His report indicates that staff members in the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Special Operations and Low Intensity Conflict are working, in conjunction with their counterparts in the Joint Staff, on policy guidance for the Department of Defense High **Risk** Personnel (HRP) program.

Please get with the Chairman in order to shape and energize the effort your staff is engaged in. I want to put out good policy guidance for a *HRP* program that is appropriate to the current threat, economizes resources where possible, and focuses our assets accordingly.

I'd like you to brief me on the effort by the end of November, so I can evaluate how we are doing. I'd like to have Department of Defense-wide guidance published shortly after the New Year.



(Tab B) We believe that CTFP can be readily modified, expanded, and/or used as a template for meeting the larger need your suggestion addressed.
- Since its creation in 2002, CTFP has funded a wide variety of educational programs in CONUS. These include, for example, a Master's degree in Special Operations, an eight-month program at the National Defense University, and courses on intelligence and antiterrorism force protection. In addition, CTFP funds counterterrorism courses using mobile teams in partner countries.
- CTFP is budgeted at \$20M per year. We are seeking an increase of \$2M in FY07, largely to increase the role of the regional centers in countering ideological support for terrorism.
- Since 2002, CTFP helped create a global network of over 3,000 counterterrorism experts from 86 countries who share critical skill-sets and common values. Moreover, the program brought many students to the United States for the first time in their lives, providing a positive first hand experience of life in an open, democratic society. (Tab C) Among other things, the CTFP model could serve as a template for analogous "Train and Equip" and "Stability Operations" programs.


Cross Sections Comparisons 777-200XF/KC-10A/767-200SF









Wide Body Freighter Airplanes Range of 747 and 777 with A380 Cargo Density







Comparison of Payload vs. Range



Thank you for your letter dated April 11, 2002, confirming the principal points conveyed orally in our April 9 conference call with regard to in-line attructural changes to the 767 aircraft for use by the U.S. Air Force as air refueling tankers.

Pursuant to the authority provided in 22 C.P.R. § 126.3. I have decided to sake an exception to the provisions of that subchapter insofar as they concarn the requirement for an export license in this setter. In lieu of that requirement, this letter serves as written authorization for the modified 767 tanker program, as follows:

- (1) The 767 tanker in-line changes will be limited to Bosing's Everett, WA facilities;
- (2) No ineligible foreign nationals (22 C.F.R. 5 126.1) will participate in the in-line changes;
- (3) So ineligible foreign nationals will have access to ITAE controlled technical data:
- (4) The in-line changes at Everstt will be limited to those discussed to date with this Office in several oral briefings and in your Fabruary 25, 2007, submission and, specifically, will not include ITAR payloads, equipment or weapons systems (i.e., will not go beyond structural changes and provisioning for ITAR psyloads and equipment); and
- (5) This authorization is limited to this specific program for lesse and/or sale to the D.S. Air Force.

With respect to other matters reised in your original rebruary 15, 2002, submission, it is not necessary for this office to furnish a first opinion in view of this decision on the 767 tanker matter. That said, please allow me to reiterate what I explained orally to you and other Hoeing representatives. The ITAR clearly controls at § 121.1 (Category VIII) elected that are "specifically designed, modified, or equipped for military purposes." Your original request for an advisory opinion essentially sought a railing from this Office that effectively would have excluded from U.S. Munitions List coverage (and worldwide oversight) most, if not all, aircraft and associated defense services when they are "modified" but not "equipped" for military purposes.

In this respect, the Department has long considered both:

(1) the provisioning of sixuraft for weapons and military

aviences and electronics; and (2) specific structural changes to aircraft undertaken solely to ready the aircraft for military purposes to be appropriately within the coverage provided in the U.S. Municious List at Category VIII. The assorption granted herein with regard to the 747 tenker program for USAP is fully consistent with this understanding.



Dear Mr. Secretary

We have reviewed the briefing that Mr. Fred Smith, FedEx CEO, gave you regarding the Boeing 777 as a possible tanker replacement. He brings out some key points to consider, and he keeps a keen focus on the bottom line. FedEx, alongside Southwest Airlines and others in industry, are continually helping to show us how to be more efficient.

In our talks with them, the point they keep bringing home is their focus on shedding their most expensive and least capable assets. Shedding old equipment is a primary mechanism to reduce their operating costs – Herb Kelleher keeps his fleet at an average age of 9 years. Given the steadily increasing age of the USAF fleet, 23.4 years overall (45.4 years for the KC-135 fleet!), it is no surprise our maintenance costs are rising while our capability is decreasing.

We've made sure that all of Mr. Smith's points were considered in the on-going tanker studies. RANDjust delivered their Analysis of Alternatives, in which they looked at medium and large class aircraft, including the Boeing 777. The next steps are a sufficiency review by the staff, the follow-up JCIDS capability assessment, IDA's objectivity study, and industrial base considerations.

Our industry leaders have great insights on becoming more efficient, and they are an invaluable resource to the Air Force. We wish Fred and FedEX the best of luck as they negotiate for new aircraft. With steady, hard work the USAF will hopefully award a contract for its tanker replacement by the end of FY06. Together, industry and the Air Force will give our joint warriors the tools they need to kill our Nation's enemies.








Gulf Coast Main Supply Routes



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





There are three Navy Flag houses there; the security is manageable and the cost of security would likely be cheaper than what is currently required for the homes of those officials. Any official who decided to use those facilities would pay appropriate rent.

- In TAB A, you requested my thoughts on the potential seventy and impact on the
 country of Kazakhstan of the avian influenza as documented in the intelligence report
 that accompanied your request. The Armed Forces Medical Intelligence Agency has
 provided you subsequent information on this topic, but it is classified higher than this
 memorandum.
- Based on the material from the Armed Forces Medical Intelligence Agency, I believe
 the reports to-date characterize a mild outbreak with negligible impact on the country.
 There have been no human deaths confirmed by the World Health Organization
 outside of Southeast Asia.
- Based on data provided by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, Kazakhstan is located within two different flyways in the U.S. Central Command area of operations. However, the U.S. Central Command Surgeon assesses the current impact of avian influenza in his area of operations as minimal to none, and assesses the long-term impact as moderate. The current Armed Forces Medical Intelligence Center assessments that there is a low threat to U.S. forces.

SMART MEMBRANE IMPACTS.

This technology is anticipated to make a significant impact on world water crisis, and issues facing the **U.S.** at home and abroad including hostile contamination of water supplies.

Calculations indicate that **these** membranes could produce **205** gallons per square foot per day (gfd) operating **a** <1 psi, and utilizing techniques other than high **pressure** to accommodate the osmotic gradient during desalination. At this filtration **rate**, high volume, high quality water purification and desalination could be provided **within** a small footprint: a Smart Membrane cube measuring **165 mm** (65 inches) per side could produce 100,000 gallons of purified water per day at **1 psi**. For desalination, the cube would double in size and require **1psi** plus **10** degrees of temperature change.

Now, however, the definition of **"the** world water crisis" encompasses G8 countries. The global-wide scientific understanding is that we have reached the end of the era of abundant, cheap, clean groundwater. According to the World Bank, the health and economies of more than 80 countries are threatened by current water shortages. Within the next 15-20 years, that problem will extend worldwide, including the U.S.

Except for a few **locates** which receive their water **exclusively from** annual snow pack runoff or **from** year-round rain, most of the world's fresh water **supply** is **stored** underground in aquifers areas of porous rock which hold water like a sponge. These reservoirs may take on the order of 100,000 to 300,000 years to fill, Higher populations, the imgated agriculture to feed those populations, and growth of industry during the 20th and 21th centuries have meant increasing water withdrawals from aquifers. These withdrawals exceed the natural recharge provided by rainfall. The wells and pumps used to tap aquifers are drilled ever deeper to chase the falling water levels. This ongoing water debt is independent of reduction in rainfall due to climate change, or cyclical fluctuations in rainfall patterns such as those that caused the **Dust** Bowl.

Some examples:

- The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation predicts the exhaustiin of the aquifers underlying the western and mid-western United States by 2025. These aquifers required an estimated 100,000 years of rainfallto fill.
- In India, water tables are dropping by 30 metres per year.
- The aquifer which provides Australia's fresh water is predicted for exhaustion within 10 years. It is estimated that this aquifer had taken 300,000 years to Ell with water. Throughout the continent, rivers are turning saline. The city of Perth (population 4M) is building a 45gigaliter desalination plant to come online in Aug 2006.
- China has officially recognized that approximately 400 out of 600 cities are short of water.

Ogallala Aquifer

Ninety-five percent of the United States fresh water is underground. As farmers in the Texan High Plainspump groundwater fester than rain replenishes it, the water tables are dropping. North America's largest equifer, the Ogallala, is being depleted at a rate of 12 billion cubic metres (bcm) a year. Total depletion to date amounts to some 325 bcm, a volume equal to the annual flow of 9 Colorado Rivers. The Ogallala stretches from Texas to South Dakota and waters one fifth of US imigeted land-



Fresh water could be acquired by 'desalinating" high solute wastewater, or by desalinating seawater or the brackish water which underlies most continents. However, today this process is done using reverse osmosis technology whose high energy demands produce fresh water æ a price which is 6 to 10 times that of purifying fresh water (not assuming any increase in energy prices from 2004). The impact of such cost increases on industry, which uses 20% of all water, and agriculture — which uses 70+% often at artificially low prices -would be significant.

In contrast, Smart Membrane technology is anticipated to provide desalination of waste water, brackish or seawater at a cost roughly equivalent to that of current fresh water purification.

WATER QUALITY ISSUES

Worldwide, 24% of all fresh water is now polluted and in countries such as China as much of 75% of all water is contaminated. New U.S. rules will require purification of these contaminants, at the cost of billions. Water quality issues derive in part from natural contamination from substances such as boron, bacterial and viral infestations, and from man-made contaminants. For example:



- bacteria and viruses. Bacteria or viral contamination is often discovered only after illness or fatalities are traced back to the water supply. To date, the largest U.S. problem resulting in disease and death involved 400,000 people in Michigan. Some bacteria and viruses have been further spread by human activity, such as the giardia and cryptosporidium contamination from livestock waste throughout rural US communities with farming operations. According to the EPA, approximately 95% of all U.S. municipalities are small systems serving populations of less than 5,000 and lacking resources to build improved their water purity. Terrorist scenarios envision deliberate contamination.

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- novel bacteria and viruses. Microbiologists are now concerned about the threat from imported species.
 Preparation to test for, identify and treat to eliminate a multitude of potential new threats is not present.
- arsenic, boron, other toxic minerals. Many countries, including the US, are now acquiring data which indicates that their ground water contains unacceptable levels of arsenic or borates which cause disease over the long term. Although not at high enough levels to produce the immediate diseases and disfigurement seen in Bangladesh, the arsenic will cause cancer and other diseases over time. Within the U.S. scientific community, debate is now underway about the amount of arsenic contamination which will be accepted. Using current technology to clean water to the known safe levels is estimated to cost billions over acceptable budget levels.

The processes arge removing contaminants water are established. and low cost. But as the contaminants to be removed become smaller - as in CBW agents or salts - the cost rises, achieving levels which are not financially sustainable, present. some levels of desired cleanliness are not attainable because the

problem exists. Municipal water systems usually have tremendous difficulty providing any improvement which increases costs.

Smart Membrane purification, providing full spectrum filtration, does not require identification of a new threat or higher cost to provide superior protection. It does not require the traditional higher energy used for filtration at the smallest end of the pollutant range. Yet it will provide water purer than that found in medical treatment centers. The definition of the desired potable water end product (water plus earth salts) means that other chemical or biological species are not allowed to pass the membrane. No testing is required to determine which chemical, biological or other species of threat is present. OTHER TECHNOLOGIES PROVIDE INCREMENTAL IMPROVEMENTS

Conventional technologies date from the 1800's (water purification) through the 1950's (reverse osmosis). Over the decades, conventional technologies have continued to make incremental gains as inventive engineers have found ways to extract bits of efficiency in creative ways. In some cases, such as multi-stage flash far desalination, take advantage of special circumstances, such as building a power plant and a water filtration plant together in order to use the abundant waste heat from the power plant. In general, however, these technologies have been out competed by membrane desalination technologies or conventional water purification techniques.

Water purification, end desalination ere demanding applications in demanding environments. Experimental technologies which look good in limited performance environments in the lab commonly fail when tested in the field because of inability to deal with feedstock complexity, or other demands of the in-field environment. Adding the demanding financial requirements for water filtration or desalination can also eliminate a prospective technology or limits its use to a highly confined arena. Currently, carbon nanotubes are enjoying promotion as a water handling technology; they will have to face their limited adsorption capacity—after which small pollutants would just flow through, high manufacturing costs, lack of anti-fouling properties and attendant high maintenance costs to find any broad market acceptance.

In order to provide the necessary order of magnitude improvements to both costs and quality of filtration, truly new technology is needed that is capable of functioning in the demanding worlds of purification and desalination.

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DEFINITION OF AN IDEAL PURIFICATION SOLUTION

- Able to clean up the full spectrum of possible contaminants with a single technology
- Lowest energy thermodynamically possible for water purification, waste water remediation and desalination. In the field, no external power source required.
- Technically simple and robust
- Greatest non-fouling and non-scaling capability ever applied to water purification or desalination.
- No ongoing maintenance requirements: eliminating chemicals, backflushing, plant downtime

SMART MEMBRANE TECHNOLOGY

The Smart Membrane core technology was designed from inception to provide ultraspecific filtration in rigorous real-world environments at the lowest energy and lowest total cost (infrastructure, maintenance training, etc.) possible. Developing a technology capable of dealing with the highly complex set of issues involved in water purification and desalination was a key consideration in the basic design of Smart Membranes. The implication of working to the rigorous nanotechnology definition of "complete control at the atomic scale" provides unprecedented benefits in such areas as exquisite filtration specificity, high filtration performance, low energy requirements, non-fouling in the face of multiple complex feedstocks and the other criteria need to be an ideal solution to water purification and desalination needs.

Although a Smart Membrane is only a few atomic layers thick (.05-.22 nm). it consists of three distinct parts:

- 1. A protective top **layer** is designed to amplify non-fouling characteristics, amplify water ordering to further reduce energy costs, and extend the working life of the Smart Membrane. This protective layer can be custom engineered on an atom-by-atom level of design to provide a specificity previousty found only in living systems. As a result, many of nature's successful anti-fouling strategies can be applied for the first time.
- 2. A **one-atomic** layer thick nanomembrane is directly under the protective top coating. This is where the work of filtration and separation is carried out. The nanomembrane is designed and built to provide only the desired end **product** usually either potable water (water plus earth salts), or water that is completely salt free, This membrane eliminates anything other than the specific class of water that the customer wants. At one atomic layer thick, this membrane offers no impedance to flow.

The one-atom-thick nanomembrane is the key to the benefits which a **Smart** Membrane can deliver. Unlike the way conventional membranes are constructed through bulk

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processes, each nanomembrane seri-assembles from a collection of custom designed, pharmacologically-built pores.

Smart Membranes result from the creation of a new class of extremely selective, biomimetic Smart Pores which assemble into thin (0.5nanometer-.22nanometer) porous nanomembranes. These porous monolayer membranes have specific structures that provide a low energy barrier to the passage of water or specific solutes, while providing a high barrier to other solutes. This technology shows highly specific molecular filtration at the atomic scale and profound transport properties such as exquisite ion selectivity characteristics.

Each pore has been designed and built with complete atomic precision in exactly the same way that a pharmaceutical is designed and built. Often the design of the pore's interior may mimic the active filtration portion in cell membrane proteins, such as aquaporin, nature's water channel. By eliminating the voluminous support structures in the natural aquaporin and building only the "business part" of the molecule, a Smart Pore can move water even taster than its natural counterpart.

Because of this tight atomic design control, a pore need not be built to merely exclude contaminants based on their size, but can also be built to eliminate classes of contaminants based on their complete chemical identity including atomic shape, electrical charge, hydrophobicity, hydrophilicity, etc. This demonstrated ability means, for example, that a complex, mixed waste stream including a wide range of 400,000 different contaminants. earth salts, urea and water can deliver just potable water (water and earth salts). The major technical achievement demonstrated here is that even though the urea (a known toxin) is smaller than the earth salts; urea is rejected based on its electronic characteristics rather than size.

The exterior of each pore has a distinct top, bottom and sides. Think of a Leggo block with a hole in the center. The hole does the filtering work, but the top, bottom and side attachment sites on the Leggo let it snap together with other Leggo blocks. The sides of the pares attach to each other to form the nanomembrane the way the sides of Leggo blocks snap together to form a plane.

On the top surface, this snap-on ability allows the precision building of the protective top layer (discussed above) which can be specifically designed to prevent bacterial fouling, scaling and other forms of fouling while also enhancing water ordering to further reduce energy demands.

On the bottom surface, the snap-on ability allows the pores in the nano-membrane to attach to a thicker, porous substrate.

3. The porous substrate. The porous substrate answers the question of how to handle a nanomembrane that is only one atomic layer thick. The porous substrate is a thin film, much like a thinner version of Saran Wrap, with a regular army of holes in it. The porous substrate is a passive, structural component. Is purpose is strictly to support the nanomembrane, allow for handling during manufacturing and contribute to the working lifespan of the membrane. The nanomembrane does the actual work of filtration: the porous substrate lets the water flow on through.

This basic technology enables the delivery the application-critical benefits, as exemplified in the following four key areas:

- 1. Ultra specificity in filtration
- 2 Low maintenance through non-fouling, non-scaling characteristics
- 3. Ultra small device footprint coupled with ultra high performance
- 4. Ultra low Energy requirements
- 1. Specificity. Previousty, the ability to create potable water by removing urea, even though the urea is smaller than the earth salts, was described. This is an unprecedented technical achievement, and a strong demonstration of exquisite control over specificity of filtration. Because pores can be built to absolute specification different sizes, shapes, charges, etc. - this ability can be tuned to apply specific filtration to any class of problem required.

2 Low Maintenance. A membrane, no matter, how perfect its ability to filter, is useless. if it is dogged. Scale buildup in water with notable mineral content is one such problem. Bacteria are another prime problem: they attach to surfaces and form rock hard biofilm which impairs or ends filter performance, Conventional membranes are backflushed and bleached with harsh chemicals to kill bacteria or to descale; this requires plant downtime and creates maintenance expense.

The Smart Membrane's ability to address problem through specificity at *the* atomic **level** opens unprecedented opportunities to control these problems. For example, the technology of the Smart Membrane provides multiple strategies to defeat biofilm formation. Some strategies are at the level of the pores and nanomembrane, and others are employed by the protective top

coating, creating a total anti-bacterial environment.

One major strategy of bacteria is to use the thread-like pili (seen here surrounding the main body of an E coli bacterium) as grappling hooks to establish a foothold on a surface. But E. coli's pili, for example, measure 650 angstroms in diameter and are too bigto snag onto any feature in a Smart Membrane. The pili are 100

Both the nanomembrane and the protective layer above it appear to **these bacteria** as absolutely **smooth**, featureless surfaces. The **structures** of both the protective layer and the nanomembrane are too small to be used by bacteria.

Laminar flow is also known to inhibit bacteria's ability to form biofilm. The environment bacteria encounter is optimized for laminar flow: they are swept along with no ability to attach to a surface.

Other bacteria do not use pili, but colonize by laying down a **sinne** layer. **But** bath classes of bacteria are known to have characteristics which **can** be **used** to inhibit biofilm formation. Both classes of bacteria prefer a hydrophobic surface on **which** to begin colonization. Bacteria are also known to be vulnerable to a range of anti-microbial **chemical** and pharmaceutical agents. Therefore, among the design requirements for the protective layer is to **present** a bacteria-hostile, hydrophilic surface studded with anti-microbial destruct points, and **optimized** for laminar flow.

This ability to design with atomic precision has never been available before. It means that many strategies for preventing fouling and scaling, or strategies for precision filtration are made available for the first time. In addition, this is setup up for continual filtration over a long life span. Unlike bucky tubes, activated charcoal or deionization media which ultimately saturate, a nanomembrane simply filters: undesirable classes of contaminants cannot pass through the membrane and are dumped to waste. Desirable pure filtrate water passes through the pore and is captured

- 3. Small Footprint, High Performance. Attached to their Saran-Wrap-like porous substrate, the complete Smart Membranes are only 0.5 microns thick, in contrast with conventional membranes which 35 times thicker. Therefore, a huge amount of filtration capability fits into a very small footprint Calculations indicate that one square foot of membrane could produce 205 gallons of purified water per day operating at <1psi. At this filtration rate, high volume water purification could be provided within a small footprint: a Smart Membrane cube measuring 165mm (6.5 inches) per side could produce 100,000 gallons per day at 1 psi. A city & 5 Million people with a 600 gigaliter annual water need could be met with 5,000 such cubes.
- 4. Low Energy Requirements. Because these membranes are so thin, very little energy is required for their operations. Because these membrane structures are so thin, it is useful to think about them in quantum mechanical terms rather than classical fluid mechanical terms. Dr. William Dean of MIT has described these pores as "orifices" offering no impedance to flow, rather than as conventional "pores."

With low pressure drops across a nanomembrane 0.5 nanometers thick, high flux is produced at very low pressure differential. In fact, the impedance to flow is created by the porous substrate — although its job is to provide support, the rate limit on how fast water can be processed is how long it takes to flow through the "thick" substrate.

In the most energy efficient mode, a filtration cartridge would sit at the bottom of a tube with a 27" head of water. At 1 psi, gravity does the work to purify the water.

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SMART MEMBRANES AND DESALINATION

The most expensive form of creating potable water or water completely lacking salt is desalination. Excluding any recent rise in the **cost** of energy, today desalinization of seawater can cost over \$1,000US per acre-foot. Water with less salt in it (brackish water) costs less to dean because the lower salt content drops the amount of pressure required. Although Tampa Bay, Florida had once hoped to desalinate a mix of brackish water and seawater at a cost of only \$650US per acre-foot, the potential cost reduction was due to favorable financing terms, not technical breakthroughs. Even at Tampa Bay's target cost, this still leaves desalination open only to energy and cash rich countries of the First World and the Middle East.

The claims of dramatically lower cost desalination which used to be made by the Tampa Bay, Florida project are now being made by the Ashkelon project in Israel. These numbers, which have even been quoted by the Congressional Budget Office as reflecting the current price of desalination, are again based strictly on financing deals which have been described in the industry experts as brilliant." According to desalination experts within the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, these systems contain no technological contribution to increased efficiency. The true cost of desalination remains unchanged. In fact, Tampa Bay failed to meet its technical performance goals by 50% and is currently undergoing re-engineering.

Energy is the largest cast component of desalination: annually, energy casts generally match capital costs. A \$400M plant can expect to generate a \$400M annual energy bill, assuming no price increases for energy. A dominant percentage of the capital costs are also derived from the energy requirement, e.g., high pressure pumps, energy recovery systems.

The final stage of purification — in which the water and salt are separated - accounts for 99% of the energy cost. Of that energy cost, roughly 2/3^{rds} is due to overcoming 1) the long and 2) tortuous path of the pores in conventional membranes. Only 1/3rd is due to overcoming the osmotic gradient of the salt.

The Smart Membrane's extreme thinness and lack of tortuous paths immediately eliminates the 2/3rds energy penalty experienced by conventional membranes. Significant as this cost reduction is, the impact of moving to a low-energy/low pressure mode ripples through the overall design of any water system, accounting for an additional reduction of both the capital cost and labor casts. Concomitantly, eliminating high pressure pumps, energy recovery systems (little wasted energy to recover), certain pretreatment systems, reducing system complexity and maintenance costs may provide overall cost reductions on the order of 60 or 70% for a Smart Membrane seawater desalination system.

SMART MEMBRANE TECHNOLOGY MODIFICATION AND DESALINATION

The differences between using a Smart Membrane for desalination, as opposed to water purification are:

 For use in desalination, a smaller pore must be used than the basic water purification pore. A water purification pore can pass up to 4 water molecules at a time. For desalination, the pore must be capable of passing only 2 water molecules at a time.

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- 2. Further "snap on" chemistry must be used to overcome the osmotic gradient.
- In addition to the 1 psi energy requirement, 10 degrees of temperature change would be needed
- 4. The footprint would expand: the equivalent of two 6.5" cubes would now be needed to provide 100,000 gallons of desalinated water, instead of one cube.

OVERCOMING OSMOTIC GRADIENT WITH A SMART MEMBRANE SYSTEM

Conventional desalination today uses reverse osmosis with thick polymer membranes. To push the water through the membrane and leave the salt behind requires pressures ranging from 180 psi (for use with brackish water) up to 1400 psi (for use with seaweter). In each case, 2/3 rds of the pressure is used to overcome the tortuosity and the thickness of the membranes. The remaining 1/3 is to overcome the osmotic gradient: with salt water on one side of a membrane and fresh water on the other side, the more concentrated salt solution Wants" to pull more fresh water onto its side until the salt content is evenly balanced between both sides. In reverse osmosis, the additional pressure is placed on the salt side to push fresh water through the membrane and away from the salt.

Because of the Smart Membrane's extreme **thinness**, the penalty for overcoming the tortuosity and thickness of conventional membranes is eliminated. Therefore, **2/3rds of** the pressure requirement and **2/3rds** of the energy cast disappear.

This leaves the remaining issue of dealing with osmotic gradient and reducing its attendant costs. Recently, a different technique has been used to eliminate the need for high pressure in dealing with an osmotic gradient: forward osmosis. The most widely known example has been the DoD's use of the technique for rehydrating food packages or sports drinks using a warfighter's urine or waste water. In this technique, a contaminated solution (urine or unsafe water) is placed on one side of the membrane. Sugar is placed on the other side of the membrane. The sugar draws the liquid in the contaminated solution across the membrane until there is an osmotic balance between the two sides. The membrane, to the best of its ability, separates water from contaminants. The user now has a sports drink or a hydrated food package.

Note that this technique produces purified water, not desalinated water (water free from a high solute content).

The disadvantages of this technique which limit its usefulness are:

- unless the desired end product is a sports drink or a hydrated foodpackage, the
 user now has water contaminated by sugar or some other substance which
 would require punification.
- once the sugar or food packet is used up, more sugar or another sorbent must be imported to process the next batch of water. This makes the technique expensive and impractical.
- As used today with conventional membranes, urea also passes along with the
 water and salts into the sports drink or hydrated food package. Urea is a known
 toxin, and too much exposure will cause kidney failure.

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However, moved to a level of atomic precision, this forward osmosis technique can be modified to overcome its disadvantages and made useful for desalination. For desalination with a Smart Membrane, a reusable, high density ("thirsty") molecular sponge can be engineered and snapped onto the base of the Smart Membrane. The sponge would soak upwater from the bottom of the pomes until saturation is reach. A few degrees of temperature change would be required to "wring" the sponge out and release the water into the catch chamber. The sponge is now ready to soak up another batch of water. As abundantly demonstrated in nature, many other systems commonly load and release over prolonged lifetimes. By designing and building at the atomic scale, these systems can be borrowed and modified for use elsewhere.

SUMMARY

Smart Membranes represent a new technology based *on* building materials which mimic the way nature performs filtration, selection, and protection against biofilm and scale formation. This technology is anticipated to out perform any known or planned competitors. The benefits include operating in an ultra-low energy mode, and producing highly pure and highly specific filtration.

Smart Membrane technology is anticipated to be applicable and superior for applications in:

- Desalination applications, including both seawater and brackishwater.
- Purification applications, ranging from high punty semiconductor, other industrial and medical uses through home drinking water.
- Remediation of both waste water and polluted ground water.

Their specific technical capabilities include:

- Unique 'full-spectrum" filtration of any mix of contaminants in the water feedstock
- The highest purity possible
- The lowest cost possible
- The lowest energy requirements possible
- Extreme flexibility of capacity, from municipal scale to hand held units in the field, in an extremely small footprint. A 6.5" cube is anticipated to provide 100,000 gallons of purified water per day.
- "Filter and forget" robustness under tough conditions.

Applying Smart Membranes to the problems of water purification and desalination holds the potential to **positively** impact the world water crisis and the many dimension which water shortage or impure water represents: heatth, agricultural **productivity**, industrial

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productivity, and conflict between nations. Because the technology combines high performance with low total costs (product costs, energy, infrastructure, maintenance, training, etc.), it is anticipated to have major impact at opposite ends of the spectrum

- 1. High Performance Venues. In addition to water users with high purity demands, such as semiconductor manufacturers or medical applications, organizations such as the US DoD services, whose needs encompass and surpass those requirements are anticipated to derive value from Smart Membrane technology. The DoD operates in the most extreme environmental and logistical conditions, and is required to deal with the fullest array of water quality and water quantity problems. In addition, their operation is usually subject to the strictest footprint, weight, component resupply, volume issues, maintenance and safety requirements. The range is exemplified by the need for desalination and purification occurring everywhere from submarines at depth to individual warfighters on the ground facing C6W contaminated water, or no liquids at all expect for their own sweat and urine.
- 2. Low Cost/High Volume. Municipal systems and point of use applications both in the U.S. and internationally are anticipated to be used by those seeking higher purity fresh water at low cost, or desalinated water at low cost to cope with water shortage. At a competitive price point, the Smart Membrane technology could provide cost-effective desalination to the American mid-west as well as cost-effective water purification against the problems such as arsenic, giardia, etc. Expressed interest in Smart Membranes has came from Australia, Singapore, China and India in addition to European parties. Introduction in some venues, such as the water-short Middle East, may assist in reducing tensions and increasing prosperity.

Various new paradigms of how water is delivered may well evoive, and with them new paradigms for living, conducting business or military operations. For example, municipal systems may become more widely distributed. Countries with substandard infrastructure may opt for home point of use systems to augment central municipal facilities. Military operations may be more flexible once the logistical burdens of water provision are lifted.

By combining high performance with low cost, Smart Membranes hold a potential solution to seemingly intractable problems involving water quality and water quantity.



SUBJECT: Army End Strength Increase

- Senators Lieberman and Clinton have introduced legislation (the "United States Army Relief Act of 2005") to increase the Army's active end strength.
- They may offer this legislation as a floor amendment to the Defense authorization bill.
- Their bill would add 100,000 troops to the Army by FY **09** (or **80,000** above the FY **05** authorized end strength of 502,400).
- You asked what this would cost per year, and whether Congress would include the funding (TAB A).
 - The FY 06 cost is about \$10B, roughly half in recurring costs and half in one time costs. The total FY 06 to FY 09 cost is about \$63B (details, TAB B).
 - The Leiberman/Clinton bill did not include funding, or propose a way to pay for the increased end strength.
 - **Chairman** Warner's committee reported bill proposes a FY 06 Army end strength of **522,400** (+40,000) -- the same starting point **as** the Lieberman/Clinton bill ... and also did not authorize additional funding for the increase.
 - The House Appropriations Committee did not include funds to increase Army end strength. The Senate Appropriations Committee has not completed **mark** up.

- You asked for a more comprehensive look at what the cost figures include for the Army
 end strength increase and how long it will take to get the additional people on duty.
 (TAB A)
- The FY 2006 cost is \$9.9 billion. There are no equipment costs in the first year. Included are \$0.6 billion for training, \$5.4 billion for infrastructure, and \$2.6 billion for pay and allowances. Attached is a table that displays all cost categories. (TAB B)
- The total FY 2006–FY 2009 cost is \$63.1 billion. This includes \$10.1 billion for equipment, \$4.2 billion for training, \$22.2 billion for infrastructure, and \$19.5 billion for pay and allowances.
- The proposed legislation phases the increased end strength over a 4-year period from FY 2006 to FY 2009, with increases of 20K people per year.
 - The Army anticipates that it can increase its end strength by an additional 5K to 6K personnel per year based on historical recruiting trends.
 - At this rate, it would take several years instead of 4 years to reach the 582.4K end strength floor proposed in the legislation.


SUBJECT: Exchange Programs



- (U) First, how many countries have signed them? As of August 22,2005,101 **countries** out of 182 target countries have signed an Article 98 agreement with the U.S., of which 90 are officially in force.
 - o Venn Diagram illustrating our global Article 98 effort at Tab B.
 - o List of Article 98 agreements at Tab C.
- (FOUO) Second: "Do we now have more Article 98 Agreements than countries that have ratified the Treaty itself?"
 - Yes. The 101 countries that have signed Article 98 agreements are two more than
 the 99 State's Parties to the ICC Treaty. Forty-two Article 98 signatories are party
 to the ICC Treaty.
- (FOUO) Third: "Where should we be working hardest to complete agreements, and what else do we need to be doing?"
 - We are developing a strategy with State to target priority countries over the next 6
 months that will utilize high-level contacts, including John Bolton's presence at
 the UN, direct negotiations and guidance cables for Ambassadors and DATTs.
 Priority countries/areas include:
 - Latin America. Of the 33 countries in the region, only 14 have signed an Article 98 Agreement (42%). Another strong push in this region could yield several more Article 98s in the mid-term (next six months).



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
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

After we spoke in December, you asked me to prepare a reply from you to the Secretary on the CIO question. Based on our conversation in the car last week, I've revised a January 7 paper that I'd sent up, and the new version is attached for your consideration (Tab 1). In addition to our two discussions, it reflects recent talks with John Kasich, Pete Geren, Ken Krieg, Steve Cambone, and others.

Per yesterday's discussion, the memo focuses only on the CIO-ASD(NII) combination vice the four organizational options I'd originally proposed.

We have looked at the concept of a Defense Information Board, which you'd raised earlier. It is feasible, but given the difficulties of establishing a new Advisory Board under FACA rules, an Information Sub-Panel of the DSB may be a much easier way to achieve the same goals.

Next under is an amplification of some of the qualifications you might want in a CIO/ASD(NII)

Will be glad to discuss at your convenience.

SUBJECT: Response to CIO (Kasich Group) Snowflake

I support the points Ken Krieg made to you in his memo of October 25, and have spoken with DepSecDef, the Chairman and Vice Chairman, Steve Cambone, and Mike Wynne as you asked. This memo amplifies Ken's and suggests ways ahead.

How do we empower the CIO for the Department?

All principals supported the concept of a strong, information-age Chief Information Officer (CIO) for DoD, with skills and powers to help transform the Department into an information-age organization. Success will involve leadership, communications, and marketing skills. How empowered he or she will be depends on answers to the questions raised below.

A strong ClO can't succeed without the backing of the Secretary's "full faith and credit," but empowering the CIO requires leadership, not new authorities.

- Both Title 40 and Title 10 give the ClO significant powers regarding budget and program oversight. Despite perceptions that Title 10 perpetuates Service and agency stovepipes, all applicable authorities come together at your level and you can choose how to balance them. Adoption of an enterprise-wide, information-centric focus would be a major change, but wouldn't require new statutes.
- Thus, I agree with Ken that the first question for you to decide is whether or not you personally want to take this issue on. But, if you do take it on, you also have to be willing to follow through. This can't be done just with periodic expressions of support. Key net-centric programs are underway, but they were begun when budgets were growing. Historical patterns don't bode well for continued net-centric transformation in a time of constrained resources without a sustained commitment from the top. As Ken puts it: "In a competition between digits and widgets, the widgets usually win." Supporters of net-centric transformation may wince when their own china starts being broken.

The CIO must become the "enabler" of information age transformation, but not the "doer." He or she must communicate the value of a net-centric environment

and drive and enforce standards, such as configuration, security and data management.

To achieve this, governance is key. Trust must be built before people will be willing to take chances, and to get this trust the CIO must:

- σ Establish consistent and clear policies.
- Bring Principal Staff Assistants (**PSAs**) and components along as partners, and empower them to succeed.
- Measure progress.

.

• Find a big stick to prod the Department along. Industry ClOs point to the leverage provided by clearly enunciated standards, coupled with an ability to report to their Chief Executive Officers (CEOs) on compliance with the standards throughout their organizations.

The qualifications for the CJO will depend on what you want from the position

- Given the importance of your personal backing for the CIO, if you decide you're <u>not</u> willing to engage on a sustained basis, then leave the model as is. Look primarily to hire a technically oriented ASD/NII with a secondary role as an information-oriented CIO. The NII/CIO staff will do their best to leverage existing authorities to continue promoting information age transformation.
- Four models of a stronger CIO were proposed during the discussions with principals (no effort is made to rank them here):
 - 1. Emphasize the CIO role and leave it with NII, but as DoD ClO/ASD(NII).
 - 2. Dual-hat an Under Secretary as ClO.
 - 3. Establish a stand-alone CIO. This led to two variants:
 - a. A stand-alone CIO within OSD, which might not be Senate-confirmed.
 - b. A completely new model, in which the CIO would have an internal role and also an external one, as Chairman of a DSB-like Defense Information Board, which would serve as an Information Advisory Committee

Each of the last 3 models may have significant legal and organizational questions to be worked out.

What is the next step for the Kasich Group?

From a long range point of view, the most important element for the Department is to put in place a <u>process for continuous transformation</u>, one that will be hard to roll back and will transcend the tenure of any particular leader. The Kasich Group could provide advice on such approaches.

Once the type of **CIO** is decided, the recruiting process will be a major key to success: **A** world-class search committee should be set **up** to begin the search as soon as the questions above are answered, perhaps with Kasich Group support.

The Kasich Group also could help address some serious issues, such as:

- The industry model doesn't work exactly here:
 - DoD is much larger and more complex than any company.
 - If a business fails, it goes out of business. If DoD fails, people die. There are, therefore, reasonable limits to the amount of risk DoD can accept.
 - Our need to use competition makes it hard to impose sole-source standards (industry noted their standards often were product-specific).
 - o Industry's two-to-hire, one-to-fire model for component CIOs will need careful monitoring if it is to work within the government's military and civilian personnel systems.

How do we ensure that this effort to produce an Information Age CIO will succeed? If it doesn't, it will be years before someone tries again.

I recommend that:

. .(. . . .

- A small DoD-only group begin addressing the above issues and prepare a short briefing to introduce the CIO issue to the SLRG, or a subset, in December.
- A longer SLRG session be scheduled in January in which the CEOs and ClOs from, say, two or three of the companies you saw before would spend 30-45 minutes with the SLRG to provide private sector perspectives. The CIO recruiting action would stem from this second session, though candidates could begin to be evaluated earlier against the different organizational models.
- The Kasich Group be engaged to help with the preparations for the second session, and also to address some of the issues raised above.
- Execution of the implementation strategy Ken recommended be deferred until
 the new CIO is on board, though NII will prepare interim approaches as your
 direction unfolds.

Hope this helps. Will be glad to discuss any of these issues further.

SUBJECT: CIO (Kasich Group) Snowflake

This memorandum is in response to your questions in subject snowflake. The views are mine alone. My first question – and the key insight from the roundtable discussion – is will this area be one of your key priorities in the next period of time? The clear consensus was that the effectiveness of the CIOs stemmed from the commitment of their CEOs to this area. Assuming that it will be in the top tier (a crowded level, I realize), here are some thoughts on your two questions.

How do we empower a CIO for the Department?

To be effective, the CIO must be perceived as a DoD vice OSD official. The CIOs worldview has to be broad (operational and business, now and in the future), his focus has to be on customers (joint war fighters and key decision-makers), and his style has to be balanced (integrating strategy vice advocating specific programs). There are three areas of empowerment – perceived authority, actual authority, and the individual's capability to use the authority.

- Perceived authority is derived from the Secretary by the level of the
 position, in part, and, more fully, by the time and attention you give to it.
 The CIO is now a dual-hat position with the Assistant Secretary for
 Networks and Information Integration, I would respectfully argue that the
 role is a little lost in the noise right now.
- Actual authorities probably could be strengthened in three areas -- by practice more than by legislation:
 - 1. The establishment of a DoD implementation strategy led by the CIO and agreed to by the SLRG/SEC setting out direction, standards, and responsibilities. This should be of the 500-day variety vice the "hard-to-measure" grand strategy statements.
 - 2. The CIO would oversee implementation of the strategy and report regularly to you (and the SLRG/SEC) on performance and accountability.
 - 3. To add a little pressure to the system, you should establish dual-reporting lines for the component CIOs linking them to both the Component heads (i.e., Service Secretaries, etc.) and the DoD CIO.

• The individual's capability to use that authority will come from picking the right person. This is a key hire.

Much of this is in the Department's control. To work, the CIO will have to be and be seen as a key member of the senior leadership group.

What is the next step in the Kasich Group?

As we work through this issue, I think we can use John and his team in the following ways:

- As a red team to bounce development ideas off of.
- o Potentially help with the personnel search.
- Use a combination of CIOs plus their chairman for a "seminar discussion" with SLRG at kick-off for a QDR topic.

This memorandum is in response to your questions in subject snowflake. The views are mine alone. My first question – and the key insight from the roundtable discussion – is will this area be one of your key priorities in the next period of time? The clear consensus was that the effectiveness of the CIOs stemmed from the commitment of their CEOs to this area. Assuming that it will be in the top tier (a crowded level, I realize), here are some thoughts on your two questions.

How do we empower a CIO for the Department?

To be effective, the CIO must be perceived as a DoD vice OSD official. The CIOs worldview has to be broad (operational and business, now and in the future), his focus has to be on customers (joint war fighters and key decision-makers), and his style has to be balanced (integrating strategy vice advocating specific programs). There are three areas of empowerment – perceived authority, actual authority, and the individual's capability to use the authority.

- Perceived authority is derived from the Secretary by the level of the
 position, in part, and, more fully, by the time and attention you give to it.
 The CIO is now a dual-hat position with the Assistant Secretary for
 Networks and Information Integration. I would respectfully argue that the
 role is a little lost in the noise right now.
- Actual authorities probably could be strengthened in three areas -- by practice more than by legislation:
 - 1. The establishment of a DoD implementation strategy led by the CIO and agreed to by the SLRG/SEC setting out direction, standards, and responsibilities. This should be of the 500-day variety vice the "hard-to-measure" grand strategy statements.
 - 2. The CIO would oversee implementation of the strategy and report regularly to you (and the SLRG/SEC) on performance and accountability.
 - 3. To add a little pressure to the system, you should establish dual-reporting lines for the component CIOs linking them to both the Component heads (i.e., Service Secretaries, etc.) and the DoD CIO.

• The individual's capability to use that authority will come from picking the right person. This is a key hire.

Much of this is in the Department's control. To work, the CIO will have to be and be seen as a key member of the senior leadership group.

What is the next step in the Kasich Group?

As we work through this issue, I think we can use John and his team in the following ways:

- As a red team to bounce development ideas off of.
- Potentially help with the personnel search.
- Use a combination of CIOs plus their chairman for a "seminar discussion" with SLRG at kick-off for a QDR topic.
- Lastly, you might think about bringing one or two of them on either DBB or DSB.

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All principals supported the concept of a strong, information-age Chief Information Officer (CIO) for DoD, with skills and powers to help transform the Department into an information-age organization. Success will involve leadership, communications, and marketing skills. How empowered he or she will be depends on answers to the questions raised below.

A strong CIO can't succeed without the backing of the Secretary's "full faith and credit," but empowering the CIO requires leadership, not new authorities.

- Both Title 40 and Title 10 give the CIO significant powers regarding budget and program oversight. Despite perceptions that Title 10 perpetuates Service and agency stovepipes, all applicable authorities come together at your level and you can choose how to balance them. Adoption of an enterprise-wide, information-centric focus would be a major change, but wouldn't require new statutes.
- Thus, I agree with Ken that the first question for you to decide is whether or not you personally want to take this issue on. But, if you do take it on, you also have to be willing to follow through. This can't be done just with periodic expressions of support. Key net-centric programs are underway, but they were begun when budgets were growing. Historical patterns don't bode well for continued net-centric transformation in a time of constrained resources without a sustained commitment from the top. As Ken puts it: "In a competition between digits and widgets, the widgets usually win." Supporters of net-centric transformation may wince when their own china starts being broken.

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To achieve this, governance is key. Trust must be built before people will be willing to take chances, and to get this trust the CIO must:

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Each of the last 3 models may have significant legal and organizational questions to be worked out.

What is the next step for the Kasich Group?

From a long range point of view, the most important element for the Department is to put in place a <u>process for continuous transformation</u>, one that will be hard to roll back and will transcend the tenure of any particular leader. The Kasich Group could provide advice on such approaches.

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I recommend that:

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- The Kasich Group be engaged to help with the preparations for the second session, and also to address some of the issues raised above.
- Execution of the implementation strategy Ken recommended be deferred until the new CIO is on board, though NII will prepare interim approaches as your direction unfolds.

After we spoke in December, you asked me to prepare a reply from you to the Secretary on the C1O question. Based on our conversation in the car yesterday, I've revised a January 7 paper that I'd sent up, and the new version is attached for your consideration (Tab 1). In addition to our two discussions, it reflects recent talks with John Kasich, Pete Geren, Ken Krieg, Steve Cambone, and others.

Per yesterday's discussion, the memo focuses only on the CIO-ASD(NII) combination vice the four organizational options I'd originally proposed.

We have looked at the concept of a Defense Information Board, which you'd raised earlier. It is feasible, but given the difficulties of establishing a new Advisory Board under FACA rules, an Information Sub-Panel of the DSB may be a much easier way to achieve the same goals.

Next under is an amplification of some of the qualifications you might want in a ClO/ASD(NII)

Will be glad to discuss at your convenience. I'm leaving for PACOM tomorrow, back on February 3rd, but my staff can make any changes to the memo while I'm gone.

Qualifications for CIO/ASD(NII)

- 1) Experience in managing a very large organization (not just consultant experience)
- 2) At least some knowledge of DoD
- 3) Sufficient technical expertise to understand what is required for success in three critical areas
 - network operations (not just the old telephone company/comms network ops),
 - network security, and
 - performance in a very large, heterogeneous environment

Failure in any one of these could undo the vision, and

4) An ability to implement a collaborative environment and practices (human side) across a very large constituency.

Answer. In response to your issue (TAB A), approximately 18 hours after
Hurricane Katrina made landfall on 30 August, we initiated coordination with
USNORTHCOM and USJFCOM to form teams to capture lessons learned from
the Hurricane Katrina relief efforts. The major collection and analysis effort is
being led by the USJFCOM Joint Center for Operational Analysis – Lessons
Learned in close coordination with USNORTHCOM and the Joint Staff.
Subsequent coordination included the National Guard Bureau, USPACOM, and
OASD(HD).

Analysis

- An initial team of five personnel deployed from USNORTHCOM, USJFCOM, and the Joint Staff to Fort Gillem, 1st Army Headquarters (HQ), on 31 August to collect lessons learned. Four of these personnel joined the Commander, Joint Task Force Katrina (CG 1st Army), at the forward HQ, Camp Shelby on 2 September. By 7 September, nine joint teams totaling 61 personnel were in place, in addition to 24 Service personnel embedded with major units for Service-specific lessons, as listed in the attachment (TAB B).
- A Joint Staff strategic lessons learned team, in coordination with OASD(HD), will interview senior leaders of the Department of Defense and key federal agencies (TAB C) in support of the National Response Plan. These interviews are critical to capturing DOD strategic lessons to better respond to future major domestic incidents.

Latin strongman rebels against UScentric news

CARACAS, VENEZUELA - Television is a window on the world. But if you're sitting in Latin America, that window is more likely to be facing Baghdad than Buenos Aires. Or show Michael Jackson Instead of Mexico City. Or offer a clearer view of Ukraine's Orange Revolution than the one in Ecuador last month.

Those networks that do cover regional news, like CNN Español, based in Atlanta, or Spain's TVE, are often considered US- or Eurocentric, with pundits sitting in Washington or Madrid. International news from the Latin American perspective is almost nonexistent, critics say.

"But," says journalist Aram Aharonian, "not for long"

On May 24, Venezuelan President Hugo ChBvez will launch a 24-hour hemisphericTV news network, with Mr. Aharonian at the helm. The idea, Mr. Chávez has explained on several occasions, is to offer a "Southern" perspective, and combat what he calls "the conspiracy" by networks to ignore or "distort" information from and about this region.

BUI critics worry that Televisora del Sur (Telesur), or TV of the South, will be used by Chávez to drown out the free press at home and spread his populist, socialist, and anti-US message and abroad.

'We get enough of him already," says Ana Cristina Nuñez, legal counsel at Globovision, a 24-hour local news station that is critical of ChBvez Globovision, like all channels in Venezuela, functions under a so-called "chain" system, which means it is obligated by law to drop everything and cover Chávez speeches whenever instructed by the government. Those speeches are often hour-long rants about the US or afternoon chats with "the people," during which he has been known to describe President Bush as a "jerk" who wants to invade Venezuela or sing praises of Cuban President Fidel Castro

Latin America's Al Jazeera?

Comparisons of the new TV venture are being made to Al Jazeera, the Arabic-language network funded by the government of Qatar that has been criticized frequently by **US** officials for what they call "inflammatory" or "biased" reporting.

Still. "bias" for one person can simply be a well-rounded view for another.

"I am in favor of initiatives that create additional voices in the news," says John Dinges, an associate professor of Journalism at Columbia University in New York. "Al Jazeera, for example, has made an important impact on journalism in the Middle East... Alternative looks at the facts can be positive."

Problems do arise, he warns, when news becomes too political. "Look at Fox TV in the US," he says. "If you create a medium to fill a political need -that's politics, not journalism." If Telesur is going to be a state-sponsored vehicle for Chávez, it will be bad journalism, says Mr. Dinges "But if it's being done in order to spread an alternative journalistic voice, it will be good journalism and a contribution," he says.

Telesur's programming, which will be available free over the airwaves, will be split between news and "Latin America interest" documentaries, reaching viewers across South and North America, with expansion planned to Western Europe and North Africa for later this year. Promos begin this month with shows starting in July.

Telesur is being described as a regional endeavor Argentina owns 20 percent, Cuba 19 percent, and Uruguay 10 percent. But Venezuela, with 51 percent, is the main player: The government has provided \$2.5 million in start-up capital. The total cost and source of the money have not been disclosed, but some funding will come from corporate sponsors, not advertising, Aharonian says.

Information Minister Andrés Izarra is the company's president, and headquarters are being constructed here in Caracas. Some 35 staffers are already in the cubicles of the makeshift second-floor office, beepers and cellphones clasped to their jeans. Other offices are being set up in Argentina, Uruguay, Brazil. Bolivia, Colombia, Mexico, Cuba, and in Washington. There is even a news anchor standing by. Ati Kiwa, an indigenous Colombian woman who wears traditional dress.

"We have been trained to see ourselves through foreign eyes," says Aharonian. "Europeans and Americans see us in black and while, and yet this is a technicolor continent"

Navigating Venezuela's media laws

For some, such talk rings hollow. "We all like the idea of a Latin American perspective of news, but not a one-sided view," replies Ms. Nuñez of Globovision. "I am very suspicious that Telesur will represent the voice only of leftist governments in Latin America - and will be an instrument of propaganda for them."

Globovision is not the only private media station in Venezuela hostile to Chávez. During the April 2002 coup that briefly ousted the president, most outlets openly sided with the opposition, providing round-the-clock coverage of anti-Chavez protests while refusing to air footage of massive demonstrations held in support of him. Since then, says Ms. Nuñez, "It has been payback time"

Globovision hired Nuñez four months ago in response to Chávez's new press laws, under which whoever "offends," or "shows disrespect for," or "defames" the president or his top officials, will face fines and punishment of six to 3θ months in prison.

Nuñez spends her days now, she says, trying to interpret those terms for the journalists and editors she works with.

"There is no jurisprudence to go by, and people don't know what is allowed and what's a crime," she says. The new laws have already led to widespread self- censorship across the country's half-dozen private channels, she says. Late-night TV jokes about Chávez are out, risqué political talk shows are being canceled, and news reports are being finely combed before airing. "Telesur is introducing a super-well-fundedofficial voice, just as free-press voices are being fined and intimidated," she says. "Coincidence?"

The French media advocacy group Reporters Without Borders and the New York-based Committee to Protect journalists are already worried. Both have expressed concerns over the increased regulation of media content. And Human Rights Watch, the international monitor, insists that governments can only restrict certain content if "there is a clear relation between the speech in question and a specific criminal act."

No plans to muzzle media

Aharonian dismisses any suggestion that Telesur is part of some bigger plan to muzzle the media or give Chdvez an open microphone. The programming is not "against or instead of any other." but simply an option, he maintains. "That is what the remote control is for," he says, "so people can pick and choose between different perspectives."

Larry Bims, director of the left-leaning Council on Hemispheric Alfairs in Washington is not quite as diplomatic. "Chdvez found himself yielding an important battlefield to anti-Chavistaperspective, both from within and from outside the county," he says. "Uruguay and Argentina found a similar lack of ability to communicate- and this is their combined response."

Ultimately, slanted or straight, Telesur's success will depend on whether it's watchable, says Richard Siklos, adjunct professor at New York University's department of culture and communication. "[Chavez] will learn what every media executive in New York has learned: You can put stuff out there, but if people don't watch, you are wasting your money."

General Bottleneck

Many businesses – some members of BENS, others not – after repeated attempts to donate significant amounts of much-needed capability, have called BENS in frustration seeking our assistance in penetrating the government bureaucracy. In virtually all cases, FEMA was the first intermediary contacted *to* deploy these offers, but after several days of unsatisfactory action from FEMA, efforts expanded to include other, non-governmental organizations such as the American Red Cross and BENS.

Typical Examples

- Manufacturer and operator of highly capable mobile telecommunications
 command centers. On Wednesday, August 31, the company offered to FEMA three.
 command centers, including experience operating teams, at no cost for 90 days.
 FEMA did not make a decision for approximately four days (citing no legal way to
 accept the donation), and then agreed to buy one command center, and then two days
 later agreed to buy several more.
- 2. Major aircraft manufacturer. On Saturday, September 3, company called BENS after having offered several helicopters and large cargo planes to FEMA without a response. Still no response as of today.
- 3. Major national aviation association. On Monday, September 5, an organization contacted BENS asking for help in moving FEMA into action. The organization had offered to make a large number of very capable private aircraft available to FEMA and/or others to evacuate residents and deliver food and other essential goods to affected areas from California, Florida and other states. No answer from FEMA after several days. Independent members of organization then began delivering supplies to affected areas without FEMA participation.
- **4.** Major U.S. airline. Airline offer of aircraft to FEMA produced no action after several days and multiple appeals. Airline contacted U.S. Senator last weekend to seek assistance. Resolution unknown.

FEMA's City of Anxiety in Florida

Many Hurricane Charley Victims Still Unsure of Next Step

PUNTA GORDA, Fla. -- "Someone killed my dog," sputtered Royaltee Forman, still livid two weeks later.

"They just threw him out the window and hung **him** with his own leash," he said, convinced that someone broke into his home while he was out. "I mean, what kind of place has this become?"

Forman's place is FEMA City, a dusty, baking, treeless collection of almost 500 trailers that was set up by the federal emergency agency last fall to house more than 1,500 people made homeless by Hurricane Charley, one of the most destructive storms in recent Florida history. The free stieller was welcomed by thankful survivors back then; almost a year later, most are still there -- angry, frustrated, depressed and increasingly desperate.

"FEMA City is now a socioeconomic time bomb just waiting to blow up," said Bob Hebert, director of recovery for Charlotte County, where most FEMA City residents u sed to he . "You throw together all these very different people under already tremendous stress, and bad things will happen. And this is the really difficult part: In our county, there's no other place for many of them to go."

As government efforts move forward to relocate and house some of the 1 million people displaced by Hurricane Katrina along the Gulf Coast — including plans to collect as many as 300,000 trailers and mobile homes for them — officials here say their experience offers some harsh and sobering lessons about the difficulties ahead

Most troubling, they said, is that while the badly damaged **town** of Punta Gorda is beginning to rebuild and even substantially upgrade one year after the storm, many of the area's most vulnerable people are being **left** badly behind.

The hurricane began that slide, destroying hundreds of modest homes and apartments along both sides of the

Peace River as it enters Charlotte Harbor, and almost all of Punta Gorda's public housing. Then as the apartments were slowly restored -- a process made more costly and time-consuming because of a shortage of contractors and workers -- landlords found that they could substantially increase their rents in the very tight market.

As a result, the low-income working people most likely to have been displaced by the hurricane are now most likely to be displaced by the recovery, too.

The unhappy consequence is that FEMA City's population has barely declined -- its trailers are occupied by 1,500 check-out clerks, nurse's aides, aluminum siding hangers, landscapers and more than a few people too old, too sick or too upset to work. A not-insignificant number of illegal immigrants and ex-convicts live there as well.

To the **county's** surprise, Hebert said, finding solutions to their ever-increasing problems is now the biggest and most **frustrating** part of the entire hurricane recovery effort.

"Having lived through the last year here, this is my advice to New Orleans and the other Gulf Coast towns: Don't make big camps with thousands of people, because it doesn't work," Hebert said. "It takes a bad situation and, for many people, actually makes it worse."

Hebert was referring to the growing family problems, vandalism and criminal activity at the site, but even more to the deadline looming over FEMA City. By regulation, federal emergency shelter only lasts 18 months after a disaster is declared, and in Charlotte County the emergency period will end on Feb. 13. By then, everyone is supposed to be out of the trailers.

The deadline can sometimes be extended, but **FEMA** City site manager Roger Larson said no extensions are currently planned in Florida In fact, more than 50 trailers have been taken out of FEMA City since Katrina hit, all headed to Mississippi and Louisiana **The prospect of forced evictions is on everyone's minds**.

"Personally, I think there will be riots here if they try to evict people," said Tiffanie Weygart, a high school junior who was spending time last week with some friends on the otherwise-deserted main street of FEMA City, her family's home for most of this year "We've got old people, we've got a lot of new babies. Where are they supposed to go?"

FEMA City is about 10 miles from Punta Gorda, its rows of white trailers covering 64 acres between the county jail and Interstate 75 The trailers are rent-free, but evacuees must pay for utilities

The contrast to Punta Gorda, a damaged but pretty waterfiont town with many historic homes, is extreme About 100 miles south of Tampa Bay, Punta Gorda is the only incorporated city in Charlotte **County** (population 140,000). It was a sleepy place by South Florida standards until Charley came in and performed its version of urban renewal.

"You almost hate to say this because of the difficulties so many people have had, but Charley tore down some buildings that needed to come down and cleared areas for much higher kinds of uses," said City Manager Howard Kunik

An old, damaged Holiday IM on the town's waterfront, for **instance**, has been demolished and will be replaced with an \$80 million condominium-hotel complex, and other upscale projects are moving forward. Many residents are excited by the changes, but others -- especially the poor and some in Punta's Gorda's long-standing African American neighborhood -- worry they will be permanently priced out of their old home town.

Those fears were stoked last month when the city made clear that it plans to tear down a public housing complex on the waterfiont to make way for much higher-income people

"That land was just too valuable to have poor people on it," said community leader Isaac Thomas He said that the local government is trying to help him and other black leaders save some of the modest but historic homes in

the African-American East End, but that "it's a really uphill fight."

This **uneven** recovery started on a far more **promising** note. The Federal Emergency Management Agency got generally **high** marks for its response to Hurricane Charley -- and three other Florida hurricanes last fall -- and that included the quick construction of the trailer *city*.

Tons of gravel, sand and crushed shells were trucked in to build up a low-lying meadow, and electrical and sewer lines were quickly laid. Officials say that last Christmas season, many homes were cheerfully lighted, and a sense of relief and thanks prevailed.

Today, that cheer is gone. That gritty soil makes the south Florida sun even hotter, and few people venture outside except to go to their cars. There are no trees, no shrubs, and only two small playgrounds for several hundred children.

Teenagers have been especially hard-hit - drug use, vandalism, break-ins and tights are widespread. Young people regularly call FEMA City a prison.

The troubles got so bad in the spring that the entire camp was fenced in, a county police substation was set up, and armed security guards were stationed at the one point where residents were allowed to enter and exit. Even with that, the number of calls to the county sheriffs office was \pm an all-time high last month - 257 calls that resulted in 78 police reports, many of them involving domestic violence, fights, juvenile delinquency and vandalism. In January, there were just 154 calls and 40 official actions.

Some of the vandalism has proven costly. Even after the expanded police deployment, FEMA officials said they had to spend almost \$20,000 recently to cover switches on the street lights because young people were so frequently turning them off

FEMA site manager Larson acknowledged the problems, but he said they should not overshadow the successes.

Providing shelter for so many people is a mammoth and expensive undertaking, he said, and many families have used the time to save money to pay the three-months' rent usually required upfront by landlords. In the past two weeks, he added, FEMA City has experienced its first population decline since opening in November

'We know the rental market is very tough **out** there, but we expect our tenants to make at **less**: three **calls a** month about new housing, and some are succeeding," he said.

But many are not. FEMA reports that one year after the four Florida storms, it is still providing 7,640 mobile homes or trailers for displaced people, 1,056 of them in Charlotte County. Both statewide and in Charlotte, that means almost half of the people who needed temporary FEMA shelter after the storms still rely on it.

Melissa Frey, who posts grocery prices at a local Winn-Dixie market, is one of them, and she watched with dread from her **FEMA** City doorway last week as another mobile home was hauled away. She said she **has** been looking for an apartment for herself and her 2-year-old daughter, with no luck. The stress of the hurricane and the aftermath led to a split with her husband and the loss of his income, and **so she** barely has **enough** money to cover expenses without paying rent.

"This is no way to live, and I just wish I could move out." she said. She lives a stone's throw from the **main** security post, but she still regularly finds her tires flattened by nails that she blames on vandals. "But I'm really worried about what's coming in February, and **so** are many other people here."

Others are angry.

"Basically, Charlotte County would be happy to see **us** all **go**," said Forman, the resident whose dog was strangled "They think they don't need **us**, and they really don't want us " Adding to his embitterment, the police ruled that the dog had thrown itself out the window, a conclusion his neighbors greeted with disbelief

With the constant troubles at FEMA City and the increased tensions throughout the county caused by its housing crisis, Charlotte County Sheriffs Office spokesman Bob Carpenter said his department has had a real education since Charley. It's hard-won knowledge, he said, that they will **share** with Hancock County, Miss., one of the hardest-hit areas of the **Galf Coast**.

"We'resending some officers over there," he said. "We know what's going to happen, while they don't have a schoe."







BAGHDAD -- Attacks on and around the 7-mile highway linking Raghdad to its international airport have dropped 41% since May, the result of increased U.S. and Iraqi troop presence and new tactics to battle insurgents along one of the world's most dangerous roads.

There hasn't been a suicide car bombing on the road since April, according to U.S. military statistics through August.

U.S. officers attribute the decline to an influx of Iraqi troops who have been stationed at key points along **Airport Road**, which goes by the military designation Route Irish.

"Route Irish is definitely not the most dangerous road in Iraq any longer, and everyone who uses it knows it," says Lt. Col. Geoffrey Slack, commander of the New York National Guard's 1st Battalion, 69th Infantry Regiment.

In May, insurgents staged 49 attacks on the road and in surrounding neighborhoods, including assaults with deadly roadside bombs and rocket-propelled grenades, according to statistics from Slack's battalion, which was responsible for the area until a recent hand-over.

Violence in the road's area peaked in November 2004. That month, insurgents launched 52 attacks, including 13 car bombs, according to the military statistics. The number of attacks fell to 29 in August, mostly small-arms fire.

Airport worker Hana Abdul Aziz, 28, was on her way to work in **a** bus with other airport employees one morning last November when the bus came under attack.

Aziz remembers glass and blood flying through the air. A woman sitting next to her was killed in the attack. "She got a bullet in her head and died immediately," she says.

For most of the past year, the New York battalion has been responsible for securing the road and surrounding neighborhoods. U.S. military officials declined to discuss numbers, but American battalions generally number about 800 troops.

In lune, an Iraqi police commando unit was assigned to work alongside the American troops. Iraqi battalions typically have about 750 troops, says Lt. Col. Fred Wellman, spokesman for the command responsible for training Iraqi troops.

The additional Iraqi troops, along with U.S. counterparts, were deployed at seven armed checkpoints at the entries to the road. The checkpoints are staffed around the clock and can carefully watch vehicles entering the highway.

The airport highway has been hotly contested. It is heavily used by American and coalition forces, contractors, diplomats and Iraqis working with them. Surrounding the airport is a large U.S. military facility that serves as headquarters for coalition forces.

There are few entrances or exits on the road. Most of the traffic is going to or from the airport or the U.S. base, presenting prime targets for insurgents.

"They knew you'd have diplomats traveling on that road," says Maj. Alayne Conway, spokeswoman for the 3rd Infantry Division.

The highway also has symbolic importance as one of the main links between Iraq and the outside world.

During March and April, attacks on the road were so common that U.S. Embassy personnel were banned from using the road.

Dense neighborhoods along the road make ideal hiding places for insurgents who can attack and take cover in the narrow streets.

Coalition forces have struggled to make it safe, highlighting the difficulty of fighting an insurgency in a big city.

Soldiers have cut down date palms that lined the road, cleared trash, moved guardrails and cut weeds to make it difficult to hide roadside bombs. Conway says.

Getting the additional Iraqi troops assigned to the area allowed commanders to set up strong points along the highway and "turned the tables," Slack says.

U.S. officers stop short of saying the problem is fixed. "I don't want to speculate that things are going to stay the same, but obviously with the things that have been done, the road is safer," Conway says.

SUBJECT: Alliance for Progress

- You asked us to take a look at the Alliance for Progress and see if there was anything there that we might do again today (TABC).
- The information paper at TAB A provides background on the Alliance. Created in 1961 with lofty goals, it is generally regarded as a failure.
- The principal foreign aid initiative of this Administration is the Millennium Challenge Account (MCA), designed to reward nations that make the right choices—before they get any money—to root out corruption, respect human rights, and adhere to the rule of law.
 - o Principal criteria are:
 - Rulingjustly:
 - Investing in their people; and
 - Encouraging economic freedom.
 - o President Bush announced the MCA in a speech at the Inter-American Development Bank in March 2002, pledging to reach annual funding levels of \$6 billion in new money over three budget cycles. (TAB B)
 - MCA is underfunded to date both budget requests and appropriations fall short of this goal.
 - Western Hemisphere countries currently eligible are Bolivia, Honduras, and Nicaragua.

SUBJECT: Alliance for Progress

BACKGROUND:

- The Alliance for Progress was launched in a March 1961 speech by President Kennedy when he called on the 20 American Republics to "join in a vast cooperative effort... to satisfy the needs of the American people for homes, work, and land, health, and schools."
- The Charter of the Alliance was signed on August 17,1961, at a hemispheric meeting in Punte del Este, Uruguay, where the Latin American countries agreed to undertake the drastic social and institutional reforms necessary to ensure that the fruits of economic development would be sustained and broadly distributed.

DISCUSSION:

- Impetus for the Alliance has usually been cast as a U.S. response to counter the spread of communism and Castro's revolution in the Hemisphere.
 - o Origins, however, were the 1958 proposals by Brazil's President Kubitschek for an *Operacion* Pan America and a realization in the late 1950s that private investment flows were insufficient to correct the chronic poverty of the region without major structural reform.
- Latin American nations pledged to improve health, housing, and sanitation, wipe our illiteracy, modernize tax structures and land tenure, maintain sound fiscal and monetary policies, and stimulate private investments. They also committed to achieve per capita GDP growth rates of 2.5% (actually not very ambitious, but still not universally achieved in the life of the Alliance).
- The Charter recognized it would require at least 20 billion dollars over a decade from external sources, principally public. In the first six years (FY 1962-1967), the U.S. provided \$7.3 billion in various forms of loans and grants.
- By the late 1960s, USG interest turned more toward military and police assistance for Latin America, and interest in social and economic reform dwindled. Vietnam became the predominant national security concern, and commitments to Latin America were reduced.

- Latin American countries were unwilling or unable to implement the required reforms. Most remain unfulfilled today.
- The human, financial, and political resources required to prod Latin America into rapid modernization were probably underestimated. Measured against the region's needs and the Charter's goals, the Alliance's achievements appear relative unimpressive. The Alliance is generally regarded as a failure.
 - o Success may also have been undermined from the start by the pace of the region's population growth. Birth rates were too sensitive a topic for consideration by the Alliance.
 - o Also, 13 Latin American governments were overthrown between 1961-1968.
 - Underscores the Alliance's failure to generate political stability and meet the Charter's goal of attaining economic and social progress through the democratic process.
- The OAS committee created to implement the Alliance was disbanded in 1973.

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you all. Asientese. Gracias, Enrique. It's about time you invited a Presidenthere (Laughter.) It's about time one accepted. (Applause.)

Thank you for the energy and leadership you bring to the challenge of global development. I'm honored to be at the Inter-American Development Bank, which has done a lot of good in our hemisphere over the last **40** years. I appreciate your work and I'm proud of your accomplishments.

Along with many of you, I'll be in Monterrey, Mexico, next week as leaders from around the world focus on the important work of reducing global poverty.

I'm here today to announce a major new commitment by the United States to bring hope and opportunity to the world's poorest people. Along with significant new resources to fight world poverty, we will insist on the reforms necessary to make this a fight we can win. (Applause.)

As you can see, I'm traveling in some pretty good company today: Bono. (Laughter and applause.) We just had a great visit in the Oval Office. Here's what I know about him: first, he's a good musician; secondly, he is willing to use his position in a responsible way. He is willing to lead to achieve what his heart tells him, and that is nobody -- nobody -- should be living in poverty and hopelessness in the world.

Bono, i appreciate your heart and to tell you what an influence you've had, Dick Cheney walked in the Oval Office, he said, "Jesse Helms wants us to listen to Bono's ideas." (Laughter and applause.)

Lappreciate PaulO'Neill, Secretary of Treasury. Lappreciate his work, Lappreciate his advice. He's a fine member of my Gabinet. Cardinal McCarrick, thank you for coming, sir; I'm honored to have you here. Jim Wolfensohn, thank you for your leadership of the World Bank. Lappreciate Jose Fourquet. Thank you, Jose, for taking on the responsibility you've done. It's good to see Andrew Natsios here of AID. Thank you, Andrew, for coming. You've done a fine job, by the way, in helping prevent starvation in Afghanistan. Lappreciate your work and Lappreciate your focus.

I want to thank John Negroponte, Embajador, of the United Nations. I want to thank all the other ambassadors who are here. I look around, I can see many familiar faces. Thank you all for coming today.

I appreciate the members of the United States Congress who are here. I see Frist and DeWine from the United States Senate. I appreciate both senators for coming. I appreciate the Congressman from PuertoRico; thank you for coming, se?or. I see the Congress lady from Miami, Florida. I see Spencer Bachus, from Alabama. I think

that's it; I better-- well, anyway, if anybody else is here -- (laughter) -- Chris Cannon, I think, from Utah is here. Hey, Chris, thank you for coming. And thank you all for taking an interest in this subject; it's an important subject.

As you all know and we all know, America is engaged in a global struggle, a mighty struggle against the forces of terror. Yet, even as we fight to defeat terror, we must also fight for the values that make life worth living; for education, and health, and economic opportunity. This is **both** the history of our country and it is the calling of our times.

In World War II we fought to make the world safer, then worked to rebuild it. As we wage war today to keep the world safe from terror, we must also work to make the world a better place for all its citizens. (Applause.)

The advances of free markets and trade and democracy and rule of law have brought prosperity to an ever-widening circle of people in this world. During our lifetime, per capita income in the poorest countries has nearly doubled. Illiteracy has been cut by one-third, giving more children a chance to learn. Infant mortality has been almost halved, giving more children a chance to live. Nations from India to Chile have changed old ways and, therefore, found new wealth. Nations from Turkey to Mali have combined Islam with progress.

Yet in many nations, in many regions, poverty *is* broad and seemingly inescapable, leaving a dark shadow – a dark shadow – across a world that is increasingly illuminated by opportunity, Half the world's people still live on less than \$2 a day. For billions, especially in Africa and the Islamic world, poverty is spreading, and per capita income is falling.

In Malawi, thousands of teachers die each year from AIDS, and life expectancy has fallen to only 38 years. In Sierra Leone, nearly one-third of all babies born today will not reach the age of five. And in Sudan, only half the children attend school.

This growing divide between wealth and poverty, between opportunity and misery, is both a challenge to our compassion and a source of instability. We must confront it. We must include every African, every Asian, every Latin American, every Muslim. in an expanding circle of development.

The advance of development is a central commitment of American foreign policy. As a nation founded on the dignity and value of every life, America's heart breaks because of the suffering and senseless death we see in our world. We work for prosperity and opportunity because they're right. It's the right thing to do. We also work for prosperity and opportunity because they help defeat terror.

Poverty doesn't cause terrorism. Being poor doesn't make you a murderer. Most of the plotters of September 11th were raised in comfort. Yet persistent poverty and oppression can lead to hopelessness and despair. And when governments fall to meet the most basic needs of their people, these failed states can become havens for terror.

In Afghanistan, persistent poverty and war and chaos created conditions that allowed a terrorist regime to seize power. And in many other states around the world, poverty prevents governments from controlling their borders, policing their territory, and enforcing their laws. Development provides the resources to build hope and prosperity and security.

Development is not always easy, but the conditions required for sound development are clear. The foundation of development is security, because there can be no development in an atmosphere of chaos and violence. Today, the United States is leading a broad and vast coalition defending global security by defeating global terror.

Meeting this commitment is expensive, but securing peace and freedom is never too expensive. (Applause.)

Development also depends upon financing. Contrary to the popular belief, most funds for development do not come from international aid --they come from domestic capital, from foreign investment, and especially from trade. America buys and imports over \$450 billion in products from the developing world every year -- \$450 billion of purchases every single year. That is more than eight times fine amount developing countries receive in aid from all sources. Trade is the engine of development. And by promoting it, we will help meet the needs of the world's poor.

Successful development also requires citizens who are literate, who are healthy, and prepared and able to work.

Development assistance can help poor nations meet these education and health care needs. That's why the United States provides more than \$10 billion a year for development assistance for food and for humanitarian aid. That is also why my administration has committed \$500 million to the global fund to fight aids and other infectious diseases.

And we will work with Congress to increase this commitment, to show our love and compassion by increasing our commitment as the fund gets organized, develops a strategy, and shows success. We're spending billions more on AIDS research and other programs, to fight the disease around the world.

Yet many of the old models of economic development assistance are outdated. Money that is not accompanied by legal and economic reform are oftentimes wasted. In many poor nations, corruption runs deep. Private property is unprotected. Markets are closed. Monetary and fiscal policies are unsustainable. Private contracts are unenforceable.

When nations refuse to enact sound policies, progress against poverty **is** nearly impossible. In these situations, more aid money can actually be counterproductive, because it **subsidizes** bad policies, delays reform, and crowds out private investment.

The needs of the developing world demand a new approach. In Monterrey, we have a tremendous opportunity to begin acting on a new vision of development. This new vision unleashes the potential of those who are poor, instead of locking them into a cycle of dependence. This new vision locks beyond arbitrary inputs from the rich, and demands tangible outcomes for the poor.

America supports the international development goals in the **U.N.** Millennium Declaration, and believes that these goals are a shared responsibility of developed and **developing_countries**. To make progress, we must encourage nations and leaders to walk the hard road *of* political, legal and economic reform, so all their people can benefit.

Today, I call for a new compact for global development, defined by new accountability for both rich and poor nations alike. Greater contributions from developed nations must be linked to greater responsibility from developing nations. The United States will lead by example. We will increase our development assistance by \$5 billion over the three -- over the next three budget cycles. This new money above and beyond existing aid requests -- is above and beyond existing aid requests in the current budget I submitted to the Congress.

These funds will go into a new Millennium Challenge Account. Under this account, among other efforts, we will expand our fight against AIDS; we will bring computer instruction to young professionals in developing nations; we will assist African businesses and their people to sell goods abroad; we will provide textbooks and training to students in Islamic and African countries; we will apply the power of science and technology to increase harvests where hunger is greatest.

These are some of the examples of what we intend to do. The goal is to provide people in developing nations the tools they need to seize the opportunities of the global economy. In return -- in return for this additional commitment, we expect nations to adopt the reforms and policies that make development effective and lasting.

The world's help must encourage developing countries to make the right choices for their own people, and these choices are plain. Good government is an essential condition of development. So the Millennium Challenge Account will reward nations that root out corruption, respect human rights, and adhere to the rule of law. Healthy and educated citizens are the agents of development, so we will reward nations that invest in better health care, better schools and broader immunization.

Sound economic policies unleash the enterprise and creativity necessary for development. So we will reward nations that have more open markets and sustainable budget policies, nations where people can start and operate a small business without running the gauntlets of bureaucracy and bribery.

I've directed Secretary Powell and Secretary O'Neill to reach out to the world community, to develop a set of clear and concrete and objective criteria for measuring progress. And under the Millennium Challenge Account, we will apply these criteria rigorously and fairly.

Countries that live by these three broad standards -- ruling justly, investing in their people, and encouraging economic freedom -- will receive more aid from America. And, more importantly, over time, they will really no longer need it, because nations with sound laws and policies will attract more foreign investment. They will earn more trade revenues. And they will find that all these sources of capital will be invested more effectively and productively to create more jobs for their people.

The evidence shows that where nations adopt sound policies, a dollar of foreign aid attracts \$2 of private investment. And when development aid rewards reform and responsibility, it lifts almost four times as many people out of poverty, compared to the old approach of writing checks without regard to results.

Marrying good policies to greater aid led Mozambique to a 10 percent growth rate in 2001. This approach help Uganda open its schools to more children, and increased teacher pay by 2,700 percent. Bangladesh, a nation that was once a symbol of famine, has transformed its agricultural economy; rice production is almost up by 70 percent since the mid-'70s.

The new compact I propose would multiply this progress. I challenge other nations, and the development banks, to adopt this approach as well. America's support for the World Bank will increase by almost 20 percent over the next three years. We expect the World Bank to insist on reform and results, measured in improvements in people's lives. All the development banks should adopt a growth agenda, increasing their support for private sector enterprises and focusing more on education, as the Inter-American Development Bank has done.

And I challenge the development banks to provide up to half of the funds devoted to poor nations in the form of grants, rather than loans. (Applause.) Grants instead of loans that may never be repaid. Many have rallied to the idea of dropping the debt. Isay let's rally to the idea of stopping the debt.

This new compact for development can produce dramatic gains against poverty and suffering in the world. I have an ambitious goal for the developed world, that we ought to double the size of the world's poorest economies within a decade. (Applause.) I know some may say that's too nigh a hurdle to cross -- I don't believe so, not with the right reforms and the right policy. This will require tripling of current growth rates, but that's not unprecedented. After all, look at the dramatic growth that occurred in Asia in the 1990s.

With the world's help and the right policies, I know -- I know -- that the developing world can reform their own countries. I know it can happen. And, therefore, better their own lives. They can live in a world where their children's dreams are ignited by liberty and learning, not undermined by poverty and disease. (Applause.) They can live under governments that deliver basic service and protect basic rights. The demands of human dignity know no borders and know no boundaries. They are universal. And so are the gifts of creativity and enterprise that lead to prosperity.

When governments repress and punish those gifts, no amount -- no amount of aid is sufficient to lift people from poverty. When governments honor these gifts, every nation can know the blessings of prosperity.

People across the world are working to relieve poverty and suffering, and I'm proud of their efforts. I appreciate Bono. I appreciate groups like the Sisters of Charity. Some were motivated by simple decency, some serve a God who is impatient with injustice. And all have made this commitment. We cannot leave behind half of humanity as we seek a better future for ourselves. (Applause.) We cannot accept permanent poverty in a world of progress. There are no second-class citizens in the human race. (Applause.)

I carry this commitment in my soul. And I'll carry it with me to Monterrey next week. As the civilized world mobilizes against the forces of terror, we must also embrace the forces of good. By offering hope where there is none, by relieving suffering and hunger where there is too much, we will make the world not only safer, but better.

Following your trip to Peru, you asked what we could do to ensure that the UN promptly reimburses nations contributing troops to UN peacekeeping missions (Tab A).

The UN's apparent slow payment to Peru for deploying troops to the UN Stabilization Mission in Haiti (MINUSTAH) had three causes:

- The Peruvians themselves are principally responsible. They were not timely in submitting correct invoices to the UN.
- Nations assessed by the UN to reimburse peacekeeping contributors are slow in paying (including the largest contributors, the U.S. and Japan).
- The UN Department of Peacekeeping Operations (UNDPKQ) is a cumbersome bureaucracy that can take up to 6 months to reimburse troop contributors, depending on when the costs occur in the UN's fiscal year.

Despite those impediments, Peru had been reimbursed prior to your visit. Evidently, the Peruvian MOD was misinformed. In May 2005 Peru was reimbursed for itservices in Haiti through December 2004, and on 24 June 2005, Peru was paid for its contributions through March, 2005. By the UN's reckoning, its account with Peru is up to date. The UN now intends to request more troops from Peru for MINUSTAH.

Although Peru has been paid, the UN process is cumbersome and requires poor nations to pre-finance peacekeeping operations. We will work with Joint Staff which has liaison officers in the US Mission to the UN to press the UN to streamline and accelerate reimbursement.

SUBJECT: Update on Central America Ministers Conference on Security (U)

You asked about your conference with the Central Americans (TAB A). It is scheduled for Miami, October 11-13. Your decisions on this memo will help finalize preparations.

- The Ministers have met several times to prepare. We expect good ideas from them.
 - There is such high interest in your conference that some countries asked to send both their defense and interior ministers (with the MOD or equivalent as principal).
 - This makes good sense, in view of the countries' stated desire to define military and law enforcement responsibilities clearly and close seams between them (one of your themes from the Quito Defense Ministerial).
 - DASD-WHA Pardo-Maurer has met with the ministers, country ambassadors, and the US ambassadors to help shape the conference.

Of note: Colombia has taken up one of our suggestions, and will host a conference on regional security with the Central American ministers two weeks after your conference.

- So your conference is having positive ripple effects, even before it has happened.
- **DECISION #1.** We have sounded out an overall theme of "Security and Economic Opportunity". Everyone likes this, since it will be the first high-level US-Central America meeting after CAFTA ratification, and given your interest in CAFTA.

PROPOSED SECDEF OBJECTIVES & ACTIONS US-CENTRAL AMERICA MINISTERS CONFERENCE ON SECURITY

1. Objective:

The key objective of this conference is for ministers to develop a common strategic vision for US-Central American security cooperation—through regional institutions.

- The backdrop is CAFTA---which we should take as a beginning, not an endpoint. As
 the overall conference theme, "Security and Economic Opportunity" points out, the
 U.S. relationship with this region of 40,000,000 people is moving forward on all
 fronts, not just trade.
- Implicit in this objective, which "upgrades" the strategic profile of Central America,
 is the long-term goal of building a broader trade and security community that links the
 NAFTA and CAFTA areas (and ultimately the Free Trade Area of the Americas). To
 this end, Mexico and Colombia have been invited as observers.
 - o This conference can help set a good tone for President Bush's participation in the Summit of the Americas, November 3-4, in Argentina.

2. Background:

This conference will be the first high-level US.-Central America meeting following U.S. ratification of CAFTA, and the first ever meeting of *all* seven sitting Central American defense or security ministers with a U.S. Secretary of Defense.

- We will achieve our primary objective if, as we expect, we are able to:
 - 1. Clarify USG and DoD relationships with the two primary regional integration mechanisms with security portfolios:
 - ✓ Conference of Central American Armed Forces (CFAC), the region's mini "NATO-like" defense integration mechanism. CFAC comprises the militaries of Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, and Nicaragua.
 - ✓ Central American Integration System (SICA), the region's mini "European Commission-like" overall integration mechanism. SICA comprises the CFAC countries, and Belize, plus Costa Rica and Panama, which have no military.
 - 2. Consolidate fledgling regional security institutions (e.g., for peacekeeping, counternarcotics, counterterrorism, natural disaster response) and identify new opportunities for multilateral cooperation.

- 3. Establish a relationship between CFAC and the Joint Forces Command.
- 4. Tighten seams between military and law enforcement, and across borders.
- 5. Help countries agree to coordinate their plans to modernize their security forces.
- **6.** Build a Colombia-Central America security partnership. (Colombia, at our urging, will host a MOD-level conference with Central America two weeks after ours).
- 7. Encourage closer Mexico-Central American security cooperation, and float the concept of a North American security community "from Panama to the Pole".

3. Bilateral Objectives:

Although the conference will focus on **regional** institutions, it is also an opportunity to work on **bilateral** ties. We suggest that SecDef host the following bilateral meetings:

- o Panama: discuss Secure Trade and Transportation Initiative (bilateral).
- o El Salvador: encourage continuing participation in Iraq (bilateral).
- o Guatemala: encourage joining El Salvador in Iraq. The MOD has told us that he and the president are discussing the possibility of an offer (pull-aside).
- Nicaragua: encourage the military to continue its support for constitutional, democracy, and to make progress on destruction of MANPADs (pull-aside).

4. SecDef Actions:

The Central Americans (with input and feedback from us) have made a big upfront effort to craft proposals on how we can help their new **regional** institutions.

We hope SecDef will play the key role in 3 vital areas:

- Shapingpublicperceptions of the event, and giving the media a new perspective on this region and on Administration policy toward Latin America as a whole.
- As "catalyst" to encourage the Central Americans to sort out coordination tangles
 having to do with vaguely defined roles for military and law enforcement, and the
 interaction between CFAC and SICA. (GEN Craddock can be helpful).
 - We are working closely with the countries, our Ambassadors, and GEN Craddock to define concrete discussion points and recommendations.

Saddam's Revenge

Five men met in an automobile in a Baghdad park a few weeks after the fall of Saddam Hussein's Baathist regime in April 2003, according to U.S. intelligence sources. One of the five was Saddam. The other four were among his closest advisers. The agenda: how to fight back against the US.-led occupation of Iraq. A representative of Saddam's former No. 2, Izzat Ibrahim al-Duri, was there. But the most intriguing man in the car may have been a retired general named Muhammad Yunis al-Ahmed, who had been a senior member of the Military Bureau, a secret Baath Party spy service. The bureau's job had been to keep an eye on the Iraqi military—and to organize Baathist resistance in the event of a coup. Now a U.S. coup had taken place, and Saddam turned to al-Ahmed and the others and told them to start "rebuilding your networks."

The 45-minute meeting was pieced together months later by U.S. military intelligence. It represents a rare moment of clarity in the dust storm of violence that swirls through central lraq. The insurgency has grown well beyond its initial Baathist core to include religious extremist and Iraqi nationalist organizations, and plain old civilians who are angry at the American occupation. But Saddam's message of "rebuilding your networks" remains the central organizing principle.

More than two years into the war, U.S. intelligence sources concede that they still don't know enough about the nearly impenetrable web of what Iraqis call ahl al-thiqa (trustnetworks), which are at the heart of the insurgency. It's an inchoate movement without a single inspirational leader like Vietnam's Ho Chi Minh--a movement whose primary goal is perhaps even more improbable than the U.S. dream of creating an Iraqi democracy: restoring Sunni control in a country where Suntis represent just 20% of the population. Intelligence experts can't credibly estimate the rebels' numbers but say most are Iraqis. Foreigners account for perhaps 2% of the suspected guerrillas who have been captured or killed, although they represent the vast majority of suicide bombers. ("They are ordnance," a U.S. intelligence official says.) The level of violence has been growing steadily. There have been roughly 80 attacks a day in recent weeks. Suicide bombs killed more than 200 people, mostly in Baghdad, during four days of carnage last week, among the deadliest since Saddam's fall.

More than a dozen current and former intelligence officers knowledgeable about Iraq spoke with TIME in recent weeks to share details about the conflict. They voiced **their** growing frustration with a war that they feel was not properly anticipated by the Bush Administration, a war fought with insufficient resources, a war that almost all of them now believe is not winnable militarily.

"We're good at fighting armies, but we don't know how to do this," says a recently retired four-star general with Middle East experience. "We don't have enough intelligence analysts working on this problem. The Defense Intelligence Agency [DIA] puts most of its emphasis and its assets on Iran, North Korea and China. The Iraqi insurgency is simply not top priority, and that's a damn shame."

The intelligence officers stressed these points:

a6¢ They believe that Saddam's inner circle—especially those from the Military Bureau—initially organized the insurgency's support structure and that networks led by former Saddam associates like al-Ahmed and **al-Duri still** provide money and logistical help.

a€¢ The Bush Administration's fixation on finding weapons of mass destruction (WMD) in **2003** diverted precious intelligence resources that could have helped thwart the fledgling insurgency.

• From the beginning of the insurgency, U.S. military officers have tried to contact and negotiate with rebel leaders, including, as a senior Iraq expert puts it, "some of the people with blood on their hands."

• The frequent replacement of U.S. military and administrative teams in Baghdad has made it difficult to develop a counterinsurgency strategy.

The accumulation of blunders has led a Pentagon guerrilla-warfare expert to conclude, "We are repeating every mistake we made in Vietnam."

THE WRONG FOCUS

It is no secret that General Tommy Franks didn't want to hang around Iraq very long. As Franks led the U.S. assault on Baghdad in April 2003, his goal—and that of Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld—was to get to the capital as quickly as possible with a minimal number of troops. Franks succeeded brilliantly at that task. But military-intelligence officers contend that he did not seem interested in what would come next. "He never once asked us for a briefing about what happened once we got to Baghdad," says a former Army intelligence officer attached to the invasion force. "He said, 'It'snot my job.' We figured all he wanted to do was get in, get out and write his book." (Franks, through a spokesman, declined to comment for this article.)

The rush to Baghdad, critics say, laid the groundwork for trouble to come. In one prewar briefing, for example, Licut. General David McKiernan--who commanded the land component of the coalition forces--asked Franks what should be done if his troops found Iraqi arms caches on the way to Baghdad. "Just put a lock on 'em and go, Dave," Franks replied, according to a former U.S. Central Command (Centcom)officer. Of course, you couldn't simply put a lock on ammunition dumps that stretched for several square miles--dumps that would soon be stripped and provide a steady source of weaponry for the insurgency.

U.S. troops entered Baghdad on April 5. There was euphoria in the Pentagon. The looting in the streets of Baghdad and the continuing attacks on coalition troops were considered temporary phenomena that would soon subside. On May 1, President George W. Bush announced, "Major combat operations in Iraq have ended," on the deck of an aircraft carrier, near a banner that read MISSION ACCOMPLISHED. Shortly thereafter, Franks moved his headquarters from Qatar back to Florida. He was followed there in June by McKiernan, whose Baghdad operation included several hundred intelligence officers who had been keeping track of the situation on the ground. "Allowing McKiernan to leave was the worst decision of the war," says one of his superiors. (The decision, he says, was Franks'.) "We replaced an operational force with a tactical force, which meant generals were replaced by colonels." Major General Ricardo Sanchez, a relatively junior commander and a recent arrival in Iraq, was put in charge. "After McKiernan left, we had fewer than 30 intelligence officers trying to figure who the enemy was," says a topranking military official who was in Iraq at the time. "We were starting from scratch, with practically no resources."

On May 23, the U.S. made what is generally regarded as a colossal mistake. L. Paul Bremer-the newly arrived administrator of the U.S. government presence, the Coalition Provisional Authority (CPA)--disbanded the Iraqi army and civil service on Rumsfelds orders. "We made hundreds of thousands of people very angry at us," says a Western diplomat attached to the CPA, "and they happened to be the people in the country best acquainted with the use of arms." Thousands moved directly into the insurgency—not just soldiers but also civil servants who took with them useful knowledge of Iraq's electrical grid and water and sewage systems. Bremer says he doesn't regret that decision, according to his spokesman Dan Senor. "The Kurds and Shi'ites didn't want Saddam's army in business," says Senor, "and the army had gone home. We had bombed their barracks. How were we supposed to bring them back and separate out the bad guys? We didn't even have enough troops to stop the looting in Baghdad."

A third decision in the spring of 2003--to make the search for WMD the highest intelligence priority—also hampered the U.S. ability to fight the insurgents. In June, former weapons inspector David Kay arrived in Baghdad to lead the Iraq Survey Group (ISG), which had 1,200 intelligence officers and support staff members assigned to search for WMD. They had exclusive access to literally tons of documents collected from Saddam's office, intelligence services and ministries after the regime fell. Kay clashed repeatedly with U.S. military leaders who wanted access not only to the documents but also to some of the resources--analysts, translators, field agents--at his disposal. "I was in meetings where [GeneralJohn] Abizaid was pounding on the table trying to get some help," says a senior military officer. "But Kay wouldn't budge."

Indeed, a covert-intelligence officer working for the ISG told TIME correspondent Brian Bennett that he had been ordered in August 2003 to "terminate" contact with Iraqi sources not working on WMD. As a result, the officer says, he stopped meeting with a dozen Iraqis who were providing information--maps, photographs and addresses of former Baathist militants, safe houses and stockpiles of explosives--about the insurgency in the Mosul area. "The President's priority--and my mission--was to focus on WMD," Kay told TIME. "Abizaid needed help with the counterinsurgency. He said, You have the only organization in this country that's working.' But military guys are not used to people telling them no, and so, yes, there was friction."

Sanchez learned that autumn that there were 38 boxes of documents specifically related to the city of Fallujah, a hotbed of Sunni rebellion. Months later, when military-intelligence officers finally were able to review some of the documents, many of which had been marked NO INTELLIGENCE VALUE, the officers found information that they now say could have helped the U.S. stop the insurgency's spread. Among the papers were detailed civil-defense plans for cities like Fallujah, Samarra and Ramadi and rosters of leaders and local Baathist militia who would later prove to be the backbone of the insurgency in those cities.

U.S. military-intelligence sources say many of the documents still have not been translated or thoroughly analyzed. "You should see the warehouse in Qatar where we have this stuff," said a high-ranking former U.S. intelligence official. "We'll never be able to get through it all. Who knows?" he added, with a laugh. "We may even find the VX [nerve gas] in one of those boxes."

MISJUDGING THE ENEMY

As early as JuneÅ 2003, the CIA told Bush in a briefing that he faced a "classic insurgency" in Iraq. But the White House didn't fully trust the CIA, and on June 30, Rumsfeld told reporters, "I guess the reason I don't use the term guerrilla war is that it isn't ... anything like a guerrilla war or an organized resistance." The opposition, he claimed, was composed of "looters, criminals, remnants of the Baathist regime" and a few foreign fighters. Indeed, Rumsfeld could claim progress in finding and capturing most of the 55 top members of Saddam's regime—the famous Iraqi deck of cards. (Todate, 44 of the 55 have been captured or killed.) **Two** weeks after Rumsfelds comment, the Secretary of Defense was publicly contradicted by Centcom commander Abizaid, who said the U.S. indeed faced "a classical guerrilla-type campaign" in Iraq.

In a sense, both Rumsfeld and Abizaid were right. The backbone of the insurgency was thousands of Baathist remnants organizing a guernlla war against the Americans. According to

documents later seized by the U.S. military, Saddam--who had been changing locations frequently urtil his capture in December 2003--tried to stay in charge of the rebellion. He fired off frequent letters filed with instructions for his subordinates. Some were pathetic. In one, he explained guernlla tradecraft to his inner circle--how to keep in touch with one another, how to establish new contacts, how to remain clandestine. Of course, the people doing the actual fighting needed no such advice, and decisions about whom to attack when and where were made by the cells. Saddam's minions, including al-Duri and al-Ahmed, were away from the front lines, providing money, arms and logistical support for the cells.

But Saddam did make one strategic decision that helped alter the course of the insurgency. In early autumn he sent a letter to associates ordering them to change the target focus from coalition forces to Iraqi "collaborators"--that is, to attack Iraqi police stations. The insurgency had already announced its seriousness and lethal intent with a summer bombing campaign. On Aug. 7, a bomb went offoutside the Jordanian embassy in Baghdad, killing 19 people. Far more ominous was the Aug. 19 blast that destroyed the U.N.'s headquarters in Baghdad, killing U.N. representative Sergio Vieira de Mello and 22 others. Although al-Qaeda leader Abu Mousab al-Zarqawi claimed responsibility for theattack, U.S. intelligence officials believe that remnants of Saddam's Iraqi Intelligence Service (IIS) carried it out. "It was a pure Baathist operation." says a senior U.S. intelligence official. "The Iraqis who served as U.N. security guards simply didn't show up for work that day. It wasn't a suicide bomb. The truck driver left the scene. Our [explosives]team found that the bomb had the distinctive forensics of Saddam's IIS."

On Oct. 27, 2003, the assaults on "collaborators" that Saddam had requested began with attacks on four Iraqi police stations--and on International Red Cross headquarters--in Baghdad, killing 40 people. The assaults revealed a deadly new alliance between the Baathists and the jihadi insurgents. U.S. intelligence agents later concluded, after interviewing one of the suicide bombers, a Sudanese who failed in his attempt, that the operation had been a collaboration between former Baathists and al-Zarqawi. The Baathists had helped move the suicide bombers into the country, according to the U.S. sources, and then provided shelter, support (including automobiles) and coordination for the attacks.

MISHANDLING THE TRIBES

By almost every account, Sanchez andŠBremer did not get along. The conflict was predictable-the soldiers tended to be realists fighting a nasty war; the civilians, idealists trying to create a new Iraq--but it was troubling nonetheless. The soldiers wanted to try diplomacy and began reaching out to the less extreme elements of the insurgency to bring them into negotiations over Iraq's political future. The diplomats tooka harder line, refusing to negotiate with the enemy.

Military-intelligence officers presented the CPA with a plan to make a deal with 19 subtribes of the enormous Dulaimi clan, located in al-Anbar province, the heart of the Sunni triangle. The tribes "had agreed to disarm and keep us informed of traffic going through their territories," says a former Anny intelligence officer. "All it would have required from the CPA was formal recognition that the tribes existed—and \$3 million." The money would go toward establishing tribal security forces. "It was a foot in the door, but we couldn't get the CPA to move." Bremer's spokesman Senor says a significant effort was made to reach out to the tribes. But several military officials dispute that. "The standard answer we got from Bremer's people was that tribes are a vestige of the past, that they have no place in the new democratic Iraq," says the former intelligence officer. "Eventually they paid some lip service and set up a tribal office, but it was grudging."

The Baathists, on the other hand, were more active in courting the tribes. Starting in November 2003, tribal sheiks and Baathist expatriates held a series of monthly meetings at the Cham Palace hotel in Damascus. They were public events, supposedly meetings to express solidarity with the Iraqi opposition to the U.S. occupation. (The January 2004 gathering was attended by Syrian President Bashar Assad.) Behind the scenes, however, the meetings provided a convenient cover for leaders of the insurgency, including Muhammad Yunis al-Ahmed, the former Military Bureau director, to meet, plan and distribute money. A senior military officer told TIME that U.S. intelligence had an informant—a mid-level Baathist official who belonged to

the Dulaimi tribe—attending the meetings and keeping the Americans informed about the insurgents' growing cohesion. But the increased flow of information did not produce a coherent strategy for fighting the **growing** rebellion.

THE DEALMAKING GOES NOWHERE

Saddam was captured on Dec. 13, 2003, in a spiderÅ hole on a farm near Tikrit. His briefcase was filled with documents identifying many of the former Baathists running support networks for the insurgency. It was the first major victory of what the U.S. called the postcombat phase of the war: in early 2004, 188 insurgents were captured, many of whom had been mentioned in the seized documents. Although Izzat Ibrahim al-Duri, Saddam's former No. 2, narrowly evaded capture, much of his Mosul and Kirkuk apparatus was rolled up. Baathist financial networks were disrupted in several provinces. The CIA, in fact, believes that Saddam's capture permanently crippled the Baathist wing of the insurgency. "A guy like al-Duri is more symbol than substance at this point," a U.S. intelligence official says. "The parade has passed him by."

Military-intelligence officers who were in Iraq at the time, however, saw evidence that the Baathists regrouped in the spring of 2004, when the U.S. was procecupied with battling a rebellion led by Shi'ite extremist Muqtada al-Sadr in Iraq's south and with the fight for the rebelheld city of Fallujah in the Sunni triangle. And the U.S. intelligence officials believe that some former regime loyalists began to be absorbed by other rebel groups, including those made up of religious extremists and Iraqi nationalists.

Al-Ahmed, say **U.S.** intelligence officials, is still running the support network he began building after the meeting with Saddam in the car. In May **2004** al-Ahmed set **off** on one of **his** periodic tours of the combat **zone**, meeting with local insurgent leaders, distributing money and passing along news—a trip later pieced together by **U.S.** intelligence analysts wading through the mountain of data and intelligence provided by low-level local informants. Al-Ahmed started in his hometown of Mosul, where he had been supervising—from a distance—the rebuilding of the local insurgent network disrupted after Saddam's capture. He moved on to Hawija, where he met a man thought to be a senior financier of the insurgency in north-central Iraq. After a brief stay at a farmhouse near Samarra, he met with military leaders of religious and nationalist rebel groups in Baghdad and with Rashid Taan Kazim, one of the few faces from the deck of cards (al-Duri is another) **still** at large, who is thought to be running a support network for the insurgency in the north and west of Iraq. Al-Ahmeds final stop was Ramadi, where he distributed \$500,000 to local insurgency leaders.

What is remarkable is the extent to which the U.S. is aware of al-Ahmeds activities. "We know where Muhammad Yunis al-Ahmed lives in Damascus," says a U.S. intelligence official. "We know his phone number. He believes he has the protection of the Syrian government, and that certainly seems to be the case." But he hasn't been aggressively pursued by the U.S. either--in part because there has been a persistent and forlom hope that al-Ahmed might be willing to help negotiate an end to the Baathist part of the insurgency. A senior U.S. intelligence officer says that al-Ahmed was called at least twice by former Prime Minister Iyad Allawi--an old acquaintance--and that a representative of an "other government agency," a military euphemism that usually means the CIA, "knocked on his door in 2004 and asked if he was willing to talk. He wasn't."

STARTING OVER AGAIN

In the middle of 2004, the U.S. again changed its team in Baghdad. Bremer and Sanchez left, replaced by Ambassador John Negroponte and General George Casey. At the same time, there was a new transitional Iraqi government, led by Iyad Allawi. Negroponte set up a joint military-diplomatic team to review the situation in the country. The consensus was that things were a mess, that little had been accomplished on either the civilian or the military side and that there was no effective plan for dealing with the insurgency. The new team quickly concluded that the insurgency could not be defeated militarily--but that it might be divided. The attempts to engage potential allies like al-Ahmed became the unstated policy as U.S. and Iraqi officials sought ways

to isolate foreign terrorists like al-Zarqawi.

But progress in the effort to defuse the insurgency through dealmaking has been slow--and in some cases has led the U.S. to ease pressure on individuals tied to rebel groups. Consider the careful handling of Harith al-Dhari, chairman of the Association of Muslim Scholars and one of Iraq's most important Sunni leaders. In late 2003, several insurgent groups began to meet regularly in the Umm al-Qura mosque in Baghdad, over which al-Dhari presides. According to U.S. intelligence reports, al-Dhari--who has said he might encourage his organization to take part in the democratic process--did not attend the meetings. But his son Muthanna--who is thought to be an important link between the nationalist and religious strains of the insurgency-did. In August 2004, the son was arrested after his car scanned positive for explosives residue. But he was quickly released, a retired DIA analyst says, under pressure from Iraq's government, to keep channels open to his father. "It would be difficult to lure Harith into the tent if Muthanna were in jail," says the former officer.

By April 2004, U.S. military-intelligence officers were also holding face-to-face talks with Abdullah al-Janabi, a rebel leader from Fallujah. The meetings ended after al-Zarqawi--who had taken up residence in Fallujah--threatened to kill al-Janabi if the talks continued, according to U.S. and Iraqi sources. But attempts to negotiate with other insurgents are continuing, including with Saddam's former religious adviser. So far, the effort has been futile. "We keep hoping they'll come up with a Gerry Adams," says a U.S. intelligence official, refemng to the leader of the Irish Republican Army's political wing. "But it just hasn't happened."

CNIL WAR?

The leadership in Baghdad changed yet again this year. Negroponte left Baghdad in March to become director of national intelligence. He was replaced by Zalmay Khalilzad. But the turnover in the Iraqi government was far more important religious Shi'ites, led by Prime Minister Ibrahim al-Jaafari, took charge, a severe irritant to many Sunnis. "The insurgents see al-Jaafari as a traitor, a man who spent the Iran-Iraq war in Iran," says a senior military officer. "And many of the best officers we have trained in the new Iraqi army--Sunnis and secular Shi'ites who served in Saddam's army--feel the same way." Al-Jaafari did not help matters by opening diplomatic ties with Iran, apologizing for Iraq's behavior in the Iran-Iraq war and cutting economic deals with the Iranians.

In fact, some Iraq experts in the U.S. intelligence community have come to the conclusion that Iraqis' courageous recent steps toward democracy--the elections in January and the writing of a constitution that empowers the religious Shi'ites and the Kurds (though it is resoundingly opposed by the Sunnis)--have left the country in a more precarious position. "The big conversation in our shop these days," says a military-intelligence officer, "is whether it would be a good thing if the new constitution is voted down [in the public referendum] next month."

Iraq experts in the intelligence community believe that the proposed constitution, which creates autonomous regions for the Kurds and Shi'ites in the oil-rich **north** and south, could heighten the chances of an outright civil war. "A lot of **us** who have followed this thing have come to the conclusion that the Sunnis are the wolves--the real warriors--and the religious Shi'ites are the sheep," says an intelligence officer. "The Sunnis have the power to maintain this violence indefinitely."

Another hot debate in the intelligence community is whether to make a major change in the counterinsurgency strategy—to stop the aggressive sweeps through insurgent-riddled areas, like the recent offensive in Tall 'Afar, and try to concentrate troops and resources with the aim of improving security and living conditions in population centers like Baghdad. "We've taken Samarra four times, and we've lost it four times," says an intelligence officer. "We need a new strategy."

But the Pentagon leadership is unlikely to support a strategy that concedes broad swaths of territory to the enemy. In fact, none of the intelligence officers who spoke with TIME or their

ranking superiors could provide a plausible road map toward stability in Iraq. It is quite possible that the occupation of Iraq was an unwise proposition from the start, as many U.S. allies in the region warned before the invasion. Yet, despite their gloom, every one of the officers favors continuing—indeed, augmenting—the war effort. If the U.S. leaves, they say, the chaos in central Iraq could threaten the stability of the entire Middle East. And al-Qaeda operatives like al-Zarqawi could have a relatively safe base of operations in the Sunni triangle. "We have never taken this operation seriously enough," says a retired senior military official with experience in Iraq. "We have never provided enough troops. We have never provided enough equipment, or the right kind of equipment. We have never worked the intelligence part of the war in a serious, sustained fashion. We have failed the Iraqi people, and we have failed our troops." --With reporting by Brian Bennett/ Washington and Michael Ware/Baghdad

SUBJECT: Iraq

I recently returned from Iraq where I had the opportunity to observe the ISF in action as well as spend time with my friend, Sheik Saad Al-Janabi, who is one of the key political players within the Sunni community that worked on the draft, constitution. While some of the observations and recommendations that follow may be controversial, they represent my best judgment and are consistent with our past frank and direct discussions.

The accomplishments made by Generals Casey and Petraeus in building the ISF over the past year have been amazing. The sheer size of the forces is well beyond what I thought was achievable during that period. Within the MOI alone, the number of police, commandos, intervention forces and border units is over 140,000. I hesitate to estimate the number of "trained" MOI forces because not only is it highly subjective, but dependent on the quality of the enemy. With notable exceptions, the insurgents are not well trained. I contend the real measure of effectiveness is leadership. Iraqis follow strong leaders. There is a "gang" mentality among Iraqis that must be understood for us to achieve both political and military success. For that reason, the rise of militias is one of my greatest concerns.

Despite their improved operational capability, the ISF is susceptible to sectarian political influence, even control. I witnessed this first hand within the MOI forces, particularly the commandos, public order units and the 8th Mechanized Brigade. There is a systematic effort by SCIRI and its Badr militia to take control of the high-end units within MOI. This effort ranges from assigning Badr officers to command units to protecting thugs like the commander of the Wolf Brigade who has been involved in death squad activities, extortion of detainees and a general pattern of corruption. Nearly all of the new recruits within the commandos are Shia, many of them are Badr members. While this effort by SCIRI may be a hedge designed to create a protective force similar to the Pesh for the Kurds, it has the effect of seriously undermining the government's most effective forces. It also contributes to the possibility of a Lebanon-type scenario where the a civil war ensues with the Sunnis being driven into the arms of the insurgents as their militia. This would put us in an untenable position

It is my opinion that the ISF is sufficiently capable militarily right now to permit withdrawal of some US forces and the redistribution of others to areas like Anbar. I recognize that the timing of such a withdrawal with the referendum and an election pending has strong political implications. However, it is essential that the Iraqis assume the burden of their own security as quickly as possible. In this

regard, Iraqi army units must begin operating more independently. They are highly dependent on their US counterpart units for logistics as well as command and control. Changing this has to be a top priority. In order to make such a change, the Iraqis have to develop a functional logistics system. We also have to focus our efforts on the US advisory teams that are assigned to the Iraqi wits. These teams will play an increasingly key role as we begin the withdrawal process. My first-hand experience with the MOI forces and their advisory teams suggest that we could do better. Without detracting from the courage and sacrifices that these teams are making daily, the qualifications of many of those assigned to this duty are lacking. Most are active duty personnel assigned to reserve units with little training or experience in working with indigenous forces. In most cases, they do not live with the Iraqi units they advise and are sometimes left behind because they are unaware of pending operations. Working with host country forces is precisely what the Army's Special Forces were initially designed to do. Unfortunately, they have moved away from this critical mission and focused instead on direct action.

Most of my comments heretofore have been directed toward military matters. However, the current situation is overshadowed by politics and specifically the pending referendum. My friend, Saad, has been working day and night to find common ground between the Sunnis, Kurds and the Shias so that the constitution will have the support of all. I am less than optimistic that this will occur. However, if the Sunnis with the support of strange bedfellows like Moqtada are able to achieve the requisite votes in three provinces to defeat the constitution, there is a silver lining. It will show that the Sunnis do have political power and can be successful within the system. Regardless of the outcome of the referendum, it is essential that the Sunnis are not disenfranchised to the point where they turn to the insurgents on a large scale to protect their interests have left my most controversial and perhaps most important comments for last. Despite the problems, we are making progress in Iraq. I am less confident that we are doing a good job on the home front. **An** axiom of US foreign policy is that military action receives overwhelming support if accomplished quickly. When it stretches out and casualties **mount**, support at home wanes. If one traces military actions with overwhelming public support, there is a common thread that I consider significant. The military leader in charge was renowned. Eisenhower, MacArthur, "Blood and Guts" Patton, even "Stormin' Norman" were household names. Very few Americans, even those that are well read, can tell you who is in charge in Iraq, General Casey is smart and has done most things right, but he is not particularly good with the press and he is not the dynamic leader that Americans revere and have confidence that he is going to get this job done and get the troops home. I recommend you find that dynamic general, give him some running room and turn him loose on the press. Unfortunately, there are not many around, but I can think of a few.

- Your note of September 16th emphasized the importance of getting to ground truth on making sure that all security requirements are in the Iraqi budget and defended by both the Iraqis and the U.S. You requested that we come back with an approach to this problem. (TAB A)
- At the interagency level, the approach has been prescribed by the Principal's Committee: The DoD must provide the definitive 2006 security and operations and maintenance requirements by September 30. By October 15, a USG review of options on how to finance the requirements will be complete.
- The USD(P), the Joint Staff, the Defense Reconstruction Support Office (DRSO) and my staff are fully engaged in this issue.
 - A preliminary staff estimate put the 2006 cost in the \$8 billion to \$13 billion range.
 - The timeline to get to a single, defensible estimate is:
 - The Commander, US Central Command (USCENTCOM) is developing an estimate of the 2006 requirement. His initial estimate is due today; we expect it will be refined and supporting data provided early next week.
 - Upon receipt of the USCENTCOM estimate, staff from OUSD(P), the Joint Staff, DRSO, the Army and OUSD(C) will review the estimate for reasonableness.
 - Our goal is to coordinate any changes to USCENTCOM plan by Wednesday (September 28).
- We expect to have a package for your review by Friday, September 30.

These persons include the hospitalized sick, frail elderly from nursing homes, and those requiring on-going acute medical care. This entire effort was accomplished between 3:00 pm Thursday, Sep 22 and 1:00 pm (EST) Friday, Sep 23 using C-130, C-17, and C-5 fixed wing aircraft.
- The effort was brought about through a coordinated effort involving Texas local and state health offices and multiple federal agencies. Within the Department of Defense, there has been a well coordinated effort involving Health Affairs, Homeland Defense, the Joint Staff (J4), U.S. Northern Command, and U.S. Transportation Command
- The effort was led by Brigadier General Paul Selva, Director of Operations for the U.S. Transportation Command. Every party involved has expressed deep appreciation for the superb, rapid, and competent response of U.S. Transportation Command and the aero-medical evacuation teams.
- The results of **this** effort in the medical area are a clear improvement **from** those following Hurricane Katrina and reflect the early pro-active efforts of those at the local and state levels, and much improved coordination at the federal level.
- We are compiling lessons learned **from** this response effort, and will be ready to share them within days.



- This responds to your subject memo of 26 August 2005.
- It is standard operating procedure for the Marine Corps to engage returning Marines with the media and the public. I have attached a few examples to illustrate our success in this arena (Tab A).
- We have developed and implemented an updated, comprehensive, Corps-wide plan to engage returning Marines with the public. The highlights of this plan include:
 - o No less than 4 weeks prior to redeployment of a Marine unit, base and station public affairs officers (PAOs) contact local and regional media, local community leaders and other community relations points of contact, and local commanders to identify engagement opportunities. These opportunities are disseminated and coordinated via subordinate PAOs.
 - o PAOs will identify and proactively seek new speaking venues for recently returned Marines and Sailors. Headquarters Marine Corps provides additional talking points and speech support to major Marine Corps commands.
 - o Local base and station PAOs coordinate with their counterparts within Marine Corps Recruiting Command to identify speaking and engagement venues for Marines on recruiter's assistance.
 - o PAOs provide copies of events calendars, news releases, plans, and locally generated public affairs guidance to each other via the Intranet.

We are developing an updated, web-based tracking system for our commanders maintained by Headquarters Marine Corps. This updated system will have initial operating capability on 1 January 2006.

Billings Marines return from 7-month Iraq tour Billings, Montana (Sept 2005)

It took the better part of a year, but on Friday afternoon Linda Fowler, of Helena, got what she's been waiting for.

Her son, U.S. Marine Lance Cpl. Joseph Fowler, finally returned from Iraq.

The soldier was one of nine Marine reservists in a Billings unit who arrived at Billings Logan International Airport after a seven-month tour in Iraq. The Marines were received by a noisy throng of family members, friends and supporters.

In Iraa since February

The group, from Bravo Company, 4th Reconnaissance Battalion, 4th Marines Division in Billings, was activated in January. They were attached to the 1st Force Reconnaissance Company in Camp Pendleton, Calif., and sent to Iraq in early February.

Two other Marines from the group are due to return soon.

"It feels good to be back," Sgt. John Ryder, of Billings, said at a welcome-home party at the Marine drill center in the Armed Forces Reserve Center on Gabel Road.

Gettina reacquainted

The 24-year-old plans to return to Montana State University-Billingsto complete a degree in information systems. First, though, there will be the small matter of learning the new songs on the radio and getting reacquainted with life in Billings.

"There are some new businesses here and there, but for the most part everything looks familiar," Ryder said of his home since 1999.

In Iraq, the Marines were stationed in Al Asad in the Hit-Haditha corridor, identified by the military as a conduit through which insurgents transport people, weaponry and other resources from Syria. Under the cover of nightfall, the soldiers carried out more than 70 missions targeting what they call "high-value individuals" insurgents or other figures deemed to be security threats.

"The names are probably not anything you or I would recognize," Staff Sgt. Paul Dreyer, 36, of Choteau, said while others enjoyed burgers and brats at the cookout. "But they are the lieutenants and facilitators for the names you hear on TV."

Close calls abounded as the Marines routinely encountered small arms fire, improvised explosive devices, rocket-propelled grenades and other hostilities. In one case, Ryder and other soldiers narrowly escaped injury when their vehicle was struck by an **IED**. The vehicle was destroyed, Ryder said.

It was in the Haditha region where Pfc. Nicholas Bloem of Belgradewas killed, along with 13 other Marines, when a transport vehicle was hit by a roadside bomb Aug. 3.

While Bloem was serving with a different unit at the time, several of the soldiers who returned Friday had met him or trained with him. They said his death was at once deeply sad and a reminder about the danger of the roads they traveled every day.

"It was tough," said Lance Cpl. Joe Fowler, who trained with Bloem in San Antonio and described him as "an awesome guy" and a dedicated soldier. "All the Marines we leave with we fully intend to return with," he said.

Bloem's death was hard, too, for family members who learned about it while monitoring media reports for any news of their loved ones in Iraq.

"It just rips your heart out because you just know it could be your son," said Butch Bergstrom, of Sheridan. Wyo. His son, Lance Cpl. Jay Bergstrom, is a third-generation Marine with an older brother also in the Corps.

Former student finds inspiration with marine Ohio News/September 2005

Her heart is now at home. Former WSU student Courtney Whitt can breathe easier now that her boyfriend of over a year has returned from the war in Iraq. Although the circumstances under which her Marine returned werenit ideal, Whitt is happy to report that Lance Cpl. Beau Links, also a WSU student, is making a fine recovery.

Originally published on May 25, The Guardian reported that Links was being transported back to the states following injuries sustained while clearing houses of insurgents near the Syrian border. He was shot several times and wounded by a grenade blast.

Here at home, Whitt experienced many emotions because she couldn't get to Links."I felt hopeless because I couldn't see him. It was very frustrating...a very empty feeling," recalled Whitt.

Along with Links, his two team members were injured. Another team then came and moved them to a house that had already been cleared. Lance Cpl. James Crum, also Links' best friend, tended to his wounds until rescue trucks could take them to safety.

"(Crum)'s got a big hug coming from me when he gets home," Whitt said. "It made me feel better knowing that those two were over there together. They're unstoppable," she added.

In the four months since the incident, Links has made an incredible recovery. He's had multiple surgeries and his last one is Sept. 25 to put a plate and screws in his right arm. He also has physical therapy on weekdays at Wright Patt. In response to Whitt's support, Links was overwhelmed.

"It was unexpected. People don't do the things that she does. She was there when I opened my eyes in the hospital, and she's been there ever since," he said. "She's incredibly patient and understanding. If things are difficult, I can talk to her. She doesn't always try to solve the problem; she's a good listener. She's a keeper," he added with a smile

"He's very independent so I try to let him do things on his own until he needs me. But ('1) do anything for him even if its something small like going to get him lunch," said Whitt.

Both Links and Whitt stay involved with the Marine Corps by attending family days, e-mailing those that are still in Iraq. attending funerals of fallen Marines and staying in contact with others who are injured. The rest of Links' platoon is estimated to come home in mid October.

Whitt graduated WSU in June and is busy with a job search to put her psychology degree to use. Links is returning to WSU this quarter and is taking on a few classes.

When asked how their relationship has changed, Whitt was quick to answer. "We've learned things about each other that we wouldn't have learned for years. Despite all that has happened, I love where we are. He's my best friend," she said. "Beau is unlike any person I have ever met in my life; he's such an inspiration."

Marine returns home from Iraq Benally visits family after duty at Al Asad Air Base August 2005

For a while it was a frenzied but feel-good Friday at the Cortez Municipal Airport with friends and family cheering aloud to welcome home a local Marine from his first tour of duty in Iraq.

Marine Pfc. Lyle Benally, of Cortez, received a standing ovation after hopping off a Great Lakes propeller plane as people waved American flags and held up signs of support for the area troop and all U.S. service members.

"I'm just happy to be back and spend time with my family," Benally said after corralling a round of hugs. "I really appreciate everyone being here." About 60 people packed into the airport office—and waiting area to display signs that stated 'Welcome home Lyle Benally" and "Missed and love you son." Benally, 20, was assigned to the 2nd Low Altitude Air Defense Battalion while serving in Iraq. The main mission of the 2nd LAAD is to provide low altitude air defense to soldiers on the ground and in support of the 2nd Marine Wing.

Benally said the experience was good for him and that the weather was always "hot and dusty."

"(Marine) boot camp helped prepare us well for deployment," he said.

After three months of MREs (meals ready to eat) followed by three months of regular military chow. Benally appeared eager to attend the "welcome home" dinner held in his honor Friday evening at Empire Electric's Calvin Denton Room.

When you're over there you realize how everything is better in the U.S.," he said. "I didn't know how well we had it." Additional duties Benally performed during his Iraqi stint included primary security patrols around the perimeter of the base, searching incoming and outgoing vehicles and personnel, and providing tactical air command support. As an aviation mechanic, the private primarily worked with an EA-6B Prowler, which is a jet aircraft specializing in electronic warfare.

During their six-month mission, the 150 Marines of the 2nd LAAD lost no lives while stationed at the Al Asad Air Base in Iraq, according to Benally, but the unit did suffer two wounded in action.

Benally is a 2003 graduate of Montezuma-Cortez High School. He joined the military soon after graduating and is approximately two years through a five-year enlistment.

The private's father, Larry Benally, said he and his wife, Faye, have had mixed feelings and concerns since their son was deployed last February.

'We've had a lot to think about with him over there," he said. "After hearing the news every day on TV, our worries ran deep and our minds were on him. Sometimes you just have to go outside by yourself and cry things out." Private Benally is scheduled to leave Cortez Wednesday and soon return to duty at his regular station in Cherry Point, N.C. He was not certain whether a second tour of duty to Iraq is forthcoming.

Marine home **on** leave becomes dad Witnessed bombing and **loss** of fellow Marines in ill-fated Lima Company Dayton Daily News/August 2005

Lance Cpl. Nathan Ryerson, 27, who was sent home from Iraq by his commanders on emergency leave at the request of the Red Cross when his pregnant wife began experiencing complications, is now a father.

The subject of a *Dayton Daily News* article on Tuesday, Ryerson, who was given a middle of the night homecoming reception in his hometown of West Milton on Saturday, and his wife, Suzanne, 27, are parents of a healthy son. According to family friend Joy Cornelius, the baby is named Thomas Klyne Ryerson, and was born by C-section at 4:09 a.m. Wednesday at the Upper Valley Medical Center in Troy.

"Everyone is doing fine," Cornelius said. Ryerson was the first member of the Lima Company, 3rd Battalion, 25th Marines from Ohio to return home to the states after 14 Marines from the company died in action on Aug. 3. Ryerson witnessed the bombing and loss of fellow Marines and bunked in the same room with 11 of the victims.

Others in his unit are expected to complete assignments and to be sent home within a month.

Marine home with grateful family Rocky Mountain Colorado News/August 2005

The afternoon flight from Palm Springs arrived in Denver 15 minutes early Wednesday, but not soon enough for Marine Cpl. Dean Sanchez, who was coming home after serving three tours in Iraq.

"All you think about is family and when you're going to see them," he said. "This is the most scared I've been in a year."

Sanchez, a Denver native, spent the past three years fighting the war in Iraq and was greeted by friends and family at Denver International Airport on Wednesday.

As loved ones rushed to the waving hands of Sanchez in a crowded baggage claim area, the Marine relished being around family and girls again. He also can't wait to eat home-cooked tamales and stuffed sopapillas.

"I'm very grateful. I'm going to watch him and feed him," said his mother, Rose Garcia.

Sanchez, 29. is a member of the 3rd Battalion, 4th Marine Regiment that helped provide security in Fallujah and took part in the takeover of Baghdad. Sanchez said he was one of the Marines that helped topple the statue of Saddam Hussein in Baghdad.

"I wish I could have done more," he said.

Sanchez has received 10 medals including a Purple Heart when he was hit in the shoulder by a ricochet bullet from a sniper last year. Family members jokingly said he wasn't hurt enough to come home then.

"I'm not going to miss the sand. I'm not going to the beach anytime soon," he said.

His twin sister, LeDawn Sanchez, stood in the background and remained quiet as he hugged friends in the airport. She is a minute younger and said she missed their twin connection.

"I think we feel each other's pain," she said. "He called the day I had my baby. He didn't know. Dean was on his way to Germany and he had an intuition."

LeDawn Sanchez brought her 2-year-old son, Latyr McQuarters to the airport. He was dressed in army fatigues and was still learning the Marine yell, "OORAH."

"A lot has changed since he has been gone," she said. "It was hard not being able to talk to him every day and seeing the war on television and not knowing if he was hurt."

Dean Sanchez's arrival comes at a time when anti-war activists have been protesting outside President Bush's Texas ranch for almost two weeks. Cindy Sheehan, who started the protest because her 24-year-old son was killed last year in Iraq, is asking to speak with the president.

Sanchez backs the war effort and sympathizes with the loved ones of those who died, but he said the soldiers know what they get themselves into when they enlist.

"When you put up your left hand, you swear an allegiance," Sanchez said. "We all joined the Marines knowing what we're doing. There was nothing hidden."

Sanchez said he is getting out of the Marines and plans to attend law school after he finishes his bachelor's degree at Metropolitan State College.

But before he starts thinking more about the future, he wants to chow down on menudo and green chile.

"We ate good food out there, but there's no substitute for home-cooked Mexican food," he said.

Local Marine fights for recovery one finger **at a** time Salem, Ore. July 2005

KEIZER -- She cradles his lifeless wrist with one hand and with the other takes his fingers, one at a time, and bends them until he flinches. Then she bends each one a bit more and holds it in that position for **10** seconds.

Again and again, for about an hour each day, she flexes his crippled fingers during a series of range-of-motion exercises. This is not Erik Sphoon's idea of holding hands with his wife, but the routine is just the beginning for the Marine Corps sergeant.

A sniper's bullet ripped through his hand, wrist and forearm last month while he was on patrol in Ramadi, Iraq, and he faces a year of grueling physical therapy.

"Most of it feels like a good stretch," he says, "but some of it feels like a voodoo death grip.

"I can't just not do it. I want to be able to use my hand again someday."

The exercises are almost as difficult for Christie, his wife.

"I get squeamish because I think about the pain," she says. "I don't want to push too hard or snap anything. My worst fear **is** I'm going to mess up what they have fixed."

Erik has had more than a dozen surgeries to repair shattered bones, torn tendons and severed nerves. His arm is held together by a 7-inch metal plate and several pins and screws.

"I don't know why it doesn't sound like a robotic arm, because there's so much stuff in there," he says. "It should just be hydraulic."

Almost six weeks have passed since he was wounded, and he barely can wiggle his thumb and his index finger. But the 26-year-old knows he *is* lucky. He could have lost his arm or bled to death.

"Not a day goes by that I don't think about it," says Erik, who is home on convalescent leave.

Second tour in Iraq

He was shot about three months into his second tour of duty as an infantryman with Alpha Company of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment. During his first tour, he was among the first troops to move into Fallujah in April 2004.

"That was just one big gunfight the whole time," says Erik, who grew up in Aumsville and graduated in **1997** from Cascade High School in Turner.

He returned to Iraq this year to find the insurgents even more determined, carrying out more sophisticated attacks. Two members of his platoon were killed in April when an improvised explosive device detonated near their convoy.

Erik had had some close calls -- like the time a roadside bomb exploded across the street from his Humvee -- before getting wounded less than two months later.

Members of his platoon were on patrol June 12 in Ramadi, about 70 miles west of Baghdad. They were escorting a civil-affairs group that was surveying residents in a city that has been the site of frequent attacks that have killed U.S. troops. They were cordoning a city block and establishing what they call "trigger lines," placing a barrier of cones to keep Iraqis at a distance and away from their vehicles. The locals were getting too close in one area, so Erik, the platoon guide, radioed to extend the trigger line. He moved the cones himself and, as he was placing the last one, he heard the shot coming from a bolt-action rifle.

"It felt like my arm was on fire," he says, "and I felt this giant hole."

A swift reaction

Erik dropped his rifle, grabbed his arm to try to stop the bleeding and ran for his Humvee about 20 yards away. His driver, Lance Cpl. Josh Barfield, was waiting with bandages. The bullet entered through the back of his hand, shattered his wrist and exited under his forearm. His ulnar artery was severed, and a chunk of his arm was blown away. He was losing a lot of blood. He remembers that later. when doctors removed his desert camies, they were soaked red.

"The more excited I got, the more blood rushed out of the wound," he says.

Barfield's quick reaction and calming influence were crucial to saving his arm, perhaps even his life.

"He was very cool," Erik says. "He knew what he had to do and just did it. He told me, You're going to be all right; it's not that bad.' He was lying to me, but he was calming me down.

"I think -- I know - he pretty much saved my life."

A medevac vehicle arrived within minutes and transported Erik to a field hospital. He was groggy from a morphine injection but remembers his teary-eyed platoon sergeant coming to visit him.

"On the radio, he thought I had been shot in the head," Erik says, "not the hand."

While Erik was at the field hospital, nurses were able to use Vaseline to remove his titanium wedding band from his swollen hand. It doesn't fit the ring finger on his right hand, so for now, Christie is wearing it on her thumb.

Fearing the worst

Once Erik was stabilized, a medevac crew flew him to Germany, where he underwent surgery, and then to the Navy hospital at Camp Pendleton, the headquarters for the 1st Battallon, 5th Marine Regiment. Much of the first few days was a blur. He was sure he was going to lose his arm and join hundreds of troops who have undergone amputations in the more than two years since the war began in Iraq.

"I thought I was off to Bethesda, where amputees go." Erik says, referring to the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Md.

Instead, Camp Pendleton was his destination. He arrived June 19, one week after being hit by that sniper's bullet.

Family at his bedside

His wife and daughter, his parents, and his younger brother and his wife were there to greet him. The Injured Marine Semper Fi Fund reimbursed much of their travel expenses, allowing them to concentrate on Erik's recovery.

"It's definitely a life-saverfor the injured," Erik says, urging people in the Salem-Keizer area to donate a few bucks to the nonprofit organization. "I don't care how tough you think you are; you can't do it alone.

"I'm definitely going to donate to them when we have more money. I'm not the last one who's going to get injured over in Iraq."

Erik underwent surgeries almost every other day while doctors worked to repair the damaged bones, tendons and nerves. Metal plating, pins and screws were inserted to help the wrist heal. Doctors also grafted skin from his upper thigh to replace the tissue that was blown away.

He developed an infection while in Iraq and still needs a full drip bag of antibiotics every six hours. A pick line was surgically inserted into a vein under his right biceps so he doesn't have to be poked for an IV every time.

"If I don't fight it off," Erik says of the infection, "I could potentially still lose my arm."

His father, Tim, the chief of the Aumsville Rural Fire District, helps out with the IV when Christie is at work.

Vital surgery is near

Erik will undergo perhaps his most important surgery next month at the Navy hospital at Camp Pendleton. Doctors will take a piece of nerve from his leg and insert it in his arm where the ulnar nerve was severed. His physical therapist says it might take a year before he can use his hand to pick something up. He might never be able to use his ring finger and pinky.

"As long as I can still play cards," he says, demonstrating the motion of sliding playing cards across the table with his thumb and index and middle fingers.

Texas Hold 'em is his game. He and his buddies spent **a** lot of their free time in Iraq playing the popular poker game.

"The guys wouldn't want to play with me cause I took all their money," Erik says.

There are other, more important, things he wants to be able to do, such as being able to tie his shoes and tickle his 18-month-olddaughter, Alexis, who has his bright blue eyes.

Erik keeps his arm in a sling and rests it on a pillow most of the time. Underneath the sling is a mesh "sock" that covers much of his arm from wrist to elbow, "so I don't have to look at it, so people don't have to see it."

A large, jagged scar juts out from under the mesh sock. A small patch of dressing on the inside of his forearm marks the spot where the skin graft was done. He wears an Isotoner glove, which keeps his joints warm and his fingers from swelling too much. A few days ago, for the first time, he took a long look at the wound.

Changina plans

The scar reminds him that a career with the Marines no longer is in his future. At best, he might regain 80 percent use of his arm, which isn't good enough for an infantryman.

"Sitting behind a desk, in front of a computer, doing paperwork, that's not me," Erik says. "That's not why I joined the Marine Corps."

In another year or so, after completing eight years of service, he expects to be medically discharged. He and his best friend, Devin Hlavinka, plan to start *a* local

motorcycle custom fabrication shop. Erik wants to go to college when he gets out of the Marines and take courses to learn how to start and run a small business.

His job now is to be faithful to physical therapy, which means spending at least an hour a day with his wife holding his hand and taking him through the range-of-motion exercises.

As his wife presses down on one of his fingers, he closes his eyes and winces. Sometimes he holds his breath and then sighs with relief as she lets up.

"I just don't want to get her on a bad day," he says with a smile.

Semper Fi Fund

A group of Marine Corps spouses started the Injured Marine Semper Fi Fund in April 2004. It is a nonprofit organization that provides financial grants and other assistance to injured Marines, sailors and their families. The fund helps pay for travel and lodging, for example, **so** families can be at the bedside of their loved ones. The fund has provided more than **\$1.7** million to more than **1,000** families.

Marine corporal honored by New Britain Rock Cats August 2005

NEW BRITAIN, Conn. (AP) _ Just a couple of bad hops away from where he played shortstop for the Eastern League co-champions four years ago, Tony Stevens was honored Wednesday by the New Britain Rock Cats for his valor on a much more vital front.

Stevens, a Marine corporal who has served two tours in Iraq, was targeted by roadside bombs 11 times but never badly hurt.

His return to New Britain Stadium elicited an outpouring of love and respect from city and state officials as well as the thousands on hand to **see** the Rock Cats, part of the Minnesota Twins farm system, play the Portland Sea Dogs.

"It's great that they remember me," Stevens said. "There was a lot of talent on that team."

When the 2001 Eastern League Championship Series between the Rock Cats and the Reading Phillies was canceled because of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. Stevens was en route from New Britain to his home near Jacksonville. Fla.

On the way, his family's military background, Americans' patriotic reaction to the attacks and his sense of duty combined to convince him to leave baseball behind.

"No regrets," Stevens said about his decision. "Never had one. When you're in a fight hole and you're in Iraq, you say, 'Wow, I could be in spring training right now.' But no regrets as far as stepping away from the game."

Stevens, who played shortstop, took batting and infield practice with his old team Wednesday.

He received an official welcome from Rock Cats owner/general manager William Dowling and proclamations from state and local officials.

Statt. Bannell, marketing director of Stanley Tools, announced the establishment of a \$10,000 scholarship fund in Stevens' honor.

Rock Cats manager Stan Cliburn, who also managed the **2001** club, delivered a short speech about Stevens' contribution to that team.

"He was a tremendous baseball player but he's even more tremendous as a (Marine) protecting our country," Cliburn said as he presented Stevens with a red, white and blue jersey that the Rock Cats would wear in his honor.

The visiting Portland Sea Dogs stood attentively along the top step of the thirdbase dugout. The **2005** Rock Cats, a few of whom played with Stevens during his five years in the Twins organization, acknowledged him from the other side.

Stevens, **26.** spoke after a lengthy standing ovation, saying servicemen are not heroes but are just doing their jobs.

He first joined the Rock Cats at the end of the 2000 season. He started the **2001** season with the Class A Fort Myers Miracle but was promoted to Double-A New Britain in June 20.

Stevens will start a third tour in the Middle East in October. He said he would like to give baseball another shot when it's over.

Marine burned **in Iraq** explosion returns to **U.S.** with new mission Patriot News (Pa.)/August 2005

Paul Croom II's life, and his perspective, changed in the violent blast of an improvised explosive device.

That blast tore through an armored vehicle in which Croom, a Marine first lieutenant and 1995 Cumberland Valley High School graduate, was riding near Karibilah, Iraq, on May 11.

Croom, 27, was burned and battered, but comparatively lucky.

Six Marines died in the explosion. Another nine, including Croom, were wounded.

All Croom needs to do to remember that horrifying moment **is** look at the Purple Heart medal that was pinned to his chest late last month.

He has been a Marine for five years, but the fighting with Iraqi insurgents near the Syrian border during Operation Matador was his first taste of combat.

A public rolations officer, Croom had been in Iraq about a month with Regimental Combat Team 2.

He was with a squad of Marines when the explosion ripped their armored amphibious vehicle apart.

"The inside of [the vehicle] turned orange and filled with thick, black smoke as it leaped in the air, violently throwing the passengers about," Croom said. "Everyone was flung upward and I came down hard on my right side.

"I looked to the front of the troop cabin and all I saw was a wall of flames licking the silhouettes of still figures. ...The Marines in front most certainly were killed by the blast, and thereby saved from an even more horrible end."

The interior of the vehicle felt like "a foundry," Croom said. "I knew I had to get out."

He failed three times to pull himself out a top hatch, then dove through a small rear hatch another Marine had forced open.

"As I ran, I looked down at my arms and noticed that I had no skin on my forearms. They were not my normal chocolate color, but instead the color of raw chicken." Croom said.

"My face tingled slightly, but I took no notice of it as loads of adrenaline rushed through my body."

Despite his wounds, Croom said he helped a corpsmantreat another injured Marine, whom they dragged to safety as ammunition in the burning vehicle exploded.

It was only when the corpsman yelled, "You're hurt. You need to sit down, sir," that he was treated for burns on his arms and face. Croom said.

After stays in hospitals in Iraq and Germany, he was sent home and is now stationed at Marine Corps Air Station Mirarnar in San Diego.

Croom, an accomplished musician who performed with the Harrisburg Youth Symphony, joined the Marines after graduating from the University of Colorado, where he studied on a music scholarship.

His father, Paul, of Philadelphia, was a Marine during the Vietnam era and his mother, Ada Long-Croom, is a captain with the Navy Judge Advocate General Corps in San Diego.

His wife, Sara, is a Northern High School graduate, and his in-laws, Kathy and Sam Thuma, live in Susquehanna Twp.

Croom said he once aspired to be a pilot, and before going to Iraq intended to become a military lawyer like his mother.

His experience in the war zone -- he was "awed by the professionalism and dedication" of the U.S. service people, he said -- changed those plans.

He returned home convinced his duty is to help the Marine Corps better tell the story of the troops who risk their lives daily, he said.

Civilian reporters can tell part of the story, he said, but they can't tell it like the Marines who do the fighting.

Croom said his wounds have healed well, but "I still have flashbacks."

His feelings were mixed when he received his Purple Heart during a July 29 ceremony at Miramar.

"Really what you think about as you're getting [the medal] are the guys who are getting it posthumously," Croom said.

Tri-state Marine Receives Bronze Star For Valor Cincinnati/August 2005

On Saturday a local Marine was honored for his heroism after his actions in Iraq saved lives.

Sergeant Lonnie Douglass Young, of Dry Ridge, was presented with the Bronze Star with a "V" for valor.

When insurgents attacked a base in southern Iraq last year, Young responded with gunfire to repel the assault.

He also pulled a wounded comrade to safety and after being shot in the shoulder himself, he continued to fire on the enemy.

At Saturday's ceremony Young said it felt good to have his whole family there to see him receive the medal – and to feel their pride for him.

"It's a good feeling, yes, to have everybody that you see here today just for me," said Young. 'That's a great feeling. It comes from a gruesome time."

Young was married just two months ago.

He was promoted to Sergeant in the spring and has since left active duty.

Marines serve so little brother won't have to Ohio/August 2005

The Cohen boys keep stepping up for their conflicted country. While telling each other not to.

'Why in the world did you?" big brother Aaron asked middle brother Ryan last week.

Aaron, 19, is a fine one to talk -- a Marine reservist with knees hobbled by kicking down doors in Iraq. His injuries may have saved his life, sending him home before attacks early this month killed 13 members of his already bloodied battalion, based in Brook Park.

But Ryan, 18, plunged even deeper. He joined the Marines, shipped out last Tuesday to boot camp at Parris Island, **S.C.** and figures to be in Iraq soon.

'With the way the war's going, I'm pretty sure they're going to need me," he said.

The two Marines agree on this much: Their little brother Jacob. 12, should never serve.

"He's not going to because me and Ryan are already doing it," Aaron declared.

"Ryan and I." chided their mother, Gloria.

Gloria admires her boys' courage, but prefers to see it up close. "I love them and I want them in my life forever."

Jacob says he's not sure about enlisting. He might just "stay home and protect my parents."

Like so many neighbors, the Cohens are torn about the drawn-out war, which has killed an estimated 26,000 civilians and at least 1,874 American troops, including 48 Marine reservists assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 25th Regiment, based in Brook Park.

The mother blames Iraq's deposed Saddam Hussein for terrorism, though government and independent panels have found otherwise. The father, Bob, divorced and living in Sharon Township, wants "a graceful exit."

Ryan has mixed feelings. "It is good that we are helping in other countries, but we should take care of our country first," he said.

Aaron said he has to guard his views as a Marine. And some of the views he aired were conflicted.

He praised the war for "disarming Saddam from his draconian rule." But he faulted it for estranging allies. Aaron shipped home on July 4 and asked people at a German airport to steer him toward US Airways.

"They wouldn't even look at me," said Aaron. "They'd just point."

Whatever the war's merits, the boys in this comfortable, professional family believe in serving their nation.

"It gives something back to the country that has brought you up and given you a free education," said Aaron.

Aaron was training at Parris Island two years ago when his knees began to ache. He blames fierce drills like the "duck walk" -- running while squatting, a tactic seldom tried in combat.

"There's only one good reason they have you do anything in boot camp," said Aaron. "That's discipline."

After three weeks of treatment and light duty, Aaron recovered enough to finish camp. Then he began attending Ohio State University while serving weekends in Lima Company, a nearby infantry unit assigned to the reserve center in Brook Park.

This March, all five companies of the 3rd Battalion shipped to Iraq. Aaron, his squad's tallest member at 6 feet 2, kicked down doors during searches.

Some occupants welcomed the squad. Others shot at it. No members were wounded, but Aaron's knees grew sorer than before.

He was shipped to Kuwait in May for two surgeries and a little therapy. The knees still balked. So he went home for longer treatment.

"It's one thing to leave a bad situation," he said. "It's another thing knowing your brothers in arms are still there."

Some of the brothers killed this month were friends. Aaron had learned a little Spanish from one of them and had regularly awakened another for a turn on watch.

"These were the guys that were going to come back and take dates to the Marine Corps Ball," said Aaron. "They're not going to be there anymore."

Aaron is still spending many hours in therapy. His prognosis vanes from doctor to doctor. He sees no chance of rejoining the battalion before its homecoming, scheduled for September.

Aaron is supposed to spend four more years on active reserve, then two on inactive. He said he may become a military lawyer or a politician.

"There's changes we need to make," he said.

Ryan signed on for four years rather than juggle military and civilian life like Aaron.

"I figured I'd just get in there, get it done, get it over with," Ryan said before shipping out. "I'm nervous, but I'm ready to go. I'm going to try to keep positive the whole way."

Norman, Stokes will go from a war zone to Southern Conference football North Carolina/July 2005

After two tours of duty in Iraq, a three-month football season doesn't seem so imposing for two Appalachian State players.

Wayne Norman and Brian Stokes, two strapping, 26-year-old freshmen, will take the field for the Mountaineers this fall.

"When we open the season against Eastern Kentucky, on each side of that kicker is going to be a Marine running down the middle of that field," Coach Jerry Moore of the Mountaineers said.

Having served four years in the 2nd Battalion, 2nd Marines, Norman and Stokes have endured experiences that few 18-year-old, fuzzy-faced freshmen could comprehend. They were shipped to Iraq in 2003 at the start of Operation Iraqi Freedom and returned last year as things were heating up in Faluja.

As TOW gunners, or anti-tank missile launchers, both progressed from driver to vehicle commander to squad leader, and both attained the rank **of** sergeant. Now both are living out their dream of playing college football.

They were applauded by the rest of the team when they were introduced last spring.

"As with anything, we've gained a lot of confidence by being over there," Stokes said. 'You lead 25 troops in a firefight, that should tell you that you're capable of doing anything you want if you put your mind to it."

Or, as Norman put it: "I think it goes with that mentality of what doesn't kill you just makes you stronger."

Stokes, a Shrine Bowl selection from Burlington Williams High School, went to East Carolina in 1997 as an invited walk-on but tore a tendon in a finger and didn't play. Norman, a two-way starter in high school, enrolled at his home-state University of Massachusettsfor a year.

Both faced financial hardship and left college after a year. They worked for a while, then joined the Marine Corps in 2000 with the intention of returning to college afterward with the aid of the GI Bill.

Norman and Stokes met at Camp Geiger right after basic training and hit it off immediately.

"I wound up having to borrow money from him the first day because I didn't know we had to go buy a bunch of stuff at the PX," Norman said.

In 2002, they began a nine-month deployment to Kosovo, Kenya and the United Arab Emirates. They wound up in Iraq in March of 2003 and stayed there **45** days.

"We were actually on our way back to Camp Lejeune when the war started," Norman said. "Everybody was pretty happy about that, and then it was, 'Guess what, we're turning the boat around.""

Norman and Stokes said that their unit encountered little resistance once there, but that changed in a seven-month follow-up assignment beginning in March **2004.** They encountered particularly heavy fighting when approaching Faluja.

"The second time, I couldn't count how many bullets I felt fly by," Stokes said.
"We were in probably over 30 fire-fight engagements, and I don't know how many road-side bombings. And every day there was a mortar attack."

Stokes lost **some** of his hearing during one attack and has applied for a purple heart.

"A 100 kilogram bomb blew up about five feet from my armored truck," Stokes said. "The impact blew the 300-pound doors open."

Norman said: "The first time we got ambushed was *so* surreal. We had trained with blanks, and you're used to the sound, but it's definitely not the same. We were taking it from both sides of the road in pitch black. It was incredible. We were blessed that none of our guys got hit that day."

Both completed active duty last November, although they remain on reserve and could be recalled. Stokes, who had wanted to attend Appalachian out of high school, decided to pursue football again and confirmed that he would have at least two and possibly three years of eligibility remaining.

"I felt like it was something Lieft undone at ECU," Stokes said. "I wanted to come back and finish what I started and complete that dream."

Norman came with Stokes on a visit and was sold, too. "I figured it was like riding a bike." he said.

Stokes said: "I had forgotten what practice was like. I was really anxious to get that first hit, to see how it felt. As soon as I did, it was like, 'Yep, that's how it feels.""

Norman (5-11,215) nailed down a spot on punt coverage, and Stokes (6-1.220) on both kickoff teams during spring drills.

"We know we're not going to go out and start right away, but maybe in a year or two we might learn the defense enough or the offensive schemes to be able to compete at that level," Stokes said.

Norman said: "It's a little bit physically demanding because we have aged a bit and we're competing with kids out of high school, but it's not that bad."

Not bad at all, Stokes said.

"We went from having such close friends in the Marines - people we went to war with - and that's what you miss the most when you leave," Stokes said. 'We get here, try out for football in January and didn't know anybody, but now it's very similar to the same sort of brotherhood and camaraderie we had over there. I love being around these guys. It's a great bunch."
