#### **FBI FOIPA Addendum**

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

#### Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) Intelligence Records. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records is itself a classified fact protected by FOIA exemption (b)(1) and/or would reveal intelligence sources, methods, or activities protected by exemption (b)(3) [50 USC § 3024(i)(1)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that any such records do or do not exist.

## Part 2: The standard responses below apply to all requests for records on individuals:

- (i) Requests for Records about any Individual—Watch Lists. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of any individual's name on a watch list pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(7)(E) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(7)(E), (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that watch list records do or do not exist.
- (ii) Requests for Records about any Individual—Witness Security Program Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records which could identify any participant in the Witness Security Program pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(3) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(3), 18 U.S.C. 3521, and (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.
- (iii) Requests for Confidential Informant Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of confidential informant records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F) [5 U.S.C.§ § 552 (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F)] and Privacy Act exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C.§ 552a (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records would reveal confidential informant identities and information, expose law enforcement techniques, and endanger the life or physical safety of individuals. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.

## Part 3: General Information:

- (i) Record Searches and Standard Search Policy. The Record/Information Dissemination Section (RIDS) searches for reasonably described records by searching systems, such as the Central Records System (CRS), or locations where responsive records would reasonably be found. The CRS is an extensive system of records consisting of applicant, investigative, intelligence, personnel, administrative, and general files compiled by the FBI per its law enforcement, intelligence, and administrative functions. The CRS spans the entire FBI organization, comprising records of FBI Headquarters, FBI Field Offices, and FBI Legal Attaché Offices (Legats) worldwide; Electronic Surveillance (ELSUR) records are included in the CRS. The standard search policy is a search for main entity records in the CRS. Unless specifically requested, a standard search does not include a search for reference entity records, administrative records of previous FOIPA requests, or civil litigation files.
  - a. *Main Entity Records* created for individuals or non-individuals who are the subjects or the focus of an investigation
  - b. Reference Entity Records- created for individuals or non-individuals who are associated with a case but are not known subjects or the focus of an investigation
- (ii) **FBI Records.** Founded in 1908, the FBI carries out a dual law enforcement and national security mission. As part of this dual mission, the FBI creates and maintains records on various subjects; however, the FBI does not maintain records on every person, subject, or entity.
- (iii) **Foreseeable Harm Standard.** As amended in 2016, the Freedom of Information Act provides that a federal agency may withhold responsive records only if: (1) the agency reasonably foresees that disclosure would harm an interest protected by one of the nine exemptions that FOIA enumerates, or (2) disclosure is prohibited by law (5 United States Code, Section 552(a)(8)(A)(i)). The FBI considers this foreseeable harm standard in the processing of its requests.
- (iv) Requests for Criminal History Records or Rap Sheets. The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division provides Identity History Summary Checks often referred to as a criminal history record or rap sheet. These criminal history records are not the same as material in an investigative "FBI file." An Identity History Summary Check is a listing of information taken from fingerprint cards and documents submitted to the FBI in connection with arrests, federal employment, naturalization, or military service. #### EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

## SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual;
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (d)(5) information compiled in reasonable anticipation of a civil action proceeding;
- (j)(2) material reporting investigative efforts pertaining to the enforcement of criminal law including efforts to prevent, control, or reduce crime or apprehend criminals;
- (k)(1) information which is currently and properly classified pursuant to an Executive order in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy, for example, information involving intelligence sources or methods;
- (k)(2) investigatory material compiled for law enforcement purposes, other than criminal, which did not result in loss of a right, benefit or privilege under Federal programs, or which would identify a source who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence:
- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.

At 10:00 a.m., 10/31/64, the New York Office telephonically advised that the above three subjects had been identified as responsible for the major jewel theft of the American Museum of Natural History, New York, New York, on October 29 - 30, 1964. In this theft

\$178,595 in precious jems were stolen which included the Star of India valued at \$50,000, the Edith Haggin DeLong Star Rubby valued at \$21, 400, the Midnight Star valued at \$35,000 and numerous other

valuable jems.

Information was received through a police informant and further verification by a New York Criminal Informant that Kuhn and Murphy departed New York at 9:15 a.m., 10/30/64, by an unknown airlines destined for Miami, Florida. Clark was also partially identified as the third subject and it is believed he has left New York City, destined for Connecticut.

The USA New York, has authorized prosecution of Kuhn and Murphy and extensive investigation is being conducted in Miami in an effort to locate these subjects. It is believed Kuhn and Murphy have possession of the stolen jewels in Florida.

New York advised they are holding any press release concerning the developments in this case in abeyance until the Miami investigation is completed and subjects located. REC-21



This case concerns the burglary on the night of October 29 - 30, 1964, of the Museum of Natural History, New York City. The subjects took a number of priceless gems from the jewel case, including the 563-karat "Star of India Sapphire." The burglars are in custody but the gems have not been recovered.

By letter dated 11/1/64, the New York Office forwarded to the Laboratory a piece of glass removed from the jewel case by the subjects. Several strips of 1/2" wide adhesive tape were stuck to the piece of glass by the subjects. Also forwarded were a partial roll of 1/2" wide adhesive tape from the New York apartment of the subjects and known gravel and soil samples from the crime scene.

The pieces of tape on the piece of glass are similar to the tape on the roll but no end of the pieces of tape could be matched to the outer end of the roll of tape.

By letter dated 11/1/64, the Miami Office submitted three rolls of 2" wide adhesive tape from the Miami apartment of Allan Dale Kuhn and bandages and debris removed from the right elbow of Jack Rolland Murphy. The rolls of 2tt wide tape are different from the pieces of 1/2" wide adhesive tape on the piece of glass from the jewel case. No mineral matter of value for significant comparisons was found on the bandages and debris from the arm of Jack Rolland Murphy.

Results of examination:

Several minute particles of glass were found on the wheels of the Q6 and Q8 glass cutters. This glass, however, had different optical properties from the Q1, K23 and K24 glass specimens and did not originate from the panes of glass represented by these specimens.

Specimens Q4 and Q5 consisted of a small amount of asphaltic material mixed with silty debris. This material was different from specimens K2 through K5 and the K21 gravel.

There are not sufficient individual microscopic characteristics remaining in the scores on specimens Q1, K22 and K23 through K25 to identify the specific tool, or tools, used to produce them.

No paint chips were found in specimen K25 for comparison with the paint on the glass cutters, specimens Q6, Q7 and Q8.





ANTHONY RICCI is an individual who is under intensive investigation by the Miami Division (Miami File 92-112; Bureau File 92-3247). He has resided in the Miami area now for several years and is formerly from the New York and Chicago areas.

RICCI is alleged to be in the "shylock" business and continues his association with known hoodlums whenever the situations present themselves. He gives the appearance of being surrounded by individuals at Maruca's service station on a daily basis where he converses with them. The individuals have past and present backgrounds of being "shylocks", jewel thieves and gamblers.

The individual observed talking to RICCI at Maruca's service station on November 9, 1964 is described as follows:

White male, approximately early 30's, 5'8" - 10", 190 - 210 lbs., heavy build, dark brown hair, light complexion

CLINKthe whether or not he would consent to submit to a polygraph examination concerning this robbery and the facts as furnished by particularly in view of the extensive investihiml gation which had been conducted by the FBI and other law enforcement agencies during the ten days prior to this robbery concerning ALLEN DALE KUHN and JACK MURPHY, both friends of PEARSON and b6 b7C relating to the burglary of the American Museum of Natural History in New York City for which, KUHN, MURPHY It was pointed out that and ROGER CLARK had been arrested. a polygraph examination of PEARSON would be highly desirable to establish beyond any doubt that an actual robbery of PEARSON and others had taken place at the PEARSON residence as claimed, and that same had not been a "fake" robbery or a "put-up" job in an effort to focus the investigative attention of law enforcement officers away from the museum burglary and persons under investigation regarding that burglary.

PEARSON advised that he readily understood why such polygraph examination of him would be desirable, because of this investigation and because of the reputation of numerous associates and acquaintances of his, but he was declining to take a polygraph examination or lie-detector test, for two reasons. PEARSON stated that first he considers himself a very poor subject for a polygraph examination, due to his being highly nervous and has high blood pressure. He said that while

he was in the U. S. Navy he had made four separate attempts to get into the submarine service, and each time was found to have high blood pressure which caused him to be rejected. PEARSON also advised that some months ago he had been erroneously identified by a Miami woman as one of the individuals who robbed this woman, for which he had been arrested by the Dade County Sheriff's Office. Officers at that time requested he take a polygraph examination, which he declined to do until he consulted his attorney, even though he knew he was innocent. His attorney later advised against taking a polygraph examination. PEARSON stated he then obtained books and literature on Polygraph machines, operators and experiments, and read up on these matters. He was advised by a friend (law enforcement officer whom he would not identify) that the polygraph operator for the Dade County Sheriff's Office was not at all reliable and reportedly made errors in his findings (favorable and unfavorable for the subject being examined), and as a result of all this he made up his mind that he would never submit to any polygraph examination for any reason. PEARSON concluded that he realized prior to this conversation that there might be considerable question regarding the reality of his robbery, and as to whether or not same might have been a planned affair or a "set-up", but PEARSON insisted that he is quite certain this was not the case, adding that he would never have had any part in subjecting his wife and friends to the torture and punishment and danger which they underwent in the robbery of their residence the previous night. For above reasons, he respectfully declined to take a polygraph examination concerning this matter.

After interviews on November 7, 10 and 12, 1964,



#### DETAILS:

On November 10, 1964 KUHN and MURPHY appeared before U. S. Commissioner EDWARD P. SWAN, Miami. SWAN at the request of Assistant U. S. Attorney AARON A. FOOSANER, Miami, granted a continuance of the hearing until November 17, 1964. SWAN stated no further continuances would be granted in this case, that the government must be prepared to present its case or he would have no alternative but to dismiss the charges against KUHN and MURPHY.

On November 17, 1964, KUHN and MURPHY, represented by attorney HARVEY ST. JEAN, appeared before U. S. Commissioner EDWARD P. SWAN, Miami. SWAN possessed a telegram from the U. S. Attorney's Office, Southern District of New York, copies of which were furnished to Assistant U. S. Attorney AARON A. FOOSANER, Miami, and attorney ST. JEAN. The telegram requested that SWAN grant a further continuance of the ITSP hearing, that the case was currently being presented to Federal Grand Jury at Southern District of New York. Although ST JEAN objected to any further continuances, SWAN granted the continuance until December 1, 1964, with the provision that he be immediately notified of the results of the Federal Grand Jury.

ST. JEAN advised SWAN he intended to take KUHN and MURPHY to New York and surrender them to authorities, requesting that they be allowed to travel to the Southern District of New York under the existing bond. Commissioner SWAN granted permission; no objections were made by Mr. FOOSANER.

On November 12, 1964 in the Justice of the Peace Court of Judge HUGH F. DUVAL, defense attorney ST JEAN challenged that KUHN and MURPHY were not the ones named in the local warrant out of New York. He further advised that he needed time to study the warrants. Judge DUVAL continued the hearing until November 18, 1964.

On November 17, 1964 KUHN and MURPHY appeared before Circuit Court Judge FRANCIS J. CHRISTE and on ST JEAN's advice of counsel, signed waiver of formal extradition, ST. JEAN advising KUHN and MURPHY were voluntarily being returned to New York City on November 18, 1964.

On November 18, 1964 KUHN and MURPHY accompanied by their attorney and three New York detectives boarded National Airlines Flight 80, non-stop jet from Miami to New York's Kennedy Airport. They departed Miami at 9:00 a.m., scheduled to arrive in New York City at 11:20 a.m.

Late on the date of November 18, 1964, KUHN and MURPHY returned to Miami, after having posted bond of \$20,000 and subsequent release by New York authorities.



At 11:30 am, November 4, 1964, was interviewed at the B & M Diner, Biscayne Boulevard and 52nd Street, Northeast, Miami, Florida.
At the outset of the interview, was advised by SA WILLIAM F. BEANE that he was not required to make any statement whatsoever without first consulting legal counsel. He was further informed that any statement he did make could be used against him in a court of law. No threats, promises or other inducements were made to in connection with this interview.
He advised that he had just come from a visit with ALLAN KUHN at a location which he chose not to identify. He pointed out that he met with KUHN at the request of SA BEANE and attempted to encourage KUHN to surrender the jewelry stolen from the Museum of Natural History in New York City on October 29-30, 1964, to the FBI. He suggested to KUHN that he could surrender this jewelry anonymously inasmuch as the FBI has numerous persons in the Miami area looking for the jewelry, and if it were returned amonymously through the mails or if information was furnished amonymously by telephone to the FBI as to its location, the FBI would have no means whatever of determining who was responsible for its return.  suggested to KUHN that such a maneuver would take an enormous amount of "heat" off of as well as off of himself (KUHN), CLARK and MURPHY.  stated that he indicated to KUHN in the strongest language at his command that now that arrests have been made in this case, the jewelry is virtually worthless and would have no marketable value through any fence. KUHN responded to that he was very sorry, but he did not wish to discuss the museum theft with anyone, "not even you", (meaning KUHN advised that he was taking this position on advice of counsel.

PEARSON stated that on Thursday, October 29, 1964, he had left Providence. Rhode Island, at approximately 1:00 or 1:15 P.M. via American Airlines and had arrived in New York City at approximately 2:15 P.M. He stated he arrived at Kennedy Airport and gave serious consideration to going into the city for dinner, inasmuch as he had about a three hour wait for the next non-stop flight to Miami. He stated, however, he remained at the airport and took a National Airlines flight, leaving at 5:20 P.M., which was a nonstop jet flight to Miami, which arrived at approximately 8:15 P.M. He stated he took a cab directly to his home from the airport. He stated on Friday morning, he spent most of the morning at his residence and then, in the noon and early afternoon, made several social and business calls to individuals whom he stated he would rather not identify. He stated that \_\_\_\_\_ subsequently advised him that during his absence, ALLAN KUHN paid a visit to his residence, accompanied by a girl friend. He stated he had last seen ALLAN KUHN at his own residence on Sunday evening, October 11, 1964. He stated he has known KUHN for several years. To the best of his knowledge, KUHN made his living as a swimming instructor and scuba diver. He stated that apparently, KUHN did very well as he was currently supporting a luxurious apartment in the Brickell Towers.

PEARSON stated that he personally left Miami approximately two weeks previously and that he had toured New England with a friend, whom he refused to identify. He stated he traveled by means of a rental car in that area.

PEARSON stated that he did not participate in and had no knowledge of the theft of the valuable jewels at the Museum of Natural History in New York City. He stated he personally felt it was foolish to steal such museum pieces because there was no practical market for such items.

PEARSON was advised that after making several unsuccessful calls to contact his attorney, ALLAN KUHN, subsequent to his arrest, attempted to contact the PEARSON residence. PEARSON quickly stated that it was only logical for KUHN to attempt to contact him, stating they both utilized the same attorney, HARVEY ST. JEAN, and that KUHN knew that he, PEARSON, would certainly attempt to locate his attorney to assist him if he were in trouble.

PEARSON stated he first heard of KUHN and MURPHY being arrested from \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ who also lives at the Brickell Towers, when \_\_\_\_\_\_ called him late Saturday afternoon, approximately 4:00 P.M. \_\_\_\_\_\_ advised him that ALLAN KUHN had called him by telephone and had requested assistance in locating his attorney, HARVEY ST. JEAN. PEARSON stated he then contacted HARVEY ST. JEAN at his residence, who advised him that he had been in contact with KUHN at the Miami Office of the Federal Sureau of Investigation.





X. INTERVIEW WITH ROGER CLARK

ROGER FREDERICK CLARK was observed and met in the restaurant located in the basement of the Casablanca Hotel, 6345 Collins Avenue, Miami Beach, Florida.

CLARK was observed walking past the pool area and down the ramp leading to the basement of the Casablanca Hotel with another individual who appeared familiar as a pool manager at the Martinique Hotel, or a hotel in the immediate vicinity of the Casablanca Hotel. CLARK was next observed in the restaurant of the hotel, seated with the afore-mentioned individual.

Agent sat down next to CLARK and asked him how he was getting along, whereupon CLARK freely and voluntarily stated he was getting along all right "down here". He further stated that he had been treated bad in New York, explaining that the police beat him with a blackjack to obtain a confession. CLARK further stated that "the police made the agents leave the floor" before they beat him, that he "told them anything" so the police would leave him alone.

A close observation of CLARK reflected that he had no visible marks or bruises about the head or face, and there were no visible marks or bruises on his arms, noting that CLARK was wearing a short sleeved pale green sport shirt. Observation did reflect that CLARK had rings and bags under his eyes, and he did state he "just got up" and was still tired.



On November 12, 1964, Lieutenant MARVIN SELSKY, Dade County Sheriff's Office, Robbery Division, telephonically contacted SA EDWARD A. ROMANOFF to advise that he had received an anonymous telephone call from a girl who stated to him that BEN OLSEN, 136 East 56th Street, New York City, was responsible for setting up scores in the New York City and Miami Beach, Florida areas.

Lieutenant SELSKY asked the anonymous caller if she was referring to KUHN and MURPHY, whereupon the female caller stated "yes, those queer beachboys". The caller stated further to SELSKY that OLSEN set up three major scores in the Miami Beach area during the last season.

On November 15, 1964, an anonymous telephone call was received by Clerk ROBERT T. GILLIGAN at the Miami Office of the FBI. The anonymous caller, a female, stated she had just received information from an unidentified source that BEN OLSEN might possibly be involved in the jewel theft at the American Museum of Natural History, New York City. OLSEN was described as "a finger man who befriended females and then exploited his position by executing successful jewel thefts." The caller advised that OLSEN was responsible for setting up scores in the Miami Beach She further advised that OLSEN had been living in West Palm Beach and has been associating with KUHN and MURPHY, but failed to elaborate on this alleged comradeship. The caller advised that OLSEN two months prior to the New York jewel theft, relocated in New York City at 105 East 61st Street, and has been known to be casing a number of jewel depositories.

#### PURPOSE

This is to advise of current developments in the investigation of the burglary of precious gems from the American Museum of Natural History, New York City.

### BACKGROUND

During the night of October 29-30, 1964, the American Museum of Natural History, New York City, was burglarized and a number of precious gems including the 563 carat Star of India sapphire were taken.

Our New York Office quickly developed information identifying the persons responsible for the theft. Roger Frederick Clark, arrested at New York City, October 31, 1964, admitted acting as a lookout while the burglary was committed by Allan Dale Kuhn and Jack Rolland Murphy.

It was learned Kuhn and Murphy flew to Miami the day following the theft and they were apprehended at Kuhn's Miami apartment by Bureau Agents on October 31, 1964. A thorough search at the time of this arrest failed to recover the gems.

of Kuhn, traveled to Miami on the plane with Kuhn and Murphy. She denied any knowledge of the burglary or the location of the gems.

#### STATUS OF PROSECUTION

On the basis of Clark's admission, the three subjects were indicted by New York authorities for grand larceny. Clark is also charged locally with possession of narcotics. On November 24, 1964, the subjects entered not guilty pleas to the local indictments.



Kuhn, through intermediary developed by the New York Office, has indicated he will sell the gems for \$150,000, and has agreed to discuss the sale with two buyers recommended by intermediary. The New York Office proposes to send two Agents in undercover capacity to act as potential buyers. The New York Office requests authority for Agents to proceed to Miami and to be furnished \$1,000 each for expenses in order to give appearances of affluence, appearing capable of making such a purchase. BACKGROUND:

The American Museum of Natural History, New York City, was burglarized during the night of 10/29 - 30/64. On information developed at New York, the subjects were identified and Kuhn and Murphy were arrested by Bureau Agents at Miami 10/31/64, and Clark was arrested at New York the same day. Searches incidental to the arrests and subsequent investigation has failed to recover the missing gems.

New York proposes to utilize Agents Paul J. Brano and Guy C. Berado in b7D this undercover capacity. Both Agents have had successful undercover experience in the past and it is felt they are fully capable of performing this assignment. In order to provide all possible cover for these Agents, the New York Office proposes that they purchase plane tickers in casify rather than utilizing GTR's, and that they be provided sufficient money so as to give the appearance of individuals of means who are capable of making the purchase of these gems. The New York Office recommends these Agents each be given in order to carry out this scheme. Agents will make a detailed accounting of expenditures and will lonly spend what is necessary to insure the success of the operation.



This investigation is predicated upon information furnished telephonically to SA LOWELL S. LAWRENCE of the New York Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation by Detective PETER MEENAN, 20th Squad, New York City Police Department, on October 30, 1964. Detective MEENAN advised that the American Museum of Natural History, 79th Street and Central Park West, New York City, had been burglarized sometime during the night of October 29 - 30, 1964 and that various precious jems, including the Star of India Sapphire had been taken.

American Museum of Natural History, 79th Street and Central Park West, New York City, furnished a mimeographed list of the jewels taken in instant theft.

This list reflected the following described jewels and the locations from which they were obtained.

Star Sapphire/Star of India/, 563.35 carats/Ceylon/value fifty thousand dollars.

Star Ruby/ Edith Haggin DeLong/, 132 carats/ Burma/ value twenty one thousand four hundred dollars.

Star Sapphire/ Midnight Star/, 116.75 carats/ Ceylon/ value thirty five thousand dollars.

Diamond Crystals, two small - Volcano, Amador Company, California. Diamond Crystals/ eight small 4.07 carats/ Kasai River, South Africa.





Subsequent to the arrival of ROGER FREDERICK CLARK, Apartment 1803, Cambridge House, 333 West 86th Street, New York City, with Lieutenant ROBERT DANNER, New York City Police Department (NYCPD), other detectives, and SA LEO P. KELLY at approximately 11:45 a.m., SA JAMES R. HAYES observed CLARK being brought into one of the bedrooms. It was observed that CLARK was searched thoroughly by the Police and thereupon Detective JOHN MC NALLY of the 20th Squad, NYCPD, advised him that he, MC NALLY, was a Police officer. MC NALLY further advised CLARK that he did not have to make any statement and that any statement he did make could be used against him in a court of law and that he had the right to an attorney. ROGER FREDERICK CLARK was advised of the identities of the interviewing agents. He was advised by SA JAMES R. HAYES that he did not have to make a statement and any statement that he did make could be used against him and/or others in a court of law. He was further advised that he had theright to consult an attorney. He stated that he understood this and consented to the interview.

Also present during part of t.: interview were Detective RICHARD MALINE and Detective JOHN MC NALLY of the 20th Squad, New York City Police Department.

CLARK stated that he had come to New York City from Miami, Plorida, with ALLAN D. KUHN and JACK MURPHY is gaid that they arrived in New York City about the first week in October, 1964, and stated that they stayed for about a week at the Stanhope Hotel, New York City. They then moved to Apartment 1803 at the Cambridge House, 333 West 86th Street, New York City, New York. He stated that their purpose in coming to New York City was "for a vacation and to do anything". When specifically questioned regarding this statement, he said that they had come to New York City to do a burglary. He said that that had "gone shopping around" looking over various prospective burglary sites. He stated that they had been in several museums among them the Guggenheim Museum and the Metropolitan Museum of Art. He stated that the three of them had also gone into the Museum of Natural History on two occasions in the daytime. As best he could recall they had gone in there on October 13 or 14, 1964, and again

He stated that at about 7:30 p.m. on October 29, 1964, he, MURPHY and KUHN had gone to the museum in KUHN's white Cadillac. He, CLARK, parked the Cadillac across the street from the museum and sat on a park bench. He stated that the plan had been for him to act as a lookout on Central Park West while the other two entered the Museum of Natural History. He said that they had approached the museum from the 81st Street and Central Park West side, "near the Planetarium".

Among the material which he had seen KUHN and MURPHY take with them were a yellow-handled screwdriver; a ball peen hammer; a length of venetian blind nylon chord; a glass cutter; and some adhesive tape. He stated that MURPHY and KUHN also had gloves.

CLARK alleged that he had stayed on the park bench from 7:30 p.m. on October 29, 1964, until 12:30 a.m. on October 30, 1964. He stated that his primary duty was to see if any commotion was made around the museum or if any police arrived. He stated that he did not know how he was going to communicate with KUHN and MURPHY. As far as he knew, KUHN and MURPHY were

supposed to go in behind the museum from 81st Street and at the back of the museum go over a wall and into a courtyard and there break a window. They were then going up to the fourth floor. There they were going out on a window ledge and work their way to another window in the room where the above-mentioned diamonds were located. CLARK said that it was necessary forthem to go out on a ledge in order to bypass a padlocked iron gate at the entrance to the room where the items were located. After they had committed the burglary, they were to retrace their steps and exit.

CLARK claimed not to have gotten any signal indicating that the burglary was over, but had returned to the apartment at the \_\_\_\_\_\_ at about 12:45 a.m. on October 30, 1964, because he felt that the five hours he had been on a park bench was more than sufficient time for them to have committed the burglary.

He stated that KUHN had done most of the "master-minding" of the burglary. For his participation in the planning and execution of the burglary, CLARK was supposed to receive a one-third share of the amount realized from the burglary. CLARK stated that when he returned to the apartment, KUHN and MURPHY were there and displayed to him the items of jewelry and diamonds which are listed above and which he had previously mentioned.

CLARK said that the items were being taken by KUHN and MURPHY to be fenced somewhere in Florida and it was his belief that it would be Miami or Miami Beach, Florida.

He denied knowing specifically who was going to handle the fencing of the loot for KUHN, MURPHY and himself. He stated that after they had all examined the jewelry and diamonds, they had gone to bed and assumed that this was between 1:30 a.m. and 2:00 a.m. He said the next morning, KUHN, MURPHY and a girl named had gone to Kennedy International Airport and taken a flight to Miami. They had the jewels with them in a light brown traveling case. Thereafter, CLARK had gone up to Meriden, Connecticut, in KUHN's Cadillac and returned to his apartment in New York City on October 31, 1964, where he was apprehended.

CLARK said that KUHN and MURPHY were to return to New York City around November 3 or 4, 1964, with his share of the money received from the disposal of the diamonds and jewels in Florida.

It is noted that several times during this interview, the point was made by ROGER FREDERICK CLARK that he, KUHN, and MURPHY had specifically planned to steal from the Museum of Natural History, the Star of India Sapphire, the Midnight Star Sapphire, the Star Ruby, and any other precious stones readily accessible to them. Moreover, CLARK stated that the three of them, KUHN, MURPHY, and himself had planned from the beginning, that after stealing these items, KUHN and MURPHY would take them to Florida to dispose of them.

No threats, force, or promises of reward were made to CLARK to induce him to give this information.

ROGER FREDERICK CLARK was interviewed by SAS JAMES R. HAYES and LEO P. KELLY at the 20th Squad, New York City Police Department, from 1:30 p.m. until 2:45 p.m. Also present during the interview were Detective JOHN MC NALLY and Detective RICHARD MALINE. This interview was interrupted on several occasions for the benefit of the prisoner in order to permit him to take care of personal needs and to smoke, eat and drink both corfee. and soda.

At approximately 5:30 P.M.SA KELLY journeyed from the 20th Squad of the New York City Police Department, accompanied by ROGER CLARK and Deectives JOHN MC NALLY and RICHARD MALTANES, and arrived at the Museum of Natural History, Central Park West, New York City, a few minutes later.

Immediately after entering the car CLARK was again advised by SA KELLY that he did not have to make a statement, that any statement he did make could be used against him and/or others in a court of law. No threats or promises were made to induce him to make additional statements and he was again advised of his right to an attorney.

This trip was made inasmuch as CLARK had wlunteered to show how he participated in the burglary of the Museum on the evening of October 30, 1964, with ALAN KUHN and JACK MURPHY.

As the car in which we were riding approached the middle of the block on 81st Street between Central Park West and Columbus Avenue, CLARK advised that this was the approximate area that he had stopped the evening of October 29,1964, when MURPHY and KUHN exited from KIHN's Cadillac which was driven by CLARK. Immediately after they exited as he was driving away he observed KUHN and MURPHY walking toward the Museum grounds from 81st Street approximately in the middle of the block between Columbus Avenue and Central Park West. He stated that MURPHY was attired in a dark turtle neck sweater and KUHN in a dark sweatshirt. MURPHY had a length of venetian blind type cord drapped over his right shoulder-with the coat over the cord. KUHN had a handy talkie black in color. CLARK then drove to Columbus Avenue went south on Columbus to 77th Street east on 77th Street to Central Park West and parked the car. He then sat on a bench on the park side of Central Park West located directly across the street from a church which church is located on the southwest corner of 77th Street and Central

Park West. CLARK was in possession of another handy talkie black in color. He acted as lookout. They transmitted to him several hours later and at approximately 12:30 he received a transmission that they had completed "the job". He returned to the apartment which he shared with KUHN and MURPHY namely Apartment 1803, at 333 West 86th Street at which time MURPHY and KUHN displayed to him the jewels which they had taken from the Museum, namely "The Big Three", the Delong Star Ruby, the Star of India and the Midnight Star, two pieces of carved emerald, one piece of uncarved emerald, two large acqua marine stones and some assorted pieces of stones. All three then discussed the fencing of the jewelry in question. MURPHY and KUHN were to leave for Miami with the jewelry to fence it. CLARK stated he did not know to whom the stores were to be given.

SAS HAYES and KELLY and Detectives MC NALLY and MULANE interviewed ROGER CLARK on the fourth floor of the Museum of Natural History from approximately a quarter to six to six thirty. He was advised that he did not have to make any statement; that any statement he did make could be used against him and others in a court of law and that he had the right to consult an attorney. No threats or promises were made to induce him to make any statements.

He pointed out the case from which the "Big Three" were taken and the case second from the left from where smaller stones were taken and also the one to the right. At this point, CLARK stated "as long as I've gone this far I might as well tell you the rest". He elaborated on this statement by stating that he talked to KUHN on several occasions on the evening of October 30, 1964, during the period commencing at 7:30 P.M. when KUHN and MURPHY were in the Museum. It was his recollection when they returned to the apartment that KUHN and MRPHY told him that they waited for the guard to make three checks at the iron gates at the entrance of the room in which they were hiding and from which they took the jewelry in order that they could establish a pattern. CLARK stated that in his discussion with KUHN and MURPHY regarding the checks the guard made, they did not get into a discussin with regard to the specific times.

She advised that on October 19, 1964, she, and the three subjects visited the American Museum of Natural History on a date and spent several hours there. She recalled that they spent quite a long time looking at the gem display on the fourth floor of the nuseum. She commented that upon entering the museum, KUHN was impatient to go to the fourth floor where the gems were and "acted like he could hardly wait to get there". She stated that judging from KUHN's comments while looking at the gems he seemed to be very interested in them and to know a lot about them.

She recalled that during the three weeks she had known KUHN and the other subjects, the subjects frequently talked acout the various museums in New York City which they had visited. She stated that the subjects did not work and seemed to do nothing but go to New York City museums and visit friends in New Jersey. She did not know the names or addresses of any of their friends in New Jersey, however.

further stated that during the last week of October, 1964, she was on vacation from her job and that she and KUHN had discussed going to Miami, Florida, together. The specific date of departure from New York for Miami had not been decided, however. Very early in the morning of October 30, 1964, KUHN telephoned her at her apartment at the \_\_\_\_\_\_ and told her that he and MURPHY were flying out of New York at 9:15 a.m., and that she should pack her bags and come along.

Later KUHN came to her apartment carrying a train case which bore the initials "J.M." He explained that she should use an assumed name in traveling because it was illegal for him to transport an underaged girl out of state. She accepted this reason as valid.

She, KUHN and MURPHY took a taxi to Kennedy Airport, New York City. She noticed that MURPHY was carrying a plain brown paper shopping bag which bore no name or label. She also noticed that when MURPHY got on the plane he did not have this bag with him.

In the taxi KUHN made the remark, "Oh, I forgot to call and then, "Well, I don't guess I have to". She did not know identity or the reason why KUHN wanted to call him.

In the offices of Assistant District Attorney  New York County, in the presence of two detectives and a policewoman of the New York City Police Department,  furnished the following information concerning her trip to Miami with ALLAN KUHN and JACK MURPHY:
Prior to leaving New York City, JACK MURPHY made a phone call before boarding the plane to Miami but she does not know who he called. MURPHY also was carrying a brown shopping bag which she never again saw in MURPHY's possession, although she observed from the plane window after landing in Miami, JACK MURPHY walking down the stairs from the plane. MURPHY was to meet his girl friend, BONNIE SUTERA, at the Miami airport.
After landing in Miami, KUHN rented a Thunderbird and they drove to KUHN's apartment. In the apartment she went to the bedroom to change clothes. In the bedroom KUHN took out of the traincase, which she had carried on the plane for KUHN, what appeared to be a sock and emptied out some jewelry. She said she recognized the Star of India immediately from having seen it in the Museum in New York. An argument ensued between her and KUHN over getting her involved. She stated that KUHN told her not to worry about it, that she would not get involved in anything.
She changed her dress and together they went over to house. She did not think that KUHN took the jewelry with him because he was dressed only in a sport shirt and a white pair of slacks. She carried his wallet in her handbag.

"there?" KUHN returned to the table and said that he was unable to reach the person who could give him the okay to "firm up" a deal. KUHN then asked how much we expected to pay for the "stuff". He was told that no price would be discussed until such time as he (KUHN) stated that he was in authority to make a deal and set a price. At this point, KUHN assured that he could discuss the deal and set a firm price.

KUHN then asked how we intended to dispose of "the load", and he was told that this was our business, however, we had several possible channels to dispose of "the load". KUHN then stated that he had heard that even Mayor WACNER (in New York City) was interested in making a deal to get the "load" back for the museum. At this point KUHN was told we did not care about who was trying to get the stuff but we were interested in doing business for ourselves in a quiet smooth transaction with the least number of people involved. KUHN then stated that he had a 1959 white Oldsmobile and he was told then we would be sitting in a 1965 white Ford in the Howard Johnsons parking lot. was told that if he did not show by 12:00 noon, we would leave and meet him at an alternate location. A check of the records of the Santa Monica Police Department (SMPD) reflects no record for either subject. Detective BOB SOLLEE and MERCED ORTEGA, Robbery Detail, SMPD, were advised of the fact that subjects could have possibly been in the Santa Monica, California, area in the past several months. On November 2, 1964, Officer OLSEN of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Office, Harbor Detail, Marina Del Rey, California, advised after checking his records that no boat slip had been rented at the harbor by subjects under their true names in the past several months. He was shown photographs of both subjects MURPHY and KUHN without effecting an identification. The pieces of ½ inch wide adhesive tape strips on the piece of glass designated specimen Ql are similar to the ½ inch wide adhesive tape on the Kl roll but not any of the ends of the tape strips on the piece of glass could be matched to the outer end of the roll of tape.

The three rolls of 2 inch wide tape, specimens K6 through K8, are different from the inch wide strips of tape on the Q1 piece of glass.

No mineral matter of value for significant comparisons with specimens K2 through K5 was found on specimen Q2 or in specimen Q3.

NY 87-36226 By letter dated November 5, 1964, the New York Office of the FBI also forwarded to the FBI Laboratory another box of gravel marked "Box Number 5" which contains samples from a gravel pile located inside the courtyard of the victim museum. An examination similar to the above was requested concerning this gravel. By letter dated November 3, 1964, the Miami FBI Office advised the FBI Laboratory as follows and requested the following examination: Found in the apartment of ALLAN DALE KUHN during the search incidental to arrest were three Red Devil glass cutters and a pair of Webster Rubber Company slippers. The ball of one of the glass cutters is badly chipped, appearing to have been recently done, apparently from pounding on glass or some other comparatively hard object. These glass cutters are being forwarded to the FBI Laboratory for comparison with any vacuumings or sweepings at the crime scene for the purpose of attempting to determine if any paint chips, if found at the crime scene, could have come from the glass cutters found in KUHN's apartment. Also enclosed for the FBI Laboratory are six impressions of the left slipper and six impressions of the right slipper found in KUHN's apartment, as well as scrapings of a black dirt or tar-like substance from the soles of these slippers. (It should be noted that one envelope contains scrapings taken before dusting and the other contains scrapings taken after dusting.) - 98 -

NY 87-36226 The Laboratory is requested to compare these impressions with any footprints found at the crime scene and to compare the scrapings with any like material found on the inside or outside of the general area of the crime scene. By letter dated November 6, 1964, the New York FBI Office submitted the following to the FBI Laboratory and requested the following examination: Package Number 1 Pieces of broken glass marked numbers 1 through 14. This package also contains a diagram showing the position of each of the 14 pieces. Package Number 2 Two large pieces of glass marked A and B. Package Number 3 Contains debris consisting of pieces of broken glass All of the above pieces of glass were from the showcases at the victim museum which were apparently broken into by the subjects in order to obtain instant jewelry. The contents of package number one are from the center showcase from which the three major items of jewelry were taken, specifically the Star of India Sapphire, Midnight Star Sapphire and the Delong Star Ruby. It is noted that the circular piece of glass previously submitted to the Laboratory by New York letter, November 1, 1964, was also a part of this showcase and its position in the showcase is apparent from the diagram enclosed with package number one. -99: **-**


NY 87-36226 The contents of package number two are from the panes of glass which formed the top of two other showcases located in the museum on either side of the main showcase. The broken pieces of glass in package number three are debris from all of the showcases. The FBI Laboratory is requested to compare any tool marks found on any of the above pieces of glass which appear to have been scratched or cut, with the glass cutters which were found in subject KUHN's apartment in Miami and previously submitted by Miami to the Laboratory. The Laboratory is also requested to search the debris in package number three and compare any items believed to be paint chips with the paint chips on the ball peen section of the glass cutters. NY 87-36226 Specimens received from New York on November 12, 1964 (PC-83262 KS KH KL) K22 Glass from the center showcase K23 - K24 Glass from two other showcases Glass and debris from showcases Results of examination: Several minute particles of glass were found on the wheels of the Q6 and Q8 glass cutters. This glass, however, had different optical properties from the Q1, K23 and K24 glass specimens and did not originate from the panes of glass represented by these specimens. Specimens Q4 and Q5 consisted of a small amount of asphaltic material mixed with silty debris. This material was different from specimens K2 through K5 and the K21 gravel. There are not sufficient individual microscopic characteristics remaining in the scores on specimens Q1, K22 and K23 through K25 to identify the specific tool, or tools, used to produce them. No paint chips were found in specimen K25 for comparison with the paint on the glass cutters, specimens Q6, Q7, and Q8. - 101 -

On October 31, 1964, Detective PETER MEENAN, 20th Squad, New York City Police Department (NYCPD) advised that fibers believed to be rope fibers had been located by personnel of the NYCPD on the window sill of the fifth floor window which is located directly above the fourth floor window at the victim museum where subjects were believed to have made their entry. He stated that these fibers were being retained on file by the NYCPD.

On December 9, 1964, Sergeant ROBERT BOUTON, 20th Squad, NYCPD, advised that no finger-prints of subjects KUHN, MURPHY, or CLARK had been found by the NYCPD anywhere at the crime scene, the American Museum of Natural History, 20th Street and Central Park West, New York City.



In connection with the trip Kuhn made in the company of New York City detectives and a representative of the District Attorney's Office, I contacted SAC Alexander today upon hearing the news that they were successful in recovering some of the gems in this case. I asked SAC Alexander to immediately obtain through Hogan or one of his representatives the complete details of the "deal" that was made in order to obtain Kuhn's cooperation.

He was also instructed to ascertain the complete story concerning the recovery of the gems. And thirdly, he was instructed to determine from Hogan why the FBI had not been kept advised of the progress made in this matter, it being noted that Hogan had given earlier assurances that we would be currently informed.

SAC Alexander said that he would immediately initiate inquiries into the above matter.

This is to advise of recent ludicrous events resulting from New York City District Attorney and police Dept. representatives in accompanying Kuhn to Miami to recover jewels stolen from the American Museum of Natural History, October 29-30, 1964.

'This afternoon Supervisor William Holloman, Miami Office, advised that the Miami press have been carrying full details of the deal entered, into between New York County District Attorney Frank Hogan, New York State Supreme Court Justice Markewich and subject Kuhn whereby Kuhn offered to attempt to obtain and return the stolen jewels in exchange for consideration for all three subjects in connection with the state charge pending against them. Special Agent (SA) Holloman stated from reading the paper it would appear that Kuhn is setting most of the terms.

It is interesting to note that the details concerning this deal were obviously leaked by New York City authorities since newspapers carried the details of this story coincidental with Kuhn's departure to Miami. Kuhn, Assistant District Attorney

Kuhn to come up with the jewels prior to the time the press determined where they were staying. It is noted that Major Hill is the only person locally in Miami that the New York authorities are talking to.

SA Holloman advised that the group have changed motels in order to avoid the press and this afternoon, January 7, 1965, they are at the University Inn in south Miami and have at least temporarily given the press the slip.

SA Holloman stated that there have been all sorts of stories on the radio and in the papers. Some to the effect that Kuhn jumped out of the window at the Dunes Motel, ran to a waiting New York Car where he was joined by two detectives who leaped from the bushes and all sped away. SA Holloman stated that for a time every move of the New York authorities was followed by the press, that the press have representatives stationed at the airport, in the bus terminals and the train stations to be aware of the activities of the group. The constant badgering, harassment and shadowing by the newsmen of Kuhn and the detectives created an almost comical situation as they moved about.

SAC Alexander, New York Office, advised that District Attorney Hogan had been in contact with the New York Office this afternoon and stated that in spite of press reports to the contrary he had no information that his assistant was en route back to New York and he had no information that the jewels had been recovered. Mr. Hogan has also told the New York Office that the activities of the press had impeded their investigation.

#### ACTION

The New York and Miami Offices have been instructed to keep abreast of all developments in this matter and to advise the Bureau of any pertinent information received.
