FBI FOIPA Addendum

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) Intelligence Records. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records is itself a classified fact protected by FOIA exemption (b)(1) and/or would reveal intelligence sources, methods, or activities protected by exemption (b)(3) [50 USC § 3024(i)(1)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that any such records do or do not exist.

Part 2: The standard responses below apply to all requests for records on individuals:

- (i) Requests for Records about any Individual—Watch Lists. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of any individual's name on a watch list pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(7)(E) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(7)(E), (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that watch list records do or do not exist.
- (ii) Requests for Records about any Individual—Witness Security Program Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records which could identify any participant in the Witness Security Program pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(3) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(3), 18 U.S.C. 3521, and (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.
- (iii) Requests for Records for Incarcerated Individuals. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records which could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any incarcerated individual pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(7)(E), (b)(7)(F), and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(7)(E), (b)(7)(F), and (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.

Part 3: General Information:

- (i) Record Searches. The Record/Information Dissemination Section (RIDS) searches for reasonably described records by searching systems or locations where responsive records would reasonably be found. A standard search normally consists of a search for main files in the Central Records System (CRS), an extensive system of records consisting of applicant, investigative, intelligence, personnel, administrative, and general files compiled by the FBI per its law enforcement, intelligence, and administrative functions. The CRS spans the entire FBI organization, comprising records of FBI Headquarters, FBI Field Offices, and FBI Legal Attaché Offices (Legats) worldwide; Electronic Surveillance (ELSUR) records are included in the CRS. Unless specifically requested, a standard search does not include references, administrative records of previous FOIPA requests, or civil litigation files. - (ii) **FBI Records.** Founded in 1908, the FBI carries out a dual law enforcement and national security mission. As part of this dual mission, the FBI creates and maintains records on various subjects; however, the FBI does not maintain records on every person, subject, or entity.
- (iii) Requests for Criminal History Records or Rap Sheets. The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division provides Identity History Summary Checks often referred to as a criminal history record or rap sheet. These criminal history records are not the same as material in an investigative "FBI file." An Identity History Summary Check is a listing of information taken from fingerprint cards and documents submitted to the FBI in connection with arrests, federal employment, naturalization, or military service. - (iv) **National Name Check Program (NNCP).** The mission of NNCP is to analyze and report information in response to name check requests received from federal agencies, for the purpose of protecting the United States from foreign and domestic threats to national security. Please be advised that this is a service provided to other federal agencies. Private Citizens cannot request a name check.

EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual;
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (d)(5) information compiled in reasonable anticipation of a civil action proceeding;

- (k)(1) information which is currently and properly classified pursuant to an Executive order in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy, for example, information involving intelligence sources or methods;
- (k)(2) investigatory material compiled for law enforcement purposes, other than criminal, which did not result in loss of a right, benefit or privilege under Federal programs, or which would identify a source who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence:
- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.

ON JUNE 2, 1983, VICTIM RECEIVED LETTER VIA U.S. MAIL AT HIS RESIDENCE. LETTER PURPORTEDLY WRITTEN BY PARAMILITARY ORGANIZATION, WHICH HAS BEEN INVOLVED IN COVERT ACTIVITIES IN U.S. LETTER ADVISED VICTIM TO PROVIDE \$1,250,000 INTEREST-FREE LOAN OR MEMBERS OF HIS FAMILY WOULD BE KILLED. LETTER INDICATED THAT A SUBSEQUENT LETTER WILL BE RECEIVED BY VICTIM WITH INSTRUCTIONS FOR DROP OF MONEY ON JUNE 7, 1983 IN EVENING. INDIANAPOLIS BEING NOTIFIED SINCE VICTIM PRESENTLY IN INDIANAPOLIS AND SCHEDULED TO RETURN ON JUNE 5, 1983.

BOSTON WILL FACSIMILE COPY OF LETTER TO BUREAU UPON RETREIVAL. INVESTIGATION CONTINUEING.

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





Specimens Qc1 through Qc3 most closely resemble Laboratory standards for photocopies produced on a Savin photocopy machine. Specimens Qc1 through Q9 bear no indented writing, watermarks or other physical characteristics which would be of value in determining their immediate source.

In the absence of any known writing, no handwriting comparisons were made. If future handwriting comparisons are anticipated, it is suggested that numerous, comparably worded, handwritten and hand printed exemplars be obtained on envelopes and lined paper which approximate the size of specimens Qcl through Q8. Exemplars should be written with both ball-point and felt-tip pens. Undictated known exemplars would also be of value. These exemplars could take the form of employment, educational and financial records.

This will confirm the telephonic report given to on June 10, 1983.

A forensic linguistic examination was conducted on the facsimile copies, Qcl through Qc3. It was concluded that the author is most likely 25-35 years old, family oriented, with possibly some college courses and possibly from a low socioeconnomic and/or rural background. Conflicting indicators were found concerning the author's sex, with the majority leaning toward female. (This could also indicate a male with effeminate characteristics.) It is probable that the extortion money, once obtained by the author, would be split two ways. In addition, be author of Qc1 through Qc3 most likely was not in the military, but may well have a close relationship with one who is/was.

Since application of linguistic methodology to forensic science is a relatively new technique and its reliability is as yet unproven, linguistic examinations are provided for investigative assistance only, and are not intended for testimony.

The psycholinguistics report will be the subject of a separate communication, from the FBI's outside consultant,



Special Forces staff Army Sgt. Marc E. McDonnell, 27. a former Stoughton resident stationed at Ft. Devens, threatened to kill Kenneth H. Olsen of Lincoln and Olsen's family unless an 18-month "interest free loan" was paid in unmarked \$100 bills, the FBI said.

McDonnell appeared yesterday before U.S. Magistrate Robert J. DeGiacoma and was held on \$100,000 surety bail, pending a July 6 probable cause hearing.

According to a June 2 extortion letter obtained by The Herald, McDonnell allegedly gave Olsen a "demonstration" to prove his threats were serious.

Olsen, a soft-spoken

man who in 1957 founded Digital — a \$6.7 billion high-tech firm headquartered in Maynard was supposed to drop off. the \$1.25 million June 7 in Littleton. But he didn't get his mailed instructions, contained in a second ransom note, until a day later.

A complaint was filed June 16, charging McDonnell with attempting to use the U.S. Mail to extort \$1.25 million from Olsen. But he wasn't arrested until Friday after he returned from maneuvers.

According to documents filed with the US magistrate in Boston, McDonnell allegedly wrote two letters to Kenneth Olsen, founder and president of Digital Equipment Corp. of Maynard. Digital is the second largest computer manufacturer in the world.

caused no injuries or serious damage. According to the FBI, two "low-order" explosives damaged utility poles on Codman road and Bedford street, the latter about a mile from Olsen's home.

No money was ever paid, and neither Olsen nor his family was injured, the FBI said.

McDonnell, a 10-year Army veteran, was arrested in Germany last Thursday by military authorities and turned over to the FBI in Boston yesterday. He was on duty in Germany with his outfit, the 10th Special Forces Group. Army officials were unable to provide the dates of his assignment in Germany. He had been stationed at Ft. Devens since 1977, officials said, and was trained as a demolitions expert.

According to an FBI affidavit, the first letter was picked up by Olsen on June 2 at the Lincoln Post Office. That letter, the affidavit said, demanded the money and contained the death threat. The letter described the writer and his associates as "a small group of professionals [who] are asking you to cooperate in furnishing a \$1.25 million loan for a period of 18 months."

Under a heading of "Reasons," the letter

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stated:

"We have served this country on average about 19 years each. America's finest in the civilian covert intelligence gathering and/or military and paramilitary special operations fields, performing still classified dirty work in SE Asia, Africa, Central and South America.

"We suffered, been wounded and lost good friends. When we grew too tired and had had enough, the US released us to go our own way. A career of intense living, shaping the histories of some countries and the desire to make up lost time with our families has created in us a disdain for the 'normal' civilian job market.

"Utilizing our acquired skills, we are soliciting some of the wealthiest people in the country to provide us with [an] 18-month loan. Then returning the principal while retaining the interest which averages around \$150,000-\$200,000 utilizing our own investments."

The letter closed with the blunt words: "... up and you will die and we will move on to someone else. There will be no 2d chances, delays or excuses"

A second letter was received by Olsen on June 8, the affidavit said, and contained instructions and a map for delivering the money in cash, specifying only small, unmarked bills. However, the June 8 letter demanded the money be delivered on the evening of June 7, the day before.

According to the court records, FBI agents and local police went to the "drop" site, a disused roadside rest area in Littleton on the evening of June 8, and saw a man, woman and child drive up in a car, look at a box in the rest area, then drive away.

The affidavit said that the agents followed the car to Ft. Devens to McDonnell's Davio court address.

The next day, the affidavit said, agents

searched the trash bin behind the house, and found what they allege is a draft of the demand letter which contained McDonnell's finger-prints.

McDonnell is married and has a 4-year-old daughter, court records indicate. He was born in Boston, grew up in Stoughton and joined the Army after he was graduated from Stoughton High School.

A probable cause hearing is set for July 6. The FBI released a statement which said Mc-Donnell could get 20 years in jail and a \$5000 fine if found guilty.



Executive Was Target Of Extortion Bid, FBISays

By a Wall Street Journal Staff Reporter

BOSTON-An Army staff sergeant Monday was charged with attempting to extort \$1,250,000 from Kenneth C. Olsen, president of Digital Equipment Corp., according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The FBI office here said Mr. Olsen received two letters recently demanding the money as an interest-free loan and threatening to kill Mr. Olsen or members of his family if he didn't comply.

Staff Sgt. Marc E. McDonnell, 27 years old, of Fort Devens in Ayer, Mass., was charged with attempting to extort through the U.S. mail. The maximum penalty for a conviction is 20 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine, according to an FBI spokesman.

Mr. Olsen couldn't be reached. A spokesman for Digital Equipment said Mr. Olsen handled the matter as a personal rather than corporate issue.

Details weren't available, but the FBI said it was assisted in its investigation by the Army's Criminal Investigation Command and by local police from the towns of Lincoln and Littleton

FBI nabs suspect

in Olsen extortion

BOSTON — An Army sergeant stationed at Fort Devens has been charged with a plot to extort \$1.25 million from Kenneth Olsen, president of Digital Equipment Corp. of Maynard.

Staff Sgt. Marc E. McDonnell, 27, of 785B Davao Circle, Fort Devens, was charged in federal court on June 16 with attempting to extort the money from Olsen, president of the Maynard-based computer firm.

James W. Greenleaf, special agent in charge of the Boston division of the FBI, said Olsen received a letter on June 2 demanding \$1.25 million as an interest free loan.

The letter stated that if Olsen did not comply with the demand, that he and members of his family would be killed, Greenleaf said.

On June 8, another letter was received by the Olsen family furnishing instructions for delivery of the money. The letter scheduled

delivery of the money for June 7 between 7 and 9 p.m., Greenblatt said.

Subsequent surveillance of the drop site led to the arrest of McDonnell, Greenblatt said.

Members of the Fort Devens Criminal Investigative Command, the FBI, and the Littleton and Lincoln Police Departments joined forces to investigate the incident:

FBI agents in Boston filed a complaint on June 16 before US Magistrate Robert J. Degiacomo charging McDonnell with attempting to use the US mails to extort, a federal crime.

McDonell was taken before a US magistrate in Boston today to establish his identity, set bail and schedule a hearing date.

If McDonnell is convicted, he could receive a maximum penalty of 25 years in jail and a \$5,000 fine, Greenleaf said.

An FBI agent said that neither Olsen, nor his family were harmed.

March E. McDonnell, 27, was charged with attempting to use the U.S. mails to extort money from Kenneth H. Olsen, the millionaire who heads the Maynardhased computer firm, according to U.S. Attorney

In letters to Olsen, McDonnell claimed he represented a paramilitary terrorist group and threatened to kill Olsen or his family members unless the money was delivered, authorities said.

If convicted, McDonnell faces a maximum 20year jail term and a \$5,000 fine.

The suspect, held on \$100,000 bond, faces a pretrial hearing July 6. (Indicate page, name of newspaper, city and state.)

Mc-Donnell, 28, led agents to four locations in the woods where they found an arsenal that included 100 pounds of TNT, Claymore mines and antipersonnel mines, FBI Agent George H. Burttram said. After learning of the find, US Magistrate Robert J. DeGiacomo refused to reduce McDonnell's \$100,000 bail. An FBI search of McDonnell's home at Ft. Devens uncovered a quantity of chemicals and devices used in make ing bombs. Moments before the ball review hearing, a federal grand jury indicted McDonnell on the charge of using the US mails in an; attempt to commit extortion. Later yesterday, McDonnell was arraigned before US District Judge A. David Mazzone. He denied the charge and the judge scheduled the trial for Aug. 29. Mazzone agreed to accept as collateral for the bail deeds to the home of McDonnell's mother and stepfather in Stoughton, an aunt's home in Bridgewater and a summer home McDonnell and his wife own in Winthrop, Maine.







A detailed description of the individual components of the two (2) IED's are set forth hereafter:

MAIN CHARGE

Although an instrumental analysis of submitted specimen Q27, section of damaged utility pole, failed to reveal any explosives or explosive residues, the observable physical characteristics of the damaged utility poles in specimens Q16, Q21, and Q27 in conjuction with the recovered safety fuse and blasting cap and the absence of a container, is highly suggestive that a high explosive was used as the main charge in the two IED's.

SAFETY FUSE

Present in specimens Q11, Q20, Q22, Q24, and Q26 are numerous lengths of burned/fragmented safety fuse, green in color. Examinations revealed these lengths of safety fuse to be type M-700, which is manufactured for the exclusive use of the United States Military.

TAPE

Present in specimens Q12, Q13, Q14, Q17, Q18, Q19, Q23, and Q25 are numerous lengths of 3/4"- wide black plastic tape whose ends are not suitable for comparison purposes.

BLASTING CAP

Present in specimen Q10 are the fragmented remains of an aluminum shelled blasting cap. Due to the fragmented condition of the blasting cap, no manufacturer could be determined.

Additionally, indented writing of portions of the questioned hand printing appearing on specimen 038 was observed upon examination of the top sheet of specimen 042 which indicates that specimen 038 probably originated from the specimen 042 tablet.

Indented writing was observed upon examination of the top sheet of specimen Q41. Two photographs depicting this indented writing are enclosed for your investigative assistance. No other indented writing of value was observed upon examination of the remaining submitted specimens.

Some physical characteristics in common were noted during comparison of the Q40 tablet paper and the previously submitted specimens Q7 through Q9; however, no association could be made with regard to their common origin.

The specimens Q28 through Q35 envelopes do not correspond in observable physical characteristics with either the Q4 or Q5 envelope, previously submitted.







Kenneth H. Olsen, Weston Road, Lincoln, Massachusetts, telephone number 617-259-8754, supplied the following information:

He is president and founder of Digital Equipment Corporation, headquartered in Massachusetts.

On March 5, 1983, at approximately 10:00 p.m. he received a telephone call at his residence from a female caller. The caller sounded businesslike and stated that she was paid by people to make the call. The caller sounded as if she was reading her statements.

The caller stated that the group she represented wanted a two million dollar interest-free loan for two and one half years. The caller stated that if Olsen did not comply, Olsen or members of his family would be injured.

Olsen hung up the telephone at this point because he believed the call to be a hoax. The telephone rang a short time later but he did not answer it.

Olsen subsequently notified Digital Security and the local police of the call. Investigation failed to identify the caller and no further calls were received. Olsen had his telephone number changed to a non-published number a short time later.

On June 2, 1983 at approximately 11:50 a.m., Olsen traveled to the Lincoln, Massachusetts Post Office and picked up mail from his box. Included in the mail was an unsigned letter demanding an interest-free loan and threatening to kill his family or himself if he did not comply. Olsen provided the letter and envelope to on June 2, 1983.

Olsen cannot supply any suspects in this matter.

the president of Digital Equipment Corp. in an extortion attempt lost an effort in US District Court yesterday to suppress an incriminating statement he made when he was arrested in Germany. Judge A. David Mazzone rejected a claim that Sgt. Marc. E. McDonnell, 27, of Ft. Devens, was coerced and intimidated into making the written statement June 23 to an Army investigator in Berlin, where McDonnell was on duty with his Special Forces unit. The judge said McDonnell had waived his right to silence and to an attorney when he made the statement: McDonnell is accused of mailing two letters to Kenneth Olsen, founder and president of Digital Equipment Corp. of Maynard, the world's second largest computer manufacturer. The first letter demanded a \$25 million "loan" and claimed the writer represented a paramilitary terrorist group. The letter also promised "a demonstration of our seriousnesses." Two bombs were detonated in Lincoln on June 4, damaging two utility poles, one a mile from Olsen's home. No money was ever paid and neither Olsen nor his family was injured. McDonall has pleaded innocent and is scheduled to go trial Aug. 29.

A Green Beret, who said he wanted the money so that his wife could stop working, pleaded guilty yesterday to using the mail to threaten to kill the president of Digital Equipment Corp.in an \$1.25 million extortion attempt.

Sgt. Marc E. McDonnell, 27, of Ft. Devens

McDonnell admitted writing two letters to Digital President Kenneth Olsen of Lincoln, demanding a \$1.25 million "interest-free loan." Digital, with headquarters in Maynard, is the second largest computer manufacturing firm in the world.

In the first letter June 2, McDonnell promised "a demonstration of our seriousness," and admitted he set off two bombs that damaged utility poles in Lincoln June 4. One explosion was a mile from Olsen's

No money was paid, and neither Olsen nor his family was in-

McDonnell, a 10-year Army veteran and trained demolition expert, faces up to 20 years

In a written confession he gave Army investigators who arrested him on duty in Germany June 23, McDonnell explained his motive.

"I felt with the training the military has given me I should be able to do more for them his wife and child. I tried to think of a way that

Such a setting was necessary, McDonnell said in the confession, "because I felt the operation required a demonstration of capability which could only be done in a woodsy type area where nobody could be injured. At no time whatsoever was physical contact or action contemplated against Mr. Olsen."

When he received no response from Olsen, McDonnell said, he assumed the Digital president did not hear about the bombings and considered the letters a hoax. "I forgot about it and later left for [assignment in] Germany. No reprisal was ever planned."

Assistant US Atty. Paul F. Healy Jr. said Mc-Donnell was arrested after investigators working on another case found a draft of the demand letter containing McDonnell's fingerprints discarded in a trash bin outside the sergeant's

There was also testimony at a pre-trial hearing that the Army used a plane for surveillance of McDonnell when he went to the "drop site," a roadside rest area in Littleton, in hopes of picking up the money. The sergeant took his wife and 4-year-old daughter with him to the drop site but said they were unaware of what he was looking for.

After his arrest and return to the United States, McDonnell led FBI agents to a cache of explosives he had buried in a wooded area at Ft. Devens, according to testimony.

BOSTON (AP) — A U.S. Army sergeant was sentenced yesterday to four years in prison for trying to use the mail to extort a \$1.25 million loan from the president of Digital Equipment Corp., authorities said.





A Green Beret, who admitted threatening to kill the president of Digital Equipment Corp. in a \$1.25-million extortion attempt, received a four-year prison sentence yesterday.

Sgt. Marc E. McDonnell, 28, who is based at Fort Devens in Ayer, admitted writing two letters to Digital president Kenneth H. Olsen demanding the money as an "interest-free loan." Digital is the second largest computer manufacturing firm in the world.

The first letter promised a "demonstration of out seriousness" and after it was mailed McDonnell admitted setting off explosives which damaged two utility poles in Lincoln June 4. One explosion was a mile from Olsen's home.

McDonnell pleaded guilty in federal court in Boston to a charge of sending an extortionate letter through the mails. No money was paid and neither Olsen nor his family was injured.

US District Judge A. David Mazzone imposed the sentence and ordered McDonnell turned, over to federal marshals to begin serving it immediately.

Although Assistant US Attorney Paul F. Healy Jr. recomended a five-year sentence, the judge said he considered McDonnell's remorse, his suportive family and his lack of a future in the Army.

Defense lawyer Willie J. Davis, emphasizing that no one was injured in the episode, argued that McDonnell "let his mind run away with him." The sergeant is a trained demolitions specialist who was born in Boston and lived in Stoughton before joining the Army 10 years ago.

According to a psychiatric report filed in court: "The combination of financial stress and his feeling of entitlement and lack of recognition for the dangers of his job seemed to have led to a temporary disorder of thinking which he now views with remorse."

McDonnell is a person of superior intelligence and with no mental disease, according to the report.

In a confession given Army investigators at the time of his arrest in June, McDonnell said the extortion attempt was motivated by a desire to do more for his wife and daughter. "I tried to think of a way that would harm no one, inconvenience few and make available enough money to live on without my wife working," he said in the confession.

McDonnell selected Olsen's name from a magazine article listing the 400 richest people in the country.

"I narrowed the possible candidates down to seven. From those only Mr. Olsen lives a near normal lifestlye in a rural setting. This was a requirement because I felt the operation required a demonstration of the capability which could only be done in a woodsy type area where nobody could be injured," he said.

In the letters, McDonnell directed the money be left at a roadside rest area in Littleton. He took his wife and 4-year-old daughter with him to the "drop site," but said they were unaware of what he was looking for.

You requested an examination of specimens K1 through K6 and an intercomparison of those items with specimens previously examined and reported in above referenced report.

PHOTOGRAPHS:

Enclosed for your investigative assistance are two sets of photographs (19 photographs per set) depicting the submitted items.

EXPLOSIVES AND EXPLOSIVE ACCESSORIES:

Present in the submitted items are nonelectric blasting caps, rolls of safety fuse, a blasting cap crimper tool, and C-4 type high explosive material. All items are manufactured for the use of the United States Military and are not normally available on the commercial market. Also present is a partial roll of black plastic tape.

A detailed description of the individual items is set forth hereafter:

Main Charge Explosive

The white puttylike material in specimen Kl was determined to be C-4, a United States Military demolition explosive.

Safety Fuse

Present in specimen K5 are two rolls of type M700, safety fuse, a United States Military fuse used to safely initiate nonelectric blasting caps like the ones present in specimens K4 and K6. Blasting Caps

Present in specimens K4 and K6 are twenty-eight (28) United States Military Type M7 nonelectric blasting caps which contain the explosives, RDX and lead styphanate. These aluminum shelled blasting caps which measure approximately 2.35" X .239" are capable of initiating the C-4 explosive in specimen K1. Present on the exterior of the paper boxes in specimens K4 and K6 is the following United States Military LOT number: CTL 2-3 3-72. The 3-72 indicates the blasting caps were manufactured during March 1972.

Crimper Tool

Present in specimen K2 is a nonelectric blasting cap crimper type M2 manufactured by the Sargent Company. An instrumental analysis of the white powder removed from the cutting portion of the crimper was determined to be PETN, the high explosive component in detonating cord.

COMPARISON EXAMINATIONS:

The free end of the 3/4"-wide black plastic tape in specimen K3 was compared with the 3/4"-wide black plastic tape in specimen Q12, Q13, Q14, Q17, Q18, Q19, Q23, Q24, and Q25. Although the lengths of tape have similar surface characteristics, no end match was affected.

The metal fragments of an aluminum shelled blasting cap in specimen Q10 were compared to one of the nonelectric blasting caps in specimen K4. Although the presence of the aluminum fragments in specimen Q10 are similar to the type aluminum used in the K4 nonelectric blasting cap, no positive determination was reached regarding the exact source of specimen Q10.

The length of burned safety fuse in specimen Q11 was determined to be like the military M700 green colored safety fuse in specimen K5.



Plot for 'a quick \$20,000' ruins his life

By THOMAS MORONEY

DANBURY, Conn. — For most of the soldiers in the small



group, the conversations a b o u t extorting we althy businessmen were nothing more than that just talk.

Yet, set against the low pay, risky assignments and months away from their families, the idea had a certain appeal, albeit a perverse one.

Staff Sgt. Marc E. McDonnell, a member of that Fort Devens coterie, saw the idea as "a quick \$20,000" to cover bills and start a "nest egg" for his children's education.

"A bunch of us just started talking one day. Two years later, I went off and did it ... alone." he said in an interview.

McDonnell was sentenced Sept. 26 to four years at the Federal Correctional Institution here after he pleaded guilty to charges of threatening to kill Kenneth Olsen, the president of Digital Equipment Corp., and his family in a \$1.25 million extortion plot.

In the prison visitors room, McDonnell talked about how the scheme took root and the motives behind it.

What emerged were some hints as to why this successful 28-year-old career Army sergeant blessed with a devoted wife, loving daughter and strong family background would do what he did

"People look at me as the soldier boy gone bad or 'Andy of Mayberry commits extortion' or something like that. All I wanted to do was stay solvent and stay in the military. I loved the job, but it's real tough on the family

"It was a bluff to secure a loan. What was I supposed to do, threaten to egg his house? I'm sorry for the trouble I caused, but nobody was hurt, no property damaged." he said.

the FBI in June while on a tour of duty in Germany. With utter disgust, one agent turned to McDonnell and asked, "How could you do such a thing?"

"And I asked him. 'How much do you make a year?' He said \$60,000. I told him I made \$14,000 and I was just as patriotic and hard-working as he was.

"I knew after 10 years in the Special Services (Green Berets), where the average tour of duty is 12 years, that I would never be able to give my family the good stuff," McDonnell said.

He and his soldier friends also knew they had the talent, training and equipment for any plan. McDonnell is an expert with explosives, known in military circles for his skill and creativity in the field.

"We talked about how we would show the people we were a viable force. We could do anything, really. We could have derailed a train; or, with a single charge, blacked out all of New England. We also talked

about the person.

"There must be 150 millionaires in New England. We had it narrowed down to two Mr. Olsen and An Wang (founder of Wang Laboratories in Lowell). But we weren't sure how Wang would react or whether he was heavily protected, so we focused on the other," he said.

Did he ever think he'd get away with it, he was asked.

"It was about a 50-50 chance. If it didn't work, I figured to walk away and never try it again.

"Early summer was a frantic time. The people I was talking with (the other soldiers) were starting to leave on one-year missions. I was ready to leave again myself, and I thought, 'Well, it's now or never,' " he

On June 2, Olsen received NicDonnell's letter demanding a

\$1.25 million interest free-loan, accompanied with the inreat of death, according to the FBI.

On June 8, Olsen received instructions to put unmarked \$100 bills in plastic trash bags in a deserted rest area at the intersection of routes 2 and 495.

The FBI also said that, on June 4, two telephone poles near Olsen's house were damaged by explosions, perhaps as a show of color est or a

McDonnell corroborated all the rol information but would not talk about the explosions. He did say that, after the poles exploded, he was surprised to find nothing in the newspapers to indicate that Olsen would pay.

"There and then I was ready to forget the whole thing — so much for a life of crime. But one day I told my wife to drive by the rest area. I just hated to think that, if he did pay, some kid would come across the million bucks and I'd read about it in the papers.

"That was a bad move, because they may have traced my wife's car from there," he said.

Combined with what some say is a light sentence and McDonnell's own description of the country club atmosphere at Danbury, it is hard to feel much empathy for him.

"I live in a dormitory setting. I've had worse times back in the barracks.

"Besides the tennis courts." track, weight room, you can go to school all day. I have a chance now to take college courses I couldn't take in the Army. I may work toward a degree in civil engineering.

'Plus it's absolutely fascinating who is in here — big corporate presidents, world-class forgers and people you would see in 'People' magazine. It's like a cocktail party where

all the guests are celebrities.

"I'd rather not say who they are, but I will say I've had many good job offers," he said. Although it is not official,

McDonnell expects no court martial - just a permanent release from the military.

His one regret is the pain he has caused his wife.

"The person really hurt by this is her, and that hurts me. She lost her job because of this. She has to take care of our 5-year-old daughter and leave Devens right away, so basically she's looking for a place to sleep this winter. She's really on the edge. I hope she's OK.

Otherwise, I'd like to say I'm more remorseful, but I never meant any harm, so I can't be that sorry," he said, "I'm not a psycho or gangster. I made a mistake, and I'm paying for it.'
