### FBI FOIPA Addendum

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

### Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) Intelligence Records. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. - (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.

His rate of pay was \$25 per diem ungraded, Ordnance Department at Large, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland. At present, Professor VON NEUMANN is authorized to work at Aberdeen Proving Ground not exceeding 30 days per year. When first appointed, Professor VON NEUMANN was authorized to work not exceeding 180 days per year intermittently or 90 days per year continuously. Approval for Professor VON NEUMANN's employment at Aberdeen Proving Ground has been granted each fiscal year and his present appointment expires June 30, 1947.

Professor VON NEUMANN's file indicates that under date of July 13, 1943 has designation was changed from consultant to technical expert.

On July 9, 1943, a room was set aside for Professor VON NEUMANN at the Officers' Club, Annex #2, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md.

Professor VON NEUMANN's file indicates that on August 16, 1946, he signed a no strike pledge for the War Department at the Aberdeen Proving Ground.

Applicant's personnel file contains no derogatory information, and Captain ROBBINS advised that no complaint of any nature whatever had been received concerning the applicant.

Mr. H. R. FALPAUGH, Security Office, Ballistics Laboratory, Aberdeen Proving Ground, advised that he has known the applicant slightly during the past five years inasmuch as Professor VON NEUMANN was working almost entirely in the Ballistics Laboratory. Ir. FALPAUGH advised that he can furnish no derogatory information of any kind regarding the applicant and states that so far as he knows, the applicant is highly regarded at the Ballistics Laboratory and has displayed no anti-American attitudes of any kind.

Dr. THEODORE STERN, Chief of the Terminal Ballistics Section, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., advised that he has known Professor VON NEUMANN for 15 years both on a social and on a business basis. Dr. STERN advised that he considered Professor VON NEUMANN to be one of the outstanding mathematicians and physicists of the world. Dr. STERN stated that he could definitely assert that the applicant is anti-Nazi and has never been known to exhibit any anti-American or pro-Communist views. Dr. STERN advised that Professor VON NEUMANN is a man of excellent personal habits, good character, and fine morals. According to Dr. STERN, although Professor VON NEUMANN occasionally will take a drink, he has never seen the applicant under the influence of liquor. Dr. STERN also advised that Professor

VON NEUTANN is regarded very highly by the scientific circles in which he travels. Or. STEAN advised that he would have no hesitation in recommending the applicant to any job in the United States Covernment requiring the confidential handling of restricted data.

III. I. S. DIEDERICH, Associate Director, Ballistics Laboratory, advised that he has known Professor VON NEULANH for 4 years. In connection with the applicant's employment at Aberdeen Frowing Ground, DIEDERICH advised that the applicant has been closely associated in the designing and operating of computing devices in the Ballistics field and stated that during that time Professor VON NEULANN has made no anti-American remarks of any kind.

DIEDERICH regards the applicant to be a foyal and patriotic American citizen and a man of good character and fine morals. According to DIEDERICH, while Professor VON NEULANN was working at the Aberdeen Proving Ground he lived at the Officers' Club Annex which is set aside for individuals of scientific grade at Aberdeen Proving Ground. IT. DIEDERICH advised that he believes the applicant is an ascociate member of the officers club, and has an excellent reputation, and has never been censured for any unbecoming activities.

Dr. R. H. KENT, Associate Director, Ballistics Laboratory, advised that he has known Professor VON EQUIANT as a scientist for 4 years, and that he regards him to be a patriotic and loyal American citizen as well as a man of excellent personal habits, good character, and fine morals.

CCLCAIL FECLARD E. SHOW, Director of the Hallistics Laboratory, Morrisen Froving Ground, Aberdeen, -1., advised that he has known Frofessor VON FEULARL since 1939 and regards him to be "the world's greatest living mathematician." Colonel SIMON advised that since 1942 Frofessor VON NEU ARM has been employed intermittently by the Eallistics Laboratory at Aberdeen Froving Ground in the capacity of consultant and technical expert. Colonel OF ON stated that the applicant's work has been chiefly that of designing computing instruments and setting up experiments in the field of Ballistics. Colonel SIMON advised that Professor VON LEU ANN has often served without pay at Aberdeen Proving Ground and that he is regarded by his scientific associates as being a man of splendid personal habits, good reputation, and fine character. Colonel SIMON advised that he has no reason to question the loyalty and patriotism of the applicant to the American government. According to Colonel SIMON,

while Frofessor VCH HEWIANN has been at Aberdeen Proving Ground, he lives at the Officers' Club on the Fost, and he is an associate member of that club. Colonel BY OH explained that this is a designation given to employees of a scientific rank at Aberdeen roving Ground. Colonel BY OH advised that the applicant has already handled restricted data in connection with his work at Aberdeen and further advised that he would have no hesitation in trusting Frofessor VOH NEWIANN with top secret information. Colonel SNYCH said that he would have no hesitation in recommending the applicant for any position in the United States Government which requires confidential handling of secret or restricted information.

Dr. R. H. FRAZIR, Chief, Internal Ballistics Division, Aberdeen Froving Ground, advised that he has known Frofessor VOF HECTAIN for 4 years both as an associate member of the Aberdeen Froving Ground Officers' Club and as a scientist. Dr. FRAZER advised that Professor VOW ACUMANN is regarded as a brilliant mathematician and a man of unqualified loyalty and patriotism toward the United States Government as well as having good personal habits and good moral character.

The records of the Retail Merchants Credit Eureau, Enlinere, Md., were negative concerning the applicant.

Chief BELJAMIN RAY, Aberdeen, I'd., searched his records against the name of the applicant with negative results.

Reference, acquaintances, neighbors and associates of applicant at Princeton, New Jersey hold applicant and family in high regard. They consider applicant trustworthy. honest, of high moral character and reputation, one who could keep confidence and undoubtedly a loyal, patriotic American citizen. Credit rating catisfactory. No criminal record Princeton. ### Employment

The records of the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton, New Jersey, reflected that the applicant came to Frinceton University in 1930 as a professor of Mathematics and that he was made a member of the faculty at the Institute for Advanced Study in 1933. He is presently engaged in research work at the Institute in Mathematics and Physics.

### Reference, Acquaintances and Associates

Dr. FRANK AYDELOTTE, Dean of the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton, New Jersey, advised that he has known the applicant for a period of about 15 years and that applicant had been previously employed as an instructor in the University of Berlin and the University of Zurich, Switzerland, prior to coming to Princeton, New Jersey. According to Dr. AYDELOTTE, applicant came to Princeton in 1930 as a professor of Mathematics at the University and that he was made a member of the faculty at the Institute for Advanced Study in the year 1933.

Dr. AYDELOTTE characterized applicant as being one of the most brilliant mathematicians in the world today, placing him in the category of ALBERT EINSTEIN. According to Dr. AYDELOTTE, applicant is an expert on shock waves and that he has done considerable research work in Mathematics and Physics. He also mentioned that the applicant was closely associated during the war in the atomic bomb project and that he had spent considerable time on this project at Cak Ridge, Tennessee and Los Alamos, New Mexico. Dr. AYDELOTTE stated that the applicant was primarily a scientist and that he had never evidenced any great interest in politics or social problems.

Dr. AYDELOTTE went on to say that he held the applicant and his family in high regard and that he considered the applicant as being trustworthy, honest, one who could undoubtedly keep confidence and that he is of fine moral character and reputation and that there was absolutely no question in his mind concerning the applicant's loyalty. He said that he could vouch for applicant in every possible respect.



Dr. AYDELOTTE further advised that the applicant was divorced from his first wife, MANETTE, in 1937 and that he married his present wife, KLARA VON NEUMANN in Hungary in 1938. Dr. AYDELOTTE mentioned that applicant's first wife was definitely not applicant's type and that he believed she was presently residing somewhere in New York City operating a dress shop. Dr. AYDELOTTE described applicant's present wife, KLARA, as a loyal person who comes from a very prominent family in Hungary. Dr. AYDELOTTE concluded by stating that he could furnish absolutely no derogatory information whatsoever concerning the applicant and his wife and that he would recommend applicant unqualifiedly.

Dr. OSWALD VEBLEN, Mathematics Department, Institute for Advanced Study, and a reference of applicant, stated that he has known the applicant ever since the applicant has been in this country. Dr. VEBLEN went on to say that he himself was partly responsible for the applicant coming to the United States and that the applicant first became known to him through his reputation and his reading about him as a mathematician and physicist in Europe. Dr. VEBLEN recalled that he might have even met applicant at the boat in New York when he first entered the United States. Dr. VEBLEN mentioned that he was a witness for the applicant when he filed petition for naturalization in Trenton, New Jersey quite sometime ago. Dr. VEBLEN was very high in his praise for applicant and he described applicant as being a great genius in mathematical physics and that he ranked with EINSTEIN in ability and intelligence.

Dr. VEBLEN considered applicant honest, trustworthy, and of fine moral character and reputation and one who could undoubtedly keep confidence. Dr. VEBLEN said that there was absolutely no question in his mind about applicant's loyalty to the United States and that he would have no hesitation in recommending applicant.

Dr. H. H. TAYLOR, Dean of the Graduate School and Head of the Chemistry Department, Princeton University, advised that the applicant was first associated with the Mathematics Department at the University in 1930 and that he transferred to the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton approximately three years later. Dr. TAYLOR was very high in his praise for applicant and mentioned that it was absolutely ridiculous for any person to doubt the loyalty, patriotism and integrity of applicant. Dr. TAYLOR



characterized applicant as being the greatest genius of mathematical physics in this country today.

Dr. I. P. ELSENKALT, Lathematics Legartment, Princeton University, was interviewed and he stated that he has known the applicant for quite some time. He mentioned that the applicant was born in Hungary; that he served as a professor at the University of Eerlin, Germany and as a professor at the University of Zurich, Switzerland before coming to the United States. Dr. EISENKART said that the applicant had worked on different phases of the atomic bomb during the war and that there was absolutely no question in his mind concerning applicant's loyalty and his ability to keep confidence.

Dr. EISENKAMT went on to say that applicant, from his experience with him, was completely trustworthy and that he knew of no derogatory information about him. Dr. EISENKART stated that the applicant was primarily interested in Mathematics and Physics and that to his knowledge he had never heard the applicant evidence any interest in politics or social problems.

Dr. ALBEIT EINSTEIN, Professor Emeritus of the Institute for Advanced Study, Frinceton, advised that he knew applicant, having become closely associated with him at the Institute. Dr. EINSTEIN spoke very highly of applicant and he considered the applicant as a person who could be thoroughly trusted with secretive information and one who was undoubtedly loyal and a patriotic American citizen.

Dr. M. H. NICHOLS, Department of Physics, Palmer Laboratories, Princeton, New Jersey, advised that he had been acquainted with applicant since 1940. He stated that he had worked with the applicant on a project which was not connected with Princeton. He stated that he classed applicant as one of the world's best mathematicians and advised that he considered him a loyal American. He stated that he had no knowledge of the applicant's political beliefs.

Dr. HENNY D. SMYTHE, Department of Physics, Palmer Physical Laboratory, Princeton, New Jersey, was interviewed and stated that he had known the applicant approximately 15 years and that he has known him very well for a period of seven or eight years. Dr. SMYTHE stated that he knew applicant's wife very well also and he classed her as the most passionately loyal American that he knew. Dr. SMYTHE further stated that he considered the applicant's loyalty of such a nature that no foreign power would even



consider contacting him for information. He stated that he knew the applicant lived up to the letter his loyalty with respect to his confidential work and did not even talk to him, Dr. SINTHE, on the Manhattan Engineering Project which was closely associated until it was approved by the Mar Department.

Dr. ENYTHE stated that he did not consider the applicant a likely prospect for any foreign government to contact and that he further did not consider the applicant a likely contact for any of the American Communists.

### Neighborhood

Mrs. C. P. TSCHEBOTARIOFF, 21 Westcott Road, who resides directly across the street from the applicant, advised that she has known the applicant and his wife and small child slightly for a period of four to five years. She said that applicant made a very good neighbor; that to her knowledge he has never caused any trouble whatsoever in the neighborhood and that from what she knew of him he was of fine moral character and reputation and a reliable, trustworthy person. She had no reason to doubt applicant's loyalty or patriotism to the United States.

Mrs. KATE MONGAN, 10 Westcott Road, Princeton, advised that she has known the applicant and his family for a period of two or three years. She mentioned that she very seldom saw the family but her associations with applicant and his family have been of the best and she could furnish no derogatory information concerning them.

Mrs. JOHN C. DIELHENN of 34 Westcott Road, Princeton, advised that she has known the applicant and his wife for a period of four years and mentioned that they made very good neighbors; kept to themselves most of the time and that she had no reason to doubt their integrity and loyalty.

Reference letter from the Bureau sets out other previous residences of applicant in Princeton, New Jersey. However, investigation at and in the neighborhood of these residences disclosed that no one was sufficiently familiar with applicant or his family to furnish information concerning them.

Reference letter from the Eureau also sets out that applicant has been a member of the Nassau Club, Frinceton University since 1934.

Miss HOUSTON SCOTT, Secretary to the Dean of the Graduate School, Princeton University, stated that the Nassau Club in Frinceton is a social club whose members consist of various professors at the University and various businessmen in the town of Princeton. She stated that this club meets once a week

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in Princeton and that usually a prominent speaker talks to its members.

Background

Engineering District file reflects that a previous investigation of this applicant was conducted in 1943 by the Military Intelligence Division. This investigation revealed that the applicant in 1942 engaged in considerable cable traffic with individuals in Switzerland. This cable traffic was at first considered to be suspicious but later was determined to be harmless in nature. During this investigation the following associates of the applicant at Princeton University were interviewed with favorable results.

Professor MARSTON MORSE, School of Mathematics, Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton, New Jersey

H. D. SMYTHE, Head of the Physics Department, Princeton University H. P. ROBERTS, Head of the Mathematics Department, Princeton University

At this time applicant mentioned that he had known ISEAEL HALFERIN very well while HALFERIN was working under him in the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton University in 1936. Applicant had mentioned that the association between himself and HALFERIN was similar to that of a student working under a professor for a Ph. D. degree, and in addition to that applicant stated that he became a good friend of HALFERIN and had considerable social contact with him.

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During the interview applicant stated that HAIFERIN was considerably to the left politically, being very enthusiastic over the Marxist philosophy. Applicant stated, however, that Marxism was definitely a secondary interest for HALPERIN and that he, HALPERIN, became much more excited about a mathematical problem than he did about Marxism.

During this interview applicant furtheradvised that HALPERIN corresponded with him when he, applicant, made one of his yearly trips to Hungary which ended in 1938. According to applicant, the correspondence that he had with HALPERIN at that time concerned a mathematical problem that HALPERIN was working on at the time. The address which was mentioned in HALPERIN's address book was that of the summer home of applicant's family in Eudapest, Hungary. Applicant went on to say that he did not see HALPERIN after he left Princeton University until 1940 when he, the applicant, was lecturing at the University of Washington in Seattle.

According to applicant, MALPERTN came to the University of Washington as a student and spent considerable time with the applicant during the six weeks summer session. The applicant explained that he and HALPERTN had much in common because of their mutual interest in a certain phase of mathematics. Applicant further mentioned that no further contact with HALPERTN was had by him until he accidentally met him in June 1945 in Montreal, Canada. The applicant was in Montreal for a Mathematics Congress and he met HALPERTN there at which time HALPERTN was in the uniform of a Canadian Army officer. According to applicant, they talked for about one hour about old times and applicant stated that no mention was made of his connection with the atomic bemb project.

Concerning his own background, applicant at this time stated that from 1930 to 1938 he took yearly trips to Europe during which he lectured at the universities at Europe and also visited his family in Eudapest, Hungary. He stated that he went to England in 1943 on a mission for the Navy and that he has not been abroad since. After his return applicant stated that he became acquainted with the Los Alamos Project at Los Alamos, New Lexico and that he remains a consultant on the Los Alamos Project having just recently returned from Santa Fe, New Mexico.

During this interview applicant was asked for his opinion regarding keeping confidential the secret of the atomic bomb and he stated without qualification that he believes that all of the information should not be made public. He stated, however, that there are certain physical



principles that he believes could well be made public and that their release would create good will. He further mentioned that he believed some of these principles would be discovered within a year or so by most nations anyway and that the release of these principles would only be for the advancement of science and that their release would not endanger the secret of the atomic bomb itself. He stated definitely, however, that the technical knowledge of the manufacture of the bomb should not be released.

Miss MARTHA STONE, Deputy Clerk, U. S. District Court Clerk's Office, Trenton, New Jersey, produced a declaration of intention number 859 which was filed by applicant then residing at Princeton, New Jersey. This declaration of intention reflected that applicant was of Hungarian nationality, the Magyar race. He was born in Budapest, Hungary on December 28, 1903 and was married to MANETTE VON NEUMANN on January 1, 1930 at Budapest, Hungary. It was revealed that MANETTE was born at Budapest, Hungary on September 7, 1909 and that she entered the United States At New York City on January 28, 1930.

It is to be noted that applicant is presently divorced from MANETTE and that he is now married to KLAMA D. VON NEUMANN.

The records also reflected that the last foreign address of applicant was Berlin, Germany and that he immigrated to the U. S. from Bremen, Germany on the SS BRELEN on January 28, 1930.

The records of Local Braft Board 1, Princeton, New Jersey, reflected that the applicant furnished information that he was employed at the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton. He also furnished information to the effect that he was also employed as a member of the Scientific Advisory Committee of the U. S. Department of War. His family was listed as himself, KLAPA VON NEUMANN, his wife, age 30, and his child

It was indicated that his child, spent part of her time with applicant and part of her time with his first wife.

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There is a letter on file at the Draft Board from the Bureau of Ordnance in the Department of Navy, Washington, D. C. dated September 14, 1942 advising that applicant was engaged in primary offensive and defensive marine warfare and in the protection of ships and that his work was confidential. He entered on duty with this Bureau of the Navy on July 15, 1942 and was paid \$25 a day for his work as a contract physicist and mathematician. It was indicated that the applicant was one of the best qualified mathematical physicists in the country.

In a report dated October 9, 1945 at the Trenton Credit Association, Trenton, New Jersey it was revealed that applicant derives an income of approximately \$20,000 annually in his position; that he owns property at his present address, 26 Westcott Road, Princeton, New Jersey, valued at approximately \$30,000. There was a mortgage on this home dated May 6, 1939 in the amount of \$26,528 and that the mortgages was the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton. The records further reflected that applicant maintained a very satisfactory account with the Institute and that his credit rating in Princeton and vicinity is satisfactory.

It was revealed through the records of the Trenton Credit Association that the applicant's first wife, Irs. MANETTE VON NEUMANN, filed suit for divorce against the applicant on November 3, 1937 charging cruelty.

The following information was on file at the U. S. District Court, Clerk's Office, Trenton, New Jersey for applicant's present wife, KLARA VON NEULANN. In Certificate of Arrival number 3225742 it was indicated that she arrived in New York City on December 15, 1938 on the SS QUEEN MARY. Petition for Naturalization number 5444 was filed under the name of KLARA VON NEUMANN, 26 Westcott Road, Princeton in the District Court of the U. S. at Trenton, New Jersey. Occupation was listed as housewife and that she was born on August 18, 1911 in Budapest, Hungary; that she was married to applicant on November 18, 1938 in Budapest, Hungary; that she immigrated to the United States from Southampton, England and landed in New York. References on this petition were HAROLD P. ROBERTSON, 175 Prospect Avenue, Trenton, New Jersey and HENRY DE W. SMYTHE, Lafayette Road, Princeton, New Jersey. Both of these individuals are professors at Princeton. Certificate of Naturalization number 5760792 was issued to KLARA VON NEUMANN on December 26, 1942.

Chief of Police EDWARD MAHAN, Princeton Police Department, Princeton, New Jersey, advised that there was no record of applicant ever



having been arrested there.

A search of the applicant's fingerprints in the files of the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D. C. failed to reflect any prior criminal data in reference to applicant.

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At Los Alamos, New Mexico

The file maintained by the Personnel Office of the University of California, Los Alamos, New L'exico, regarding the applicant was made available by Miss DOROTHY CARTER of that office. An examination of this file reflected that JOHN R. VON NEU'ANN had first been employed by the University of California at the Los Alamos Project on October 2, 1943, in the capacity of a consultant and has made periodic visits to that Project, in the same capacity. The file otherwise contained no information of pertinence. It consisted largely of administrative correspondence in regard to compensation and travelling arrangements in connection with VCN NEUMANN's visits to Los Alamos. Miss CARTER informed that the applicant's stays at Los Alamos were generally of three or four weeks furtion and that he occupied temporary living quarters while there. Other than the data that

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was contained in his file and the above, she could furnish no information

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about the applicant. She recommended Dr. ERADBURY, Director of the Project, as being the person best able to furnish information concerning the applicant.

Dr. N. E. BRADBURY, Director of the Los Alamos Project, advised that VON NEUCCIN has been regularly utilized as a consultant at Los Alamos in the fields of applied mathematics and thermo-dynamics in connection with the development of the Atomic Energy Project since 1943. He stated that he personally has only been associated with the applicant in this connection since 1944 but he is aware that VON NEULANN was active in this respect during 1943.

The services rendered by the applicant, Dr. BRADBURY stated, have been extremely valuable and in fact, at the present time, he is attempting to complete arrangements whereby VCM PEULANN'S services can be obtained more frequently than heretofore. Dr. BRADBURY advised that he has a high personal regard for the applicant, whom he regards as a completely loyal citizen and of whom he has never heard or observed anything of a derogatory nature. He informed that VON NEURANN'S associates are the highest type of individuals and that he has never known, or heard, of the applicant showing any subservisive tendencies or associating with persons having such a reputation. He also advised that VON NEURANN rendered exceptional service to the Navy Department in connection with some of their wartime experimental work.

# CREDIT AND CRIMINAL RECORDS

## At Los Alamos, New Mexico

Captain H. D. ITSE, Provost Marshal, caused a search to be made of the files of his office for a possible record relating to the applicant and subsequently advised that the search had been made with negative results.

# At Santa Fe, New Mexico

The files of the Merchant's Credit Association were reported by BERT BROWN, Manager of that service, to contain no record of the applicant.

The records of the Santa Fe Police Department and of the New Mexico State Police, Santa Fe, New Mexico, were searched by Sergeant TOM GONZALES and Officer ARCHIE THITE, respectively, but no record of the applicant was on file.

The records of the Bureau of Ordnance, Mavy Department show that the applicant was employed by that bureau September 7, 1942, for intermittent duty at twenty-five dollars per diem as a consultant on research and explosives. Personnel services contracts were executed for each period of employment, the last one terminating on August 31, 1945. The Office of Naval Intelligence cleared him for this employment in 1942. The CHI file revealed that the applicant had been an associate of Oscar Morganetern, Professor of Economics at Princeton, N. J., who was described as a "dangerous German alien"; K. A. SCHISSIN, Vice President of Wilnington Chemical Association; and one DR. VELLY VILSCH.

Var Department records reflect that the applicant is presently on active appointment, as of September 20, 1940, as an "Expert", employed by the Var Department Bureau of Ordnance, Aberdeen, Id., at \$25.00 per diem, for not more than 90 days continuous service or 180 days intermittent service for any one fiscal year. Employment authority has been granted each year.



DETAILS:

MRS. MILDRED WILLIAMS, Personnel Office, University of California Radiation Laboratory, produced records reflecting JOHN VON NEWMANN, date of birth not shown, address listed as Institute of Advanced Study, New Jersey, was employed as a consultant September 15, 1952. MRS. WILLIAMS stated records reflected that on June 1, 1953 the employee had worked at Livermore, California for three weeks as a consultant. No further information relative to the employee appears in the files of the Radiation Laboratory at Berkeley, California.

The following investigation was conducted by the writer:

AT LIVERMORE, CALIFORNIA

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ROBERT C. BECKER, Security Officer, Radiation Laboratory, advised that his records do not reflect any unfavorable information concerning the employee. He stated that the employee was employed by the University of California, Berkeley, California, as a consultant on several occasions. He was at the Radiation Laboratory in Livermore in November, 1952 for several weeks and again in June, 1953 for three weeks.

ROBERT MAINHARDT, Radiation Laboratory, stated that he is acquainted with the employee and his wife, KLARA, and that he helped make the arrangements

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for the employee to be employed in the capacity of a consultant by the Radiation Laboratory. He stated that the employee impressed him considerably concerning his loyalty to the United States. He said that to the best of his knowledge, the employee and his wife are of good character, associates and loyal citizens.

DR. EDWARD TELLER, Consultant, Radiation Laboratory, advised that he has known JOHN VON NEWMANN since 1925. He said that VON NEWMANN was born in Budapest, Hungary, and that he knew him in Germany, England and the United States, and that he worked with him at Los Alamos, New Mexico in 1943. DR. TELLER related that VON NEWMANN is a genius of a scientist and that he has made some great contributions to science. He said that VON NEWMANN is acutely aware of the great danger of the Russian plans for world domination, and DR. TELLER proclaimed that VON NEWMANN is definitely "Anti-Russian."

DR. TELLER went on to relate that he considered VON NEWMANN to be a person of good character, and that his associates were of good choice. He added that in lieu of the fact that VON NEWMANN is such a brilliant person and scientist that his work brings him in contact with a wide variety of individuals and that undoubtedly he has had contact with some individuals who are sympathetic to Communist causes, but he felt that he was not closely associated with any such individuals. He reiterated that he believed that VON NEWMANN was positively loyal to the United States in all respects and that he is a person who can keep a secret and be discreet in his conversations relative to security matters.

DR. TELLER continued that he has been acquainted with VON NEWMANN's wife, KLARA, since approximately 1945, and although he is not well acquainted with her, she has never given him any reason to cause doubt concerning her character, loyalty, and associates.

#### GREDIT AND CRIMINAL

The files of the Livermore Police Department and the Credit Bureau of Livermore Valley did not contain any record or unfavorable information concerning the employee.

The files of the Berkeley Police Department and Credit Bureau of the Greater East Bay, as checked by SE DONALD A. CLOWARD, did not contain any record or unfavorable information concerning the employee.

Reliable confidential informants familiar with certain phases of Un-American activities in the San Francisco Bay Area have advised that VON NEWMANN is unknown to them and that they have no information concerning him.

He stated that on the basis of acquaintenceship with the employee, he considers him to be of good character and reputation. Mr. TOMEI added that he has no reason to question the employee's loyalty or choice of associates. He further advised that he knows of no other persons, on the General Advisory Committee, who are located in Washington, D. C., that might know the employee.

The following investigation was conducted by SA ROBERT M. BASS, Jr., at the Naval Ordnance Laboratory, White Oak, Maryland:

According to the records, MARGARET VON NEUMANN was 65 years old, a widow, born in Hungary and naturalized 7/2/46 in Federal Court in Pennsylvania, no city given. No record was found concerning the employee or other members of his family.

It is to be noted that investigation concerning the employee's brother was conducted in December, 1952 under caption "MICHAEL JOSEPH NEUMANN - RI - 8609, aka; AEAA", which investigation in NYC disclosed that employee's family had an excellent reputation.

Rebulet requested that information contained in Newark letter concerning the German Library of Information be reported. A review of Newark files reflects that, the source material for this information was destroyed on 1/5/46.



She said she is not closely associated with them, explaining that nearly everyone residing on Westcott Road is connected with Princeton University and that most of the social contacts made by them are with their professional associates within the University.

Mrs. HENDRY said that insofar as she knows the VON NEUMANNS enjoy a fine reputation in the Princeton, N.J., area. Mrs. HENDRY said she felt she did not know them well enough to be in a position to recommend VON NEUMANN for a position of trust, however, she said that she has never heard anything that would made her question his loyalty to this country; she further stated that she did not believe the VON NEUMANNs were closely associated with anyone in the immediate neighborhood as most of their social contacts were with people connected with the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton, New Jersey.





The following persons residing in this neighborhood, who have each known the VON NEUMANN family for the past two years, furnished substantially the same information regarding them as did Mrs. HENDRY.

Records of the Trenton Credit Association, 551 Atlantic Avenue, Trenton, N.J., which covers Princeton, N.J., contain only favorable information concerning VON NEUMANN and members of his immediate family.

### ETSCELLANGOUS

During a previous applicant type investigation conducted in 1948, VON NEUMANN was interviewed concerning VALENTINE BARGMANN at which time he advised that BARGMANN had been his research assistant for about five years doing classified work in aerodynamics and that he had known BARGMANN for ten years.

It is noted that information concerning BARCMANN has been furnished to the Atomic Energy Commission under the caption "VALENTINE BARCMANN - 15- 76728".





The personnel files of the University of California reflect that GARRETT BIRKHOFF was recommended to the University of California by Dr. JOHN VON NEUMANN of Princeton University. Investigative reports concerning GARRETT BIRKHOFF have been previously furnished to the Atomic Energy Commission.

During a previous investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation in 1951, Dr. JOHN VON NEUMANN advised that Dr. LEOPOLD INFELD studied at the Institute for Advanced Studies in Princeton, N.J., for approximately one and one half to two years in about 1936 and 1937. He stated that he has not seen INFELD since he left the Institute.

The November, 1950, issue of "Poland Today" published by the Polish Research and Information Service, 250 West 57th St., New York City, a registered agent of the Polish Government, contained a part of a letter addressed to Dean BEATTY of the University of Toronto from LEOPOLD INFELD. The letter was dated 9/13/50 at Warsaw and in it INFELD expressed his appreciation for the generosity of the University which, he said, he tried to repay by doing volunteer work during the recent war against Facism, and later by public lectures across Canada on the basic issues of war and peace. He complained that he was balked in his efforts to advise the Canadian people of the truth and that he was attacked with ignorant viciousness on a level to which he refused to descend even by way of reply. He complained that his motive for returning to visit Poland were slandered and that the campaign of persecution directed, not only against him, but also against his wife prevented him from carrying on any further work in Canada in the cause of peace.

According to the letter, he has now found relief from these distressing experiences in Poland and the Polish people have impressed him with their tremendous desire for peace and universal constructive activity. He concluded his letter by stating:

"Since, now, the University of Toronto forces me to make a choice, under threat of dismissal if I stay here for a year, my decision is to remain here in my native land, to contribute all I can to the research being done here in my field, and to do all I can for peace throughout the world. In so doing, I am convinced that I likewise continue to serve the people of Canada."

The letter continued:

"Please therefore consider this letter to be my resignation from the position of Professor of Applied Mathematics of the University of Toronto."







Newark T-2 advised that one of these Americans was JOHANN VON NEUMANN, Professor of Mathematics at Princeton.

DETAILS:

AT OAK RIDGE, TENNESSEE:

ELVIN T. HENSON, contracts coordinator, Carbide and Carbon Chemicals Company, advised that JOHN VON NEUMANN has Consultant Subcontract Number 186 which commenced on January 1, 1949 and which runs to December 31, 1953. He said that VON NEUMANN's subcontract provided for consultant services on High Speed Computational Methods, Methods of Generating Random Variables and the Monti Carbo Mathematical Method in general. In connection with VON NEUMANN's services, Mr. HENSON stated that the employee provides consultant services to the Engineering Division of the K-25 Flant at Cak Ridge in the field of pure and applied mathematics as well as to the Cak Ridge National Laboratory Mathematics Fanel. Mr. HENSON said that aside from the fact that he personally supervises the employee's consultant subcontract, he knows very little concerning him. He pointed out that VON NEUMANN has to his knowledge never spent much time in Cak Ridge and particularly during the past several years. In this respect Mr. HENSON stated that VON NEUMANN has not been in Cak Ridge for any period of time long enough to establish residence.

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DR. ALVIN M. WEINEERG, Research Director, CRNL, advised that he has been professionally acquainted with the employee for about 3 or 4 years. He indicated that he was first introduced to VON NEUMANN approximately 10 years ago but did not really get to know him other than through reputation until a few years ago. He said that the employee has the reputation of being one of the most influential scientists in the United States from the standpoint of military technology adding that VON NEUMANN also has the general reputation of being the 20th century's greatest mathematician. Dr. WHINBERG pointed out that although he does not regard himself as a close associate of the employee, he has on one or more occasions discussed politics with VON NEUMANN resulting in his having

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the opinion that the employee is one of the most violently anti-Russians he knows. Dr. WETNBERG pointed out that nothing has ever come to his attention reflecting adversely on the employee from the standpoint of character, loyalty or associates adding that he believes VON NEUMANN a loyal American.

DR. AISTON S. HOUSEHOLDER, in Charge of the Mathematics Fanel, ORNL, advised that he has been professionally acquainted with the employee since about 1949. He pointed out that he has had very little social contact with the employee, therefore knows little concerning VON NEUMANN's ideological beliefs. Dr. HOUSEHOLDER indicated, however, that he considers VON NEUMANN a loyal American, and a person of unimpeachable character and associates in that he has never had information to the contrary come to his attention.

DR. JACK MOSHMAN, Senior Statistician, ORNL, stated that in connection with the employee's consultant services with the Laboratory, he has had occasion during the past 3 years to work with DR. VON NEUMANN. DR. MOSHMAN said that his contacts with the employee have been strictly limited to professional ones adding that nothing reflecting adversely on the employee's character, loyalty, or associates has come to his attention. He pointed out that DR. VON NEUMANN has a reputation in the highest order in his various scientific fields.

SYLVAN CROMER, Engineering Superintendent, K-25 Plant, advised that although his division has a consultant subcontract with VON NEUMANN, the contract responsibilities have been fulfilled or performed entirely in the employee's office at Princeton, New Jersey and not at the K-25 Plant. Mr. CROMER stated that it has been several years since he has seen the employee in Cak Ridge, adding that he does not know VON NEUMANN personally therefore can furnish no information about him from the standpoint of character, loyalty or associates.

The following investigation was conducted by SE LEWIS J. BLEDSOE:

Identification Officer L. C. WIISON, Oak Ridge Police Department stated that he has no arrest records in his files identifiable with either JOHN VON NEUMANN.

AT KNOXVILLE, TENNESSEE:

Identification Officer, GEORGE TRELAND, Knoxville Police Department, stated that his records contain nothing concerning the employee or his wife.

ANCIL HALL, Knoxville Credit Bureau, advised that the employee and his wife are not known to that Bureau.



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California under date of October 2, 1943, reflects that he was born on December 28, 1903, at Eudapest, Hungary; that he entered the United States at New York City on September 25, 1931, and that he became a naturalized citizen of the United States on January 8, 1937, at Trenton, New Jersey. This application form reflects that his father, MAX VON HEUMANN, was deceased at that time, and that his mother, MARGARET VON NEUMANN, a naturalized citizen of the United States, was at that time residing in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Dr. JORDAN CARSON MARK, Division Leader, Theoretical Physics Division, University of California, advised that he first met VON NEUMANN and his wife about 1946 or 1947 and that he has worked rather closely with VON NEUMANN in his position as consultant since that time. He further advised that inasmuch as VON NEUMANN is administratively assigned as a consultant to the Theoretical Physics Division he has worked very closely with him whenever his services have been utilized by the Laboratory. He explained that Dr. VON NEUMANN usually spends a total of three or four weeks a year at Los Alamos, but has in the past performed considerable other work at his normal location of Frinceton University and under various contracts with the University of California. Dr. MARK further advised that he has been a fairly close social acquaintance of the employee and his wife during a like period of time, and that they visit in each other's homes whenever convenient. He did not indicate, however, that he considered the VON NEUMANNS to be particularly intimate friends of he or his wife.

Dr. MARK stated that in his opinion Dr. VON HEUMANN and his wife are individuals of unimpeachable character, and are entirely loyal to the United States and the democratic form of government. He has never known either of hem to entertain any sympathy for any foreign government or type of government. So far as he knows, the VON NEUMANNS do not have any close relative or particular contact still residing in continental Europe. He added that the employee and his wife have at various times appeared to be quite "disturbed" about the threat of communism or communist domination in both Europe and the United States. He stated that they have always appeared to be completely opposed to any such political philosophy.

Dr. MARK advised that the only organization that he has known VON HEUMANN to be affiliated with is the American mathematical society which he has served as president. He stated that other than himself, the VON NEUMANNS have particularly associated with Mr. and Mrs. STANISLAW ULAM and Mr. and Mrs. G. FOSTER EVANS at Los Alamos, and that to the best of his knowledge their social acquaintances at Princeton University have been limited to their professional collegues.

Dr. MARK informed that he is cognizant of the fact that ISRAEL HALPERIN, a reputed Soviet espionage agent, was at one time a student of JOHN VON NEUMANN, but stated that VON NEUMANN has never indicated to him that he had any particularly close contact with EALPERIN, or that such association exceeded a normal professor-student relationship. He concluded

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that he considers VON NEUMANN to be thoroughly trustworthy in regard to confidential information, and that he would give him his highest recommendation for any position of trust.

Mr. JAMES L. TUCK, Physicist and Group Leader, University of California, Los Alamos, recalls that he first net Dr. VON MEUMANN during the time that he was attending a scientific conference in England scmetime in 1942, but that his contact with him there was very limited, and he has become much better acquainted with him through a working relationship at Los Alamos and Frinceton University between 1944 and the present. He has had only a limited amount of social contact with him and is not acquainted with any of his relatives except his wife. He stated that Dr. VON NEUMANN and his wife are people of unimpeachable character, and that he has never had any reason to question their loyalty to the United States or the democratic form of government in any respect. He advised that they are both very intelligent individuals but that he has never known them to express more than a normal interest in political ideology or political questions. He has only known VON NEUMANN to be affiliated with professional organizations, and furthermore has only known him to associate with apparently responsible and loyal individuals.

Mr. TUCK definitely pointed out that VON NEUMANN is the actual originator of much classified data and confidential information relative to experimental weapons, but stated that to the best of his knowledge and belief VON NEUMANN has always been very careful in the handling and protection of such classified information. In this connection, he pointed out that VON MEULANN and he were involved in an incident at Los Alamos, New Mexico, in August, 1953 which wight be considered a procedural security violation, but stated that he does not consider that VOM NEUMANN was actually responsible for this matter in any way. In describing the incident, he stated that Dr. T. H. JOHNSON, Director of the Division of Research, ALC, Washington, D. C., and a Mr. ROBERT R. WILSON of the Livermore, California, Laboratory, arrived at Los Alamos on a Sunday in the foregart of August, 1953, upon very short prior notice. These individuals desired to obtain the opinions of Dr. VON NEUMANN and Mr. TUCK relative to a matter in which Mr. WILSON was vitally concerned at that time. They explained however, that Mr. WILSON could only spend a matter of a few hours at Los Alamos and that it had not been possible to furnish the AEC Security Officials at Los Alamos sufficient data for them to furnish the appropriate clearances and passes for admission to the restricted or working areas at Los Alamos. Mr. TUCK advised that there was no question in the mind of either Dr. VON NEUMANN or himself, but that Dr. JOHNSON and Mr. WILSON were actually cleared for ETY information in connection with the AEC program, but that VON NEUMANN did voice an objection to discussing any such information on the Sunday at The Lodge, a public hotel at Los Alamos, and outside of the guarded or restricted areas where all confidential or classified work is normally performed. Mr. TUCK advised, however, that he and VOH NEUMANN eventually acquiesced and did enter into a discussion of such a matter in a room at The Lodge because of the desires of Dr. JOHNSON andhis insistence that Mr. WILSON could not remain at Los Alamos until the following Monday. Mr. TUCK stated, however, that this discussion was commenced over the

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
object of Dr. VON NEUMANN, who appeared fully cognizant of the fact that such a discussion should not have been commenced outside of an appropriately guarded or restricted area. He further stated that neither he nor VON NEUMANN discussed their work or anything that was being done at Los Alamos, and that actually, in his opinion, the data which were discussed was not of a highly classified nature. He added that he is quite certain that VON NEUMANN has never made a practice of discussing any possibly classified information in hotel rooms or public places, and that he is normally very discreet and careful in his conversations. He concluded that in his opinion VON NEUMANN can be completely trusted with confidential data.

Mr. NICHOLAS METROFOLIS, Group Leader, Theorectical Physics Division, University of California at Los Alamos, advised that he has known and worked with VON NEUMANN to a considerable extent between 1948 and the present. He has also had considerable social contact with VON NEUMANN and his wife, and advised specicially that he met YVONNE NEUMANN in Athens, Greece, in the Fall of 1952, and attended a Scientific Congress with them at Constantinople a few days later. At the conclusion of the Congress he returned to Athens with them, but YVONNE NEUMANN then went on to Rome and he did not have any further contact with them during that trip. He stated that neither during this trip, nor at any other time, has he ever known either Dr. or Mrs. VON NEUMANN to indicate that they presently have any close relative or particular contact at any place in continental Europe. He is cognizant of the fact that Mrs. VON NEUMANN has a sister residing in England, but is not acquainted with her in any way.

Mr. METFOPOLIS stated that both VON MEUMANN and his wife are individuals of unimpeachable character, and that they are absolutely loyal to the United States and the democratic form of government. He added that he is sure that both Dr. and Mrs. VON NEUMANN are "definitely anti-communist" in their political philosophy or ideology. He has known VON NEUMANN to be an active member of the American Mathematical Society, and the American Fhysical Society, but has never known him to be affiliated with any other organization. He advised that the close associates of Dr. VAN NEUMANN appeared to be limited almost entirely to individuals with whom they have professional connections and that at Los Alamos he has known them to particularly associate with Mr. and Mrs. STANISLAV ULAM and Mr. and Mrs. G. FOSTER EVANS. At Princeton University he has known the VON NEUMANNS to be very friendly with Professor H. D. SYMMEE and with OSCAR MORGANSTEIN, both members of the faculty there. He indicated that he considers all of these individuals to be loyal and reputable citizens.

Mr. METROFOLIS concluded that he has only known VON NEUMANN to be very careful and conscientious in the protection of any possibly classified information, and that he considers him to be entirely trustworthy with such information.

Mr. BENGT G. CARLEON, Group Leader, University of California at




Los Alamos, advised that he has worked with or for VON NEUMANN during occasional short periods between 1948 and the present, but that he has had only very casual outside or social contact with him. He stated that Dr. VON NEUMANN is a very capable and responsible individual of good character, and that he has never had any reason to question the loyalty of either he or his wife to the United States or the democratic form of government. He further advised that to the best of his knowledge neither Mr. or Mrs. VON NEUMANN have any current contacts or relatives outside of the United States, and that they only associate with the most reputable individuals. He concluded that to the best of his knowledge Dr. VON NEUMANN can be entirely trusted with confidential information.

Mr. GEORGE FOSTER EVANS and his wife, CERDA LOUISE EVANS, Mathematicians, University of California at Los Alamos, advised that they have known Dr. VAN NEUMANN and his wife since about 1948. They have worked with the VON NEUMANNS at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Princeton University, and Los Alamos, New Maxico, on several occasions since that time. They have also been quite close social friends and have frequently visited in each other's home. They do not believe that either Dr. VON NEUMANN or his wife has any close relative presently residing outside of the United States except one sister and at least one nephew of Mrs. VON NEUMANN who presently reside in England. They advised that Mrs. VON NEUMANN has indicated that she and her husband are acquainted with a few individuals that they believe to be still residing in Hungary, but that she has never indicated that they have had any recent contact with such individuals.

Mr. and Mrs. EVANS both stated that VON NEURANN and his wife are entirely loyal to the United States and the democratic form of government, and that they are more pronounced in their statements indicating such loyalty than the average citizen. They further advised that to the best of their knowledge all of the relatives of employee and his wife residing in the United States are very respectable people and are loyal to the United States. They have known VON NEUMANN as a former president of the American Mathematical Society and to be affiliated with the American Physical Society, but they have never known either VON NEULANN or his wife to be affiliated with any other organization. Mr. and Mrs. EVANS stated that to the best of their knowledge all associates of VON NEULANN and his wife have been entirely responsible and loyal individuals. At Los Alabos they have known the VON NEULANNS to most frequently associate with Dr. and Mrs. J. CARSON MARK, and with Mr. and Mrs. STANISLAW ULAM. They concluded that VON HEUMANN has always appeared to be very security conscious in regard to confidential information, and they consider him to be entirely trustworthy.

Mrs. LOIS ILES, Secretary, University of California at Los Alamos, advised that she has had some contact with Dr. VON NEUMANN during his visits and work at Los Alamos, but that such contact has been limited entirely to business and such matters as his accommodations and reservations. She stated that to the best of her knowledge he is a respectable individual and a loyal citizen. She further advised that during the visits of VON NEUMANN and his



wife to Los Alamos, they have only resided at the Lodge and never been furnished any type of private residential accommodations.

#### NEIGHEORS AND ACQUAINTANCES

### At Los Alamos, New Mexico


Mrs. ELSTE MARSH, Zia Company Housing Office, advised that records of that office do not reflect that the employee has ever been furnished any type of private residential quarters at Los Alamos. She advised that to the best of her knowledge, VON NEUMANN and his wife have always resided at The Lodge during their occasional visits to Los Alamos.

Mr. ROBERT E. CARAWAY, Manager, and Mr. ARNOLD SHOLD, Assistant Manager, The Lodge, Los Alamos, each advised that he has known VON NEUMANN and his wife as occasional residents at The Lodge during short periods of time over the last five or six years. Each stated that they have always conducted themselves in a very respectable manner and appear to be entirely responsible individuals. Each stated that he has never had any reason to question the loyalty of VON NEUMANN or his wife in any respect, and that they only appear to associate with the very "top" scientists at Los Alamos.

Mr. STANISLAW MARCIN ULAM, Mathematician, University of California at Los Alamos, advised that he first met Dr. VON NEUMANN during a trip he made to Poland in 1935, and that he has had considerable contact with him in the United States since about 1938. He explained, however, that within that period they have usually been affiliated with different Universities and his contact with VON NEUMANN has been only intermittent and somewhat limited to social visits whenever possible. He indicated, however, that he and his wife consider themselves to be rather intimate friends of Dr. and Mrs. VON NEUMANN.

Mr. ULAM stated that Dr. VON NEUMANN and his wife are individuals of unimpeachable character and habits and that Dr. VON NEUMANN is a world renowned and respected mathematician. He stated that since he and his wife became naturalized citizens of this country, there has never been any question about their complete loyalty to the United States and the democratic form of government. He further advised that to his knowledge, Mrs. VON NEUMANN has one sister presently residing in England, but they do not have any other relatives or particularly close contacts outside of the United States. Mr. ULAM has known Dr. VON NEUMANN as a very active member of the American Mathematical Society and the American Physical Society but has never known either he or his wife to be affiliated with any other organization. He also stated that in his opinion, both Dr. VON NEUMANN and his wife are "extremely conservative" in their political ideology and philosophy and they have never been affiliated with any possibly questionable organization.

In regard to the associates of Dr. and Mrs. VON NEUMANN, Mr. ULAM



stated that they have only associated with very reputable, loyal citizens who are eminent figures in various scientific fields. He advised that he has frequently observed a professor of economics named OSCAR MORGANSTEIN to visit in employee's home at Princeton University, and indicated that to the best of his knowledge, MORGANSTEIN is an entirely respectable and loyal individual. He concluded that he definitely believes that Dr. VON MEUNANN can be entirely trusted with any confidential information or restricted data and pointed out that he actually originates a great deal of such data in the field of atomic energy.

#### CREDIT

### At Santa Fe, New Mexico

Mr. BERT BROWN, Manager, Merchant's Credit Service, which covers Los Alamos, New Mexico, advised that the records of that agency do not contain any information relative to the employee or his wife.

#### CRIMINAL

### At Los Alamos, New Mexico

The records of the Los Alamos Police Dapartment were checked with negative results in that they do not reflect any criminal data relative to employee or his wife.

#### MISCELLAMEOUS

#### At Los Alamos, New Mexico

The files of the AEC Security Branch reflect that on August 10, 1953, information was furnished to the AEC by a confidential source indicating that a possible procedural security violation had been committed at Los Alamos on August 9, 1953, by Dr. T. H. JOHNSON, Director of Division of Research, AEC, Washington, D. C.; Mr. ROBERT R. WILSON of the Livermore (California) Laboratory; Mr. JAMES L. TUCK, and Dr. JOHN VON NEUMANN, in that they discussed possibly classified matter in a room at The Lodge, a public hotel located outside of the restricted areas at Los Alamos. The files reflect that Mr. TUCK was interviewed by AEC security officials and furnished information corresponding to that attributed to him above and indicating that although such a discussion was held, it was not at the instigation, and in fact was over the objection of Mr. TUCK and VON NEUMANN. Instant files further reflect that VON NEUMANN was also interviewed by AEC security officials; that he explained the data that were discussed on that occasion, and stated that he had been reluctant to participate in a discussion of this nature on a Sunday and

outside of the restricted area, but had done so at the request of Dr. JOHNSON. So far as reflected by the files, no further action was taken by the AEC in regard to this matter, and the files do not contain any other information unfavorable to VON NEUMANN, except as previously furnished to the AEC.

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

He said Halperin subsequently had been "acquitted" by the Royal Canadian Commission, promoted to a full professorship, and elected to the fessorship and elected to the Royal Society of Canada, so he felt his opinion had been "corroborated" in official chan-

"My opinions have been violently opposed to Marixism ever lently opposed to Marixism ever since. I can remember. However, in that particular case I felt an obligation to a man who se opinions differ from mine and in a large case, just because they differ from mine, you Neumann told the Committee.

Subsequently, von Neumann added: Halperin told him he was a "Marxist."

As for Professor Alexander, von Neumann declared, "He's a friend of mine, but I certainly don't agree with his political views," Alexander was terther identified.

Von Neumann made no apologies for his support last year of Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer during the lengthy AEC hearing which labeled the famed nuclear physicist a security risk and incligible to continue as a Government consultant.

He said he did not believe Oppenheimer a "security risk, but that the decision had been
