At 4 pm ASAC Belmont called and made reference to Bureau letter dated May 20 last, furnishing information concerning Judge Carl Wyzanski of Massachusetts, a character witness for Hiss. Mr. Belmont stated that information furnished was apparently taken from a departmental applicant file plus information in possession of the Bureau obtained from confidential technical informants. Mr. Donegan wants to cross-examine Myzanski but does not feel free to use the information from the confidential technical informants indicated. Belmont stated that he wants to have the Boston Office queck its files and furnish the New York Office information which could be used on cross-examination without possible embarrassment to the Bureau. I authorized this type of check of the Boston files. I told him, however, that he should not request the Boston Office of any investigation of Judge Wyzanski.

ASAC Belmont further made reference to the testimony of Joseph R. Boucout, who testified that he had rented a cottage to Chambers but saw no one else at the cottage although he lived only one hundred feet away. This is contrary to the report of interview by Special Agent Kirkland of the Philadelphia Office. He stated he planned to call the Philadelphia Office and talk to Special Agent Kirkland concerning the reportedly results of the interview and that Mr. Donegan planned to inquire of Boucout on cross-examination whether or not he had furnished information to Special Agent Kirkland contrary to that to which he testified. If Boucout does not respond affirmatively, Mr. Donegan plans to use Special Agent Kirkland in rebuttal. I authorized the Necessary contact with the Philadelphia Office.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Rental Agent for premises at 2728 P Street, N. W., Washington, D, C., Miss ELMA STEVENS, states premises leased by GEORGE ROULHAC who, it has been ascertained, is presently located with Air Corps in Alaska. Rental Agent has no knowledge of CATLETTS. Mrs. FRANCIS COTH, sister of GEORGE ROULHAC, relates that her brother was boyfriend of CLYTTE CATLETT; that he lived with CATLETTS during and prior to the time CATLETTS lived at 2728 P Street. Mrs. BOOTH also resided with CATLETTS in 1937 and again in 1939. She cannot recall typewriter in 1937 but recalls typewriter in 1939. Mrs. BOOTH also relates that in March, 1949, MIKE CATLETT, with two white men, came to her apartment and related he was working for the FBI in an attempt to obtain information from her concerning typewriter. GEORGE Ex ROULHAC, father of Mrs. BOOTH's brother and his estranged wife, SUSIN ROULHAC, interviewed and no pertinent information obtained concerning typewriter. Mrs. BOOTH further relates that CLYTIE CATLETT contacted her recently to obtain address of GEORGE ROULHAC in Alaska.

The following investigation was conducted by SA CARL N. DE TEMPLE and the writer.

Inquiries were made at the Water Registrar's Office in the Municipal Building and the Stone's Mercantile Credit Agency with negative results to ascertain the owner of the premises.

At the Tax Assessor's Office in the Municipal Building, the owner was ascertained to be JAMES J. and MAE J. MANOGUE and BLANCHE M. WILSON.

JAMES J. MANOGUE, 3201 P Street, N. W., advised that the rental agent for 2728 P Street was and had been for many years Miss EMMA W. STEVENS, 1220 Wisconsin Avenue, telephone Michigan 0089.

Miss STEVENS produced a lease dated January 17, 1938, effective January 19, 1938, between herself and GEORGE ROULHAC for the instant premises. She has no other leases for this property. She stated that the rent has been paid regularly by a man who comes into the office, and her description of this man was noted to agree generally with that of MIKE CATLETT. Miss STEVENS has no knowledge of anyone by the name of CATLETT and she assumed the person paying the rent was ROULHAC. The lease reflects on its face that ROULHAC formerly resided at 2523 P Street, N. W., and worked for the Pennsylvania Railroad as a pullman porter.

The 1948 Washington City Directory reflects a GEORGE E. ROULHAC, laborer, Board of Education, at 1307 Riggs Street, N. W., telephone Decatur 5684. Also shown is GEORGE N. ROULHAC, JR., employed at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, 760 Howard Road, S. E. The 1939 and 1940 Washington City Directories show GEORGE N. ROULHAC at 2728 P Street, N. W.

Inquiry at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Washington, D. C., reflected that GEORGE NORMAN ROULHAC was born January 24, 1917, and resigned May 25, 1948, to reenter the U. S. Army. His Serial Number was shown as Army Serial Number 33068499 and his last address as 760 Howard Street, S. E., Washington, D. C. His file indicated that between 1937 and 1941 he resided at 1123 48th Place, N. E., Washington, D. C. His wife, SAMANTHA ROULHAC, was also employed at this institution and was terminated because of inefficiency and excessive absence from work. The record of ROULHAC at the hospital was clear.

CHARLES HOWARD, 760 Howard Street, S. E., stated that GEORGE ROULHAC was married to his sister, formerly SALANTHA HOWARD. GEORGE is presently in the Air Corps stationed in Alaska. SALANTHA had been living at this address with CHARLES HOWARD and his wife but she had recently gone to New York where she is employed and he did not have her address. At the request of the Agents, CHARLES HOWARD contacted his mother, MARY E. HOWARD, Falls Church, Virginia, at a later date to obtain the address of SAMANTHA in New York City with negative results. It might be noted as a matter of interest that CHARLES HOWARD formerly lived in the Georgetown Section of Washington, D. C; that he was acquainted with the CATLETT family; that he had visited, on one or two occasions, the house on P Street but that he stated he knew nothing concerning the typewriter in this case. It might also be noted that HOWARD is presently living across the street from PERRY CATLETT, who resides at 733 Howard Street, S. E.

WILLIAM ROULHAC, 1123 48th Place, N. E., advised that he is the brother of GEORGE E. ROULHAC and that GEORGE NORMAN ROULHAC is the son of his brother. WILLIAM ROULHAC went on to say that his brother has lived with him at this address for many years; that recently he moved to 1307 Riggs Street, N. W., and that as far as he knows, his brother never lived on P Street. WILLIAM ROULHAC indicated it was probably his brother's son who lived at that address. WILLIAM ROULHAC advised that Dr. EASTER had lived next door to him at the above address and that he was acquainted with Dr. EASTER, the MARIOW family and the CATLETT family. He recalled that two of the daughters of CLYTLE CATLETT lived with Dr. EASTER. WILLIAM had no knowledge concerning the typewriter in this case, and he was asked if he had ever been contacted before concerning it. He replied that he never had been contacted directly but that several months ago a telephone call was received by him ostensibly for credit information but actually it might have been to obtain the address of his brother and his brother's son.

GEORGE E. ROULHAC, 1307 Riggs Street, who is employed at the Langley High School, First & T Streets, N. E., advised he had never lived at the P Street address but that his son, GEORGE, had lived there with the CATLETTS and that he had a daughter FRANCES ONEIDA BOOTH who had also lived there. He stated he had visited at 2728 P Street on several occasions but he had never observed a typewriter and could furnish no information concerning it.

Mrs. FRANCES ONLIDA BOOTH, 1236 Hopkins Court, S. E., stated that her brother, GEORGE, used to live with the CATLETTS and that he was, for a long time, CLYTTE CATLETT's boyfriend. Mrs. FOOTH said that the CATLETTS formerly resided at an address she recalled as 1632 32nd Street, N. W., and that GEORGE had lived with the CATLETTS there. Mrs. EOOTH went on to say that she had likewise lived with the CATLETTS and her brother GEORGE at this address and that she was not married at the time. She related that in approximately January, 1937, she left this address and went to live at 1402 6th Street, N. W., but that her brother GEORGE continued residing with the CATIETTS. She stated she definitely recalled there was no typewriter in the CATIETT residence at 32nd Street at the time she left. Mrs. BCOTH stated it was her recollection that the CATIETTS and her brother GEORGE moved from 32nd Street to 2728 P Street, N. W., but on the occasion of a later interview she stated that she believed that the CATLETTS and her brother had moved from 32nd street to an address on 25th Street, where they lived for a few months before going to 2728 P Street, N. W.

Mrs. BOOTH stated that her first child, JOAN, was born October 18, 1937. About three months before this child's second birthday, which would be about August, 1939, she and her husband moved in with the CATLETTS at 2728 P Street, N. W. She recalls that on this occasion and during the time she lived with the CATLETTS thereafter, she did see an old typewriter in this residence which was maintained, as she recalled it, underneath the stairs. She said she could not furnish any information as to when or where the CATLETTS obtained this typewriter although CLYTTE may have told her on one occasion that it was given to her by the family she worked for. However, Mrs. BOOTH stated she could not be positive of this.

Mrs. BOOTH recalled that UESULA, who is now married to PAT CATLETT, used the typewriter for school work. UESULA was not married to PAT at that time and was living in a house at the back of 2728 P Street. MIKE CATLETT was keeping company with PEARL, whom he later married and who is now dead, but she was not residing at the P Street house at that time. As Mrs. BOOTH recalled, URSULA received a new typewriter as a gift, and the old typewriter was given to BUENETTA, a daughter of CLYTIE's who was living with the EASTER family next door to her father on 48th Place, N. E. Mrs. BOOTH stated that her mother, SUSIE ROULHAC, who is separated from her father, also lived in the house on P Street with the CATLETT family for some time and that she was a friend of CLYTIE CATLETT. She could not furnish the names of any other persons who might have knowledge concerning the typewriter.

Mrs. BOOTH stated that after they had resided at the address on P Street for some time, her brother met SAMANTHA A. HOWARD and, after an acquaintanceship of about three months, married her. Shortly after this marriage, relations between them and the CATLETTS became somewhat strained, and she and her husband, as well as her brother, left the house.

Mrs. BOOTH was asked whether or not she had ever visited at the HISS house while CLYTIE worked there. She replied that she believed she had gone to this house on one occasion but that she could recall nothing concerning the details or the time that she went there. She also stated that her mother may have worked there for or with CLYTIE CATLETT on several occasions. Mrs. BOOTH also related that within the past several months CLYTIE CATLETT contacted her by telephone to obtain the address of her brother GEORGE in Alaska. Mrs. BOOTH does not know whether this request had anything to do with the typewriter, but she stated she did know that CLYTIE still liked her brother and wanted to keep in touch with him.

Mrs. BOOTH was asked whether or not anyone else had contacted her concerning this matter. She related that her husband JOHN had died in February, 1949. They were living at that time at 1412 Chapin Street, N. W., where her husband was the janitor of an apartment. In March, 1949, about 11:30 one evening, MIKE CATLETT came to her apartment at that address and knocked on the door desiring entrance. She refused to allow him in and he told her that he was working for the FBI and had a couple of FBI men with him and that he was attempting to obtain information concerning the old typewriter. Mrs. BOOTH then let him in and was questioned by two white men accompanying him concerning the typewriter, its disposition and whether she had any specimens of typing done on it. She related she had never typed on the machine herself and had nothing which had been typed on it. A few days later; MIKE CATLETT recontacted her and advised her he was still working for the FBI and requested her to keep the visit confidential. A signed statement was furnished by Mrs. BOOTH to the Agents concerning this matter. This statement was forwarded to the New York Office June 24, 1949, because of the urgency of the matter inasmuch as the CATIETTS were testifying at that time, and no copy was retained by the Washington Field Office.

Concerning Mrs. BOOTH, it will be noted that she is a resent widow and is residing at the above address where she is caring for four small children. Although not well educated, she appears to be intelligent and cooperative.

The records of the Marriage License Bureau for the District of Columbia reflect the following concerning the marriage of GEORGE NAMEOULHAC

and SAMANTHA HOWARD. It was reflected that they were married February 19, 1939, at 1815 Vernon Street, N. W., by Reverend JAMES L. PINE, the age of the groom being twenty-two years and the bride twenty-one years. No other information was available.

These records also reflected that a license was obtained by Mrs. SUSIE HOULHAC for JOHN BOOTH, aged twenty-one years, and FRANCES ONEIDA ROULHAC, aged seventeen years, who were married June 27, 1938, at 2803 N Street, N. W.

Mrs. SUSIE ROULHAC and BENJAMIN PERRY, with whom she is now living, were interviewed at 1910 First Street, N. W., where they reside in the quarters of EUGENE DUNCAN. Mrs. ROULHAC was somewhat abrupt at the beginning of the interview, and when advised that the purpose was to obtain information concerning a typewriter, she stated she knew nothing concerning this typewriter; that it was a matter which concerned CLYTTE and her family and that only CLYTIE and her family would be able to furnish any information concerning it. She denied.ever having worked at the HTSS residence either with or for CLYTIE CATLETT, stating that when CLYTIE CATLETT could not go to work she made no attempt to get anyone to take her place. Considerable time was spent in trying to ascertain from her whether she lived with the CATLETTS at 32nd Street or at any residence before they moved to P Street and whether or not she was with the CATLETTS when they first moved into the P Street address. Mrs. ROULHAC finally related that she and BEN PERRY moved in with the CATLETTS at 2728 P Street about a year after the CATLETTS first moved into this residence. She insisted, however, that she had never seen a typewriter either during the time she lived there or on any of her visits to that address. She insisted she could furnish no further information concerning this matter. BEN PERRY also related that he had no information to furnish concerning the typewriter.

Mrs. CURRY, Enlisted Personnel Section, Air Corps, Pentagon Building, made a search of her records in an attempt to ascertain the present whereabouts of GEORGE ROULHAC in Alaska. She stated that her only records showed that ROULHAC was in Langley Field, Virginia, in 1948.

Washington Field Office, by teletype dated June 24, 1949, requested the Norfolk Office to check at Langley Field, and a reply was received that GEORGE ROULHAC had left Langley Field in June, 1948, and his present whereabouts were unknown there.

Mrs. CURRY advised, on recontact, that information concerning ROULHAC's whereabouts could be obtained from the Alaskan Air Command, Seattle, Washington.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS: Rental Agent for premises at 2728 P Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., Miss EMMA STEVENS, states premises leased by GEORGE ROULHAC who, it has been ascertained, is presently located with Air Corps in Alaska. Rental Agent has no knowledge of

CATHETTS. Mrs. FRANCIS BOOTH, sister of GEORGE MOULHAC, relates that her brother was boyfriend of CLYTTE CATHETT; that he lived with CATHETTS during and prior to the time CATHETTS lived at 272d P Street. Mrs. BOOTH also resided with CATHETTS in 1937 and again in 1939. She cannot recall typewriter in 1937 but recalls typewriter in 1939. Mrs. BOOTH also relates that in March, 1949, MIKE CATHETT, with two white men, came to her apartment and related he was working for the FBH in an attempt to obtain information from her concerning typewriter. GEORGE E. ROULHAC, father of Mrs. BOOTH's brother and his estranged wife, SUSIE BOULHAC, interviewed and no pertinent information obtained concerning typewriter. Mrs. BOOTH further relates that CLYTTE CATHETT

The referenced telephone call requested that information be obtained as to the owner of the premises at 2728 P Street, N. T., "ashington, D. C., and the exact date on which the CATLETTS moved into this address.

The following investigation was conducted by SA CNALN. 60 TETRE and the writer.

Inquiries were made at the Tater Registrar's Office in the Funicipal Building and the Stones Mercantile Credit Agency with negative results to ascertain the owner of the premises.

At the Tax Assessor's Office in the Nunicipal Building, the owner was ascertained to be JAMES J. and MAR J. MANOGUE and BLANCHE M. WILSON.

JAMES J. MANOGUE, 3201 P Street, N. V., advised that the rental agent for 2728 P Street was and had been for many years Miss EMMA V. CTEVENS, 1220 Wisconsin Avenue, telephone Fichigan 0089.

Miss STEVENS produced a lease dated January 17, 1938, effective January 19, 1938, between herself and GEORGE kOULHAC for the instant premises. She has no other leases for this property. She stated that the rent has been paid regularly by a man who comes into the office, and her description of this man was noted to agree generally with that of NIKE CATLETT. Miss STEVENS has no knowledge of anyone by the name of CATLETT and she assumed the person paying the rent was HOULHAC. The lease reflects on its face that HOULHAC formerly resided at 2523 P Street, N. T., and worked for the Pennsylvania hallroad as a pullman porter.

The 1948 Washington City Directory reflects a GEORGE E. MOULHAC, laborer, Board of Education, at 1307 Miggs Street, N. W., telephone Decatur 5684. Also shown is GEORGE N. LOULHAC, JR., employed at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, 760 Howard Road, S. E. The 1939 and 1940 Washington City Directories show GEORGE N. LOULHAC at 2723 P Street, N. W.

Inquiry at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Eashington, D. C., reflected that GEORGE NORMAN ROULHAC was born January 24, 1917, and resigned May 25, 1948, to reenter the U. S. Army. His Serial Number was shown as Army Serial Number 33062499 and his last address as 760 Howard Street, S. E., Mashington, D. C. His file indicated that between 1937 and 1941 he resided at 1123 48th Place, N. E., ashington, D. C. His wife, SAMANTHA ROULHAC, was also employed at this institution and was terminated because of inefficiency and excessive absence from work. The record of houlhac at the hospital was clear.

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CHARLES HOTARD, 760 Howard Street, S. E., stated that GEORGE ROULHAG was married to his sister, formerly EM ANTHA HOWARD. GEORGE is presently in the Air Corps stationed in Alaska. SAMANTHA had been living at this address with CHARLES HOWARD and his wife but she had recently gone to New York where she is employed and he did not have her address. At the request of the Agents, CHARLES HOWARD contacted his mother, MARY E. HOWARD, Falls Church, Virginia, at a later date to obtain the address of SAWANTHA in New York City with negative results. It might be noted as a matter of interest that CHARLES HOWARD formerly lived in the Georgetown Section of Washington, D. G; that he was acquainted with the CATIETT family; that he had visited, on one or two occasions, the house on P Street but that he stated he knew nothing concerning the typewriter in this case. It might also be noted that HOWARD is presently living across the street from PERRY CATIETT, who resides at 733 Howard Street, S. E.

WILLIAM MOULHAC, 1123 43th Place, N. E., advised that he is the brother of GEORGE M. MOULHAC and that GEORGE NOMMAN MOULHAC is the son of his brother. WILLIAM MOULHAC went on to say that his brother has lived with him at this address for many years; that recently he moved to 1307 Riggs Street, N. b., and that as far as he knows, his brother never lived on P Street. WILLIAM MOULHAC indicated it was probably his brother's son who lived at that address. WILLIAM MOULHAC advised that Dr. EASTER had lived next door to him at the above address and that he was acquainted with Dr. EASTER, the MAKLON family and the CATLETT family. He recalled that two of the daughters of CLYTIE CATLETT lived with Dr. EASTER. WILLIAM had no knowledge concerning the typewriter in this case, and he was asked if he had ever been contacted before concerning it. He replied that he never had been contacted directly but that several months ago a telephone call was received by him ostensibly for credit information but actually it might have been to obtain the address of his brother and his brother's son.

GEORGE E. HOULHAG, 1307 Miggs Street, who is employed at the Langley High School, First & T Streets, N. E., advised he had never lived at the P Street address but that his son, GEORGE, had lived there with the CATLETTS and that he had a daughter FRANCES OFFIDA BOOTH who had also lived there. He stated he had visited at 2,23 P Street on several occasions but he had never observed a typewriter and could furnish no information concerning it.

Ers. FRANCES OMMIDA BOOTH, 1236 Hopkins Court. S. E., stated that her brother. GEORGE, used to live with the CATLETTS and that he was, for a long time, CLYTTE CATLETT's boyfrlend. Mrs. BOOTH said that the CATLETTS formerly resided at an address she recalled as 1632 32nd Street, N. u., and that GEORGE had lived with the CATLESTS there. Mrs. BOOTH went on to say that she had likewise lived with the CATLETTS and her brother GEORGE at this address and that she was not married at the time. She related that in approximately January, 1937, she left this address and went to live at 1402 6th Street, N. T., but that her brother GEORGE continued residing with the CATLETTS. She stated she definitely recalled there was no typewriter in the CATIFIT residence at 32nd otreet at the time she left. Mrs. BCOTH stated it was her recollection that the CATLETTS and her brother GEORGE moved from 32nd Street to 2723 P treet, N. V., but on the occasion of a later interview she stated that she believed that the CATINATS and her brother had moved from 32nd Street to an address on 25th Street, where they lived for a few months before going to 2728 P Street, N. W.

Mrs. BOOTH stated that her first child, JOAN, was born October 18, 1937. About three months before this child's second birthday, which would be about August, 1939, she and her husband moved in with the CATILITS at 2723 P Street, N. W. The recalls that on this occasion and during the time she lived with the CATILITS thereafter, she did see an old typewriter in this residence which was maintained, as she recalled it, underneath the staira. She said she could not furnish any information as to when or where the CATILITS obtained this typewriter although CLITTE may have told her on one occasion that it was given to her by the family she worked for. However, Mrs. BOOTH stated she could not be positive of this.

Mrs. BOOTH recalled that ULJULA, who is now married to PAT CATLETT, used the typewriter for school work. ULJULA was not married to PAT at that time and was living in a house at the back of 2728 P Street. MIKE CATLETT was keeping company with PEARL, whom he later married and who is now dead, but she was not residing at the P Street house at that time. As Mrs. BOOTH recalled, URSULA received a new typewriter as a gift, and the old typewriter was given to BUNNETTA, a daughter of CLITIE's who was living with the EASTER family next door to her father on 45th Place, N. E. Mrs. BOOTH stated that her mother, SUSIE houlhac, who is separated from her father, also lived in the house on P Street with the CATLETT family for some time and that she was a friend of CLITIE CATLETT. The could not furnish the names of any other persons who might have knowledge concerning the typewriter.

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Mrs. BOOTH stated that after they had resided at the address on P Street for some time, her brother met EAMANTHA A. HOMARD and, after an acquaintanceship of about three months, married her. Shortly after this marriage, relations between them and the CATIETTS became somewhat strained, and she and her husband, as well as her brother, left the house.

Mrs. BOOTH was asked whether or not she had ever visited at the HISS house while CLYTIE worked there. She replied that she believed she had gone to this house on one occasion but that she could recall nothin, concerning the details or the time that she went there. She also stated that her mother may have worked there for or with CLYTIE CATLETT on several occasions. Ers. BOOTH also related that within the past several months CLYTIE CATLETT contacted her by telephone to obtain the address of her brother GEORGE in Alaska. Mrs. BOOTH does not know whether this request had anything to do with the typewriter, but she stated she did know that CLYTIE still liked her brother and wanted to keep in touch with him.

Mrs. BOOTH was asked whether or not anyone else had contacted her concerning this matter. She related that her husband JOHN had died in February, 1949. They were living at that time at 1412 Chapin Street, N. V., where her husband was the janitor of an apartment. In March, 1949, about 11:30 one evening. LIKE CATLETT came to her apartment at that address and knocked on the door desiring entrance. She refused to allow him in and he told her that he was working for the FMI and had a couple of FMI men with him and that he was attempting to obtain information concerning the old typewriter. Mrs. BOOTH then let him in and was questioned by two white men accompanying him concerning the typewriter, its disposition and whether she had any specimens of typing done on it. She related she had never typed on the machine herself and had nothing which had been typed on it. A few days later, MIKE CATLETT recontacted her and advised her he was still working for the FBI and requested her to keep the visit confidential. A signed statement was furnished by Mrs. BOOTH to the Agents concerning this matter. This statement was forwarded to the New York Office June 24, 1949, because of the urgency of the matter inasmuch as the CATLETTS were testifying at that time, and no copy was retained by the hashington Field Office.

Concerning Mrs. BOOTH, it will be noted that she is a recent widow and is residing at the above address where she is caring for four small children. Although not well educated, she appears to be intelligent and cooperative.

The records of the Marriage License Bureau for the District of Columbia reflect the following concerning the marriage of GEORGE N. HOULHAC

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and SAMANTHA HOLVARD. It was reflected that they were married Pebruary 19, 1939, at 1815 Vernon Street, h. T., by heverend JAMES L. PINE, the age of the groom being twenty-two years and the bride twenty-one years. No other information was available.

These records also reflected that a license was obtained by Mrs. SUSIE LOULHAC for JOHN BOOTH, aged twenty-one years, and FRANCES ONLIDA LOULHAC, aged seventeen years, who were married June 27, 1938, at 2803 N Street, N. W.

Mrs. SUSIE HOULHAC and BENJAMIN PERRY, with whom she is now living. were interviewed at 1910 First Street, N. N., where they reside in the quarters of EUGLNE DUNCAN. Mrs. KUULHAC was somewhat abrupt at the beginning of the interview, and when advised that the purpose was to obtain information concerning a typewriter, she stated she knee nothing concerning this typewriter; that it was a matter which concerned CLYTTE and her family and that only CLYTTE and her family would be able to furnish any information concerning it. She denied ever having worked at the HISS residence either with or for CLYTIE CATLETT, stating that when CLYTIE CATLETT could not go to work she made no attempt to get anyone to take her place. Considerable time was spent in trying to ascertain from her whether she lived with the CATLATS at 32nd Street or at any residence before they moved to P Street and whether or not she was with the CATLETTS when they first moved into the P treet address. Mrs. LOULHAC finally related that she and BEN PERRY moved in with the CATIMITS at 2728 P Etreet about a year after the CATILITS first moved into this residence. She insisted, however, that she had never seen a typewriter either during the time she lived there or on any of her visits to that address. She insisted she could furnish no further information concerning this matter. Bill Pekily also related that he had no information to furnish concerning the typewriter.

Ers. GULRY, Enlisted rersonnel Section, Air Corps, Pentagon Building, made a search of her records in an attempt to ascertain the present whereabouts of GEORGE LOULHAC in Alaska. The stated that her only records showed that LOULHAC was in Langley Field, Virginia, in 1948.

Washington Field Office, by teletype dated June 24, 1949, requested the Norfolk Office to check at Langley Field, and a reply was received that GEONGE 1. WILHAG had left Langley Field in June, 1948, and his present whereabouts were unknown there.

Hrs. CULRY advised, on recontact, that information concerning MOULHAC's whereabouts could be obtained from the Alaskan Air Command, Seattle, Mashington.

Map made with markers indicating locations of typewriter sales and repair shops in Washington, D.C., during 1937 and 1938.

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DETAILS:

AT WASHINGTON, D.C.

By letter of June 24, 1949, the New York Office transmitted photostatic copies of the testimony offered by RAYMOND SYLVESTER CATLETT in Federal Court, Southern District of New York, on June 23, 1949. In essence the testimony reflects that CATLETT was interviewed by "about five men and a lady" at the Washington Field Office from about 4:30 to 9:00 p.m. and that Special Agent COURTIAND J. JONES told him the Woodstock typewriter of AIGER HISS was worth \$200 or more and that Agent JONES would give him \$200 or more if RAYMOND CATLETT secured the typewriter for him.

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The writer recalls that on Friday, May 13, 1949, RAYMOND SYLVESTER CATLETT was brought into the Washington Field Office about 3:45 p.m. in the company of his brother, JAMES CATLETT, for the purpose of being interviewed concerning their knowledge of the Woodstock typewriter of ALGER HISS. Their mother, CIAUDIE SATIETT, had informed the Washington Field Office earlier on May 13, 1949, that her sons had assisted the attorneys for ALGER HISS in locating the typewriter in question. PERRY M. CATLETT, JR., was also brought into the office for interview. The writer and Special Agent JOHN E. HOWARD interviewed PERRY M. CATLETT first, followed by JAMES CATLETT and then RAYMOND SYLVESTER CATLETT.

The interview on May 13, 1949, with RAYMOND SYLVESTER CATLETT commenced at 5:07 p.m. and was concluded at 6:45 p.m. The interview was conducted by Special Agent JOHN E. HOWARD and the writer and Stenographer MARCUERITE A. HANSEN was present during the entire interview. During the last 30 or 40 minutes Special Agent KENNETH T. DELIMICALE was also present. Several times other agents assigned to the Washington Field Office walked through the room but their presence in the room was momentary and it was not related to instant matter. The writer did not offer RAYMOND SYLVESTER CATLETT \$200 or any other sum of money or inducement during the course of the interview to procure the typewriter in question nor did he say that the typewriter was worth \$200 to the FBI. At 6:45 p.m. the interview was concluded and Special Agent JAMES FREW took RAYMOND CATLETT away from the field office.

Special Agent JOHN E. HOWARD recalls that on Friday, May 13, 1949, RAYMOND CATLETT was interviewed at the Washington Field Office by Special Agents COURTIAND J. JONES and JOHN E. HOWARD. This interview commenced at approximately 5:07 p.m. and ended at approximately 6:45 p.m. The interview was conducted by Agents JONES and HOWARD with Stenographer MARGUERITE A. HANSEN making notes thereof. No one else was present during this interview except during the last 30 to 45 minutes when Special Agent KENNETH T. DEIAVIGNE assisted in the interview. Other agents may have passed through or may have come into the room momentarily where the interview was being held during the course of the interview, but if so this was for purposes totally unrelated to this interview.

Special Agent JONES did not offer RAYMOND CATIEIT \$200 or any other sum or inducement during the course of this interview or at any time in Agent HOWARD's presence, to procure instant typewriter or for any other reason. Agent HOWARD recalls that he was in the room during the entire course of this interview.

RAYMOND CATLETT was brought to the Washington Field Office with his brother, JAMES, by Special Agents JAMES FREW and LEWIS E. GIENN at about 3:40 p.m. and he was returned to his home by Agent FREW about 6:45 p.m.

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Special Agent KENNETH T. DELAVIGNE recalls that he sat in on the interview of RAYMOND CATLETT for approximately 30 to 40 minutes on May 13, 1949, the interview being held at the Washington Field Office. At no time did Agent JONES offer RAYMOND CATLETT \$200 to procure the Woodstock typewriter of ALGER HISS nor was any mention made of the sum of \$200.

Miss MARGUERITE A. HANSEN, stenographer, recalls the interview of RAYHOND SYLVESTER CATLETT in the Washington Field Office on May 13, 1949. Her stenographic notes reflect that the interview commenced at 5:07 p.m. A major portion of the interview was in question and answer form and her notes do not reflect any offer by Agent JONES of \$200 to procure the typewriter of ALCER HISS. She does not recall the sum of \$200 being mentioned at any time during the interview of RAYMOND SYLVESTER CATLETT, during which she was present in its entirety.

Special Agents IEWIS E. GIENN and JAMES FREN recall that on May 13, 1949, at 3:00 p.m., they left the Washington Field Office and proceeded in a Bureau car to 2728 P Street, N. W., with instructions to locate JAMES and RAYMOND CATIETT. Both JAMES and RAYMOND CATIETT were located on the sidewalk of P Street in the immediate vicinity of the above address. The Agents identified themselves to JAMES and RAYMOND CATIETT and they agreed to accompany the agents to the Washington Field Office for interview. At this point, RAYMOND CATIETT commented that he had been expecting "the FBI" to come to see him.

The above agents and JAMES and RAYMOND CATIETT then proceeded in the car to the Washington Field Office, arriving at about 3:40 p.m. PERRY CATIETT arrived a few moments later and entered the interview room first. Agent FREX remained in the outer office with JAMES and RAYMOND CATIETT.

After PERRY was interviewed, he left the office and JAMES entered the interview room. At the completion of the interview with JAMES, JAMES returned to the outer office and remained with Agent FREW. RAYMOND entered the interview room a few minutes after 5:00 p.m. At about 6:45 p.m., RAYMOND returned to the outer office.

Agent FREW then drove JAMES and RAYMOND CATTETT in a Bureau car to the vicinity of 28th and P Streets, N. W. It was the intention of Agent FREW to drive the CATTETTS to the U.S. Public Health Service at Bethesda, Maryland, where they are employed. However, while proceeding along Constitution and Virginia Avenues the CATTETTS decided it was too late to go to work and asked to be driven to the vicinity of their home at 2728 P Street, N.W. This was done.

Neither Agent GIENN nor Agent FREW was present during the above interviews. Neither agent heard Agent COURTLAND J. JONES or any other person offer RAYLOND CATLETT a sum of money for the typewriter.

On June 25, 1949, the New York Office telephonically requested that a map be prepared reflecting the location of all typewriter sales and repair shops that were in existence in Washington, D.C., covering the period from January through September 1938. It was also requested that the classified telephone directories covering this period be secured.

A review of the classified telephone directories for the years 1937 and 1938 reflects that two directories are issued annually. For 1937 there is a directory "corrected" through April 21, 1937 and another "corrected" through October 22, 1937. There are two directories for 1938, one "corrected" through April 21, 1938, and another "corrected" through October 27, 1938.

Mr. WILLIAM K. NORWOOD, 2 New York Avenue, NW, general directory manager of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company, furnished the directories for April 1937, April 1938 and October 1938, and advised that they are the official copies of the telephone company.

A review of these directories reflects the existence of the following typewriter sales and repair shops in Washington, D.C., as shown in the classified sections of the directories. The identities of these shops are being set forth below with an "x" indicating the directory in which they appear.

DETAILS: AT WASHINGTON, D. C.

It will be recalled that in referenced telephone call, the New York Office desired that the Washington Field Office ascertain if possible, from the exact or approximate date when TIMOTHY HOBSON HISS ceased using crutches. It will be recalled that in February, 1937 TIMOTHY HOBSON HISS suffered a compound fracture of his leg and was discharged from the Georgetown Hospital on February 24, 1937, as the New York Office has been previously advised.

It is the understanding of the Washington Field Office in this respect that testimony has been offered that TIMOTHY HOBSON HISS was on crutches at a Maryland summer camp as late as August, 1937.

On June 24, 1949,

for this leg injury after his leg had been set, placed in a cast and after	/D
he was discharged from the hospital as set out in previous communications	
to the New York Office. this fracture and implemented	
the cast. advised that she was positive that this break, which

off crutches by August, 1937. however, mentioned that HOBSON	
was a neurotic child at that age and may have used his crutches longer than

Charts also include a letter handwritten from PRISCIIIA HISS, dated August 31, 1938, indicating that the HISSes would henceforth engage one Dr. WORTH DANIEIS to treat TIMOTHY HOBSON. has a hazy recollection that she may have forwarded some charts to Dr. DANIEIS and there may be some information in these charts bearing upon the removal of the cast from HOBSON's leg. said that this is by no means a positive recollection.
Dr. WORTH DANIEIS is a local physician with offices at 1150 Connecticut Avenue, Northwest. He is presently on vacation in Maryland and by teletype dated June 28, 1949, Baltimore has been requested to interview him.
a reputable local physician with offices at 915 19th Street, Northwest, advised that he cannot remember removed the cast from TIMOTHY HOBSON's leg and that he cannot state with any cer- tainty when HOBSON should have discarded his crutches. It is that the cast should have been removed in April or May, 1937 and that HOBSON should have been without his crutches by August, although said that there is a possibility that the crutches may have been required in August, 1937. New York teletype dated June 24, 1949, indicated that AIGER HISS, in direct testimony, had stated that no original State Department documents were made available to the Nye Committee and requested that the Washington Field Office interview STEVEN RAUSHENBAUSH in this connection. It is pointed out that HISS's actual testimony was probably that no original State Department documents were furnished to him rather than to the committee as such.

RAUSHENBAUSH, who resides at 3503 Lowell Street, Northwest, advised the writer on June 25, 1949 that it is his recollection that the Nye Committee was furnished paraphrases of numerous State Department documents and that these paraphrases were made available through one JOSEPH COY GREEN, a State Department official who was designated by then Secretary of State HUIL to act as liaison between the State Department and the Nye Committee. RAUSHENBAUSH said that paraphrases were furnished in order to protect State Department codes in which the original documents were couched.

Mrs. STEVEN RAUSHENBAUSH, who is the former JOSEPHINE BURNS, advised that when AIGER HISS was employed with the Nye Committee, she, also a Nye committee employee, was the Committee liaison with the State Department and was furnished an office in the State Department by GREEN. In this office Mrs. RAUSHENBAUSH read an extremely large number of State Department documents and selected those which she thought might be of interest to the Nye Committee. The selected documents were copied by a stenographer and these copies made available to the Committee. Mrs. RAUSHENBAUSH recalls that this material was furnished as exact copies and not as paraphrases.

RAUSHENBAUSH, himself, recalls only two original (as opposed to copies) State Department documents furnished to the Nye Committee. One of these was a memorandum written by Lord BAIFOUR, British diplomat, which was sent to the Nye Committee after HISS had left the Committee. RAUSHENBAUSH cannot recall the other document with any accuracy, nor can he recall the date of its transmission. He does recall it was returned to the State

Department immediately. It is RAUSHENBAUSH's opinion that HISS could have had access to any material furnished by the State Department to the Nye Committee, although he doubts if HISS, in his work, would have had any occasion to refer to State Department documents. RAUSHENBAUSH made the reservation that HISS may have had the necessity to refer to these documents.

Mr. JOSEPH COY GREEN, previously identified, who resides at 10 Quincy, Chevy Chase, Maryland, advised on June 26, 1949, that he had furnished "literally hundreds" of State Department documents to the Nye Committee in the form of true copies of the original documents. Mr. GREEN recalled that Mrs. RAUSHENBAUSH functioned in this matter in the fashion set out above. Mr. GREEN stated that copies rather than paraphrases were furnished because most of the documents were so old that the codes involved were obsolete. GREEN, who said he was selected by HUIL to be liaison between the State Department and the Nye Committee, advised that he had almost daily conferences with Nye and RAUSHENBAUSH but recalls no business dealings with HISS and does not recall meeting HISS at the time, although he did not deny the possibility that he may have met HISS.

GREEN said that when HISS began to work in the State Department he knew HISS extremely well. GREEN advised at that time his office records might indicate in some detail exactly what documents had been furnished by him and he promised to check these records. GREEN also advised that any State Department documents made available to the Nye Committee were furnished in order that they could be published and insisted that nearly all the State Department documents furnished were in fact published in the Nye Committee reports, which reports constitute approximately forty volumns and are available to the public. GREEN stated that the intelligence value of the State Department documents furnished was negligible.

On June 28, 1949, GREEN advised that he had completed a check of his State Department files. These files indicated that several thousand documents, or copies of documents, were furnished the Nye Committee and that all of these several thousand, except approximately twenty, had State Department sanction for publication. GREEN also said that his records indicated that he on one occasion met in an official manner with RAUSHENBAUSH, five Senators and HISS. GREEN will supply the date of this meeting and such further details as his records may show on June 29, 1949.

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The former Senator GERAID NYE was located and interviewed at Richmond, Virginia by the Richmond Office, as indicated by Richmond teletype dated June 27, 1949. At this time NYE stated that he recalled that the Committee had access to and that original State Department documents were made available to the Nye Committee. He could not recall specifically whether State Department documents were furnished to AIGER HISS or if HIES had access to them.

The report of Special Agent JOHN VAN ETTEN, dated March 23, 1949, sets out interviews with several Nye Committee associates of HISS.

Mr. BEN T. MOORE, 6512 Ridgewood Avenue, Chevy Chase, Maryland, a State Department employee, advised the writer on June 26, 1949 that he worked with the Nye Committee from June, 1934 until June, 1935 and that he worked on a project with HISS in connection with war-time control of the press. The bulk of the information in connection with this project came from the War Industries Board and MOORE does not recall that any State Department documents were utilized. He could furnish no other pertinent information.

Mr. CALVIN J. NICHOIS, previously identified by this office, also recalled working with HISS on the Nye Committee. NICHOIS advised the writer on June 26 that he has no recollection that HISS was furnished State Department documents. NICHOIS recalls one meeting where Secretary HUIL brought original documents from the State Department for the perusal of two the members, NYE and RAUSHENBAUSH. HULL returned these documents to the State Department at the close of this meeting. NICHOIS does not think HISS attended this meeting although he has no exact recollection. NICHOIS recalled that he and HISS worked on a project involving wartime finances.

Mrs. MARKIEY M. MARKIEY (Mrs. GEORGE H. MARKIEY) who has previously been identified by this office, advised that although she was secretary to RAUSHENBAUSH, she does not recall any information in connection with State Department documents and specifically does not recall any State Department documents furnished to HISS.

LOUIS R. BECKER, employee of the NLRB, previously identified by this office, advised the writer on June 27 that he has no recollection of

It is noted that Mr. JOSEPH COY GREEN is somewhat incensed because his name has not been cleared after CHAMBERS' testimony that HISS received documents from GREEN, which documents were given to CHAMBERS for transmittal in the Soviet apparatus. GREEN's home town newspapers (Cincinnati, Ohio) have given considerable space to the testimony and GREEN feels it should have been explained by USA MURPHY that his, GREEN's, part in this affair was entirely above suspicion.

DETAILS:

AT DULUTH, MINNESOTA:

Captain CHARLES EDWARD DOLE, U. S. Marine Corps, presently resides at Apartment $\frac{n}{H}$ 9, 815 E. 1st Street, Duluth, Minnesota, and is attending special courses at the University of Minnesota, Duluth Branch, Captain DOLE was interviewed in accordance with requests set forth in referenced teletypes.

Captain DOLE advised that his mother, Dr. ESTHER DOLE, who died on January 10, 1946 pecupied an apartment, on which she paid rental, at 117 Water Street, Chestertown, Maryland, from 1932 to 1942. This building was owned by Mrs. L. WICKES. According to Captain DOLE, his mother, during all these years, to his knowledge, did not sublet her apartment except once, and that was during the summer, July and August, of 1937. Captain DOLE did not meet the occupants, did not know their identities, and he states that the name HISS was unknown to him until he read of this name in the newspapers in connection with the current trial.

Captain DOLE, in explaining his reasons for stating that his mother had not subleased her apartment, except for the summer of 1937, said that in June of 1936 he himself had graduated from Washington College. During the summer months of the year 1936, he was employed at the LEONARD ZIEZOLE (phonetic) Garage on Maple Avenue in Chestertown. This garage is now known as Waddell's Garage. He also stated that his sister ALICE, now Mrs. GEORGE KEESTER, finished art school in the spring or early summer of 1936 at the Maryland Institute in Baltimore and returned home immediately thereafter. She did not teach school until the fall of 1936 and it is DOLE's recollection that his mother, his sister ALICE and he resided at 117 Water Street during the entire summer of 1936. He said he probably, because of the crowded condition in the apartment, slept in the basement of this apartment building.

In the fall of 1936, Captain DOLE stated he enrolled at the Droxel Institute of Technology at Philadelphia, Pa., and thereafter during the school years of 1936-37, 1937-38, 1938-39, 1939-40 and 1940-41 attended school at the University. During these years he resided with his mother at her apartment in Chestertown, Maryland during school vacations and on occasional week-ends, except as hereinafter noted.

In the summer of 1937, Captain DOLE advised he secured a position with the Glenn L. Martin Airplane Factory at Middle River, Maryland, which is a suburb of Baltimore,

Maryland, during the time he resided at 1732 St. Paul Street, Baltimore, Maryland. He recalls that in the summer of 1937, while so employed, he visited at Chestertown Maryland on a few week-ends only. He stated he did not go to his mother's apartment at any time for the reason that this apartment was subleased. While in Chestertown on these occasions he resided with friends. He states he is certain of the year 1937 because of the fact that the first year he worked at the Glenn I. Martin Airplane Factory he became friendly with several young men, also employed by Martin, whose homes were in Philadelphia. These young men returned to Philadelphia week-ends and DOIE recalls a feeling of lonesomeness many week-ends while he remained in Middle River. Only occasionly during this summer of 1937 did he visit friends in Chestertown and stay at their homes.

Captain DOLE advised that his mother was normally employed as an instructor at the Washington College in Chestertown, Maryland during the school years, and her employment usually terminated at mid-June of each year. He recalled that in the year 1937, after the mid-June term had ended, his mother was to report for employment as an instructor at Alfred University, Alfred, New York, on or about July 1st, and that the term was to end about in mid-August of the same year. states that he is positive that it was the summer of 1937 that his mother's apartment was subleased for the reason that on June 27, 1949, he received a letter from his sister ALICE, who said that since the FBI had interviewed her she remembers attending summer school at Alfred University during the summer of 1937. Captain DOLE related that in her letter she said she and her mother both lived in Alfred, New York from approximately July 1, 1937 to mid-August, 1937, after which time they left on a vacation trip of two to three weeks' duration in Canada and returned to their apartment in Chestertown, Maryland approximately September 1, 1937. It was during this same time, said DOLE, that he was employed by the Glenn L. Martin Airplane Factory in Middle River, Maryland.

Captain DOIE recalled that his mother, during the summers of 1935 and 1938, visited in Europe and, of course, said DOIE, during these two summers she was not employed during the summer sessions at Alfred University, Alfred, New York.

With reference to the letter Captain DOLE received from his sister ALICE in Florida on June 27, 1949, DOLE said that she is certain her mother subleased her apartment during the summer of 1937 to an individual or individuals recommended to her by KEILOGG SMITH, who is a prominent man in Chestertown and who was well acquainted with his mother. SMITH is also connected with the Chester River Yacht & Country Club, said DOLE.

Captain DOIE listed the occupants in Mrs. WICKES' building during 1936 and 1937. Mrs. L. WICKES had her apartment on the first floor. Professor FORD lived in a first floor apartment for two or three years, including 1936 and 1937. He was professor

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of Spanish and French at Washington College in Chestertown, and is still teaching there, said DOIE.

Professor PAUL SOLANDT occupied one of the two apartments on the second floor, and taught at Washington College. He lived with his aged mother in an apartment, as later explained herein, directly across the hall from DOLES' apartment.

Captain DOLE's sister ALICE, now Mrs. GEORGE C. KEESTER, 3401 Prescott Street, St. Petersburg, Florida, was away from home, said Captain DOLE, during most of 1936 and 1937, except as related above, while attending school in Baltimore. She visited her mother only during school vacations.

Captain DOLE advised that a young married couple named Mr. and Mrs. RICHARD COLLINS age 30 to 35 years, resided in one of the two third floor apartments from 1932 to 1937 or 1938. The COLLINSES had lived in Chestertown all their lives and built a white house eventually next to the country club in Chestertown, moving into this home from the above noted apartment in about 1937 or 1938. RICHARD COLLINS: brother named WILLIAM is an attorney in Chestertown, and another brother STEPHEN is a judge in that city.

Captain DOIE stated that his mother's apartment, until the fall of 1935, had been the second apartment on the third floor. One Dr. KENNETH BUXTON, who was head of the Chemistry Department at Washington College in Chestertown, resided with his family in a second floor apartment. Captain DOIE related that Mrs. BUXTON murdered Dr. BUXTON's mother in the second floor apartment in the fall of 1935, and the BUXTON family moved away. At that time Captain DOIE's mother moved from the third floor to the second floor apartment formerly occupied by the BUXTONS. Simultaneously a family whose last name was HUBBARD moved to the third floor apartment vacated by the DOIES. HUBBARD's first name is not recalled, but he had a daughter DIANNE, age 17 in 1935, who attended high school, and a daughter BARBARA, age then about 19, who attended college in Chestertown. The father was a salesman away from home most of the time, but resided with his daughters in the apartment when at home. HUBBARD was about 50 years old in 1935.

Captain DOIE related that to his knowledge his nother required no lease from the individual or individuals who subleased her apartment in the summer of 1937. He stated he was certain his mother kept no diary, and that the only records she had at the time of her death were destroyed by his sister, Mrs. GEORGE KEESTER. She did have, he stated however, a few notes which she left to the Washington College. Certainly, said DOIE, nothing is now in storage. DOIE said that he and his sister ALICE were the only two relatives of the deceased Mrs. DOIE.

When asked how his mother probably went about the matter of subleasing her apartment,

DETAILS:

AT DULUTH, MINNESOTA:
