new cookstoves mortality numbers

Madame Secretary,

I wanted to send you a short note about today's release of the new Global Burden of Disease study and how it relates to cookstoves. The study estimates that 4 million people die each year from exposure to cookstove smoke – that's twice as many people as we thought (2 million). The study now ranks this as the 4<sup>th</sup> worst health risk factor in the world (we used to say it was 5<sup>th</sup> worst in developing countries), after only high blood pressure, smoking, and alcohol use. And it is the 2<sup>nd</sup> worst health risk factor in the world for women and girls, after only high blood pressure. Exposure to cookstove smoke is the single worst health risk factor in South Asia for both sexes, and the 2<sup>nd</sup> worst health risk factor in Sub-Saharan Africa (though first for women in most parts of SSA). This 4 million figure is more than the study attributes to HIV/AIDS, TB, and malaria combined.

But the most shocking statistic of all is that only a handful of people are working full-time to solve this severe risk factor: 15 staff at the Alliance, Jacob and a few other U.S. federal employees, a few staff in different U.N. agencies, a handful of bilaterally-funded efforts, and scattered researchers, businesses and NGOs.

Thank you for your leadership on this issue to bring the Alliance where it is today. Today, we know better than ever before that our efforts have been well directed.
