Dear Mr. Greenewald:

This is a final response to your November 24, 2021, Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request, a copy of which is enclosed for your convenience. We received your request on November 24, 2021, and assigned it FOIA case number 22-F-0224. We ask that you use this number when referring to your request.

The Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence & Security (USD (I&S)), a component of the Office of the Secretary of Defense, conducted a search of their records systems and located records, totaling 50 pages, determined to be responsive to your request. Colonel Brian C. Kreitlow, Chief, Assessment Capabilities & Integration Division, (I&S), in his capacity as an Initial Denial Authority (IDA), has determined that 23 pages are withheld in their entirety pursuant to 5 U.S.C. § 552 (b)(1), currently and properly classified in the interest of national security. This classified information is exempted pursuant to Executive Order 13526, as amended, applying Sections 1.4 (a), military plans, weapons, systems, or operations; 1.4 (c), intelligence activities (including special activities), intelligence sources or methods; and 1.4 (g), vulnerabilities or capabilities of systems, installations, infrastructures, projects, plans, or protection services relating to the national security. The aforementioned IDA has also determined that portions of the remaining 27 pages are exempt from release pursuant to 5 U.S.C. § 552 (b)(5), inter- and intra- agency memoranda which are deliberative in nature; this exemption is appropriate for internal documents which are part of the decision making process, and contain subjective evaluations, opinions and recommendations; and (b)(6), disclosure that would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of the personal privacy of individuals.

In this instance, fees for processing your request were below the threshold for requiring payment. Please note that fees may be assessed on future requests.

## MEMORANDUM FOR SENIOR PENTAGON LEADERSHIP COMMANDERS OF THE COMBATANT COMMANDS DEFENSE AGENCY AND FIELD ACTIVITY DIRECTORS

SUBJECT: Establishment of the Airborne Object Identification and Management Synchronization Group

The presence of unidentified aerial phenomena (UAP) in Special Use Airspace (SUA), designated in accordance with 14 CFR Part 73, represents a potential safety of flight risk to aircrews and raises potential national security concerns. Accordingly, I direct the Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence and Security (USD(I&S)) to establish the Airborne Object Identification and Management Synchronization Group (AOIMSG) to synchronize efforts across the Department and with other Federal departments and agencies to detect, identify and attribute objects of interests in SUA, and to assess, and as appropriate, mitigate any associated threats to safety of flight and national security. To provide oversight and direction to the AOIMSG, I establish the Airborne Object Identification and Management Executive Council (AOIMEXEC). The USD(I&S) will be the lead DoD official responsible for management of this process, will co-chair the AOIMEXEC along with the Director of Operations, Joint Staff, and will invite Principal-level participation from the Office of the Director of National Intelligence. Resourcing for this requirement will be addressed in the Program Budget Review process.

The Director, AOIMSG (hereafter referred to as "the Director") will synchronize the activities among the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD) and DoD Components, and with other U.S. Government departments and agencies, to minimize safety of flight and national security concerns associated with UAP or other airborne objects in SUA. The Director, with support from the OSD and DoD Components heads, will address this problem by standardizing UAP incident reporting across the Department; identifying and reducing gaps in operational and intelligence detection capabilities; collecting and analyzing operational, intelligence and counterintelligence data; recommending policy, regulatory or statutory changes, as appropriate; identifying approaches to prevent or mitigate any risks posed by airborne objects of interest; and other activities as deemed necessary by the Director. Additionally, the Director, in coordination with the OSD and DoD Component heads, will identify requirements and recommended changes in doctrine, organization, training, materiel, leadership, personnel, workforce, facilities, and resources to be brought to the AOIMEXEC for review, consideration and implementation, as appropriate, by the applicable DoD Component head.

Effective immediately, the AOIMEXEC, in coordination with the OSD and DoD component heads will manage the transition of the current UAP Task Force to the AOIMSG. The AOIMEXEC will designate an acting Director of the AOIMSG, and will

submit implementation guidance for my approval. This guidance will specify organizational membership, roles, responsibilities and authorities for the AOIMSG, AOIMEXEC, and OSD and DoD Components.



## MEMORANDUM FOR SENIOR PENTAGON LEADERSHIP COMMANDERS OF THE COMBATANT COMMANDS DEFENSE AGENCY AND DOD FIELD ACTIVITY DIRECTORS

SUBJECT: Unidentified Aerial Phenomena Assessments

A recent report from the Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) highlights the current challenges associated with assessing Unidentified Aerial Phenomena (UAP) occurring on or near DoD training ranges and installations. It is critical that the United States maintain operations security and safety at DoD ranges. To this end, it is equally critical that all U.S. military aircrews or government personnel report whenever aircraft or other devices interfere with military training. This includes the observation and reporting of UAPs.

The report also confirmed that the scope of UAP activity expands significantly beyond the purview of the Secretary of the Navy, who heads the Unidentified Aerial Phenomena Task Force (UAPTF), and suggested process improvements to ensure timely collection of consistent data on UAP. Consistent with these recommendations and to improve partnership with the ODNI and other non-DoD organizations, I direct the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence and Security to develop a plan to formalize the mission currently performed by the UAPTF. The plan should:

- Establish procedures to synchronize collection, reporting and analysis on the UAP
  problem set, and to establish recommendations for securing military test and training
  ranges.
- Identify requirements for the establishment and operation of the new activity, to include the organizational alignment, resources and staffing required, as well as any necessary authorities and a timeline for implementation.
- Be developed in coordination with the Principal Staff Assistants, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the Secretaries of the Military Departments, and the Commanders of the Combatant Commands and with the DNI and other relevant interagency partners.

All members of the Department will utilize these processes to ensure that the UAPTF, or its follow-on activity, has reports of UAP observations within two weeks of an occurrence.

The Select Committee on Intelligence, having considered an original bill (S. 2610) to authorize appropriations for Fiscal Year 2022 for intelligence and intelligence-related activities of the United States Government, the Intelligence Community Management Account, the Central Intelligence Agency Retirement and Disability System, and for other purposes, reports favorably thereon and recommends that the bill do pass.

#### CLASSIFIED ANNEX TO THE COMMITTEE REPORT

Pursuant to Section 364 of the Intelligence Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2010 (Public Law 111-259), the Director of National Intelligence (DNI) publicly disclosed on May 28, 2021, that the request for the National Intelligence Program (NIP) for Fiscal Year 2022 was \$62.3 billion. Other than for limited unclassified appropriations, primarily the Intelligence Community Management Account, the classified nature of United States intelligence activities precludes any further disclosure, including by the Committee, of the details of its budgetary recommendations. Accordingly, the Committee has prepared a classified annex to this report that contains a classified Schedule of Authorizations. The classified Schedule of Authorizations is incorporated by reference in the Intelligence Authorization Act and has the legal status of public law.

#### Unidentified Aerial Phenomena

The Committee acknowledges the recent Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) report of the Unidentified Aerial Phenomena (UAP) Task Force and the need for increased collection and data to better understand the potential national security

threats that UAPs pose to our nation.

The Committee remains concerned, however, that while the U.S. Navy and the U.S. Navy-led UAP Task Force have made efforts to standardize and destigmatize UAP reporting, the ODNI report confirmed that the scope of UAP activity expands significantly beyond the U.S. Navy's equities. Subsequently, the Deputy Secretary of Defense has directed the Undersecretary of Defense for Intelligence and Security to provide a plan to formalize the mission currently performed by the UAP Task Force. Accordingly, pursuant to Section 345 of the Intelligence Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2022 (S. 2610), the Committee has directed classified quarterly reporting on UAP-related events.

Therefore, given the Department of Defense's mandate to the Undersecretary of Defense for Intelligence and Security, and the additional reporting mandates, the Committee continues to support increased funding for UAP Task Force-related operations.

#### COMMITTEE ACTION

On July 28, 2021, a quorum being present, the Committee met to consider the bill and amendments. The Committee took the following actions:

Votes on amendments to the committee bill and the classified annex

By unanimous consent, the Committee made the Chairman and Vice Chairman's bill, together with the classified annex for Fiscal

Year 2022, the base text for purposes of amendment.

By voice vote, the Committee adopted en bloc twenty-four amendments to the bill, as follows: (1) an amendment by Senator King to require an assessment of all source cyber intelligence information, with an emphasis on supply chain risks; (2) an amendment by Senator Risch to improve Section 337; (3) an amendment by Senator Risch to improve Section 353; (4) an amendment by Vice Chairman Rubio to prohibit the collection and analysis of United States persons' information by the Intelligence Community based on First Amendment-protected activities; (5) an amendment by Chairman Warner to establish a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Officer of the Intelligence Community; (6) an amendment by Chairman Warner, and cosponsored by Vice Chairman Rubio, to improve Section 351 and Section 404; (7) an amendment by Chairman Warner, and cosponsored by Vice Chairman Rubio, to require a report on the influence of the People's Republic of China (PRC) through Belt and Road Initiative projects; (8) an amendment by Chairman Warner, and cosponsored by Vice Chairman Rubio, to establish a Chaplain Corps at the CIA; (9) an amendment by Chairman Warner, and cosponsored by Vice Chairman Rubio, to require a plan to increase cooperation with intelligence agencies of key democratic countries to track and analyze certain matters relating to the technological competition with the PRC; (10) an amendment by Chairman Warner, and cosponsored by Vice Chairman Rubio, to require
