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I don't know how you are coping with the latest from Egypt. Your plate is overflowing with a mess around the world. Your Doha statement could not have been more prescient.

I don't want to add to your burdens but I know you are to meet with Rasmussen and Gates tomw. Rasmussen has given real leadership to women in peace and security at NATO. Their action plan was adopted in Lisbon, particuarly focused on Afghanistan. One of our staffers was at Nato last week meeting with Rasmussen's staff as well as with European counterparts focused on Afghanistan and the Munich conference.

If you can thank Rasmussen for his leadership as well as mention to Gates our departments working together on 1325, I think it would go a long way since there are great hopes for our 1325 action plan and the IPC process soon to start. A few days ago, we had a group of women mediators from many places from Azarbaijan to Israel to Sri Lanka here at State. They met with many departments from EUR to Pol Mil to Office on Reconstruction and Stabilization. Nancy McEldowney was so persuaded she said clearly we could be adding a civil society dimension now to our existing peace negotiating efforts. The experience that civil society has should be feeding into peace discussions for better outcomes.

Thanks for all you did. Your voice this morning once again exemplifies strong leadership.

He then said that he hoped to live to see the day when countries came together and make consistently good decisions. Everywhere I go people want to tell me what a great job you're doing from Republicans to foreigners to your loyal followers. The pressures have got to be even greater, however, with what's happening in the Arab world. I feel like you predicted it in your Doha remarks.

There are many companies who want to partner with us and I'm eager to raise more money for our Fund. I did a press conference in Istanbul with our Avon and other Secretary's Fund grantees and could see agin what a difference it makes. It's also good PD. The Istanbul conference was a big successes.
