You were previously advised we were consulting with another agency concerning information located as a result of your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request.

This consultation is complete and the enclosed material is being released to you with the appropriate exemption noted next to the redacted information pursuant to Title 5, United States Code, Section(s) 552/552a as noted below. Below you will find checked boxes under statute headings indicating the appropriate exemptions asserted to protect information which is exempt from disclosure. FBI FOIPA Addendum

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) Intelligence Records. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records is itself a classified fact protected by FOIA exemption (b)(1) and/or would reveal intelligence sources, methods, or activities protected by exemption (b)(3) [50 USC § 3024(i)(1)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that any such records do or do not exist.

Part 2: The standard responses below apply to all requests for records on individuals:

- (i) Requests for Records about any Individual—Watch Lists. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of any individual's name on a watch list pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(7)(E) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(7)(E), (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that watch list records do or do not exist.
- (ii) Requests for Records about any Individual—Witness Security Program Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records which could identify any participant in the Witness Security Program pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(3) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(3), 18 U.S.C. 3521, and (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.
- (iii) Requests for Confidential Informant Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of confidential informant records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F) [5 U.S.C.§ § 552 (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F)] and Privacy Act exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C.§ 552a (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records would reveal confidential informant identities and information, expose law enforcement techniques, and endanger the life or physical safety of individuals. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.

Part 3: General Information:

- (i) Record Searches and Standard Search Policy. The Record/Information Dissemination Section (RIDS) searches for reasonably described records by searching systems, such as the Central Records System (CRS), or locations where responsive records would reasonably be found. The CRS is an extensive system of records consisting of applicant, investigative, intelligence, personnel, administrative, and general files compiled by the FBI per its law enforcement, intelligence, and administrative functions. The CRS spans the entire FBI organization, comprising records of FBI Headquarters, FBI Field Offices, and FBI Legal Attaché Offices (Legats) worldwide; Electronic Surveillance (ELSUR) records are included in the CRS. The standard search policy is a search for main entity records in the CRS. Unless specifically requested, a standard search does not include a search for reference entity records or administrative records of previous FOIPA requests.
 - a. *Main Entity Records* created for individuals or non-individuals who are the subjects or the focus of an investigation
 - b. Reference Entity Records- created for individuals or non-individuals who are associated with a case but are not known subjects or the focus of an investigation
- (ii) **FBI Records.** Founded in 1908, the FBI carries out a dual law enforcement and national security mission. As part of this dual mission, the FBI creates and maintains records on various subjects; however, the FBI does not maintain records on every person, subject, or entity.
- (iii) **Foreseeable Harm Standard.** As amended in 2016, the Freedom of Information Act provides that a federal agency may withhold responsive records only if: (1) the agency reasonably foresees that disclosure would harm an interest protected by one of the nine exemptions that FOIA enumerates, or (2) disclosure is prohibited by law (5 United States Code, Section 552(a)(8)(A)(i)). The FBI considers this foreseeable harm standard in the processing of its requests.
- (iv) Requests for Criminal History Records or Rap Sheets. The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division provides Identity History Summary Checks often referred to as a criminal history record or rap sheet. These criminal history records are not the same as material in an investigative "FBI file." An Identity History Summary Check is a listing of information taken from fingerprint cards and documents submitted to the FBI in connection with arrests, federal employment, naturalization, or military service. For a fee, individuals can request a copy of their Identity History Summary Check. Forms and directions can be accessed at www.edo.cjis.gov/about-us/cjis/identity-history-summary-checks. EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual;
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (d)(5) information compiled in reasonable anticipation of a civil action proceeding;
- (j)(2) material reporting investigative efforts pertaining to the enforcement of criminal law including efforts to prevent, control, or reduce crime or apprehend criminals;
- (k)(1) information which is currently and properly classified pursuant to an Executive order in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy, for example, information involving intelligence sources or methods;
- (k)(2) investigatory material compiled for law enforcement purposes, other than criminal, which did not result in loss of a right, benefit or privilege under Federal programs, or which would identify a source who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.



Applicant-type investigations were conducted concerning Mr. Gray in 1948, 1953 and 1961, the results of which were summarized in memoranda dated February 18, 1953, and June 14, 1961. This memorandum summarizes Mr. Gray's activities since June, 1961.

Mr. Gray was appointed a member of the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board, at the White House, on May 16, 1961, and is presently serving in that capacity. From May 16, 1961, to October 6, 1964, Mr. Gray was employed as a member of this board a total of seventy-four days and four hours.

Mr. Gray is self-employed and maintains an office at 800 17th Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C. He is currently affiliated with the following companies and organizations in the positions indicated:

Mr. Clifford said he would highly recommend Mr. Gray for a position of trust and responsibility.

Luther H. Hodges, former Secretary of Commerce, Washington, D. C., advised he has known Mr. Gray on a business and social basis for several years and stated he has the greatest admiration and respect for him. Mr. Hodges stated he has no reason to question the honesty, loyalty, reputation, character or judgment of Mr. Gray, and recommends him without reservation for any position of trust and confidence.

Sam J. Ervin, Jr., United States Senator from North Carolina, advised in Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. Gray for over twenty years. He said he is acquainted with Mr. Gray's family and they are all reputable people. He said b6 b7с

no finer citizen exists than Mr. Gray. Senator Ervin said there is no reason whatever to question Mr. Gray's character, associates, reputation or loyalty. He stated he would highly recommend Mr. Gray for a position of trust and responsibility.

B. Everett Jordan, United States Senator from North Carolina, advised in Washington, D. C., he has known Mr. Gray for approximately twenty years both professionally and as a friend. He said Mr. Gray is a fine upstanding businessman and has been an excellent public official in the past. Senator Jordan said he would not question Mr. Gray's character, associates, reputation or loyalty. He said he would recommend Mr. Gray without qualification for a position of trust and responsibility.

Arthur S. Adams, Director of the Salzburg Seminar in American Studies, Brookings Institution, Washington, D. C., advised he has been a professional associate of Mr. Gray for approximately fifteen years, Dr. Adams stated Mr. Gray is known for his outstanding administrative abilities both in public and private affairs. Dr. Adams described Mr. Gray as an outstanding example of a patriotic American dedicated to public service without regard to occasional inconveniences to his family. Dr. Adams said Mr. Gray is a patriotic American of impeccable morals, reputation, character and associates. Dr. Adams said Mr. Gray suffered a massive heart occlusion in October, 1964, which has seriously limited his activities. Dr. Adams further stated that during Mr. Gray's convalescence from his heart condition he developed a severe bronchial condition. Dr. Adams recommended Mr. Gray for a position of trust and confidence in the United States Government.

Jeanne G. Norvell, Washington, D. C., private secretary to Mr. Gray, advised Mr. Gray suffered a "mild coronary" in October, 1964, while in Texas, and subsequently developed pneumonia. She stated Mr. Gray has been convalescing in Florida, and expects to return to his office about February 1, 1965.

Interviews were conducted with eighteen additional persons, consisting of professional associates, social acquaintances and references, who stated they consider Mr. Gray to be an outstanding public servant and a loyal, sacrificing and dedicated American citizen. They said that he is eminently capable and has

been successful both in private enterprise and in his service with the Federal Government. They stated they would not question his character, reputation, associates or loyalty. They recommended him highly for a position of trust and confidence.

Mr. Gray's mother, Mrs. Nathalie Bernard, died on November 28, 1961. Mr. Gray has the following living close relatives in addition to his wife and two stepdaughters mentioned hereinbefore:

SPEICHER on June 1, 1961, and it indicated that the appointee was granted a "Top Secret" clearance with the ODM, January 31, 1957. It was also noted that the appointee was granted a "Cosmic" clearance by the ODM on October 7, 1957. It was indicated that he was born May 30, 1909, at Baltimore, Maryland. No additional information concerning the appointee could be located at the OCDM.

On June 1, 1961, Mr. CHARLES H. KENDALL, General Countel, OCDM, advised SA SPEICHER that he first met Mr. GRAY in 1948, when Mr. GRAY was Assistant Secretary of the Army. Mr. KENDALL said he did not become well acquainted with Mr. GRAY, however, until approximately March, 1957, when Mr. GRAY became Director of the ODM. Mr. KENDALL mentioned that he served under the appointee's immediate supervision at ODM during the appointee's tenure there. Mr. KENDALL said he could not think of anyone who is more completely loyal and devoted to the United States than Mr. GRAY. He remarked that although the appointee is financially able to do as he pleases, he has chosen to make great personal sacrifices for his country. He said the appointee's character, reputation, and associates are above reproach. He highly recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility.

Mr. KENDALL mentioned that the appointee's first wife, JANE BOYDEN CRAIGE GRAY, is now deceased, subsequently Mr. GRAY remarried and iscourrently living with his present wife, He stated that he has met the appointee's present wife on a few occasions and that he considers her to be a loyal American of good character, reputation, and associates. Mr. KENDALL was unable to furnished any additional information concerning the other members of the appointee's family.

On June 1, 1961, Mr. WILLIAM E. ELLIOTT, Deputy Director of Security and Inspection, OCDM, advised SA SPEICHER that he was well acquainted with the appointee when the appointee was Director of the ODM. Mr. ELLIOTT served under the immediate supervision of Mr. GRAY during that time. He described Mr. GRAY as being a very able, experienced, and intelligent individual, who is completely loyal to the United States. He vouched for Mr. GRAY'S character, reputation, and associates, and he highly recommended Mr. GRAY for a position of trust and responsibility.

ACQUAINTANCES

Mr. JAMES F. KING, Assistant to the President, Manufacturing Chemists' Association, Incorporated, 1825 Connecticut Avenue, N. W., advised on June 1, 1961, that he has known and served intermittently in various capacities with Mr. GRAY since 1948. Mr. KING was associated with Mr. GRAY at the Department of Defense and also during different Presidential assignments, which Mr. GRAY carried out for the President of the United States. He described the appointee as being a very capable and intelligent individual. He said Mr. GRAY is completely loyal to the United States, and he vouched for his character, reputation, and associates. He highly recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility.

Mr. JOHN S. PATTERSON, Consultant, National Aeronautical and Space Administration, advised on June 1, 1961, that he has known Mr. GRAY since approximately 1948.

Mr. PATTERSON served as the Deputy to Mr. GRAY when Mr. GRAY was the Director of the ODM. He stated that Mr. GRAY is loyal to the United States and a person of excellent character, reputation, and associates. Mr. PATTERSON said he has never known a more dedicated public servant than Mr. GRAY, and that he considers anyone able to utilize Mr. GRAY'S services as being most fortunate. He highly recommended Mr. GRAY for a position of trust and responsibility.

CREDIT AND POLICE AGENCIES
