FBI FOIPA Addendum

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) Intelligence Records. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;

- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;

My dear Congressman:

I have your letter of Barch 4, 1943, and the accompanying communication which you received from Mr. John B. Gregory. Wells-Roberts Hotel, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, who requests information concerning a motion picture film of the Jack Johnson-Jess Willard prize fight.

There is no information available in the files of this Bureau relative to the present location of the film referred to by Mr. Gregory. Our only interest in the exhibition of prize fight films resulted from this Bureau's jurisdiction over cases involving a violation of Section 405, Title 18, United States Code, which prohibited the importation or interstate transportation of prize fight films. However, that code section is no longer in force having been repealed on June 29, 1940.

If Mr. Gregory possesses additional information concerning the seizure of this film by the Federal Covernment as indicated in his letter, it is suggested that he furnish complete details to the United States Attorney at New York City who may be able to determine its disposition.

details of this story but stated that he had heard it several times and was not particularly impressed with its truth because it varied with each telling. SCHELL pointed out that it may be a reasonable thought with regard to this story that subject probably was not telling the truth because of the unlikeliness that he could have been employed as a seaman aboard a cargo vessel in his early teens, boys of such age being employed on ocean-going vessels only in the capacity of cabin boys and pages on passenger vessels. SCHELL further pointed out that in view of the fact that subject weighed approximately 130 lbs. when full grown during his alleged boxing career, that his size would have been particularly small at the age of 13 or 14. However, on the possibility that this information may have been correct an attempt was made to examine the Immigration records but advice was received that records on deserting seaman are not maintained for any of the periods prior to 1917.

With regard to specific places in the United States, SCHELL stated that the only city he recalled subject ever having mentioned was New York and the only particular place in New York ever having been mentioned by subject was Grupp's Gymnasium. He pointed out that the only American fighter in addition to WILLIE HERMAN mentioned by subject, was JACK JOHNSTON, the Negro heavyweight champion. According to SCHELL subject had in his collection of photographs a large one of JACK JOHNSON. which was autographed, containing an inscription somewhat similar to "To my good friend, BILLY SMITH - signed JACK JOHNS'ON" and it is SCHELL's recollection that the handwriting was the same throughout the inscription. With regard to this photograph it is noted that in 1915 when JACK JOHNSON lost the world heavyweight championship to JESS WILLARD in Havana, he was a fugitive from justice from the United States and had been for sometime previously. In 1918 JOHNS'ON was still outside of the United States as a fugitive residing at last during part of 1918 in Spain. It is also known from general information that when JOHNSTON returned to the United States he was immediately placed under arrest and then served a prison term so it is unlikely that the photograph in the possession of subject of JQHNSTON could have been secured by him during the period the subject was known to have been living in New York City and frequenting Grupp's Gymnasium.

As of possible interest in this matter it is again pointed out that the photograph of subject in SCHELL's possession, purportedly having been taken in Honolulu, has the inscription "Campo de los Angeles" which is obviously a Spanish name, and during JACK JOHNSTON's sojourn out of the United States he was almost invariably in a Spanish-speaking country.

As stated previously SCHELL does not recall subject having ever mentioned any location in the United States other than New York City. With regard to persons known by him or possible relatives in the United States,

during the time subject was known to have been in the United States. MONTEITH can probably be located through inquiry at the U. S. Marshal's Office in Detroit. For the purpose of this interview, it is recalled that NAT FLEISCHER claims to have a distinct recollection of the subject of this case attempting to secure a match for HEIN DOLGOERGEN at Madison Square Garden in New York City and if this recollection is correct it would necessarily have had to be handled by MONTEITH.

At Honolulu, Hawaii

- * Will through Mr. GEORGE LOW, Bishop, National Bank, obtain the names of the directors and officers of the British club who staged boxing bouts in 1918 and will interview these members regarding the subject.
- * Will attempt to locate the owners of the Orpheum (which is now the Princess) Theatre and interview them regarding the participants in the boxing bouts held at the theatre in 1918.
- * Will attempt to locate NIGEL JACKSON, a promoter of boxing bouts in Honolulu in 1918.
- * Will attempt to locate BILLY HOLIES, an outstanding boxer during this period and will also locate A. B. ANGUS, referee during the pertinent period.
- * Will again interview Mr. GEORGE F. LOW, Bishop National Bank, and ERNEST HEINE, Hawaiian Electric Company, for any information which they may recall regarding boxing in the Hawaiian Islands during the pertinent period.

LOS ANGELES FIELD DIVISION:

At Los Angeles, Calif.

By inquiry through boxing circles will locate and contact JACK JOHNSON, former Negro heavyweight champion of the world, and interview him concerning any knowledge he may have of subject, it being noted that subject is reported to have had a personally autographed photograph of JOHNSON in his possession. The photograph of subject purportedly in Waikiki, Honolulu, should be exhibited to JOHNSON to determine if he recalls any Campo de los Angeles which he can identify

NY 98-905 as being the locale of this photograph, it being noted that for several years JOHNSON boxed and lived in various Spanish-speaking countries. NEWARK FIELD DIVISION: At Bayonne, N.J. Through inquiry in boxing circles will endeavor to locate MIKE BALLERINO. He should be interviewed concerning any knowledge he may have regarding the subject and his background, it being noted that BALLERINO was a prominent boxer while subject was in New York and is known to have trained in Grupp's Gymnasium. At Newark, N.J. Will contact the various Polish publications in New Jersey in an attempt to locate clippings pertaining to an account of the EDDIE TRAN-VOLKMAR bout held on June 11. 1932 at Warsaw, Foland. Will search the cross references of the "New York Times" at the Newark Public Library for the same purpose as outlined directly above. Will re-contact STANLEY WILK, 107 Peshine Avenue, Newark, for any information he may have in his possession pertaining to this case. At Elizabeth. N.J. Will interview LIICKEY WALKER, former light heavyweight champion of the world, located in the vicinity of East Grand Street, for any information he may have concerning the subject. NEW HAVEN FIELD DIVISION: At Bridgeport, Conn. Will locate through sporting circles, JOE SLITH, old-time boxing trainer, who was the trainer of several of DAN MORGAN's fighters, including BATTLING_LEVINSKY. Photographs of subject should be exhibited to Mr. SMITH and he should be questioned in detail in regard to any knowledge he may have in regard to subject's background. The photograph of subject taken in Honolulu should be exhibited to Mr. SMITH inasmuch as he is stated to have operated an outdoor training camp in the vicinity of New York, as stated by DAN MORGAN, and the photograph of subject may have been taken in that locale. -59,

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no recollection of any training camp by the name of "Campo de Los Angeles". JOHNSON, who will be 66 years of age March 31, 1944, advised that his memory of places and individuals was not very good, particularly in view of the fact that he spent so many years traveling throughout the world, a good many of them having been those when he was a fugitive from justice. He further stated that following the loss of the heavyweight championship in 1915 at Havana, Cuba, and several years prior to that time he had made exhibition tours all over the world, including practically all the countries of South America and Central America, as well as those in Europe. He further stated that following his retirement from the active fight game he took many tours during which he would put on exhibitions of most any kind, including sparring, wrestling and other such athletic endeavors and that due to the fact that he had been the heavyweight champion he was able to draw a crowd irrespective of what type of entertainment or exhibition he would put on. He further stated that he had spent many years in Spain where he even took up the sport of bull fighting, and that in none of the Spanish-speaking countries in which he had been, did he have any recollection of any place called "Campo de los Angeles". He also related that in those days the fight game was in its infancy in Spanish-speaking countries and that as a matter of fact he was the originator of the game in Spain before the first World War. JOHNSON stated that he had continued his exhibition tours and trips throughout the world up until 1932 when he returned to this country following a two years: tour, which took him to Europe. He recalled that on this tour he had specialized in wrestling exhibitions and specifically recalled having been in Cologne, Germany, where he had put on such an exhibition. He further related that all during his life and even up to the present time he is still asked for signed photographs of himself and that as a matter of practice he always carries small photographs and business cards to give to any who request them. He further related that he had no recollection of any individual by the name of BILLY SMITH and that if any such individual did have an autographed photograph of him, it would undoubtedly be one of the many thousands of followers of the fight game who had requested such at some time or another.

He also related that his last professional fight had occurred in 1932 in Czechoslovakia, his opponent being an individual whose name he could only recall as being PAUL SAMPSON. It should be noted that this individual might have been PAUL SAMPSON KOERNER, previously mentioned in reports in this case.

JOHNSON further recalled that on his last trip to Europe in about 1930, his wrestling exhibitions in Europe had been managed by one ALBERTI who he stated was a very ardent Nazi and who left with him from New York City and returned with him in 1932, and subsequently returned again to Germany, where he supposedly still is. As a matter of information, it should be noted

that although JOHNSON'S memory is not particularly good and he is slightly deaf, he does not have the usual characteristics of a punch-drunk fighter.

He also stated that he ispresently engaged in doing exhibitions on war bond drives and recently returned from such a tour in Canada. He also stated that he expects to continue his activity along this line and further has hopes of having one more fight on his 66th birthday.

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
