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FBI FOIPA Addendum

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) Intelligence Records. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records is itself a classified fact protected by FOIA exemption (b)(1) and/or would reveal intelligence sources, methods, or activities protected by exemption (b)(3) [50 USC § 3024(i)(1)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that any such records do or do not exist.

Part 2: The standard responses below apply to all requests for records on individuals:

- (i) Requests for Records about any Individual—Watch Lists. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of any individual's name on a watch list pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(7)(E) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(7)(E), (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that watch list records do or do not exist.
- (ii) Requests for Records about any Individual—Witness Security Program Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records which could identify any participant in the Witness Security Program pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(3) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(3), 18 U.S.C. 3521, and (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.
- (iii) Requests for Confidential Informant Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of confidential informant records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F) [5 U.S.C.§ § 552 (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F)] and Privacy Act exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C.§ 552a (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records would reveal confidential informant identities and information, expose law enforcement techniques, and endanger the life or physical safety of individuals. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.

Part 3: General Information:

- (i) Record Searches and Standard Search Policy. The Record/Information Dissemination Section (RIDS) searches for reasonably described records by searching systems, such as the Central Records System (CRS), or locations where responsive records would reasonably be found. The CRS is an extensive system of records consisting of applicant, investigative, intelligence, personnel, administrative, and general files compiled by the FBI per its law enforcement, intelligence, and administrative functions. The CRS spans the entire FBI organization, comprising records of FBI Headquarters, FBI Field Offices, and FBI Legal Attaché Offices (Legats) worldwide; Electronic Surveillance (ELSUR) records are included in the CRS. The standard search policy is a search for main entity records in the CRS. Unless specifically requested, a standard search does not include a search for reference entity records or administrative records of previous FOIPA requests.
 - a. *Main Entity Records* created for individuals or non-individuals who are the subjects or the focus of an investigation
 - b. Reference Entity Records- created for individuals or non-individuals who are associated with a case but are not known subjects or the focus of an investigation
- (ii) **FBI Records.** Founded in 1908, the FBI carries out a dual law enforcement and national security mission. As part of this dual mission, the FBI creates and maintains records on various subjects; however, the FBI does not maintain records on every person, subject, or entity.
- (iii) **Foreseable Harm Standard.** As amended in 2016, the Freedom of Information Act provides that a federal agency may withhold responsive records only if: (1) the agency reasonably foresees that disclosure would harm an interest protected by one of the nine exemptions that FOIA enumerates, or (2) disclosure is prohibited by law (5 United States Code, Section 552(a)(8)(A)(i)). The FBI considers this foreseeable harm standard in the processing of its requests.
- (iv) Requests for Criminal History Records or Rap Sheets. The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division provides Identity History Summary Checks often referred to as a criminal history record or rap sheet. These criminal history records are not the same as material in an investigative "FBI file." An Identity History Summary Check is a listing of information taken from fingerprint cards and documents submitted to the FBI in connection with arrests, federal employment, naturalization, or military service. For a fee, individuals can request a copy of their Identity History Summary Check. Forms and directions can be accessed at www.efbi.gov/about-us/cjis/identity-history-summary-checks. EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual;
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (d)(5) information compiled in reasonable anticipation of a civil action proceeding;
- (j)(2) material reporting investigative efforts pertaining to the enforcement of criminal law including efforts to prevent, control, or reduce crime or apprehend criminals;
- (k)(1) information which is currently and properly classified pursuant to an Executive order in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy, for example, information involving intelligence sources or methods;
- (k)(2) investigatory material compiled for law enforcement purposes, other than criminal, which did not result in loss of a right, benefit or privilege under Federal programs, or which would identify a source who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence:
- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.



Subsequent to a review of a news article appearing in The Daily Seal News, West Claster , Rec on Friday, August 31, 1990, pertaining to the fendings of an audit of Lincoln University by the Pennsylvania Office of the Suditor General (PAG), the following investigation was conducted by SA at Harrislany, Pa on October 3, 1950.

In this regard, TSUCALAS reiterated that the above under pertaining to Jincol University did not uncover evidence of Criminal misconduct, but mainly discovered procedural errors.

LINCOLN U. FAULTED OVER FISCAL PROCEDURES

The way Lincoln University President*Niara*Sudarkasa described it, her \$26,000 Lincoln Continental was just basic wheels, transportation to and from work - college administrators don't drive jalopies.

And Sudarkasa said the decision to set up a university-funded checking account with about \$100,000 for purchases by her husband, John L. Clark - who is Lincoln's physical plant director and picked out the car - was a money-saving measure implemented to cut the school's deficit.

A state auditor general's report scheduled to be released next week criticizes Clark's no-bid purchases of the 1988 Lincoln Continental, nine other vehicles and an array of products ranging from pastel-colored toilets to cleaning equipment, according to one ranking state official.

While stressing that auditors had uncovered no suggestion of criminal wrongdoing, he said Sudarkasa's 'highly unusual' management style may have cost the taxpayers money because there was no competitive bidding on items Clark bought. The university generally requires bidding for goods worth more than \$500.

The official, who asked to remain anonymous, said the checking account was set up in Clark's name - not in the name of the university - and therefore was not in compliance with the school's own fiscal guidelines.

Clark, a building contractor by trade who was hired at Lincoln shortly after Sudarkasa joined the school in 1987, declined to comment on the audit.

Sudarkasa said that there were no grounds for the criticism, but that she would implement all recommendations of the auditors.

The state's routine ''compliance audit,'' in which auditors were at the

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school until April, covered much of the three years that Sudarkasa has headed the 1,200-student, state-related university in Chester County.

The state official said Clark's purchases between late 1988, when the checking account was opened, and this year totaled nearly \$250,000.

In addition to the vehicles and 100 yellow dormitory toilets, Clark purchased heavy machinery, radio communications equipment and auto-repair shop supplies.

Sudarkasa said \$148,000 of the money - which came directly from the school and did not pass through Clark's checking account - was used to buy the white Lincoln Continental and nine other vehicles, most of them vans for school transportation.

She said Clark purchased the Lincoln after doing ''comparative shopping,'' telephoning Philadelphia-area dealerships.

''There's nothing unusual about that. Other university presidents use comparable vehicles,'' she said in an interview Tuesday. ''It's not a car that anyone bought for a quote 'wife.' ''

Other Philadelphia-area universities said Sudarkasa's car was somewhat above the scale that they provided for their presidents.

University of Pannsylvania President Sheldon Hackney drives a 1987 Ford station wagon. Temple provided President Peter J. Liacouras with a 1989 Buick, and Pennsylvania State University President Bryce Jordan drives a 1988 Buick.

Sudarkasa said during the first two years she was at the university she used a station wagon that was also available for faculty members. She said that last year, when the Lincoln Continental was purchased, ''everyone felt it was about time that the university president had a car.''

She said the school's former vice president for financial affairs set up Clark's checking account without telling her, but there had been accounting for 'each and every penny that was spent.'

''This was something discussed between the vice president for financial affairs and the plant director,'' she said, referring to Clark.
''Unfortunately this has been sensationalized.... This was not a slush fund.''

Sudarkasa said the checking account was needed because her husband purchased used equipment, which she had believed was not subject to the same bidding requirements as new material.

She said that through the purchase of used equipment and other cost-cutting measures, she was able to sharply reduce Lincoln's longstanding deficit to less than \$500,000.

''It is the result of careful management and prudent spending,'' she said, adding that under her husband's direction university employees were able to do much of the work that in the past had required outside contractors.

Sudarkasa, however, declined to discuss whether her husband was hired because of her position at the university, stating only that 'what has been done at Lincoln University speaks for itself.'

Armstrong Williams, the university's Washington-based public relations agent, said no evidence of impropriety was found by the auditors. He acknowledged that Clark's checking account was 'a red flag.'

"There is no impropriety. I guess you could look at the procedures, but I didn think it was a big deal ," Williams said.

Lincoln's current vice president for fiscal affairs, Lloyd E. Asparagus, said Clark's checking account had been closed on the advice of the auditors.

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State Rep. Gordon J. Linton (D., Phila.), a member of Lincoln's board of directors and an alumnus, said he was ''not alarmed'' by the audit.

''It's not unusual for the presidents of universities to use cars purchased by the universities,' he said. Linton said all Clark's purchases were authorized by the university treasurer.

Deputy Auditor General John Tsucalas confirmed that Lincoln had been audited but declined to discuss details. Speaking in generalities, he said his office stressed the need for competitive bidding because it tended to drive down prices as well as prevent conflicts of interest.

LINCOLN OFFICIAL FELT FREE TO SHOP BUT STATE AUDITORS FIND HE SPENT 250G WITHOUT AUTHORITY

The husband of the president of Lincoln University made nearly \$250,000 worth of unauthorized school purchases, including a luxury car for his wife, according to findings of a state audit.

The Daily News has learned state auditors found that John L. Clark, husband of *Niara *Sudarkasa and head of buildings and grounds at the school, bought items without authority and in some cases circumvented required competitive bidding procedures.

Among Clark's purchases was a \$25,000 white 1988 Lincoln Continental for his wife and 100 yellow toilets for school dormitories, according to a source familiar with the audit.

'This guy was just out there buying things at auctions when he should not have been,' the source said.

Clark, according to audit findings, appears not to have violated any state regulations since all of his purchases were accounted for.

And the state plans no further investigation of Clark because there is no evidence of personal gain, according to a key state official.

The office of Auditor General Barbara Hafer told Lincoln officials of its findings last week. The audit is to be made public soon.

Lincoln's vice president for fiscal affairs, Lloyd E. Asparagus, confirmed the audit and said school policies call for making purchases only through a designated department and bidding items worth more than \$500.

He said those policies are being revised unrelated to audit findings. But he declined to comment on Clark or audit specifics. ''I really don't appreciate the media calling on something on which I don't have a final

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report,'' he said.

Deputy Auditor General John Tsucalas, Hafer's top aide, confirmed the Lincoln audit but also declined to discuss details.

"'We never talk about audits we haven't released,' he said.

Philadelphia attorney Richard H. Glanton, the school's general counsel, also declined to comment.

Dr. Bernard Anderson, chairman of Lincoln's board of directors, said he was "'unaware'' of the audit.

Calls to Clark, Sudarkasa and an aide to Sudarkasa were not returned.

The audit was a ''compliance'' audit routinely conducted to determine whether institutions are following their own fiscal guidelines and state law.

The audit covered more than one year. Field work on it was completed in April.

A state source said Clark could be held personally liable for the sum he spent but that there is no state recommendation to do so.

Among other purchases by Clark were vans for school use, heavy machinery, a radio communications system for maintenance workers and auto repair shop

Lincoln, located near Oxford in Chester County, is a state-related university with an enrollment of about 1,200 undergraduates.

Sudarkasa, formerly of the University of Michigan, became Lincoln's president three years ago. Her husband was hired as acting director of physical plant shortly after she took office.

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



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

An attorney for Lincoln University denied a published report Tuesday that the husband of the school's president spent some \$250,000 without proper authorization.

Philadelphia lawyer Richard Glanton, the school's general counsel, said John Clark, the head of buildings and grounds at Lincoln, did not improperly spend school funds.

The Philadelphia Daily News said Tuesday that a state audit found that Clark, the husband of Lincoln president Niara Sudarkasa, spent \$250,000 without authority and in some cases circumvented required competitive bidding procedures.

Deputy Auditor General John Tsucalas and Glanton confirmed that field work for the audit was completed in April. Tsucalas would not comment on the audit other than to say it would be made public in two or three weeks.

''We absolutely deny that there has been any impropriety. This is a draft audit.'' said Glanton.

But Glanton also said the Daily News story was inaccurate.

The paper said the audit revealed that Clark bought, among other things, a 1988 Cadillac for his wife and 100 yellow toilets for school dormitories.

But quoting unnamed state sources, the Daily News said Clark appeared not to have violated any state regulations and there was no evidence that Clark personally gained from the purchases.

''The article was inaccurate. It should be clear that they were authorized procurements. They were approved,'' Glanton said.

The audit was a routine compliance audit conducted to determine if the state-related school in Chester County was following its own guidelines and state regulations, Tsucalas said.

He said the audit covered the 1986 through 1988 fiscal years.

''The Lincoln University audit was very much in backlog, when it was inherited from the previous administration,'' said Tsucalas, a top aide to

Clark was hired shortly after Sudarkasa was appointed Lincoln president three years ago. Neither Clark nor Sudarkasa could be reached for comment Tuesday.

"When the report comes out, these lies will be exposed," Glanton said.

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


To comment briefly on the other three findings in the audit report: (1) with respect to the travel advances, please note that the \$8,000 referred to was used for travel by the track team, not by an individual employee, even though one employee is responsible for accounting for the advance. Appropriate duplicate documentation on the travel is being assembled and resubmitted. No individual at Lincoln University receives \$8,000 in travel advances! An explanation and documentation regarding the other travel is also being prepared in the Business Office.

(2) With respect to the establishment of greater control over fixed assets, the University is already taking steps to implement this recommendation. (3) Finally, with respect to the recommendation that the University submit annual financial satements in a more timely manner, the University's external auditors are working with the Business Office to reduce the time it takes to prepare the audit.

CHAIRMAN OF LINCOLN UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES RESPONDS TO AUDIT REPORT BY PENNSYLVANIA AUDITOR GENERAL

PHILADELPHIA, September 10, 1990 - Board of Trustees of Lincoln University, announced the University's acceptance of the recommendations contained in the routine audit report prepared by the Department of the Auditor General for the fiscal years ending June 30, 1986 through June 30, 1989.

He noted that University President Niara Sudarkasa is already taking the necessary steps for full compliance with the recommendations, which are all procedural in nature. The audit found no wrong doing, no misuse of University funds, no use of University funds for personal gain.

stated, "a Committee of the Board has reviewed the audit report together with supporting documentation and determined that all equipment and vehicle purchases were authorized by the appropriate fiscal officer of the University."

As stated in the audit report, all vehicles, equipment, tools and materials purchased are fully accounted for and have been and continue to be used for the purposes for which they were acquired. "The equipment purchased," said the Chairman, "has enabled the Physical Plant to embark on an impressive program of 'in-house' renovation and rehabilitation of our dormitories, classrooms and other buildings."

The Chairman then praised President Sudarkasa's stewardship of the University and credited her with restoring Lincoln's image as an innovative leader in American higher education. He also stated that between 1987 and 1989, the President reduced the budget deficit at the University from \$1.8 million to \$480,000, or nearly 75 percent, through effective management of the University's fiscal affairs.

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY RESPONSE TO STATE AUDIT REPORT

Lincoln University has received and reviewed the report of the routine audit from the Office of the Auditor General, released on September 10, 1990.

The University generally accepts the audit's findings and is taking the necessary steps to comply fully with its recommendations, all of which are procedural in nature.

Because of the adverse publicity surrounding the unauthorized release of an earlier draft of the audit report, the University deems it necessary to comment on the finding that the Physical Plant Director did not adhere to the University's purchasing policies and procedures in making purchases of \$242,940 of equipment and vehicles.

The audit found no wrong doing, no misuse of University funds, no use of University funds for personal gain. The finding centers mainly around the procedural fact that the Physical Plant Director did not go through the Purchasing Department in receiving authorization for these purchases from the Vice President for Fiscal Affairs.

Prior to the release of the audit report, the University sent a detailed letter to the Deputy Auditor General in which it documented that all the purchases referred to had the written authorization of the Vice President for Fiscal Affairs, the officer whose approval is required in order for a purchase to be in conformity with the University's written Purchasing Policies, Rules and Regulations.

The vehicles referred to in the audit report were purchased from one of Philadelphia's largest dealerships. Before this decision was made, competitive prices were obtained from dealerships in Pennsylvania and Delaware by telephone and by visits to the locations in question. Requisitions for the vehicles were sent to the Vice President for Fiscal Affairs. Invoices for the vehicles were made out to Lincoln University, and sent to the Vice President for Fiscal Affairs, who authorized each and every purchase. Standard University checks were requisitioned by the Vice President for Fiscal Affairs, signed by him, and sent directly from the Business Office to the dealership. Titles to all the vehicles are in the name of Lincoln University, not that of any individual.

The University acknowledges, however, that the comparative pricing and ordering of the vehicles should have been carried out by the Purchasing Department, not the Physical Plant Director, who oversees the maintenance and use of the vehicles. The University also acknowledges that the purchase requisitions should have been routed through Purchasing to the Vice President for Fiscal Affairs. This procedure will be adhered to in the future.

The University wishes to clarify the circumstances surrounding the purchase of equipment, tools and machinery by means of the special checking account mentioned in the audit report. First, it should be noted that these purchases were made to give the University a measure of self-sufficiency in addressing its deferred maintenance problems.

Lincoln is a 136-year old university with dormitories, classroom buildings and other structures that require major repairs and renovations. The heavy costs of effecting such repairs by using outside contractors make it impossible for a small campus such as this to adequately address most of these maintenance needs.

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In 1988, upon the recommendation of Physical Plant Director the University embarked on a program to create an "in-house capability" to effect major repairs and renovations throughout the campus. In order to do so, it was necessary to find reasonably-priced equipment and begin a training program to improve and fully utilize the skills of the maintenance staff.

A special checking account was established to enable the Physical Plant Director to purchase used equipment at auctions, where purchase orders are not normally accepted. The account was set up by the former Vice President for Fiscal Affairs, Donald L. Mullett, and expenditures from it were approved by him and later by the present

The account was established in the amount of \$15,000 and all

requisitions for the transfer of additional funds into it were initiated and signed by the Vice President for Fiscal Affairs.

The University has on hand cancelled checks and receipts to document all purchases made. All equipment, tools and materials purchased are fully accounted for and are being used for University purposes.

As a procedural matter, the Auditors objected to the existence of the special account, and in compliance with the audit report's recommendation, the account has been closed.

The Physical Plant Director recently had the opportunity to describe Lincoln's "inhouse" renovation program to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives' Education Committee, when it visited Lincoln on its tour of the State-Related Universities to survey their deferred maintenance problems. The Committee made very favorable comments, especially as regards the savings to the University resulting from the development of this "in-house" capability.

Since 1988, in addition to routine maintenance jobs, Lincoln's Physical Plant has completed at least 25 major renovation projects with far less dependence upon outside contractors than in the past. A preliminary survey indicates that by doing these projects entirely or partially in-house, the University has saved hundreds of thousands of dollars. The equipment purchased by the Physical Plant to effect these repairs cost less than \$95,000.

The projects completed by the Physical Plant include the renovation of two dormitories and the remodeling of a third; the renovation, remodeling and refurbishing of four University-owned houses and seven apartments; the remodeling of one house to provide accommodations for special University guests; the repair of roofs, foundations and basements; the replacement of clogged sewer lines; and various other jobs.

In addition to these major renovation and repair projects, the Physical Plant also designed and fabricated a removable, stackable covering to protect the Gymnasium floor when used for non-athletic events.

Another project of particular note was the repair and restoration of the University's historic stone arch at the entrance of the campus.

Because of the equipment purchased and the expertise developed, the Physical Plant was also able to construct the foundation, fabricate the steel base, install the marble around the base, and erect the 1800-lb. statue of Frederick Douglass that was donated to the University in 1989 by three of our alumni, the Atwell brothers of New York City. This statue has become one of the major focal points on the campus.

The University is proud of what it has accomplished in the Physical Plant arena as well as in the academic arena in the last several years. It is significant to note that while all the projects mentioned have been carried out, the inherited budget deficit of \$1.8 million has been reduced by nearly 75% to \$480,000.

The University considers it very unfortunate that efforts have been made to cast the procedural issues raised in the audit report in the most unfavorable light. Given the University's demonstrated and consistent commitment to sound and prudent fiscal management, it will take the necessary steps to see that its purchasing procedures are followed in all instances.

Subsequent to a review of a news article appearing in THE DAILY IOCAL NEWS", West Chester, Pennsylvania, on Friday, August 31, 1990, pertaining to the findings of an audit of Lincoln University by the Pennsylvania Office of the Auditor General (PAG), the following investigation was conducted by SA at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, on October 3, 1990.
Deputy Auditor General stated he was familiar with the recent audit conducted at Lincoln University and noted that the findings did not develop any evidence to point to any possible criminal wrong doing and that the discrepencies were those relating to procedural issues. There were basically three areas, two of which are termed as findings and one termed as an observation.
The appointee, NIARA SUDARKASA. is the President of Lincoln University and her husband, was appointed Director of Plant Facilities at the University.
In one finding, PAG auditors determined the checking account into which the University deposited funds. Then made purchases of equipment totaling approximately \$95,000, making payment by checks written against that account. The equipment purchased was for the university and there is no indication that diverted any of the funds or equipment to his personal use. However, this method bypassed normal bidding procedures and should have been handled by the purchasing department of the University.
The second finding concerned the purchase of vehicles totaling approximately \$150,000. authorized to obtain vehicles, signed for those vehicles, thereby obligating Lincoln University to the purchase and thus the University would subsequently issue checks for payment for the vehicles. This is contrary to acceptable procedure. The Purchasing Department did not handle the vehicle purchases, bid procedures were not adhered to, and a plad signed contractually for them, and then the University paid for the vehicles.
One observation noted that employees were paid a large sum, approximately a total of \$35,000, for travel. The travel was determined to have been legitimate, but Lincoln University should have conducted a cost analysis to ascertain the least expensive means to conduct that travel.

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Lincoln University has taken steps to correct the problems noted, such as closing the aforementioned checking account and directing that purchases of equipment, to include vehicles, be made by the Purchasing Department.

The PAG, upon completion of an audit, also subjects the finding to review by investigators to identify any indication of possible criminal action. Should such wrongdoing be detected, proper referral is made to the appropriate agency, such as the Attorney General, Inspector General, District Attorney, or other investigative agency. In this regard, reiterated that the above audit pertaining to Lincoln University did not uncover evidence of criminal misconduct, but mainly discovered procedural errors.

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

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



THE INVESTIGATION OF DR. SUDARKASA COVERED INQUIRIES IN THE UNITED STATES AS TO HER CHARACTER, LOYALTY, AND GENERAL STANDING, BUT NO INQUIRIES WERE MADE AS TO THE SOURCES OF HER INCOME.

This summary memorandum contains the partial results of an investigation concerning Dr. Sudarkasa and covers the period since October, 1975. Additional investigation is being conducted.

<u>Birth</u>

Dr. Sudarkasa was born on August 14, 1938, in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, as Gloria A. Evans.

Education

Dr. Sudarkasa was awarded a Ph. D. degree in anthropology from Columbia University, New York, New York, in May, 1964.

Military Service

Dr. Sudarkasa has indicated no prior military service.

Employment

From October, 1975, to January, 1987, Dr. Sudarkasa continued to be employed by the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan, holding the positions of Assistant Professor; Associate Professor; Full Professor; Director, Center for AfroAmerican & African Studies; and Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Since February, 1987, Dr. Sudarkasa has been employed as the President of Lincoln University, Lincoln University, Pennsylvania.

In addition to the above employments, Dr. Sudarkasa is active in various community, academic, cultural and anthropological organizations.

Family Status
Dr. Sudarkasa is married to who she has indicated is a United States citizen. They reside at the President's House, located on the campus of Lincoln University, Lincoln University, Pennsylvania.
Records of the Washtenaw County Circuit Court, Ann Arbor. Michigan. disclosed that Niara Sudarkasa (plaintiff) and (defendant) were divorced on on the grounds of a breakdown in the marriage relationship.

Based on the background information furnished by Dr. Sudarkasa, she has no close relatives residing in

contacted and would only comment that he considers Dr. Sudarkasa to be a good person. He refused to provide any further comments to the FBI.

Twenty-four additional persons, consisting of current and former colleagues and superiors, present and former neighbors, references, professional associates, and social acquaintances, were interviewed. They provided favorable comments concerning Dr. Sudarkasa's character, associates, reputation, and loyalty. They stated they are unaware of any illegal drug use or alcohol abuse by Dr. Sudarkasa, nor have they ever known her to exhibit any type of bias or prejudice against any class of citizen or any type of religious, racial or ethnic group. They also commented that they believe Dr. Sudarkasa lives within her financial means. All persons interviewed recommended her for a position of trust and responsibility.

Among those interviewed are the following:

Credit and Arrest Checks

A review of appropriate credit records revealed no pertinent information concerning Dr. Sudarkasa.

Information has been received from appropriate law enforcement agencies indicating their files contain no record concerning Dr. Sudarkasa.

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<u>Miscellaneous</u>

A search of NEXIS, a computerized news retrieval service, disclosed no pertinent information concerning Dr. Sudarkasa. However, NEXIS did disclose an article which was carried by United Press International on August 21, 1990, relating to allegations that Dr. Sudarkasa's husband, in his position as head of buildings and grounds at Lincoln University, spent approximately \$250,000 of Lincoln University's funds without proper authorization. The allegations stemmed from a routine compliance audit conducted by the Pennsylvania Office of the Auditor General (PAG) in 1990.

Deputy Auditor General PAG,

Lincoln University conducted by the PAG in April, 1990. Deputy
Auditor General advised that this audit, which covered
the 1986 through 1988 fiscal years, did not develop any evidence
to indicate any possible criminal wrongdoing on the part of
Dr. Sudarkasa, or Lincoln University, although several
procedural errors were noted. Furthermore, Lincoln University
has initiated corrective action.

Agency Checks

During the course of this investigation, the records of the following entities were checked. Their files contained either no record or no additional pertinent information concerning Dr. Sudarkasa, unless otherwise indicated elsewhere in this summary memorandum:

> Office of Personnel Management; Appropriate United States Attorneys, Department of Justice; United States Secret Service; and the White House Office.

Searches of the various indices of the FBI, including but not limited to the central index maintained at FBI Headquarters, the index of the Identification Division, the indices of appropriate field offices and other appropriate computer data bases, did not identify any documents that contain pertinent information identifiable with Dr. Sudarkasa or her close relatives.

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It should be noted that the currency of the data input into the various indices can vary from days to even months from the date of the document as a result of existing clerical backlogs throughout the FBI.

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



LINCOLN UNIVERSITY INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Lincoln University (University), chartered by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania on April 29, 1854, as the Ashum Institute, was founded for the scientific, classical, and theological education of black males. In 1866, the University adopted its current name, elected to teach on the university level, and opened enrollment to students of all races. Lincoln University has enjoyed interracial enrollment since the first baccalaureate class of 1868.

In July 1972, Governor Milton J. Shapp signed a bill which gave Lincoln University state-related status, and Lincoln joined the University of Pittsburgh, Temple University and The Pennsylvania State University as schools eligible to receive funding from the Commonwealth.

Lincoln University is the oldest university in the United States dedicated to the highest education of black youth. The campus, part of a 422-acre tract of farm and woodlands is composed of 27 main buildings and 21 faculty residences.

Programs of Study

The University offers 13 programs of undergraduate study:

- . Preparation for engineering.
- . Preparation for the study of law.
- . Preparation for the study of medicine.
- . Preparation for public service.
- . Preparation for social welfare careers.
- . Preparation for teaching.
- . Preparation for careers in management and economics.
- . General science.
- . Preparation for the professional study of religion and theology.
- . Health and physical education.
- . Recreation.
- . Music and music education.
- . Master's degree in human services.

Certain programs of study are conducted in cooperation with Drexel University, Lafayette College, The Pennsylvania State University, and the New Jersey Institute of Technology.

Special Programs and Services

Lincoln University offers various special programs and services. Included among them are:

- . Freshman Studies Program The scope of this program is to provide the range and variety of learning experiences required to make all entering students educationally competitive on a college level.
- . The Honors Program This program is designed for those students able and willing to undertake more rigorous, sophisticated and demanding academic work.

INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND INFORMATION (Continued)

- . Cooperative Education Program This program offers students an opportunity to combine classroom learning with planned, practical work experience.
- . The TIME Program (Act 101) The TIME Program (Talent Improvement and Motivation Experience) is a Commonwealth supported program that maintains a reading/writing laboratory and a mathematics laboratory. Individual tutoring and practice are provided in the laboratories under the constant supervision of several professionals.
- The SPEED Program The SPEED Program (Special Services for Enriching Educational Development) through professional counselors, attempts to facilitate a student's academic and social adjustment to college life. The tutorial facet of the program provides individual academic assistance on a short-term or continuous basis, depending on a particular student's needs.
- . Pre-College Enrichment Program This program, located in Lincoln's Urban Center in Philadelphia, offers special courses, minority scientist speakers, field trips, summer research experiences, counseling, and support systems to 160 talented high school minority students from Philadelphia schools.
- Lincoln Advanced Science and Engineering Reinforcement (LASER) Program This program is funded by the United States National Aeronautic & Space Administration and is considered by many to be the best preengineering program in Pennsylvania and a national prototype. Requiring rigorous course work in physics, chemistry, and mathematics, the eight year old program has a heavy emphasis on student research and prepares participants to earn two undergraduate degrees: a Bachelor of Arts from Lincoln University, and a Bachelor of Science in engineering from a selected engineering college.

We have audited the accompanying statements of appropriations earned of Lincoln University for the years ended June 30, 1989, 1988, 1987, and 1986. These statements are the responsibility of the university's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those statements require that we plan and perform the examination to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the schedules. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the schedules. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

Our audit included a review of the grants and associated costs for educational and general expenditures, the Recruitment and Retention of Disadvantaged Students, the enhancement of the opportunity for equal education, and the costs of the Masters of Human Services Program as required by Act Numbers 14A of July 7, 1988, 14A of July 3, 1987, 14A of July 10, 1986, and 17A of July 9, 1985. We also reviewed the University's independent certified public accountant's workpapers and performed a limited test of the University's accounting records which we considered necessary to determine compliance with provisions of the acts.

As discussed in Note 1, the accompanying statements present only the appropriations earned as of June 30, 1989, 1988, 1987, and 1986, and are not intended to present fairly the financial position of Lincoln University and the results of its operations and changes in financial position in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the statements of appropriations earned are presented fairly as required by Act Numbers 14A of July 7, 1988, P.L. 2216, No. 14A of July 3, 1987, P.L. 608, No. 14A of July 10, 1986, P.L. 1922, and No. 17A of July 9, 1985, P.L. 740.

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY NOTES TO THE STATEMENTS OF APPROPRIATIONS EARNED

1. Appropriations Earned Based on Cost

Act Numbers 14A of July 7, 1988, July 3, 1987, and July 10, 1986 and Act Number 17A of July 9, 1985 provide appropriations for educational and general expenditures, and for enhancing the recruitment and retention of disadvantaged students. In 1987, 1986, and 1985, it also provided for the enhancement of the opportunity for equal education, and in 1985, for the masters program in human services. According to the acts, these appropriations shall be made on the basis of costs incurred during the fiscal years.

Program costs consist of direct and indirect expenditures and mandatory transfers allocated in a rational and consistent manner. The categorical appropriations are earned when applicable costs exceed amounts appropriated by the Commonwealth. Lincoln University incurred expenditures in excess of appropriations in the following amounts:

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY INTRODUCTION TO OBSERVATIONS AND FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The following observations and findings and recommendations are the result of an examination of Lincoln University's operations through April 4, 1990. This examination included a review to determine:

- . Compliance with applicable laws and regulations;
- . Efficient and economical use of resources; and
- . Achievement of desired program results.

On April 16, 1990 the observations and findings and recommendations were reviewed with representatives of Lincoln University. Where appropriate, their comments have been included in this report.

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY
OBSERVATIONS

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY OBSERVATIONS

Observation No. 1 - The University Needs to Analyze Reimbursement for Vehicle Costs

Lincoln University currently reimburses employees who use their personal vehicles for University business at the rate of 24 cents per mile. When employees travel extensively, this policy may result in higher costs than if the University owned or leased the vehicles.

The Master of Human Services Program employs four recruiters who travel extensively. These four employees travel as far as State College, Pennsylvania, New Brunswick, New Jersey, and Baltimore, Maryland. For the year ended June 30, 1989, each of these employees averaged 35,250 reimbursable miles.

This program's mileage reimbursement to the four recruiters for the year ended June 30, 1989, totaled \$36,030: 44,000 miles, \$10,560; 38,000 miles, \$9,120; 32,000 miles, \$9,870; and, 27,000 miles, \$6,480. The University has no procedures to assess the reasonableness of these expenses.

The University should review mileage charged to particular programs to assess its propriety and reasonableness. Further, the University should perform cost analysis to determine if owning or leasing the vehicles is more economical than reimbursing for mileage.

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY OBSERVATIONS

Observation No. 2 - The Legislature Should Establish Reimbursement and Performance Criteria for the State-Related Universities

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has provided a total of \$452,424,000 to Lincoln University, the University of Pittsburgh, Temple University, and Pennsylvania State University for the year ended June 30, 1989. However, the legislature has not provided criteria to be used to determine how the University will earn the appropriations and has not provided criteria to evaluate the University's performance.

Currently, the state-related universities earn their respective appropriations based on costs incurred for various functional categories. The only requirement is that the universities have costs at least equal to the dollar amount of the functional appropriation.

The current criteria does not adequately define which costs are eligible for reimbursement. Further, criteria does not exist which establishes performance standards that must be met by the universities. Funding methods in effect now for the state-related universities provide the universities' appropriations with no specific instruction on how the money will be earned or what the Commonwealth expects to receive for its contribution.

The legislature or the Department of Education should establish reimbursement and performance criteria for the state-related universities to be used for determining earned reimbursement and evaluating the effectiveness of the University operations.

Finding No. 1 - Lincoln University's Department of Physical Plant Purchased

\$242,940 of Equipment and in so Doing did not Adhere to
University Purchasing Policies and Procedures

The Director of Physical Plant (Director), purchased automobiles and equipment in noncompliance with the University's purchasing policies and procedures (policies). Purchase requisitions, purchase orders and competitive bid procedures were not used, and the purchases were made by an unauthorized person.

The Director of Physical Plant is responsible for the general maintenance, construction, and improvement of the buildings, grounds, and substructure of the University. The Director's responsibilities do not include purchasing or procurement. Lincoln University has a fully staffed and functioning purchasing department which operates in accordance with written and approved purchasing policies and procedures.

The policies indicate that the purchasing department, with certain exceptions, should make all purchases. Examples of exceptions are accounting and legal services and negotiation of union contracts. The policies also state that at least three bids must be obtained for any expenditure in excess of \$500. The purchasing department is charged with the overall responsibility of selecting vendors. Furthermore, the policies indicate that any employee who commits the institution to an expenditure for material or equipment, who is not an authorized employee of the purchasing department or who has not received the written approval of the President or Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs for these expenditures, will be held personally liable for the cost and the payment for these items, without exception.

In December 1988, the Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs established a checking account in the Director's name and the bank sent all statements and correspondence directly to the Director. The account was not authorized by the board of directors. From December 1988 to December 1989, \$94,250 was expended from this account for equipment purchased at various auctions and yard sales. The Director requested and received replenishment of his account without providing the business office with purchase orders and invoices to substantiate the funds expended. Without this documentation, we could not determine if the purchases were cost effective or even necessary.

From May 1989 to November 1989, the Director purchased ten vehicles for \$148,690. He signed all of the sales agreements as the purchaser. Purchase orders and requisitions were not executed and bids were not solicited. The aforementioned purchases of equipment and vehicles were not processed by the University's receiving department but were delivered to the Director. University officials contend that these purchases were approved in writing by the Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs when he authorized the issuance of the checks.

Purchasing policies should furnish internal control assurance that:

. The purchase is necessary for the proper operation of the entity.

Finding No. 1 - (Continued)

- . The quantity ordered is based on properly authorized requisitions, and meet the entity's requirements.
- . The functions of purchasing, accounting, and receiving are segregated.

Furthermore good internal control dictates that:

- All bank accounts and check signers are approved by the board of directors.
- . All bank accounts are in the entity's name and included in the general ledger or subsidiary ledgers.
- . All bank accounts are reconciled regularly by the entity.
- . All reconciliations are prepared and supervised by an employee who does not prepare or sign the checks.
- . All bank statements and cancelled checks are delivered unopened directly to the employee reconciling them.

At the exit conference, University officials generally agreed with this finding and indicated that purchasing policies are currently being revised and the checking account in question will be closed.

The University asserts, however, that as a result of the signing of the fund transfer requisitions and the check by the Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs, the University's purchasing policies and procedures were adhered to by the University. The University maintains that all purchases from the checking account were approved by the Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs and that all requisitions for vehicles were signed and approved by the Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs and that the checks for the vehicles were signed and sent to the dealers by the Vice-President.

In response to the recommendations below, the University plans to implement or has made the following changes in its policies and procedures, as well as taking actions as set forth below, all as represented by the University:

- closing the checking account of the Director of the Physical Plant;
- reconciliation of all purchases made from the checking account has been carried out through December, 1989, with purchases over the remaining period in the process of being reconciled;
- all items purchased through the checking account have been accounted for through physical inventory and are in the possession of the University for its sole use; and,

Finding No. 1 - (Continued)

. corrective measures to require all employees to adhere to the established purchasing policies and procedures, including the separation of the Director of the Physical Plant from any involvement with the Purchasing Department or purchasing.

Recommendation

The University should:

- . Close the checking account established for the Director of Physical Plant.
- . Reconcile all purchases made from this account and perform a physical inventory of these purchases.
- . Require all employees to adhere to the established purchasing policies and procedures.

In order to assure adequate internal control, all purchasing should be processed through the Purchasing Department in accordance with established purchasing policies and procedures.

Finding No. 2 - Lincoln University did not Enforce Current Travel Reimbursement Policies and Procedures

Lincoln University's travel expenses for the year ended June 30, 1989, did not comply with the university's travel policies and procedures:

- . \$11,200 in travel advances were not properly accounted for by the employees who received them.
- . Travel expense statements were not always submitted timely.

Also, Lincoln University's travel policies do not provide the University with adequate assurance that only legitimate travel expenses are reimbursed and all travel advances are reconciled in a timely manner.

Travel Advances

Travel advances are not always reconciled. Employees can get advances for travel expenses as often as they are needed. When the employee submits a travel expense statement to the University listing his expenses for a period of time he must list any advances he has received and subtract them from his total. The employee is not required to submit documentation for the advance. Advances are not reviewed and reconciled by the University to determine which are outstanding and which have been reconciled.

One employee received approximately \$8,000 in advances during fiscal 1989 without accounting for or reconciling them. Another employee received approximately \$3,200 of advances in excess of travel expenses submitted. The total substantially accounts for the \$11,200, set forth in the first paragraph of the Finding.

A good system of internal control would require the business office to reconcile all advances monthly, and identify all employees who have outstanding balances.

Expense Statements

Expense statements are not always submitted timely because the University has not enforced the established deadlines for submission. (e.g. we noted November expenses that were submitted in March).

In response to the Recommendation set forth below, the University has represented that it has established a policy whereby no employee may be advanced money if prior advances have not been fully accounted for or reconciled to actual expenses through submitted expense reports.

Recommendation

Lincoln University should establish new travel policies and procedures, including the following controls:

. Travel expenses should not be reimbursed unless an employee has submitted the proper documentation. This documentation should be submitted monthly and no later than 30 days after the month's end.

Finding No. 2 - (Continued)

- . Travel advances should be reconciled monthly.
- . Outstanding travel advances should be limited and no additional advances given until the employee properly accounts for prior advances and expenses.

Finding No. 3 - Inadequate Control Over Fixed Assets

In our prior audit for the year ended June 30, 1985, we recommended that Lincoln University conduct a complete physical inventory of fixed assets and prepare a detailed plant ledger to assure that only fixed assets still in existence are included in the financial statements. A plant ledger providing a detailed record of fixed asset expenditures is still not being maintained. Our review revealed the following deficiencies.

A Detailed Plant Ledger For All Fixed Assets Does Not Exist

The University does not have a detailed plant ledger which reflects the actual status of property and equipment. The purchasing department has recently installed a computerized system which identifies fixed assets, their location and their equipment tag number. However, this system only includes assets purchased in the last four years and does not identify equipment and furnishings that are still carried on the general ledger, whether usable or obselete.

Periodic Physical Inventory Of Fixed Assets Is Not Performed

The University does not perform physical inventories of fixed assets. Equipment listings are submitted to the various University departments for their review. However, no physical inspections are made. Periodic physical inventories are necessary to confirm the presence of fixed assets.

Not All Fixed Assets Are Properly Tagged And Insured

Some fixed asset purchases were not tagged or recorded in the plant ledger. Some purchased items were delivered directly to the requesting department, thereby bypassing the University receiving department. Unless the receiving department is made aware of the purchase, the asset is not tagged or recorded in the ledger. Consequently, if an asset is not entered into the ledger it is not included in the updated insurance coverage. This is so because insurance policies are updated using the fixed asset ledger.

Recommendation

In order to strengthen controls over fixed assets the Vice-President of Finance should:

- . Develop a detailed plant ledger.
- . Require all fixed asset purchases be delivered to and tagged by the receiving department.
- Perform an annual physical inventory of fixed assets with emphasis towards movable, high dollar items such as personal computers, video cassette recorders, televisions, and other items.

Finding No. 3 - (Continued)

. Develop quarterly listings of all purchases over \$500, in accordance with the captial assets policy, and verify that the items are tagged and properly recorded for insurance purposes.

At the exit conference, University officials agreed with this finding and resulting recommendations. They indicated that bids were solicited for firms to perform a comprehensive physical inventory. Once the inventory is performed, the recommendations will be implemented.

Finding No. 4 - Lincoln University Does Not Prepare Financial Statements in a Timely Manner

Lincoln University receives approximately 50% of their operating funds from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania through the Commonwealth Appropriations Acts. This grant averaged \$6,500,000 per year for the four years ended June 30, 1989. The Commonwealth Appropriation Act states in Section 4 (A):

"Not later than 120 days after the close of the fiscal year to which this act relates, Lincoln University shall file with the Secretary of Education, the General Assembly, and the Auditor General of the Commonwealth a statement setting forth the amounts and purposes of all expenditures made from moneys appropriated by this act and costs, as proved in Section 2, used as a basis for receipt of any appropriation during said fiscal year."

Lincoln University did not issue their financial statements within 120 days after the fiscal year (i.e. by October 30) for the four fiscal years of our audit period. Lincoln University did not comply with the Appropriations Act. For the past four years, Lincoln University has issued their financial statements on the following dates:

In order for financial statements to be a useful tool for management, they must be prepared in a timely manner. Future plans and goals cannot be properly set or assessed without current accurate financial data.

The University's accounting system, specifically their year-end closing process, does not appear adequate to produce the financial statements by the October 30th due date.

Recommendation

Lincoln University should improve their year-end accounting procedures and closing process to ensure that financial statements are issued timely and in accordance with the Commonwealth Appropriations Act.

Lincoln University should consult with their independent CPA firm to determine what improvements and systems changes are needed by the University to issue the financial statements in a timely manner.

At the exit conference, University officials agreed with this finding and the above recommendations.

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY

STATUS OF PRIOR YEARS' FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY STATUS OF PRIOR YEARS' FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The following is a brief summary of the findings and recommendations contained in our June 30, 1985 audit report, along with a description of the subsequent course of action taken. The status of each recommendation was determined by either one, or a combination of, the following procedures:

- . Review of the University's written responses to the June 30, 1985 audit report;
- . Tests performed as a part of or in conjunction with the June 30, 1986, 1987, 1988 and 1989 audit;
- . Discussion with appropriate University personnel.

Finding No. 1 - Housing for Certain Employees and Faculty Members Costs the University \$157,577 in Excess of Rental Income for the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 1985

A total of 25 employees and faculty members reside in 16 University owned houses or apartments. For the year ended June 30, 1985 total expenses exceeded tenant reimbursement by \$157,577. The total expenses included both direct and indirect charges. We recommended that the University charge all employees and faculty members a rental income which at least covers all direct and indirect costs incurred to maintain the housing. We also recommend that the University adhere to the requirements of the United States Department of the Treasury's Internal Revenue Service concerning housing provided to employees and faculty members.

Subsequent Action

Our current audit revealed that the University had rental appraisals performed on the properties in question and is charging employees rent based on those appraisals.

Finding No. 2 - Inadequate Control Over Fixed Assets

The general ledger has not been updated to reflect equipment and furnishings which were sold, traded in, retired, stolen, or missing. Physical inventories of equipment and furnishings are not completed periodically. Weaknesses exist in the tagging and ensuring of fixed assets. We recommended that the University establish a computerized system for fixed asset control and perform a physical inventory of all fixed assets.

Subsequent Action

Our current audit revealed the same problem still exists. Lincoln University still has inadequate control over fixed assets. (See Finding No. 4 for details).
