairly reassuring. Even before she left, word leaked out that the U.S. would sell Israel at least 17 new Phantoms. Though no final agreement on the entire program was reached in Washington, U.S. officials estimated that Israel can count on about half a billion dollars in aid over the next two years, with about half of that amount earmarked for arms.

For the last quarter-hour of their 90-minute meeting, Nixon and Mrs. Meir dismissed their aides and talked alone. The Israeli Prime Minister was known to have two thoughts on her

ment to halt the current buildup must precede any bargaining.

Why did Egypt and the Soviets weigh their agreement? The Soviets' move seemed perplexing in view of their generally cooperative attitude in negotiations like SALT. U.S. officials speculated about several possible theories. One view was that the Soviets simply cynically exploited the absence of Israeli jets over Egypt to complete the installation of an effective air defense system, knowing that the U.S. would probably not retaliate directly. Another explanation was that Russia had grown uneasy over the U.S. foothold as "middle man" in the Arab-Israeli dispute and deliberately violated the cease-fire to force Washington to resume its old role as the partisan and sponsor of the Israelis, thus driving a new wedge between the U.S. and the Arabs.

Whatever the Soviets' motivation, they profited from two goofs in Washington's handling of the cease-fire arrangements. In his desire for a quick end to the hostilities, Secretary of State William P. Rogers failed to obtain written agreement from Moscow on exact terms of the agreement, leaving many possible infractions open to dispute. Also, the U.S. promised that it would try to "rectify" any violations, including military buildups, that occurred during the 90 days. Such a pledge made the U.S. a virtual guarantor of the status quo—a bigger job than it could possibly handle.

Despite all the scars on the U.S. initiative, Rogers is still convinced that peace remains in the interest of both sides, and that the issues preventing them from discussing a settlement are secondary. With last week's opening of the U.N. General Assembly in Manhattan, Israeli and Arab representatives are in the same city and are at least in the proper physical proximity to begin talks at any time. The other promising sign is that along the Suez, the cease-fire itself—despite the arguments and violations that revolve around it—has yet to be broken by gunfire.

JAPAN

The Biggest Ever

For neophytes in staging world's fairs, the Japanese did themselves proud. When the lights of Expo '70, Asia's first universal exposition, dimmed in Osaka last week after six months, attendance stood at a record 64,218,770. Ever meticulous about details, the Japanese also reported that: The average visitor spent four hours waiting in lines, meaning that almost a quarter of a billion man-hours were whiled away in queues; there were 48,190 lost children but nearly three times as many lost adults—127,457, mostly rural oldsters; 55 weddings were performed on the fairgrounds and one birth (a boy) occurred; there were 1,938 reported thefts and 141 people arrested for drunkenness; the visitors left behind 19,700 tons of trash, or about 10 oz. per fairgoer.

the U.S. peace initiative was "dead."

Mrs. Meir, flanked by Israeli security guards and appearing unusually solemn, arrived in the U.S. on two vital missions. First, she wanted to negotiate a long-term package of military and economic aid. Her military shopping list included sophisticated electronic equipment and Phantom jets that would partially offset Israel's loss of advantage at the Suez front caused by the forward deployment of the Soviet missiles. The economic proposals mainly involved long-term credits to a nation that spends almost 30% of its gross national product on defense, more than three times what the U.S. allocates.

Private Talk. Her second—and far more pressing—task was to size up the Nixon Administration's moral commitment to Israel. Washington's heavy pressure on Israel to accept the cease-fire and its slowness in admitting that the agreement was almost immediately violated by the Egyptians have deeply shaken Israeli confidence in their most important ally. Said an official: "Golda wanted to establish a personal rapport

mind. She wanted Nixon to have a clear idea of Israel's minimal conditions for a final settlement, which include continued control over the Golan Heights and those sections of Jerusalem seized during the Six-Day War. In addition, she was determined to let the President know that Israel intended to boycott any negotiations with the Arabs until the missile violations are halted.

American Goofs. On that point, Mrs. Meir got an argument. The U.S. contends that the violations have not altered Israel's overall military superiority in the Middle East, and that Israel should take advantage of Egypt's willingness to talk. The Israelis, who point out that they have lost the freedom of the air over much of the Suez front, adamantly refuse to negotiate under present conditions. Following Mrs. Meir's round of Washington talks, the State Department had no choice but to announce, somewhat weakly, that "we will continue to make diplomatic efforts to obtain rectification." Privately, Israeli officials acknowledge that it is no longer feasible to expect withdrawal of the missiles, but



Attached is pertinent portion of today's 9/17/70 "Washington Post" column by Jack Anderson captioned "Israeli Tipped U.S. on Hijackings." Therein he reports that Israel, prior to the recent skyjackings, warned U.S. authorities of the possibility of such activity by Palestinian terrorists but that such warning was unfortunately ignored. The Director inquired regarding the article.

Bureau files fail to disclose the receipt of any such warning or related data from the Israelis. However, our Legat, Paris, on 8/14/70 advised that French authorities had learned of an alleged plan by Palestinian terrorists to board an unidentified Swissair flight which they would subsequently hijack in an effort to bring about U.S. pressure on the Swiss Government for the release of three Palestinian terrorists being held in Switzerland for their participation in an earlier terrorist attack on a Swiss flight. United States pressure would be forthcoming in view of the fact that the hijacking would take place at a time when U.S. citizens were on board. The French authorities furnished this information to the Swiss Government, alerted security forces at airports in Europe and authorities of Swissair.

The information from Legat, Paris, was disseminated by teletype 8/14/70 to the White House, Central Intelligence Agency, State Department, Secret Service and with copies to the Attorney General and the Criminal Division of the Department of Justice. The Federal Aviation Administration was telephonically advised.

It is noted that Arab guerrillas hijacked a Swissair jet liner 9/6/70 following departure from Zurich, Switzerland, bound for New York with 155 passengers on board. This plane was subsequently destroyed at a guerrilla airstrip in Jordan.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round Israeli Tipped U.S. on Hijackings

By Jack Anderson

Our investigation into the skyjacking story has produced two startling discoveries:

1. Several days before the multiple skyjackings, Israel tipped off U.S. authorities that the Palestinian guerrillas might pull such a stunt to dramatize their cause and to upset the Middle East truce.

2. The Secret Service uses electronic and ultra-violet devices to prevent the smuggling of weapons or explosives aboard White House planes. If the airlines had been willing to take the same precautions, air piracy probably could have been stopped long ago.

The Israeli warning called attention to the possibility that Palestinian fanatics might attack or seize airliners belonging to Israel or the United States. The Israelis correctly guessed that the Popular Front would be the most likely to attempt this kind of drama in the sky.

The Popular Front is led by a fervent Christian Arab, George Habbash, who used to head a band of nuns before he took command of the guerrilla group. He is determined to block any Middle East settlement that isn't decided by Arab arms. The Israelis figured Habbash was desperate and daring enough to plan some skyjackings.

A warning, therefore, was delivered to U.S. authorities and to Israel's own airline, El Al. The U.S. unfortunately ignored the warning.

But El Al, thanks to the alert, not only thwarted one skyjacking attempt but barred two suspicious passengers from another flight. The two men subsequently boarded a Pan American jumbo jet bound from Amsterdam to New York.

The Odd Couple

El Al spotted the pair and alerted the control tower which notified the Pan Am captain as he taxied the huge airliner into position for take-off. He searched the two passengers who, incidentally, carried Senegalese passports. He found nothing, apologized to them and roared down the runway.


Less than 30 minutes afterward, the pair produced pistols and hand grenades, seized control of the jumbo jet and brought it down in Cairo. The guerrillas later blew up the \$24 million plane.

Clearly, the big airlines haven't taken proper precaution to protect their passengers from air piracy.

Footnote: Perhaps George Habbash, himself, unintentionally has offered the solution to air piracy. Talking about Israel, he once said: "We have to stand against whoever supports Israel economically, militarily, politically, ideologically."

Maybe the time has come for the airline passengers and workers to stand against a nation that support skyjackers. Passengers can refuse to fly

Cuba is the worst offender. Only three airlines — Russia's Aeroflot, Spain's Iberia and Cuba's own Cubana—fly into Havana. North Korea, which has also refused to deal with skyjackers, is served only by Aeroflot.

In the Middle East, Egypt and Syria have harbored air pirates. These countries are served by Air France, Air India, Alitalia, BOAC, Czechoslovak Airlines, Ethiopian Airlines, Iraqi Airways, Japan Air Lines, Kuwait Airlines, Middle East Airlines, Pakistan International, Pan American, Qantas, SAS, Swissair, Syrian-Arab Airlines and TWA.

The Republican National Committee has delivered a smart slap in the face to Harvard students who heeded President Nixon's appeal to work non-violently within the system.



[redacted] stated that due to the nature of international travel, ticket sales and airline manifests leave a lot to be desired. Incomplete, misspelled names, failure to indicate sex, citizenship, identify geographic residences et cetera complicates, in an emergency situation, any effort to establish a 100% accurate listing of persons traveling. In this particular instance, it must also be appreciated the American Embassy, Amman, Jordan, was practically in a state of seige, short of actual war. There were electrical power and water failures, the travel of assigned U. By law dated 8/28/68 all U. S. Passports are valid for five years from their original date of issuance. Thus any U. S. Passport prefix designator prior to F above (meaning 1965) would be expired and invalid.

Passport application photographs of the following individuals are not included in instant dissemination:

The Bureau is being designated as Office of Origin on persons with an overseas permanent residence.

For the benefit of recipient offices, it is noted the USDS has placed stops with INS against the persons and their passports listed in LHM enclosure.

WFO is putting the identity of the one-hundred and fifty persons, including their DOB and passport number, into the NCIC system. This is being done should any FBI office, not included in instant dissemination, have a future reason to make inquiry on the fraudulent use of the passports. They are similarly entered into NCIC should another U. S. Government agency have reason to determine any fraudulent use of these passports. As these passports are generally valid by law for a five-year period, the NCIC could be purged in five years from the date of this communication.

He reiterated that this was common gossip, and like all rumors, its seriousness was probably exaggerated each time it was repeated. He pointed out that during the time that Arab commandos were holding hostages on a desert air strip in Jordan, a general uneasiness prevailed, particularly among individuals involved with the security of aircraft. Conditions were "ripe" for the spread and growth of rumors.
