

The FBI has completed its search for records subject to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) that are responsive to your request. The enclosed 61 pages of records were determined to be responsive to your subject and were previously processed and released. #### **FBI FOIPA Addendum**

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

#### Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) Intelligence Records. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records is itself a classified fact protected by FOIA exemption (b)(1) and/or would reveal intelligence sources, methods, or activities protected by exemption (b)(3) [50 USC § 3024(i)(1)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that any such records do or do not exist.

#### Part 2: The standard responses below apply to all requests for records on individuals:

This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.
- (iii) Requests for Confidential Informant Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of confidential informant records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F) [5 U.S.C.§ § 552 (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F)] and Privacy Act exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C.§ 552a (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records would reveal confidential informant identities and information, expose law enforcement techniques, and endanger the life or physical safety of individuals. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.

#### Part 3: General Information:

- (i) Record Searches and Standard Search Policy. The Record/Information Dissemination Section (RIDS) searches for reasonably described records by searching systems, such as the Central Records System (CRS), or locations where responsive records would reasonably be found. The CRS is an extensive system of records consisting of applicant, investigative, intelligence, personnel, administrative, and general files compiled by the FBI per its law enforcement, intelligence, and administrative functions. The CRS spans the entire FBI organization, comprising records of FBI Headquarters, FBI Field Offices, and FBI Legal Attaché Offices (Legats) worldwide; Electronic Surveillance (ELSUR) records are included in the CRS. The standard search policy is a search for main entity records in the CRS. Unless specifically requested, a standard search does not include a search for reference entity records, administrative records of previous FOIPA requests, or civil litigation files.
  - a. *Main Entity Records* created for individuals or non-individuals who are the subjects or the focus of an investigation
  - b. Reference Entity Records- created for individuals or non-individuals who are associated with a case but are not known subjects or the focus of an investigation
- (ii) **FBI Records.** Founded in 1908, the FBI carries out a dual law enforcement and national security mission. As part of this dual mission, the FBI creates and maintains records on various subjects; however, the FBI does not maintain records on every person, subject, or entity.
- (iii) **Foreseeable Harm Standard.** As amended in 2016, the Freedom of Information Act provides that a federal agency may withhold responsive records only if: (1) the agency reasonably foresees that disclosure would harm an interest protected by one of the nine exemptions that FOIA enumerates, or (2) disclosure is prohibited by law (5 United States Code, Section 552(a)(8)(A)(i)). The FBI considers this foreseeable harm standard in the processing of its requests.
- (iv) Requests for Criminal History Records or Rap Sheets. The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division provides Identity History Summary Checks often referred to as a criminal history record or rap sheet. These criminal history records are not the same as material in an investigative "FBI file." An Identity History Summary Check is a listing of information taken from fingerprint cards and documents submitted to the FBI in connection with arrests, federal employment, naturalization, or military service. #### **EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS**

### SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual:
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (d)(5) information compiled in reasonable anticipation of a civil action proceeding;
- (j)(2) material reporting investigative efforts pertaining to the enforcement of criminal law including efforts to prevent, control, or reduce crime or apprehend criminals;
- (k)(1) information which is currently and properly classified pursuant to an Executive order in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy, for example, information involving intelligence sources or methods;
- (k)(2) investigatory material compiled for law enforcement purposes, other than criminal, which did not result in loss of a right, benefit or privilege under Federal programs, or which would identify a source who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence:
- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.

SABOTAGE

In connection with this investigation, the CV Office is attempting to Identify and locate witnesses. Rowever, classes at XSU Lava bean discontinued for the remainder of the Spring school term, and students have left the campus.

In view of this, the CV Office is setting out numerous leads to offices by teletype and telephone. In order to facilitate scating out leads, the following info is being made evailable:

At about 8:00 PM on evening of 5/2/70, the Army ROTO Building at KSU was destroyed by fire during a campus disruption. A crewd of approximately 600 individuals was gathered adjacent to the ROYC Building during the incident.

Preliminary inquiries indicate tht about 50 to 75 of these individuals were actively engaged in throwing rocks and debris at the building, breaking many of the windows. Some of these individuals also started the fire.

Caupus PD officers, who witnessed the burning were unable to identify the UNSURS due to darkness and the fact that demonstrators throwing rocks at them.



This airtel concerns specific instructions for each office in regard to any investigation being conducted concerning the Fire Bombing of the Army ROTC Building, Kent State University, Kent, Ohio.

This Office had no leads in this particular matter and, therefore, the case should be considered RUC administratively.

One witness has advised he observed an unidentified white male place a rag in a gas tank of a nearby motorcycle and carry the rag to the building where it was ignited.

The Kent Fire Department attempted to extinguish the fire. However, demonstrators interferred with their efforts by throwing rocks at them and cutting their hoses.

Prior to the burning, demonstrations occurred in downtown Kent, Ohio, on 5/1/70.

On the evening of 5/3/70, bands of demonstrators roamed the KSU campus during the night.

During the afternoon of 5/4/70, four KSU students were killed when Ohio National Guard (ONG) troops attempted to disperse a crowd of demonstrators:

In addition to the substantive violations of the sabotage sections, the Department of Justice advised they wanted investigation conducted to establish a conspiracy to destroy the ROTC Building at KSU and requested that the following points be considered:

- 1. The names of participants setting fire to the ROTC Building.
- 2. The names of persons organizing, instigating or inciting damages to this ROIC Building.
- 3. Obtain post-act or pre-act statements made by leaders including speeches urging abolition of the ROTC at KSU.
- 4. Attempt to obtain any leaflets or any other printed material authored or distributed by such persons urging the abolition of ROTC.
- 5. Determine if SDS or New Left Leadership caused the burning of the ROTC Building or if this was an act of local groups on an individual initiative without the advise of outside or national influence.

All offices are requested to refer to the above in connection with any leads set forth by the CV Office.

LEVEN AND HODGSON ARE ROOMMATES IN THE RESIDENCE.

HODGSON HAS BEEN INTERVIEWED, BUT DURING INTERVIEW WAS APPARENTLY UNDER INFLUENCE OF NARCOTICS AND COULD NOT REMEMBER A GREAT DEAL ABOUT THE NIGHT OF THE BURNING BUT DID INDICATE HE FELT SOME INDIVIDUALS CAME INTO THE RESIDENCE AND MENTIONED SOMETHING ABOUT A FIRE. THAT NIGHT HE HAD A DATE WITH EBERT. HE INDICATED THAT AT PRESENT LEVEN IS AT HIS PHILADELPHIA ADDRESS.

BENNETT HAS ALSO BEEN INTERVIEWED. HE RELATED THAT ALL RESIDENTS OF THE HOUSE WERE PRESENT THE NIGHT OF THE BURNING, AS WELL AS THE FEMALES, AND THE ONLY TWO WHO COULD HAVE POSSIBLY BEEN AWAY FROM THE HOUSE AND WHOM HE CONSIDERED "MOBILE" WERE DURKALSKI AND LAYTON. HE ALSO STATED THAT NOVICH WAS GONE FROM THE RESIDENCE SEVERAL DAYS PRIOR TO THE BURNING AND DISTRUBANCES AT KSU AND HAS NOT BEEN SEEN SINCE.

DURKALSKI AND NOVICH ARE ROOMMATES, AND BY VIRTUE OF WHAT WAS OBSERVED IN THEIR ROOM THEY ARE UNDOUBTEDLY VERY SYMPATHETIC TO NEW LEFT ACTIVITIES.

LEVEN IS ALSO APPARENTLY VERY SYMPATHETIC TO NEW LEFT
ACTIVITIES SINCE IN HIS ROOM AND AMONG HIS PERSONAL BELONGINGS
WERE OBSERVED LITERATURE AS WELL AS PEACE SYMBOLS AND ARM

THOMAS H. BECKLEY, advised on May 16, 1970, he is a first year student at Kent State University, Ohio, and resides on campus in 105-A Mc Dowell Hall.

On the evening of May 2, 1970, a student rally had been announced to be held on the Commons located on the campus at 8 p.m., that evening. BECKLEY arrived at the Commons some time after 8:30 p.m., with fellow students JACK CRAIG and GARY BUKSZAR. Approximately one to two thousand students were in the crowd which began moving away from the Commons about the time BECKLEY arrived. He heard no inflammatory speeches urging the burning of the ROTC building or any other college buildings.

The crowd circled around the campus until approximately 9:30 or 10 p.m., when the students returned to the Commons area where BECKLEY observed the ROTC building on fire.

The crowd of students went up to a hill overlooking the Commons area and watched the fire. There were numerous firemen and fire apparatus at the scene. By this time, BECKLEY had become separated from CRAIG and BUKSZAR and was alone.

Later on at perhaps 11 p.m., or after, Ohio National Guard Troops arrived and began firing tear gas to disperse the crowd of students and forced their return to the dormitory area.

BECKLEY denied any knowledge of which person or which group was responsible for the fire and estimated about 500 to 1,000 Kent State students are hard-core militants who would destroy the system by violent means and said there were many more who are sympathetic to such militants.

BECKLEY stated that he himself is sympathetic but would not participate in violent action too, as an expression of protest.

BECKLEY can furnish no information on those responsible

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#### FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

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DAVID JOHNSON, was contacted in connection with incidents at Kent State University the early part of May 1970. At the outset he was advised of the identities of the interviewing agents and of the nature of the investigation, and he furnished the following information:

He is a junior at Kent State University and resides at Tau Kappa Epsilon House, 517 East Main Street, Kent, while at the unversity.

On Friday, May 1, 1970, sometime in the late afternoon several assistant professors at the university started a rally on the Commons, a section of the campus, and buried the Constitution in defiance of the President's action on Cambodia. Later, about 1:30 a.m., on May 2, a group of students, slightly in excess of 100, went by his fraternity house heading toward the downtown section. Later the same morning, May 2, he learned that a great deal of damage had taken place in downtown Canton, with the reason being the United States entry into Cambodia. Later that same morning there were rumors on the campus that there was to be trouble and that possibly the ROTC building would go. Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) members had previously demanded abolishment of the ROTC at Kent University.

About 8 p.m., May 2, while in whis fraternity house he heard that the ROTC building was in smoke. He went to the area and as he approached saw another small fire in the archery equipment shack. He went to a girls' dormitory nearby, got a fire extinguisher, and along with others attempted to put out the fire. Later, the exact time not recalled, the ammunition in the ROTC building went off and the building was destroyed. During the fire department's attempts to put out the fire in the ROTC building one student, whom he does not know, cut one of the fire hoses. He was told, though he

On Sunday, May 3, 1970, in the morning he, along with others, went through the debris at the ROTC building with ROTC men in an attempt to recover whatever was possible. Almost nothing was left; however, a few typewriters which were badly burned were located.

- About 9:15 p.m. on Sunday evening, May 3, he was in the library studying when a group of National Guardsmen surrounded the library building. No one was allowed in or out for about 45 minutes. After that, in small groups of five only they were allowed to leave the building. After he got out of the library he learned that several radicals had taken refuge in the library which was the reason for the building being surrounded by the National Guard. He returned to his room in the fraternity house. On his way there he saw a group starting to congregate in a circle about three hundred feet from his fraternity house. He started to watch them and estimated that there were between 100 and 150 or maybe a few more congregated in the group. The National Guard set up a line stretching from the library to his fraternity house and were armed with tear gas. At this point National Guardsmen on bullhorns were asking the students to disperse so that there would be no problem. However, the students refused. The National Guard started to advance on the group congregated and used tear gas to do it. They were able to move the group toward the library and then past the library and out across the campus. He did not see anything else on Sunday.

On Monday, May 4, 1970, there were rumors on the campus that there was going to be a rally. It was announced on a continual basis over bullhorns that no groups larger than five were allowed to gather and the campus was under marshal law. At about 11:45 a.m. a group started gathering near the Victory Bell on the campus. He estimates the group to be about 200 or slightly more. Shortly thereafter the Victory Bell started to peal which drew a lot of students to the area. There are fences surrounding the area and a number of students, he estimates 1500, gathered on the outside of the fences to watch what was going on. The group near the Victory Bell started to chant, "One, two, three, four, we don't want your ----- war!" and other similar chants. The National Guard set up a line at

this point and more approached from the hill to swell the ranks of the National Guard. At this point the National Guard jeep broke the ranks and circled the campus with their bullhorns asking "Please, disperse; disband, for : your own good. Please return to your rooms," and similar words and phrases. The group near the Victory Bell answered by raising a clenched fist and hollering at the Guardsmen all types of remarks. The National Guard then started from their ranks and began moving toward the group. They had on tear gas masks and were shooting tear gas into the group. One of the students in the group, who had a gas mask on, grabbed and threw canisters of gas back to the National Guardsmen. The National Guard swept forth and moved the group up a hill then down the hill, moving the group before them as they went. As they started down the hill a group of students formed behind them and started chanting behind them. The National Guard continued down the hill, moving them on to a practice football field where they both came to a halt as there was a wire fence at the far side of the field. At this point a group of students were in front of the Guardsmen as they had been swept there by the National Guard, and another group was directly behind them, and on the left side another group started to converge on the National Guard. They were throwing rocks and bottles at the Guardsmen. The National Guard turned around and started to sweep the group behind them up the hill leaving the first group down on the football field. As they reached the top of the hill one student threw a rock which hit a Guardsman, apparently serious. At this point several National Guardsmen turned and fired; some fired into the air, some into the ground, and some into the crowd. At this point a group of students near where he was standing were shouting and pointing to the roof of 🗼 🤈 Johnson Hall saying, "There's a sniper on the roof." He did not personally see the sniper. Ambulances started to arrive and the groups that were in front and in back of the Guardsmen hollered at the Guard asking why they had to shoot at them.

The students that were shot were in the group that the National Guard had originally pushed from near the Victory Bell; however, while they were being swept up and over the hill, some students had joined the group and some had left the group during the sweep. He does not know whether the four students that were shot were a part of the original group near the Victory Bell or whether they had joined the group during the sweep up the hill or as the National Guardsmen pushed forward.

Kent State University in Johnson Hall.	

He recalled that sometime during the rallies and prior to the shooting by the National Guard, he saw two men on one motorcycle come over the hill in front of Taylor Hall. He noticed them because they were shouting and waving. DITTMAN did not believe that this incident occurred on the night of the fire of the ROTC Building because it was during the daylight hours.

He stated that he was a spectator just outside of the dorm the night of the fire. He saw no one that he could identify set fire to the ROTC Building or tried to prolong it.

He added that on Saturday, May 2, 1970, there was talk that there was going to be an attempt to burn down the ROTC Building. DITTMAN did not know the source but observed that quite a few from the Johnson Hall dorm had been to rallies.

He stated that the evening of the fire he had gone to bed between 7 and 8 p.m. He was awakened by a couple of friends who told him, "They are trying to burn the ROTC Building." He got dressed and went outside. He could see a few flames and he could see a small group trying to throw what appeared to him to be flares. He noted that he was standing approximately 300 yards away from the group and could not identify anyone. He noted that the firemen were on hand already and the hoses were on. Suddenly the flames burst out on one side of the building and it was out of control.

DITTMAN stated that the only organizations involved were the Kent Chapter to End the War in Vietnam and the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC). He stated these two organizations promulgated the rallies which were occurring. There were no hard core SDS on campus although the four previously arrested

he heard had been released a few days before the incident of the fire. DITTMAN did not see any of these individuals.

DITTMAN stated that he himself did not attend any of the meetings and although he was at a couple of rallies they were all disorganized.

When he returned to his home in on Sunday, May 24, 1970, he stated that his mail contained a letter dated May 13, 1970, from "Committee of Kent State Massacre Witnesses, c/o SMC, 2102 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio, 44115 621-6516." This letter was addressed to "Dear Fellow Kent Student" and contained a green enclosure soliciting funds. DITTMAN made the above enclosure available.

In connection with this investigation, the CV Office is attempting to identify and locate vitnesses. However, classes at KSU have been discontinued for the remainder of the Spring school term, and students have left the campus.

In view of this, the CV Office is setting out numerous leads to offices by teletype and telephone. In order to facilitate seeting out leads, the following info is being made available:

At about 8:00 FM on evening of 5/2/70, the Army ROTC Building at RSU was destroyed by fire during a campus disruption. A crowd of approximately 600 individuals was gathered adjacent to the ROTC Building during the incident.

Preliminary inquiries indicate the about 50 to 75 of these individuals were actively engaged in throwing rocks and debris at the building, breaking many of the windows. Some of these individuals also started the fire.

Compus PD officers, who witnessed the burning were unable to identify the UNSUES due to darkness and the fact that demonstrators were throwing rocks at them.

One witness has advised he observed an unidentified white male place a rag in a gas tank of a nearby motorcycle and carry the rag to the building where it was ignited.

The Kent Fire Department attempted to extinguish the fire. However, demonstrators interferred with their efforts by throwing rocks at them and cutting their hoses.

Prior to the burning, demonstrations occurred in downtown Kent, Ohio, on 5/1/70.

On the evening of 5/3/70, bands of demonstrators reamed the NSU campus during the night.

During the afternoon of 5/4/70, four KSU students were killed when Ohio National Guard (ONG) troops attempted to disperse a crowd of demonstrators:

In addition to the substantive violations of the sabotage sections, the Department of Justice advised they wanted investigation conducted to establish a conspiracy to destroy the ROTC Building at KSU and requested that the following points be considered:

- 1. The names of participants setting fire to the ROTC Building.
- 2. The names of persons organizing, instigating or inciting damages to this ROTC Building.
- 3. Obtain post-act or pre-act statements made by leaders including speeches urging abolition of the ROTC at KSU.
- 4. Attempt to obtain any leaflets or any other printed material authored or distributed by such persons urging the abolition of ROTC.
- 5. Determine if SDS or New Left Leadership caused the burning of the RONC Building or if this was an act of local groups on an individual initiative without the advise of outside or national influence.

All offices are requested to refer to the above in connection with any leads set forth by the CV Office.

# Kent State had blame enough to go around

President Nixon's Commission on Campus Unrest presented an even-handed report on the Kent State killings: It blamed everyone involved.

The commission made clear it considered the actions of some students and non-students "plainly intolerable" as well as "dangerous, reckless and irresponsible."

It found a lack of co-ordination and cooperation between city, county and university police. It found that control of the university has passed from its president to the National Guard.

Shooting of 13 students, four fatally, by guardsmen was called "unnecessary, unwarranted and inexcusable." It found no evidence of a sniper and that shots had been fired only by guardsmen. It found no order to fire was given and that there was no fire control discipline after shooting started.

It said the trouble started when the tired, nervous guardsmen tried to disperse what had been a peaceable gathering. The report said: "The guard fired amidst great turmoil, engendered in part by their own activities. But the guardsmen should not have been able to kill so easily in the first place."

Thus an emotional confrontation ended in tragedy. Armed men must know when to use their weapons as well as how. Crowd control depends on esponse equal to the provocation and discipline. Campus violence is intolerable, but so is unjustified killing.



Cleveland was requested to advise San Antonio what action was desired.

Referenced Cleveland letter to San Antonio, 5/7/71, suggested that San Antonio interview SILVERTHORNE regarding his involvement in the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) and other subversive groups.

Referenced San Antonio Letter to Cleveland, 6/9/71, sets forth information that SILVERTHORNE was interviewed by Bureau Agents on 6/3/71 and he refused to make any statements. Cleveland was also furnished a letter from SILVERTHORNE, no copy of which was retained by San Antonio.

ReBulet to Commanding General, U.S. Army Intelligence Command, Department of the Army, dated 6/25/71. Copies of this communication were furnished Cleveland and San Antonio Offices.

Referenced Bureau letter instructed your offices to handle the Army request and submit a reply promptly by memorandum. San Antonio, by letter dated 6/29/71, indicated that the information in their possession is identical to that in the possession of the Cleveland Office and Cleveland should be responsive to the Army request.

With regard to San Antonio's letter, it is not responsive to the request of the U.S. Army or instructions from the Bureau. It should be noted that the Army requested that confidential informants in the San Antonio area be queried to determine the extent of subject's association with the Young Socialist Alliance and Weatherman as he had claimed during his interview of 3/22/71. In order to respond to the Army inquiry, an LHM should be submitted concerning contact with confidential informants of the San Antonio Division as to their knowledge. of the subject. Even if the information is negative, it should be reported in LIM form.

On 7/20/71 the Bureau, by O-1, instructed Cleveland to submit an airtel and LHM immediately concerning the results of their investigation as outlined in the Army request. response to the O-1, Cleveland indicated a communication would be furnished to the Bureau by 8/3/71. tions have been located at the Bureau.

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
