I don't see it as a problem, no - for the very reason you just said. Not only because their dynamic was a specific reflection of Nixon, but of Kissinger's neediness too. On the elevator ride back up with him (sans Meacham), I said that this President chairs more Sit Room mtgs than W, so the core team is seeing each other as a group or different subsets near constantly.

Generally though, another way to answer that question which comes up often is to conflate all the time at the WH with your 1:1 time. So, you can say "We make sure to meet privately at least once a week - but I'm at the WH for NSC or other meetings practically everyday. So I'm seeing the President, or speaking with him by phone, near daily. I have a secure phone on my desk that has a button programmed to dial right to him. Plus all the trips we've taken together where I'm with him all the time"

People know you're at the WH a lot. So that's easy. The one thing they don't know is that you speak by phone. And obviously there's no way for them to know how often.

But again, no, I don't think it's a problem. The conversation is going to be run as a transcript, either in whole or parts - so there won't be any Newsweek commentary or snark.

And for as much as I dislike them and wish they'd fold already, I always believe that when media outlets do these specials that are supremely important to them - more so than the subjects - they don't make people look bad. This is Newsweek's answer to Time's Person of the Year. They aren't doing a hit job.

Now, if it were

doing a cover story on you, I'd be worried. But we separately nixed that.
