In addition, the Army information, which is being released in its entirety, goes into great detail regarding Einstein's receiving of encoded messages which were then forwarded to Moscow.

Information in FBI records pertains to our investigation into the activities of Einstein from 1932 until the time of his death in 1955. Einstein associated with many individuals and organizations that were under investigation for subversive activities. An Internal Security investigation was opened in February, 1941, upon receipt of information that Paul Robeson, prominent American Negro vocalist, was an alleged member of the Communist Party. This investigation remained open until his death on January 23, 1976, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The last piece of mail is 100-12304-734, dated March 29, 1977, regarding the "Paul Robeson commemorative Committee", IS-R (CPUSA).

It won't come as much of a surprise that actor, singer and AllAmerican football player Paul
Robeson was a subject of FBI surveillance, but recent documents
show the FBI considered him a
threat to national security. After
poring over 3,000 heavily censored
pages of FBI documents, received
after nearly four years of Freedom of
Information Action inquiries, the Asbury Park (N.J.) Press reported yesterday that Robeson and his wifewere the subjects of wiretapping,
bugging and mail interception. Robeson died in 1976.

Between 1943 and 1976, Robeson

Between 1943 and 1976, Robeson was on the FBI's "custodial dentention" list of people to be detained within 24 hours in a national emeragency, according to the report. Robeson lost his passport for eight years in 1950 when he refused to sign a statement saying he was not a communist. And even though the FBI's New York office recommended the famous actor be removed from the surveillance list, J. Edgar Hoover apparently never followed through. The late FBI director was known to believe Robeson was a communist.

REQUEST OF "60 MINUTES" FOR MIPORN TAPES

PURPOSE: To advise of a release of four video tapes from the MIPORN case to Norman Gorin, Producer, "60 Minutes" CBS News by the Miami Office on March 25, 1983, which may result in publicity.

DETAILS: By letter dated February 9, 1983, to the Miami Office, Gorin requested various video and audio tape recordings made during the MIFORN investigation. Gorin and/or other "60 Minutes" representatives, in their efforts to obtain the tapes, have made several contacts with the Miami Office, U. S. Attorney's Office and the Miami Strike Force Attorney's Office. As you are probably aware, "60 Minutes" is planning to air a segment in the near future on the issues surrounding the FBI's dismissal of former SA Patrick Livingston, the undercover SA utilized in MIFORN. On March 11, 1983, Assistant Director Roger Young was videotaped by the "60 Minutes" staff at FBIHQ for the same program.

On March 24, 1983, the four video tapes were reviewed by FOIPA personnel at FBINQ. They depicted former SA Livingston and another undercover agent in conversations with three different MIPORN subjects (Chamizo, Van Buren, Gottesman). Several references to other named individuals were noted on the tapes; however, the Miami Office subsequently advised after consulting with the Strike Force attorney, that the release of these names would not jeopardize any ongoing or prospective investigation or prosecutions. Miami was then authorized to make the release. The investigations shown on these tapes are closed. The tapes themselves were introduced as evidence and shown in open court.

This matter was coordinated with the Department of Justice, United States Attorney's Office in Miami, Legal Counsel Division, and the Miami Office.

Generally speaking, the Privacy Act forbids the FBI from disclosing any personally identifiable information contained within the Central Records System without the written consent of the person to whom the record pertains, except under certain enumerated circumstances. Title 5, U.S.C., § 552a(b). There is not any clear-cut exception to that general prohibition which would allow a wholesale release of information to the public of the documents which selectively may withhold.

However, to fully answer your question, an examination of the actual documents would be necessary for several reasons. First, the Privacy Act's general disclosure prohibition applies only to records which contain information which may be identified with an individual. To the extent that records selectively withheld by do not contain personally do not contain personally identifiable information, they may be disclosed to the public without violating the provisions of the Privacy Act. Second, since the Privacy Act applies only to individuals, defined by the Privacy Act only as U.S. citizens or aliens admitted for permanent residence (Title 5, U.S.C., § 552a(a)(2)), that information in the proposed FOIPA release regarding alone could also be disclosed. __alone could also be disclosed without regard to the Privacy Act. Additionally, if selectively utilizes documents released to him, the actual documents placed into the public sector could also be disclosed to the public by the FBI in the same fashion in which they were originally released to him, regardless of the fact that the documents may contain personally identifiable information. Benson of the Texas Life Insurance Company for the records on the death of Major General Robert Gardner Ownby. General Ownby's body was found January 11, 1984, with a note claiming he was killed by a terrorist group.

Material being released (316 of total 637 pages) from the FBI's Crime on a Government Reservation investigation includes results of numerous interviews with family members, business associates and military personnel. Appropriate exemptions for privacy and confidentiality have been applied. Also being released are the results of laboratory examinations revealing that the terrorist's note was typed on a typewriter located at a company in which General Ownby was on the Board of Directors. Witnesses established that General Ownby had access to the typewriter shortly before his death. Investigation revealed no evidence of terrorist involvement in the death of General Ownby. Bexar County Texas authorities determined death to be a suicide and FBI case was closed after all logical investigation.

This material was then released between September, 1979 and March, 1980 by the Assistant Attorney General, Civil Division, Department of Justice, to the plaintiff in connection with the litigation arising from the case titled American Friends Service Committee, et al., v. William H. Webster, et al., (U.S.D.C., D. C.) Civil Action Number 79-1655, Bufile 197-1264.

The remaining 600 plus index cards have been further processed for release to the requester with deletions made therefrom including the source symbol numbers, the FBI field office involved, and the addresses of the target organizations. In view of the very limited information that will be made available to the requester, the FOIPA Section plans initially to release 25% of the above-mentioned 600 index cards in order for Mr. Theoharis to make a determination whether or not he desires copies of the remaining 450 index cards. One index card being initially released to the requester reveals a surreptitious entry/bag job. The Office of Professional Responsibility has been previously advised concerning this matter. The release of these records has been coordinated with the Intelligence Division. Mr. Theoharis is a knowledgeable and prolific user of the FOIA. He has received considerable publicity regarding several of his past requests, the most recent of which was the personal and confidential files of former Director J. Edgar Hoover. On 12/23/81, the DOJ issued another statement indicating that they had closed the DOJ inquiries concerning the Financial Disclosure Statement and the watches. The proprietor of the aforementioned WDC restaurant, upon interview by BuAgents, denied the allegation involving his restaurant and Mr. Allen.

We maintain a three-volume file on the above investigations. Two volumes consist of statements and/or White House documents which were furnished to the FBI during interviews of

These two volumes also contain statements furnished to the FBI by the Japanese ladies and Mr. and Mrs. Allen. The remaining volume consists solely of public source material.

FOIPA Section proposes to release, among others, statements given to the FBI by Edwin Meese III, Counselor to the President, John Lehman, Secretary of the Navy, Mr. Allen, Mrs. Allen, and those of the Japanese ladies. These statements are proposed for disclosure either because the cooperation of these individuals with the FBI was publicly known, or because portions of their statements were previously disclosed and attributed to them in the DOJ statements of 12/1/81 and 12/23/81. We are protecting the names and other identifying information provided by other individuals whose knowledge of, or involvement in the Allen matter was not publicly known.

Certain documents were released to him in 1978, subject to those FOIPA provisions protecting classified information, informant information and third party privacy information. Before his death from cancer on February 8, 1985, in Bethesda, Maryland, Jaffe sued the CIA, alleging that U. S. Intelligence agencies had conspired to deprive him of this livelihood on the ground that he was a security risk. The CIA wrote to Jaffe stating that its own investigation had shown him to be a legal citizen. In addition, the U. S. District Court

throughout the file is currently and properly classified and is being denied from release. Other information is exempt because it represents pre-decisional material or would be an invasion of personal privacy if released. The 2,884 pages of documents being released contain information publicly disclosed at the GRAY, FELT, MILLER trial; information arising from the SWP lawsuit; entries regarding SWP and New Left activities and internal administrative memoranda of past entry practices and policies. Section Chief JOSEPH TIERNEY, Intellignece Division, reviewed and approved this release. It should be noted that numerous other files were created dealing with all the legal aspects of the Surreptitious Entry Program; however, so far MR. THEOHARIS has requested only this particular file.

In the second instance, MR. THEOHARIS requested documents maintained in the "TOLSON File." This was a file maintained in the office of former Associate Director TOLSON consisting of memoranda from former Director HOOVER to MR. TOLSON and other FBI officials. These documents are contained in six volumes maintained in the Special File Room. A release was made on 8/15/84. Subsequently, THEOHARIS administratively appealed from the action of the FBI, requesting the release of additional information. Following discussions with DOJ attorneys handling his appeal, MR. THEOHARIS was advised by DOJ letter 3/15/85, that the FBI would reprocess his request, resulting in additional material being released. now being released include MR. HOOVER's comments and observations regarding the difficulty in recruiting and hiring black Special Agents. He commented, "the average Negro when he gets his degree can make more money practicing law than he can get by coming to the FBI;" several instances where MR. HOOVER indicated his utmost displeasure with administrative actions or lack of administrative action by Bureau officials; and the existence and documentation of what may be interpreted as toadying by some Bureau officials in order that they remain in the good graces of MR. HOOVER.

MR. THEOHARIS has been a knowledgeable and prolific user of the FOIA, and other releases made to him previously have received considerable publicity. "T" symbols were used for several b7C decades by the FBI in reporting information received from b7D a variety of sources. These sources included symbol informants, potential security informants, technical installations, anonymous sources, and, more importantly, private citizens who provided information to the FBI on a confidential basis. In the latter instance, the individual providing the information to the FBI may have specifically requested that his identity be protected or, in the judgment of the reporting Agent, a "T" symbol was assigned due to the individual's position in the community which, if his or her identity were disclosed, would cause embarrassment or place the individual in jeopardy.

An investigation of the Sheriff's Posse Comitatus, also known as the Citizens' Law Enforcement Research Committee (CLERC), was instituted in April, 1973. It is a loose-knit nationwide organization established in Portland, Oregon, in 1973. The SPC is a nonaffiliated offshoot of the Identity Group (IG), a California-based tax rebellion organization. The SPC claims that the Federal Reserve System and the graduated income tax are "ultra vires and not lawful," and that the Federal Judiciary has attempted to establish "a dictatorship of the courts over the citizens of the Republic."

The SPC calls for the establishment of a posse in each county to assist the only legitimate law enforcement authority, the county sheriff, in combating the unlawful acts of others, particularly those of Federal and state officials.

Some members and leadership of the SPC have voiced hatred for Jews and Negroes, advocated the assassination of Federal law enforcement agents, and have engaged in acts of provocation and assault against Federal and other law enforcement officials.

The FBI's investigation was closed in 1977 when it was determined the activities of the SPC no longer met the Attorney General's Guidelines governing domestic security cases.

In 1984 the SPC again gained public attention when a member killed two law enforcement officers and wounded two others in North Dakota.

This release was coordinated with SA CID, who advised there are no pending Posse Comitatus cases at this time, and stated the material being released is basically historical in nature.

Portions of the same material regarding the SPC have been previously released on four separate occasions.

This request is being brought to your attention due to the past publicity of this group and the stated intention of the requester to use the material for the ABC News 20/20 program.

Bureau file 116-46882 pertains to an "Atomic Energy Act-Applicant Employee" investigation initiated in 1947. Additional applicant inquiries were conducted in 1950, 1952 and 1954. Anonymous communications were directed to the AEC in 1950 and the FBI in 1951 alleging subversive activity on the part of then Captain Rickover and one of his subordinates. During these inquiries, it was determined that Admiral Rickover had a reputation of being a controversial naval officer due to his alleged inability to get along with some of his associates because of his dictatorial manner. These investigations failed to reveal any pertinent derogatory information bearing on the loyalty of Admiral Rickover. This file consists of 109 pages and 96 are being released.

This FOIA request may result in publicity due to the fact Admiral Rickover was considered the Navy's and perhaps the world's most qualified authority on the use of atomic-propelled submarines, having directed experiments in this field since their inception.

DETAILS: Stewart Harris, an associate of nationally syndicated columnist Jack Anderson, submitted an FOIA request for records concerning Spencer Tracy.

Mr. Tracy is the subject of two Bureau main files (48-1155 and 7-749).

Bureau file 48-1155 pertains to a postal violation in which Mr. Tracy's name was "forged" as sending obscene letters to an individual at Metro Goldwyn Mayer Studios. The FBI had no jurisdiction in the matter and it was turned over to the Postal Inspectors Office. The file consists of two pages and two are being released to Mr. Harris.

Bureau file 7-749 is an extortion file dealing with two different extortion attempts in 1934 and 1936 against Mr. Tracy. In the 1934 case, the identity of the subject was never ascertained.

Memorandum from Allen H. McCreight to Mr. Glover Re: Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) Request of Stewart Harris for Records Concerning Spencer Tracy

The 1936 threat was determined to be a hoax by the son of an employee of Mr. Tracy. The possibility of prosecution at the local level was left to Mr. Tracy's discretion. This file consists of 65 pages and Mr. Stewart is being furnished 61.

In addition, 12 cross references were located in which Mr. Tracy's name was mentioned in the investigations of other individuals or subject matters. These references, for the most part, concern Mr. Tracy's public actions in opposition to the House Committee on Un-American Activities. Included in these references are general correspondence, a published biographical sketch, and a portion of the script "Keeper of the Flame" in which he starred. The motion picture was believed to contain communist propaganda.

This FOIA request may result in publicity due to the popularity of Mr. Tracy and the fact that other previous requests of Mr. Harris have been the subject of publication in Mr. Anderson's syndicated column.

a 1980 OPEA program evaluation of the GGCP. The request submitted by Trope is for records pertaining to the division of responsibility among the FBI, Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) law enforcement officers and the tribal police in investigating crimes committed on Indian reservations.

The OPEA evaluation consists of a comprehensive analysis of the GGCP and of the individual classifications within it. The portions concerning the Crime on Indian Reservation classification contain an overall review of the FBI's performance of our investigative responsibilities on Indian reservations. The evaluation specifically deals with the responsibilities of and relationships between the FBI, BIA officers and the tribal police and includes candid appraisals of the capabilities of the BIA officers and tribal police. The opinions expressed in the evaluation are not being released.

The Administrative file concerning the GGCP program evaluation (Bufile 62-118200) has also been processed. Portions of this file contain the recommendations which resulted from the OPEA evaluation and the comments and suggestions made by the Criminal Investigative Division. Deletions have been made of recommendations that were not adopted and of opinions contained in the Administrative file.

FBI Monitored Rock Hudson's Sex Life

he FBI, fearful that Rock Hudson's apparent homosexual proclivities could harm the bureau's image if he portrayed a G-man in the movies, kept close watch on the actor throughout the 1960s and early 1970s, according to documents in the bureau's files.

Hudson, a Hollywood star for three decades, died last fall of AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome). Following his death, there was open speculation of what Hollywood and the Federal Bureau of Investigation had thought for years: that Hudson was a homosexual.

We first reported 14 years ago that the FBI had secret dossiers on Hudson and other entertainers. According to information just released to our reporter Tony Capaccio under the Freedom of Information Act, the columns we wrote then set off a determined FBI search for our source.

The FBI files make clear that the bureau's sole interest in Hudson was his sexual behavior—and the concern that he might play an FBI agent on the silver screen. As early as 1960, a memo reported on a Hollywood party that was raided by police because of alleged sexual "orgies" on the premises. "Files of guests' names were confiscated during the raid and as a result many prominent individuals have reportedly been revealed as apparently participants in these orgies," the memo states. The names included Rock Hudson.

In 1966, the FBI sent a memo to the White House that stated the actor had not been the subject of an FBI investigation. However, the memo did inform President Lyndon B. Johnson that

an informant "reported that several years ago while he was in New York he had an 'affair' with movie star Rock Hudson."

The memo continued: "The informant stated that from personal knowledge he knew that Rock Hudson was a homosexual. The belief was expressed that by 'personal knowledge' the informant meant he had personally indulged in homosexual acts with Hudson or had witnessed or received the information from individuals who had done so."

The FBI memo to the White House also disclosed that another informant had provided similar testimony in 1961.

The FBI was particularly concerned about two 1960s movies, "Chicago 7" and "A Fine Pair." A historian at the American Film Institute told our associate Donald Goldberg that "Chicago 7," in which Hudson was to have played an FBI agent on a kidnaping case, was never released. A memo to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said the bureau's activities were treated "very favorably and accurately" in the film, but added: "However, our files indicate that Rock Hudson, a prominent leading man, has been alleged to be a homosexual and/or bisexual."

The FBI was alerted to the other movie by an item in Daily Variety of Hollywood on Sept. 5, 1967. It said Hudson was to play "an FBI agent who becomes involved with a jewel thief." The bureau tried desperately to get a copy of the script, but failed. As it turned out, Hudson's role was changed to that of a New York City policeman.
