Subject: Update on Former Czech President Havel

The medical council has just concluded its press conference at the Prague Motol Hospital. The council includes the country's top experts, and many of them had treated Havel before. The doctors refused to give a prognosis for Havel, but stated that his state is serious because he is in danger that the non-functioning part of his lung has become infected and the infection could spread. Havel's breathing is shallow and must be assisted by a machine (noninvasive ventilation). He is also on heavy antibiotics. The doctors said that at this time Havel is not in danger of dying (but they stressed "at this time"). They also stressed that Havel's history of lung problems is complicating treatment. The council will be meeting again tomorrow afternoon.

(U) Former Czech President Havel In Hospital After Emergency Operation: Former Czech President Havel (72) is in a serious condition in a Prague hospital, having undergone an emergency throat surgery. While the surgery was successful in removing an abscess obstruction in Havel's throat, a complication involving one of his lungs appeared subsequently. A council of medical experts is meeting early this afternoon and will hold a press conference at 2:00pm Prague time to provide an update on Havel's condition. Havel has had a series of health problems since the 1990s, including lung cancer. Ambassador Graber met with Havel last week. Havel appeared tired, but was very engaged. He reiterated his support for missile defense and close Czech-U.S. ties. Havel remains publicly active, speaking out periodically about key issues facing the Czech Republic, as well as continuing his work in support of human rights and democracy. Over the past couple of years, Havel has also been focused on writing. His latest play "Odchazeni" (Leaving) has been performed around the world.
