It was concluded that the DATSY FARSHIT signature appearing on K35 was written by the same person who wrote the FAMILIA dignatures appoaring on specimens K519 through K525. Specimens K519 through K525 are listed as follows:

K525 Undated handwritten letter on stationery bearing the address "252 South Twenty-First Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania", beginning "Dear Liss Wrice I really didn't hear ...", migned COMMY DAISY FANCIUM.

K525 Letter typewritten on stationery of The Free Library of Philadelphia, Logan Equate, Philadelphia, dated Hovember 23, 1945, signed COMD DAISY PANSIER.

It was concluded that the ALGER HISS signature appearing on KAO was written by the person who signed the ALGER HISS signature appearing on a United States Civil Corvice Commission Applicant fingerprint card dated Lay 6, 1942. The fingerprints on the fingerprint card were taken, according to the notation appearing on the reverse side of the fingerprint card, by GRADY E. BERETT, Junior Stenographer, Room 100, Department of State, Lay 6, 1942. The ALGER HISS signature appearing on the fingerprint card submitted by the New York Office showing the arrest date of 12-16-48 contains variations which are not in the HISS signature on KAO. This is probably due to the fact that the HISS signature on KAO was written in 1933, while the signature on the fingerprint card was written in the latter part of 1948.

It was concluded that the PRISCILLA FARSLET HISS signature on KAL was written by the person who wrote the PRISCILLA HISS signature appearing on K535.

Testimony can be given in regard to the above conclusions, however, it is specifically pointed out that the authenticity of the known handwritings would have to be established to the satisfaction of the Court.

For the information of the New York Office, specimens Kolthrough Kol, which were received from the Daltimore Office under date of November 29, 1948, are described below:

Kel Photostatic copy of a three-page letter dated April 13, 1936 beginning "Dear Lr. Case, The arrangements suggested in your letter ...", bearing known handwriting specimens of ALCEN HISS.

Kc2 Photostatic copy of a letter dated April 16, 1936 beginning "Dear Ir. Case, The washer on the plunger of the pump ...", bearing known handwriting specimens of ALCER HICC.

Re3 Photostatic copy of a letter dated April 25, 1936 beginning "Dear lir. Case, I was disappointed to receive ...", bearing known handwriting specimens of ALGIR HISS.

Kell Photostatic copy of a two-page letter dated May 5, 1936 beginning "Dear Er. Case, Your letter of April 22 and earlier letters ...", bearing known handwriting specimens of ALGER NESS.

The evidence submitted will be returned to the New York Office as soon as photographic copies have been made for the files of the Inbergtony.

Reference letter from the Bureau to the Attorney General dated December 13, 1948, and letter from the Bureau to New York dated February 5, 1949.

In the referenced letter of December 13, 1948, it is stated "it was concluded the handwriting on specimens Q1 through Q4 was written by AIGER HISS, whose known handwriting specimens are listed in the FBI Laboratory as KCl through KC4." These known handwriting specimens were submitted by the Baltimore Office of the FBI on November 29, 1948. This office has no information as to what handwriting specimens are referred to as KCl through KC4. It is desired that the Baltimore Office, as well as the Bureau, advise this office just what specimens are referred to as KCl through KC4.

In the referenced letter of February 5, 1949, it is noted that the FBI Laboratory has advised that "if authenticated known handwriting specimens of AIGER HISS, PRISCILLA HISS and DAISY FANSLER are received in the future, such signatures will be compared with the signatures appearing on specimens K35, K40 and K41." The Bureau has in its possession a copy of a fingerprint card of AIGER HISS, who was fingerprinted at the New York Office on December 16, 1948. A signature appears thereon and it was witnessed by two Agents of this office. It is further believed that the Baltimore Office has a copy of AIGER HISS! signature that was placed on a signed statement that was secured from him on December 4, 1948. Further, it is believed that the Washington Field Office could secure specimens of the handwriting of AIGER HISS from the personnel file of AIGER HISS that was maintained on him at the time he was employed by the United States Govern ment.

There is enclosed herewith the original signed statement of PRISCILLA HISS that was obtained from her at the time she was interviewed at this office. This signature appearing on this statement was witnessed by two Agents of this office.

For the information of the Fhiladelphia and Norfolk Offices, an attempt is now being made to obtain authentic specimens of DAISY FANSLER'S handwriting.

It is desired that she be recontacted and that a copy of her signature, along with RECORDED -- 133 ENC - REGISTERED MAIL

WORK AND ON ONE OCCASION SHE AND GRANE WENT WITH COL ABYKOV, WHOM CRANE KNEW AS RETE, AND BYKOVS WIFE TO A NIGHT CLUB IN NEW YORK. UNDATED AND NIDENTIFIED NEWSPAPER CLIPPING FOUND IN SEARCH OF CRANES RESIDENCE REFEECTS CRANE AND GUTELIUS MARRIED BY GUTELIUS' FATHER, A PRESBYTERIAN MINISTER, AT WHICH TIME ACCORDING TO CLIPPING CRANE WAS ASSOCIATED WITH A NEWSPAPER SYNDICATE IN NYC. GUTELIUS PRESENTLY REMARRIED AND CRANE DOES NOT KNOW HER PRESENT LAST NAME. GUTELIUS HOME WAS IN ROCHESTER, NEW YORK. CRANE ADVISED HE RECEIVED A LEICA CAMERA FROM JOHN LOOMIS SHERMAN IN SAN FRANCISCO AND LATER GAVE THIS CAMERA TO CHAMBERS IN NEW YORK. CRANE BELIEVES CHAMBERS LATER GAVE THE CAMERA TO THE WIFE OF QUOTE THE ITALIAN UNQUOTE TO WHOM CRANE GAVE LESSONS IN PHOTO-GRAPHY. CRANE BELIEVES THIS WOMAN MAY STILL HAVE THIS LEICA CAMERA CHAMBERS FURNISHED CRANE MONEY WITH WHICH CRANE PURCHASED A MODEL G EICA AT COHENS CAMERA EXHANGE ON FULTON STREET IN NYC. THIS LEICA WHICH HAS SERIAL NO. ONE SIX TWO SIX SEVEN THREE CRANE STILL HAS IN HIS POSSESS ION. HE BELIEVES HE NEVER USED THIS CAMERA FOR TAKING PHOTOGRAPHS OF DOCUMENTS. CRANE USES THE LEICA CONTINUOUSLY AS A MEANS OF LIVELIHOOD DOING COMMERCIAL PHOTOGRAPHY. HE HAS BEEN EXTREMELY COOPERATIVE AND IS EMTIRELY WILLING FOR BUREAU TO TAKE HIS CAMERA, HOWEVER STATED HE MUST HAVE A SIMILAR LEICA CAMERA TO USE WHILE HIS IS GONE. BUREAU REQUESTED TO GIVE LA AUTHORITY TO LOAN CRANE A BUREAU OWNED LEICA CAMERA END PAGE TWO

CRANE HAS NOW RECALLED THAT HE ALSO DID SOME PHOTO-GRAPHING OF DOCUMENTS DURING ONE WEEK IN SUMMER OF THIRTYSEVEN IN WASH DC IN APARTMENT OF A GIRL KNOWN TO CHAMBERS, THAT HIS GIRL WOULD BE AWAY FROM THE BEE APARTMENT WHILE THEY WERE DOING PHOTOGRAPHING AND HE DES-CRIBED THIS GIRL AS BEING LARGE ATHLETIC TYPE, FIVE TEN OR ELEVEN INCHES, ONE FIFTY POUNDS, AND DARK HAIRED. HE RECALLED HER APARTMENT HAD BEEN ON SIXTEENTH OR SEVENTEENTH STREET NW, ONE BLOCK OR MORE FROM COMMISSION. THEEXX CONNECTICUT AVENUE IN WASH DC. WHILE WORKING FOR CHAMBERS CRANE OPERATED RANE NEWS PHOTO SERVICE PAREN OR SIMILAR NAME PAREN AND HAD MAIL ADDRESS AT MINATURE CAMERA CLUB, GEORGE WASHINGTON HOTEL. HE USED DARKROOM OF MINIATURE CAMERA CLUB TO DEVELOP PHOTOS. HE ADVISED THIS WORK INVOLVED COMMERCIAL PHOTOGRAPHY WAS DONE WITH CHAMBERS PERMISSION, WAS NOT CONCERNED WITH HIS ILLEGAL WORK, BUT MERELY TO KEEP HIM OCCUPIED AND AS AN ADDITIONAL SOURCE OF INCOME. CRANE RECALLED CHAMBERS MENTION-ING PERSONS IN YOUNGER SET OF STATE DEPT. INCLUCDING NAMES OF ALGER HISS. ACHESON, ADDITION ADOLPHABERLE, AND ALSO HARRY DEXTER WHITE. DUGGAN, DEAN THESE CONVERSATIONS MAY HAVE BEEN WITH COL. BYKOV AND IT WAS HIS IMPRESS-ION THAT MATERIAL WAS TO BE EXPECTED FROM SOME OF THESE PEOPLE OR THAT SOME OF THEM WERE CONSIDERED AS POSSIBLE SOURCES OF MATERIAL. CRANE SAID HE WAS SUBSEQUENTLY SURPRISED TO READ ANTI SOVIET STATEMENTS MADE END PAGE THREE

BY BERLE. CRANE ALSO RECALLED VAGUELY THAT THERE WAS SOME DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE TRANSACTION MENTIONED, BUT HE COULD FURNISH NO FURTHER INFORMATION CRANE STATED HE, KNEW PEYTON KERR AND WIFE IN SAN FRANCISCO AND LATER IN WASH DELLA DC. CONTACTED KERRS SEVERAL TIMES ON INSTRUCTIONS OF EITHER CHAMBERS OR BYKOV TO DEVELOP HIM OR OTHERS THROUGH HIM AS INFORMATION SOURCES. PEYTON KERR WAS ECONOMIST AND POSSIBLY EMPLOYED IN EITHER AG-RICULTURE OR LABOR DEPARTMENTS. CRANE STATED KERRS HAD A FRIEND IN STATE DEPARTMENT AND CHAMBERS HAD INSTRUCTED CRANE TO DEVELOP THIS FRIEND AS A SOURCE. CRANE CANNOT RECALL THIS PERSONS NAME. HE WAS TO DEVELOP THIS MAN THROUGH ATTENTION TO THE MANS WIFE, WHOM HE DESCRIBED AS FIVE FEET ONE OR TWO INCHES, OVERWEIGHT FOR HEIGHT, LIGHT BROWN HAIR, LIGHT COMPLEXION, WORE GLASSES. HE COULD NOT DESCRIBE THE HUSBAND, WHOM HE MET ONLY ONCE. CRANE STATED HE WAS UNSUCCESSFUL IN DEVELOPING THE KERRS OR KERRS FRIEND AND THAT KERRS WERE IN NO WAY INVOLVED IN THE ILLEGAL WORK. CRANE ADVISED THAT COL. BYKOV WAS PROBABLY INTRODUCED BY CHAMBERS, HE, CRANE, KEPT PREARRANGED MEETINGS WITH BYKOV ON THE AVERAGE OF ONCE OR TWICE A MONTH. CRANE SAID HE NEVER REALLY KNEW THE REASON FOR HIS CONTACTS WITH BYKOV BUT THAT ON OCCASIONS HE DELIVERED MONEY FROM BYKOV TO CHAMBERS AND SOMETIMES WHEN CHAMBERS COULD NOT KEEP MEETINGS WITH BYKOV CHAMBERS WOULD SEND CRANE.

CRANE CANNOT RECALL MEETING BYKOV ANYWHERE BUT NYC. CRANE MET BYKOVS WIFE ONLY ONCE AS MENTIONED ABOVE WHEN GUTELIUS WAS ALSO PRESENT. TO CRANE THIS MEANT IT HAD FALLEN INTO NAZI HANDS. CHARLES CHAMBERS IN LETTER STATED HE AND PETE PAREN BYKOV PAREN QUOTE WERE MARCHING HAND IN HAND INTO OBLIVION UNQUOTE. CRANE RECALLED CHAMBERS TELLING HIM THAT ISAAC TOLKOFF ON ONE OCCASION SOLD ALL HIS GOODS AND WENT TO RUSSIA BUT AFTER BEING THERE A SHORT WHILE BECAME VERY DISGUSTED AND HAD A DIFFICULT TIME GETTING BACK INTO THE US. CRANE ALSO STATED CHAMBERS ONCE TOLD HIM FOLKOFF WAS WITH THE SECRET BOOMERPOLICE. CRANE SAID IF FOLKOFF IS STILL ACTIVE HE IS STILL VERY MUCH ILLEGAL. CRANE ALSO RECALLED CHAMBERS TELLING HIM THE SOVIETS HAD USED MEMBERS OF THE IRISH ARMY TO OBTAIN INFORMATION IN THE US. Reference is made to New York teletype to the Director and Boston dated February 8, 1949, requesting Boston to interview Judge MANLEY 0. WUDSON, Harvard Law School, Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts, to secure any typewritten correspondence emanating from ALGER HISS.

Professor HENRY M. HART of Harvard Law School, who was interviewed on February 4, 1949, also suggested that Judge HUDSON be contacted. Accordingly, an appointment was made through Judge Hudson's secretary for February 10, 1949.

Judge HUDSON when contacted stated he did not desire to be interviewed orally and that if a letter were forwarded to him outlining the information requested he would reply by letter.

In this connection the attention of the Bureau is directed to Boston leto the Bureau dated May 11, 1948 in that case entitled MAURICE ARMELEE Railroad Retirement Board, Chicago, Illinois, LOYALTY OF GOVERNMENT EMBOSTON file 121-415. The Bureau file number of this case is unknown to Boston. This letter pointed out that on May 10, 1948 an attempt was mean agent of the Boston Office to interview Professor HUDSON concerning PARMELEE, and that the secretary stated Professor Hudson would not see agent, advising if a letter were submitted requesting Professor Hudson's views he would reply.

In view of the foregoing, in the event the Bureau desires Boston to submit a letter to Judge MANLEY O. HUDSON, it is suggested the Bureau outline in memorandum form the information it desires from Professor HUDSON or should the Bureau so desire that it submit a letter directly to Judge MANLEY O. HUDSON at Harvard Law School, Cambridge, Massachusetts. In the absence of specific Bureau instructions, no further action will be taken in this matter by the Boston Office.

## AT WASHINGTON, D. C.

BEVERLY SMITH, writer, Saturday Evening Post, 744 Jackson Place, n.w., advised that he has been acquainted with ALGER HISS and his family since SMITH's boyhood days, when he lived on Park Avenue and the HISS family lived on nearby Linden Street, in Baltimore, Laryland. He recalled HISS mother as a widowed woman with five children who lived in modest circumstances, and who was very courageous and a good manager and mother. SMITH stated that he was somewhat older than ALGER and DONALD HISS, advising that he visited the HISS home frequently because of his very close friendship with their brother, BOSLEY HISS, who died in 1926. He recalled that both ALGER and DONALD were serious minded well-behaved boys, contrasting them with BOSLEY, who was a very gay and carefree lad. SMITH stated he graduated from Johns Hopkins in 1919, considerably ahead of ALGER HISS, and lost track of ALGER and DONALD HISS to some extent until he heard of their brilliant records at Harvard University.

BEVERLY SMITH related that in 1931 or 1932 he had written an article on the late Justice OLIVER WENDELL HOLMES for the American Magazine, and had sought out ALGER HISS for background data and interesting anecdotes. He stated that ALGER was very cooperative but was reticent in furnishing personal material concerning the home life of the Justice or intimate personal items. SMITH stated that he furnished this as evidence of the scrupulous consideration which he felt identified ALGER HISS. SMITH also mentioned that he had written an article on CORDELL HULL at a later date, at which time ALGER was employed at the State Department, and again he had consulted HISS for the same purpose. He stated that ALGER was most courteous and considerate, but again, reluctant to furnish personal bits of information as he did not feel this proper and correct. SMITH stated that because of his early acquaintance with the HISS family he feels prejudiced on HISS' side. At the same time, he is aware of the seriousness of CHAMBERS' allegations and the developments since CHAMBERS' exposures.

SMITH advised that he had not seen ALGER HISS very often, perhaps on eight occasions in the past fifteen years. He said he made it a point to look ALGER up every so often. He was unable to associate HISS personally with any of the characters in the case, such as PRESSMAN, ABT, CHALBERS, WITT, etc. He stated he had never had any personal correspondence with ALGER, nor had he ever met ALGER's wife or the wife of DONALD HISS. He mentioned that he has seen DONALD perhaps four times in the past ten or fifteen years.

SMITH advised that he had no information which would identify HISS with the Communist movement nor did he have any contrary data. He stated that if

HISS had esponded the doctrines of Communism, he had no idea when he may have been converted. He recalled that in the early 1930's, there were numerous evening gatherings of dynamic young men who had been brought into the covernment, and that all kinds of theories and ideas were discussed, and he is pretty sure ALGER was exposed to these ideas and participated in the discussions, particularly in AAA, where there was much talk of rolling up of sleeves and remaking America.

BEVERLY SMITH stated that he understood that the attorneys for ALGER HISS, at one time at least, were very confident of winning the libel suit filled by HISS against CHAMBERS in Baltimore, Maryland. He also indicated that the character and background of WHITTAKER CHAMBERS is the weak link in the Government's case against ALGER HISS, and that the trial will disclose that the defense knows a lot more about CHAMBERS than we do.

ANATOL VISSON, Time Magazine, 815 - 15th Street, n.w., advised that he has known ALGER HISS in his official capacity as Time reporter, since about 1944, first meeting him about the time of the Dumbarton Oaks conversations. He also recalled that he saw HISS during the San Francisco Conference, April 25 to June 27, 1945, at which time HISS acted as Secretary General, meeting the press and interested persons in a casual and highly efficient manner. He stated that a one word description of ALGER HISS is that he is genial. He advised that he never received any inside information or "scoops", but as a reporter, considered HISS a top grade man to contact at the State Department.

VISSON also recalled that the last time he saw ALGER HISS was in connection with an article on ANDREI GROMYKO, who was featured on the front page of Time during 1947. VISSON stated that he recalled having heard some yague rumor about HISS' loyalty and felt that this was an opportunity to interrogate HISS, whom he knew was acquainted with GROMYKO. He advised that HISS handled the interview in a very casual and disarming manner and answered TVISSON's most penetrating questions to the latter's entire satisfaction. VISSON advised that he could furnish no information connecting HISS with any of the subjects in the case nor any information showing Communist affiliation. He stated that he had never visited socially with HISS nor exchanged correspondence with him. He stated that he had considerable information concerning ALGER's background as he had assisted in collecting information for the lengthy article on HISS and CHAMBERS which appeared in the December 20, 1948 issue of Time Magazine, following disclosure of the espionage documents by CHAMBERS. At that time VISSION interviewed several of HISS: superiors in the Department of State, including LEQ PASLOVSKY, STANLEY HORNBECK and one BALLANTINE.

GARDNER JACKSON, Cooperative League of the United States of America, 726 Jackson Place, was interviewed concerning his acquaintance with and knowledge of HISS. It is recalled that JACKSON was well known in past years as an extreme liberal, appearing in the role of speaker, sponsor or member of numerous organizations and causes recognized generally as Communist Party fronts or those with which the Communists were identified.

JACKSON advised that he had known ALGER HISS during their employment by the AAA from 1933 to 1935. He stated that HISS worked in the Legal Division under JEROME FRANK and was associated with JOHN ABT, NATHAN WITT, and LEE PRESSMAN. He advised that ALGER was particularly close with LEE PRESSMAN and was aware that WITT and PRESSMAN had attended Harvard law school with JACKSON stated that he is certain that LEE PRESSMAN is a Communist, ALGER RISS. recalling particularly PRESSMAN's blind adherence to every deviation in the party line. He recalled June 22, 1941 particularly, when Russia was attacked by Germany, as an instance when PRESSMAN changed his views overnight. has the same feeling with reference to JOHN ABT, who was described as an excellent attorney and legal student; possibly more capable than the driving ambitious PRESSMAN. JACKSON indicated that he had some ideas about ALGER HISS but preferred not to express his "suppositions". He mentioned that last summer, BEN MANDEL, House Committee on Un-American Activities, had approached him in Columbus, Ohio concerning HISS and subsequently an investigator from the State Department had called on him and on each occasion he declined to give what he considers only "suppositions".

JACKSON stated that he has not had any particular contact with HISS since their AAA days and he has never visited with HISS. He recalled meeting HISS on a street car about three years ago at which time HISS scarcely spoke to him. In this connection, JACKSON recalled the period when he and numerous others, including PRESSMAN, JOHN ABT, ABE FORTAS, FRANK SHEA, VICTOR ROTNEM, and others, were purged from the Department of Agriculture because of a tremendous conflict of field operations in AAA pertaining to employment of sharecroppers. He recalled that ALGER HISS, for some reason, was not included in the purge list, although he had prepared the brief which brought on the explosion. He also stated that at the time they knew that HISS was aware of the impending dismissals for the two weeks preceding the issuance of the notices, and that all of the group had been very angry with HISS and let him know it, with the result that HISS made vigorous complaints to FELIX FRANKFURTER at Harvard University, Subsequently FRANKFURTER phoned GORDON JACKSON, among others, and JACKSON made a trip to Harvard to explain to Mr. FRANKFURTER their side of the matter.

As indicated, JACKSON advised that he has had no social meetings with HISS since 1935 and never exchanged correspondence with him. He stated, however,

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that in 1948, after the HISS case broke in the HCUA, he had learned from mutual friends that HISS might be interested in JACKSON's recollections of the relationship between AIGER and LEE PRESSMAN and others, apparently HISS: claim being that they were on quite casual terms. JACKSON stated that his recollection on this point was quite to the contrary and he allowed these mutual friends to know that he would be of no value as a witness for HISS. He stated that perhaps in late August 1948, he had received a letter from HISS suggesting that they get together, but advised that he had not answered this letter. JACKSON stated the letter was typewritten on stationery of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, and volunteered the thought that it might not be relevent in this matter, however, he would endeavor to locate the letter at home and advise the writer.

JACKSON stated that he must admit the indictment of ALGER HISS and the failure to indict WHITTAKER CHAMBERS seemed terribly inconsistent with the concept of completely impartial legal procedure and he is in deep conflict because of this. He admitted, however, that he felt CHAMBERS' story has been truthful, for the most part. In this connection, he advised that some of his friends have been approached to contribute to a defense fund which has been organized by members of the Harvard faculty under the leadership of Professor RICHARD FIELD, whom he referred to as DICK FIELD, and JACKSON is concerned whether he should or should not contribute to this fund if he is approached.

GERDER JACKSON stated that he has never been acquainted with HAROLD WARE, who formerly worked in the Agriculture Department, nor does he know VICTOR PERLO. He stated he knew CHARLES KRAMER and recalled that while with AAA, THE PRESSMAN had brought KRAMER in and requested JACKSON to persuade FREDERICK C. HOWE, Consumers Counsel, to employ KRAMER, which he did, and KRAMER was employed. At that time he was using his true name of CHARLES KRIVISKY. JACKSON also mentioned another incident which he recollects, hamely, that while acting as Legislative Representative for the CIO, he had recommended LEE PRESSMAN to JOHN L. LEWIS for the position of General Counsel and that LEWIS regrets this now.

JACKSON stated that he had known LAURENCE DUGGAN very well and that he was certain that DUGGAN was not a member of the Communist Party nor involved in any espionage activities. He stated, as a matter of fact, that he had talked with TOM. C. CLARK about this and made himself active in defending DUGGAN's good name. JACKSON stated that he thought he may have met NGAH FIELDS on one or two occasions but was not certain, although he was vaguely aware that LAURENCE DUGGAN had resided at the same apartment building with FIELDS in Washington, D. C. In defending DUGGAN, JACKSON recalled an occasion in the spring of 1940, when DUGGAN informed him of the action of

LEE PRESSMAN and JOHN L. LEVIS having an agreement with VICENTE TOLEDANO to persuade President CONACHO of Mexico to sell expropriated oil to WILLIAM RHODES DAVIS, which oil later appeared in shipments to Nazi Germany. JACKSON pointed out that if DUGGAN's sympathies were pro-Communist during that period of Nazi Soviet friendship, he would have never disclosed this YEAMACHO! information.

WILLIAM H. TRIPPLETT has previously furnished information to the effect that TIMOTHY TOBSON attended a summer camp known as Camp Wachusett, which TRIPPLETT operated at Holderness, New Hampshire. TRIPPLETT stated that his catalogues reflect that HOBSON attended the 1938 and 1939 sessions, which sessions consisted of about eight weeks beginning the first week in July.

TRIPPLETT has subsequently furnished information to the effect that he recalls vaguely that ALGER HISS was in New Hampshire, probably during the 1938 session, at which time he contacted the camp telephonically and stated that he was spending a little time at some tourist camps across the lake from the camp. The tourist camps at that time were known as Perkins Cabins, Holderness, New Hampshire, and were operated at that time by HAROLD RERKINS.

It is noted that TRIPPLETT is not certain of these facts and stated that they are based on his memory only and he may have the HOBSON boy confused with some other boy who was in the camp at the time.

The Boston Division is requested to conduct investigation at Holderness, New Hampshire to ascertain if any documents are available at Perkins Cabins or in the possession of HAROLD PERKINS from AIGER or PRISCILLA HISS. Any typewritten documents found should be forwarded to the FBI Laboratory for comparison with known typewriting specimens.

By reference from Miss O'Donnell, I saw Mr. Arthur M-Roark, Jr., whose letterhead is attached. He exhibited the credentials of a private detective licensed by the State of New York, and his New York address is 2 Broadway, New York 4, New York, telephone Bowling Green 9-4452.

Roark advised that for 20 years he has specialized in investigating alleged cases of suicide for various insurance companies, and he was retained by the Home Life Insurance Company since Laurence Duggan took out a \$10,000 policy that has run less than two years, and thus, if he committed suicide, Home Life is not liable for the \$10,000. He has also been retained by the Aetna Life Insurance Company with which company Duggan had a \$13,000 insurance policy which contained a double-indemnity clause; thus, if Duggan met his death by accident, the company would be liable for an additional \$13,000. In addition, Duggan carried a \$10,000 life insurance policy with the New York Life Insurance Company, which has a double-indemnity clause. However, the New York Life Insurance Company is conducting its own investigation.

Roark stated that he is investigating primarily to determine if Duggan had a motive for committing suicide. To that end, he was placed in the embarrassing position of having to ask for confidential information which he would accept either on or off the record. To that end he saw the Attorney General on the morning of February 2. The Attorney General stated he did not know much about the case and referred him to me. I told Mr. Roark quite frankly that the Attorney General's office had called me but that I did not have any specific instructions from the AG and in the absence of specific instructions it would not helpossible to furnish him certain confidential information, which would be outlined hereafter.

Roark told me that he had spent considerable time with Adolf Berle, Jr., who claims that following his interview with Whittaker Chambers, he had turned his notes and the information furnished by Chambers over to the FBI in 1941, according to his best recollection and belief. I told Mr. Roark that

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this was an incorrect statement, that we did not secure the Berle notes until 1943, although we knew in 1941 that Chambers had been to Berle in 1939, but that Berle had not turned anything over to us until we went to Berle and asked for his notes. He was quite specific in describing Berle's notes so there is no doubt that Berle furnished him with complete information.

Roark then asked how many times we had interviewed Laurence Duggan. I told him that we had interviewed Duggan on Friday afternoon, December 10, and we considered this a routine interview. Pursuant to his inquiry he was informed that occasioned by statements made by Whittaker Chambers that the interview had been conducted on an amiable basis, that the Agents the rviewed Duggan were satisfied with Duggan's statement. He then stated that he, of course, had no reason to contradict the statement but that he had been led to believe that we had had more than one interview with Duggan. He stated that he had talked to Hedda Gompers and it was her opinion that we had had several interviews with Duggan. I told Roark that obviously Duggan, occupying the position he did in the State Department, was frequently contacted by the Bureau, that I had no doubt that we had interviewed him on numerous occasions in connection with applicants and other matters; however, I thought that he was referring to specific controversies that arose immediately after Duggan's death, and that there had only been one interview in connection with the New York allegations. He asked to be advised as to the content of the subject matter of the interview. I told him that this was a matter that would have to be cleared with the Attorney General, that we had a specific directive from the AG not to disclose or discuss this case, and that even though the Attorney General had referred him to me, I did not feel at liberty to discuss the Duggan interview beyond what had already been said and beyond what the Attorney General had said in his statements, which were, in themselves, self-explanatory and concerning the details of which we did not enter into any discussion. He stated this was quite understandable.

Roark then stated that he had seen Drew Pearson and had asked Pearson about his broadcast wherein Pearson had referred to the fact that Duggan had been approached by Frederick Vanderbilt Field and Hedda Gompers to act as a spy for the Russians but had declined. Pearson told him that he could not divulge his sources, that he knew Duggan intimately and Roark would have to accept Pearson's word. In this connection Roark stated he asked the Attorney General about this and the Attorney General stated he should discuss this phase of the matter with me. I told Roark I frankly did not know why the AG should say that he should discuss

this matter with me as I knew nothing about Pearson's sources other than what Pearson said. In this connection you will recall we made a protest to the Department and the Attorney General sent back a memorandum with the notation as to who told Pearson. We have not pursued this matter further.

Roark further related that he had had a lengthy conversation with Mrs. Duggan and, in fact, presented a letter from Mrs. Duggan, addressed to whom it may concern, requesting that all information pertaining to her husband be turned over to Roark. He stated that Mrs. Duggan strongly intimated that Duggan had made mistakes in his younger days and, in fact, told him that when the name of Noelfield was injected into this case last October that Larry Duggan had forwarded a clipping to Noelfield and Noelfield had replied, stating that if that was all they had, he saw no necessity for making a statement. However, this letter could not be found among Duggan's effects, although Roark stated he was amazed at the amount of personal correspondence Mrs. Duggan was able to produce.

Roark then asked if we had conducted a Hatch Act investigation on Duggan. I told him I was not at liberty to discuss
this and would take the matter up at a later date. In this connection he had the AG's statement to the effect that there was no
evidence involving Duggan in espionage. We have not conducted a
Hatch Act investigation on Duggan. He then stated that only three
people that he had run into had alleged that Duggan was a member
of the Communist Party, that his considered judgment was that Duggan
was not a member. I told him that probably if he were a member
it would be practically impossible to ever prove this. He then
stated that he had ascertained that after the Chambers allegations
to Berle that Duggan had offered to resign from the State Department.
He wanted to know if we had anything in connection with this. I
told him that quite frankly we did not.

A memorandum is attached to the Attorney General advising of Roark's call to the Bureau and a summary of the interview, requesting the Attorney General's instructions as to what, if anything additional should be furnished Roark.

Confidential letter to the Director NY E5-14920

In regard to HEDE MASSING'S meeting DUGGAN through NOEL FIELD, it should be pointed out that MARGUERITE YOUNG, who was the "Daily Worker" correspondent in Washington from 1933 to 1936, was recently interviewed by this office and stated that it was her belief that she affected an introduction for HEDE GUMPERTZ with LAURENCE H. DUGGAN.

HEDE stated that she could recall three specific meetings with LAURENCE H. DUGGAN. She feels that there undoubtedly were other meetings. However, she can only recall these three, which are: 1. A motor trip from New York to Washington with DUGGAN and his wife; 2. A weekend at DUGGAN'S house in Washington, and 3. A visit to DUGGAN'S office in the State Department and lunch at the Casis Restaurant in Washington. HEDE was unable to place the dates of these meetings or the sequence. She feels sure that they all took place within a year from the time she first met DUGGAN, which means that they probably all took place during 1935.

In regard to the motor trip, HEDE recalls that she drove from New York to Washington with DUGGAN and his wife. She feels that NOEL and HERTHA FIELD were also with them. She cannot recall whose car was used but feels that it was possibly NOEL FIELD'S. She recalls that they stopped at a famous fish restaurant in Baltimore on their way to Washington and she had oyster stew and got sick. She recalls that that evening in Washington she stayed at the apartment of the FIELDS. She cannot recall any conversations that she had with DUGGAN on the trip.

In regard to the weekend at DUGGAN'S house in Washington, HEDE stated that it was her recollection that there were no other guests and that LARRY DUGGAN, HELEN DUGGAN, and one of their children were there. She recalled that during her visit on the weekend she and LARRY took a walk in the country and during their walk HEDE asked LARRY if he would supply her with information. He evidently interpreted her request to mean that he should supply her with "documents". HEDE digressed at this, point to state that she doubted whether DUGGAN actually used the word document because at that time the use of such a word in connection with forwarding information was more or less a word of European usage. However, whatever word DUGGAN had used had carried the same idea. DUGGAN stated to her that he did not have access to any "documents" which would be of interest to her. He added that he would give her bits of news that came to his attention that would be of interest to her, however, he insisted that the person who contacted him for the purpose of getting the information must know shorthand, because he did not have time to wait for a person to write it out in longhand.

HEDE felt that DUGGAN agreed to do what he said he would do because he wanted to be a hero and do something out of the ordinary. She told him not to tell his wife and to this he readily agreed.

In regard to the visit of HEDE to DUGGAN'S office in the State Department, she stated that it is her recollection that when she went to Washington on one trip she telephoned to DUGGAN at the State Department and he suggested that she come to his office, which she did. After she met him there the two left and went to a restaurant, which she believes was called the Oasis, and had lunch. It was her recollection that DUGGAN was in charge of some section of the State Department. She states that it is her recollection that at this meeting she arranged with DUGGAN that he should meet the person who was to be his contact, and to whom he was to furnish his information. This person was to meet him in a car on a road somewhere enroute between the State Department and his, DUGGAN'S, house. HEDE could not recall just where the place of the meeting was to be or whether the place was suggested by her or by DUGGAN. She feels that the secrecy of the meeting was by mutual agreement. Person unknown to HEDE.

HEDE stated that it is her recollection that she reported her dealings with DUGGAN to her superior, BORIS, in New York. She recalls telling BORIS about DUGGAN'S request that the person who contacted him should know shorthand. It is her recollection that she recommended to BORIS that he send an intelligent, well-educated individual of completely American background, since she felt that DUGGAN was somewhat repelled by the "foreign atmosphere" of her proposition. It is HEDE'S impression that BORIS did not contact DUGGAN since he spoke very poor English. HEDE recalls that BORIS advised her sometime after she had made arrangements for DUGGAN to meet his contact, that DUGGAN was very difficult. HEDE did not know just what BORIS meant by this, but felt that he meant that DUGGAN was difficult because he was not completely cooperative - if at all.

mention ALGER HISS. She knows that LARRY DUGGAN was friendly with NOEL FIELD and that he, DUGGAN, knew that FIELD was at least interested in the Communist International Movement. HEDE stated that DUGGAN scoffed at the American Communist Party. She considered LAURENCE DUGGAN a much higher type individual than NOEL FIELD, both as to character and intellectual ability.

HEDE stated that DUGGAN was difficult throughout her contact with him. She feels that he resisted because he felt his efforts were futile, rather than because he was a coward or because of loyalty.

In regard to the method that she used in attempting to recruit DUGGAN, HEDE stated that she posed as an anti-Nazi and talked Socialism. She may even have mentioned that she was connected with the Comintern, but she certainly never mentioned that she was working for Soviet Intelligence.

In regard to her request of DUGGAN that he should supply her with information, she stated that this was not normally a function of hers and that her function was principally to recruit people and get them to meet her superior. However, in the case of DUGGAN, she does recall asking him to supply information, but she does not recall the reason why she did this in this particular case.

HEDE recalled that when she was in Moscow during the period from November, 1937 to June, 1938 when she was being interviewed by the NKVD, the name LARRY DUGGAN was mentioned. She also recalls that the name HISS was mentioned, but she could not recall in just what connection either of these names was mentioned. However, she did explain that during this period in Moscow she had been completely interviewed as to any and all contacts she had had in the United States and accordingly, there was nothing unusual about the names of these two individuals being brought up.

HEDE stated that after she broke with the Russians and returned to the United States from Russia in June, 1938, she went to Washington to see LARRY DUGGAN and advise him of her break. She could not place the date of this visit but atdicould have been as late as the Summer of 1939. She did this because she felt responsible for DUGGAN and, as she liked him, she wanted to make sure that he was not retaining any association with any individuals as a result of his former friendship with her. When she went to Washington she did not see DUGGAN, but saw his wife HELEN. At this time DUGGAN was living in a different house from the one where HEDE had spent the weekend. HELEN greeted HEDE very busily and rather cooly. HELEN was engaged in running a children's party at the time and left HEDE seated downstairs. HEDE remained for some time waiting to see LAURENCE DUGGAN, who was out and who did not return. When she had been kept waiting some time and HELEN did not return downstairs, HEDE decided to leave and accordingly, left without further contact with HELEN.

HEDE stated that she never saw DUGGAN or HELEN after this visit to Washington. She was satisfied that she would not have to see LARRY DUGGAN and tell him of her break since she felt that HELEN had expressed by her attitude that she knew of HEDE'S relationship to DUGGAN and disapproved of it. This all added up in HEDE'S mind to the fact that DUGGAN had undoubtedly broken with the Russians, if he had ever fully developed any connections with them or their agents. & (U)

The above is being furnished to the Bureau in order that it may have available the complete story of HEDE MASSING'S association with DUGGAN.

Reference is made to the Bureau teletype to New York dated January 24, 1949, authorizing interview of RUTH SHIPLEY and RAYMOND MURPHY of the State Department for additional information concerning Colonel EORIS BYKOV.

Reference is also made to New York teletype to the Director, WFO, and Baltimore dated January 19, 1949, advising the New York Office has a copy of a memorandum dated July 11, 1939, prepared by RUTH SHIPLEY concerning her interview with General WALTER ARIVITSKY on June 29, 1939, which interview was arranged by ISAAC DON LEVINE. The teletype quoted from this memorandum as follows:

"Another person very active in the Soviet intelligence work in this country, who is now here, is a man said to be Colonel BORIS BYKOV or BYKOFF, or RUKOV of BUKOFF. He is probably in charge of the extermination of KRIVITSKY. He is said to be a small person with very odd red-brown eyes, red hair, and red eyebrows. He came to this country in the summer of 1936 from France, also probably first class on the NORMANDIE. He received a visa in Paris in the spring of 1936 on either a German or Polish passport."

Mrs. RUTH SHIPLEY, Chief, Passport Division, State Department,

PACKOOM 204 Winder Building, was interviewed on January 26, 1949. Mrs. SHIPLEY

recalled having interviewed General WALTER KRIVITSKY in the summer of 1939

but advised she did not recall making a formal report of the interview and

did not have any notes of the interview in her possession at this time.

Mrs. SHIPLEY related that in 1939 the State Department had conducted an

extensive investigation pertaining to fraudulent obtaining of passports,

as a result of which criminal actions were instituted. She recalled that about this time they had revised the entire system of issuing passports and had recalled every red passport then outstanding. She explained that the red passports were so identified from their red covering.

She continued that during this period, General KRIVITSKY had written a series of articles in the SATURDAY EVENING POST and in one of these articles, had mentioned having seen a great supply of American red passports in Moscow.

She advised that she determined to interview General KRIVITSKY, mentioning that Mr. GEORGE MESSERSMITH had not wanted KRIVITSKY interviewed in the State Department and, at the suggestion of ADOLPH A. BERLE, she and her assistant, Mr. ASHLEY NICHOLAS, had proceeded to New York and interviewed General KRIVITSKY there.

The descriptive data set forth above was discussed with Mrs. SHIPLEY at some length. She advised that this information was substantially identical with her recollection, and she could add nothing in addition thereto. Mrs. SHIPLEY called in Mr. ASHIEY NICHOLAS, Assistant Chief, Passport Division, for interview and further suggested Mr. RAYMOND MURPHY as a possible source of information.

ASHLEY J. NICHOLAS, Room 208 Winder Building, was interviewed and confirmed the statements of Mrs. SHIPIEY. He recalled the interview in New York on June 28, 1939, advising it had taken place in an old residence (apartment) in the 50's or 60's off Fifth Avenue, belonging to one OBLENNIS (phonetic), deceased, who was a friend of Mrs. SHIPIEY. Mr. NICHOLAS expressed the opinion that he had some of the old notes taken by Mrs. SHIPIEY in his possession, and after an extensive search of his file cabinets, Mr. NICHOLAS produced several pages of handwritten notes. One of these pages contained notes concerning the reference to BORIS BYKOV and was identical with the information set forth in the second paragraph above. NICHOLAS advised that Mrs. SHIPLEY had undoubtedly prepared a memorandum concerning the BORIS BYKOV phase of the interview.

With further reference to the information furnished by General KRIVITSKY, Mr. NICHOLAS gave Agent TAYLOR copy of a memorandum which he had dictated from some of the notes. Copies of this memorandum are being furnished the Bureau and the New York Office herewith. It is noted that KRIVITSKY recognized without identifying the photographs of several individuals mentioned in this case, including MAXIBEDACHT and TAMER. Mr. NICHOLAS also handed Agent TAYLOR copy of a memorandum dated October 25, 1939, reflecting an interview between ISAAC DON LEVINE and Mrs. SHIPLEY. In this connection, it is noted that Mrs. SHIPLEY indicated that during the passport investigation mentioned previously, she had solicited the assistance of ISAAC DON IEVINE and he had aided her during that period.

In view of the information obtained from KRIVITSKY to the effect that BYKOV had obtained an American visa in Paris in the spring of 1936 on a German or Polish passport; investigation was conducted to determine the feasibility of an inquiry for the purpose of identifying BYKOV through application for such visa.

ROBERT ALEXANDER, Assistant Chief, Visa Division, State Department, 515 - 22nd Street, N. W., was interviewed. He advised that when France fell in 1940, the Visa files in the American Embassy had been removed to southern France and subsequently a large portion of these files had been brought to Washington and stored in the Archives Building. It was his impression that records prior to 1940 were included. He suggested contact at the Archives Building but mentioned that a great many thousand visas would have been issued during the spring and summer of 1936 and surmised the number might exceed fifteen or twenty thousand.

Dr. ALMON WRIGHT, Fifth Tier, Archives Building, was interviewed and advised that visa records in his possession include only those records for 1935 and earlier. He explained that this was in accordance with the desire of the National Archives to avoid possession of current material. He stated that the records subsequent to 1935 were still located at the American Embassy in Paris. Dr. WRIGHT furnished a number of sample copies of applications for visas at Paris during 1935, and it was noted that in no instance was there a copy of the photograph, although the application form contained a space for photograph on the reverse side, lower left-hand corner. It was also observed that no place for description appeared in the applications for visa and the only descriptive data contained therein was space for date and place of birth. Any other information or description appeared only incidentally in response to other questions.

The suggestion had been made by Mr. ASHLEY NICHOLAS that perhaps a search of applications for visa could be broken down by period, that is date, on the basis of records maintained in connection with day-to-day collections of visa fees. However, in view of the fact that no photographs were found attached to the applications for visa and no descriptive data appeared thereon other than date and place of birth, Dr. WRIGHT agreed it would be a tremendous task to have a search made in the American Embassy at Paris. Apparently the only information remaining of value in addition to the date and place of birth would be the fact that the application for visa was based on a German or Polish passport.

. Dr. WRIGHT also discussed the possibility of an investigation based upon examination of the passenger lists of the SS NORMANDIE covering trips made during the summer of 1936. He advised that his office contained none of these lists but he believed they could be obtained in the office of the Collector of Customs, New York City, from 1920 on. Dr. WRIGHT stated he did not believe that the passenger lists contained a great deal of information. He stated in the old days it was customary for ship's masters to require the passport number and origin of passport but that in more recent years, only the place from which the passenger came, meaning the nationality of the passenger, was included. 2030

RAYMOND E. MURPHY, Office of European Affairs, State Department, was contacted telephonically for an appointment. He indicated he had discussed the present matter with ASHLEY NICHOIAS and advised he could add nothing whatever to the information furnished by NICHOLAS and SHIPLEY. MURPHY advised that his first recollections were that KRIVITSKY had described BYKOV as an albino, but upon further reflection, he agrees with the description given by Mrs: SHIPIEY. He stated he had not been present at the interview of General KRIVITSKY by Mrs. SHIPLEY and Mr. NICHOLAS but that he had interviewed General KRIVITSKY about the same time. He advised that he Hot been engaged in counterintelligence work after 1940. In response to question, he stated he had not made any active investigation concerning the issuance of an American visa to BORIS BYKOV. He concurred in the opinion that it would be very difficult, if not an impossible task, to identify BORIS BYKOV through search of the Paris records of the State Department without the name under which the visa was issued or the exact date on which it was issued.

In view of the above information, no leads are being set out at this time for further investigation at Paris or through passenger lists in New York. It is believed that such investigation may be conducted in the event more detailed data is obtained concerning the entry of BORIS BYKOV into the United States or departure from this country.

## Memorandum Concerning Interview with "K" and "L" at New York on June 28, 1939

(× )

The following information was furnished by "K" unless otherwise specified.

The real name of the person who obtained a passport in the name Antonio Spina is Elman. He was born
in Bessarabia and was a member of the staff of the
Soviet Embassy in Rome in 1928 and 1929. He speaks
fluent Italian and therefore could use an American passport in an Italian name. The woman and child shown on
the photograph are the wife and child of Elman. The
Elmans are believed to have been liquidated probably because the wife was a relative of Zenoff. (Zinovieff).

The person who obtained the passport in the name Alexander Smied is a man named Carl Nebenfuhr, who was born in Vienna, Austria. The woman and child shown in the Smied application are really the wife and child of Nebenfuhr. This man had never lived in the United States but was in Spain a while in 1937. His present whereabouts is unknown to "K". He is said to have repeatedly obtained American passports which are presumably under other names.

The real name of Rubens is Ewald. He was a Latvian and went to Russia in about 1926. He was a minor figure in the espionage movement and was assigned the task of obtaining passports. "K" estimates that probably 100 or 150 passports were obtained. Ewald has a brother who is an officer in the Latvian Army and with whom he is in constant touch. "K" associates the name Rutkowski or Rutofski with Rubens but was unable to place the connection.

The name of the woman who obtained the passports in the name of Jean Montgomery is Margaret Browder.

The photograph of Katherine Dozenberg is believed to be the second wife of Dozenberg. Nicholas Dozenberg

is believed to have been a party to the circulation of counterfeit American money in this country. He was the friend of a man named Tilden who was in that business. Dozenberg was in Rumania in 1932 and 1933 while counterfeit money of Russian origin was being circulated there.

Julia Poyntz was the mistress of the Soviet General Witow (Vitalia) Putna, who was liquidated about one week after Miss Poyntz disappeared in New York. General Putna was at one time the Soviet Military Attache at London. It is the fear of "L" that Miss Poyntz was done away with because of her connection with General Putna. "L" also stated that close friends of Miss Poyntz were Grace Hutchins and Ann Rochester, the latter of the New York Public Library. He thinks that if they are questioned that they will immediately report to Browder.

"K" and "L" think that Moren may be identical with a man named Moran who was supposed to be a spy at the Brooklyn Navy Yard a number of years ago.

"K" identified a number of photographs which were shown him including those of Ewart and his wife. He recognized without identifying the photographs of Pat Devine, Max Bedacht, Wirkkula, Tamer and a person whose number is 96 ( ) on the group photograph.

"L" stated that the man known as Nicholas Sherman was seen in New York as recently as three months ago. He still uses the same name but spells the last name either Shirman or Schirman. "L" thinks that if a watch is kept between the automat in the basement at 41st Street and Broadway, Times Square, and the New York Public Library he can be picked up. He usually has one or two companions. (He is resident agent of G.F.U.)

"I" stated that Max Bedacht is known in the party as "Barber" due to his former occupation.

Mr. Isaac Don Levine called to discuss with me the assistance which Mr. Mandell could render in New York in his talks with Mr. Murray. I told Mr. Levine that we needed information concerning the names used by William Z. Foster, Max Bedacht, and Joseph Brodsky in their trips abroad on false passports. He said that he felt that Mandell could be helpful.

If possible, some one should get in touch with Herbert Solow, care of his mother, 260 West 72d Street, Apartment 5B, telling Mr. Solow that Mr. Levine thought he could assist the government's agents by informing him of what he knew of passport fraud and we would learn something of value. He says he does not believe Solow has told all that he knows. He does believe that he is hard up for money and is holding out to get a good cash price for an article. He may not be willing to talk but on the other hand he may be.

There is a man by the name of Milton Goodman who was formerly organizer and manager of the World Tourists. This man now has a travel agency in the Heckscher Building at 57th and Fifth Avenue. He believes that if he were asked to cooperate with our agents he could give a good deal of information. He was put out of his job with World Tourists some time ago and is fairly successful in his own behalf.

Mr. Levine also stated that Hillman Bishop, a Professor of Economics at City College of New York, was first cousin of Mrs. Rubens and he thought he had recently had information from her.

He said that Louis Waldman, 301 Broadway, who is attorney for Krivitsky, probably knew something about the Copenhagen matter. He said that Krivitsky had told him that the people arrested in Copenhagen were there for a conference. He also said that General Krivitsky knew that the man known as Hans Grunfeld was Max Unschlicht, a colonel in charge of Russian espionage in Berlin; that Margaret Browder worked for one of Krivitsky's agents under Max Unschlicht. I asked him if he had any idea where Margaret Browder was and he said he thought likely she was working for the Comintern in Moscow; that he understood that she was in Russia. He was under the impression that

Mrs. Rubens was also doing some work for them in Russia. However, he said it was also possible that Margaret Browder was working in the Military Intelligence Branch of the Soviet Government as she had been employed as a field worker under Military Intelligence:

Mr. Levine thinks that Harry Wicks, a former editor of the Daily Worker who is now secretary of the Typographical Union in Chicago, knows a good deal about the Poyntz case and could tell a lot if he wishes to do so. Levine thinks that Browder knows who did what he calls the kidnapping and murder.

The man Moren is known to be Mark Zilberg.

Mr. Levine believes that Mandell could get any information that is wanted from Zack. He thinks he would be a very good person to use. He says that Mandell is definitely not the person to be used for Goodman.

Nicholas Dosenberg (Browder), William Z. Foster, and Ella Reeves Bloor went to Moscow together in November 1921. There were not many people sailing at that time and William Z. Foster's alias might be learned by going through the passenger lists of the various boats.

Morris Gordin, who wrote "Utopia in Chains" has broken with the party. He was in Moscow on a British passport in 1924 and may know something about false passports. He had his own British passport photostated and put in the back of his book.

FADIMAN wrote an article entitled Why I Became A Leftist', to be published in 'New Masses'. The title of this story was changed to Why I Became A Communist', and was published in one of the editions of 'New Masses' under the name CLIFTON FADIMAN. I have since been told I changed this title. Although I cannot recall having done so, I am willing to believe I probably did. So far as I know, CLIFTON FADIMAN has never been a member of the COMMUNIST PARTY. In so far as my changing the title of this article, it is my present recollection that he did not complain or criticize me for doing this." Review of back issues of "New Masses" at the New York Public Library ascertained that in the September, 1932 issue of "New Masses" CLIFTON FADIMAN wrote a brief article which was part of a How, I Came to Communism Symposium". Other authors in the symposium included WALDOWFRANK, GRANVILLE HICKS, SHERWOOD ANDERSON, EDMUND, VILSON and MICHAEL GOLD. Photostats were made of the referenced article, and are being forwarded to Bureau for information purposes. Karl Baarslag informed me this morning that Isaac John Levine initially contacted Congressman Dies in 1939 and furnished him the information concerning subversive individuals in the State Department. Baarslag stated that he had recently discussed this with J. B. Matthews who is very much incensed over the publication in the Times-Herald and

approximately 200 other papers of Stripling's story. Baarslag stated that in 1939 when Levine contacted Dies there were present also J. B. Matthews and Robert Stripling. Levine informed Dies and the other two he could produce Chambers at that time who would be perfectly willing to

tell his story, but Stripling insisted that the information furnished by Levine was ridiculous and the Committee would be laughed at. Under the

circumstances Chambers was not called.

Baarslag stated that 50% of the profit from Stripling's writings will

go to the Hearst newspapers and that the other 50%, approximately \$150,000 will

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go to Stripling.

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#### STOLEN SECRETS OF THE U.S.

#### Success of Spies. Are They Still Active?

Spy stories, now unfolding, mean Russian agents were operating deep inside U.S. Government in prewar years.

Moscow leaders, fearing Germany and Japan, looked everywhere for secret plans. Spying in Washington proved productive.

Big question for investigators now is a link with the past: Do spies still have access to U.S. codes and secrets?

The story of spy operations inside the United States Government, put into focus on the basis of revelations to date, is this:

Spies were busy, and getting results, during 1937 and 1938, at least, In those years they obtained highly secret documents from the Department of State. There is an implication that they were successful, as well, in obtaining information in the military establishment.

The spy story, as it is unfolding, relates directly to a prewar period and only indirectly to the war period or the present time. The years involved were those during which Hitler was moving into Austria; when he was building toward. Munich and domination of Czechoslovakia. They were the years, too, when Japan was making a test of Russia in

Manchuria.

Spying of war years, so far as it has been brought to light, is not yet supported by tangible evidence. The activity of prewar years, however, leaves the implication-which investigators stress-that similar activities continued, probably on an expanded basis. It is just that the evidence is not so definite.

What happened in the pre-Munich period of spying, at least in some part, now is being outlined by revelations made by Whittaker Chambers, a former editor of Time magazine. Secret documents. brought forward by Mr. Chambers in defending himself in a slander suit brought by Alger Hiss, are the basis of further investigation by a federal grand jury in New York City and by the Un-American Activities Committee of the House of Representatives.

Mr. Chambers is providing evidence that espionage was going on in the pre-

war period, with real results. Heal testified that he was a "courier" in a Communist organization of that period. He also has testified that he broke with the Communists during the first half of 1938. What he now is revealing, therefore, does not cover the war period.

Melodrama entered the case when Mr. Chambers late at night led investigators for the House Committee to a pumpkin on his farm near Westminster, Md. This trip followed a conference of Mr. Chambers with Representative Nixon (Rep.), of California, a member of the Committee, and Robert E. Stripling, its chief investigator. From the pumpkin, Mr. Chambers produced several rolls of microfilm-three of them still undeveloped-on which some 200 pages of secret documents had been recorded. Included pefficials and to turn over the Ukraine to were three handwritten membrabiling Cermany. based on documents even more secret. These "pumpkin papers" were in addition to 65 documents Mr. Chambers afready had produced in response to questioning by attorneys for Mr. Hiss.

Mr. Chambers accuses Mr. Hiss, a former State Department official who now is president of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, of having removed some of the documents from the State Department long enough to be reproduced. Mr. Hiss denies this charge. Two other individuals also have been named by Mr. Chambers in this connection. One of these is Henry J. Wadleigh, former State Department employe and until recently an economist employed by the Italian Government. He denies having been a Communist, but has refused to answer many of the Committee's questions.

The problem immediately arose as to whether contents of the documents themselves should be made public. Both Sumner Welles, who was Under Secretary of State during the 1937-38 period, and John E. Peurifoy, present Assistant Secretary of State, declared that, even now, their publication would be prejudicial to U.S. interests, or even dangerous. Later, the State Department permitted publication of some of them.

Enough now is known about the nature of the documents to put the story into focus against the background of what was happening in the world in the years leading up to the war.

Around the world, during the prewar period, Russian agents were making constant efforts to find out what the other great powers were doing. These efforts were stepped up in 1937, as the international situation grew more tense and Russia found herself menaced by Hitler's Germany on the west and by an expanding Japan on the east.

Russian leaders, in that period, were in a state of alarm over the trend of affairs in the world.

Inside Russia "purge" trials were under way. Hundreds of thousands of persons were being liquidated out of fear that they dissented from the viewpoint of the regime. Marshal M. N. Tukhachevsky, Vice Commissar of Defense, was executed after the Russian courts had decided that he was conspiring with the Trotsky wing of the Communist Party and with the German Government to murder Russian

Outside Russia this was the pre-Munich period. In Britain diplomats were operating on the theory that Hitler was getting prepared for aggression. They hoped to turn his thoughts of aggression away from the West and toward the East. This period reached its culmination at Munch on Sept 30, 1938, when Britain, France and Italy bowed to Hitler's demand for annexation of the Sudetenland of Czechoslovakia. Neither Czechoslo vakia nor Russia was invited to the m

ing and the decision was regarded as a defeat for both.

The testimony of Mr. Chambers, and the documents that he has offered in evidence, concerned the period before Munich. It was in the first half of 1938 that Mr. Chambers claims to have broken with the Communists. The implication is that the secret papers that he retained—at least those that now are back in the hands of this Government—did not in fact reach the hands of the Russians.

For the Russian leaders, confidential reports received in Washington from foreign capitals could be invaluable in providing inside information on what the various powers really were planning to do. Also, any documents relating to U. S. policy could throw light on whether this Government expected to intervene in Europe or the Far East. If the U. S. was agreeable to the effort to appease Hitler, or to turn his attention away from the West and toward the East, knowledge of that fact would be of great value to the Russian leaders.

Russian leaders.

The Chambers testimony now indicates that, to obtain such documents, the Russians used an underground network of U. S. Communists who were loyal primarily to Russia. Mr. Chambers has testified that, during this period, he did act as

part of a ring that sought to supply Russia with the the information it wanted.

The Chambers charge that Alger Hiss played a part in the Communist plans has given rise to the present controversy and to the slander suit that Mr. Hiss has brought against Mr. Chambers. Mr. Hiss, on his part, now as last summer, has denied "without qualification" the charges brought against him.

Mr. Hiss was described by Mr. Chambers last August as one of a group of seven or eight Government officials who were alleged to be the nucleus of a Communist underground operating inside the U.S. Government in 1937 and 1938. The function of this group, as described by Mr. Chambers, was mainly to infiltrate the U.S. Government, rather than espionage. He said: "I should perhaps make the point that these people were specifically not wanted to act as sources of information. These people were an elite group, an outstanding group, which it was believed would rise to positions... in the Government, and ... would be of very much more service to the Communist Party."

Background of individuals involved has had only casual attention, as charges and denials and countercharges have been flying back and forth.


Whittaker Chambers, in testimony before the Committee on Un-American Activities of the House of Representatives, gave his age as 48. He was born in Philadelphia. He testified that he joined the Communist Party in 1924 in New York City and served as a paid functionary of that party. He testified that he left the party in 1938 and reported to Government authorities many of the things he had learned as a party member. For nine years, Mr. Chambers worked for Time magazine, part of that period as a senior editor, resigning on December 10 of this year.


Alger Hiss is 44 years of age, on the basis of testimony given to the same Committee. Mr. Hiss was born in Baltimore. He was graduated from Johns Hopkins University in 1926 and from Harvard Law School in 1929. Immediately after graduation from law school, he served for a time as secretary to Justice Oliver-Wendell Holmes of the U.S. Supreme Court, before entering private practice in New York City. In May, 1933, Mr. Hiss came to Washington as assistant general counsel of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. In 1934, he became counsel for the Senate committee headed by Senator Nye then investigating the munitions industry and seeking to disclose whether the munitions industry inspired war. It was in 1936 that Mr. Hiss entered the Department of State, where he served until January, 1947.

In the State Department, Mr. Hiss

which was there agreed to by Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin. Then, in the spring of 1945, he was secretarygeneral of the San Francisco Conference at which the United Nations Charter was put into final form.

Thus, Mr. Hiss played a very important part in shaping the United Nations. Out of that experience he gained recognition and a recommendation from John Foster Dulles that he be named to the Presidency of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, a position that he now holds.

The full story of spy charges, denials and countercharges might be brought out at some future time in slander and libel suits growing out of present accusations. Or that story might come from Government prosecution of individuals or groups of individuals whom it may charge with violation of federal laws. There is an almost equal chance that the full story may never be told.

Members of the House Committee on Un-American Activities say that a charge of perjury might be entered by the Government if any recent testimony should prove to have been false. Charges growing out of attempted espionage back in 1937 and 1938, however, run into the federal statute of limitations. To make such charges stand, it would be necessary to prove that an offense had been committed within the last three years. Federal laws provide for imprisonment up to 10 years and fines up to \$10,000, as punishment for wilfully giving out a diplomatic code or for disclosing information affecting national defense, with intent to injure the United States.

An important question growing out of the recent disclosures is this: What is the situation now, as to the security of secret documents and codes? On this point, Under Secretary of State Robert A. Lovett says that present methods of protection used by the State Department are much tighter than those in effect 10 years ago, Coding and decoding of messages now is done by machine, with the result that codes are much harder to break than once was the case. Also, the use of machines makes it possible to change codes much more often. Mr. Lovett is convinced, therefore, that any would-be spies trying to steal U.S. secrets will find their job far more difficult than it used to be.


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

#### LL GEN. MARSHALL STAY?

#### Candidates Are Ready If Hy

Secretary Marshall is emerging as President Truman's "indispensable man." His illness does not mean quick retirement.

Mr. Marshall stays on to run U. S. foreign policy if President has his way. Senator Vandenberg wants him to stay, too.

Decision means bipartisan policy continues in new term. The same team keeps command of foreign affairs.

George C. Marshall, Secretary of State, at 68 is finding himself cast in the role of indispensable man. The Secretary, three years beyond the age when most men want to give up their responsibilities, has just lost a kidney in an operation. He wants to retire. But he is unable, as yet, to get free from his job.

Ever since the war, General Marshall has wanted to take a rest. But, when the fighting stopped and he quit the Army, he was sent to China to try to unify the disputing factions in that turbulent country. When he came back to the United States, he was plumped into the

State Department to try to straighten out the world problems left by the war. And, in spite of age and ill health, he is being pressed to stay in that job.

Secretary Marshall is in good health except for the ailment that forced him to have an operation. He has a strong constitution. It seems likely that he will recover fully from his operation. And if he is restored to good health, he may not be able to quit his post. He is under steady pressure from President Truman to stay in the State Department.

The President wants to keep Mr. Marshall as an elder statesman at the directing controls of the nation's foreign policy.

Mr. Marshall's preference. Secretary Marshall has a plan of his own that he is pressing on the President. He wants to quit and let the President appoint Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg, of Michigan, as Secretary of State. Mr. Vandenberg, a Republican, President of the Senate in the 80th Congress and chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, is Mr. Marshall's personal choice for the job.


General Marshall's reasons are based not only upon the important part the Senator has played in shaping America's present foreign policy, but upon his own personal liking for the Senator. The two are close friends. When the Secretary returned from Europe, he went first to the White House in and then wandenberg apartment where he dined with the Senator on corned beef and cabbage prepared by Mrs. Vandenberg

by Mrs. Vandenberg.

This close, friendly working relationship between the Democratic Secretary of State and the Republican chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee has greatly smoothed the course for foreign-affairs legislation through the Republican Congress. Because, too, of Mr. Vandenberg's intimate knowledge of the manner in which present foreign policy has evolved, Mr. Marshall is convinced that the Michigan Senator is the one who should take over now.


Mr. Vandenberg's preference. But Senator Vandenberg has another plan. He is hoping that the post will not be offered to him. In turn, the Senator is urging that Mr. Marshall stay in his present job. While the Secretary is ill, Under Secretary Robert A. Lovett can continue to run the Department. Moreover, Mr. Vandenberg wants John Foster Dulles, who was Thomas E. Dewey's top adviser on foreign affairs, to go ahead as a part of the team that carries the burden of international negotiation. But, above all, the hand of General Marshall would remain to guide over-all-plans.

That is much the way President Truman feels, too. It was Mr. Marshall who

Reference is made to New York letter dated February 10, 1949, in which a lead was set forth for the Norfolk Office to reinterview Miss DAISY FANSLER and obtain handwriting specimens in connection with this matter.

Miss DAISY FANSLER, 738 West Ocean View Avenue, Norfolk, Virginia, on February 14, 1949, was recontacted by Special Agents of this office who had conducted the two previous interviews with Miss FANSLER.

Every precaution was made to properly conduct this interview on this occasion, inasmuch as it was noted on the two previous interviews that Miss FANSLER exhibited a very uncooperative attitude and appeared to be very prejudiced in this matter, almost to the point of being somewhat belligerent to the interviewing Agents.

As a matter of information, Miss FANSLER on the occasion of the last interview advised Agents of this office that she would give handwriting specimens only if she were allowed to include the statement in the specimens that her constitutional rights were being violated and duress was being used to obtain the specimens. The handwriting specimens were not obtained under these circumstances.

-Miss FANSLER, after making this statement, produced a letter that she had received from her attorney, Mr. ANTHONY WHITAKER, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, which advised that he had submitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation a letter written by Miss FANSLER some time previously, a photostatic copy of which was included with the communication. Miss FANSLER exhibited the letter from her attorney and the enclosure, and stated that she desired to consult her attorney before submitting any handwriting specimens to the Agents. It was noted in this letter from Mr. WHITAKER to Miss FANSLER that he stated he saw no reason not to cooperate with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, therefore, he had surrendered Miss FANSLER's letter to Agents of the FBI. After this was noted by the interviewing Agents, it was suggested that Miss FANSLER contact Mr. WHITAKER by telephone for legal counsel in this matter, that is, of submitting handwriting specimens.

Subsequent to contacting Mr. WHITAKER, Miss FANSLER agreed to furnish handwriting specimens, but in a belligerent attitude, stating that her attorney had advised her that he saw no reason why these additional handwriting specimens were desired by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and that she could furnish these handwriting specimens and after doing so it was her privilege to forcefully call this matter to the attention of the Director. She also advised that Mr. ANTHONY WHITAKER had reported to her that he had been continually "hounded" by the Federal Bureau of Investigation in connection with this matter. She informed the interviewing Agents that on her next trip to Washington she intended to contact the Director personally and criticize this organization in connection with its methods of investigation, which she termed as "sleuthing," and the organization's general interest in the entire matter.

In view of the above and in addition due to the fact that the Agents report that Miss FANSLER is very eccentric and appears to be in a neurotic state, it is suggested that careful consideration be given before setting out leads for Miss FANSLER to be reinterviewed in connection with this matter.
