FBI FOIPA Addendum

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia.website.
- (ii) Intelligence Records. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records is itself a classified fact protected by FOIA exemption (b)(1) and/or would reveal intelligence sources, methods, or activities protected by exemption (b)(3) [50 USC § 3024(i)(1)]. - (ii) **FBI Records.** Founded in 1908, the FBI carries out a dual law enforcement and national security mission. As part of this dual mission, the FBI creates and maintains records on various subjects; however, the FBI does not maintain records on every person, subject, or entity.
- (iii) Requests for Criminal History Records or Rap Sheets. The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division provides Identity History Summary Checks often referred to as a criminal history record or rap sheet. These criminal history records are not the same as material in an investigative "FBI file." An Identity History Summary Check is a listing of information taken from fingerprint cards and documents submitted to the FBI in connection with arrests, federal employment, naturalization, or military service. The mission of NNCP is to analyze and report information in response to name check requests received from federal agencies, for the purpose of protecting the United States from foreign and domestic threats to national security. - (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.

NICHOLS TO FROM Glav SUBJECT: MISS KATHERINE MURPHY HALLE Nicho Harbo Pursuant to your instructions Special Agent on July 24, 1951, recontacted Miss Kay Halle, 1534 29th Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C. You will recall that in a notation on my memorandum of July 17, 1951, the Director stated that this must be promptly followed up, referring to the radio program broadcast by Miss Halle over Station WJR at Detroit, June 15, 1951. At that time, Miss Halle told a story, How Absurd Can We Get?" to the effect that an FBI Agent held up a security investigation of a Naval officer unnecessarily for a period of six months with the result that the Naval officer was prevented from getting an important job "until the foolishness was put straight." The point of the story was that the investigating officer unnecessarily prolonged the investigation because the Naval officer's yearbook referred to him as being born "under to radical sign." actually a reference to the mathematical genius of the Naval officer. >6 When contacted on July 24, 1951, Miss Halle informed SA that she had not called him at the Bureau because she had misplaced Ther notation of his telephone extension number. Miss Halle said that on checking back on the veracity of the story which she had broadcast, her immediate source (whom she did not identify) went back to the person who told him the story in the first place (she does not know the name of this latter person). Th result was that Miss Halle is convinced in her own mind that the A "Absurd Story" should have involved an ONI investigator. words, she said, the investigator who unnecessarily prolonged the security investigation was a ONI representative and not an FBI representative, as was erroneously related in her broadcast of June 15, 1951.

Miss Halle stated that it is entirely agreeable with her for the Bureau, in answering inquiries concerning her June 15, 1951, broadcast, to say that Miss Halle has been contacted in the matter and that, on recontacting her sources, it was immediately determined that the investigative agency involved was actually ONT and not the FBI.

Miss Halle also said, if she can "weave it in", she will attempt to make a correction on the occasion of a future broadcast. She pointed out that this might be difficult for her to accomplish, because

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her radio broadcasts are devoted to a different, unrelated topic on each occasion. She said that she would, nevertheless, make every effort to correct the error in her June 15, 1951, broadcast on the occasion of a future broadcast.

Miss Halle was thanked for her cooperation in this matter. She was invited to contact the Bureau at any future date should she rdesire information concerning the work of the FBI, and she said she would be happy to do so.

(5) As soon as further particulars are obtained, in a day or two, she will notify Special Agent at the Bureau. b70 (She declared that she is interested, also, in establishing the truth of the story she broadcast.)

Miss Halle said she should not have used the story without advance verification, but she took it as being pertinent to "the situation today when persons interviewed by government investigators make exaggerated statements through hysteria or excitement." She said she is disturbed over the "fear and embarrassment" suffered by persons who are being subjected to security checks. For example, she mentioned a recent conversation with John Davies and Washington Post editor Elliston regarding the anguish suffered by Davies on account of investigations into his status as a security risk. Miss Halle was asked if she was referring to FBI security investigations and she emphatically denied this.

Miss Halle also referred to another matter involving the Secretary of Defense office where a security investigation was being conducted of a man who was being considered for employment in the Public Relations Office of that Department. The appointment allegedly was being held up because the applicant was reported to have performed a mock marriage ceremony in Greek language between two gold fish at a New Year's Eve party. Miss Halle was asked whether the FBI was mentioned in that connection and she said such was not the case.


Miss Halle asked concerning the role of the FBI in subversive investigations of individuals being considered for employment and she was told that the FBI is a fact-finding agency which makes no recommendations or evaluations as to qualifications, but merely reports the facts to the interested agency for their own consideration. It was pointed out to her that the FBI's jurisdiction in these matters is defined by Federal law and by Presidential directives.

Miss Halle said that our inquiry into the radio broadcast is evidence of Bureau efficiency. She expressed high regard for the Director whom she said she has met a few times.

ACTION:

Miss Halle will be followed on her promise to obtain and furnish further particulars.

Four office is instructed to initiate a discreet investigation of the subject, but under no circumstances are you to make any open contacts regarding her. Your investigation accordingly will be confined to obtaining information in her regard, from established reliable sources. Your promptness in submitting the results of your survey is desired.

You will recall that SAC O'Connor advised Mr. McGuire on July 2, 1951, that he understood Kay Halle in a recorded broadcast heard over WJR at Detroit on June 15, 1951, related a story under the caption "How Absurd Can We Get," which was derogatory to the Bureau. O'Connor was requested to obtain a copy of the transcription and to furnish the Bureau with information regarding Miss Halle's present whereabouts so we could set her straight. The Director agreed. The Detroit Office advises that Miss Halle resides at 1534 29th Street, Northwest, Washington 7, D. C., and that she is a reporter for Station WGAR, Cleveland, Ohio, and Station WJR, Detroit, Michigan, having acted in that capacity for the past 12 She is a sister of the Halle brothers who operate a large department store in Cleveland. Miss Halle is a free lance reporter accredited in Congress and in the Senate and has been described by the Publicity Director of WJR as one "quite liberal in thought" and that she is a friend of the Dean Acheson, Averell Harriman and Drew Pearson crowd. Further, that she is very much pro-Democratic and pro-Administration and anti-MacArthur and anti-Republican. Since she is financially independent her reporting activities are more or less something just to keep her occupied. Bureau files $reflect\ that$ She is very well known in Washington in high social levels and in government circles.

She is frequently seen contacting Congressmen and Senators at the Capitol and often attends cocktail parties with high government 学品是 officials, cabinet members, et cetera. Referral/Consult Miss Halle made a tour of the Bureau on April 13, 1950, with her brother, Walter Halle, and his wife. This tour was arranged by the White House, at which time the Bureau was advised that Miss Halle was a Cleveland radio commentator, a reporter of the United Press and a holder of a White House press pass. The exact story related by Miss Halle on June 15, 1951, is as follows:

There is no question that Miss Halle's story is prejudicial to the Bureau. A letter to her is attached asking her for specifics.

No further action is contemplated in this Division and officials of WJR above mentioned were advised that my inquiry was confidential.

After waiting over half a year, it was finally discovered what had been holding him In his college year book, the editor, knowing that he was the mathematical genius of the class, chose as the most apt phrase under his picture in the book, a well-known mathematical term. It said that he was born under a radical sign. Now, the FBI Agent, who had to go back in the past of this Naval historian, evidently had not passed his own mathematics course and hadn't heard of square roots and radical signs, and took the statement to mean something else, but that one innocent line kept the Naval officer from an important job until the foolishness was put straight. I repeat... How absurd can we get?

While discussing another matter with SAC O'Connor, Detroit, telephonically this morning, Mr. O'Connor advised that there was a news commentator named Kay Haley who is related to the owners of Haley's Department Store in Cleveland, Ohio, who apparently records her comments and then furnishes the recordings to various radio stations. He had just heard that in a recording which Radio Station WJR used on June 15th, Miss Haley told of an incident under the caption "How Absurd Can We Get," which dealt with an unnamed Navy officer in Washington, D. C. who supposedly had been selected for a job requiring an FBI security check and that it took six months for the check to be made. The commentator indicated that the NAvy officer, a mathematical wizard, had been written up in his college magazine as having been born under radical signs and that an FBI Agent assigned to the investigation, who had apparently never passed his own mathematics courses when he was at school, did not appreciate the meaning of square roots and radical signs and read into the statement attributed to the Navy officer by his classmates at college an import of subversive

O'Connor was instructed to obtain through his contacts at Radio Station WJR further information as to the identity of Kdy Haley, who she represents, and where she is located.

I think this is something that should be run down in order that the case can be identified and Miss Haley set straight, as it is obviously a dirty crack at the Bureau if untrue. This matter will be followed with the Detroit Office.

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

C. She reportedly has many contacts among newspapermen, including Drew Pearson. She presently is the subject of a Bureau case, investigation of which was predicated on data indicating that she might be connected with British Intelligence. b1 (S) COMMENDATIONS: It is recommended that Halle be interviewed concerning Zinchuk with the view of obtaining any pertinent information which she might have an her possession or which she may be able to develop in the future BNOL, It is also recommended that the afore-mentioned contact with Halle be utilized for the purpose of developing information concerning her own activities, bearing in mind that the is the subject of a pending case. 

DETAILS: AT WASHINGTON, D. C.:

This investigation is predicated on information furnished October 13, 1953, to SA ARTHUR J. HOWE by Confidential Informant T-1 whose reliability is unknown but who holds a responsible executive position in an agency of the Federal Government. T-1 prefaced his comments of Miss KATHERINE MURPHY HALLE, known more generally as KAY HALLE, with the statement that he could not make any specific allegations of espionage activity on the part of Miss HALLE, but he asserted he had a "gradually accumulated" impression she was working for British Intelligence and obviously more concerned with the welfare of Great Britain than of the United States.

Describing her home — located at 1534-29th Street, N. W., Washington, D.C., telephone number, DEcatur 2-5040 — as "a fashionable Washington society saloon", T-1 advised he had visited there on a number of occasions, but he had avoided her parties within the last few years. However, T-1 indicated a knowledge that Miss HALLE has continued to entertain lavishly for officials of the Department of State, British Embassy, and as well for pro-British writers in the United States.

T-1 continued that he was certain the intelligence service of the British operated in Washington against top-level personnel of the United States Government, and T-1 said he was certain her prominence in Washington society was a "tool, channel, or at least a fruitful source" through which much of their (British) information was obtained. T-1 expressed the belief that Miss HALLE's parties were "merely an extension of the British social lobby" and that the "pattern for intelligence" was so definite it presented a security weakness to our country. In this regard, T-1 advised he had attended many Washington parties but only at Miss HELLE's affairs has informant had the uneasy feeling that the primary purpose of the function was to elicit information on Government affairs. T-1 said with her using liquor, physical and mental charm, and flattery, Miss HALLE was very skillful in obtaining information, and T-1 said he had detected a "co-ordinated, directed effort, led by Miss HALIE and assisted in by British Embassy personnel, to pump American officials ef top-level security information." T-1 recalled that on occasions when he was in attendance at Miss HALLE's parties, he tried to direct the conversation to confidential aspects of British foreign policy upon which the British officials usually 'clammed-up' and Miss HALLE skillfully directed attention to other matters.



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Although T-1 said he had not detected any specific topics of interest, and he was non-specific on individual secrets revealed, he stated a tremendous amount of confidential internal security and United States foreign policy information was discussed openly at Miss HALLE's affairs, with each United States official trying to 'out-do' the other in revealing classified matters. T-1 said he recently had been advised from undisclosed sources that representatives of a security and intelligence agency of the Federal Government were frequenting the HALLE affairs in great number and that some, whose positions in that agency should be covert, had let it be known where they were employed and what foreign assignments they anticipated.

Informant T-1 went on to relate he had ascertained on "reasonably good authority", not disclosed, that Miss HALLE for a time was the paramour of WILLIAM AVERTILL MARRIMAN (recent Director of Director of Mutual Security Agency under former President TRUMAN); that she also had been intimate with DAVID BRUCE (DAVID ELUKI BRUCE, former Under-D.C. Secretary of State under ex-President TRUMAN); and T-1 recalled Miss HALLE was rumored to have had an affair with RANDOLPHACHURCHILL, son of the British Prime Minister, WINSTON CHURCHILL.

as 1944, some informants holding responsible positions of authority in the Federal Government expressed some distrust of Miss HALLE although no specific allegations reflecting in an unfavorable light were made against her. In this connection, Confidential Informant T-2, a reliable informant, advised the Bureau on October 10, 1944, he had been advised by another source, Confidential Informant T-3; whose reliability is unknown, that T-3 considered Miss HALLE a suspicious person and had observed she (then) constantly was entertaining service men, in uniform, in her apartment then located at 1608-19th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. No further information was available from T-2 to indicate any additional basis for the suspicions of Miss HALLE, held by Informant T-3.

On February 7, 1949, the Bureau was advised by Confidential Informant T-4,

ZINCHUK, former Second Secretary at the Russian Embassy arranged for July 31, 1951, at the Mayflower Hotel - to be attended by JEAN DAVIDSON of France Presse, Miss HALLE, HENRI De TURENNE of France Presse, and M. S. VAVIIOV and ZINCHUK, both of the Soviet Embassy. In connection with an investigation captioned, "HENRI De TURENNE, aka, Espionage - R" (Bufile 65-60879; WFO file 65-5158) conducted by this office in 1953, the Bureau, by letter January 28, 1953, to Cleveland and WFO, furnished identifying data concerning JANE HALLE CRILE and her husband, Dr. GEORGE CRILE, Jr. In the same case Cleveland by letter March 17, 1953, furnished the results of an interview with JANE HALLE CRILE concerning HENRI De TURENNE about whom she stated she knew very little since she met him on approximately two occasions, socially, while visiting in Washington.



Her mother was identified as BLANCHE MURPHY HALLE who was born in Phitsburgh; Pennsylvania March 5, 1874; then living also, at the same Cleveland address. Miss HALLE listed her brothers and sisters as including these;

Concerning financial background, Miss HATLE indicated she was not dependent on a salary but had other income from investments and securities; also, that she banked with Cleveland Trust Company and Union Bank of Commerce.

With reference to education, Miss HALLE set out that she attended the Laurel School impluding High School at Shaker Heights, Cleveland, Ohio; obtained her High School diploma through attendance from October 1920 - 1921 at Miss WHEELER's School, Providence, Rhode Island; and from October 1921-1922 attended Smith College, Northampton, Massachusetts.

In a resume of her employment experience she listed these:

- 1930 to 1931 Columnist for Cleveland News, writing a round-up column in London.
- to 1914 Feature writer for Cleveland Press, doing special interviews, spries, and articles under supervision of LOUIS SELTZER, Editor.
- 1939 to 1943 Radio commentator for WGAR, Hotel Statler, Cleveland, Ohio under supervision of JOHN PATT, doing bi-weekly radio commentary and





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musical commentary for Cleveland Orchestra over C.B.S. network under supervision of CARL GEORGE.

Tisting her places of residence for ten years preceding 1944, Miss HALLE noted the following:

The 1944 application for employment also showed Miss HALLE had no religious affiliation and she indicated membership in: United Nations Club, 1701-19th Street, Washington, D. C.; Junior League, Cleveland, Ohio; and in the League of Women Voters, Cleveland, Ohio.

the writer examined on November 30, 1953, a credit report dated July 28, 1948, on Miss KATHERINE M. HALLE, also known as KAY HALLE, residing then (1948) at 1534-29th Street, N. W., since July 6, 1946. It was indicated she came to Washington in 1943 from her home in Cleveland, Ohio, formerly lived at 1608-19th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. It was further stated Miss HALLE is a member of the HALLE family in Cleveland, well known in Cleveland, Ohio, business and social circles, as the HALLE family owned and operated Halle Brothers Company, a multi-million dollar department store. It also stated Miss HALLE had done radio commentary work; had written newspaper articles and was reported to have a private income from family holdings. It also stated she was employed by OLS.S. as a Project Specialist from May, 1944 until resignation in December, 1945. The credit report also stated her father, SAMUEL HALLE was a Director and General Manager of Halle Brothers Company. It is noted the 1953





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edition of Poor's Register of Directors and Executives listed SAMJEL H. HALLE as Chairman of the Board of Directors of Halle Brothers Company, 1228 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio. The same directory listed WAITER M. HALLE as President, General Manager, and a Director of Halle Brothers Company.

It will be recalled that previously in this report, FRANCIS MASHERWIN was identified as a brother-in-law of Miss HALLE, and the husband of MARGARET HALLE SHERWIN. As a matter of information, this Bureau in August, 1947, instituted an applicant-type investigation concerning FRANCIS M. SHERWIN, and inquiry by this office with reference to his military service disclosed nothing derogatory. It was noted according to a personal history questionnaing SHERWIN, born at Cleveland, Ohio, March 7, 1906, received his military discharge November 5, 1945, with the rank of Major, U. S. Army; and as of May, 1947 was President of Brush Beryllium Company of Cleveland. In a report dated December 26, 1944, prepared by the Credit Bureau, Washington, D. C., reviewed by the writer December 1, 1953, FRANCIS M. SHERWIN, then a L eutenant in the U. S. Army, was reported on active duty at the Pentagon; was stated formerly to have been Assistant Treasurer of the Cleveland Trust Company, Cleveland, Ohio. In Washington, SHERWIN and his wife resided at 2620 Foxhall Road and later at 1904 R Street, N. W.

In a Credit Bureau report dated July 3, 1945 reviewed by the writer December 1, 1953, ANN HALLE LITTLE and her husband, ROBERT AMDREE LITTLE, were reported as residing at 6418 Western Avenue, Chevy Chase, Maryland. LITTLE was stated to have been born September 9, 1918, originally from Cambridge, Massachusetts; and married in 1940 to ANN HALLE, who was stated to be independently wealthy as a result of a trust fund set up by her father, SAMUEL H. HALLE who had established similar funds for all his children. As of the date of this credit report LITTLE had been employed two and one-half years in civilian status in Intelligence Division, U. S. Army Air Corps. It was stated LITTLE was an architect, formerly had taught at Harvard University and at Smith College.

As has been set forth by the Bureau previously in another unrelated matter, JANE HALLE CRIE, sister of Miss KAY HALLE, is the wife of Dr. GEORGE CRILE, Jr., son of the famous Dr. GEORGE (WASHINGTON). AGRILE, Surgeon and founder of the Cleveland Clinic Foundation. Dr. GEORGE CRIE, Jr., resides at 2060 Kent Road, Cleveland, Ohio.







It is recalled that previously in this report, reference was made to JAX HOVESTONE who was one of the founders and top officials in the Communist Party in the United States until he was expelled from the Party in 1929. From 1929 until 1940 IOVESTONE was leader of the Communist Party opposition group later known as the Independent Labor League. During this latter period, LOVESTONE appealed for Communist Party unity and failed in his attempts to return to the Party. Since then, IOVESTONE has been active in American labor organizations, particularly in the international labor activities of the American Federation of Labor.

In connection with an investigation conducted by this
Bureau in a security matter unrelated to instant case. Confidential
Informant T-8, a reliable informant, advised that asof January 9, 1951,
while registered at the Statler Hotel in Washington, D. Co. JAY
IOVESTONE was observed to meet a woman in the lobby of the Statler
Hotel on the evening of January 9, 1951. They were observed to
talk for a few minutes; then, IOVESTONE and the woman proceeded by
cab to the Three Musketeers Restaurant at 818 Connecticut Avenue,
N. W. and had dinner. Following this IOVESTONE and the woman proceeded by cab to the residence at 1534-29th Street, N. W., Washington,
D. C. Current city and telephone directories (1951) listed this
address as the residence of Miss KATHERINE M. HALLE, and T-8 has
stated later this unknown woman was identified by photograph as
being Miss HALLE.

It may be of additional interest to note that Confidential Informant T-9, a reliable informant, advised Special Agent MAICOIM P. CARR in March, 1952, that JAY IOVESTONE registered at the Hay-Adams House Hotel on March 6, 1952. T-9 further advised SA CARR that between March 6, 1952 and March 9, 1952, IOVESTONE made a number of telephone calls from his hotel room, and included in the calls was one telephone call made March 8, 1952 to the number DEcatur 5040, then listed to KAY HALLE, 1534-29th Street, N. 7., Washington, D. C.

In the period of October, 1947 to June, 1948, some inquiry was conducted by this office concerning Community Educational Group, also known as Community Organization Group, and Community Education Incorporated of Washington, D. C. That investigation disclosed the organization was chartered in the District of Columbia in October, 1945 as a non-profit educational institution in the arts and sciences. On October 30, 1947, Confidential Informant T-10, a reliable informant, furnished to SA WIIFRED L. BERGERON a printed publication or







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pamohlet of this organization which occupied premises at 935 G Place, N. W.; Washington, D. C. It was noted this pamphlet or official publication listed the names of sponsors and contributors to Community Education and included in the names solisted was the name, Miss KAY HAILE, not otherwise identified. In addition, it was noted that on Page 28 of the Washington Daily News dated June 1917, there appeared an article captioned, "The School on G. Place", and this article described the activities of Community Education and as well listed names of sponsors. It was observed this newspaper article listed among names of sponsors the name, Miss KAY HAILE, not otherwise identified.

According to Confidential Informant T-12, of known reliability Miss HALTE in September, 1949 contacted TADEUSZ JAWORSKI, First [1] Secretary of the Polish Embassy. T-12 said this contact was in line with Miss HALLE's plans for a series of Television shows for American Broadcasting Company, and she planned to include an interview with Ambassador JOZEF WINIEWICZ in a series of visits with various Ambassadors at their embassies.

Confidential Informant T-13, a reliable informant, furnished information concerning activities and associates of ALEXAMDER I.

ZINCHUK, former Second Secretary at the Soviet Embassy who was working in the Press Division. Informant recalled that in October, 1949, ZINCHUK extended an invitation to Miss HALLE to attend the Russian October Revolution Cellbration held at the Soviet Embassy on November 7, 1949. Miss HALLE accepted the invitation and indicated she had some items she wanted to discuss with Ambassador A. S. FANYUSHKIW Informant also stated Miss HALLE received an invitation to attend the same function in 1950 and in connection therewith, JEANYPAVIDSON of France Presse contacted ZINCHUK making inquiry whether Miss HALLE also could bring her sister, Mrs. MARGARET SHERWIN to the 1950 Reception. Informant stated ZINCHUK was agreeable to this request and indicated an invitation also would be extended for Miss HALLE's sister.







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Informent T-13 recalled that in December, 1950, JEAN
DAVISON invited ZINCHUK to attend a luncheon where ZINCHUK would
meet WALTER LIPPMAN, at the home of KAY HALLE. ZINCHUK accepted
this luncheon invitation, according to T-13, and informant also
stated that in July, 1951, ZINCHUK invited JEAN DAVIDSON, HENRI
De TURENNE (France Presse Correspondent) and Miss HALLE to lunch
at the Mayflower Hotel with him and MIKHAIL S. VAVILOV, Counselor
of the Soviet Embassy.

With reference to the luncheon held at her home in December, 1950, attended by ZINCHUK, Confidential Informant T-ll, another Government agency, advised that Miss HALLE had reported to this informant, details of the luncheon meeting with ZINCHUK, JEAN DAVILSON, and WAITER LIPPMAN. She advised ZINCHUK's conversation was along stereotyped lines; that militarization of Russia and its aggressive acts were all defensive, based on threat of Western aggression; also, he touched briefly on his travels in the United States, visiting San Francisco, Chicago and Cleveland. HALLE said, in rebuttal, LIPPMAN warned ZINCHUK that any apparent disunity within the United States was misleading in the extreme and that in the event of war, this country would be completely united with results that would be disastrous to the Soviet Union.

According to Confidential Informant T-15, a reliable informant, Miss HAILEA'S an acquaintance of ANDREXVISSON, roving editor of "Reader's Digest" magazine. T-15 recalled that in November, 1949, while accompanying VISSON, KAY HAILE advised VISSON she was going to India with HERBERT ELLISTON of the Washington Post newspaper to attend a meeting of the Institute of Pacific Relations at New Delhi, India.

On December 3, 1953, Confidential Informant T-16, a representative of another Government department, advised the writer that so far as he could ascertain, Miss HALLE had been away from her Washington Residence for an extended period of time and that the house was under the care of a maid. Confidential Informant T-17, a reliable informant, advised the writer on December 3, 1953, Miss HALLE was in Europe but might be expected to return to her home in Cleveland, Ohio for the (then) forthcoming holiday season.

Files of the Passport Office, Department of State, reviewed by the writer December 2, 1953, disclosed the following:

(First Tassport)

KATHERINE MURPHY HALLE first applied for a passport on August 22, 1923. It was indicated she was born at Cleveland, Chio, October 13, 1903; the daughter of SAMUEL H. HALLE, also born in Cleveland. On August 29, 1923, she was issued a passport, number 836168 to visit the British Isles, France, Belgium, Holland, Switzer land, and Germany for one year for the purpose of touring and travel.

(Second Passport)

Her second Passport, No. 321222 was issued January 28, 1927, to enable her to visit "all countries" for two years for "Pleasure and travel."

(Third Passport)

A third passport, No. 410546 was issued on June 22, 1931, to KATHERINE M. HALLE of 2163 Harcourt Drive, Cleveland Heights, Ohio, for the purpose of visiting all countries for "travel" for two years. At New York on September 25, 1933, this passport was renewed for two years, to enable her to depart from New York September 26, 1933, on the SS "Europa."

(Fourth Passport)

On July 6, 1937, at New York City, KATHERINE MURPHY HALLE applied for her fourth passport indicating she desired to go abroad four months for pleasure to visit England, France, Austria, and Italy. Passport No. 457593 was issued to her July 8, 1937. It was requested that this passport be mailed to her New York City address, Hotel Elysse, 60 East 54th Street. She showed her permanent residence address to be 2163 Harcourt Drive, Cleveland, Ohio. On October 23, 1940, she applied for a renewal of this passport, indicating she desired to depart by plane from Brownsville, Texas, on November 9, 1940, to travel one month in Brazil, Venezuela, Chile, Peru, and Argentina. Passport No. 457593 was renewed and made valid only for travel in the Western Hemisphere, to expire July 8, 1941.

(Fifth Passport)

On May 1, 1941, KATHERINE MURPHY HALLE obtained her fifth passport, No. 685320 for the purpose of visiting Bermuda for pleasure.

By letter July 4, 1944, over the signature of WILLIAM A. KIMBEL, Special Assistant to the Director, Office of Strategic Services, Washington, D. C., the Passport Office was requested to issue a Special Passport to KATHERINE MURPHY HALLE. An accompanying memo indicated she was born in Cleveland, Ohio, October 13, 1903, and educated from Kindergarten through High School at the Laurel School in Cleveland. Later attended one year at Miss WHEELER's School in Providence, Rhode Island, one year at Smith College, and then two or three years at the Cleveland Institute of Music in the Piano department. In addition, it was stated she took winter courses at Cleveland College in comparative European literature. It was set out that Miss HALLE wrote columns for the Cleveland News; worked one year in London in 1931, writing a London Letter for that paper; also contributed a column in 1936-1937 for the Paul Block chain of newspapers and as well wrote free lance articles for "Spur," "Today" magazine and for the magazine section of the New York Times; also wrote special feature articles in 1938-43 for the Cleveland Press. This memorandum also stated Miss HALLE conducted bi-weekly radio programs of fifteen minute shows over Cleveland, Ohio, radio station W.G.A.R., a Columbia Broadcasting affiliate with those programs dealing with industry, civic affairs, and national and international matters. It further stated she took a trip around Latin America and broadcast back to Cleveland from ten or so of the capitals of the various republics; also had broadcasted from Cuba and Bermuda and Florida on trips. It also stated that in 1940-43 she acted as music commentator for the Cleveland Orchestra under Dr. RODZINSKI over the CBS network. The memo concluded with the statement Miss HALLE entered on duty with the Office of Strategic Services on May 15, 1944, and had been approved for overseas duty.

(Sixth Passport)

At Washington, D. C., on July 4, 1944, KATHERINE MURPHY HALLE applied for her sixth passport. On this application she indicated her permanent residence was 2163 Harcourt Drive, Cleveland,







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ohio; that her parents were SAMUEL HORATTO HALLE, born July 8, 1869 at Cleveland and BLANCHE MURPHY HALLE, born March 5, 1874, at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. She again indicated she never had been married. She also indicated she desired a passport to visit the British Isles for one year as an employee of the U. S. Government. It was requested the passport be mailed to her in care of Mrs. M. QUAY, 209 Central Building, 25th and E Streets, N. W., Washington, D. C. She was issued Special Passport No. 39306 July 22, 1944. An accompanying memo over the signature of FLETCHE WARREN, on stationery of the Office of Assistant Scretary, Department of State, indicated Miss HALLE in O.S.S. had been ordered to London. By memo from OIS.S. dated October 31, 1944, Special Passport No. 39306 was returned to the Passport Office.

(Seventh Passport)

On June 22, 1949, Miss HALLE applied for her seventh passport at Washington, D. C. She showed her permanent residence to be 1534-29th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. She indicated her occupation was "radio commentator" and she desired to depart from New York in Beptember or August" for a "month or two", visiting England, France, and Italy for "pleasure and possibly free lance writing She was issued Passport No. 110458 on June 27, 1949.

(Eighth Passport)

On September 25, 1953, at Cleveland, Ohio, KATHERINE MURPHY HALLE giving her permanent address as 2163 Harcourt Drive, Cleveland, Ohio, or 1534-29th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., again applied for her (eighth) passport. It was noted she showed her mother was deceased. She indicated she desired to depart from New York about the middle of October, 1953, by plane or by ship be visit for "several months" in "Italy, France, England, and perhaps other countries on the continent. She showed the trip was for "pleasure and perhaps a few articles for a newspaper." She was issued Passport No. 212050 on September 29, 1953. Mailing address for this passport was shown as 2163 Harcourt Drive, Cleveland.

The most recent passport application reflect this physical description:

. As you are aware your office is presently conducting an investigation of Halle, the daughter of a wealthy Cleveland family, who is active in Washington society and is suspected of being a source of information for the British Embassy.

You are authorized to contact Halle and to interview her in regard to Zinchuk. You should at the time of the original interview make no commitment to Halle urging her to resume her contact with Zinchuk but should make arrangements so that she will advise you the details of any contacts with Zinchuk that she may arrange on her own volition. It is believed that in

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discussing this situation with Halle, an opportunity may present itself for your office to obtain information concerning her own activities which would be of pertinent interest in regard to the investigation presently pending in regard to her. However, any inquiry of this nature should be handled discreetly. Following the interview with Halle, you should submit your recommendations to the Bureau as to what further action should be taken in regard to this matter and whether Halle might possibly be used to an advantage in regard to Zinchuk. You should also furnish to the Bureau any pertinent information in regard to Halle's own activities which are obtained during the interview. This matter should be handled by mature and experienced agents and should be assigned for attention in the immediate future.

representative and she was teld that any action she took was entirely up to her and that the Bureau was not in a position to advise her on the matter. She commented that if time would permit, she would supply to the Bureau a chronological account in memorandum form of her contacts with Zinchuk, Burgess, and Counselor Fedoseev. Miss Halle was told by Mr. Roach that any data she desired to supply would, of course, be of interest and would be made a matter of record: Miss Halle, who stated that she isupresently writing the newspaper column "This Week in Washington!" advised that on her next trip to Washington she was hopeful of dropping by the Bureau to see the Director.

As you know, Halle is presently the subject of a pending Bureau case. Investigation was predicated on data indicating that she might be connected with British Intelligence. It is known, however, that she has many newspaper men as contacts, including Drew Pearson. My previous memorandum suggested that Halle be interviewed concerning Zinchuk. This may not be necessary in view of the fact that she has offered to submit a chronological sketch of her contacts with Zinchuk, as well as with Burgess and Fedoseev.

Schlesinger's Record

Editor Plain Dealer-Sir: During World War II this correspondent served over two years in the para-military, secret intelligence agency known as OSS, the Office of Strategic Services, under Gen. "Wild Bill" Donovan. The OSS worked closely with the FBI and allied foreign intelligence units, becoming an authoritative source in the science of espionage, subversion and the history of treason,

Part of my assignment was serving as an executive with the propaganda and psychological warfare branch of OSS. Through the written word, broadcasts and rumors, that is to say, by the act of 'insinuendo' and the club of character assassination, we attempted to subvert the Nazi armed forces and the civilian population. An objective was to sow seeds of distrust between groups; to poison the minds of the people against their leaders; to instill in the Nazi fighting forces a distrust of their com-manders and in their fighting equipment. After destroying the morale and confidence of these targets, we hoped they would be softened up for the kill.

Now one of Gen. Donovan's most trusted and skilled staff members, who became an authority on the history and tactics of the Soviet Union, was Pulitzer prize winner Arthur Schlesinger, ir, now a noted professor of history at Harvard University. In addition to his teaching, Mr. Schlesinger has been prolific in his contributions to such nonleftist magazines as Collier's, Life, Saturday Review of Literature, Harper's, Atlantic Monthly and scores of others. His article on what makes an American Communist in the 7/29/49 issue of Life magazine, titled "The U. S. Communist Party," was surely as illuminating and revealing of the ideological threat to American democracy as any of the smearing and shooting from the hip tactics that honest, fair-minded Ameri-

cans deplore as a means of getting the facts.

Presently Prof. Schlesinger, chiefly because of his comprehensive knowledge of American history, is serving as research chief for Gov. Stevenson's presidential campaign in Springfield. In 1948 Mr. Schlesinger was one of a group of Democrats who tried to persuade Gen. Eisenhower to run as president on the Democratic ticket in place of President Tru-

So when the self-styled independent Cleveland Plain Dealer impugns the reputation of Prof. Schlesinger, calling him "a New, Deal propagandist who holds a job teaching 'history' at Harvard," this correspondent feels that a more rounded picture of his background should be presented to the Plain Dealer readers just to keep

the record straight.

And then there is this business of lumping certain government of ficials and consultants under the heading of followers of the "Communist-New Deal Line," a tag which the P. D. editorial staff seems currently to fancy. And this on the findings of the McCarran committee, not after conclusive legal evidence in a court of law. It makes the nostrils of this old veteran propaganda war horse quiver.

In the interest of morality, human decency and plain American justice, let us ban these boomerang tactics of subversion and guilt-by-association which often ends up as being as slippery as a watermelon seed under the finger of one who employs these means.

Happily, few Americans can be convincingly persuaded that we present danger from within, through the action of our policy makers.

On the occasion of Miss Halle's call she stated that she would send a memorandum regarding her dontacts with Zinchuk, Burgess, and another official of the Soviet Embassy. Miss Halle also inquired whether the Bureau felt it advisable for ther to keep up her contacts with the Soviet representatives. this occasion she was told that whatever action she wished to take was up to her and the Bureau was not in a position to advise her on the matter. "

There is attached a letter dated January 28, 1954, from Miss Halle to Mr. Roach written from her Cleveland, Ohio, address. This letter sets forth in some detail her contacts with Zinchuk and other Soviets, as well as a brief comment concerning her knowledge of Guy Burgess. The letter concludes by Miss Halle reneating her request for advice as to whether it would be wise or profitable for her to renew her acquaintance with Zinchuk.

ACTION:

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This memorandum should be referred to the Escionage Section in view of the fact that the Bureau has a pending espionare case on Miss Halle. In view of the fact that Miss Halle was previously told that the Bureau could not give her any advice regarding her continued contact with Zinchuk, a reply is not being given to her letter by Mr. Roach or by the Bureau. Should Miss. Halle call Mr. Roach again, the Bureau's position will be reiterated.

I am writing this letter PATE VOUT BY 202 chronological report of my few meetings with Mr. Alexander Zinchuk whom I met first in the early fall off 1949 when he was servinggas the Press Attache of the Soviet Embassy. I saw him altogether six times during 1950 when he served at the Embassy. He returned to Aussia that same year and I heard nothing more about him, even believing that he might have been relegated to the "salt mines" until this December when I received a Christmas card from him announcing that he had been reposted to Washington! I hesttated to acknowledge his card without some professional guidance, even though I amna member of the Press, because of the climate of this moment. Before thinking of renewing my acquaintance with him- which I thought could be profitable- I would like to record for you details as I remember them of our few meetings. I should also add that a few weeks ago an invitation was forwarded to me from my house in Washington, from the Counsellor of the Soviet Embassy inviting me to see a Soviet film on Jan 26th. It would appear that the present Soviet line is. "lets be human with the Americans", whatever that may presage.

To begin- I have lived most of my life in Cleveland where my Father founded the department Store, Halle Brothers Company. I left Cleveland in 1931 to spend a year in London. On my return I spent the winters of 1934 to 38 in a flat at the Elysee Hotel in New York and my summers with my parents in Cleveland, In 1938 I returned to Cleveland to live with my Parents. Beginning then I started my broadcasting career with a Columbia affiliate, Station WGAR with a series of bi-weekly programs of 15 minutesbroadcasts on KNOW YOUR CITY. For three years I also gave the intermission commentaries for the Cleveland Orchestra broadcasts which were carried over the entire CBS network and overseas. These jobs continued on through the first years of the War until 1943 when I lived intermittenly in Washington where I took over a flat belonging to my sister and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Little- at 1608 19th Street N.W.

After the War I moved into themall house in eorgetown, 1534 29th St. N. W. which I still rent, and continued my broadcasting career from Washington. The series was knwon as THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON and consisted of weekly interviews, behind the scenes interpretations, reports on White House, State Dept and Congressional hearings and Press conferences. They were taped in Washington and flown to Cleveland. On one broadcast I described what an October Revolution Party at the Soviet Embassy was like. Which brings me specificially to the point of this letter.

In the Autumn of 1949, realizing that I must evenutally expand my work into the field of TV-I devised a program idea which I submitted to friends in the Program Division of the major networks. was to be a weekly half hour televised show in which I as moderator would interview in the Embassies and Ministries in Washington the Ambassador, his wife endwhoever in each Embassy was most articulate and interesting. We would stress our mutual cultural and historical ties and NOT touch on current politics. I believed such a program could be/contribution to better understanding between nations and fortify the work of the UN. All the networks and State Dent. agreed that the idea was entertaining, educational and worth while, though it would be costly to produce. The State Department wondered whether the Iron Curtain Countries would cooperate with the idea and whether it might not give the Soviets a chance to propagandize. But we decided that the kind of program I envisaged would not give them such a chance. The question was, would they ever be approachable. The networks laid down the condition before giving a green light to my idea that I must get approval or cooperation from all Embassies and Ministries. This I did- naturally leaving the Soviet Embassy to the last. In approaching them I decided not to elicit advise from my colleagues on the Press on how to proceed. I called the Soviets cold, asking the onerator for the Press Attache, She asked who I was and I said no one she knew but that I had an idea for a TV show that I would like to discuss with the Press Attache. She then put me through to a Mr. Zinchuk who suggested that I come over the following day aroung ll in the morning. I keep all my engagements in fairly detailed form and though I have the dates on subsequent meetings with Mr. Z- I find that I forgot to record my first meeting and am unsure of the hour and day though I think it must have been late in September or early October,

of 1949.



In the meantime, that December 1949, I flew to India, Italy, Greece, France and Britian accompanying the Herbert Ellistons part of the way. He was as you know the former Editor of the Washington Post who is now Emeritus since his coronary thrombosis.

I returned to Washington late in February. On April 25, 1950 I lunched with members of the French Press and Mr Z at the Carleton Hotel. Nothing of much interest was discussed through Mr Z was much more talkative than he had been with me on my first interview with him in his office. I believe I wrote down some of that conversation in my notes that are in my house in Washington.

The next meeting with Mr Z was on the evening of October 26, 1950 when some of the French Press invited him to a supper picnic. On that occasion Mr Z. was subjected to some very tough and merciless questioning and some pretty critical attacks. was happening to artists and musicians and writers under the Soviet regime- indeed science and what about Stalin who was becoming more and more God-like in a state that said it repudiated religion and the worship of a human being? in an "egalitarian" state? Mr Z remained impassive and poised throughout the debate. he spoke of the loneliness of the Soviets in Washington and how debilitating was the climate of Washington to people used to the north. I remember asking him if he wasn't bery high up in the MKVD as he always arrived unaccompanied whereas his colleagues always seemed to go about in pairs. He merely smiled. My French colleagues told me that on another occasion when they had invited some Soviet representatives to a similar picnic in the country they arrived with a chauffeur. When meal time arrived the French hosts suggested the chauffuer join them at table "in true Soviet "democratic" fashion". They were told off by the Soviet representatives saying it was impossible as it was the job of the chauffeur to keep constant vigilance over the car!

I next saw Mr Z for a moment at the next October Revolution Party- November 7th 1950. In the meantime I had told Mr. Walter Liboman of my impressions of Mr. Z. Walter said that during the tenure of Litvinov and his successor whose name escapes me, as Ambassadors to the Soviet Embassy in Washington, he used to be invited to small as well as larger gatherings there. But, he said, in recent years he had been off their list, he suggested that it might be profitable to invite him and Mr Z to lunch one time. Never thinking Mr Z would accept, I discovered that he would be pleased to come.

This luncheon took place at my house with Mr Z, Mr Lippman and one of the French Press. Since Mr Z knew the press of the French Agency, I frankly thought he would be more likely to come if I invited one of them. The conversation was rather slow and stiff at first but later warmed up, I wrote down some of what I could remember later in my notes. I remember being impressed with how nobly, clearly and intelligently Walter put "our side" of the debate. I remember their discussion of what might be the conditions under which the Russians might withdraw their troops from Europe. Mr Lippman thought Mr Z a fairly intelligent young man and I think enjoyed the meeting. It was a relief to talk to one Russian who didn't brazenly put out the canned Sobiet line. My chief continuing interest in MrZ was a feeling that he was a VIP and probably a top man.

The last and final time that I saw Mr Z was on July 30, 1950 when he invited a few members of the Press to lunch at the Mayflower Hotel just prior to his return to Russia. With him was a Mr Vavilov (I'm not sure that this name is right) whom I believe he introduced as his usccessor. He was nothing like as smart outwardly as Mr Z and ptrattled on like a school boy on how his wife had converted him to Communism.

I remember also that at this period I told some of the conversations and remarks that I could remember hearing from Mr Z to a friend, Robert Hooker who was then a member of the Policy Planning Department of State.

I believe I told you over the telephone that I sent both the recent Christmas card from Mr Z and another "Cristmas card" signed in ink by "Guy Burgess" to a friend and old colleague of mine at When I was in Washington Guy Burgess" to during those two days about ten days ago when Bernie and I tried to reach you- I also had occassion to talk to Allen Dulles about the two cards. But, from the flamboyant descriptions we have all read and heard about the creature. I am sure I would have remembered him. I did know Donald McClain, as many of us did when he served under the late Lord Inverchapel who was then British Ambassador to the USA. Walter Bell who is

now married to General Spaatz' daughter and serving with the British Foreign Office in India - or was, took me to the McClain's several times.

That winds up my little chronicle whose main purpose was to get advice on whether it would be wise or profitable to renew my acquaintance with Mr. Z. on my return to Washington late in February. Also, were I to answer his card, could I do so with impunity?

We will have to have that postponed cocktail with Bernie when we are all together next in Washington.

T-1 identified MARGARET FREUHAUF PERRY as being a daughter of the Freuhauf Trailer interests; WINSOR FRENCH as a being a daughter of the "Cleveland Press", (a local daily newspaper); and JEROME ZERBE as a socialite photographer and columnist in Washington, D.C., who originally came from Cleveland, Ohio. T-1 had no recent information pertaining to KAY HALLE.

T-2 advised on February 2, 1954, that KAY HALLE attended the "Roosevelt Day" meeting of the Americans for Democratic Action (ADA) held at the Hotel Hollenden on Jamuary 29, 1954. T-2 also reported that JOSZPH and IRJA FRIEND, MARIE RELD HAUG and DON and MILDRED ROTHENEERG also attended the above meeting.

T-3 and T-Wadvised that during the period from September, 1947 to May, 1949 JOSEPH FRIEND was organizer of the professional section of the Communist Party (CP) in Cleveland, Ohio.

T-5 advised on October 11, 1943, that TRJAX RIEND was at that time dues secretary of Branch 108 of the CP in Indianapolis, Indiana / 10/2/0

T-2 advised that as of September 15, 1952, MARIE HAUG was chairman of the Finance Committee of the Progressive Party (PF) of Chio.

T-6 made available a pamphlet distributed on March 11, 1952, entitled "Are Elections Really Free in Ohio" published by the PP of Ohio. A neview of this pamphlet reflected that DON COTHENERG was then executive secretary of Cuyahoga County of the PP of Ohio.

T-7 advised that MILDRED ROTHENBERG was present at a Cuyahoga County PP convention held at 1205 Superior Avenue on November 14, 1952.

The informant stated that her husband, DON, was in charge of the meeting.

T-8, T-9 and T-10 advised on April 10, 1951, that the PP of Ohio in the Cleveland area was to the best of their knowledge controlled and dominated by the CP.

by ADA. T-2 advised that KAY HALLE has a poor moral reputation and is reported to be a sex deviate. The informant reported that KAY HALLE is not presently in Cleveland, having gone south.

It was noted in the January 31, 1954, edition of the "Cleveland Plain Dealer" (a local daily morning newspaper) in the column entitled "The Bystanders" written by OSCAR and RITA BERGMAN, that KAY HALLE would be on the receiving end of an award for selling the most season subscription ticket books in the campaign of the Women's Committee of the Karamu Proscenium Theater. According to the article, KAY HALLE was to receive this award on February 1, 1954.

According to information contained in the column of WINSUR. FRENCH in the February 16, 1954, edition of "Cleveland Press" KAY HALLE and LAG SHERWIN were in Massau. It has previously been reported that MAG SHERWIN is a sister of KAY HALLE.

T-II advised on February 15, 1954, that he has known KAY HALLE for approximately twenty years although not very intimately. He stated that he has been a visitor in the HALLE home on occasions and in addition has known KAY HALLE was at one time active in the affairs of the "Play House", a local theatre presenting dramatic productions. T-II described KAY HALLE as being a liberal and qualified such a remark by pointing out that she was a staunch advocate of the "New beal" policies as exemplified by the late President FRANKLIN D. HOUSEVELT. He stated that she seemed particularly concerned about racial discrimination and was one who was concerned with the "under dog". T-II pointed out that he has not been associated with KAY HALLE for the last ten years or so in view of the fact that she spends the majority of her time in Washington, D.C. He stated that she is independently wealthy and is not the least bit concerned with the operations of the Halle Brothers Department Store in Cleveland, Ohio. T-II stated that she makes innumerable trips to Cleveland each year and believed that such trips are becoming more numerous in view of the aged condition of her father, SAMUEL HALLE.

T-11 stated that he knew nothing adverse concerning KAY HALLE's moral reputation and pointed out that he believed that she was engaged at one time to RANDOLFE CHURCHILL, the son of the British Prime Minister WINSTON CHURCHILL. T-11 stated that he has never known KAY HALLE to be engaged in any activity believed to be inimical to the best interest of the United States and he believes that she would be a good security risk.

T-12 advised on March 9, 1954, that he had learned that KAYHILE was not presently in Cleveland, Ohio but that she was expected to return on March 27, 1954.

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

Miss HALLE impressed interviewing agents as one who probably could not retain or respect a confidence, and it appeared that she previously had discussed the ZINCHUK contacts with numerous individuals before she ever considered bringing the matter to the Bureau's attention. Until the interview with her it appears that HALLE was not cognizant of the Bureau's responsibility and jurisdiction in matters pertaining to the internal security of the U. S.

It was interviewing agents impression that HALLE rather fancies herself in the position of one who is fully informed behind the scenes in matters such as international intrigue. She doubtless is in a position to obtain much information, by virtue of her easy access to official and diplomatic circles; however, any estimate of her potential value as an information to the Bureau, based on this single interview would not be commendatory.

Miss HALLE stated her future plans were uncertain but that she probably would remain in Washington, with frequent trips during the interval to her home in Cleveland, until June 1954. She added her plans thereafter were indefinite.

Subsequent to the interview with HALLE on 4/15/54 she telephonically contacted WFO 4/22/54 to advise she had decided against attending a film showing 4/21/54 at the Russian Embassy at ZINCHUK's invitation. She went on to state she had discussed this matter with a close friend whom she described as being a former newspaper man of prominence, presently a man high in the circle of the Democratic National Committee, and he also had advised her not to get involved with ZINCHUK. It was the belief of the agent who received this call from HALLE that she had been discussing the matter with Mr. CLAYTON FRITCHEY, former newspaperman who now is editor of the Democratic Digest, monthly official organ of the Democratic National Committee.

UACB, this office does not intend to have further contact with HALLE unless she volunteers to report any additional contacts with ALEKSANDR I. ZINCHUK, if such is the case, any information offered by HALLE will be received and the Bureau will be fully informed.

II In her letter Miss HAILE related it was in the furtherance of this plan for a series of TV shows that she first contacted the Soviet Embassy in 1949, and in connection with that contact was directed to the office of the Soviet Press Attache and finally was interviewed by ZINCHUK.

Miss HALLE related it was a result of that initial contact with ZINCHUK that she later had additional contacts with him in the form of luncheons and on one occasion at a supper picnic sponsored by the French Press; also saw ZINCHUK on the occasion of her having attended the Soviet Anniversary reception held November 7, 1950 at the Embassy to commemorate the October Revolution.

On April 15, 1954 Miss KAY HALLE was interviewed by Special Agent PATRICK M. RICE and the writer at her residence, 1534 - 29th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. On this occasion Miss HALLE again mentioned the nature of her contacts with ALEKSANDR I. ZINCHUK, now First Secretary at the Russian Embassy, and in addition, Miss HALLE made some comment about the scope of her current activities. Miss HALLE stated since she had returned from her recent trip abroad (during the fall of 1953), she had heard from ZINCHUK; had received a holiday greeting card from him; also had been called via the telephone and invited to attend a showing of a Soviet film at the Embassy, scheduled for April 21, 1954. In this latter regard Miss HALLE said she did not believe she would pursue any further contact with ZINCHUK or any members of the Russian Embassy staff, particularly in view of the fact that she presently is not doing any work in journalism or radio or TV. She related she often had discussed/this matter with such intimate friends as DREW PEARSON, JOSEPH and STEWART WESOP, MARQUIS CHILDS and JOSEPH C. HARSCH, and she had come to the conclusion she would not encourage ZINCHUK or seek any further. contact with him.

During the interview, Miss HALLE made casual mention that she was a close friend with Mr. ALLEN QUILES, Director of Central Intelligence Agency, and with General WALTER BEDELL SMITH, former Director of CIA and now Under Secretary of State. She also indicated she enjoyed a close friendly relationship with THOMAS K. WINLETTER, former Secretary of Air Force.

Concerning contacts with personnel in official establishments of other foreign nations in Washington, Miss HALLE related she was on close friendly terms with Mr. ARCHIBAID GORDON, Labor Counselor at the British Embassy. Miss HALLE did not mention any other contacts at the British Embassy.

Miss HATTE said she had been considering making a trip to Russia since she had been invited by Ambassador CHARLES E. "CHIP" BOHLEN and

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Mrs. BOHLEN to visit them in Moscow; however, Miss HALLE, said she did not have any prospects of finding a sponsor to finance such a trip, and she said at the present time she was not employed. HALLE said her only writing at this time was confined to her doing a book into which she is incorporating a collection of famous withicisms of WINSTON CHURCHTLE, British Frime Minister.

On April 22, 1951 Miss HALLE telephonically contacted the writer to advise that after considering the matter of her invitation from ALEKSANDR, I. ZINCHUK, she had decided not to accept his invitation to attend the film showing at the Soviet Embassy on April 21, 1954. In further explanation Miss HALLE said she had discussed the matter with a close friend who formerly was prominent in the newspaper business and who presently is a high figure in the National Democratic Organization. She said it was his advice that she should not engage in any further contacts with ZINCHUK or members of the official Soviet establishments because she was no longer active in the field of journalism.

For your information Miss Halle telephonically contacted the Eureau on 4/12/54, and advised that she was in Washington setting up her Georgetown home. She said that on arrival here she had received an invitation in the mail from Anatoli F. Dobrynin, Counselor of the Soviet Embassy, inviting her to attend a cocktail party at the Soviet Embassy to be followed by a showing of the Russian technicolor film entitled "Russian Ballet." This was scheduled for Wednesday, April 21, 1954, at 8:00 p.m. Halle further stated that during her last trip to Washington in March, 1954, she had been called on the phone by Counselor Dobrynin and he stated that he had heard through Marqui Childs, a news correspondent, that she, Halle, was back in the city he hoped to see her in the near future.

Hallo again requested instruction as to that she should of under the circumstances. She was informed that the Bureau was not a position to advise her on the matter and that whether she did of not attend the cocktail party and the film showing was entirely her. She stated that she realized that but thought it would be to tell the Bureau so that the invitation could be made a matter of record.

The above is for your information and assistance in connection with your interview of Halle which has previously been approved by the Bureau. An extra copy of this letter is being furnished for your file 105-3478 relating to Dobrynin. The interview of Halle should be placed in line for early attention.

The FBI has not investigated Mr. Hayward and our files contain no pertinent information concerning him.
